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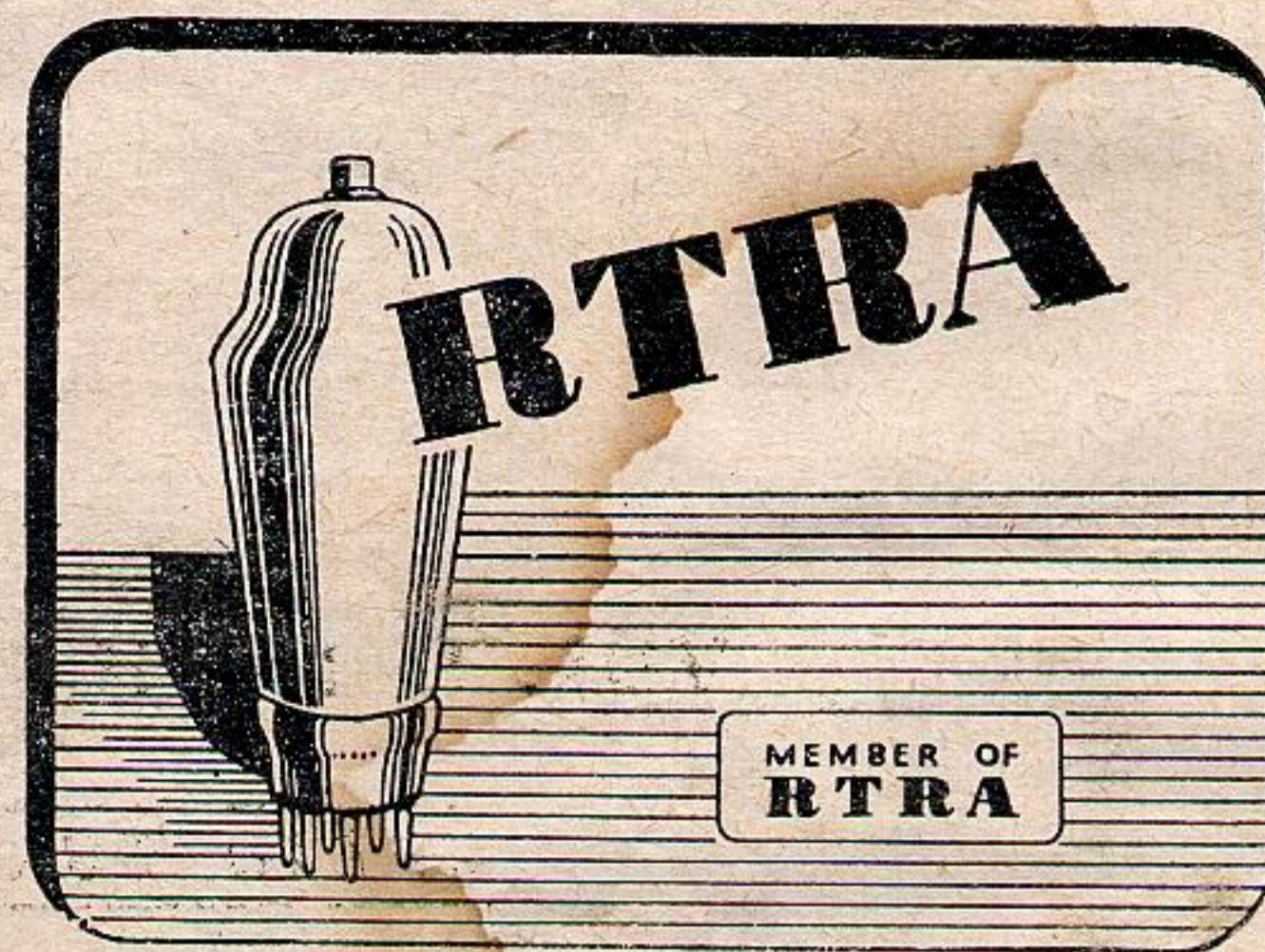

## Better Timing from Luxembourg

LUXEMBOURG is to increase its English programme hours next month, I learn. At present it is on the air for 35 hours a week. From October 21 this will be stepped up to 42 hours a week. Listening time will begin at 6 o'clock each night instead of at 7.

