

William Dawes, baritone, of Cincinnati, will be guest soloist on Josef Cherniavsky's "Autumntime Concert," over WLW, Sunday, December 4, at 4:00 p. m. (E.S.T.). As his "Chance of a Lifetime" song, Mr. Dawes has selected the aria "Eri Tu," from the opera "Ballo In Mas Chera," by Verdi.

Mr. Dawes began singing as choir boy in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Brooklyn, his native city, and took his first singing lessons from the organist of Union Church there. Preparing for an operatic and concert career, he studied with Robert Gaylor, New York Oratorio coach, and in 1931 was graduated from the American Academy of Dramatic Art, in Carnegie Hall.

Little-known incidents from the life of the late Knute Rockne and the contributions he made to the youth of America will be dramatized on the first program in the new series of "Cavalcade of America" programs to be broadcast over CBS. including WKRC and WHAS, Monday, December 5 at 8:00 p.m. (E.S.T.)

Rockne gained fame as the football coach at Notre Dame where he was a star player during his own undergraduate days. An endless list of his pupils are now coaching at various schools around the country. Among them are Elmer Layden who succeeded Rockne at Notre Dame; Jim Crowley who puts the Fordham team through its paces; Harry Stuhldreher of Wisconsin; Adam Walsh of Bowdoin and Ed. Anderson of Holy Cross, to name a few.

James Truslow Adams, one of America's greatest historians, is supervising the script. Thomas Hardie Chalmers, who was heard as narrator in the documentary film, "The River," will be heard as narrator on the program, and Gabriel Heatter will act as commentator. Mr. Adams has the "Top o' the Morning" programs. He has developed a technique in production that permits the talent to give the best possible show. In other words, Mr. Adams doesn't run around the studio with a stop-watch in hand, giving signals to cut or stretch. He allows informality to reign supreme.

Owen Vinson, WLW program director, was elevated from the ranks. He first served the Crosley stations as production man, then production manager and dramatic director, and finally program chief. Riekl Kent, whom we mentioned in last week's installment, is the dean of WLW-WSAI production men. Although Mr. Kent's specialty is dramatics, he, too, knows music and can "double in brass" as an actor, announcer and all-around radio entertainer and director.

Sammy Fuller, who conducted the 'Musical Steeplechase' and other WLW productions, leans towards the musical side in production work, but Mr. Fuller also knows dramatics. He began his radio career as a vocalist, has studied music, and likes classics.

Charles Lammers, the veteran theater man, likes dramatics, but he is an all-around man. He produces the stage portion of "Boone County Jamboree." His forte is dramatics and characterizations, yet Mr. Lammers can step into a musical program and come out with a good show.

Jack Edmunds might be termed a variety" man. He has produced many of the WLW and WSAI variety shows in the past. He likes to work with dance bands. One of his chief programs is "Melody Grove" with Jimmy James' orchestra.

Gordon Waltz, one of the younger production men, does variety programs also. He has handled musical shows and dramatics as well, but his chief love is for the variety program that has a bit of comedy, a dash of music and some dramatics.

W. Ray Wilson writes and produces dramatic shows. Arthur Radkey, assistant director of the "Nation's School of the Air." has a big job producing many of the "School of the Air" dramatic programs. Joseph Ries, educational director, supervises the entire School" series.

WSAI claims one of radio's few vomen producers. She is Wilda Hinkle, who handles several programs on Cincinnati's Own Station. Miss Hinkle, member of the dramatic staff, produces "Rainbow Ridge" and other WSAI morning programs.

TO WHICH TOWN?

Ever since the Federal Communications Commission announced that it would investigate network broadcasting, the public has been curious to know just what the purposes of that investigation are. So when the speech of Commission Chairman Frank R. McNinch at White Sulphur Springs was broadcast November 19, he had a large and interested audience.

What that audience heard was a vigorous statement of policy that both clarified the situation and left it more obscure than ever.

Mr. McNinch began by declaring, with an emphasis which seemed solemn warning, that broadcasting stations are licensed to operate a solemn warning, that produced and necessity."

