

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "Vintage Radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 9:30 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held in and around Portland.

With each issue of the Call Letter, we remember Jim Mason, a charter member of the society who remained active until his death in 1999. A generous bequest from Jim's estate ensures the vitality of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society, and continued publication of the Call Letter.

KGW FM

KGW FM Portland, the first commercially operated frequency modulated radio station, went on the air on May 7, 1946. The frequency was 95.3 MHz with 250 watts of a temporary power broadcasting from 3:00 to 10:30 pm. KGW announcer Bob Franklin won the "first honors" by drawing straws.

"Good afternoon," said Franklin. "You are listening to KGW-FM, the first Frequency modulated station to in the Northwest". Then he read a local newscast and played some recorded music. The audio frequency response was limited to 8000 KHz because of the weak telephone link from the studios to the broadcasting transmitter located in a one-room shack atop Healy Heights. The only FM set available to the KGW executives was a pre-war Scott with a new converter selling at the Meier and Frank store in Portland for a total of \$984.35.

KGW radio engineers bought a Hallicrafters Model S-27 UHF Communication receiver to monitor the FM station the previous day. Other than those two radios, the only FM receivers available to Pacific Northwest listeners during May 1946 were some estimated 600 pre-World War II Capeharts, Scotts, and Philco Model 42-1015 all requiring a new 88 to 108 MHz converter selling for \$10.00. McNaughton's Records at 1216 Main Street, Milwaukie offered conversion for pre-war FM receivers to the new higher bands.

The Scott Model 800B Radio Phonograph in a Chippendale cabinet was advertised in Radio and Television Retailing during September 1946, available at Meier and Frank during November for \$1057.60. Adaptable for television a feature not needed in Portland until 1952 when KPTV went on the air. Also selling at Meier and Frank was the Freed-Eisemann FM Radio –Phonograph Combination set at \$546.85.

Within one year of its' first broadcast, KGW FM increased power to 5100 watts while FM receiver set owners grew to 5,000 households in the Greater Portland area.