This increase, expected to last through the winter, is possible because of the greater listening public since the inauguration of the 208-metre medium wave.

Many people, unable to obtain the station on the 1293-metre long wave, now have a clearer reception on the new wavelength.

The long wavelength, at present still used on Sundays, will be discontinued after the end of this month, I understand. It will be passed on to the French section of Radio Luxembourg.

When the new time-schedule comes into operation in October, listeners will get the longest daily programme from Luxembourg since before the war. Details are not yet complete. But several ambitious items are being planned for transmission during the next few months.

They'll be addressed in the scrawling handwriting of little boys all over the country who want a copy of Dan Dare's life story before he left for Venus.

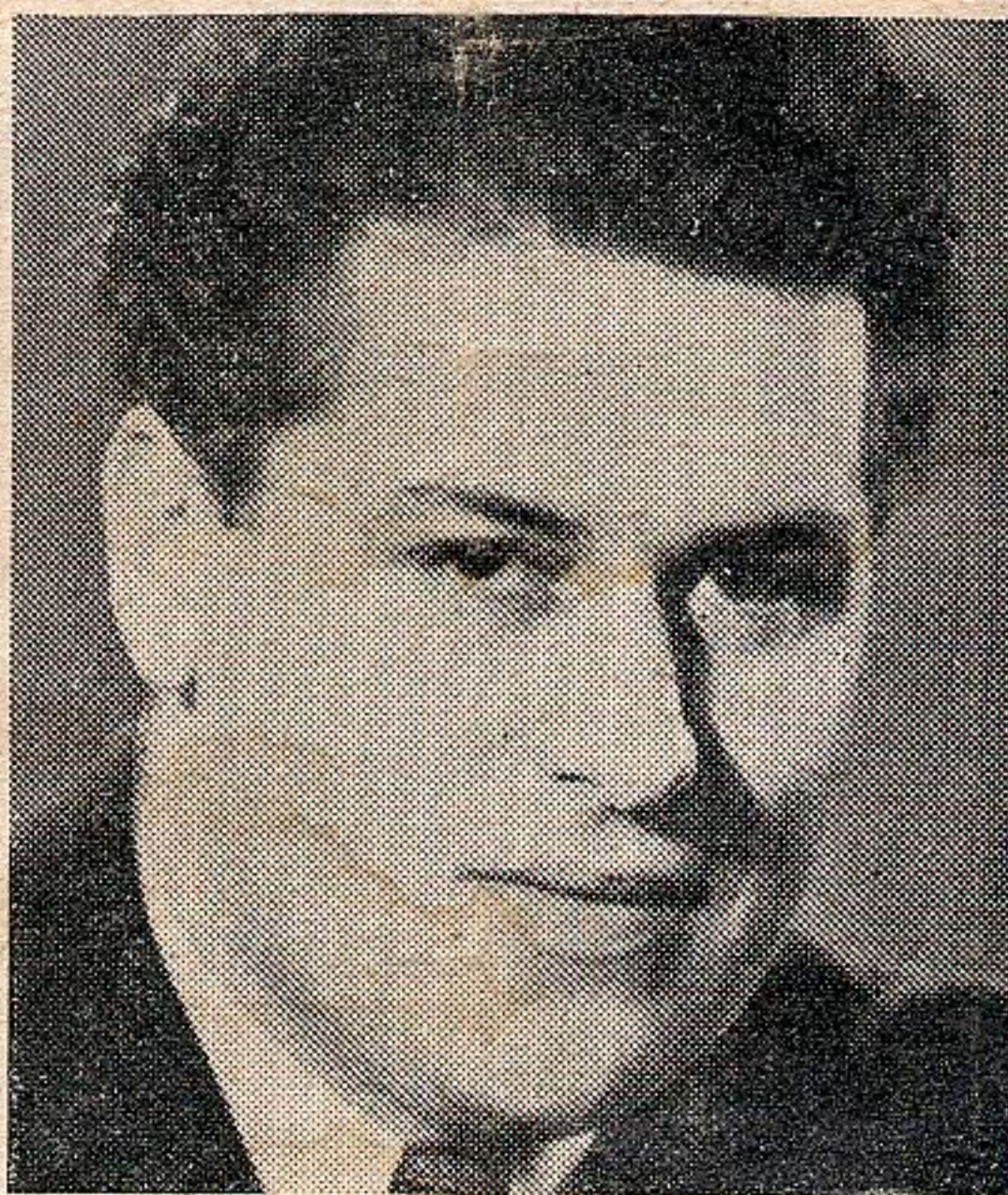

SPORTING personality in "A Date With Dickie" on Friday night will be the Trinidad sprinter McDonald Bailey. No one has been more pleased than I this summer to watch his athletic success.

Too many people have said his running skill is just a myth—especially in 1948 when muscle trouble prevented him from excelling in the Wembley Olympics.

His form this season, however, has indicated that he is one of the best

sprinters in the world. He holds the British 100-yard record (9.6 secs.), as well as both A.A.A. sprint titles. He has also come very near to beating the world sprint times. Yet he is 30!

### More For The Record

PITY Kathran Oldfield can't be seen as well as heard on Sunday. For this 24-year-old, fair-haired, hazel-eyed singer has been voted one of the three most beautiful women in her native Canada.

Unlike many other pretty girls I know, Kathran has brains as well as looks. She is doing very well for herself in England, what with her weekly Luxembourg programme and the regular recordings she is making for overseas.

Kathran has been in Britain for two years now. She came here in 1949 after gaining experience in Victoria and Toronto. Within two days of her arrival she appeared in "In Town Tonight." Within less than a week she had offered to her the first of several long-term radio serials.

Today Kathran Oldfield lives in Hertfordshire. She is neither married nor engaged. "I have no time for boys," she says. But "Just For The Record," Kathran does have time for... (see page 5).

