EDITORIAL

TAX DEDUCTIBLE OR CHAMPAGNE AND STRAWBERRIES

A friend of mine is very much opposed to the "tax reform" or—as she calls it—"tax deform" law. However, she is not so much opposed to it as to give the refund money back to the government. That, she says, would border on aberration.

So to save her from bewilderment and guilt, I have compiled a list of institutions that are worthy of her patronage. If she gave to these, she would be putting the money back into circulation—which is, as I understand it, the purpose of the refund, salving her conscience by not keeping it, and even helping the institutions. (Last, but not least, she would be tucking away a little tax deduction or two for next year.)

Baltimore Museum of Art, Baltimore Symphony, Baltimore City Opera, Walters Gallery; Corcoran Gallery of Art, Museum of African Art, National Symphony, Opera Society of Washington.

There are, of course, dozens of other

"worthy causes", and I only compiled this list because she seemed at a loss to know what to do with \$200, a problem I have never had. One thing about giving money while you are still here to see the results is that boards of directors are more likely to hear your voice than when you have been gathered to your fathers (or, in this women's liberation year—mothers).

W. W. Corcoran who founded the Corcoran Gallery once wrote that "posthumous benefactions were the most selfish," and I think I agree with him although his continue to provide pleasure.

Sometimes I think that frivolous bequests are the best. Had I the money, I would model mine on one given to an Oxford college to provide champagne and strawberries for the dons after some graduation ceremony. Gifts for art and music are gifts for the strawberries and champagne of the mind, but don't tell IRS.

A WOMAN'S INTERNATIONAL YEAR— ANOTHER BICENTENNIAL

Jane Austen was born 200 years ago in a small English village. Her father was a clergyman and therefore poor. She had brothers who had to be educated so she was taught only those subjects that a lady needs to know—household supervision, sewing, and a little music. She visited the sick and is said to have had a shattered love affair.

Given these facts one might expect to know her only through baptism and burial records—the short and simple annals of the poor.

But somehow—without a college education, without vocational counseling, without equal opportunity—she managed to write five of the greatest novels in the English language and in doing so changed the course of all subsequent ones.

How did she do it—poor, untrained, down-trodden, and sexually unfulfilled? Two hundred years later as we hear talk of the queen bee syndrome, female heads of households, sexual equality in physical education, we might begin to wonder how any woman ever accomplished anything before now.

But Jane Austen had advantages that today would be either denied or despised. She was

born into a literate household where precision of language and accuracy of observation were important. She was brought up to see her neighbors—not as cases or statistics—but as fellow human beings. And most important of all, she had a vantage point from which to view life—a sure morality. (Today it would be called making value judgments and, one wonders, what other kind of judgment is there.)

She was not unaware of the seamy side of life but she knew something that has been lost sight of recently: though tragedy ennobles, squalor bores; and a boring novel is a contradiction in terms.

So in this year 1975, wherein we begin the American Bicentennial celebration and also observe International Women's Year, I ask you to remember Jane Austen.

She did not consider duty a four-letter word nor self-denial and self-discipline obscenities. However, if you must have some modern reason for considering her, remember —when you find other people's pride to be inordinate, or other people's sensibility to be silly, or even your own prejudice to be harmful—that probably no surer guide to the intracacies of the human disposition exists than in the novels of Jane Austen.

SHAKESPEARE WOULD BE PROUD: As a playwright who knew the imporance of pleasing the audience, Shakespeare would be gratified at the report of the Folger Theatre (in a library dedicated to his life, work, and times). The 1974-75 season showed a 400 per cent subscription increase over the season before. Stirring plans are ahead for the 1975-76 season with five plays-two of William's and three new ones. According to the theater,

"In honor of the Bicentennial, the new plays will reflect themes relevant to contemporary American audiences."

JERZY SAPIEYEVSKI who completed a three-month stay at Wolf Trap Farm as composer-in-residence has had two of the works he wrote while at the composer's cottage accepted for publication by Theodore Presser. The works, one for full orchestra, "Summer Overture", and the other for concert band, "Scherzo di Concerto", were completed in mid April.

Commenting that his stay in the composer's cottage served well the purpose for which it was built by helping him increase his productivity, Mr. Sapieyevski said, "Nobody knows I am here: the telephone does not ring, and I do not have a car so I cannot go anywhere. I am forced to work.

"There is no other way," he explained, "if you compromise in the time you devote to composing, then it comes out in your art. It would not be possible for composers to live without opportunities like the composer's cottage."

New Heathkit "Super-Amp"



The new Heathkit AA-1640 is one powerful stereo amplifier—200 watts, minimum RMS, per channel into 8 ohms at less than 0.1% total harmonic distortion from 20-20,000 Hz.

That massive power virtually eliminates one of the most common forms of distortion — clipping. The optional backlighted meters are unusually useful. They monitor the power output directly in watts from 0.2 to 200 watts into 8 ohms and in decibels from -30 to +3 dB. Special ballastic circuitry allows the meters to respond to peaks as short as a record click, making them extremely effective overload indicators. The meters can be added to the basic AA-1640 during or after construction.

It almost takes an engineer to appreciate the AA-1640's conservative, reliable design — direct-coupled, differential input amplifier, 16 output transistors (8 per channel) in parallel,

quasi-complementary configuration, 12 pounds of diecast heat-sinking, a 25-pound power supply transformer, dissipation limiting, automatic thermal shutdown, and output compensation to make the AA-1640 unconditionally stable with any load. A special relay circuit prevents power on/off thumps from reaching your speakers and protects them from DC and extremely low frequency AC. In an exclusive Heath design, speaker fuses are located in the primary feedback loop where they don't degrade bass clarity by lowering its greater than 50 damping factor. 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

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


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On Stage

Ford's Theater has a rollicking revue on for the summer months called "Diamond Studs." It's not much of a show, really, but it is indicative of the present state of the American stage.

This past season we have seen an unending collection of British productions, enumerated in last month's column. These imports have gone on to New York and most have done well. The American shows have been mostly revivals of earlier successes or revues that have more in common with the Ed Sullivan Show, Lawrence Welk, and vaudeville, than they do to the American musical that obviously peaked in the 1950s.

"Diamond Studs" and "The Magic Show," recently at the National, are nothing new to the stage, anymore than the one-person show like "Give 'Em Hell, Harry" with James Whitmore. Why so many of these shows? Two reasons: they're cheap and they have a little something for everyone. Nothing wrong in that, of course, for that's what showbusiness is—give 'em what they want and make a buck doing it.

Some revues have had much to recommend them—the music is often good, like "Hair," or the stars have their own attraction, like Bette Midler's "Clams on the Half Shell Revue" now on Broadway, or have a theme of some interest, like "Grease." More often, they fail as either talent night at the local stage or as professional theater. This is the part that bothers me. Even though the stage is populated with a bunch of funloving kids having a good time and much of the audience shares some of the merriment, we are still paying the price for professionals; amateurs we can get any night at home on television and not have to pay for parking or wait in line behind 14 busloads of tourists and highschoolers throwing paper airplanes.

Broadway is currently having one of the best seasons it has had in years (that's in terms of box office bucks rather than quality) and everyone is up. I fear this means a formula is going to be presumed. Like Hollywood and television, the theater has always followed whatever successful formula developed until it was run into the ground or some innovative producer came up with a "new" show that worked, and then that became a part of the formula. Little by little over the past few years we have been getting more and more of the revues. Last year, for example, we had "The Rainbow Radio Roadshow," or whatever it was, that was Hair Part II. It was a flop, deservedly so. Then we had Godspell, which many enjoyed, though I didn't-I much preferred hearing the music on the radio and on record.

You can expect many more of the same. The formula is working and money is being made. I'm not saying that you can just skip them, for that would nearly keep you

away from the theater for next several years, rather, pick them carefully. Somehow the idolization of the bad guys doesn't strike me as worthwhile theater ("Diamond Studs" is loosely based on the exploits of Jesse James), but America has been making heroes of its crooks longer than any of us have been alive, so who am I to say that it does not make for good theater (Macbeth was hardly a good guy, now was he?)?


In the case of "Diamond Studs," and for that matter in "The Magic Show," the performers on stage were of little talent. There were exceptions, but far too few to justify the expense of a night at the theater. "The Magic Show" did have some of the most fascinating magic I have ever seen, and for that reason totally redeemed itself for those who came to see the magic. For those who came to see a Broadway musical, it was a total waste.

The full scale dramatic presentation with thoroughly professional actors and professional production values is fast becoming the formula for, of all places, the university, and subsidized nonprofit theaters, such as Olney, Arena, Hartke, and the Royal Shakespeare. Not only can we expect the trend to continue, but I think we can expect it to intensify. Commercial theater will present the star-led revue, the bawdy musical, and the nostalgic revivals of past hits, like "Gypsy," or musical versions of past hits, like "Lorelei" (both coming to Shady Grove this summer), while the new, the experimental, and the less-commercial and less surefire shows will be presented by those whose first love is theater, rather than showbusiness.

Just for an idea of how this trend is taking shape, turn over to the Calendar in Forecast! I think you will see clearly the evidence. One thing is for sure—you'll find offerings to suit your taste. Therefore, why not go to the theater tonight—they need you as much as you need them.



Movie Guide

ARNOLD — This horror spoof never manages to live up to its very funny opening scene, in which Stella Stevens marries a corpse. Still, there are a number of good moments, thanks largely to a cast that knows just how to handle lines like, "Lady Dwellyn's been in shock for days. Hasn't said a word to a soul since Master Robert exploded." With Roddy McDowall, Elsa Lanchester, Farley Granger, Jon McGiver; Georg Fenady directed. **PG**

AT LONG LAST LOVE — Were '30s musicals really this bad? Director-producer-author Peter Bogdanovich, that purveyor of genuine imitation nostalgia, has created an "original" Cole Porter musical comedy whose sole appeal is the dubious notion of Bogdanovich's pals imitating Cary Grant, Ginger Rogers, Franklin Pangborn, etc.; the urbane wit of Porter's songs is ridiculous in Bogdanovich's contrived context. Burt Reynolds feigns drunkenness most of the time to hide his inability to sing or dance, and Cybill Shepherd is revealed for what she probably was all along: a horse, albeit an attractive one. With Madeline Kahn, Duilio del Prete. **G**

BREAKOUT — Charles Bronson is hired to rescue an innocent man (Robert Duvall) from a Mexican prison. The story leaks like a sieve, but Bronson is surprisingly charming in a novel role (for him): not the cold professional, but a blunderer who doesn't really know what he's doing and relies instead on blind luck. With Jill Ireland, Randy Quaid; Tom Gries directed. **PG**

A BRIEF VACATION — This remarkable film about women and womanhood was the last work of the late director Vittorio De Sica. It deals with a much-put-upon Milan housewife and factory worker (Florinda Bolkan) whose tubercular condition causes her to be sent to an Alpine sanitarium for a few months. During this respite, she sees herself for the first time as something more than a beast of burden, suddenly surrounded by women who cling desperately to illusions, she begins to develop illusions of her own. Bolkan's transformation from sullen provider to radiant beauty—while retaining the simple strength which, De Sica suggests, is the source of genuine beauty—is a wonder to behold. In Italian with English subtitles. **PG**

CAPONE — Cheap caricature biography of the Chicago gangster. Sample dialogue: "I love him like the brother that I never had, but he just won't listen" and "Do you ever feel guilty about how you got all this?" Ben Gazzara, Susan Blakely, and Harry Guardino are the primary cardboard figures; Steve Carver directed. **R**

CHILD UNDER A LEAF — Hopelessly muddled story about adultery, set in Quebec. The principals (Dyan Cannon and Donald Pilon) spend most of the time getting into and out of sports cars and staring at each other meaningfully; you'll spend most of the time trying to keep your foot from falling asleep. George Bloomfield directed. R

CORNBREAD, EARL AND ME — Well-intended but simplistic story of a young black boy who speaks up when elders of his community have been cowed into silence over the police slaying of his best friend. The characters and dialogue lack sufficient credibility to justify the disjointed pace of the story. With Laurence Fishburne, Keith Wilkes, Moses Gunn, Rosalind Cash; Joe Manduke directed. **PG**

