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

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
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

GERSHWIN LIST INCOMPLETE

Sir:

While I in no way wish to seem to downgrade Anthony Orr's reviews of current discs now available of George Gershwin's immortal "Rhapsody in Blue," (The Compleat Discographer, **Forecast!**, November, 1975) I feel that his list is less than definitive in that it omits the recent great recording by Eugene List and the Berlin Symphony Orchestra, Samuel Adler, Conductor (Turnabout, TVS 34457 \$2.98).

This is, so far as I know, the first time the Rhapsody has been recorded as the "Original Version for Jazz Band and Piano," from Gershwin's original score as he presented it to Paul Whiteman in January, 1924, before it was turned over to Ferde Grofé to be orchestrated. The work is presented uncut and without the padding and gratuitous color effects that Grofé later added.

The "band" uses clarinet, saxophones, banjo, and other instruments as Gershwin wanted them used, and as Whiteman conducted them. While I am not familiar with the Nero and Levant versions, I can assure

List is an old hand at Gershwin, having played the Rhapsody during World War II when he was in the army and in 1946, under Leonard Bernstein's baton, at the first International Music Festival held in Europe since the end of the war (in Prague). He played it often at the Gershwin festivals held at that time in Lewissohn Stadium in New York, and he has played it with the Orchestra of Radio O.R.T.F. in Paris.

"Three Preludes for Piano" finish out the "Rhapsody" side of the record, and the flip side has an equally spirited rendition of Gershwin's "Piano Concerto in F."

DMITRI SHOSTAKOVICH

Sir:

H. Donald Spatz' article "Remembering Shostakovich" contains several observations and factual statements which call for further comment.

First, it is incorrect to state that Shostakovich "returned to favor with the ruling hierarchy in 1942 with his Symphony No. 7 (Leningrad)." Most biographies agree that he was restored to favor in 1937 following the first performances of his Symphony No. 5. It will be remembered that, in response to the uproar over **Lady Macbeth of Mzensk**, Shostakovich withdrew his Fourth Symphony from rehearsal and staked his reputation on the reception of his now-famous Fifth which he subtitled, "A Soviet Artist's Reply to Just Criticism."

Secondly, it is misleading to say that Shostakovich was "again condemned in 1962 for his Symphony No. 13 (Babi Yar)." It is true that the Babi Yar Symphony was suppressed, but the composer had come under sharp criticism as early as 1946 for his Symphony No. 9 which was accused of failing "to reflect the true spirit of the Soviet people."

Again, in 1953, his Symphony No. 10 was attacked as untrue to Soviet art owing to the somber mood of its final movement. Possibly, in his highly propagandistic Symphony No. 11 (The Year 1905), written four years later, Shostakovich was responding to this pattern of censure.

Lastly, it seems more than a little wishful to suppose that Shostakovich subscribed to the view that "one must not mix politics and art," or that he wanted to shout out those words during his 1959 visit to the United States.

Neither in his music nor in his infrequent writings did he suggest that he regarded himself as anything other than a Soviet (Continued on page 103)

"ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF AMERI-CAN QUILTS" and a collection of American miniatures are the first two exhibits to highlight the reopening of the newly-painted DAR Museum Gallery.

The quilt exhibit includes 18 bedcoverings painstakingly handworked. Most are pieced or appliqued and date from 1790. One of the most interesting is a friendship quilt made by Eliza Moore in 1843. Each of the 72 floral squares is signed and dated by a friend of the maker.

The collection of miniatures, dating from 1765 to 1860, features one of John Hancock, attributed to John Singleton Copley. There are also likenesses of Charles Carroll, Jr., of Carrollton and George Washington, as well as the well-known miniature of Joshua Barney. Customarily painted with watercolor on ivory or paper, miniatures were a sign of deep af-10 FORECAST!

fection for a lover, parent, or some dear one who had died. To work in such a confined space, the artist built up textures and gave form with cautious stippling and hatching. With the advance of photography, miniature painting went out of fashion.

show includes paintings, drawings, and book illustrations of members of Les Primatifs, the Nazarenes, Pre-Raphaelites, and the Pont Aven group and archaistic works by artists, such as J.A.D. Ingres and Benjamin West who are seldom thought of in the context of primitivism.

This is the first exhibition and catalogue to examine this aspect of the preromantic and romantic movements that persisted throughout the 19th century across the continent, in England, and even in America. In order to represent the primitive aspect of each artist's sensibility, works have been selected from 24 public and private collections in the United States and Europe.



