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OJAI FESTIVAL: Music's Last Stand

Remember all those concerts you yawned and squirmed through earlier this year? Look around you. In case you hadn't noticed, the season is over. The end of April saw an abrupt finish to musical activity in Los Angeles.

Now aren't you sorry? Feel guilty? Me neither. But you may end up wanting to hear real, live music — it does have a certain charm that staring at your turntable and speakers just can't match. The Bowl hasn't opened yet, however, and you certainly don't want to spend a warm California evening sitting in a stuffy concert hall, even if you could find one with a concert in it.

Summer festivals to the rescue! Many events are called festivals, but some are distinctly more festive than others. The one in Ojai, California, scheduled this season for the weekend of May 23-25, has earned its title by setting up its own high musical standards and holding to them valiantly for 23 years. Concerts here are far from the yawn-and-squirm variety.

First, there's the apparent code of the Festival: Bring in the best professional musicians from the area, with several visiting dignitaries. Offer musical fare consisting of works from all periods (particularly the very old and the very new) which unquestionably deserve to be heard.

If this sounds similar to the credo of our Los Angeles Monday Evening Concert Series, it is. Lawrence Morton serves as artistic director of both, and gets a lot of help from his friends. The differences are that at Ojai one is less likely to hear a modern work which may never be heard again, and the Festival does things on a somewhat grander (if shorter) scale than the winter series.



To get to Ojai, drive north from L.A. on the Ventura Freeway, past all those new communities which, the planners say, will soon be centered in the heart of the Western megalopolis (they should be so lucky). Go until you are positive that you have passed the turnoff, keep going, and then, only then, will you see the sign for Ojai. (Actually, it's less than 80 miles from downtown L.A.)

Once you get onto the country road, do the same thing — go through several little settlements. When you're sure you've gone too far, you'll be almost into Ojai.

You'll find yourself in good hiking country, with slopes appropriate for both real mountaineers and the rest of us. There are also opportunities for golf and tennis, and, for one and all, a chance to breathe O₂, not O₃. The town has a population of about 5,000. It's surrounded by orchards, with the resulting inescapable fruit stands. The row of shops is fun to wander through, and you'll find the usual variety of restaurants, coffee shops and rural-type drive-ins.

There are, says the Festival management, about a dozen hotels and such in the immediate vicinity. Brave souls however, should have no trouble finding a relatively soft spot on the grass — though chances are it won't be a legal one.

For the five concerts during the

weekend, the performers are backed by a wooden shell at the far end of the Civic Park on Ojai's main street—the one you drive in on. Audience members either grab a spot on a bench or opt for the grass—in either case, blankets and sweaters are a must.

Five conductors, all past or present Californians, are scheduled to appear. Michael Zearott will lead the Festival Chamber Orchestra for the program opening night. Formerly assistant to Robert Shaw with the Atlanta Symphony, the 31-year-old Zearott shared firstplace honors in this year's Mitropoulos Competition and will take over as assistant conductor of the National Orchestra of the Monte Carlo Opera. Lalo Schifrin, this season's multi-talented composer-inresidence, will share the podium with Zearott.

Gregg Smith will conduct his Singers on the Saturday afternoon concert; the chorus will appear again under the baton of young Los Angeles conductor Michael Tilson Thomas with the Festival Orchestra in the weekend's final event on Sunday afternoon.

In between, Stefan Minde, the new assistant chorus director of the San Francisco Opera, will direct the Festival String Orchestra (approximately the same group of instrumentalists appears with three different titles) on Saturday evening. Sunday, at the inhuman hour of 10:30 a.m., Milton and Peggy Salkind will present a program of music for piano four hands. They list such standards as Ravel's Ma Mere l'Oye as well as unusual works by Felciano, Helps and Schifrin.

Soloists this year also include Sheridan Stokes, flutist; Paul Shure, violinist; Peter Hewitt, pianist; Christina Krooskos, mezzo; Hayden Blanchard, tenor; and James Johnson, baritone-all relatively familiar to Southern California audiences.

This season's Festival repertory is not as startlingly unusual as it has been on past occasions. (Major premieres have been presented at Ojai, and visiting conductors have included Stravinsky, Boulez-who'll be back next year—and Foss.) But the musical focus remains commendably daring, and we can look forward to hearing Miss Krooskos sing the "Song of the Wood Dove" from Schoenberg's Gurrelieder, as well as songs by Charles Ives. Other works of special interest are Schifrin's Variations on a Madrigal by Gesualdo (the Festival prefers the avant garde, even if it's the 16thcentury variety), and early music by Isaac, Senfl, Hassler, Gabrieli and Schuetz. Four works by Stravinsky are listed, including the Canticum Sacrum and Apollon Musa-

If you think that in the midst of these rarities you might need a change of pace, it'll be there in the form of music by Brahms, Tchaikovsky, Bach, Mozart and Schubert.

And if this seems like a lot of listening crammed into one weekend, it is. The Ojai Festival exists for one purpose: music. Surrounded by the mountains, orchards and the quiet town, the Festival takes itself very seriously—with good reason, Perhaps you should, too; it may be a long, hot, desolate summer for music lovers.


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Beware of the Bonzo Dog Doo Dah Band

Were all of the Marx Brothers to regroup, join forces with the Spike Jones Revue and the Hoffnung Interplanetary Music Festival and cut a long-playing stereo record, I doubt seriously the result would be any funnier, more bizarre or irrelevant, than The Doughnut in Granny's

Greenhouse, the second and newest satirical LP by Britain's balmy Bonzo Dog Doo-Dah Band.

Although the Bonzos are best known Stateside for their hit single, "The Urban Spaceman" (which Beatle Paul McCartney helped produce,) their earlier *Gorilla* won a *success d'estime* at least in underground circles. Now the Bonzos, like everyone else it seems, have surfaced.

Their new album provides us with pudding proof that the Bonzos are without peer as court jesters to the baroque realm of British rock and roll. They are a much and long-needed English answer to our very own Mothers of Invention: a rock group whose music magically and cogently captures a unique sensibility, a personal life style. But the Bonzos are as much theater as music, and, like Hermann Hesse's Magic Theater, they are "Not for Everybody" — only Normals.

A Normal, as Bonzo songwriter and sometimes-tuba player Vivian Stanshall might explain, is just about anyone who suspects he isn't, but senses it's been the so-called "rational" people who've managed to gum up the works. "Dada is Normal," Stanshall insists in his liner notes. And "Normal is Nice."

Gorilla was no monster (industry jargon for best-seller), perhaps because it frightened DJs not in the habit of playing LP tracks at the time of its release who were, in addition, bewildered by the titles like "Death Cab for Cutie, Starring God," "Music for the Head Ballet" and "Piggie Bank Love."

There is a certain manic continuity in the Bonzo canon: Gorilla was dedicated to King Kong, "who must have been a wonderful bloke," and the second LP is subtitled "Son of Gorilla" — in the spirit of grade B horror movies. Once again, the album is full of perverse parodies of a variety of idioms including rock, blues, muzak, schlock, vintage swing and Broadway musicals.

"My Pink Half of the Drainpipe," for example, burlesques the Rudy Vallee era in a waltz done something like the New Vaudeville Band, only wittier. It ends with Vivian Stanshall's voice sustaining a chord for thirty (count 'em: 30) seconds. That we can hear the splice where the tape is looped to conjure this bit of musical magic merely adds to the fun, and it is this sort of studio inventiveness which



places the Bonzos in a league all their own.

On side one are songs about bank holidays at Brighton, Zelda from Galaxy Four, and schizophrenic Kama Sutra coital positions. "Hello Mabel" is a funky Busby Berkeley fox trot about a young man's sexual fixation on a stuffed pig. And "Can Blue Men Sing the Whites?" mimics white imitations of black music, mocking the whole controversy - dreamt up to sell Rolling Stone ("s") - over whether white Jewish musicians have enough soul to play blues.

Side two contains a science fiction boogie, a hymn for groupies and police and an Afro-Cuban tribal chant concerning moustachioed women running amok in fields of fat on the Late, Late Show ("I don't remember so well; I think it was John Wayne" someone sleepily says at one point).

The Bonzos' straight "rock" cuts -"We Are Normal" and "Rockaliser Baby" - sound more traditional, closer to the Clovers-Drifters-Spiders school of early rock than most of what we know as rock and roll today. Stanshall has a truly versatile voice, and he's obviously the wit of the group. "Legs" Larry Smith is a tight, consistently good drummer; Rodney Slater is the brass "section"; Roger Ruskin Spear plays xylophone among other instruments; and Neil Innes provides fine keyboard and guitar leads for the group. The album is on Liberty-Imperial.

There is a rumor that the Bonzos will be touring the U.S. this fall and that they are scheduled to appear on TV with Ed Sullivan. It should be a "really big shew," although the Bonzos are questionable material for Sunday night televiewing: a far anarchistic cry from Kate Smith and Senior Wences.



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



WE ROSE UP SLOWLY, 1963.

Roy Lichtenstein was here, working, escaping from New York's winter and whatever strikes were current. He was at Gemini, creating several series of marvelous lithographs; at Universal Studios, experimenting with film for the Tuchman Museum's Art and Technology extravaganza; at Irving Blum's gallery, where some of his oils, metals and wools, I guess ("It's a rug; some people would call it a tapestry, but it's a rug"), were on display; working with a deceptively casual intensity, yet graciously available for the national magazine writers and photographers, who always seemed to be entering

and exiting like refugees from a Marx Brothers pursuit.

One of the names intoned with reverence when Pop Art is mentioned, Lichtenstein is rich (rumor), famous (fact), lionized (grrrr), real (the words that emerge are not entombed in cartoon balloons), and takes it all with a soft-spoken, almost diffident dot of acknowledgment.

He was relaxing after a full day's work, developing a series of *Modern Heads*, lithos to complement two other series in the final printing stages, as well as a mural-sized mass of dotted images called *Peace Through Chemistry*, which he de-

scribed as "overcomposed . . . vulgarization of some kind; a play on composition; a useless Cubism." He was alone for a change in the artists' creative corner at Gemini, three museum people poised for the pounce outside, within a few hours of attending the Cy Twombly opening at Nick Wilder's. He was commenting about the designation "pop."

"I think a lot of people resent it, but I don't," Lichtenstein said. "It's a flip word, and people are summing up your life's work with it, but I take it to mean popular or vulgar."

And, about the names that always run together when that class is convened by experts at typewriters or cocktail reunions — Rauschenbergjohns lichtenstein oldenburg dine segal rosenquist wesselmann marisolindianawarhol. "They're the ones you think of as a group," Lichtenstein said, "but my close friends aren't those artists. I see them in a casual way, at openings. I don't even know them well enough to know if they're close.

"A 'group' did exist in the days of the abstract expressionists, who huddled together because the world was against them. But the Pop people were immediately successful when they got into their thing, and the need to huddle was not that strong."

Pop People: capitalizing on the contemporary everyday, converting the commonplace into museum-oriented culture. Lichtenstein, after what he terms "15 years of non-success," triumphing with larger-than-life, comic strip inspired panels. Zowee!

Now he carries the motif into more serious variations, Monet's cathedrals and haystacks, dotted delights in different colors, a single image seen at different times of day. Then the heads and the mural: "a mixture of WPA and Art Moderne."

Gemini's master printer, Ken Tyler, expects to have most everything ready for the artist's inspection, approval and signature later this month or next, while the publishing house's master administrator, Sid Felsen, has been wondering for two months if the series totals will at least equal the number of pre-publication orders for something, anything.

