The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

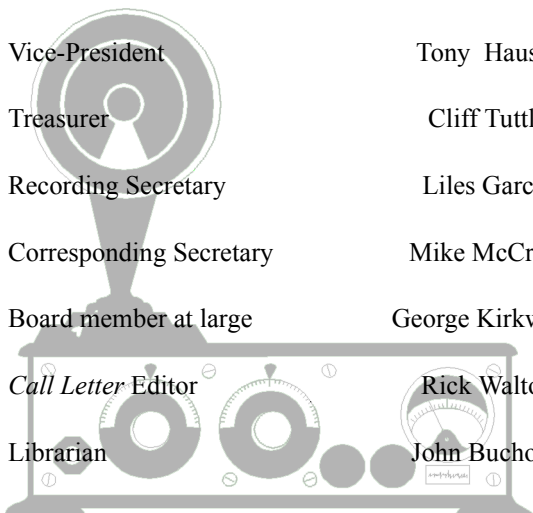
Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

Larry Tobkin 30s vintage wood case Coronado table top AM SW radio from the swap meet. It worked fine when I got it, but it needs a little work. There is no model number that I can find, but it is easy to work on with the help of my trusty tube manual.

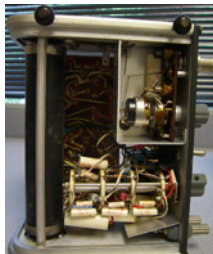
Sonny Clutter Majestic 5TO 5-tube clock radio. This 1939 beauty in a beetle plastic cabinet features a backlit 2-way mirror dial.

Dave Wise General Radio 1232-A Tuned Amplifier/Null Detector from Alan Douglas over on ARF. I got this as an accessory for my 1650-A and 1656 Impedance Bridges.

The bridges have a built-in 1kc oscillator and 1kc tuned detector. It's possible to drive the bridge with an external oscillator anywhere from 20cps to 100kc, but you need a tuned detector to filter out all the 60/120cps hum, and the oscillator harmonics. The 1232-A has a sharply peaked response you can tune on a dial anywhere from 20c-20kc; it also has fixed-tuned filters at 50kc and 100kc. It also has logarithmic compression on the meter, so you can see both loud and soft signals without messing with an attenuator.

It also has funky little telescopic front feet, I guess so you can tilt it to match your bridge :)

It was designed to run off nine short, wide "M72" mercury batteries; I intend to retrofit alkalines or lithiums. When I figure out how to fit them in, I'll post it.