THE DAY OF THE LOCUST — John Schlesinger's allegory tackles an old and very easy target: Hollywood in the '30s, where success is the only god, where you can't distinguish the phony from the real, where mutual exploitation is standard and mutual respect nonexistent. Schlesinger tries to show how a society that feeds on nothing but illusions will inevitably destroy itself—as, by implication, Germany did and America could. Only trouble is, Schlesinger is most skillfull at feeding us dreams himself: The film revels in the sort of tinsel phoniness it tsk-tsks. It succeeds not as an intellectual exercise, but simply as an engrossing piece of entertainment. With William Atherton, Karen Black, Donald Sutherland; from the novel by Nathanael West. **PG**

DOGPOUND SHUFFLÉ — Hobo chic. Weak story about a pair of tramps—one old and jaded, the other young and naive, natch — who try to get ahead with a tap dance-harmonica routine. Not bad when Ron Moody wows a fancy society party with his high-steppin', but that's about it. With David Soul; Jeffrey Bloom directed. **PG**

THE EIGER STATION — Clint Eastwood is a secret agent who must climb an impossible mountain in order to kill

another secret agent whose identity he doesn't know. Anyone who asks why he must climb the mountain will presumably be liquidated as well. Extremely contrived; among other things, we're supposed to believe Eastwood is a fine arts professor who does assassination work to pay for his expensive paintings. At its best, though, the film has an air of self-parody and campy fun. The key to this and all Eastwood films is instant gratification: Eastwood doesn't take anything from anyone for more than 15 seconds before striking back. With George Kennedy, Vonetta McGee; Eastwood directed, from the novel by Trevanian. R

FLOSSIE — This almost-hard-core porno flick from Sweden is tasteful and fairly sensuous, but every porno film seems to have something wrong with it, and Flossie is no exception. The trouble here is that the subtitles keep telling us how aroused the hero is, when one look at his face tells you he's bored out of his mind. With Maria Lynn, Jack Frank, Anita Anderson; Bert Torn directed. X

THE FRENCH CONNECTION II — Gene Hackman is back as Popeye Doyle, the New York cop who's long on hunches and short on execution, in a sequel that's long on foulmouthing, and short on plot. He chases Fernando Rey—his quarry in the original—through squalid Marseille, where derelict detective Doyle seems to fit in perfectly, even if he can't speak the language. Doesn't hold a candle to the original. With Bernard Fresson, John Frankenheimer directed. **PG**

THE HAPPY HOOKER — Xaviera Hollander's prostitutional memoirs may have been a novelty when they first appeared, but by now there's nothing to her story that the movies haven't already told us many times over. Lynn Redgrave, in the title role, has precious little to do and isn't very happy, either. Lifeless. Nicholas Sgarro directed. R

JANIS — This tribute to the late rock singer Janis Joplin does a superb job of capturing the infectious exuberance that was the secret of her success. Why did she die? Was her death a cause or an effect of the decline of late sixties rock culture? Mercifully, directors Howard Alk and Seaton Findlay avoid pseudo-intellectual moralizing and concentrate on what really matters: the memory of a woman who was totally uninhibited about sharing her talent and her spirit with others.

JAWS — Tense and terrifying modern-day sea story about the search for a huge killer shark that gobbles up bathers at an Atlantic Coast summer resort. The opening scenes, portraying the attempts of the town's boosters to conceal the shark's presence from potential tourists, don't quite ring true, but you'll be screaming your head off once Roy Scheider, Richard Dreyfuss, and Robert Shaw take off in their boat after the shark and the shark (it's not a real one) takes off after them. Steven Spielberg directed. **PG**

MANDINGO — Busy, busy. On the old Falconhurst plantation there don't seem to be enough hours in the day for all the decadent ante-bellum doings. This adaptation of Kyle Onstott's novel seems to have no purpose other than to indulge just about every sado-masochistic interracial fantasy you've ever had. In its favor, it gratifies those fantasies very well indeed, the master and slave stereotypes could be a lot worse, and the film has no intellectual pretensions whatever. With Perry King, James Mason, Ken Norton, Brenda Sykes, Susan George; Richard Fleischer directed. R

skiing champion battles to rehabilitate herself after she is paralyzed in an accident. A predictable tear-jerker, not nearly as provocative as it would like to be. Based on a true story. With Marilyn Hassett, Beau Bridges; Larry Peerce directed, from E.G. Valens' book. **PĞ**

THE PASSENGER — Jack Nicholson is a TV journalist frustrated by a job that deals only with images; he trades his identity for that of another man, only to find himself still dealing in illusions and still traveling in the same direction. Michelangelo Antonioni's ambitious work has overtones of TheScapegoat, Appointment in Samarra, and, of course, Antonioni's own Blow-Up. It's provocative and artistic, but in a manner we've come to expect of Antonioni: he always takes great pains to make sure we notice his subtleties, and the film's ultimate lack of resolution will leave you feeling cheated. With Maria Schneider, who's merely a prop. **PG**

POSSE — Director-star Kirk Douglas plays an ambitious US Marshal who seeks to fuel his campaign for the US Senate by capturing a notorious outlaw (Bruce Dern). Douglas tries to make some sort of anti-fascist statement here, but the whole thing is heavy-handed, simple-minded, and patently phony: The story takes place in 1892, but US Senators weren't elected by popular vote until 1914, and the town of Tesota, Texas, looks like Disneyland after Cleanup-Paintup-Fixup Week. Give Douglas creditfor casting himself as the heavy, but that's about it. **PG**

PRISONER IN THE MIDDLE — Mideast cowboys and Indians: Israelies vs. the Palestine Liberation Army in the Jordanian desert. The story and dialog are ridiculous, but the battle scenes are surprisingly effective at conveying the sense of deadly casualness of Israeli-Arab desert skirmishes. And if you're looking for movies about the Middle East crisis, this is the only game in town. With David Janssen, Karen Dor; John O'Connor directed. **PG**

THE REINCARNATION OF PETER PROUD — The subject of reincarnation and all it implies should be a natural for the movies; this film manages to flub it. The whole thing is reduced to the level of "Maybe she was my daughter in a previous life, but she isn't now, and I want to marry her." Novelist Max Ehrlich's characters are all so dense that you'll be light years ahead of them; Michael Sarrazin (as a PhD!) doesn't even know how to work a microfilm machine. With Jennifer O'Neill, Margot Kidder; J. Lee Thompson directed. R

THE RETURN OF THE PINK PANTHER — A tiresome, unimaginative sequel to *The Pink Panther*, with Peter Sellers back as the bungling inspector Clouseau chasing a jewel thief. All the gags are predictable—people falling into pools, losing their pants, etc.—and the film has nothing else to offer; Sellers' TWA commercials are more entertaining. With Christopher Plummer; Blake Edwards directed. **G**

THE SECRET — A fascinating and provocative study of human trust and distrust. Jean-Louis Trintignant, escaping from a French prison, is taken in by a writer and his wife who live in an isolated farmhouse. He tells them he has learned a secret so dangerous that the government will kill him if he is found. Is he telling the truth, or is he a dangerous madman? The husband trusts Trintignant and extends his friendship; the wife isn't sure, and thus feeds Trintignant's paranoia. But should we trust Trintignant? Director Robert Enrico keeps us guessing to the end, thus skillfully demonstrating the flimsy underpinnings of commitments made by supposedly civilized people and institutions. With Philippe Noiret, Marlene Jobert; in French with English sub-titles. **PG**

SILENCE — Deat-mute orphan, whose foster parents are straight out of a Dial Soap commercial, gets lost in the woods, where he Learns to Love Nature. It's the sort of cloying garbage we used to read in the Saturday Evening Post, and it may well explain why the Post went under. With Ian Geer Flanders, Ellen Geer, Richard Kelton; John Korty directed. **'G**

SILENT NIGHT, EVIL NIGHT — Sort of a *Phantom of the Sorority House*, in which an unseen evil force with a voice left over from *The Exorcist* stalks a houseful of cross-section co-ed stereotypes: the house virgin, the house nympho, the house beatnik, etc. It's a haphazard, superficial, and ultimately unsatisfying job; there are so many loose ends that director Bob Clark should open a yarn shop. With Olivia Hussey, Keir Dullea, Margot Kidder, John Saxon. **R**


THE SILENT STRANGER — Life is cheap and so are the story and production values in this spaghetti Western set in Japan, 1884. With Tony Anthony; Vance Lewis directed. **PG**


SUPER VIXENS — Foolish picaresque sexual non-adventures of a clean cut young man in the Southwest. Director Russ Meyer's appeal used to be his talent at gratifying the fantasies of old fashioned tit men; now he's got something for the sado-masochism freaks, too. Meyer is to movies what *Playboy* is to magazines: Once he was way ahead of his time, porno-wise, but the world has passed him by, and his struggle to catch up is not worth our attention. **X**

TOMMY — Roger Daltrey, in the title role, is a young man with problems: he's deaf, dumb, blind, put-upon, persecuted and Christ-like. In other words, he's a typical character in a Ken Russell film. This time Russell teams up with composer Pete Townshend for a grotesque stereophonic rock opera assault on our senses that is sometimes creative and amusing but more often heavy-handed, excessive and annoying. The lyrics are downright embarrassing (e.g., "You're a hero, you're famous, you're a champion of the young/You're rich, but it's hard to explain what you've done"). With Ann-Margret, Oliver Reed, numerous guest stars. **PG**

LES VIOLONS DU BAL — Involving but incomplete story of a French-Jewish family fleeing the Nazis, and of the surviving son who, 30 years later, sets out to make a movie about the escape. In the process, he himself becomes involved in smuggling a political refugee out of France. The film-within-a-film approach—the same actors take roles in both past and present sequences—has interesting possibilities, but here it comes off mostly as a self-conscious gimmick, nor is it followed through to any conclusion. In French with English subtitles. With Jean-Louis Trintignant, Marie-Josee Nat, Michel Drach directed. **PG**

THE WIND AND THE LION — Mostly wind. This latest chapter in John Milius's Simpleminded History of American Civilization concerns a Moroccan chieftain's kidnapping of an American woman in 1904, and President Teddy Roosevelt's efforts to get her back—by force, of course. Milius peoples his broad-screen extravaganza with comic book characters: Stale, smart-aleck dialog and crazy-Arab stereotypes abound, and there's even a bad German with a monocle. Wooden performances by Sean Connery, Candice Bergen, and Brian Keith; according to the film's publicity, "The casting reflects the respect Milius has for history." PG








Dining with the Nacrellis

This month, our restaurant critics, Esther and Andy Nacrelli continue to give you a good look at the better dining spots in the Washington/Baltimore area. The restaurants are rated for quality, service, decorand price; the best possible rating is four candles

BLUES ALLEY: 1073 Wisconsin Avenue (Rear). 337-4141. Mon. thru Sat., dinner and entertainment. Major credit cards except Master Charge and Carte Blanche.



For a change of pace, we thought visiting an establishment which features both food and entertainment would be fun. Blues Alley met our specifications and passed with flying colors.

The entertainment changes regularly, featuring the top jazz performers. We considered ourselves fortunate, having selected a night when Earl "Fatha" Hines was performing. His group put on one of the finest performances of this type we've seen.

For those who have never been to Blues Alley, be sure to allow some extra time to park and locate the building. It is on an alley off Wisconsin below "M" in Georgetown. If you've ever experienced the traffic at that interesection, you can appreciate the previous statement.

The room is intimate, apparently designed for its main function, the music. Due to the size, the number of diners they are able to accommodate is limited. Reservations are a must! Tables are small and close together, as is common in a room of this type.

The menu features New Orleans cuisine and steaks. The steaks offered are a New York Strip, Filet Mignon, Top Sirloin and Sliced Sirloin. Prices range from \$5.75 to \$7.95. The New Orleans offerings are Jambalaya, Shrimp Creole, Devilled Oysters and Fried Catfish, all from \$5 to \$6.