Prices, meanwhile, hadn't been determined, but to play the multiple images game, count back from the market value of a one-of-a-kind image. (At Blum, Lichtenstein's canvas dated 1963 went for a reported \$12,000, while a newer, larger connected series is said to have sold for about \$25,000.)

"The prices today are peculiar, sort of astounding, but I don't want to knock it," remarked a bemused Lichtenstein. "It's a combination of rising population and more people interested in art, in collecting, and collecting modern work."

He owns few works by others, he noted, and would never acquire on an investment basis: "It's like a house. You don't buy for speculation, but because you like it, and then you hope you haven't been taken."

Upcoming for Roy Lichtenstein, a comprehensive ("when you're dead it's a retrospective") exhibition at the Guggenheim Museum in the fall, works from 1961 forward; 80 paintings and all the graphics, multiples and sculpture.

He has had major museum shows in Pasadena(!), Holland, London, Bern and Hanover, but this will be his first in New York. It's about time...

THE PROCEPHIE

One of the first things that any visitor to San Francisco should learn is its magic number, 391-2000. Dial this day or night for a recorded rundown of the entertainment highlights for the day. This is a service of the S.F. Visitors & Convention Bureau, whose staff at the Fox Plaza, on Market between Ninth and Tenth Streets, can also be helpful.

May is a "best" month in San Francisco. The rhododendrons will be on display in Golden Gate Park, with a representative sample at Union Square. Sunday, May 4, will see the Rose Society show at the Hall of Flowers, followed by the African Violet Show in the same place on the May 17-18 weekend. Stores and shops will be their Springiest — with five floors of flowers at Macy's. So much for the blooming vegetation.

You can expect sunny skies in May, with temperatures in the mid-fifties, breezes fresh and cool, but don't forget your raincoat — or your walking shoes.

Theater in the city is dominated by A.C.T., that is, the American Conservatory Theater, San Francisco's three year old repertory company. The company plays in two theaters simultaneously, the Geary and the Marines' Memorial, alternating productions so that at least four or five different plays are presented each week. Among this year's more promising titles are Shaw's Devil's Disciple, Chekhov's Three Sisters, and Jules Feiffer's Little Murders. There's another theatrical you might want to catch, and that's Big Time Buck White, an L.A. import, by the way. Almost everyone likes it except the black critics - and that says something too.

Not everyone is so happy with the Kabuki review at the Japanese Cultural and Trade Center on Post Street, but judge for yourself. Kabuki is a stylized dramatic pageant, and at first it's difficult to penetrate the conventions of oriental theater. But the elaborate production and the new theater-restaurant which houses it are worth notice. There are luncheon performances daily, as well as evening ones, and an afternoon stroll in the Japanese neighborhood will be pleasant in May.

Another ethnic treat will be the Latin American Fiesta, May 5-11, in the Mission District. It will climax with a parade on Saturday, May 10, and there will be music, dancing, food, etc. in keeping with the fiesta theme. Many of the events will take place in the streets around the heart of old San Francisco, and should be worthy of a visit if you're in town.

The standout art exhibit in May is the Cubism show at UC Berk-

eley's Little Gallery. Paintings and drawings from the private collection of Texan John De Menil include seldom-seen works by Cezanne, Piscasso, Braque and others. Additional art events include the Victor Bergeron (Trader Vic) Collection of Pre-Columbian Art at the Palace of the Legion of Honor, a retrospective of significant Bay Area work done in the late 60's, at the Civic Center Museum of Art and the paintings of 19th century artist William Signey Mount at the de Young Museum. And if you've never seen the magnificant Avery Brundage Collection of Oriental Art at the de Young, do set aside a couple of hours for it.

On the music front, a major staging of Mozart's *Idomeneo* will take place in Berkeley's Zellerbach Auditorium on May 21, 23 and 24. Jan Popper, professor of music at UCLA, will direct tenor William Du Pre of the New York City

Opera in the title role. Others in the cast are Delreen Hafenrichter, soprano and Hans Wegman, tenor. Carefully researched by Berkeley professor Daniel Heartz, the performance ought to be the most authentic since Mozart's day.

The San Francisco Symphony closes its season in May, but the Verdi Requiem, performed by the Stanford University Chorus on May 21, 22 and 23 should make it listenable to the end. Then, if spring fever grips you, turn to the barbershop concert at Civic Center's Nourse Auditorium on May 24.

Movies can be seen in any city, but there are some special ones you might want to note. The de Young Museum will be running the American Screwball Comedy Series on Friday nights. Titles in May are Bringing Up Baby (Cary Grant and Katherine Hepburn), His Girl Friday (Grant, again, and Rosalind Russell) and Mr. and Mrs. Smith (Carole Lombard and Robert Montgomery).

Another lure for the cineaste is the Canyon Cinematheque in North Beach where experimental film makers offer unscheduled spur-ofthe-moment programs every Thursday evening.

And now for all you sports fans, the Giants play Los Angeles in Candlestick on May 1; the ponies are running at Golden Gate Fields; the US Open Table Tennis Championship is at the Civic Auditorium May 9 through 11; and the yachts race every weekend. Who could ask for anything more?

One last tip for May 18 or 25: catch the Mountain Play (this year, The World We Live In) in the outdoor amphitheater atop Mount Tamalpais in Marin County. A car is essential, but the drive is scenic. Bring Your Own Everything - including a cushion and a hat.





COASTWISE

According to projections I've read, one of the future functions for the computer to supposedly handle will be shopping. It would work very much on the principle of the mail-order catalogue, thus putting even the most sophisticated city mouse in the same position as her country cousin.

For marketing and the purchasing of basic household items we might have a special phone-like objects with buttons symbolizing different goods. A computer would receive our signals and an order would be put together and delivered, perhaps by a motorized robottruck. For other shopping we would send an appropriate punch card out through a special zip slot in the hallway of our condominium apartment-office complex. This would go to a vast network of warehouses, and the item, whatever it might be, would be delivered in the same manner.

Like most future projections, this one ignores the quirks of human behavior which defy the coolest of planners, and makes the major and erroneous assumption that women would actually give up shopping. And that is a dangerous assumption to base *anything* on. Shopping has nothing to do with Getting. And little to do with Buying.

Shopping is like the Fox Hunt, the search for the Holy Grail, or the Medium (as in the Medium is the Message). The ritual, the act of shopping, is an emotional, almost romantic urge for an expedition. Men, curiously, have done most of history's exploration, possibly be-

cause women have always diverted their urge in the small spurts required for shopping. A man may go to the moon or on Safari and get it all out of his system in one mammoth adventure, but women do it every day — if they can get away with it.

Women shop for various reasons, but mostly for social interaction. They may run into friends, or they'll talk to a salesgirl - as long as they possibly can. Ignore the idea that they are talking about items. It is still social conversation, not business. They are having a conversation about themselves - about their taste, and that's a delicious form of gossip, especially if they can raise a bit of controversy. "I hate those gloves," says that My Taste is Better than the Manufacturer's (or the salesgirl's who suggested the gloves in question). "Gee, that's nice, but I can't afford it . . ." says really "Things are rough right now, don't you feel sorry for me?" and "Aren't I too heavy for that?" means, "Do you like me enough to say I'm not?"

Women shop for love. If a salesgirl says, "No, they'd look great on you," she is making the customer feel loved and attractive. If she says, "Well, here's something else that's really you . . .", she is playing the game very well, and saying, "You are a special person, and I have recognized that fact." Then when the customer goes home, she feels flattered and attractive and is lovely to her family. If the salesgirl doesn't play the game, the customer will go somewhere else until she

finds someone who will. This is a major part of the Hunt — the real meaning of shopping.

Women also shop to outwit their friends, which is similar to the need to be loved. The insecure woman will go to great lengths to find something no one else has, something unique, or just, perhaps, something cheaper. The bargain hunter shows that she can find more for less, which makes her quite as superior, according to her syndrome, as the other kind of woman who delights in spending more for an original Whatever. They both need extremes to justify their hunting ability, which in turn, make them feel quite remarkable.

Computerized shopping would destroy these outlets. It would also, of necessity, destroy the opportunity for individual expression of taste. And the Planners might do well to examine current trends in the big cities which indicate that as items become more and more standardized and computerized, women progressively want to express themselves in an unusual manner. Even the woman who still wears the A-frame little nothing dress goes into a boutique for an interesting pin or an odd little ring.

Department stores have recognized this trend and many of them have put in their own little pseudoboutiques and separated their departments into semi-isolated areas for special ages and tastes. But the little stores still sprout up by the dozen every month because the action a woman is looking for in the Hunt will be concentrated with more intensity there.

The owner or manager of a boutique has more time to talk and is usually much more involved in trying to sell than the girl who works on salary at a big store. Moreover, if the boutique is groovy - or the hunter thinks so - then she is groovy because she is shopping there. Or so she thinks. She may stay and be friendly and feel like part of the scene, or she may go on, feeling warmly confident, to the next place, and compare notes with the owner of that store about the other one. That way she is reinforcing her grooviness. For many women, the only outlet for expressing

their sense of with-it-ness or chic is through the Hunt. They may not even buy, but they come home feeling, again, absolutely marvelous.

If shopping were computerized, goods would have to be mass-produced and wide selection is of little interest for the huntress wanting something really different. Rarity makes the Hunt more piquant. But for all but the most diligent huntress it is quite difficult. Of course. she might not want to wear something all that unique. But the pleasure lies in knowing she can find it. She doesn't want to capture the beast, just root it out and have a look. As with the Grail, she would just like to Know it is There, but having it would mean the Search is over.

It is impossible now to find a pair of red shoes. Grey, yellow, purple, ves. But not red. But because I haven't been everywhere, there is still hope some can be found. If, instead, I was looking in a finite thing like a catalogue, think of the frustration.

Computerized shopping may solve the traffic problems of big cities and the difficulties of the credit people. We'd all have one Big Charge Account, And no cheating. If you had overbought, they'd know and send you back a red punch card to pin on your aluminum sweater. And the Planners may like the efficiency of the pushbutton idea, but there are going to be a lot of miserable women unless a strong substitute is found to provide an outlet for the expeditionary urge. It won't be sex, because most women think that sex has a lot to do with new clothes. Most leisure also requires some sort of outfit to be leisurely in. And women would still have to shop if they were sent to other planets to sublimate the hunting urge: "I can't go to Jupiter, I haven't a thing to wear." Shopping, then, is virtually required foreplay for almost all female activity. And, heaven knows, if you can't shop, well you'll just have to sit home and buy things all day - or else give up buying completely. And then where will all the Planners, computers and businessmen be?

Who says you can't make it independently in Hollywood? Actor John Cassavetes' second low-budget writing-directing effort (the first was Shadows, a decade ago) may be faulted for its weary theme of middle-class marriage blues, but it delves so much more deeply into suburban desperation than any previous American film, it's like the story was never told before.