WHAT'S IN IT FOR ME-a prelude to the Nation's and Washington County, Maryland's Bicentennial celebration opens Sunday, December 7 at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts. The exhibition focuses on selected items from the Museum's permanent collection, but there are also choice items of traditional Americana. Reflecting history, Colonial to the present, and gathered from the many private and public collections in the area, the show contains portraits, landscapes, still lifes, sculpture, prints and drawings, and furniture. The Museum is in Hagerstown and the round trip takes less than a tankful of gas.

THE BRANDYWINE RIVER MUSEUM is featuring a "Brandywine Christmas for Children" which, they say, is a gallery filled with a dream model railroad for old and young. The "O" scale layout, with more than 1500 feet of track, features a 20-track turntable, many trestles, bridges and gorges, residential areas, and an illuminated control panel visitors can view.

For those who are more interested in decorations than in model railroads, the Museum offers Christmas trees decorated with a fascinating variety of natural ornaments made from seed pods, nuts, mock orange, and pine cones. The name of the game is "Christmas Comes Naturally to the Brandywine." The show is on thru January 11.

THE STRANGE CASE OF THE MIGRATING MONUMENT has been solved! The mysterious disappearance of a 70-pound plaque that the Daughters of the American Colonists gave to the City of Baltimore to mark the historic waterfront neighborhood of Fells Point has not been explained, but the marker has been returned. Although most people would not expect so weighty an object to be the subject of vandalism, the marker disappeared, and The Daughters of the American Colonists undertook to have a replacement made.

Meanwhile, back at the **No Fish Today** bar on Eutaw Street, the plaque was given to the owner. (We cannot help but wonder if it was in commemoration of a remarkable and historic occasion.) The owner recognizing it as obviously official and identical to those placed by the Maryland Historical Society, turned it over to them where it rested in the basement. The DAC wishing to reproduce the original text, contacted the Maryland Historical Society and . . . you can guess the rest.

The migrating monument was returned to its proper place and reinstalled in the most secure manner achievable by the City sign shop. Said the Mayor after he had rededicated it, "Anyone who can walk off with it now I don't want to run into."

THE WASHINGTON CHORAL ARTS SO-CIETY says the ideal way to celebrate Christmas is a program at Kennedy Center with seasonal music from all ages, including carols, music in procession, music from the galleries, and concludes with the audience joining the choir and orchestra in the familiar carols known and loved by all.

THE OCTAGON AND THE U.S. COMMIS-SION OF FINE ARTS are jointly sponsoring an exhibit featuring the bridges crossing the waterways of the nation's capital. "Bridges and the City of Washington" traces the development of the wide variety of bridges crossing the Potomac River, the Anacostia River and Rock Creek. Organized by Donald Beekman Myer, AIA, the exhibit includes photographs of the Aquaduct Bridge, later replaced by Key Bridge, 19th century schemes for Memorial Bridge (which was finally built in 1926) and a group of antique prints and postcards showing early views of Cabin John Bridge, Taft Bridge, and Harvard Street Bridge. Also on display will be models for sculptures designed for the Memorial Bridge. The show continues through December 29.

"IS THERE A SWISS CULTURE?" is an illustrated lecture in German sponsored by the German Language Society at 8 pm, Thursday, December 11, at the Embassy of Switzerland. Dr. Bruno Gujer, professor of history in the department of anthropology and sociology of the University of South Carolina is the person asking the question. The German Language Society is open to all persons interested in the language.



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

As we go to press the following theatrical excitements are scheduled for December (but with show biz being the way it is, who knows?). Kate should be in the middle of her run at the National. Yes, Katherine Hepburn, but you already knew that because you tried to get tickets but couldn't, right? Or you sent for them early, got them, and are feeling very smug, right again? Whatever, a Hepburn appearance is important. For the record, the play is Enid Bagnold's new comedy, **A Matter of Gravity.** At the National.

By now the great **Long Day's Journey Into Night** controversy should be settled. Arena Stage's production is over (or was scheduled to be at press time) and the Jason Robards' rendition is commencing at The Eisenhower. After this Eugene O'Neill's searing autobiographical drama, which many consider his best, ought to be indelible in some of our minds (not to mention our derrieres!).

If the names of Harold Prince and Stephen Sondheim conjure up the memories of some great musicals (if you don't remember **Company** and **Follies** and **A Little Night Music**, come out from under your rock), then great expectations are what **Pacific Overtures**, their latest collaboration, should be conjuring up. The answer will be at The Opera House this month. It concerns Admiral Perry's adventures in Japan. . . but then Harold and Steve never do tackle the usual material.