We started our meal with a cup of Chicken Gumbo and Shrimp Remoulade. The soup was tasty but, except for okra, would be difficult to distinguish from any other Chicken Rice soup. The Shrimp Remoulade, however, was another case: boiled shrimp presented on a bed of lettuce topped with Sauce Remoulade (egg yolks, mustard, oil and vinegar, capers, herbs and anchovy paste). Outstanding!

Our main courses consisted of Devilled Oysters on the half shell and Jambalaya. The Devilled Oysters were tasty, though a bit dry. Jambalaya is a one-pot dish containing seafood, ham, rice, tomatoes and

many seasonings. The most commonly accepted source for the name is the French "Jambon" meaning ham. Some Creoles contend that a Chef named Jean originated the dish by blending good things together, "balayez" in Creole. Hence "Jean Balayez" was shortened to Jambalaya. At any rate, the dish was tasty!

The wine list had but three or four selections of red, white and rosé, but offered good quality imported wines, mostly French. We ordered a bottle of wine with our meal and sipped on it during the show.

A \$3.50 per person cover charge is added to the bill. Even with the cover we enjoyed cocktails, dinner with a fine bottle of wine for about \$20.00 per person. An inexpensive evening considering the fine quality entertainment one enjoys when visiting Blues Alley.

Marriott Hotel's food division has recently announced a policy of serving U.S.D.A. Prime, Corn Fed, Vacuum Packed rather than frozen beef. We decided to visit their S. & S. Livestock restaurant to determine if this policy would be evident to the diner.

S. & S. Livestock's dining room is large and nicely decorated, with an aura of lively activity noticeably evident. Our maître d', a young Irish gentleman, added a great deal to our enjoyment with his Irish wit and good service.

Their menu offerings are Roasted Ribs of Beef, \$6.50, with a Junior Partner's Cut, at \$3.25; Big Beef Deal, \$7.95 (extra heavy cut of prime rib of beef); Ribeye Pepper Steak, \$7.25; Tender Filet Mignon, \$7.25, and Sirloin Strip Steak, \$7.25.

Under the heading "Added Dividends" they offer Steak Teriyaki, \$6.50; Broiled Lamb Chops, \$8.50; Country Barbecue Bonanza, \$5.95 (a hearty platter of barbecued chicken and spareribs), and Butter Broiled Flounder, \$6.50.

A generous selection of Tossed Mixed Greens with a variety of toppings and dressings is available from their salad bar.

Since their wine list was limited, we sampled their red house wine and found it to be satisfactory, although they could invest in some real wine glasses.

We chose their Extra Heavy Cut of Prime

Beautiful ferns and hanging planters abound in the interesting decor of G. D. Graffitti.

The menu is a contract with the name of your party, the date of your visit and your signature; a nice souvenir to take home and frame for a game room. Under the heading "An Offer You Can't Refuse!" they list:

- 1. A visit to my Italian fruit and vegetable stand
- 2. A sample of house wine from our roving wino (the sampling is just that and a mediocre wine at that)
- 3. A choice of my delicious hot number entrées
- 4. A portion of my Italian ice to cleanse your palate
- 5. A helping of homemade Italian Bread fresh out of the oven

G. D. Graffiti's Salad & Fruit Bar is well done with a selection of colorful, in season, melons as the focal point. We especially enjoyed their pineapple cheese dressing. We might mention, the arrangement of the salad bar along with the location, creates quite a crowded situation at the entrance to the dining room.

This is definitely a family restaurant offering many interesting added features for children, so, of course, our visit included the Nacrelli children. We sampled all the dishes on their menu which include Lasagna (layers of tender noodles, ground sirloin, domestic and imported cheeses, \$4.95); Lobster, \$6.50; Prime-A-Ribs (custom cut to your specification), \$6.50; Veal Parmigiana, \$5.95; Filet for Two, \$5.95 ea.; and Italian Collection Platter (a whopping offering of Lasagna, Veal Parmigiana, and Fetuccini Noodles Alfredo, \$5.95). The few dishes offered were good with the exception of the lobster which was mediocre, at best.

Cynthia Gregory

There was a big Broadway hit in the 50s called "Will Success Spoil Rock Hunter?" and the question could be asked about any number of artists, particularly the younger ones.

With ballerina Cynthia Gregory, success, far from spoiling her, has challenged and spurred her growth as an artist and a person.

"Because of my success I'm asserting myself in my whole life, personal and professional. I've always been very dependent, the kind of person who goes along with the crowd. I used to be ashamed that dancing was my entire focus but now I'm grateful for my talent. Dance is my one big accomplishment, my one big contribution in this life and I'm happy about it."

Rudolf Nureyev has called her the best ballerina in America. A few years ago Gregory might have responded to such praise with girlish embarrassment but now her reaction is thoughtful: "There are a lot of fantastic dancers in America. I don't think you should call one **the** greatest. Different people look for different qualities in a dancer. There's room for many kinds of good dancers."

This has been a year of singular honors for Gregory, a principal with American Ballet Theater who dances with the company regularly at the Kennedy Center. She appeared as guest artist with the Ballet de Cuba last fall and was followed by screaming crowds wherever she went in Havana ("like a rock star in the States"); she also danced as guest with the Stuttgart Ballet and has been invited by the Paris Opera to dance there this fall.

"I want to do more guest appearances abroad. That's been a definite growth for me," Gregory commented.

She has a wide range as a dancer but, because of the classic purity of her style, Gregory is perhaps most completely realized in the demanding, and ultimate, dual role of Odette-Odile in "Swan Lake." Her combination of strength and sensitivity, of musicality and flexibility have made her an ideal performing instrument for a variety of ballet styles—including George Balanchine's "Theme and Variations," Antony Tudor's "Undertow" and "Dark Elegies" and Eliot Feld's "Intermezzo."

On stage the gentle Gregory is regal in bearing and stature. In fact her height is about the only problem she has as a ballerina: there are few male dancers of first rank tall enough to be her partner. In her own company she dances with Jonas Kage, Ted Kivitt and Ivan Nagy but none is quite right for her.

Nureyev is mounting a full-length version of "Raymonda" for Gregdry and Ballet Theater which opens in New York at Lincoln Center the first of this month and will be seen here at the Kennedy Center this fall. He is dancing "Raymonda" with her in New York and it will be interesting to see what effect his impetuous romantic attack has on Gregory's cool elegance.

Even though Ballet Theater clearly values her, mounting "Raymonda" and other ballets that reveal the prodigious Gregory balance, strength and swiftness, it is not easy to be an American in a company so invaded by Russian superstars—with Nureyev appearing this summer and a major press blitz for Mikhail Baryshnikov and Natalia Makarova.

"Time magazine quoted me as saying I felt helpless about the way the Russians are received," Gregory remarked. "I don't say that in bitterness. It's a romantic thing with the American public to look to foreign

stars. Naturally a defecting dancer gets more publicity and that has a lot to do with why the audience comes and what they're prepared to look for."

So the person friends have described as gentle and pliant has learned she has to value her own worth and demand the recognition she merits.

One of the reasons Gregory, who turns 29 this month, may have taken so long to learn to speak out was becaus everything came so easily to her.

"I started to dance because I came from a musical family. Music was important to me and I always danced to music around the house. That's why I dance today—I love to move to music. From the beginning all my teachers were encouraging. They told my mother I was very talented and urged me to continue. What qualities did I show? Well, I was very quick and coordinated and very musical. I was on stage from an early age. In fact," Gregory said with a laugh, "I still run into a man in California (where I grew up) who reminds me that he singled me out in a review for my stage presence when I was only six. I was dancing to a record and suddenly the needle skipped a big chunk. I found my place and picked it right up without missing a beat. I danced the Sugar Plum Fairy in 'Nutcracker' when I was 13 and they said then that I already had ballerina quality."

Even though Gregory loves to dance, her feelings toward it aren't uncomplicated. "Today is one of my hate-ballet days," she said during our interview. "When we're just rehearsing and not performing I feel that way. There are frustrations and trouble with management and aches and pains to contend with. But once I'm on stage that all becomes unimportant. I need to dance for an audience. If I didn't have an audience I wouldn't dance. Gayle Young, one of my partners, says I'm 20 pounds lighter in performance than in rehearsals. I think it's true. I'm more pulled up and I actually feel physically stronger."

The process of growth that Gregory is going through has caused a rupture in her personal life. "I've been asserting myself more in my marriage and right now Terry and I are separated." Terry Orr is also a principal dancer with Ballet Theater. Their relationship is still warm and friendly.

"We're still each other's best friends—we have been since high school. When the woman's career is moving faster than the man's there's no question it's difficult. Terry loves dance but he has a lot of other interests too. We've grown apart and we both wanted to make this separation to find out who we are and what we really want."

"I give myself ten more years of dancing at most and then I want to stop and have children. Even now, while I'm still in my twenties, dancing has gotten more difficult. I used to be able to jump out on stage without warming up but I've reached the point where I have to take care of my body—warm up carefully before I perform, have massages and go to the chiropractor."

"I went through a stage where I thought I'd stop when I was 33 but right now I'm into dance more than ever. I'm contributing and really doing my thing."

A Tribute To Elisabeth Schwarzkopf

"Schwarzkopf carried us deeper and deeper into the hearts of the composers she presented. In the intensity of communication was the distillation of all that these songs mean." (The Washington Post)

"Miss Schwarzkopf . . . gave a performance that few lieder singers could equal nowadays." (The New York Times)

These statements from reviews could well have been made anytime within the past twenty years. But in fact they were made this past April when Elisabeth Schwarzkopf sang, at age 60, recitals which concluded her farewell tour of America.

The announcement of this four-month tour was a sad one for those who have loved and followed Schwarzkopf's remarkable artistry over the years. She will not be replaced soon, if ever, on the concert stage, but she will continue to be cherished

Artists, like everyone else, are known by the company they keep. For the past 30 years Schwarzkopf has been associated with the greatest musicians of our dayconductors Karl Böhm, Karajan, Toscanini, Szell, Klemperer, Furtwängler, Giulini, Serafin, Leinsdorf; and pianists Edwin Fischer, Gieseking, Moore, Geoffrey Parsons and, now, Richter.

Born of German parents in Poznán, a town midway between Warsaw and Berlin, Schwarzkopf began her studies at the Berlin Hochschule für Musik in her teens. She was 23 when she made her operatic debut at the Berlin Civic Opera as a flower maiden in Parsifal. During the next three years she sang increasingly prominent roles with this company, and was then coached in lieder by coloratura Maria Ivogün and her husband, Michael Raucheisen-the teachers whom she describes as having laid the foundation of her technique and sense of

through the many recordings she has given

Although her European farewells will take place this summer and fall (twenty of them with Sviatoslav Richter at the piano!), and although one or two final recordings may be issued in a year or so, now seems the appropriate time for a brief (and regretted) summing-up of the achievements of one of the great musicians of our time.

In an age of specialization, Schwarzkopf has been one of only a few singers who have been truly at home in both opera and lieder. Thus, just as conductor Herbert von Karajan once described her as "possibly the best singer we have" (at the Vienna State Opera), so pianist Gerald Moore, in referring to her performances of Wolf songs, called her "the greatest interpreter of this composer among women singers."

Schwarzkopf's international reputation was achieved quickly, after the war, when she appeared as a principal singer in the Vienna State Opera's productions at the Salzburg Festival, the Lucerne Festival, Convent Garden and La Scala. These in turn led to a three-season engagement as a member of the Covent Garden Company and then to regular appearances at La

Over the years La Scala has been the scene of many of her greatest successes, in such diverse roles as Mozart's Countess, Pamina, Fiordiligi and Donna Elvira; Mélisande, the Marschallin, Mistress Ford, Liù, Elisabeth (Tannhäuser), Elsa, Marguerite (Faust), Ann Truelov (Rake's Progress) and in Orff's Trionfo di Afrodite.