By trusting his actors to improvise dialogue, Cassavetes reaches a level of realism so real you wonder if he didn't hire Allen Funt as resource director. Yet Faces, by virtue of 3½ years in the cutting room, comes across tightly structured, as opposed to the pseudopodia of Warhol and the underground gang. Its economy is envious: the story is packed into 36 hours and five major scenes. It centers around a

14-year marriage gone indifferent and sour, but each of the secondary characters' lives gets the full third-degree exposure. As for the lack of studio facilities — the steely, uneven sound in the opening scenes has provoked some viewer complaints; better it were dubbed like the rest. But the 16mm graininess and occasionally streaky lighting seem part of the film's charm, and the camera, whose wobbly tracking somehow adds to the viewer's uneasiness, shows a knack at finding the best angle for each shot. Cassavetes' brilliant treatment, free directorial hand, and unified concept earn blue-ribbon performances from John Marley, Gena Rowlands, Val Avery, Seymour Cassel and Lynn Carlin, a secretary who's never acted gefore. 14-year marriage gone indifferent and sour,

Fortunately, Barbra Streisand meets the challenge. Whether she is bouncing through her Mama's saloon munching a pickle, dancing down Henry Street with her dreams up in lights or stealing the spotlight from naked showgirls as a bride who is pregnant as a water ox, she breathes witchcraft into a medium desperately in need of some. ELL IN THE PACIFIC

What happens when you're left alone with Lee Marvin on a Pacific Island? Nothing if you're Toshiro Mifune. The great flaw in this two-character flick is that nothing happens except for occasional grunts, groans and snatches of folk-songs, both American and Japanese, Director John Boorman (his name is, unfortunately, prophetic of his approach and the film) seems to lean toward closeups of eyes, long, moody shots of a raft adrift in an immense ocean, and islands like green pimples on a blue sea. But nothing happens. Nobody does anything to anybody, wants anything, or creates any conflict. We don't know any more about Marvin or Mifune after two hours of watching them than we did before buying tickets. All in all, it's a World War II loser.

ICE STATION ZEBRA

The Cinerama epic of a frosty submarine dive under the polar regions is not for the claustrophobic or easily bored. Patrick McGoohan and Ernest Borgnine as spy and counter-spy, clash with some of the best acting Jim Brown and Rock Hudson have done; but all four end up losing to a great deal of styro-foam snow and strange implausible screen writing. Once again, the dastardly Russians are foiled in their attempts to seize the world and our stars zoom off in an atomic submarine that is not, alas, yellow. not, alas, yellow.

ISADORA

SADORA

The biography of one of America's most celebrated and scandal-ridden artistes, Isadora is distinguished by an uncompromising irony towards all its characters and a persistent refusal to supply Hollywood's usual easy answers to the riddle of existence. Director Karel Reisz has let the action sprawl too much — but he has drawn from Vanessa Redgrave an extraordinarily bewitching performance. Speaking in a flat American twang that renders her pretentiousness irresistible, Redgrave sheds the cloying mystique inflicted on her previous roles to portray the absurdities, contradictions and vivid emotions that distinguish honest character from

assumed personality. James Fox and Jason Robards represent spirits of Art and Commerce fluttering about the flame of Isadora and Ivan Tchenko distinguishes himself in a press conference scene where he announces that he will present his "American Poem" — and promptly produces a loaded pistol.

KILLING OF SISTER GEORGE

Robert Aldrich's film is one of the first about homosexuality which blows away the moldy cobwebs surrounding the subject and lets in some light. Lesbianism here is not a curse or a stigmata — it is simply part of the natural order of things, presented with humor, dignity, sincerity, sobriety, honesty and candor. The acting is sensational. Susannah York has the petulant flower-nibbling quality of a vagrant orphan on a poster in the post office. Coral Browne gets her first good role in years as a crusty lady from the BBC. And Beryl Reid gives a lusty, brawling, brilliant and heartbreaking performance as George. The loss of a few Julie Andrews fans is a small price to pay for the liberation of the cinema.

This adaptation of James Goldman's Broadway play is for people who love the beauty of language and marvel at the poetry words can become when they are molded together by a real craftsman instead of a hack. Katharine Hepburn is magnificent as Eleanor of Aquitane, intriguingly paired with Peter O'Toole as Henry II, in a film full of clanging doors, crowing cocks, and entrances heralded by trumpets and madrigals. and madrigals.

Walt Disney's answer to Grand Prix is an over-long, sometimes tasteless and one-hundred percent sex-free movie about the thrills, chills and spills of high-powered auto racing. The kids will love it despite a lot of senseless dialogue between Dean Jones, who tries to act, and Michelle Lee. who doesn't. Buddy Hackett is allowed to do three of his night-club routines, cleansed of blue material, and David Tom-linson is gnashingly funny as a bad-sport villain. The movie is about a VW with a mind of its own, and Disney's special-effects men have a field day, mashing Ferraris, Lamborghinis and Jags. The climax (if you want to call it that) is a twenty-minute racing sequence that has three (count 'em) funny bits in it. To keep the film from becoming an expensive commercial, the word "Volkswagen" is never used in the script—the VW is always referred to as "the little car," which reduces this G-Rated Love Bug to the level of a Brand X film. Superb ado about nothing is this full-blown froth bubble by Carol Reed out of Lionel Bart's musical. Cinematically, Oliver! is peerless. Director of Photography Oswald Morris captures John Box's stunning sets in compositions which make every frame frameable. Graceful dollying imbues all the production numbers with added sweep and zest. Onna White's lavish choreography is worthy of Busby Berkeley. Every element teams up to make the song-and-dance version of Charles Dickens' classic the most impressive musical since West Side Story. Some Twisting uncovers the difference between these two Fractured Fairy Tales—whereas one adds phony social relevance to Shakespeare's lovers the other removes the social relevance of Dickens' novel and substitutes Ron Moody's bravura Fagin, full of tantalizing spirit. By focusing on Fagin and somewhat minimizing the ordeals of Oliver. Bart and Woolf escape some of the heavy-handed melodrama which Dickens found necessary to effect reform in a culture a century less sophisticated than ours Ruit vou can't

But you can't have an **Oliver!** in which Oliver never ap-pears, and when they zoom in for those close-ups of our maligned hero's angelic face, you're forced to feel either madlin pity, or resentment at the fact that you're expected to feel maudlin pity.

THE PRIME OF MISS JEAN BRODIE HE PRIME OF MISS JEAN BRODIE

Jean Brodie is an unrealistic sort. Instead of teaching her girls history, she recounts fantasy-based tales of her dead lover. Instead of geology, she lunches them on pate de fols gras. Instead of giving in to passion, she fantasizes an affair between the man she desires and one of her students. In her political naivete, she sends one of her students to a senseless death in Spain. Miss Brodie cannot speak of being fired, but only of "assassination." Her girls — her special girls — are "the creme

de la creme," and they provide for all of the things that she cannot provide for herself, Jean Brodie is dangerous — to herself, to her students, and to her school. Betrayed by one of her students, she is fired — "assassinated."

Although young, Maggie Smith gives an excellent performance as Jean Brodie. But laurels must also go to an excellent supporting cast, especially Celia Johnson, Pamela Franklin, Gordon Jackson, Diane Grayson and Robert Stephens. The film is wordy rather than cinematic. as Jay Allen was no doubt influenced by her stage adaptations of Muriel Spark's novel. Yet there is more of a cynical gel coloring the film than in either the New York or London stage production. The effectiveness of Jean Brodie lies in this cynicism — we all know what will happen to Miss Brodie but can take a voyeur's pleasure in watching the inevitable destruction of the woman.

ROMEO AND JULIET

Too much Zeffirelli and too little Shakespeare mars this free-wheeling adaptation.

Casting teenagers as the teenaged lovers sounds like a good idea but leaves something lacking in Juliet's characterization. It's not the same Tybalt, nurse or friar either—and you won't believe what they've done to Mercutio. The mood alternates monotonously between syrup and swashbuckling, and the constant cuts from face to face destroy most of the intimate moments. The funeral party where the lovers meet is the biggest razz-a-ma-tazz spectacular since Cleopatra's entrance into Rome. The screen does capture the play's zest and passionate spirit better than the stage can, and the balcony scene, omitted lines and all, is beautiful.

If you like closet queens, you'll love The Sergeant. Despite Rod Steiger's occasional over-performing and an utterly tasteless denouement, the body of this film is not bad at all. It deals with the hangup of a U.S. Male 100 Percent Tough-guy Top Sergeant who happens to be hung up on a private 1st class in his regiment, played prettily by John Phillip Law, When cajolery, half-veiled threats and round-the-clock surveillance don't work on the poor guy, Sgt. Steiger attacks him in what may be the clumsiest rape scene since King Kong endeavored to assault Fay Wray. Some of the film is awfully self-conscious, but Steiger's throwaways to the camera and the way he plays with the end of a beer bottle make the film almost worth seeing. SHAME

In a recent interview, Ingmar Bergman singled out Jean-Luc Godard for scorn. Bergman's latest screen effort expresses in the positive what his words did in the the negative—how he would handle the themes the Frenchman explores in Weekend, Pierrot le Fou and Contempt: loss of love and the brutalization of war, as well as Bergman's usual concern, the torments of the artist.

Musicians Max Von Sydow and Liv Ullmann are struggling through a marriage in which roles are reversed and children not forthcoming when war interrupts their ennui and sends them on an odyssey as strewn with stiffs as Weekend is with wrecks, all of which brings out the beast in Von Sydow.

Whereas Godard is intellectual, Bergman is psychological and finds in his couple's lovelessness and the war's cruelty common roots of guift, pain and fear—all adding up to one word unspoken in the text but blazoned in the title.

STOLEN KISSES

In 1959 Truffaut made his first feature film, The 400 Blows. Tracing the near-criminality of a young boy named Antoine Doinel, it was quite openly autobiographical and tender. Now, a decade later, the French director has returned to his reel self in a movie which is equally tender, more light-hearted and nostalgic—and, alas, a good deal more trivial.

Antoine, fresh from the army, is full of sex and looking for love. It presents itself in the fuller-than-flesh form of his boss' wife, an older woman a few leagues above him in experience and sophistication.

Young man-mature woman gags are pretty well played out by now, and Truffaut brings neither a bagful of new ones nor a refreshing new slant.

Jean-Pierre Leaud portrays Antoine with such engagement that the film is easy enough to sit through even though its cinematic artistry is pretty much restricted to functional placement of camera, actors and props to tell the story. And this old story, like an old Edsel, never dies—it just keeps stalling. Leaud's pastel Casanova may put the word "charming" on your lips, but Truffaut's unresonant saccharinity puts nothing in your heart.

Shirley MacLaine is a brass band and a harpsichord and a whole gaggle of beautiful things in Sweet Charity, Mainly, though, she is Shirley MacLaine again, laughing, dancing, crying and believing, time after time, that life really has no meaning without love. The man responsible for directing Miss MacLaine's first decent picture since The Apartment is Bob Fosse, whose explosive choreography makes up for any over-arty montages and ill-conceived zoom lens photography that crops up from time to time. Fosse's dances, bombastic psychedelic fireworks, shimmy, jump and shout with life on the Cinemascope canvas, bringing a largess to the film that the stage production could never muster. The weakest parts of the film occur when Fosse reverts to stageshow techniques. Fortunately he concentrates his attention on Shirley MacLaine, mascara running in a dumpy Mexican restaurant, or high-stepping with a band down New York's deserted Wall Street simply because she's happy. A series of still photographs within the film paint Sweet Charity's moods with the texture and sensitivity of a Seurat oil, letting the viewer look behind her eyes and see that her tears are as real as her hopes.

1001: A SPACE ODYSSEY
Stanley Kubrick spent more time creating exciting three-dimensional simulations of space travel in 2001 than 20th-Century Fox did on Cleopatra, and almost as much money. Just as a for-instance, the space ship is a 50-foot model, and to preserve the 3-D effect perfectly, all the scenes in which it appears are animated. This means shooting one frame, moving both the ship and the camera a fraction of an inch, shooting the next frame, and so on ad millionem. As a result, 2001 is technically perhaps the most impressive spectacle ever filmed. The climactic breakthrough into the Unknown is so effective that one long-haired viewer walked into the screen shouting, "It's God!"
The story, by science-fiction writer Arthur C. Clarke, is another story. It begins with early man's discovery of a tool. In a paroxysm of simplicity (and probably error), Clarke makes the first tool a weapon, Suddenly a black monolith appears, and a full symphony orchestra crashes toward crescendo. The monolith

reappears in the end, when the first space ship nears Jupiter. As the film contains no explanation of the monolith, everyone took it for some sort of esoteric symbol, but Kubrick confessed it was nothing more than a watchdog from outer space. (He believes we've been visited before.) So why all the noise?