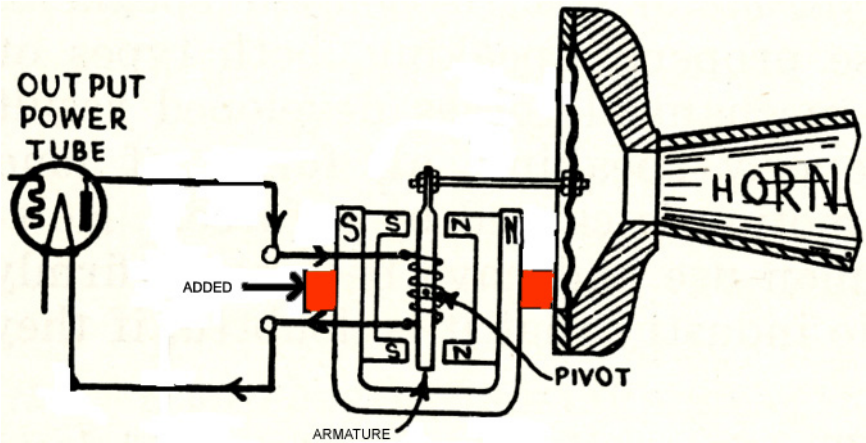
Revive That OI' Horn

As most of you remember from our last club meeting, I brought a working display of my 1924 Silvertone Neutrodyne 6 tuber, bought from Steve Berglund at our last swap meet in May. I have yet to find a model number, let alone a schematic for this beautiful domed radio with it's built in horn speaker. I saw one in a magazine, dated 1924, so I will have to go with that as to it's origin. 2 RF and 3 audio stages comprise this 'single knob tuning' TRF. It came home with an open primary 1:3 interstage audio transformer between the second and third stages, and a few 01A tubes that were open. Both Sonny Clutter and George Kirkwood noticed the sound distortion. George suggested I change out the 71A output tube and replace this with a 01A. Blake Dietze just happened to have a 01A handy. Wouldn't you know that George's suggestion made a dramatic improvement? George also said that a less tinny sound could be had if the old horseshoe magnet in the speaker assembly had more magnetism. He thought a few inexpensive, rare earth magnets put in the right places on the horseshoe, would make a further improvement.

Driving home from the meeting found an unplanned stop at Harbor Freight Tools to buy ten of these super magnets for \$1.49. Upon my return home and the radio wired to it's battery eliminator, I placed various magnet combinations around the horseshoe without much change in sound. Not one for giving up, I finally pinned the magnet on the donkey's horseshoe 'so to speak'. I would say the difference in sound quality is nothing short of amazing. It may be even better were I able to place magnets on both sides of the horseshoe, but lack of space didn't allow for this.





George also said something about removing the ‘whiskers’ between the spaces of the speaker armature and the horseshoe. I wasn’t sure what he meant by this until dragging a piece of rough paper between these spaces removed flakes of rust and other metallic debris. I now see how such debris could prevent proper action of the speaker in these tight spaces. There may be other solutions for remagnetizing these old horns, but I would have to say this is an easy and effective solution to the problem.

I hope to bring the new and improved radio to our next meeting in July to demonstrate the before and after effects of magnet restoration using small super magnets. I am grateful to have had the chance to learn more about this older sound reproducing technology, and to the continuing help and support from our club members.

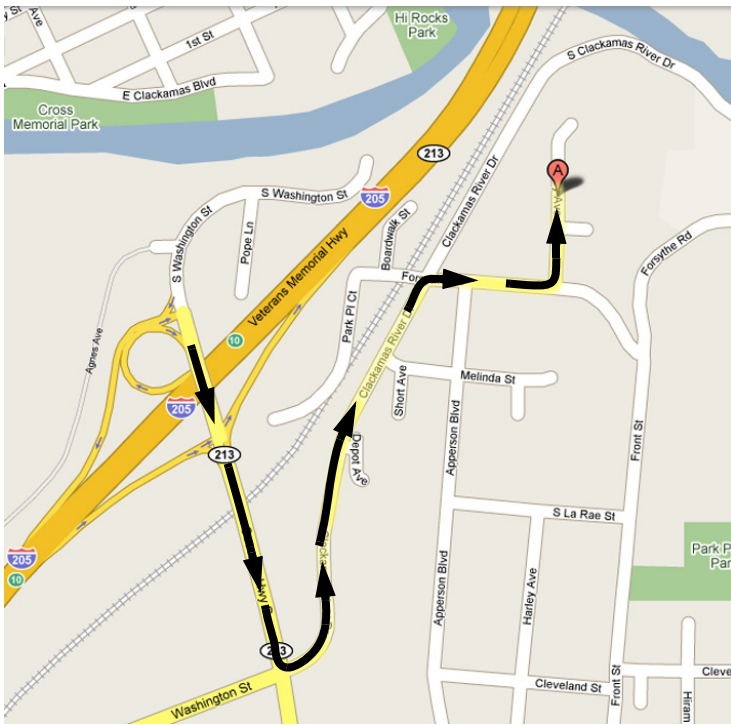

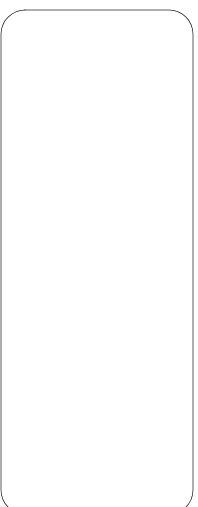
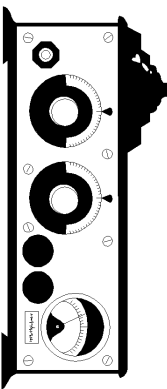