Later in the month a couple of other musical wunderkind, Leonard Bernstein and Alan Jay Lerner (yes, the **West Side Story** and **My Fair Lady** kids have collaborated on their new one, **1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.** It concerns big and little events that have occurred in the big casablanca across from Lafayette Park from time to time through the years. Right down our bicentennial alley, wot?

Ford's should be winding up its run of Vinnette Carroll's new gospel musical, **Your Arm's Too Short to Box With God.** It played first at the Spoleto Festival in Italy, where it was warmly received.

The season thus far has been full and varied, good and bad, with the good definitely outweighing the bad, happily. From late September until late October there were a raft of plays, musicals, cabaret shows and ballet. Stick around:

Ford's Theater finally opened for the season with an intriguing, somewhat disturbing play, **Are You Now or Have You Ever Been?**, based on the actual transcripts of the House UnAmerican Activities probe into show business personalities. The play came intact from Los Angeles, where it had been a huge success. It was interesting (and eerie) to see other actors portray the likes of Larry Parks, Elia Kazan, Lionel Stander, Arthur Miller, Paul Robeson. The play had power and force for two riveting acts, but then it just became more of the same and anticlimatic in its third. The problem with using the actual transcript is that there is no real place to end . . . but on the stage you need a curtain line. Are You Now Or Have You Ever Been? (***).

Hal Holbrook brought back his **Mark Twain Tonight** for a week's engagement to The Opera House and it was, predictably, a triumph. True, The Opera House is no place to do an intimate show like the Twain, but Holbrook's genius and the huge audience's rapt attention overcame the difficulty. Still, I'd have hated to have been at the back of the upper balcony straining to see and hear. **Mark Twain Tonight** (****).

Sabrina Fair must have been a nice little comedy for that charming actress. Margaret Sullivan, in its day. A day when nice little comedies were the thing. But the thing that was perpetrated on the public at The National was something else again . . . what I'm not sure. The play couldn't have been that bad . . . or have we changed so much? Harold J. Kennedy, who calls himself a director (no one else I know calls him that) was responsible for the whole mess. He also appeared in the play along with a friend of his, Skip Lynch, and they gave this season's two worst performances thus far. But then they did the same thing in Mr. Kennedy's last fiasco here, Light Up The Sky. For the record (although they'd probably just as soon forget the whole thing) Arlene Francis, Sam Levene, Robert Horton, Maureen O'Sullivan, Katharine Houghton and Russell Nype were the stars. Only Arlene Francis came through like a trouper. The rest seemed bewildered, as well they might be. Sabrina Fair (no stars).

The American Ballet Theater made its semiannual appearance at The Opera House. Even with the likes of Barishnykov, Gelsey Kirkland, Bujones and the rest it came off with little fireworks. Technically superb, never mediocre, but lacking the sparks that usually surround this great company. You can't win them all.

Something new has hit town and it could catch on: cabaret theater. It's all happening down at the Waaay Off Broadway, which is way off everyplace down at Half Street, S.W. While there is a definite gay orientation to the attractions, there is also some very fine talent that straights and gays alike are enjoying in increasing numbers. First the singing group, **Gotham**, did a highly successful stand, followed by **Wayland Flowers and Madame**, a funny/raunchy comedy act with Mr. Flowers and his puppet, Madame. The third attraction (and the only one I caught, which makes me re-

For something different, Waaay Off Broadway.

As its fourth attraction of the American Bicentennial Theater presentations, The Kennedy Center and Xerox produced a vivid, highly satisfactory production of Tennessee Williams' florid melodrama, **Sweet Bird of Youth.** Irene Worth and Christopher Walken gave powerhouse performances and the play was supercharged all the way. It was real theater. **Sweet Bird of Youth** (***1/2).

Folger Theater Group's initial production of the season was The Collected Works of Billy The Kid . . . an imaginative, often vivid, sometimes gory, kaleidoscope of the life and times of one of our legendary outlaw heroes. As a play I'm not sure it makes it on all eight cylinders . . . but there's no question it was one of Folger's most dynamic performances. Even if you really didn't like the play, you had to admire the production. Folger dares to do different kinds of plays (witness last season's brilliant Creeps) and one admires the courage, if not always the work. Louis Scheeder directed an excellent cast with style . . . and it was mostly an interesting evening. The Collected Works Of Billy The Kid (***).

The Canadian's Shaw Festival production of **The Devil's Disciple** was stylishly performed and a welcome addition to the bicentennial season. Not one of Shaw's finest, surely, **The Devil's Disciple** is still good theater and the Canadian company, particularly Paul Hecht and Paxton Whithead, gave it all it was worth. After a rather tedious beginning it was good, revolutionary (war, that is) fun. **The Devil's Disciple** (***).