The star of the movie is that most ancient of S-F banalities, the computer with human feelings. Hal (that's his name) may be smarter than his human companions, but his conversation is just as dull, and that's pretty Dullea. Finally the story ends and the pyrotechnics take over. Those viewers still earthbound after the dazzling break-through razzmatazz see Kier Dullea in a chamber with himself as an old man and a baby—a startling illustration of confusion masking as profundity. What does it mean? Enter our black visitor—the film's most interesting character, since it boasts two dimensions instead of just one. What does it mean? Crescendo. End??

Picture, if you will, the entire garrison of a secluded German schloss, cunningly wiped out by two daring, resourceful British commandos. Imagine, if you can, that they are equipped with pistols that will fire forever without reloading, and dynamite bombs that can be set off seventy-five different ways. See one man and two tommy-guns stand off an entire platoon armed with light machine guns, grenades and automatic rifles. Watch with awed fascination as a methodical killer calmly shoots and knifes his way toward the Congressional Medal of Honor. Add the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air! All this, plus a pretty blonde agent, Richard Burton, as a hedonistically inclined but heroic British major, and Clint Eastwood, trading six-guns for a silencer-equipped super-pistol, in an overblown, completely unbelievable film. Even Burton, shrugging off his lines with the efficiency of a trained bear, looks chagrined from time to time. From the first tic of the drums until the last German is blown to bits, it's a loser. If Where Eagles Dare were ever run on a double feature with a film like Bob Rossen's A Walk In The Sun, it would be laughed out of the theater for the trite, vulgar execrable exercise that it is. As the ads say, they may look like Germans, but the major is English, the lieutenant is American and the film is strictly from nowhere.



THE GRIPES OF ROTH



or You Don't Have to be Jewish to Like "Goodbye, Columbus" by Rex Reed

There's a lot of absurd talk going around about Goodbye, Columbus being an anti-Semitic movie. I'm not surprised. They've been accusing Philip Roth of being an anti-Semitic writer for years. Trouble is, Mr. Roth knows his own people — knows and cares about them — better than most Jews know themselves. He is the most Jewish Jew in captivity today, and Goodbye, Columbus is the best thing he ever wrote. I think he wrote it before he learned how to masturbate. The movie Larry Peerce, who directed One Potato. Two Potato, has fashioned from it is the warmest, friendliest, funniest, most huggable film I've seen in a very long time. I plan to see it again and again until it becomes an

I'm not Jewish, so you can start accusing me of not knowing beans about the subject right now and get it over with. But I do know a good movie when I see one, even if it does come sprinkled with an obvious cliche like the Jewish wedding to end all Jewish weddings. The book's New Jersey country club locale has been changed to Westchester (another cliche), which I thought had already been done to a bien cuit charcoal blister in The Swimmer. I see the point, though. Westchester is a much funnier place than New Jersey any day, and even though growing up in Philip Roth Land is something I know nothing about (it's another world from creole gumbo and the Louisiana bayous) I do know enough about Westchester to still get a bang out of the scene in which the aunt keeps taking the pot roast out of the oven and saying "Don't put the wet towel on the furniture." I've met all the people in Goodbye, Columbus before. They're real, all right. Real and delightful to know.

Arnold Schulman is the perfect writer to transpose Roth to the screen. In Love With the Proper Stranger, he once wrote an unforgettable scene in which Tom Bosley brought Natalie Wood home for dinner and she spent a riotous evening listening to his two yenta sisters. Goodbye, Columbus is filled with the same tough, precise little Jewish girls who speak in definite verb conjugations and end up going to Bennington.

Ali MacGraw, a magical new actress who looks constantly as though she has just washed her face with Dr. Laszlo's sea mud soap, is the perfect newcomer to portray Brenda, the embodiment of inverted snobbism so prevalent in girls who are born in the Bronx, then move to Westchester when their papas make good and end up playing tennis cautiously so the balls won't hit their \$1000 nose jobs. Loping across a Westchester lawn in slow motion, she resembles a tall white egret walking on legs like elegant stilts. I think she is quite the most enchanting new actress I've seen on the screen since Joan Hackett.

In fact, the entire cast is flawless. Richard Benjamin, as a kind of bumbling collegiate sex maniac who spends most of his life taking cold showers, has the grace of an impertinent sloth in tennis sneaks. Jack Klugman, as Miss MacGraw's father, is every nouveauriche business merchant-family man I've ever known—kind, grumpy, good, thoroughly decent, with the worst table manners since Stanley Kowalski. Nan Martin doesn't look or sound very Jewish as the girl's mother, but at least you won't be able to accuse her of being a cliche. (Watching her creaming her hands in bed with the "Johnny Carson Show" on is a mental picture I never want to forget.)

Perhaps the single most ingratiating actor in the entire film is the girl's kid brother — a lumbering young rhino named Michael Meyers. Meyers is a great big gum-chewing lummox who washes out his jock straps in



the sink, shakes hands like he was pumping for oil, thrashes into a room like he was laying seige to a foreign country, and crashes into bed in his underwear every night to listen to Andre Kostelanetz records. He is one of those miracles of casting, like Harold Russell in **The Best Years of Our Lives,** chosen because no acting is required other than living in front of a camera for a few days.



If there is any doubt in anyone's mind about whether **Goodbye**, **Columbus** is true or not, let me hasten to add that Mr. Meyers is no actor at all. He's a college student from New Rochelle, and after the screening I attended, he stood up, taller than the fence around a missile project, grinned boyishly, and left painful creases in the palm of each hand he shook. A small, bosomy lady with orange hair and a parched Miami tan then hugged him vigorously around the waist and said, "My little dum-dum." She was his mother and she could easily have stepped right down from the screen out of any one of a dozen scenes.

Without a good script, you can assemble the most brilliant actors in the world and their abilities will be wasted if they have nothing to work with. Goodbye, Columbus is fortunate enough to have a ripe, colorful script bursting with comic possibilities. There is a dinner table scene full of clumsy, class-structural self-consciousness which is a joy to watch. There is a funny scene at the 42nd Street public library with a nervous librarian eating an egg and pepper sandwich. There is the wildest Jewish wedding in the history of the movies, blazing with a collage of carousel impressions — cigars and chopped chicken livers and two uncles in the carpet business named Manny and Max pacing the dance floor measuring their carpets, little girls dancing with each other and eating the bells off the cake, people who look like leftovers from a Grossinger's passover party dancing to "Havah N'gilah" . . . of course

it's vulgar. But it is also endearing and spirited and true.

Larry Peerce seems to have instilled so much confidence in all of his actors and all of his bit players and all of his extras that they go beyond the bounds of conventional role development. Instead of becoming extensions of the characters, the roles they play become extensions of the actors. Peerce has also thrown in some terrible, worn-out directorial cliches such as the technique of slow-motion underwater swimming and two faces silhouetted against the sun. And frankly. I hope I never see another movie in which two young people fall in love while walking through an endless stream of quick cuts denoting the passing of summer, while a rock group wails a soundtrack theme song. I'm sorry he couldn't resist the temptation to be obvious and banal.

Still, my complaints are minor and grouchy and they have very little to do with the overwhelming impact this film has made on me as a whole. After the flow of stupid creeps in such brainless youth-identity crisis movies as Joanna, The Touchables, Three in the Attic, The Impossible Years, Model Shop, Wild in the Streets, etc., etc., it's a refreshing and healthy change of pace to see college age kids with sensitivity and intelligence and believable responses to life and sex the way it exists in reality instead of the rancid heads of perverted screenwriters. The people in Goodbye, Columbus look like real people, wear clothes that look like real clothes instead of Bleecker Street hock shop rejects. and say real words instead of profane, hopped-up jabberwocky.

Whether you're Jewish or not, I don't see how you can fail to recognize and respect the beauty and laughter and human insight present in Philip Roth's story and Peerce's direction and Schulman's script and the breathtaking performances of this movie's startlingly splendid cast. Together, out of what looks suspiciously like love, they have produced a film which is more than just a comedy about young Jewish people with different social backgrounds falling in love. They have painted a portrait of a civilization.

Some Jews will no doubt still be defensive and uptight and say **Goodbye Columbus** doesn't tell it true. But, as one of my Jewish friends has pointed out to me, truth is not the question here. The problem is whether or not you can accept the difference between what is true and **unbearably** true.





The trouble with writing a biography about a contemporaneous figure is that you don't know when to quit.

That was true of my first subject, Harry Cohn. It is true, but to a lesser extent, of my current biography, *Thalberg*. And it will doubtless remain the same with my work-in-progress, the life of David O. Selznick.

To begin with, the lives of such Hollywood figures cannot be researched in the quiet catacombs of the UCLA Library or the Los Angeles Main Library (which, however, is a first-class source for any researcher). Virtually nothing had been written about Cohn, whom one of his former press agents described as "the Jewish Howard Hughes." Cohn had led a secluded life, made no speeches, gave almost no interviews. His name rarely appears in film histories and biographies, and no major magazine article was written about him.

Irving Thalberg presented much the same situation. He was rarely interviewed, and he made only one important address - to film students at U.S.C. And so the research for both King Cohn and Thalberg had to be done orally - by talking to those who had known and worked with both men. With Harry Cohn, who had employed thousands of talented persons over a 40-year span in Hollywood, this presented a complex assignment. It meant tracking down almost 300 persons, some of them very famous, some quite obscure.

The famous ones were easy to find, although I sometimes had to go to New York and Europe to keep the appointments. Many of these interviews — with Frank Sinatra, Rosalind Russell, Jack Lemmon, George Stevens, Loretta Young, etc. — were done for my regular Associated Press column. At the end of them I would ask: "By the way, do you have any Harry Cohn stories?" Invariably,

the response was immediate — and often explosive.

But where do you stop? I continued asking interviewees for Harry Cohn stories, fearing that if I didn't I might miss the supreme anecdote or the truest insight into the Cohn character.


One day I gleaned a story or two from Danny Kaye, who had delivered the eulogy at the bizarre funeral of Harry Cohn. I explained my plight.

"How many people have you interviewed?" he asked. "Almost three hundred," I replied.

"Then you've got the story," he said. "If you've discussed Harry Cohn with that many people, you know what kind of a man he was and what he did. Go ahead and write it." And I did.

Researching the life of Irving Thalberg was simplier — and yet more difficult. When I undertook the task, Thalberg had been dead more than thirty years. That meant that those who knew him would then be in their sixties, seventies or eighties. Persons of such ages may or may not have good recall. Some-

RVING THALBERG, NORMA SHEARER AND



ANTIMATION From Melies to Mehitabel

Around the turn of the century, a French magicianturned-film maker discovered by accident the principle of trick photography. Projecting some footage he shot at the Place de l'Opera, Georges Melies was astonished at the sudden transformation of the Madeleine-Bastille omnibus into a hearse and male pedestrians into women. Apparently, the film had jammed in the camera and became unstuck in the time it had taken for the bus to exit and the hearse to enter the frame.

Like the apocryphal apple whose trajectory was cut short by Newton's head, the malfunction launched Melies into a train of thought that has had far-reaching consequences. Before, the camera was merely a recording device; after, one saw its possibilities for development into an art. This was the first spark of creative intelligence in movies, opening the door for the animated cartoon.

