Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 9:30 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.

Hugh's Radios

What kind of radio it was is lost to time, what is known, though, is that after WW I Hugh was just a youngster when he, and his father, started building a radio together, and the radio "bug" bit and stayed with Hugh for the rest of his life. And though Hugh did not have the opportunity to work with radios for quite some time after that first nibble at playing the radio game, his interest never waned.

Fast forward to 1976 when Hugh heard about a club that was devoted to vintage radios. How he heard about the club his lovely wife, Virginia, does not know, but he heard about it none the less and they both decided that it was a club that they should check out. Vintage radios piqued an interest in both Hugh and Virginia and off they went. The rest, as they say, is history.

When Hugh and Virginia joined the NWVRS, Hugh began seriously collecting radios. He purchased his collection primarily through the Club by buying from Club sales. Virginia also joined the Buena Vista Club, which was located in Oregon City and where the Radio Club held their meetings at the time. Fellow NWVRS wives Dorothy James and Bobby Kibler also joined the Buena Vista Club in order to facilitate the continuation of use of the Buena Vista's Clubhouse by the Radio Club for their meetings.

Hugh's radio collection started growing eventually totaling nearly 30 different makes and models. He would spend his free time working on them, endeavoring to get them all functioning again. He also contributed articles to the "Call Letter," the Radio Club's monthly publication, containing everything pertinent to the Club. Virginia and the other wives would often participate by helping out with holiday and other special events for the Club.

Both Hugh and Virginia were very active in the NWVRS for twelve years and enjoyed every minute of their time with all of their fellow members. Sadly, their involvement ended with Hugh's sudden passing in 1988.

In memory of her husband Hugh Ranken, Virginia Ranken, recently donated 15 of Hugh's radios to the Club to be auctioned as a benefit for the club. It was her way of honoring her husband's memory and their time in a club they both enjoyed.

Nighthawk Radio by Art Redman

WOODBURY RADIO ELECTRIC

Formerly at 304 Salmon Street

The Woodbury Company of Portland first located at 304 Salmon Street manufactured only one battery radio their two-dial *Nighthawk* model. The \$98.75 price included a horn speaker (no brand listed), filament storage battery, B battery, 201A tubes, (number not listed) in a mahogany wood cabinet and for extra charge a six-volt A battery charger. The ad also promised "coast to coast reception," and "volume, tone, and distance". Their December Christmas ads promised "coast to coast reception with a *Nighthawk*".

The Company moved on November 16, 1924, announcing in the Oregonian newspaper, to a new location at 481 1/2 SE Hawthorne Blvd. Their last ad placed in the Oregonian was February 22, 1925.

Does any Call Letter readers have or seen a *Nighthawk* Radio made in Southeast Portland in 1924-1925? Enquiring collectors, *NWVRS* members including yours truly, would like to know.

Portland's community radio station, KBOO, is marking its 50th anniversary with an exhibit of artifacts and ephemera at the Oregon Historical Society. Memorabilia will be on display through July 29th.

KBOO went on the air June 18, 1968. Studios are located at 20 SE 8th Ave and its transmitter is located on the KGON tower in the west hills.

Also at the OHS this spring, there is an exhibit honoring Oregon State University's 150th anniversary. In a brief preview I noticed a classic microphone from the KOAC (Oregon Agricultural College) broadcast studio and an Atwater Kent breadboard.

The Oregon Historical Society is located downtown at 1200 SW Park Ave. Admission is free to residents of Multnomah County.

Tektronix for a number of decades published copies of documents to their field offices on microfiche. The vintageTEK museum has an extensive microfiche collection estimated at over 3 million individual pages. There are certainly duplicates and some of this information is already available publicly but there is specific documentation that is available in microfiche only. This video will tell you more.



Due to the significant number of pages and finite volunteer hours available, our initial effort will be to respond to specific requests for information. A dedicated effort to scan major portions of the collection is dependent on additional volunteer hours.