As early as the Zerbinetta (a coloratura role) of her Berlin days Schwarzkopf has

had a special affinity for the operas of Richard Strauss. Her legendary Marschallin in Der Rosenkavalier, preserved in a classic film of the 1960 Salzburg Festival production, was the role she chose for both her acclaimed American operatic debut (with the San Francisco Opera in 1955) and her Metropolitan debut (1964). This role, together with her other complete recordings of Ariadne and Capriccio and excerpts from Arabella, documents a priceless Strauss singer of this or any age. In these operas, as well as in Mozart's, Schwarzkopf's qualities of vocal purity and matchless intimacy of characterization are heard to thrilling

Schwarzkopf has stated on various occasions that a singer's principal task is to communicate the meaning of the notes and words sung. It has been reported that she once practiced a single important line in Der Rosenkavalier over 100 different ways before deciding which most effectively realized the text's dramatic significance.

This kind of musical craftsmanship, when applied to her singing of lieder, helps to explain how she can make each four-minute song belong to a world all its own. The very special magic and communication which she transmits in recital remains long after one has heard and forgotten other very fine singers in the same repertoire.

This magic really cannot be adequately described or reproduced, but a great deal of it comes through in the live performances recorded on the occasion of Gerald Moore's 1967 retirement (2-Angel SB-3697). Her voice is "white" in timbre, perfect in intonation and diction in any register, with an exact placement of weight for each note of a musical phrase. These qualities are matched by a warm, ravishing vocal coloration and a perfect sense of rubato.

Perhaps the great Wagnerian soprano, Kirsten Flagstad, expressed it best after she first heard Schwarzkopf sing: "I thought I had never heard a lovelier sound coming

from a human throat."

A SELECTED DISCOGRAPHY

Among the more than 60 recordings by Schwarzkopf, an astonishing 39 are still in the domestic record catalogues. This discography represents my personal selection from these.

►BRAHMS: Deutsche Volkslieder. With Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau; Gerald Moore, piano. 2-Angel S-3675.

Forty-two superlative folk-song settings are divided between Schwarzkopf and Fischer-Dieskau, often in dialogue-fashion. All three participants mask their artistry with a perfect and natural simplicity.

MOZART: Cosi fan tutte. With Christa Ludwig, Alfredo Kraus, Giuseppe Taddei, Hanny Steffek, Walter Berry Philharmonia Orchestra and Chorus, Karl Böhm, c. 4-Angel S-3631.

I have long been happy with Schwarzkopf's mono version with Karajan, but this fine stereo performance is representative of Schwarzkopf at her best as a Mozart interpreter. Her "Come scoglio" is still a marvel of control, and the new set benefits from the Dorabella of Ludwig, whose vocal timbre in the important ensembles is an ideal complement to Schwarzkopf's Fiordiligi.

SCHUBERT: Lieder Recital. With Edwin

Fischer, piano. Angel 35022 (mono).

This classic recording, issued more than twenty years ago and continuously available since then, contains 12 of Schubert's most famous songs. For me, four of them remain definitive—"Auf dem Wasser zu singern," "Im Frühling," "Das Lied im Grünen," and "Wehmuth."

▶R. STRAUS: Ariadne auf Naxos. With Irmgard Seefried, Lisa Otto, Rita Streich, Rudolph Schock, Hermann Prey; Philharmonia Orchestra, Herbert von Karajan, c. 3-Angel 3532 (mono).

Schwarzkopf's portrayal of Ariadne contains some of the most glorious singing of her prime years. Her gripping 15-minute monologue on Side 4 is alone sufficient reason for acquiring this set quickly, before it is discontinued. With superlative pacing from Karajan throughout and a first-rate Zerbinetta in Streich, the strained Bacchus of Schock is compensated for.

▶R. STRAUSS: Der Rosenkavalier. With Christa Ludwig, Teresa Stich-Randall, Otto Edelmann, Eberhard Waechter, Nicolai Gedda; Philharmonia Orchestra and Chorus, Herbert von Karajan, c. 4-Angel S-3563.

As with **Ariadne**, there is more recent competition, but none which couples a singer with Schwarzkopf's lustrous voice and interpretative insight with the authoritative kind of direction provided by Karajan. In the great closing trio, Schwarzkopf, Stich-Randall and Ludwig achieve a timbral homogeneity by which to judge all competing recordings.

▶R. STRAUSS: Four Last Songs (coupled with the closing scene from Capriccio). With the Philharmonic Orchestra, Otto Ackermann, c. Angel 35084 (mono).

Together with **Der Rosenkavalier**, this recording of the "Four Last Songs" is the most priceless treasure of Schwarzkopf's legacy. Compared with this performance, her own more recent stereo version with Szell is (like that of Janowitz with Karajan) orchestrally phlegmatic and vocally self-conscious. In this older version, the Schwarzkopf voice effortlessly captures the magic of some of the most moving pages Strauss ever wrote. The mono sound is excellent, and I have a sealed second copy which I don't intend to open until 1990.

►WAGNER: Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg. With Otto Edelmann, Hans Hopf, Erich Kunz, Gerhard Unger. Ira Malaniuk; Bayreuth Festspiel Orchestra and Chorus, Herbert von Karajan, c. 5-Seraphim 6030 (mono).

This historic recording was made in 1951 at a live performance during the season which marked the reopening of the Bayreuth Festival after the war. The mono sound and some imperfect balances may bother some, but these factors are easily compensated for by Karajan's directness and vigor. Schwarzkopf's Eva is as youthful and spellbinding as any Walther could wish, and the Hans Sachs of Edelmann is one of that singer's great portrayals. The famous quintet towards the end of Act III is a triumphant realization.

►WOLF: **Spanisches Liederbuch.** Wtih Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau; Gerald Moore, piano. 2-DG-2707035.

►WOLF: Italienisches Liederbuch. With Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau; Gerald Moore, piano. 2-Angel S-3703.

► WOLF: **Thirteen Songs.** With Wilhelm Furtwängler, piano. Seraphim 60179 (mono).

These three recordings contain the body of Schwarzkopf's Wolf legacy currently available. The live Salzburg Festival recital with Furtwängler was derived from a tape of a radio broadcast in 1953 and it somewhat thinly preserves a very special collaboration. Furtwängler's pianism is never less than musicianly, contributing strongly to the particular success of "Epiphanias" and "Wiegenlied im Sommer." The other two recordings capture in their prime the two greatest living interpreters of Wolf in a total of 90 of his songs. Both are "must" recordings for anyone who loves the German Lied. The remainder of Schwarzkopf's Wolf songs still in the catalogues are found in her "Songbook, Vol. 2" (Angel S-36545) and in "Homage to Gerald Moore" (2-Angel S-3697). The latter set contains a live performance of the greatest of them all, "Kennst du das Land?", together with three others also not represented in the listings above.

►ELISABETH SCHWARZKOPF SINGS OP-ERETTA. Selections from operettas by Hueberger, Millöcker, Lehár and others. Philharmonia Orchestra and Chorus, Otto Ackermann, c. Angel S-35696.


Except for a complete recording of Lehár's Merry Widow, this is the current catalogue's only example of Schwarzkopf's special way with Viennese operetta. (Protests for the rerelease of her wonderful Wiener Blut, Gypsy Baron, Fledermaus and A Night in Venice may be addressed to Angel Records!) Mean-

while, every excerpt on this record is a sheer delight, from the reluctant nun of Strauss-Benatsky to the forthright post-mistress of Zeller and the naughty Lehár song "Meine Lippen, sie küssen so heiss." In this repertoire Ackermann too is very much at home.

►ELISABETH SCHWARZKOPF SONG-BOOKS, Vols. 1, 2, 3, 4. With Geoffrey Parsons (Vols. 2-4) and Gerald Moore (Vol. 1), pianists.

Of these, Vols. 3 and 4 are on EMI (ASD-2634 and 2844) and must be diligently searched for until Angel gets around to issuing them domestically. The highlights of Vol. 2 are a stupendous Schubert "Erlkönig" and as moving a Wolf "Lebe wohl" as I have ever heard. The content of all volumes is typical of the variety of Schwarzkopf's generous "Liederabends" over the past two and a half decades.

A final note: I had the unexpected and delightful opportunity to speak with Walter Legge during intervals in his wife's final Washington recital. (Legge, besides being Schwarzkopf's husband, was the founder and artistic director of the Philharmonia Concert Society and a record producer for HMV and EMI in Europe.) In addition to discussing the present European farewell recitals, Legge mentioned plans for issuing one or more survey-collections of what he and his wife consider to be her finest recordings (including some previously unreleased material). In addition, a fifth Songbook is planned and, finally, perhaps Schubert's "Die Winterreise"-which would be, to my knowledge, the first complete recording of it by a woman. Brava Schwarzkopf, and a happy, well-earned retirement!



BALTIMORE'S SUPER GRAFFITI

Man has been painting walls for thirty thousand years. It probably all began with Cro Magnon. Sitting in his cave, gnawing the bones and wearing the pelt of something he'd slain, he stared at the drab cave walls and was struck with a notion . . . He mixed ashes from the fire with some left over bone marrow and, voila, had invented paint! With 26 FORECAST!

it, Cro drew a picture on the wall of the prehistoric monster that had been his dinner. The result was so satisfying that Man has been decorating the walls of his shelters ever since with pictures and symbols of the creatures that make up his world.

A project of this kind was successfully realized in Baltimore in 1973. It is called the

Mayor's Wall Painting Project and was organized by the Department of Housing and Community Development. Robert Embry and Jay Broodie, two members of that department, sent a memo to Mayor Wm. Donald Schaeffer presenting the idea. The Mayor enthusiastically endorsed the venture. Diana Johnson and Alan Gee, also of H.C.D., found themselves in charge of turning an idea into reality. One year later, ten buildings in Baltimore boasted colorful walls decorated with huge designs painted on them by ten local artists.

Baltimore City these days offers dramatic proof of the fact that nothing is impossible, not even giving an entire city a face lift. The wall painting project is just another example of triumph over diverse riddles and adversities. For instance, what do you do when your paint begins to freeze before you get it from the brush to the wall? Or, suppose the scaffold doesn't get delivered because there is a strike and you must reach a height of two stories? Or, you set aside a month for painting what you believe will be a smooth wall surface 20 feet by 20 feet and then when the time comes you stare at an 80-foot by 20-foot expanse of rough concrete blocks? (The answers: 1) switch to oil-base paint; 2) find a truck and set a ladder in it; 3) call your wife to help.)


The National Endowment for the Arts contributed \$10,000 to the cause. Thus, H.C.D. was able to offer monetary compensation to the artists who suffered weather and less-than-tranquil working conditions during execution of their designs. Sears and Roebuck, Bruning, and Marvelite paint companies donated paint for all but one of the walls. Bob Hieronymous had special requirements for his mural which were met with supplies donated by the Reynolds Paint Company.

When it was all over, the Mayor toured the walls and was delighted by the results. Members of Housing and Community Development were also delighted, as were the artists. What about the residents of the areas brightened by the murals? According to Diana Johnson, "the most striking indication of their feelings is that none of the walls has been vandalized." Considering all things, that is a loud message of approval.

Housing and Community Development worked out a route and organized a bicycle tour of the walls. This, says Diana, is not only a great way to see the walls, but also gives a view of the city unavailable to the rushing motorist. You might plan to spend some time this way during the sweet summer days ahead.

1 - Hilton Brown

Hilton Brown recalls his wall painting experience as a "wonderful opportunity," which is sporting of him considering that he didn't care much for the sensation of working 30 feet up in the air on a shaky scaffold. That, he admits, took some getting used to! Two bus lines stop at the corner of North and Park Avenues, so he had people watching him at all times. As the harlequin pattern of reds, yellows and purples appeared on the wall it was not immediately obvious that, in addition to being a good design, it "said something." The watchers had few comments. Finally the word "Baltimore" became discernible and everyone smiled at everyone else.



2-Donald Duncan


The intricacy of Donald Duncan's design is worth studying at leisure. To do this, I suggest you join the creeping serpent of evening rush hour traffic heading north on Fallsway. Then you have a full view of this clever design for maybe 10 or 15 minutes (or longer if someone up ahead is obliging enough to have an accident). An enthusiast about the new and growing field of industrial graphics, Mr. Duncan feels that "abstract geometric design conforms to the urban environment." Certainly his overlapping geometric shapes, in yellows, oranges and blue-greys, capture the feeling of the criss-crossing motion of a busy city as seen by the starlings chittering along roof edges.