Now, in Germany, the word for cartoon is *Trickfilm* — a more inclusive designation. After all, the animated cartoon has innumerable siblings. And how else are we to classify Jiri Trnka's *Prince Bajaja*, a painstakingly crafted Czech puppet film recently screened at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art? Or Norman McLaren's shorts for the National Film Board of Canada, some of which are made without the agency of camera or sound recording equipment (both image and soundtrack are drawn directly on the film)? Or Lotte Reiniger's early German silhouette pictures, including a *Dr. Doolittle* made in 1928?

The list could go on indefinitely, but enough has been said to demonstrate that we are dealing with not just Mickey Mouse, but the whole spectrum of films in which the camera's recording function is given the lie. Being a machine, the camera cannot itself lie; it faithfully reproduces what it sees. The trick is to manipulate what the camera sees in such a way that the result is almost completely attributable to the artist.

In 1952, Josef von Sternberg accepted an offer to direct *The Saga of Anatahan*, about a group of Japanese sailors shipwrecked on an island during World War II. Although on location, Sternberg constructed a completely artificial setting. Later, he evinced some dissatisfaction with the water in the finished product. "There were too many shots of it, I think," he said. "And also it was the only *real* thing in the film — everything else was created."


Sternberg could not control the water because it was not of his own invention. The great cresting waves in the "Sorcerer's Apprentice" episode in Walt Disney's Fantasia, in contrast, are pure invention. They were created from scratch by an animator, rising and breaking as he wished them to — not as they do in real life. As one of the leading Yugoslav animators, Dragutin Kolman, says, "the range of action of the cartoon film is limited only by the bounds of the imagination." Little or nothing is left to chance; bad animated cartoons therefore more often than not represent the failure of their creators.

Animation is a metaphysical medium, according to John Wilson, who is making a two-hour cartoon version of archy and mehitabel due for Christmas release — metaphysical as opposed to cramped and earthbound. A film like Juliet of the Spirits is a failure because "Fellini tried to make metaphysical statements with physical images." Only in the animated cartoon can an artist make a total statement, because he alone possesses complete control. Any idea capable of lodging in his brain can find expression in his work. That is why, for all its failings, Fantasia intrigues; it attempts to picture the sublime, which no man has ever seen.

No other medium can give shape to the world of dreams and especially nightmares with such devastating effect. As one who could take Margaret Hamilton's leers as the wicked witch in The Wizard of Oz in stride, I quailed before the inhuman villainy of the queen in Snow White and the brooding immensity of Monstro the whale in Pinocchio. And is terror solely an attribute of childhood? There are some cartoons from Eastern Europe that take up where Franz Kafka's "The Metamorphosis" leaves off. The streets of the surreal city in Jan Lenica's Labyrinth, the claustrophobia and insistent symbolism of Trnka's The Hand, the gut-knotting horror of the giant fly closing in for the kill in Alexander Marks and Vladimir Jutrisa's The Fly – these films and others like them are capable of evoking the phantasms that crouch in the byways of our collective unconscious.

The monsters in Yellow Submarine bring to mind Erich Neumann's description of one such recurring nightmare state: "The 'swamp' stage of the uroboros and early matriarchate . . . is a world in which every creature devours every other. Cannibalism is symptomatic of this state of affairs. On this level, which is pregenital because sex is not yet operative and the polar tension of the sexes still in abeyance, there is only a stronger that eats and a weaker that is eaten." The one-of-a-kind vacuum-cleaner monster devours everything in sight and finally, because nothing else is left, himself. If George Dunning were not interested in the comic aspects of this phantasmagoria, if he followed his vision through to the uncompromising end . . . well, the results would not have been Yellow Submarine. Dunning chose to circumnavigate the flaming pit en route to deliver Pepperland from the Blue Meanies. But, without detracting from Dunning's considerable wit and imagination, we must go back to the original to understand where Yellow Submarine stands; and Disney is The Original.

Before any of the Beatles saw the light of day, Pepperland was in existence, inhabited by Mickey and Minnie Mouse, Donald Duck, Pluto, Pegleg Pete, the Big Bad Wolf and others. The public swallowed the apple proffered first by Popeye the Sailor, then went on to the greater "depredations" of M-G-M's Tom and Jerry and Warner Brothers' Bugs Bunny. One British opponent of cartoon violence laments: "There was un-




doubtedly a certain bitterness prompted by the failure of the 'Silly Symphonies,' which were artistically the most interesting of Disney's productions, and his new style, exemplified in full-length productions, seemed deliberately to distort and cheapen the finer qualities of the earlier series, as if Mr. Disney had sensed the new public demand for noise, surprise, and violence of effect." (John Culshaw, In Commentary). Another interpretation is that Disney, in his full-length features, was only being faithful to the same artistic impulse that gave birth to Mickey Mouse cartoons and the 'Silly Symphonies.' And, by so doing, he deepened and broadened his conceptions until they reached such dimensions that the rest of his career was but an anti-climax.

Today, Mickey Mouse is a pejorative term applied to insignificant, repetitive or mechanical tasks. Once it stood for something much more than that. During his heyday, Mickey was elevated to the rank of deity by the Malayans of Negri-Sembilang, and his statue, sculpted in wood, peered out from between the images of Vishnu and Narakasara. Yet, despite the recent hoopla surrounding his fortieth birthday, today the Mouse is dead. One magazine, Vanguard 1968, printed a touching requiem for his passing:

"There was a Mickey once that lived, and fought, and entertained the world. No battle was too great for him, no foe unchallenged. The marquees of ten thousand theaters proclaimed his fame, and in those dark Depression days the solace that he offered touched our souls. It was a shameless love affair. He was the stuff that poets from immortal time have sung. He was the celluloid crusader, an animated troubadour of song . . .

"His voice and shape are stilled today, but not his soul, which all men gave him, for it goes on and will find other forms and places for embodiment. But in this form and at this time we can do little more than mourn his passing, as if it were a pleasant dream scattered by the dawn."

Much of what has happened to this country in the last forty years could be summed up in the quiet struggle for the hearts and minds of the people between Mickey Mouse and the interloper, Popeye the Sailor. On one side was meekness, innocence and childlike charm; on the other was sarcasm, raucousness and black humor. (It is no coincidence that Max Fleischer, Popeye's animator and friend to spinachgrowers everywhere, later went on to make a fulllength cartoon version of Gulliver's Travels.) Mickey lost the struggle, and this was no mere passing of the sceptre; it was the French Revolution of the young medium. Nobility was dethroned by a brawling vegetarian. Or, in Swiftian terms, the Yahoos had triumphed over the Houyhnhnms. Where Mickey resorted to ingenuity and an endless store of courage, Popeye merely produced a can of spinach and proceeded to pound Bluto into the turf. And for what? For Olive Oyl!



AN ANIMATED HISTORY

1900-1909

J. Stuart Blackton's HUMOROUS PHASES OF FUNNY FACES (1906) draws mustaches, beards on animated faces. Followed by GERTIE, A TRAIN-ED DINOSAUR (1909) by Winsor McCay — probably the first example in this country of a fully animated cartoon — made to be screened with accompanying live narration.

1910-1919

John Randolph Bray makes COL. HEEZA LIAR and THE ARTIST'S DREAM in 1913. The following year, Earl Hurd introduces transparent leaves (cels), making it possible to superimpose action over an immovable background. The first American cartoon series, KO-KO THE CLOWN, featuring a clown who leaps from an inkwell to cavort on a drawing board, started by Max Fleischer in 1917. Both FELIX THE CAT and KRAZY KAT are born this decade. Bill Nolan and Leon Searle draw Krazy; Felix is the work of Australian Pat Sullivan. Walter Lantz begins his long career as an animator.

1920-1929

OSWALD THE LUCKY RABBIT, created by Lantz and Walt Disney, then becomes the exclusive property of Lantz at Universal. Bud Fisher's British MUTT AND JEFF cartoons enjoy a great vogue over here. Ub Iwerks draws FLIP THE FROG. Birth of Disney's SILLY SYMPHONIES, most famous of which is the funny-macabre SKELETON DANCE (1928). Birth of Mickey (born Mortimer) Mouse with PLANE CRAZY and GALLOPIN' GAUCHO in 1928. Then, in the same year, comes STEAMBOAT WILLIE: Mickey talks! While live film stumble over the use of sound, Disney produces cartoons that represent the pinnacle of sonic sophistication.

1930-1939

The Depression Years. But animated cartoons flourish. People's hearts are cheered by the song "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf?" from Disney's THE THREE LITTLE PIGS (1935). Mickey continues strong. Max Fleischer creates BETTY BOOP, a censorable vamp with an oversized head, and POPEYE, Mickey's powerful rival. Warner Brothers introduces BUGS BUNNY in 1938. Carl Barks begins drawing DONALD DUCK cartoons for Disney. The first full-length animated features come from the Disney studio in Burbank: SNOW WHITE (1938) and PINOCCHIO (1939).

1940-1949

Disney's features continue to delight: FANTASIA (1940), DUMBO (1942), BAMBI (1943), and ICHABOD AND MR. TOAD (1949). He aids the war effort with VICTORY THROUGH AIR POWER (1944). The decade begins, however, with a strike at the Disney plant. Several animators, led by Canadian Stephen Bosustow, secede and form United Productions of America. UPA opens up shop in 1945 with a staff of six. MR. MAGOO created by John Hubley of UPA. Walter Lantz's WOODY WOODPECKER cartoons made for Universal and M-G-M's TOM AND JERRY by Bill Hanna and Joe Barbera.

1950-1959

More Disney features: CINDERELLA (1950), ALICE IN WONDERLAND (1951), PETER PAN (1953), LADY AND THE TRAMP (1955), and SLEEPING BEAUTY (1958). UPA introduces GERALD McBOING BOING, drawn by Bob Cannon. Considered by some the hope of animation, UPA nevertheless failed to introduce any interesting cartoon characters a la Disney, although individual creations shine out: Cannon's MADELEINE and Hubley's MOONBIRD. Warner Brothers comes out with Mimi the Road Runner (that's right: she's a girl) and Wile E. Coyote.

1960-1969

Hanna-Barbarism. YOGI BEAR, THE FLINTSTONES, THE JETSONS, and an endless array of mediocrities. Disney still grinds out a few, like the recent JUNGLE BOOK. UPA's Ernest Pintoff makes THE VIOLINIST and THE CRITIC. Fritz Freleng introduces two remarkably popular series, THE INSPECTOR and THE PINK PANTHER, the latter originating from the credits of Blake Edwards' live feature. Television devours cartoons, either in limited-animation series or advertising. THE YELLOW SUBMARINE sails over from England to encourage hopes for further feature-length animation. Works in progress: John Wilson's ARCHY AND MEHITABEL and Chuck Jones' THE PHANTOM TOLLBOOTH.

1970-?

Enter the computer. Some of the more mechanical animation processes are beginning to be performed by machines and, by the end of the next decade, the cartoon will have changed radically. Less individualization of characters and more repetitiveness in common movement patterns will be the result of the cheaper, less creative computerization of the cartoon. Or, perhaps, a combination of craftsmanship and automation will preserve some vestige of the pianstaking detail and unique personality of the past. But, for better or worse, Snow White is dead.



From the animal world, we pass to the vegetable world.


Hard upon Popeye's heels came Tom and Jerry and Bugs Bunny. M-G-M's cat-and-mouse cartoons were all variations on the chase theme. While Popeye and Bluto fought for the hand of Olive Oyl, the Tom and Jerry films were motivated by an even more crude biological determinism, namely CAT + MOUSE = CHASE. Since Jerry has to this date not seen the dark side of his arch-enemy's intestines, we can assume that the laws of nature were neatly circumvented to permit the series to continue.