# JUST FOR THE RECORD

HELLO, everyone! This marks the first time my record selections will appear in *Radio Weekly*, and I hope you'll enjoy reading the comments which will appear here week by week.

If you have any special discs you'd like to know about, please write in and I'll try to help you.

First on the list is one by the Deep River Boys: *The Stars Are The Windows Of Heaven* and *Mr. And Mississippi*.

In the first title, the Deeps do a great job—and special attention will be drawn to the "new" voice which has been added since the Deeps were home last.

I believe this record is the first one in which his lovely tenor voice appears. I was told that this member of the group was discovered singing at a college somewhere in the States.

On the reverse side—*Mr. And Mississippi* starts off in a medium tempo, finishing with a wonderful bright bounce.

The Deeps are currently at the Palladium; their many fans will certainly enjoy seeing them in person, as well as getting much pleasure out of their records. H.M.V. B.10101.

Those of you who saw *Show Boat* will be happy to see that M.G.M. Records have issued a series of sides taken direct from the sound-track.

Kathryn Grayson and Howard Keel sang and acted the principal roles; rarely have the duets, *Why Do I Love You?* and *Make Believe*, sounded lovelier.

They are teamed together on *You Are Love*; and on the back of this is William Warfield singing the famous *Ol' Man River*. This was one of the high spots of the film, as indeed were the appearances of that exciting team, Marge and Gower Champion.

Judge for yourself in *Life Upon The Wicked Stage* and *I Might Fall Back On You*

Then, of course, we have Ava Gardner who was the gorgeous Julie in the film. She has quite a job on her hands with *Bill* and *Can't Help Lovin' Dat Man*. But Ava is supported beautifully by Adolph Deutsch and the M.G.M. Studio Orchestra. With such backing it's not hard to sound fairly nice—and even Ava manages to at times. M.G.M. 407-410.

Columbia are very fortunate in having Doris Day on their books, as I'm

sure they discovered long ago. Here is the honey-voiced Doris singing *Very Good Advice* (from *Alice In Wonderland*), also *Life's Desire*—this is not one of Doris's most outstanding recordings; still, I'm sure you'll want to add them to your collection. COL. DB2888.