3—Daniel Williams

When Daniel Williams' blue and green "trees" sprouted at the edge of an empty lot, they set off a chain reaction of environmental changes in the immediate vicinity. Today, the empty lot is a well-equipped playground in which an eye-catching log jungle gym is an architectural complement to the mural's mood. Facades of the row houses in the adjoining street have been painted bright pastel shades and there are a good number of flower boxes around. Although this wall didn't take long to paint, its effect is not only lasting but expanding.






4-Ellen Rosenbush

Fighting high winds, Ellen Rosenbush "pounced" her design to the wall, which is how Michelangelo transferred his design to the ceiling of the Cistine Chapel. Neighborhood kids helped hold the large paper pattern. They also helped prime the wall, using the extra brushes Ellen brought along for them to use. In addition, they pulled grass and weeds at the foot of "their" wall and cleaned up the lot the wall faces. Community interest in the painting project spread to the adults. Some of them asked Ellen to come paint their homes psychedelic too. She would probably be willing to tackle the whole town, since she says she's always liked decorating walls, ever since she got her first box of crayons!





5-Bill Schmidt

Bill Schmidt's lovely blue and green window-like design catches the eye of the visitor entering Baltimore from the west along Route 40. It seems particularly appropriate in this area of the city, which has been so vastly opened up and rejuventated in the last few years. To escape the afternoon summer sun slamming onto the wall, Bill began work early in the morning and stopped around noon, except when he got so carried away that he forgot to stop. He says that at first people were suspicious of the project. "They couldn't get used to the idea that it wasn't a gimmick or an advertisement; that it was simply a decoration to make things look nicer."

6-Stephen Loos

The south wall of the maintenance building in Patterson Park is 80 feet long. More than one pair of hands was needed to cover that expanse with paint in the alloted time, so Mrs. Loos set to work with her husband. Together they scrubbed oceans of red, yellow, and orange paint into the porous cement block wall. The result is striking. You can view this daisy fringed sunset (sunrise) from a great distance and generally through a frame of graceful trees, since the building sits at the top of a hill, facing Baltimore Street. Thanks to Mr. Loos, the sun also rises in Patterson Park.

7-Wayne Cambern

Prior to painting the whole side of a three-story building Wayne Cambern's largest works were 30- by 40-inch silk screen prints. However, a good design is good no matter what size you make it, as his bold zigzags attest. The wall's location is good since it gives motorists northbound on Calvert Street a long peek at the mural. Because the wall had been recently resurfaced, Mr. Cambern was able to apply the paint with rollers and thus completed the project in just one week.

8—Nancy Thurlow

In the case of Nancy Thurlow's design I especially wish these photographs were in color. After traversing the canyons of Baltimore's red brick row house world, the interplay of vivid reds on this wall is an exclamation point in color. Nancy has gone off to Europe or somewhere, so I couldn't ask her if she had planned her mural as an accent to the architecture. Her design gives a feeling of height greater than the three-story wall and is also a clever contrast to the long flat mood of the row-house lined streets.

9—Robert Johnson


Since Robert Johnson's mural clearly depicts two dancing Mexicans, one's first reaction to it is wonder at the relation between the design and the building it adorns, i.e., the Afro Building. Pondering this, you take off in flights of philosophical fancy into realms of intercultural harmony, through mazes of bureaucratic whimsey, and back to wonder. Mr. Johnson, please explain! The painting's earth hues are set off by a stark white background and blend well with the surrounding structures.


10-Robert Hieronymous


"The Bicentennial Mural," says Robert Hieronymous, "is the story of America as a force in the consciousness of world evolution." He says this in a 20-page booklet he's written about his design (America's Bicentennial Mural Guide Book, published by Savitriaum, 2405 Ruscombe Lane, Baltimore, Md. 21209). Although the detailed description of all the symbolism hidden behind each component of the painting certainly adds to one's appreciation of the work, it conveys messages needing no elaboration to the casual observer. This mural is clearly a celebration of Baltimore, past and present, and belongs to every one of the city's citizens. Executed by an experienced craftsman in the art of mural design, the Bicentennial Mural immediately explains Hieronymous' growing reputation as one of this country's outstanding muralists.

One good idea deserves another. Thinking along the lines of Atlanta's version of a wall painting project, the Housing and Community Development department plans to undertake Baltimore's second wall painting project in the near future. Pending support from the National Endowment for the Arts, they hope this time to decorate the walls of some of the city's skyscrapers. Again, they would select from local artists' designs, but professional sign painters would do the actual painting.

A bright future is dawning for Baltimore. Don't miss sharing in the excitement; keep your eye on the walls!







Entertainment Washington Revives Radio



Gail Condrick and Steve Brooks engage Washington Post theater critic Richard Coe in conversation about the metropolitan area entertainment scene.

In the early days of commercial radio broadcasting listeners heard the drone of saxophones and the deep-throated announcer proclaim, "From the Skyroom of the Hotel So-and-So it's Dinner With the Stars. . . ." During the late thirties and forties there were many variety and interview-type programs issuing from posh niteries in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. There was the tinkle of glassware ... and the far-off hum of other diners as announcers like Andre Baruch ran the latest bevy of movie starlets through their paces on the local and network airwaves. These shows were popular right up until their demise when television took hold.

Early in June, ENTERTAINMENT WASH-INGTON took to the airwaves over Radio

It was vintage radio all over again....

Stations WAVA-AM & FM. It was vintage radio all over again . . . from the musical program intro . . . to the tinkling glasses and ripple of voices of this exciting new celebrity interview program.

This 1975 version of a very successful radio format was brought alive by Washington broadcast veteran Steve Brooks because of a seventeen year desire to get away from the time and temperature, jingles, contests and weather reports of to-

day's radio broadcasting. "When I was a youngster in the 1940's I dreamt of someday going into radio broadcasting," said Brooks, "but by the time I had accomplished my goal . . . radio had for the most part become a time and temperature service for persons who weren't even paying attention."

The weekly show, which is co-hosted by Gail Condrick, is a live interview program focusing on the performing arts in the Washington-Baltimore metropolitan areas. The show covers the whole spectrum of musical comedy, drama, ballet, opera, dinner theater, jazz, symphony, comedy and solo performance through stimulating conversation with some of the outstanding personalities and contributors in each of these fields.

While the show's aims might seem to be a bit lofty and appear to have the ingredients for very "in" or clique "reparte", the program itself is very down to earth. Already it has accomplished its objectives of exposing people of all ages and background to the multiple aspects of the performing arts, providing understanding and appreciation of the role of the performing arts in community life. And ENTERTAINMENT WASHINGTON did it through a fast-moving, fun-filled hour of celebrity-filled interviews.

The premier performance on June 2nd, opened with actor-comedian Sam Levene, Washington Post theater critic Richard Coe, Mosby Dinner Theater producer Frank Johns and George Washington University

drama professor Thomas Scanlan. Cohosts Brooks and Condrick led their guests through their paces with ease and the audience reaction was nothing short of overwhelming.

An essential element of the show's appeal is that its kaleidoscope of entertainment does not take place in the sterile, straight-jacket of a broadcast studio, but in the VANTAGE POINT RESTAURANT of the Ramada Inn-Rosslyn, 20 floors above the Nation's Capital. Here both the stars and the dining audience relax before a sweeping panorama of Washington's Potomac shoreline complete with historic monuments, cathedral towers, and the twinkling

lights of Georgetown. Diners at this delightful restaurant are treated to the show-business atmosphere of radio in days-gone-by . . . and the WAVA listener gets an unequaled opportunity to visit with his favorite entertainer and to keep up with the burgeoning Washington entertainment scene

Arthur W. Arundel and WAVA AM & FM are to be saluted for their continuing role as daring pioneers of broadcasting in the Nation's Capital. Interrupting his successful news format to bring interesting and locally produced talk shows to the airwaves is something that very few of the area stations would be willing to chance.

ENTERTAINMENT WASHINGTON is indeed entertaining . . . and indeed Washington . . . and this reviewer recommend it highly. It's broadcast every Monday evening from 6:30 to 7:30 pm.

Jane Alexander Funky and Elegant



"You call up certain emotions and then they tend to invade your personal life for a while."

Onstage, in funky elegant 1940 clothes she's super-sophisticated Jane Alexander, playing broad farce with Douglas Fairbanks, Jr.—turning her head slightly in mock boredom or putting her long slim hands in front of her face in scene-after-scene stealing gestures.

Offstage, in funky 1975 clothes, brushing out her long brown hair, or sipping from a plastic glass of Dubonnet on the rocks, she's charming-chic Jane Alexander, the actress who along with James Earl Jones took an Arena Stage production to Broadway and received a Tony award for her efforts

Ms. Alexander is an actress who decided early in life that the theater was for her. She'd gone to college to major in mathematics, but somewhere along the higher phases of the course decided numbers weren't for her and instead worked for and received a theater arts degree. The lure of the high school, college, and community productions in which she had played was too much and after graduation she went on to theater in Boston and New York. Then, she came to Washington to take a residency with D.C.'s Arena Stage under the guidance of Zelda Fichandler.

There, after a series of good parts in good plays—"St. Joan," "The Crucible," "The Three Sisters," and "Sgt. Musgrave's Dance," 30 FORECAST!

she was cast as the co-star to Jones in "The Great White Hope."

"Hope" was the paydirt for Ms. Alexander. The show went on to Broadway and picked up several prizes including the coveted Pulitzer for best play. In the process Ms. Alexander won a Tony and a Theatre World award for her portrayal of the white girl-friend of the black heavyweight fighter.

Ms. Alexander repeated her performance in the film version of the play and received an Academy Award nomination for her first starring role. Since then the actress has picked up two more Tony nominations for the comedy-drama "6 Rms Riv Vu" and the heavier, "Find Your Way Home."

The future looks just as bright as the past and present for her. She's been signed to play the role of Eleanor Roosevelt in a two-part TV production of the Eleanor and Franklin books for ABC-TV. In it, she'll age from 18 to 61 and Ms. Alexander is looking excitedly towards playing the former first lady.

"Being in Washington is a boon," she says about her two-month Eisenhower Theatre stay in "Present Laughter." "Here I can get to meet people who knew Mrs. Roosevelt and they're able to tell me little things about her so that I can play her better. I spoke to her granddaughter who told me that Mrs. Roosevelt never wore

makeup—except for a little light nailpolish

woman. And, I'm going to meet Grace Tully for luncheon—she was Mrs. Roosevelt's secretary before she went to work for the President. All these things influence the way I'll play her."

She pauses as she removes her makeup and laughs. "Then, after the Eleanor TV show I get to play a nun in "Bledsoe" with Richard Boone. It's quite a contrast!"

"It's a heavy schedule for a while and in the midst of it, Ed, my husband, (Edward Shearin who directed her in "The Great White Hope") will direct Tennessee William's "Red Devil Battery Sign." I won't be able to get to see the opening night, but that's something that goes along with the job of acting," she says reflectively. "When two people are in the theater you've got to be understanding."

Ms. Alexander takes a few minutes prior to a performance, while putting on her makeup, in order to "get up" for the part. "You don't have to 'psych' yourself in this kind of a comedy—Douglas sets the pace—but, in heavier dramas I work at it." Then, after the curtain calls, she'll usually wind down with a glass of wine. Sometimes, though, for the run of a play she says she finds that she's affected by the character she's playing. "You call up certain emotions and then they tend to invade your personal life for a while."

But, a house, an hour's drive away from New York, four children from her's and Sherin's previous marriages, gardening, tennis, and birdwatching relax the actress.

Ms. Alexander is happy about the long engagement she's had at Kennedy Center—her eleven-year-old son who lives with her ex-husband is in Washington and the stay gave her the maximum opportunities to see her child.

Her face lights up when she speaks of the boy. "It wasn't by choice that he lives with his father," she says and then adds, thoughtfully, "Katherine Hepburn once said actresses shouldn't have children because they tend to move around so much. I don't know," but then she tells how she picked up her son after school and went off with him for the afternoons.

She has definite ideas about parts she'd like to play. One of these is Ibsen's "Master Builder," and as she speaks of the play and how "maybe I could talk to Zelda about doing it at Arena" she launches into not so much an attack on foreign actresses but a defense of American actresses.