On the dinner theater circuit: Guys and Dolls was a happy choice for Lazy Susan Dinner Theater. Well sung, nicely acted and sassy-smart production. Guys and Dolls (***). A new dinner theater, La Loge, opened in the 18th and Columbia Road area. Avignone Freres did the food . . . great. The show was Kurt Weill's and Maxwell Anderson's Knickerbocker Holiday. It's one you don't see very often . . . and I know why. It's lousy. So was the production. Knickerbocker Holiday (*). Harlequin Dinner Theater, with fear and trepidation, unveiled their new "second" company, which will alternate with the other company between Rockville and the new Harlequin Atlanta. The show was Fiddler on the Roof and the management should have had no fears . . . for the new company is great, the production was superb and Harlequin remains right where it has been ... at the top. Fiddler on the Roof (****).

Shady Grove Music Theater had a fourweek stand of the first in-the-round local production of **Godspell**... and it was every bit as much fun, and worked as well, as it does in procenium theater. The music is still stand-out and the cast did a bang-up job. **Godspell** (***1/2).

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

Dining with the Robinsons Lou & Carol

This month, our restaurant critics, Lou and Carol Robinson, continue to give you a good look at the better dining spots in the Washington/Baltimore area. The restaurants are rated for quality, service, decor and value. The best possible rating is four candles.

TIBERIO RISTORANTE. 1915 K Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 452-1915. Major credit cards. Lunch and dinner.

Washington's latest "instant" hit restaurant is Tiberio, and one can easily see why. This is the Italian equivalent of Jean-Pierre or Rive Gauche, one supposes. Certainly the food and decor are superb, the prices high ... and only the service was below the excellences of the rest of the restaurant. A large, white-walled, elegantly appointed room full of greens and handsome, vibrant paintings sets the scene. You pass through a large, attractive foyer, pass a bank of knock-your-eyes-out desserts and into the main room. You like it immediately. The menu is huge and extensive (and, as we said, expensive). Go with a crowd and try everything; we did.

After ample drinks we sampled marvelous escargots, the sauce boasting not only garlic and butter but walnuts!; superb frogs legs in a heavenly brown sauce (the kind you have to sop up with the great crusty Italian bread). Others shared Fettucini Alfredo as an appetizer, and some of us had it as an entree. Either way . . . sublime. Rich and creamy and cheesy and to hell with the diet! Some of the group went for the whole tenderloin, prepared to perfection and sliced at the table. Served with artichoke bottoms and a medley of vegetables. Salads crisp and delicious.

Desserts: almond-chocolate cake, fresh raspberries and whipped cream, cheese cake. Too much after the meal, but one must do one's duty. A light, white Frascati wine went well with all meals. Espresso, of course. All perfect, except the service. Harried, rushed a bit. Dishes left on table that should have been removed. Very busy. Plan on about \$50 for two, for the works.

OLD EUROPE. 2434 Wisconsin Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. FE. 3-7600. Major credit cards.



One of Washington's old standbys ..., and still an agreeable place to dine. German cooking, lots of schnitzels and wursts and great German beers on tap. Try the cold fruit soup as an appetizer, one of Old Europe's specialities. Full of cherries and other good things, creamy and delicious. There are other appetizers, like herring in sour cream and homemade hot soups. With dumplings. Schnitzel is king here.

My favorite is wiener schnitzel ... a large, tender piece of veal lightly breaded and cooked just right. Served with fried egg and anchovy. There are several variations of the schnitzel, all of them interesting and delicious. Even a beef schnitzel, which was a delightfully different surprise. Potato dumplings and German red cabbage are among the vegetables and among the best. Good German pumpernickel is served with everything. Portions are more than ample, but save room for the dessert house specialty, German apple pie with whipped cream. After that steaming coffee, you'll need it. A good white German moselle (the wine list is ample) goes best with this kind of meal. Service excellent. Around \$25 per couple, and worth it.

IRON GATE INN. Rear 1737 N Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. RE. 7-1370. Some credit cards.

A cozy little place that has been around forever, but now features really first rate Near East cuisine. Try the garden in warm weather or enjoy the tavern atmosphere when it's cold. Service is friendly and helpful. I say helpful, because there is much on the menu that needs explaining. We stuck with a carafe of white wine (do you get the impression we like white wine? We do.). Besides which, it's pretty safe if you don't know what kind of food you're ordering.