Bugs Bunny, the creation of Robert McKimson and Tex Avery at Warner Brothers, is cartoondom's existential hero. Although the perennial target of Elmer Fudd's shotgun, Bugs regards the chase as beneath his dignity, and, regardless of the perils involved, does exactly as he wishes. Bugs, more than any other series cartoon character, is an object of envy; his insouciant, "Ehh, what's up, Doc?" at the moment of truth reveals an inner toughness and aplomb that even Humphrey Bogart could not equal in his best moments. And yet, at the same time, his imperturbability is a barrier to complete rapport with an audience. Like the Road Runner, he is just too self-sufficient.

What makes for the success of the Road Runner is not character, however, but a desperate situation turned into an agonizingly funny farce. Wile E. Coyote is emaciated to the point of two-dimensionality, and the only creature in the desert who can satisfy his hunger is always out of reach. During the eight minutes of a Road Runner cartoon, we roar at the misfortunes of a miserable creature who exhausts the limits of the possible (and then some) for a bird whose edible portion wouldn't cover a hamburger bun.

At this point, we might return to the subject of violence in the animated cartoon. John Culshaw, who saw Disney's feature-length cartoons as a fall from grace, commented that in certain animated series, "the audience neither knows nor cares why one is attempting to kill or main the other; brutality exists in its own right, the laughs are invariably associated with some form of injury." Right, but what of it? The Road Runner carries man's need for sustenance to its logical extreme. What emerges is a shrewd, oblique commentary on the absurdity of struggle. A coyote tearing up the desert for a puny conglomeration of feathers and failing horribly is not only hilarious but also a balm for frayed nerves and as such completely salutary in every way.

There used to be a time when a spontaneous shout of glee filled the theater every time the Road Runner's familiar feathered form lit the screen. Its "beep-beep" and trail of dust meant as much to the 50's and 60's as Mickey Mouse's two-button shorts or Chaplin's baggy pants and cane did to earlier generations of moviegoers. And in those days, as you may recall, people laughed at the spectacle of live human beings falling



through an open manhole. They still do.


Man's psychological needs (and therefore his sense of humor) have not changed drastically in the last hundred years; what *has* changed are the media by which these needs are satisfied. If laughing at, say, Woody Woodpecker indicates my baseness, why then I am incorrigibly base!

Ever since my early childhood, I delighted in the multi-colored concentric circles that marked the beginning of a Warner Brothers cartoon. Although not so thorough-going or visually imaginative as Disney's productions, the creations of Tex Avery, Chuck Jones, Robert McKimson and Fritz Freleng have added at least half a dozen irresistable characters to the American cinema myth. But unlike Disney, the Warner animators were aware of the changes in the nature and tastes of their audience during and after the Second World War. Bugs Bunny, Elmer Fudd, Tweety, Sylvester, Daffy Duck, the Road Runner, Wile E. Covote, Yosemite Sam, Porky and Petunia Pig, Speedy Gonzalez – these characters people a more nervous, less innocent world than Mickey Mouse and his cohorts. Considering the manifest absurdity of the times, they are more appropriate than the placid, easygoing characters they replaced.

I'm sorry, but am I speaking in the present tense? The Road Runner, who could once out-race anything on wheels, now sells Plymouths. Bugs Bunny, who would not have been caught dead munching a carrot

unless it were ill-gotten, now sells them by the truck-load to kids who hate vegetables. The other characters, likewise, are waiting their turn to become "advertising consultants"; all production of cartoons using the characters mentioned in the preceding paragraph has been suspended indefinitely. Under McKimson, the last of the old guard at Warner Brothers, the animation department is valiantly trying to think up new characters that can do for the next decade what Bugs Bunny did for the 40's and the Road Runner for the 50's and 60's.

While animation in this country is becoming an annex of television advertising, the Europeans are rediscovering its theatrical possibilities. French critic Robert Benayoun distinguishes between what he conceives as the two most prevalent styles of animation in the world today. First there are the American animators like John Hubley of U.P.A. and the Warner Brothers stalwarts, who rely primarily on vocal effects for characterization. (Daffy Duck's voice, for example, is more identifiable than his accompanying image.) Many European countries, on the other hand, shy away from voice characterization because of the nature of their cartoon market. The Czechs, for example, cannot make talky cartoons if they wish the Slovaks, Germans, and Hungarians within their own borders to understand them. Because of such problems and the pantomime tradition long existing in Central and Eastern Europe, most European animators (excluding the British, whose cartoon industry is an outgrowth of our Continued on page 35





Yon Olde Annuale Maierr Tale

In 1980, when a morris dancer was elected President and history books at last acknowledged that the most important movement of the Sixties was neither Scientology nor the Student Uprising but the Renaissance Pleasure Faire, Phyllis Patterson finally admitted publicly that time travel had been known to a certain secret society since 1548. At last the mystery was solved of where she and her husband Ron found so many cobblers, carters, criers, friars, witches, warlocks, drunken porters, pilgrims, piemen, jousters, jesters, peasants, pirates, squires, scriveners, hostelers, harlots, cuckolds, couriers, sheriffs, sorcerers, apprentices, astrologers, falconers, fencers, knights, knaves, knives, forks and spoons to decorate the May extravaganzas they initiated in Los Angeles in 1963.

The day the Renaissance Centre headquarters opened, Phyllis Patterson met me there. As I stood gazing out from the innyard at this eighth wonder of the world, sunbeams sparkled off the thatched slats of the stately New Globe Theatre across the cobbled street. Phyllis arrived and we walked through a crooked alleyway toward a market cross. Robed and smocked figures bustled through the market. After a brief tour we journeyed back in time to Ventura County, 1967, site of the fifth annual Pleasure Faire and May Market. At that time the Faire was confined to Southern California, although it was to branch to Marin County that autumn and to Boston a few years later before sweeping the country.

We arrived near a pirate ship on a little stream. Around its poop mizzen a crowd of Fairegoers had gathered to hear a giant with a voice that could drown out a bear-baiting match. "That's Clare Zero," Phyllis told me. "He's a printmaker. He looks forward to the Pleasure Faire every year because it's the only place wide open enough for him to exercise that incredible lungpower. He's belting it out so loud everyone thinks he's an actor and his boat's a stage, so nobody's going on

board to look at his prints. Next year he changed his booth rather than go sotto voce."

"I take it this Faire is before you founded

the Renaissance Centre?" I asked.

"That's right. The Centre started next year, 1968. Up to then, the celebrations were all seasonal. In fact, the first Faire started as a commdia dell'arte show for 10 ten-year-old kids!" The kids comprised a class Phyllis was teaching. Since their commedia ran too short for a full-scale public entertainment, she began scouting around for other entertainments of the period. Before she knew it, she had found 60 craftsmen and more than 100 entertainers who wanted to help her revive the spirit of old country faires. "We wanted to get people together to celebrate springtime and to celebrate handcraft and if it made money, that was secondary," she said, pausing to fluff her farthingale.

Since 5,000 people came that first year to trade, parade and masquerade; to feast on roast beef, mutton, loquats, "legge of turkye," sausages, sweetmeats, and hot cross buns; and to quaff cider, sack, wine, beer and ale, make money the Faire did. For six years a non-commercial radio station of the time, KPFK, was the beneficiary of all excess funds. Then came the epoch-making idea for the Renaissance Centre in 1968, after which all the proceeds were channeled

there.

The Centre's first goal was to buy a permanent home for the Faire, which had shuttled around between four locations in its initial seven years. Although the Faire had more or less settled on the Arthur Whizin property in the old Paramount Ranch, its occupancy remained tenuous because the land had been optioned. By 1969 — when the Faire had grown to a three-weekend, 150-craftsman, 400-entertainer, 9,000-daily-visitor affair providing year-round work for 50 craftsmen, the Pattersons and their staff of four — it became imminent not only to move, but to take advantage of the Renaissance feeling the

own), generalize their characters by mimicry and sound effects. The Yugoslav film *The Fly*, for instance, consists only of a silent man and a gigantic fly that noisily menaces him. Jiri Brdecka's *Dr. Vogelbird* (also called *The Grotesque Chicken*) uses garbled "nonsense" voices to convey the gist of what is said.

Nowhere in the world do the animated cartoon and the puppet film flourish today as they do behind the Iron Curtain — and especially Yugoslavia. In the early 50's a group of young caricaturists working for the satirical magazine *Kerempuh* banded together to establish what has since become known as the Zagreb School of animation. Nedeljko Dragic's *Diogenes Perhaps* and Zlatko Grgic's *Little and Big* are experiments in illusion and, at the same time, comic gems more far-out than Chuck Jones' best Road Runner films. In contrast, Boris Kolar's *Boomerang* is a modest parable of a butterfly wreaking havoc on a radar installation. And Borivoj Dovnikovic's *Curiosity* is a strikingly original treatment of an old one-liner joke.


The Yugoslav films tend to resolve themselves into several clear-cut categories. First are the homilies, like *Boomerang*, which try to make a point by the use of satire. "This approach," writes Dusan Vukotic, who garnered the only Oscar ever given to a foreign cartoon, "offered unlimited possibilities for the graphic transformation of characters and progress from pure form to symbols." The difficulty here is that a banal

message all too often takes the sting away from the satire, especially if it tries to tell us, UNESCO-style, that all men are brothers, so let us all clasp hands, etc.

Second are the believers in Benayoun's dictum that "animation, in principle, has no other plastic imperative than movement." Diogenes Perhaps and Big and Little take our eyes for a walk, then burst out into a dead run. Also in this category is the Hungarian Five Minute Thrill, which is nothing but violence and murder from start to finish. One character bumps off another and is in turned bumped off. The murders reach a crescendo of droll gruesomeness. Finally, animated members of the audience storm into the cartoon to "get" the director of the film. It suddenly dawns on us that we have been exposed for what we are - drooling, bloodthirsty scoundrels who would like nothing so much as to attend a public hanging or send our enemies sliding down a fifty-foot razor blade into a barrel of brine. Bunuel lives!

Third and last are the poets, like Vlado Kristl and Ivo Vrbanic, whose *Le Peau de Chagrin* is fully as dramatic as the Balzac tale from whence it comes and overpowering in its visual sensations.

Meanwhile, back in the States, banality reigns. "If there is an underlying philosophy about our cartoons," write Bill Hanna and Joe Barbera, "it is to project warmth and good feeling. We spoof lots of things — Hollywood, cars, television and even our own animated commercials — but we don't see anything funny in



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
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

violence and sin. Even our villains are nice guys." What mediocrities will come of age when the kids who have been raised on Fred Flintstone and Quick Draw McGraw reach twenty-one? No violence or sin — the prospect is stultifying! A new dark ages, appropriately yclept Hanna-Barbarism, is descending like a pall upon the children of Mickey Mouse. No more the full animation of the early Disney or even anything approaching the visual wit of the Road Runner.

Fortunately, the bland blight has not completely covered the land. To the rescue has come, appropriately enough, *Yellow Submarine*, with songs and visuals combining to create a world of strange horizons, dazzling colors, unfamiliarity and comic distortion. Still, Pepperland is a nice place to visit, but I wouldn't like to take up residence there — it's too much like Sunday School heaven with plinking harps and splashing fountains.

archy and mehitabel, in contrast, moves from the streets of heaven down to the alleys of New York, to focus on archy, the free-verse bard of cockroachdom, and mehitabel, the eternal heart-of-gold courtesan transmigrated into the body of a cat. If the film lives up to its promise, it will be well worth waiting up for. Then too, Chuck (Road Runner) Jones is making a feature cartoon out of *The Phantom Toll-booth*.