"When people like Liv Ullman or Glenda Jackson come in and do a play, they come in with the whole production. It's already set up. And this only perpetuates the vicious cycle that American actresses can't do the classics. That's wrong—what it is is that they're not given a chance to be able to do them. There are a lot of good actresses here on Broadway."

She speaks about the parts in the Shake-speare Theatre in Connecticut. "It's a big old barn and you have to sacrifice subtleties in it. You can't modulate your voice—you actually have to bellow," she says, although one can't imagine Jane Alexander actually shouting "Major Barbara" or "Mourning Becomes Electra."

About lines from plays—Ms. Alexander can't recite any of the roles she's played in the past—she tends to forget the lines once she's through with a part.

"Sometimes you'll hear an actor like Sir Laurence Olivier recite whole passages from his former plays and I feel strange . . . and if someone asks me about a particular part in a play and the lines I said it sometimes becomes embarrassing." She laughs and waves her hand. "It's like I was in college and I used to cram for the exams and then forget everything the next day. I just don't retain it."

The 1940 makeup is creamed off now . . . the wig taken away, and the padded shoulder full-sleeved dresses hung on their hangers. They've been replaced by a light touch of lipstick, long brown wavy hair and a casual pants and top outfit. She takes a last sip from her half-full glass of wine. "It's a heavy schedule," she repeats, "but I had the whole winter off. I'm ready for it."

On June 18th, 1945, the city of Washington turned out to welcome Supreme Allied Commander Dwight D. Eisenhower home from Europe. The excitement of that day thirty years ago will be revived when WAMU presents a two hour special broadcast-as originally heard on CBS and NBC—on Sun., July 6th, at 5:00 pm.

The final in the series of five Bicentennial Forums will be heard Sun., July 13th at 8:30 pm. The speaker will be former New York City Mayor John Lindsay speaking on "Cities in America's Third Century." Following Lindsay's address, listeners are invited to call-in their comments and questions during a period of nation-wide access to the program.

On Sun., July 20th at 5:30 pm, WAMU will present the first in a series of 52 programs devoted to the fifty states and the District of Columbia. "The States of the Union" will continue through July 4th, 1976.

Also, on Sun., July 20th at 7:00 pm, WAMU presents an encore performance of John Hickman's "An Evening with William N. Robson." JASCHA HEIFETZ

by h. donald spatz

Another multi-album record set of uncommon interest is now available. This, a massive Retrospective in six volumes brought out by RCA covering the period from 1917 to 1955 and including everything Jascha Heifetz ever played in a recording studio. A non-stereo project, it is nevertheless allencompassing, a veritable gold mine of staggering proportions, a treasure trove of Heifetz artistry.

Joseph Wechsberg, who has written a superb "Appreciation" for this set of records states that the word "Heifetz" is of Hebrew origin and means "jewel." Other sources differ. "Heifetz" may be an English corruption of "Hefetz" (pronounced with a gutteral H) meaning "wish, desire, object, belonging." No matter. Whichever is correct, Jascha Heifetz, the violinist, fulfills the meaning. A jewel he most certainly is, a priceless, polished diamond. And he has had the wish and desire; he belongs to the immortals.

On this past February 2, 1975, the great violinist celebrated his 74th birthday. Perched in his home, high atop one of the Beverly Hills in California, he could look back over a span of 71 years of making music with his fiddle. He was a mere three when he first played a quarter-size violin in his native Vilna, in Russia. He made his first public appearance at seven. After study with the celebrated Leopold Auer in St. Petersburg, he came with his family to the United States, and on October 27 in 1917, at the age of sixteen, his career took off like a meteor. For his debut on these shores, he elected to play the Vitali Chaconne, accompanied by the Carnegie Hall organ, and those who remember label the reception an absolute tumult. The demonstration has rarely been equalled in our concert halls, and one result was that Heifetz made no less than thirty appearances in New York that same season.

Heifetz has not stopped playing since, though unfortunately, except for a one-hour television special several years ago (can anyone who saw it, forget it?), not in public. His performing, these days, is confined to daily practice sessions, evenings spent making chamber music with friends (among them, Piatigorsky) and working with his students. He continues a moderate teaching schedule, which he enjoys immensely, and spends the rest of his time driving fast cars, sailing, fishing, playing golf, tennis and ping pong.

We must be grateful that while his fame was worldwide, he found so much time to visit the recording studios. This gargantuan discography of all his authorized published recordings runs from A to W. From Joseph Achron (Stimmung, among others) to Wieniawski (the D Minor Concerto, to name one). It includes solo pieces, ensemble works, chamber music, and of course concerti, accompanied by every orchestra you can think of under the baton of every conductor you can name, plus a bundle you have forgotten. Somewhere in these hours of music, you will find the Berceuse from Jocelyn, pressed in 1945, with Bing Crosby as the vocal soloist.

Oddly enough, though Heifetz criss-crossed the world, enchanting audiences with his "Dolphin" Stradivarius of 1714, or his "David" del Gesu Guarnerius of 1742, he seems to have paid scant, if any, attention to Baltimore. My own files, which admittedly are far from complete, list no local appearances at all, even during those years when we were awash with fiddlers: Kreisler, Erica Morini, Mischa Elman, Francescatti, Milstein, Efrem Zimbalist, Tossy Spivakovski, Szigeti, Isaac Stern, and such.

Though I never heard Heifetz in Baltimore, I journeyed to Washington on November 11, 1942, for my first exposure to his wizardry in these parts. The National Symphony was playing in Constitution Hall under Hans Kindler, whose talents numbered a knack for building fascinating programs. On this occasion, Kindler scheduled a Brahms overture, the First Symphony of the 18th century British composer, William Boyce, and excerpts from Boris Godounov, using these to frame two performances by Heifetz, the first, a Mozart concerto (D Major) and the other, Prokofiev's Second Concerto. The Mozart, say my notes, was merely superb; the Prokofiev brought forth blinding technique and left the assembled multitude in a state of shock.

On another occasion, while in New York for a series of concerts and opera performances, I went to Carnegie Hall to hear Heifetz with the Philharmonic-Symphony Society (as it was then called). This was in 1945, on January 12, and Arthur Rodzinski was on the podium for a program that began with Douglas Moore's In Memorium, continued with the Rachmaninoff Second Symphony, and ended after intermission with the majestic Beethoven D Major Violin Concerto. What an evening!

No extended writing on Jascha Heifetz can avoid mentioning the artist's permanent glacial facade. I remember the evening just referred to. From the moment he strode onstage till the last notes of the rondo-finale faded away in the hall, his icy expression never changed. This has always been a characteristic of Heifetz, and the total absence of facial warmth, or indeed any other outward expression of emotion, has caused some hearers to believe that his playing is similarly devoid of heartfelt foundation. Impeccable intonation, yes; innate rhythm and timing, of course; fleet fingers and faultless techniques, to be sure; but emotion — no!

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RECORDS IN REVIEW 1974 Edition: High Fidelity Magazine. New York, Charles Scribner's Sons. 1975. \$9.95 Reviewed by Robert

This is the nineteenth annual such book, a compilation of all classical and semiclassical record reviews appearing in High Fidelity magazine during the year 1973, with complete information as to the form in which the performances are available: records, open reel tapes, cartridge or cassette. The reviewers generally are distinguished and authoritative, including Paul Henry Lang, Dale Harris, David Hamilton, Alfred Frankenstein, Robert C. Marsh and Royal S. Brown.

The reviews are organized alphabetically by composer with a separate section at the end for miscellaneous discs and collections, and there's a handy Artists' Index that includes all performers either reviewed or mentioned. As all major releases are reviewed in High Fidelity this is a convenient way to keep track of what came out and when. Of the reviews I enjoyed particularly are the searching opera comments by Dale Harris and David Hamilton; they are indeed experts in this field and go into great detail, making comparisons with competing recordings. Quite often I disagree with the opinions of the reviewers, usually more in the area of sound quality than in interpretive ideas. For example, RCA's Norma with Caballé must be one of the worst technical jobs of recent years, but Andrew Porter finds the sound to be "big and bright and full . . . there is plenty of space" Still, Records in Review remains a remarkable anthology of record releases with critical comment and is well worth owning.

THE COMPLEAT DISCOGRAPHER

REVISIONS AND UPDATINGS

Beethoven: Symphony #3, Vienna Philhar-monic Orchestra, Pierre Monteux, c., Stereo Treasury STS 15190, \$3.49.

Beethoven: Symphony #7, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Colin Davis, c., Angel 37027, \$6.98.

Tchaikovsky: Sleeping Beauty, London Symphony Orchestra, Andre Previn, c., Angel SCX 3812, \$22.94.

Once again it's time to pause and peruse pastpieces for changes of heart, mind and the Schwann Catalog. While nothing is forever and a lot of it only lasts until next week, there have been astonishingly few changes in the last year.

Happiness is the reissue of Pierre Monteux's recording of the Eroica with the Vienna Philharmonic. And while ecstasy would be a reissue of the same conductor's version with the Concertgebouw, this one is one of the nicest ever made. It is a very straight forward, un-mannered reading, glowingly played and beautifully recorded. Through the topsy-turvy economics of the record business it is the least expensive Eroica in print. It handily displaces the Munch recording and seriously challanges

The same, or very similar things, can be said of Colin Davis' recording of the Beethoven Seventh. This too is not a new issue (though Angel is asking full price). Judging from what so far has been issued of Mr. Davis' present Beethoven cycle on Philips, the older EMI version of the Seventh will remain preferable to any replacement, and it moves to the front of the available ver-

A last note anent Beethoven Symphonies; there is a cycle promised from Sir Georg Solti and the Chicago Symphony. To date only the Ninth has been released and while I have said unkind things about it, I still have high expectations for the rest of the series.

It is amazing how a passing fancy can grab you. While I still enjoy Pierre Boulez' recording of Bartok's Concerto for Orchestra, I am astonished that I waxed so enthusiastic about it. Looking back, to have merely said the Fritz Reiner recording (at half the price) is outstanding considerably understated its merits. As noted then, there are a great many excellent recordings of the Concerto. But the odds of Reiner's ever being seriously supplanted are small if not

André Previn is recording the major Tchaikovsky ballets. To date Nutcracker and Sleeping Beauty are available. While Nutcracker doesn't replace Dorati's, the Sleeping Beauty is magnificently performed and recorded. It is not nearly as expensive as Ansermet and a hell of a lot better than George Weldon.

There is currently a rumor that Deutsche Grammophon may issue some of their "Privilege" series of recordings in the United States. In Europe one of the items in this series is Eugene Mravinsky's recording of the last three Tchaikovsky Symphonies with the Leningrad Philharmonic. Should these be issued in the United States, all previous recommendations would be out the window.

I cannot close without noting that Leonard Bernstein has re-recorded the Mahler Second. It is more restrained than his earlier version. Personally, as some of you may recall (!), I rather like the lack of restraint in his earlier recording. This, of course, may not be to everyone's taste.

And finally, Herbert von Karajan has re-rerecorded Beethoven's Mass in D Major. Though the sound steadily gets better, the soloists steadily get worse and Mr. von Karajan remains the same. If only the best parts of all three could be combined!

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

HAVING YOUR CAKE AND EATING IT TOO!

It is not often that we say much in these pages about record playing systems but every once and a while one attracts our attention as being outstanding from the performance or design standpoint. In our opinion, the BIC 960 and 980 programmable turntables are worthy of mention. The thing that makes the BIC units unique is that they combine the best features of the manual single play turntable with the convenience of the record changer. Both units are belt driven which is unusual for a system which offers the feature of a changer.

The 960 and 980 are identical except that the 980 includes an electronic system for

maintaining and controlling speed, while the 960 is synchronized to the power line frequency. I would say that, unless one must have extremely precise speed or needs the feature of adjustable speed, such as for setting to the pitch of musical instruments, the electronic speed control of the 980 is an unnecessary embellishment.

The electronic speed control feature is certainly not without its drawbacks in terms of original cost and potential future servicing requirements associated with the greater complexity involved.