The requirement has been

This is scarcely news. The requirement has been part of American radio law since 1927. But it is news of the first importance if the Commission really means to put the phrase to work. The "public interest, convenience and necessity" is such a fundamental and explosive principle that many, many things in radio would be different if it were ever applied, thoroughly and courageously.

Then Mr. McNinch explained that the purpose of the F. C. C.'s network investigation is to determine whether a monopoly exists

This too has a familiar ring. Monopoly is a sure-fire bogie at Washington. Whether the networks are, or threaten to become, a monopoly may be important to the broadcasting industry. But to listeners, it seems a good deal more important to define the precise function the networks shall perform in radio's scheme of things. As things stand, that is far from clear. And proving or disproving the existence of monopoly promises to shed no light whatever on the part the networks should play in serving the public.

But, as outlined by Mr. McNinch, the ironic angle of the Commission's investigation is that it ignores problems that affect the listener

Commercial announcements are typical of these. It is safe to say that sponsor plugs cause more irritation and disgust among listeners than any other thing in radio. They are becoming worse, rather than Yet the Commission evidently plans to do nothing.

Another problem that is becoming more and more pressing is the lack of program diversity. Throughout many periods of the broadcasting day the same type of program can be found all over the dial. During the day it is the "real-life" serial; during the evening, the "variety show." Clearly this should not be, under a competitive system of broadcasting. Yet the Commission apparently means to do nothing about it.

So long as these several other problems are ignored, listeners cannot be blamed for taking a "Yeah? So what?" attitude toward the

current investigation.

In a newspaper interview regarding that investigation Mr. McNinch is quoted as saying, "Now we're going to town." Perhaps so. But just which town it is still seems pretty uncertain.

WASHINGTON—Defending his company's judgment as to what does and what does not constitute profanity in radio programs, John F. Royal, vice president of The National Broadcasting Company, in charge of programs, appeared before the FCC this week as the star witness as hearings continued on the investigation of monoply and chain broadcasting.

Royal defended the recent "Beyond The Horizon" broadcast carried over NBC stations which created a furore in FCC Commission ranks for several days. He declared that the use of such words as "hell," etc., in the Eugene O'Neill play were not used as profanity.

NBC accepted full responsibility for the program, Royal said, but he did not believe the lines complained of were profane. "We did not feel that the name of the Lord was being used in vain," he said, "because the character who used it was a deeply religious man and we do not think he would have used it that way, just as a minister would not."

The NBC vice president told the FCC Commissioners that his company's programs alone, he said, cost the network \$5,000,000 a year. He estimated that NBC sponsors spend \$15,000,000 a year on radio programs.

Asked by George Porter, assistant FCC counsel, whether he believed that NBC should maintain its policy of signing artists to exclusive contracts, Royal said he did.

"You wouldn't expect to have Babe Ruth playing for the Yankees one day and the Giants the next," he said, "and I wouldn't want Charlie McCarthy on NBC one night and on Columbia or Mutual the next."

He said that NBC's policy on children's programs was as stringent as possible and that the network officials used their "best judgment."

"Radio mustn't be blamed for all excitable children or adults," he declared.

The Commission was told that NBC in its commercial contracts carries a clause which requires sponsors to give equal time to opposite points of view whenever they introduce a controversial subject of public interest on their programs.

Artist Monopoly Charged To Chains

Charging that NBC and CBS have a monopolistic control of concert artists the American Guild of Musical Artists, Inc., has asked the investigating committee of the FCC to allow it to present evidence proving that "great injustices" to artists is the result of such alleged policy.

The petition was submitted as the committee heard testimony describing operation of the NBC Artists' Service, which manages performers who range from "concert artists to three goats from a bock beer party."

"By purchase and consolidation of a vast majority of the then independent managers, NBC, Inc., and CBS, Inc., have acquired (directly or thru subsidiaries) a monopolistic strangle-hold on the services of concert and opera stars whose appearances on radio are essential to the radio industry with the result that competition for the services of these artists has been stifled" it was charged.

"To aid this monoply, CBS and NBC have together acquired monopolistic control of the business of concert management by operating (directly or thru subsidiaries) as a sideline community and civic course in approximately 400 U. S. cities."