David Rose was over here not long ago, to see the old homestead. (He was born in England—news to some of his fans). His latest release here is *Liza*—but I have another disc here with his own composition, *Puppet Serenade*, backed with *Zing-Zing, Zoom Zoom*.

This is another typical Rose record; but how can you improve upon perfection. M.G.M. 376.

*Pa's Not Home—Ma's Upstairs* is a title that just couldn't be ignored by Nellie Lutcher. This is definitely her meat. She sings a composition by her sister, *I Really Couldn't Love You*, on the other side.

The phenomenal success of Nellie over in England is by no means news—so I'll bet there'll be plenty of fans waiting to buy this! CAPITOL 13509.

Another Capitol record that is definitely not a late issue, but one which I thought you might like to get, is a Woody Herman record, *Early Autumn*.

It is composed by that brilliant young arranger, Ralph Burns, and the list of names in the Herman Herd read like the Who's Who in the music world. Stan Getz on tenor, Terry Gibbs on vibes. And Bill Harris playing trombone on *Tenderly*—the other side. CAPITOL CL13184.

Finally on Esquire 5-032 we have a duet, *What A Cute Little Hat*, sung by Robert Beatty and myself. Robert Beatty has not previously recorded for any company, and it speaks well for Esquire to have latched on to him.

I'm sure you'll get a kick out of this side. On the flip-over is *Honey Lips*—which I sing as a dual vocal. It's easy, once you know how . . .

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# Meet the Short Waves

## 2: Where and When

HAVING presumably whetted readers' appetites for short-wave thrills in last week's issue, the best policy is to drive home the advantage with some practicable hints.

The guide presented below, however, is not the final word. It is meant to give a simple general forecast of where and when to look for stations in various corners of the globe.

There are, of course, exceptions to the examples given, but when you consider how complex the whole thing is—depending as it does on geographical positions, the path of the waves, seasonal conditions, local broadcasting times, to name a few governing factors—it would be difficult to produce anything with tighter limits.

As it stands, the table can be used by the neo-short-wave listener to find when to hear specific countries, what bands to hear them on, and, conversely, what times to listen on various bands to find certain countries.

### Night And Day

The observant reader will notice that the figures bear out last week's observation that, generally speaking, the low wavelengths are best in daylight hours and the high wavelengths in darkness.

A quick check on this can be made by tuning over the 13- and 16-metre

bands after darkness and the 49-metre band in the morning or afternoon. In each case, the bands will be comparatively empty, if not totally blank. Reverse the process and there will be stations for the asking.

Take an example of where exceptions to the rule exist. Some stations are purely "local" and are only meant to cater for a comparatively small area. That we can pick them up is pure accident.

Other stations are on the air primarily to reach listeners in worldwide localities. The International Stations, then, will make sure they are on the air at convenient times for their "target area." It is no use, for example, pouring out programmes for Great Britain at four in the morning.

On the other hand, the local broadcasters have only their national listeners to think about. Often, although good reception is obtained where it is wanted, such programmes are difficult to hear, because they are transmitted at an inappropriate combination of time and wavelength for the knob twiddlers in this country.

### Amoy Calling

Let's take, for example, a station used for local reception in China. There is one at Amoy which operates on the 49-metre band from nine in the morning to two in the afternoon.

According to the chart, the best time to hear Asia on 49 metres is much later in the day. But as Amoy is not on at that time of day it can be heard only at a time unsuitable for good reception.

Despite such anomalies, the chart holds good for the more powerful stations. Conditions also have a say in the matter, but this is a topic in itself and will be explained next week.

This series is being run with the idea of telling the short-wave story, so that the previously uninitiated will have another string to their entertainment bow.

And soon we will talk about each of the main broadcasting bands in turn, with tips on how to tune in the more popular stations.

Each week we will give additions or amendments to the Guide Chart published in issue 14. Well received at the moment is the Saturday Sporting Session from Radio Australia at 0600-0730 (G.M.T.) on 21,540 kc/s (13.93m). The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation gives an English session from 2100-2300 on 11,720 kc/s (25.60m). The two daily English transmissions from Vatican City are given at 1500 and 1815 G.M.T.