Both the 960 and 980 use the same motor, a 24 pole synchronous 300 rpm unit which boasts very low noise and vibrations. The fact that the motor runs at 300 rpm, rather than the 1800 rpm of the usual 4 pole motor, accounts to some extent for its low noise output and also enables the use of a simple belt drive system to turn the platter. Most other record systems which include a record changing feature use high speed motors and an idler wheel to drive the platter. Such idler wheels and their associated bearings are notorious for causing problems of wow and rumble, especi-




BIC Model 980

ally after they have been in service for a few years and wear has occurred. Thus the belt drive system, used on the new BIC turntables and the direct drive DC motor employed on some of the finest single play units, have both been great steps forward in better record reproduction,

An interesting and worthwhile feature of the BIC 960 and 980 is the programming option. This is controlled by a level calibrated from 1 to 6 which allows the playing of up to six records, when the changer spindle is installed, or playing a single record up to six times, after which time the unit will shut off. The turntables can also be operated in a manual mode either with or without employing the cueing lever, which is another feature of these fine BIC turntables.

Incidently, the rate at which the arm is dropped by the action of the cueing lever, is adjustable. This is an unusual feature as most turntables provide only factory set rates. Other adjustments provided on the 960 and 980 include: stylus angle, antiskating, stylus overhang, and, of course, stylus force. BIC claims that the accuracy of the force adjustment is within 0.1 gram and that this is maintained over six records when the unit is being used as a changer. All in all, the BIC 960 and 980 appear to offer a minimum compromise approach to achieving record changer convenience. The design appears quite simple and reliable,

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much less complex than most changers normally encountered. Apparently BIC has come up with what many of us have been looking for, practically since the dawn of hifi.

AN ALL FORMAT FOUR-CHANNEL RECEIVER

Other products which have caught my eye because of their versatility and generally good performance are the top-of-line four-channel receivers from Sansui. The QRX 6001 and the QRX 7001 are identical except in power output. The 7001 provides 35 watts per channel into 8 ohms with a total harmonic destortion of less than 0.4 percent. This is enough power for all but the most demanding home applications.

The attribute which, in my mind, makes these two Sansui receivers outstanding is their versatility. Many four-channel receivers include only SQ or only CD 4 with provisions for plugging in a separate box to provide the missing formats. Some boast CD-4 plus matrix but the matrix circuitry is of the simplest variety. The QRX 7001 and 6001, on the other hand include CD-4, QS sometimes called Regular Matrix, and SQ which is the matrix system for which the majority of quadriphonic records have been issued. The QS decoding system employs Sansui's "Vario Matrix" system which I first heard demonstrated at the 1974 Consumer Electronics Show in Chicago. At that time, I was impressed by the ability of the "Vario Matrix" system to approach true discrete four-channel source material. In the Sansui receivers, the "Vario Matrix" circuit is not only used in decoding QS material but is also employed in processing SQ and in synthesizing stereo program material into "quad-like" sound.


As I am convinced that discrete four-channel will ultimately win out over all of the other less versatile systems, any quadriphonic receiver which I would buy must include CD-4. On the other hand, at present, the selection of record titles available definitely favors the SQ matrix system promoted by Columbia Records. Thus, it is a good idea to have adequate provisions available to play these records. The Sansui receivers have all of this as well as provision for two 4-channel tape machines and the usual coverage of FM, FM stereo and AM.


Generally, I am very happy with the Sansui QRX 7001 which I recently purchased from Audio Associates.

It's nice to have four-channel sound in my home and not just write about it.

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MUSICAL ODDITIES

The Bermuda Triangle Takes A Twist

(Note: In the third issue ago but two, Dr. Wade Fiscus, noted musicological graduate of the Juilliard School of Music, Queens Annex, became intrigued with the activities of a strange death-dealing percussion instrument known as "the Bermuda Triangle." After personally being on the scene when the Capetown (S.D.) Symphony percussionist disappeared in midconcert, Fiscus immediately left for Bermuda to gather background material on the triangle. In the second issue ago but one, he arrived on that island and was in the process of interviewing native historian Ogunbiji Foster when the telephone rang and Foster promptly vanished. It is at this point that Dr. Fiscus' narrative continues.—Ed.)

"Good Lord," I articulated. "Has the Bermuda Triangle struck again?"

As I spoke, I stared at the spot where, just a few brief seconds ago, Foster had stood. Now there was nothing save a thin wisp of steam and two small shreds of paper funneling their way through the air toward the rug. Impervious to personal danger, I rushed to the spot just as the papers hit the floor. One of them, which I discarded immediately, read "Inspected by No. 9." The other carried the cryptic message, "O X O X O X O X."

What did it mean? Was it a clue to the Bermuda Triangle's whereabouts? As I pondered, the telephone rang again. It was my editor. "Remember that July is the month we're dedicating to women," he or she said. "So I'd appreciate it if you could devote your Musical Oddities column to some woman composer, conductor, etcetera. Or perhaps I should say, etceteress."

"But I'm busy tracking down the Bermuda Triangle mystery," I protested. "The longer I delay, the more musicians will meet terrible fates."

"We've all got to go sometime," he or she replied. "Now get me an article on women or I'll have to take repressive measures."

"Very well," I said, knowing full well that an unkind word from him or her at the upcoming Musical Editors and Metallurgists Convention could ruin my career. (Perhaps I should explain that the two groups discovered they could save money on hall rental and chicken salad if they combined their names and held their annual meeting together. The arrangement worked out well for five years, until 1973, when one metallurgist read a technical paper entitled "Why I like Copper" which lasted three hours and culminated in a riot. Since then, technical papers and research articles have been limited to nine words each.)

Seeking to placate my editor, I said, "I've been saving an article for just such an

occasion. Last month ago but one week I ran into a noted author who has proven beyond the shadow of a doubt that Beethoven was a woman."

"Is that all?" my editor said, the tone of his or her voice distinctly bored.

"All?" I replied. "Is not that a revelation of the first order?"

"I don't know. Somehow it just doesn't grab me. See what else you can come up with.' The rest of the day went by in a whirl. On the one hand, I tried furiously to contact someone who could help me with my musical needs. When I was not on the telephone or at the archives for that purpose I continued to pursue the Bermuda Triangle Mystery. After studying the "O X O X O X OXOXOX" message for many minutes, I finally decided to turn the matter over to an expert cryptologist. There were three listed in the Bermuda yellow pages. The first, a small dapper man dressed in a chameleon-colored suit, said: "It looks like a game of horizontal tic-tac-toe. Instead of playing by the usual up-and-down and diagonal methods, the horizontal players take turns in a straight line."

"But how does one ever win?" I asked.

"By persistence and grim determination," he said. "Horizontal tic-tac-toe games have gone on for decades before one player cracked. It's not for the weak in spirit." Thanking the man, I left. Somehow, however, I felt the message had been misinterpreted. Foster did not seem the game type. A second cryptologist informed me the note was a reminder to himself by a cattle buyer. "He decided to buy an ox," he explained. "Then a bit later, he decided to buy another, then another, etcetera."

"Why not just write a number in front of the word 'ox,' though?"

"Don't be silly," the cryptologist said.

In the meantime, I discovered a musical tidbit about a woman, so I telephoned my editor. "What would you think about this story, which my contact tells me is true?" I said. "Someone has discovered that the Dead Sea Scrolls are really words to an opera, written six thousand years ago by a one-armed, left-handed woman named Irma. The music has been found, deemed authentic, and predicts every Hit Parade winning song from 1935 to 1951."

"I don't know," the editor said. "Give me a call when you get something really exciting."

I hung up, depressed, but my mood evaporated shortly after I entered the shop of the third Bermuda cryptologist. After glancing at the series of O's and X's, he blanched.

Leopold Stokowski continues his illustrious recording career with two new discs on RCA, Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 in E Flat, Op. 55 "Eroica" (ARL1-0600) and a Bach collection (ARL1-0880), both made with the London Symphony Orchestra.*

Under his new contract with RGA Stokowski has already recorded a magnificent Dvorak Symphony No. 9 (ARL2-0334) and a disappointing, truncated Tchaikovsky Pathetique (ARL1-0426). The two latest discs fall somewhere between the two.

It is amazing that during his half-century plus of appearing before the microphones Stokowski has never before recorded the Eroica. Now, in his nineties, he has a rather placid, undynamic approach to the source, remarkably free from mannerism, but some distance removed from the grandeur of competing versions by Bohm, Karajan and many other conductors. Beethoven's Coriolanus Overture fills out the second side in a perfunctory performance that misses much of the drama of this powerful work.

The Bach collection consists primarily of shorter pieces, all in the Maestro's rich transcriptions, most of which are available in earlier Stokowski recordings. While these are often very lovely, they do not have the drama and impact of the larger scale transcriptions, some of which can be heard on Stokowski's incredible recent London Phase Four LP with the Czech Philharmonic (SPC 21096). The reproduction on both of the new RCA discs is close-up and resonant. These two new LPs add little to the lustre of

Stokowski's recorded repertory. Still to come from RCA is another new Stokowski recording, Mahler's Resurrection Symphony.

MENDELSSOHN: Piano Concerto No. 1 in G Minor, Op. 25; Piano Concerto No. 2 in D Minor, Op. 40; Murray Perahia, pianist, with the Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Neville Marriner c. COLUMBIA M 33207, \$6.98.

This is Perahia's first concerto recording and he again displays the qualities that have made him one of the most acclaimed of younger pianists. He searches underneath the surface brilliance of the two Mendelssohn concertos, reveling in the beauties of the two slow movements and yet displaying remarkable virtuosity. The accompaniments are excellent, but I found the reproduction not up to today's highest standards, with a piano so far back that it is sometimes almost subdued by the orchestra. The quite old Rudolf Serkin-Eugene Ormandy recording on Columbia of both concertos has a dazzling, if superficial brilliance, with sonics that are excellent.

I prefer Serkin to the Perahia even if only for the better balance between soloist and orchestra.

HINDEMITH: Mathis der Maler. STRAUSS: Death and Transfiguration, Op. 24; London Symphony Orchestra, Jascha Horenstein, c. NONESUCH H 71307, \$3.96.

There is extraordinary value here as this budget-priced LP contains the last two commercial recordings of the esteemed late conductor, recorded in 1970 and 1972. It is sad that this fine conductor, who specialized in Mahler and Bruckner, had so little opportunity to record their music. Horenstein offers transcendent readings of the music on this LP, with a particularly glowing account of Mathis der Maler. The engineering on this disc is generally good, although a bit too close-up for me, and with some balances that are out of perspective.

RAVEL: Piano Concerto in G; Concerto in D for the Left Hand. FAURE: Fantasy for Piano and Orchestra, Op. 111; Alicia de Larrocha, pianist, with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, Lawrence Foster and Rafael Fruhbeck de Burgos, c. (in the Faure). London CS 6878, \$6.98.

Elegant performances by the diminutive but powerful Spanish lady, who has all that it takes to play the two difficult Ravel concertos and make them sound easy.

Lawrence Foster is to be commended for his pinpointing of orchestral detail, particularly in the finale of the G major concerto. The inclusion of the Faure is an added bonus as this is an evocative, inventive miniature not available elsewhere on recordings. London's sound is rich and full, but I found the results more satisfactory by boosting the treble a bit.



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
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Jazz Unlimited

Richard Reiter is a 28-year-old reed player and leader of a group called Fusion. Fusion has played enough places that some of you may have seen the group and Mr. Reiter. What you would notice is a quartet of young, very dedicated and competent musicians playing a variety of sounds drawn from every musical category and melded together with ingenuity and verve.

What you would not see or could not see would be Richard Reiter's relentless effort behind the scenes to get you in that chair to watch Fusion perform. Reiter says he does not perfer to do all his own PR work but someone has to do it and he does it superbly. Some artists shy away from beating their own drum, most just will not do it, letting their artistry "speak for itself." These people often play just for themselves. Richard Reiter is smart enough to know that unless you invite someone to hear that twig crack in the forest no one is going to appreciate it no matter how creative it is.