McNinch's Face Red!

One of the amusing incidents of the hearings occurred late this week when in the course of cross-examination of Mr. Royal's testimony Chairman Frank R. McNinch asked if NBC programs very often went overtime.

The short and sweet answer of Mr. Royal was, "Very seldom. Mostly when Government officials speak over our network."

The Chairman had left himself in something of a spot "behind eight ball" as he had only a few days ago made an address over the works, scheduled for 30 minutes and had gone 7 minutes overtime quietly dropped the subject.

"Perhaps this yardstick would seem to allow us wide latitude of choice. But it has not proved so. Only after many hours and days and nights of reading, study and discussion have we arrived at a list of stories that will allow us to maintain the standard of entertainment that we propose."

The first few weeks of the new Playhouse series will include such widely-varied material as a thrilling adventure story of India, a Christmas fantasy, a war romance and the dramatization of the latest best selling novel. Still other types of stories will

With the lengthening of the "Playhouse" presentations to occupy the full hour, there will be scope to present each of them in graphic detail. Supplementing the gifted characterizations of Welles, celebrated guest stars will be selected for roles in each week's drama.

The new series of broadcasts represents the culmination of a gradual process of change in the character of the "Hollywood Hotel-Playhouse" program, which began last spring. As it was felt the dramatic presentation provided the most interesting factor in the broadcasts, plans for the lengthening and strengthening of this factor were begun at that time.

As early as June 27, Orson Welles and his "Mercury Theater of the Air" were auditioned with a view to their appearing in a summer series of "Playhouse" broadcasts. However, it was decided to suspend the broadcasts for several weeks during the summer and in September the program resumed from Hollywood, with the dramatization lengthened to encompass a complete, finished story in each broadcast. Now, with a new cycle of programs beginning on December 9, the final step in the program's evolution is fulfilled.

After the auditioning of Welles in June and a careful study of his broadcasts from week to week, it is felt that he is the logical man to assume leadership of this important new dramatic series. His training in the theater and in radio have complemented one another, and his meteoric successes in the two mediums have been simultaneous.



Verdi's "Otello" to Be Presented to **Radio Listeners**

With Giovanni Martinelli and Law rence Tibbett in the leading roles, the world's radio audience will hear Verdi's "Otello" on December 3, at 1:55 p. m. (E.S.T.) over NBC, including WLW, when the second complete Saturday matinee opera of the Metropolitan Opera Company's 1938-39 season is broadcast.

A short musical preview of the themes, important melodies, and other excerpts from "Otello" will be offered by the Metropolitan Opera Guild in its second "Operalogue" over NBC at 6:00 p.m. (E.S.T.), Thursday, December 1

The story of Verdi's "Otello" is based on Shakespeare's tragedy. It was first produced in 1887, sixteen years after the Italian composer's "Aida." The power and characterization of the music is extraordinary, for Verdi, like Wagner, employed the orchestra as his main vehicle of expression.

The scene of the opera is a seaport in Cyprus in the fifteenth century. Iago, envious of Cassio's promotion by Otello and incensed over Otello's rise to general in the Venetian army and to governor of Cyprus, plots his revenge. Iago induces Roderigo, who still loves Desdemona even though she is the wife of Otello, to serve him as an accomplice in his evil designs. Though Desdemona faithfully loves her victorious husband, Iago's crafty planning succeeds in making Otello jealous. Cassio becomes the unwitting cause of this jealousy when Iago builds him up in Otello's mind as Desdemona's secret lover.

Eventually, Otello becomes so jealous he strangles his wife. Too late, Iago's wife, Emilia, bursts into the scene to expose the plot. As the music swells to a terrifying climax, Otello stabs himself. Dying, the tragic Moor calls to his dead wife, while the orchestra softly plays the melody of the beautiful love duet, sung by Otella and Desdemona in the first act.