(Note: British Summer Time = G.M.T. + 1 hour.)

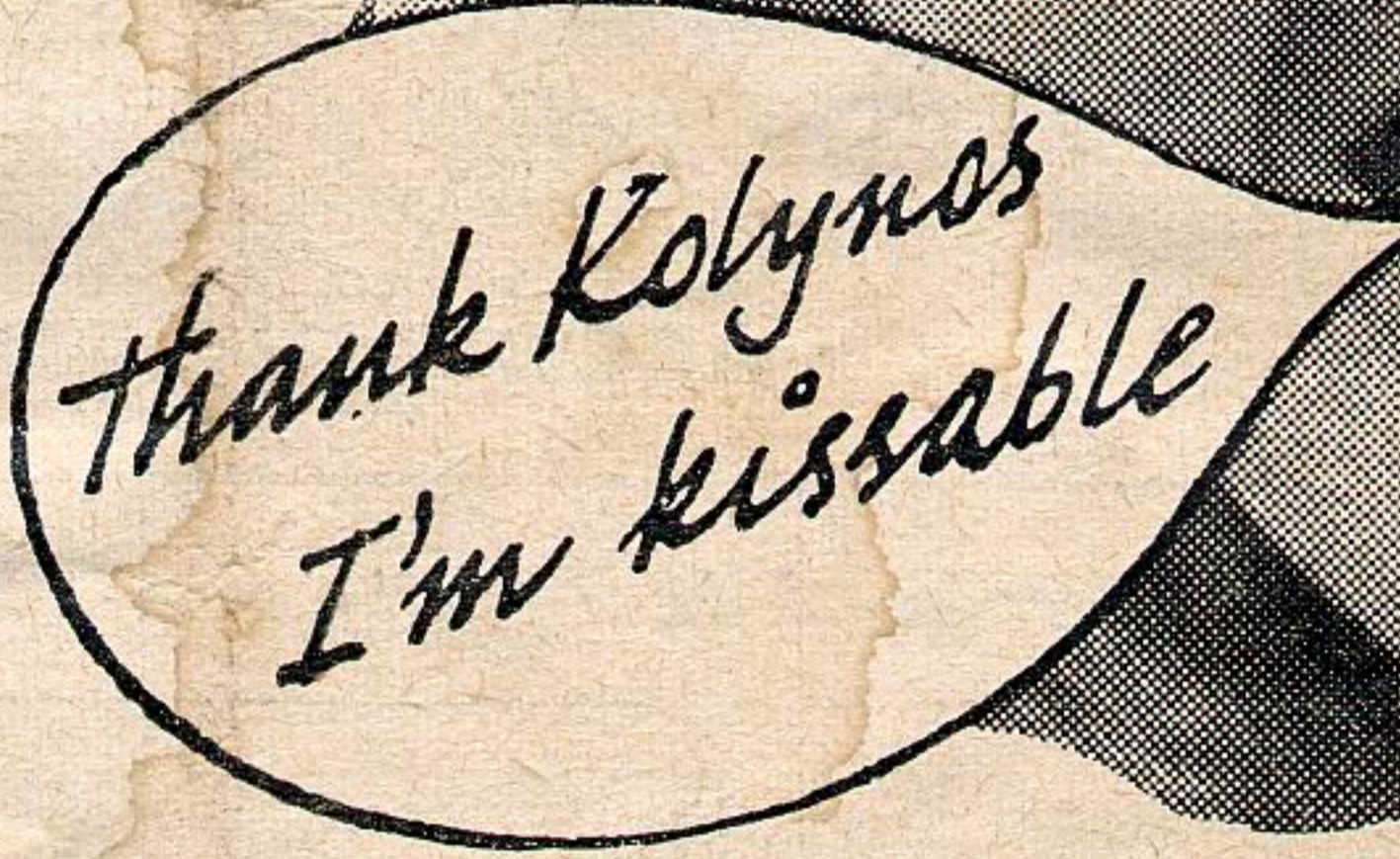