If it were not for an early back problem in junior high school, aggravated by school track participation, Reiter might have been a miler instead of a musician. He was already several years into music when the problem erupted and sidelined him. Needing an outlet of some sort he buried himself in his music. But ironically enough, Reiter did not really make up his mind to become a professional musician until he got a degree in psychology from the University of Maryland in 1970 even though he had a college dance band and was earning money in pit bands and such. He then went on to Catholic University and a Masters Degree in music.

It is interesting to note that although Reiter had been playing music of some sort since age 5 or 6 he never really got turned on to jazz until he was in college, a rather late development. He remembers the Stan Getz-Charlie Byrd Jazz Samba collaboration as his first jazz record. Despite his late conversion to jazz music, he looks upon it philosophically. Instead of struggling with the rather difficult jazz concepts when he was a very young and inexperienced musician, he feels his late emergence into the jazz field was actually beneficial, because when he did "come out" he was technically prepared to experiment significantly in the medium.

Fusion is an apt name for Reiter's group because all of the collective musical minds influence the musical activity of the group. Reiter points out that despite his apparent leadership all of the group members con-

EMMYLOU HARRIS: Pieces Of The Sky. REPRISE.

While it may be true that not many of Washington's artists go on to recording and the big time, most of those that make it, make it big. There's Marvin Gaye, Roberta Flack, Jim Morrison, Mama Cass and John Phillips, and two others now appear destined for superstardom. Nils Lofgren will make it, and it's only a question of time as to when Emmylou Harris will make it, too. At the moment, she's one of the hottest acts in the business. If her debut album did not live up to expectations, it could do her irreparable damage, but luckily it's beautifully done.

It took me several listenings before the value of this album sank in. It at first seemed bland, but one by one, the melodies, her voice, and the restrained, yet effective backup, all revealed themselves. The material is fine, from sad ballads like "Boulder To Birmingham" and "Before Believing" to up tempo, near country-rockers like "Bluebird Wine" and "Bottle Let Me Down." This is a fairly heavy country album; she has a perfect country voice and she has

tribute significantly not only to the group's repetoire, but to the kind of image it wants to put forth.

Reiter plays all the reeds and flutes. Bob Hallahan is the pianist but also plays guitar on occasions. Derwyn Holder plays string bass, and they have a new drummer. Fusion's longtime drummer Mike Shepard recently left the group to go on the road with the Maynard Ferguson Orchestra. As Reiter says, if you have to lose a drummer that's the best way to lose him.

The future of Fusion looks bright certainly in the Washington area. The group is planning its first album, the members are working with a booking agency on a series of fall college concerts, and Reiter himself has just received a grant from the National Endowment of the Arts to compose a piece for symphony orchestra and jazz enemble. And, perhaps most important of all to the members of Fusion, they are being heard and accepted by an ever increasing group of music fans thanks to their high level of artistry and in no small part to Richard Reiter's zealous desire to have as many people as possible hear and enjoy a group he has so much faith in.

excellent backing on mandolin, dobro, fiddle, banjo and pedal steel as well as the standard guitar, bass, drums and piano.

Emmylou will no longer be working with her D.C. based Angel Band, which only plays on one cut on Pieces of the Sky. It's rumored that her temporary touring band will include such legendary players as James Burton (guitarist on the early Rick Nelson records), pianist Glen D. Hardin, and drummer Jim Gordon, Regardless of who plays with her, she has at least done a successful first album, and that's the best way to start. She's been in the background for a long time, and she's finally making her move.—B.R.

MAGGIE BELL: Suicide Sal. SWAN SONG.

Don't look for Maggie Bell to be doing herself in despite the title tune which she wrote. She's left herself in fine position for her next shot with this LP. The tunes are solid. The lyrics don't rush her vocals into corners she can't handle nor do the arrangements aspire to anything more than what is needed from them and which they fulfill splendidly: unquestioning, but imaginative support.

But the background instrumentation doesn't just lay there like some sessions do. Rather, the feeling injected by these session players comes through via their subtlety and restraint instead of offensive amplitude and rough edges.

"Wishing Well," a fiery number written by five men, becomes all Maggie Bell, pushing the rest of the album out into the warm sunlight.

"I Saw Him Standing There," the Lennon-McCartney standard, seems a bit out of place, but I suppose every album that struts along at this pace twists its ankle along the way whether we notice it or not. This false step just seems to be more out front. Though it doesn't really upset the album, it is noticeable.

It'll be hard work, but not impossible, to surpass the quality shown here in **Suicide Sal.** Time and concentration, in just the right blend with the talent so obviously displayed here, should make it clearer still that Ms. Bell stands in nobody's shadow.

Were Heifetz still active, still playing concerts, I would make a suggestion. I would advise those disturbed by his frigid mask to do as I did whenever I attended a Heifetz performance. I closed my eyes. I concentrated on what I heard, not what I saw. Those who know the artist intimately insist that he has always been tense while playing, fiercely determined to seek perfection, and his expression is merely a shield to ban all distractions. Cold and impersonal, they say,

Of course in listening to recordings, there is no problem. You hear only what I heard when I closed my eyes, years ago. I will be surprised if you do not agree. It will amaze me if you do not conclude that you are listening to a giant, one of the truly great violinists of all time. Heifetz was, is, one of the very few artists for whom the word "legendary" was coined.

INVESTING IN OIL(S). However the rest of the country may feel about oil companies this summer, Washington has cause to be grateful. Mobil, it is said, is paying for the show of Art in Arab World at the Freer Gallery which opened with a tremendous splash in the spring.

Atlantic Richfield has made a grant to WETA for a second season of "In Performance at Wolf Trap." Six productions will be taped, and four programs have been chosen. These are: the opera, Roberto Devereux, the National Symphony Orchestra playing Verdi's "Requiem" with soloists Rachel Mathes, Gwendolyn Killebrew, Ermanno Mauro, and Samuel Ramey. Bonnie Raitt, blues stylist, and old-time favorite Mose Allison; The New England Conservatory Ragtime Ensemble, conducted by Gunther Schuller, and the Preservation Hall Jazz Band.

Dr. Armand Hammer, an entrepreneur in the great tradition, has been able to persuade the Soviet Union to lend the U.S. some of the treasures from The Hermitage and the Russian State Museum. These come to the National Gallery first and then go on to other areas of the U.S. In return, an exhibit of paintings from this country will be offered the USSR, including ten western paintings from the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, Wyoming.

The exhibit at the National Gallery will open July 30 and continue through the summer. And we are reminded that the Gallery is open in the evenings for the session.

For those with personal curiosity, Dr. Hammer, chief executive officer of Occidental Petroleum Corporation, is the subject of a detailed article in the June issue of "The Atlantic Monthly."

LONDON IN TOWN. The Opera Society of Washington announces that George London has accepted the position of General Director for the Society. Among Mr. London's more remarkable exploits was being the

first non-Russian ever to sing the title role of Boris Godunov at the Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow and later returned there to record it with the Bolshoi ensemble.

He began a new career as an operatic stage director in 1971 at the Juilliard School in New York and since then has directed all four operas of Wagner's "Ring". He is not new to Washington, having served as artistic administrator of the Kennedy Center (1968-71).

THE CRADLE! The Bureau of Music of the City of Baltimore was founded October 19, 1860 when Mayor Thomas W. Swann designated that a concert band be formulated to play at the dedication of Druid Hill Park as a City facility. It was this act that made Baltimore the first city in the United States to sponsor a municipal band and a municipal orchestra. This is why Baltimore is known as the "Cradle of Municipal Music."

If you're new to Baltimore and have wondered what that piece is that opens all the concerts given by the Bureau of Music, it's "Baltimore Our Baltimore" and was written as the result of a competition held in 1915 to find a municipal anthem. The winning words were written by Folger McKinsey (who was known as the Benztown Bard). They were set to music by another Baltimorean, Mrs. Theodore Hemberger, Baltimore was the first city to adopt a municipal anthem. The same year Baltimore introduced another first: the audience sing along. The words to the songs were shown on a screen and the audience followed a bouncing ball.

The Bureau of Music now has three concerts bands, one Big Band, and one Dixieland Jazz Band under its jurisdiction.






A CASE OF MISSING MUSIC

Max Bruch completed The Concerto for Two Pianos and Orchestra, Opus 88a in 1915. The work disappeared in 1917, later to resurface in the effects of one Ottilie Sutro when she died in Baltimore in 1971. The caretaker of the Sutro estate failed to recognize the worth of the Bruch manuscript, estimated between \$30,000 and \$50,000. So one Nathan Twining purchased it, along with some newspaper clippings, in a box of junk for eleven dollars. The story was just beginning.

For it was after the discovery of the forgotten concerto that Nathan Twining's friend and pianist, Martin Berkofsky, played detective and unraveled the clues surrounding the cover-up of a valuable German composition by the Sutro sisters of Baltimore. After much detailed research in Capri, Germany and the United States, Berkofsky pieced together the course of events which obscured the Bruch concerto from musicians for over half a century.

Rose and Ottilie Sutro, one of the world's first duo-piano teams, enchanted Max Bruch in 1911 when they performed his Opus 11 Fantasy for Two Pianos. He promptly agreed to write a concerto for two pianos expressly for the Sutro sisters. This was a mistake: The Sutros had a reputation for rearranging other composers' music.

The sisters returned to America and Max Bruch worked on the commissioned piece. Upon their return to Germany in 1915, the Sutros were given Bruch's manuscript for the duo-piano concerto. Plans were made for a performance of the work with the sisters and the Berlin Philharmonic, to be conducted by then seventy-eight year old Bruch himself. Owing either to the Sutros'

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
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inability to play the complicated music, or believing themselves more qualified composers than Bruch, they set about simplifying and changing the original orchestration.

Fearful of his reputation, Bruch refused to allow them to perform the concerto in Germany. And he soon sent the sisters packing, back to the United States, but only after exacting promises from them never to perform the concerto in Europe. The German composer then began work on other new creations,

In December of 1916, the Sutro sisters, now back in the United States, copyrighted their edited version of The Concerto for Two Pianos. This copyright, effective for twenty-eight years, was never renewed and the Library of Congress deposit copy mysteriously disappeared. The deposit copy was found among the effects of Ottilie Sutro in 1971. Rose had died years before.

The duo-pianists had performed their altered concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra in 1916, pretending the work was genuine Bruch. After shortening the concerto to three movements from Bruch's original four, the sisters again performed the mangled concerto, this time with the New York Philharmonic in 1917. The Sutro versions of the concerto were so unpopular they hid the original manuscript and denied all knowledge if its existence.

The cloud of intrigue which surrounded the concerto did not lift at its rediscovery in 1971. Nathan Twining placed a copyright claim for the original Bruch manuscript while Martin Berkofsky set about researching the Bruch mystery. A recording was then made for Angel Records with Twining and Berkofsky at the pianos and Antal Dorati conducting the London Symphony. At the recording session, Twining and Berkofsky had a falling out. Twining then claimed ownership of the Concerto for Two Pianos by right of possession and copyright.

Berkofsky doubted the validity of such a claim and notified the U.S. Copyright Office of the existence of Max Bruch's son and legal heir, Ewald Bruch. Since Ewald was dying in Germany, the copyright office rushed a new claim through its office in one day and it was mailed to Bruch before his death. This copyright is based on the premise that physical possession does not supersede rightful heirs in the matter of ownership.

Since then, Nathan Twining and his lawyers have sent threatening letters to publishers and orchestras to prevent them from printing or performing the duo-piano concerto by Bruch. Despite these inhibitions, Martin Berkofsky, backed by noted legal opinions, has convinced the Baltimore Symphony to schedule a July 5th concert of Bruch's work at Merriweather Post Pavilion. Berkofsky has persuaded the Baltimore Symphony to take the initiative because he feels that the concerto deserves to be heard.

Max Bruch's adopted granddaughter will fly over from Germany with her husband for the concert. The concert will be played by duo-pianists Martin Berkofsky and Justin Blasdale. They will perform Opus 11 Fantasy for Two Pianos prior to the concert. The Fantasy for Two Pianos is the same work which charmed the composer into creating a concerto for two sisters from Baltimore, beginning the trail of tragedy.