We heard "Orpheus and Eurydice" piece-meal Saturday afternoon, as probably a thousand other listeners did too. Notified in the daily columns of the press that the nation's facilities would be at the disposal of the Army-Navy boys for their annual post-Thanksgiving set-to for several hours, we tried out the short wave range of our particular instrument and by switching among W5XAL, W3XL, W8XK, and W2XAF, got parts of the opera, a news broadcast in French, a number of sports announcements, and considerable static.

Of course we have no intention of mincing matters with the radio stations that will tell you volubly that our United States are sports-conscious. Deprive an anxious public of the Army-Navy classic-never! We enjoy it ourselves. We have an inward feeling, however, that there are some few (precious few) who prefer opera to football. In Cincinnati those few were forced to waive their preferences in favor of the pigskin addicts for two hours, while three major stations regaled their listeners with the Army-Navy game. The Columbia, National, and Mutual chains gave hearty recitals of the gridiron battle from (we hope) every possible angle, and all the sports-lovers were happy, very happy.

Our only thought on the subject is that at least one recital of the game might have been sufficient in the Queen City, regardless of the varying perspectives of the announcers who relayed the plays with a wealth of assorted vocabulary. If one were not sufficient, two would have been. Besides, there were stations in Columbus, Cleveland, Louisville, Detroit, Chicago, and a dozen other places-all within easy listening range-who had subscribed to the same idea as the three Cincinnati stations. The tender, graceful music of Christoph Willibald Gluck was no match for all this football enthusiasm and only scored a miserable field goal in the fifth quarter, after the Cadets had whipped the Tars in a smashing 14-7 victory.

That allowed the woods-moving, animal-taming voice of Orpheus (Kirsten Thorberg, mezzo-soprano) sufficient time to come through with the heartrending "Che faro senza" and convince the dieties of the Styx to give back the lifeless Eurydice. Madame Thorberg's singing of the aria was compensation enough for conscientious patience and the afternoon ended on a jubilant F Major chorus of the rejoicing shepherds, shepherdesses, heroes and heroines of Herr Gluck's little classic.

Saturday night, Toscanini fans listened to another Orpheus, dripped from the pen of Franz Liszt in the form of a rhapsodic tone poem, keyed mostly in the tender vein. The work, heard rarely in concert halls, seemed as brilliant as the composer's other pictures of Mazessa, Tasso, Faust, etc. One wondered why it, as well as the Martucci symphony, played by the NBC Symphony Orchestra, are not performed more frequently. The Martucci work had much of the orchestral sparkle of Tchaikovsky, Berlioz and Franck, besides a considerable originality of its own, and apparently would stand up against a little popularity.

As for orchestral pyrotechnics, however, Tchaikovsky's Fourth Symphony was the prize piece Sunday afternoon, with John Barbirolli officiating on the New York Philharmonic Symphony podium. The pin-wheel "scherzo" and the roman candle "finale" were exceptionally brilliant, and we rejoice that conductors like Barbirolli have seen fit to revive the Russian's sentimental works. Well played also on the symphonic matinee were the Elgar concerto and the "Fountains of Rome." A word to the wise for serious listenersthe ent'acte comments of Deems Taylor are worth fifteen minutes or so of undivided attention; the time he takes up between symphonies should not be used for going to the refrigerator for ice cubes to freshen up Sunday afternoon drinks.

Too bad that the Radio City Music Hall contingent must give up its tabloid operas, though subsequent symphonic programs undoubtedly will live up to their established reputation. Mr. Rapee's "Faust" on Sunday was a masterpiece of abbreviation, all the best parts (there are so many) having been retained, including the splendid prologue. If the operatic series could only be extended to include some of the less well known items of the standard repertory.

Added to the woes of the FCC on censorship matters these days is the possibility that the Commission may be forced to take some kind of stand on the recent broadcast of Father Coughlin over a number of stations which was allegedly anti-Semitic. The Detroit priest spoke over about 50 stations and is reported to have charged that Jews are the main proponents of Communism and then "explained" why Hitler was persecuting the Jewish race.

Although the matter has not come before the FCC officially it may be hard put to side-step the issue when complaints are received. This incident may develop into another straw "that broke the camel's back" and force the FCC to finally take some definite and concrete action on censorship in general.