Ever since Melies' camera jammed up that fateful day seventy-odd years ago, a million times a million phantasms have leaped up before our eyes. Cartoon dynasties have risen and fallen, and more are on their way. As mehitabel would say, "there's a dance in the old dame yet." We can only hope that there are many, many dances left before that final

Faire had engendered in the Los Angeles

community.

Phyllis smiled when she thought about the original vision of the Centre in 1968. "We wanted to build something that was in theme and in atmosphere architecturally beautiful and reflective of a period when the arts were at a zenith. Such an atmosphere would inspire craftsmen to create objects of a universal nature.

"We envisioned the Centre as a meaningful outgrowth of the Faire as well as a permanent home. And we wanted to build a community for the cooks, bakers, bookbinders, printmakers, weavers, woodcarvers, spinners, stonecutters, smiths, joneses, merchants, tinkers, alchemists, and apothecaries."

The beneficiaries seemed equally eager. When the Marin County Faire got rained out one weekend and held over to the next, "all the craftsmen, instead of grousing about the weather, were glad for the opportunity to stay together for another week," said Phyllis, who admits to a special fondness toward these people.

"Oh look," she said, "by that cart. That's Richard Sterling. Leathermaker, executer of purses extraordinaire. He lives on a ranch near San Francisco. Once each year he climbs into his cart and wends his eccentric way down the freeway-filled path to the Faire. Go and look in his cart."

I did. The entire inside of his cart was lined. With fur.

If Phyllis likes anyone more than craftsmen, it's kids. In January 1969 the Renaissance Centre began making contacts with the public schools. Teachers found the Centre to be a valuable resource center. That year's Faire parade was enriched by giants, monsters, hobbyhorses and a phoenix head made by a class at Barnsdall Junior Art Center. The Roosevelt High School costume crew got involved in making outfits to wear to the Faire (admission paid by the Centre, under whose aegis several hundred school children attended the '69 Faire) and were there with bells on.

Only a year after their founding of the Centre, Ron and Phyllis decided they didn't have the patience to hold off projects until they secured land. "Our few thousand dollars annually was just a drop in the bucket anyway," Phyllis said. Already anticipating the outside funds that were to storm their mailbox shortly afterward, they directed the

Centre's efforts toward re-establishing the apprentice system in the arts, crafts and in theatre. "By the summer of '69, we were sponsoring talented high-school craftsmen, especially from 'confined community' schools, apprenticing them to our craftsmen. We hoped to save talented workers from turning out doorknobs on an assembly line all their lives." The Pattersons spent much of 1969 looking. They found applicants for apprenticeships, and they found people to contribute grants for the Centre to funnel to them.

By 1970 the permanent traveling Renaissance exhibit made by schoolchildren ("No, the leather chastity belt wasn't in it," she laughed.) became available through the

Centre. The rest is history.

With all the contending forces vying for power in the Sixties — blacks, browns, reds, hippies, yippies and the CIA — how do the Pattersons think they became the ones who pulled off the Revolution? "We had so many people who would come out just to build bridges, or just to be out in the country, to be involved in the group effort to make beautiful things. There were no real oldcountry fairs in the U.S. I guess the Puritans killed all of that. We were trying to save America from its Puritan heritage.

We crossed Merywood Bridge to the Maybower Theatre. The air rang with the shouts of rhymers, mimers, drummers, mummers and paupers; sang with the strains of hautboys, choir boys, flutes and lutes. Up on Hawkers Hill they were crying icons, batiks, candles, kites, maps, metalware, prints, pomander, spices, stained glass, vials, woodcarvings — and a partridge in a pear tree.

"We gave people something to be interested in doing with their leisure time, instead of sitting with a beer can and watching TV," Phyllis continued. "The Renaissance Centre was a Utopian idea which we really thought

we could bring into being."

Whatever the reason, when the groundswell began for the Centre and Postal Box 46066. Hollywood 90046 was stuffed with offers every day, it was the beginning of the end for society as post-Renaissance Man knew it.

"Utopia. If I didn't know you and have the perspective of 1980 to judge it from, I'd say your head was full of clouds," I said.

"All things are possible — if you belong to the right secret society," she winked. She flagged a passing broomstick and whisked off to another century.

times years have mellowed the memories, and only the good is recalled.

There is an inevitable aftermath following the publication of biographies like *King Cohn* and *Thalberg*. People tell me: "Gee it's too bad you didn't talk to me before you wrote that book. I could have told you some great stories." In most cases, the stories don't turn out to be as great as the narrators had imagined. Or else the anecdotes are more concerned with the storytellers than with Cohn or Thalberg.

But once in a while the biographer comes across a story that makes him wish he could go back to the drawing board. That happened on at least one occasion following the publication of *King Cohn*.

When Mary Martin was in Los Angeles for I Do, I Do, I interviewed her for the AP. She and her husband, Richard Halliday, were staying at a beachfront house in Santa Monica, and when the interview was over, the subject of Harry Cohn came up.

"Let me tell you about my experience with Harry Cohn," she said. Here was her story:

Back in the 1930s, Mary Martin was appearing in a Sunset Strip nightclub, where she attracted some attention with her surprisingly powerful voice. Harry Cohn, who was seeking a successor to Grace Moore (he continued to do so to the time of his death), sent for her.

She was admitted to his forbidding, Mussolini-like office, but she had too much Texas in her to be scared. With no formal greeting, Cohn bade her to sing.

Mary Martin launched into an operatic aria that gave full vent to her coloratura soprano. She thought she was performing well, but to her dismay, Cohn seemed to be paying no attention. His eyes were focused on a paper that lay on his desk; she suspected it was a racing form and grew more and more peeved as she poured forth the song. Finally she quit in mid-trill.

Cohn looked up in surprise. "What's the matter?" he asked. "Well, Mr. Cohn, it's obvious that you aren't interested in me, so I won't waste any more of your time," she snapped.

"Oh, can it!", he grumbled. "You're okay. I'll sign you to a contract — on one condition." "What's that?", she asked.

"That you get your nose fixed," he said. Miss Martin thought for a long moment, then replied: "No, I don't think so. I know I can sing through this nose. If I got myself a new nose, I might not sing as well."

The sequel to the incident came six months later. Mary Martin was appearing on Broadway with Victor Moore and William Gaxton in Leave It to Me. Cole Porter had written one of his uniquely suggestive songs for her and the critics had exulted over the birth of a new star.

Shortly after the premiere, Harry Cohn went to New York on one of his periodic prowls for talent and story properties. The show he most wanted to see was Leave It to Me, and he acquired two hard-to-get front-row seats. When the hit number came on, he was startled to see that it was delivered by the same girl who had spurned a Columbia contract because she wouldn't get her nose fixed.

Mary Martin recognized the stocky man in the front-row seat. She sang the entire rendition of My Heart Belongs to Daddy directly at Cohn — all the while holding her thumb and forefinger around her nose.

Thalberg, Life & Legend by Bob Thomas. (Doubleday, 415 pages, \$7.95.)

So much mythology has been heaped upon the memory of Irving Thalberg that it is refreshing to find a biography which ferrets out such a large amount of material about his life and films without sacrificing accuracy. F. Scott Fitzgerald made Thalberg the model for Monroe Stahr, the hero of his unfinished novel, *The Last Tycoon*. From the starting point of this novel, Thomas brings his own 20 years


as Associated Press Hollywood columnist to bear upon both the era and the man.

Although Thalberg's name never appeared on the production credits ("If you have the power to give yourself credit, you don't need it."), he was the guiding force behind such achievements as the first version of Ben Hur, Greta Garbo's Anna Christie, Grand Hotel and the Marx Brothers' A Night at the Opera. As Thomas portrays him, Thalberg was not only a potent creative force as studio manager of Universal Pictures at age 20, but remained the most inventive producer in Hollywood until he died at the age of 37, having guided M-G-M through a significant period of movies.

Bob Thomas, whose previous biography of Harry Cohn and his forthcoming book on David O. Selznick might qualify him for the title of "mogul monger," treads a stylistic path which avoids the academic precision of his research and the extravagant hyperbole of his locale. The result is clear, fast-reading prose which is lavishly illustrated and well-organized. After the thorough chronology of Thalberg's career, Thomas has appended an extensive 70 page section of filmography and analysis of Thalberg's films, reviving for the reader many memorable films.

As well as being the initiator of many important film projects, he became famous for his ability to take an inadequate production and remold it, sometimes completely, into a financial and often critical success. One of his favorite comments was: "Movies aren't made; they're remade."

In his summation of Thalberg's contribution to motion pictures, Thomas states: "Together with Louis Mayer, he invented the bigstudio system that kept American movies supreme throughout the world for a generation. But his reputation would not have prevailed if he had only devised the film factory. The touchstone of his genius was quality, the unceasing pursuit of quality." The comment serves both as apt tribute to the genius of Thalberg and proper admonition to the film factory folk



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who still think that genius comes only in denominations of a million. DIGBY DIEHL

The Crazy Ladies by Joyce Elbert. (New American Library, 448 pages \$6.95)

Joyce Elbert is a nice Jewish girl from the East Bronx who as a child read the "Jewish Daily Forward" and went to Christopher Columbus High School and, later, Hunter College. She feels that although sexual experience is not compulsory for a writer of dirty books, it is a great inducement. Her second novel, The Crazy Ladies, is a shaggy lady tale about four urbane young women in New York City that reads like a bedtime story from Kraft-Ebbing.

Miss Elbert's tale is, unfortunately, ingenious but wearying. Her pornography does not have the flair of Philip Roth or the dedication of de Sade, but falls somewhere between the two Henries-Sutton and Miller. The Crazy Ladies encompasses the name brand ecstasies of the sixties, such as Reddi-Whip and A&P hotdogs, used to prepare gourmandsatisfying sexual antipasto. But the reader's ultimate response is "So what?" You're hungry, anyway, an hour after.

The final flaw of The Crazy Ladies is its length. Long-winded and overextended, the climax is rendered impotent because the book peters out after a couple of hundred pages.

Afterwords: Novelists on Their Novels. Edited by Thomas McCormack. (Harper & Row, Publishers. 231 pages. \$5.95.)

Fourteen authors have bared their souls and aired their egos in this collection of essays on the craft of novelizing. While some have told their tales here in response to an invitation, editor McCormack includes pieces not specifically composed for the occasion — an epistle from William Gass to his editor, a reminiscence in warm blood by Truman Capote, a psychedelic effluence from Norman Mailer's prolific pen. Unfortunately only one woman writer (Mary Renault) is represented and a few more-such as Jessamyn West, Muriel Spark or Iris Murdoch-might have resulted in a more balanced picture.

McCormack claims that nothing is peculiar to all writers, yet the essays prove otherwise. What matters foremost to these fourteen is the experience of writing, not of having written. What exactly is writing? In nearly every case it's a visceral experience, and how they all love to talk about it! "Haemorrhoidally agonizing," moans Anthony Burgess, present mirth masking past pain. "The word I have found for the experience was immersion," writes Robert Crichton, adding colorfully, "I had the sensation of being drawn very fine as if I could thread myself through a needle." Gass "suffered"; Reynolds Price was "wired" to his book with "threads of skin"; Mailer "the captive of an illness" (aside from the multi-drug, multi-everything binge that illuminated his dreamlike revision of The Deer Park).

And what's in a novel? It's the combination of the author's personal experience, plagiarized from life itself, and "the accidentality of inspiration" (John Fowles). Inevitably the writer will move bodily into his pages, a process which is subor unconscious, until he recognizes himself. Just as frequent is the phenomenon of the sudden idea from which burgeons an entire work: sometimes a single phrase or sentence drumming in the dreamer's ear, sometimes a single recurrent image, seemingly sprung from nowhere. The actual writing is ac-

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companied by what any author will here greet as an old and dear friend: the unexpected vet hungrily awaited influx of nervous energy, the momentum of creativity, wholly exciting, involuntary, other-worldly, effortless, "as though one were a secretary transcribing the words of a voice from a cloud," in Capote's breathless description.

Despite beneath-the-skin similarity, novelists speak in different voices. John Fowles' "Notes on an Unfinished Novel" is the only onthe-spot account, its spare diurnal revelations a refreshing contrast to the more wild and woolly retrospects — i.e., Reynolds Price throws in Shakespeare, Tolstoy, Hawthorne, Dante, Virginia Woolf, Catherine and Heathcliff, etc., etc. Predictably, Norman Mailer's contribution throbs like a fevered pulse as he recounts his intensive rewriting of The Deer Park complete with two sets of proofs from two different publishers for the reader's comparison - perhaps the most perversely fascinating entry in all of Afterwords.

"Narcissism is the essential vice a writer must have," Fowles states, and it is beyond doubt from the tone of any and every one of these selections that this essential vice is in no wise lacking. Gass may call himself a madman, but he does so with considerable self-satisfaction. Mailer's egotism is ruggedly entertaining as usual but in others it takes the form of snooty and ineffectual put-downs of editors and reading public. Gass to editor: "You are, of course, surrounded by immeasurably ignorant people charlatans and salesmen, the cheap, the vulgar and the noisy." Price cavalierly dismisses his critical readers as people without "appreciative agility or senses of humor."

But Louis Auchincloss, George P. Elliott, Mary Renault, Anthony Burgess and Robert Crichton add a few redemptive sunny moments to this stormy landscape of blood and print, with Truman Capote and Ross Macdonald blithely spinning their gossamer memories and enjoying their magic hours in that most seductive of fool's paradises: the writing of fiction.

The Johnny Carson of Kiddieland

The major networks will be cancelling a major portion of the Saturday morning cartoon orgy next season under mounting pressure from parents and the Federal Government. When they decide how to fill the empty time slots, they would do well to take a look at educational television, especially from 5:30 to 6:00 weekday nights, when Misterogers' Neighborhood is on the air. As a matter of fact, Fred Rogers' remarkable kiddies' show is presently socking it to all the major Boston networks during

its time slot, acing out such perennial re-run favorites as I Spy, Batman, Merv Griffin and Perry Mason. A notable feat for a slightly built Presbyterian minister who drinks double shots of ginger ale spiked with marachino cherries.

At first glance the only thing that sets *Misterogers' Neighborhood* off from its commercial competitors is the fact that it is done on UHF educational television. The format is the same as a lot of kids' shows—a combination of puppets, live characters, songs, situations and features. But Rogers' background and his approach to his audience sets him apart from anyone else on television.

He is basically a musician, having received his B.A. in that field, but his interest in people led Rogers to become an ordained Presbyterian clergyman, and finally to take an advanced degree in child psychology at the Arsenal Institute, the University of Pittsburgh Medical School's child-study center.

Rogers feels that the only correct



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way to deal with children is to nurture their hopes and help them define their own humanity. "We have to show kids that something new isn't necessarily something to be afraid of. *Misterogers' Neighborhood* introduces children to everyday life through exposure to such situations as the barber, doctor, dentist and so forth.

"We're mainly concerned with kids in the 'edible' phase of development — from four to about six years old. They have a natural concern about their body parts, and, unwittingly, castration fears can be built up in them. To offset these fears, we've used simple psychology and developed a series of training songs. The songs speak to the needs of kids, about their differences. Like the song that tells about the differences between boys and girls — Some are fancy on the outside. Some are fancy on the inside.

Everybody's fancy. Everybody's fine.

Your body's fancy and so is mine."
Rogers feels that the responsibility of programming for kids is too often left to people who do not understand the full implication of what they do. "The Uncle Billy or Bozo characters often traffic in their own unresolved childhood fantasies. Much in the same way, the orgy of cartoons that kids see on Saturday morning is only the animated reflection of 'real' television that their

parents will watch later in the day. It's like sucking at a glass teat — because there is no nourishment to be gotten from these shows. Programmers have got to be aware of the kids' needs as sensitively as an analyst has to be aware of his patients'.

"I try to communicate with the kids on an adult level — no Uncle this or Big Fred, or Farmer Fred, but *Misterogers*. And I'm not a substitute parent. Perhaps that's one reason that the children trust me — because they know instinctively that I can only enrich what's already there."

The Arsenal Child Study Center, which serves as advisor to WOED-TV in Pittsburgh, Rogers' home base, has validated the Misterogers theory. They have shown that Fred Rogers is enjoyed through a broad spectrum of children, from slum kids through rich ones. Studies have also shown that parents watch the show with great frequency, gleaning from it information that they can use to further their child's development. Rogers feels that in any successful childrens' show, the programming should be utilized as a stimulus for family relationships, as well as serving as entertainment.

Rogers can communicate to kids exactly who they are, without any promise that they will automatically get better as they get bigger. "I'm



not here," he says, "to tell children I want you to become an adult as quickly as possible, so that you can buy the stuff I sell, I want them to mature at their own pace. The developmental songs, the situations that we show, well, there's more to putting on a kids' show than stringing cartoons and interviewing a local Boy Scout."

Misterogers' Neighborhood tries to help kids set their own life patterns — "TV is an accepted part of the household, and kids instinctively feel that what it spouts must be acceptable to their parents. In too many kids' shows the way you win is you flatten the opponent — kill him. And the kids swallow it. They have their own violent tendencies within them, everbody does, but the current violence on TV only makes them accept it as the normal reaction, not the abnormal."

The people and situations on Misterogers' Neighborhood are neither saccharine-sweet nor bloody. By treating his audience with respect, as well as demanding respect from them, Fred Rogers achieves a masterful balance. He operates on a shoestring: a \$300,000 annual budget, which must produce five shows a week for twentysix weeks - as opposed to the \$150,000 spent for one week's segment of a commercial kids' cartoon show. But because of his ingenious approach to the world of children and their problems, Misterogers' Neighborhood is a smashing success in all the cities in which it is shown.

Fred Rogers sums up his success simply, saying "Kids' imaginations are stifled if they are left feeling alone and helpless. It's our job to give them the chance to be magical." He does just that, and without anything up his sleeve except understanding.

If I were pinned down for an explanation of the major differences between 'classical' music and 'pop', I would immediately object on semantic grounds. Both labels are detestable - not to mention inaccurate. But we're stuck with them, and since the name of the game is communication, we might as well make the best of a barely tolerable system. Now where was I - oh ves, being pinned down.

The main difference lies in interpretation. In the pop field, each artist puts his or her imprint on a song, or an arranger may transform the music to the point where it is virtually re-written: rhythm could vary from a bossa nova to a waltz; chords could be completely re-harmonized. In classical music, the composer's intentions are theoretically sacred. The notes are not tampered with; the instrumentation remains identical (with exceptions in doublings); and the conductor is supposed to be the liaison between creator and interpreters.

Supposed to be. Yet I (and perhaps many of you) have different versions of the same work. That doesn't mean another theory's been shot to hell; it simply indicates that conductors are more than human metronomes. They have moods; they have prejudices; they have flaws. They can be inspired

and inspiring.

What gives rise to these observations is a new recording of Beethoven's Ninth – the Choral Symphony. It features Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic, with the Julliard Chorus and soloists Martina Arroyo soprano, Regina Sarfaty mezzo, Nicholas DiVirgilio tenor and Norman Scott bass (Columbia M2S-794).

Bernstein may never have been known particularly as a "Beethoven exponent," but no one has ever questioned his ability at interpre-

ting scores that call for large forces and abound in dramatic extremes. Therefore his reading of the Ninth is exceptionally compelling: intense, brooding, joyous - with meticulous concern for the dynamics of each mood. In fact, it is better than the sum of its parts; his choice of soloists is open to question, but the finale will be dealt with later. First let's focus on three orchestral segments that can make or break any interpretation of the Ninth, and compare them with those of other recorded renderings.

Those mysterious fifths that open the symphony are the murmurings that one associates with impressionism: there is an unfolding of rare beauty - a crescendo that depends on suspense. Bernstein builds it most effectively, and what's more, takes his time doing it. The element of time immediately brings to mind Toscanini, who always conducted as if he were double-parked. His opening of the Ninth, taken from a 1952 recording (RCA Victrola -VIC~8000 - an~album~lovingly~designed for Toscanini/Beethoven buffs, containing all nine symphonies, four overtures and two chamber works) shows a tendency to jab at chords and rush from idea to idea. It is as if time-lapse photography of a sunrise were speeded up. The emotion is there, so is the balance. But this should be the Choral Symphony—a time to linger.

One who does linger - also on RCA - is Charles Munch (LM-6066). But there's little anyone can



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do wrong waving his arms in front of the Boston Symphony Orchestra: it is such a magnificent instrument. Not to detract from Munch, who preferred to lavish his Gallic sensitivity on Berlioz, Ravel, Debussy, et al, his reading of the opening combines the dramatic italics of Bernstein with the incisiveness of Toscanini. It makes for more variety; but it also creates more unevenness, Hans Schmidt-Isserstedt, conducting the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra (London OSA-1159).


gives an outstanding rendition of this difficult opening: his is forthright, a bit on the slow side but with appropriate solemnity. Only his orchestral balance is debatable at both extremes: the piccolos doubling the strings on top sound detached; the tympani sounds muffled instead of booming.

The playful scherzo (this is the only Beethoven symphony in which the scherzo precedes the slow movement) has been called "a miracle of repetition in monotony." It is pre-

cisely that, with 'miracle' minimizing the negative aspect of monotony. It is a miniature masterpiece, propelled by kettledrums tuned in octaves. At the very outset, let us eliminate the London version. Schmidt-Isserstedt's scherzo (sav that three times fast!) is not only lifeless, but abridged - no doubt prompted by the unmusical decision to squeeze the Ninth on just two sides. All other versions take at least three. Therefore, all other versions have the necessary repeats. (The first indication of London's austerity came when timings were compared: Schmidt-Isserstedt zips through the scherzo in ten minutes; dragster Toscanini lavishes 13 minutes on it!) Both Munch and Toscanini are careless with the famous tympani jabs: Bernstein separates the elements (with help from Columbia's fine engineers) and achieves greater clarity. Toscanini and Bernstein keep the pulse at its original marking throughout. Munch lets it sag when the French horns begin their upsweep. For overall dynamics, Bernstein's concern for dramatic detail make his reading the most exciting.

As for the hauntingly beautiful slow movement, again let's dispose of London's rendition: whatever serenity is pressed in its grooves is nullified by the fact that it comes in two parts: the last track on Side one and the first on Side two. They really know how to hurt an adagio. Both Munch and Toscanini adhere to the conductorial philosphy that slow movements should be kept moving. Their performances are practically interchangeable: both stately and dignified, but lacking passion. Columbia (or is it Bernstein?) lavishes an entire side on the Baroque beauty and imbues it with a Romantic undercurrent: there is grace and warmth in this reading. It is rhapsodic without being lush; introspective without being melodramatic. Here is a contemplative adagio worthy of the Ninth.

With Bernstein leading in the third quarter, we'll take an intermission here. Next month we'll compare chorales – and for the Ninth, that's the moment of truth.



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