For appetizer we chose humos, which is a dip made of mashed chic peas and spices. It is served with hot Arabian bread: Just break off a bit and dip in. Great. The Arabian Night Platter is a good way to get acquainted with near eastern food. It consisted of grape leaves stuffed with chopped lamb and rice, shish kebab (lamb and vege tables off the skewer on rice), rice with pine nuts, chopped lamb meat balls, stuffed cabbage (with lamb, again), chopped lamb square and maybe a couple of other things I couldn't identify. It's all very tasty and satisfying. We also tried the lamb curry, served on rice with an outstanding mango chutney. Baklaawa (honey and nuts in crispy, thin layers of crust) was an appropriate dessert. The Turkish coffee is deadly sweet so be forewarned. Regular coffee is also served. Very different food, nicely prepared and super-friendly atmosphere. Around \$20 for two. Try it.

MEADOWLARK INN. White's Ferry Road, Poolesville, Md. 428-8937. Credit cards.




Here's a little gem that you really must discover. It's a long ride past Rockville but worth every bit of it. A country inn that looks like somebody, if not old G.W., must have slept there in days of yore. Very unpretentious but pleasant. And do they pile the food on and is it good! All meals are complete . . . and we mean complete.

Over cocktails you'll be served cheese and crackers plus a relish tray full of radishes. celery, olives and carrot strips. But don't nibble too much. The onslaught is about to begin. Appetizers included a delicious gumbo soup, or pickled herring, among others. The salad is next and again everything measures up. For entrees one of us chose prime ribs (which are only served on Friday and Saturday nights). The beef was excellent and the portion huge. Another had fried shrimp, large and tender, lightly battered and lightly cooked. Filet of sole for another, stuffed with backfin crabmeat, was sublime. The remaining member of the party had a beautiful calves' liver, smothered in cooked onions and declared delicious.

Vegetables are served family style: scalloped potatoes, corn, green beans. A special treat, along with hot rolls, in Meadowlark's spectacular date and nut bread, which they sell to take home. Buy it on the way in . . . there's never any left when you leave. All kinds of good desserts. We chose a pound cake and ice cream covered with chocolate and mint . . . outrageous after that meal. But marvelous. Hot coffee and a two mile walk and you'll be okay again. Would you believe all this for around \$20 a couple, for everything?

Dining Out Travel Tip. Antonio's. About 5 kilometers west of Marbella on the Costa del Sol of Spain, in the exquisite Puerto José Banus (where Franco and Onassis used to park their yachts) is the marvelous quay-side restaurant with outdoor and indoor dining. You may remember it's where Glenda Jackson and George Siegel bumped into each other accidentally in "A Touch of Class." Well, the restaurant has a touch of class and more. Superb Andalusian seafood, best of all a dish called Fried Fish Malaga Style. Sounds yuk, but wait until you taste the goodies: squid, tiny fish, other native fish, all lightly fried and delicious. It all jumped out of the Med that morning. Wash it down with Antonio's special sangria. Olé.

ALI THE FIGHTER — Unimaginative documentary focusing on the 1971 Ali-Frazier heavyweight title fight, which Ali lost. Ample footage of the fight itself, which should satisfy boxing fans. A few very brief scenes from subsequent title fights have been tacked on at the end to make the film timely, but they don't. William Greaves directed. **G**

ALI THE MAN — This is more like it. Not a definitive portrait by any means, this hour-long documentary nevertheless manages to create a stirring mood by combining clips of the controversial boxer's past and present against the background of a ballad sung by Richie Havens. In retrospect, Ali's draft resistance and his other so-called antisocial utterances now appear so harmless that it's hard to believe anyone could have stripped him of his title, least of all the hustlers who run professional boxing. Rick Baxter directed. G

BLACK CHRISTMAS — Sort of a *Phantom of the Sorority House*, in which an unseen evil force with a voice left over from *The Exorcist* stalks a houseful of cross-section coed stereotypes: the house virgin, the house nympho, the house beatnik, etc. It's a haphazard, superficial, and ultimately unsatisfying job; there are so many loose ends that director Bob Clark should open a yarn shop. With Olivia Hussey, Keir Dullea, Margot Kidder, John Saxon, **R**

BROTHER, CAN YOU SPARE A DIME? — This is what you might call raw nostalgia: an odd assortment of Hollywood and newsreel film clips from the '30s, unsupported by narration or any unifying thread (other than James Cagney, who reappears constantly). Director Phillippe Mora appears to have no particular statement to make, other than the familiar saw about how tough the Depression was and how much fun it is to reminisce about it. And, to be sure, it is, PG

DOG DAY AFTERNOON — This taut thriller about a Brooklyn bank robbery tries to go beyond the usual copsand-robbers stuff to probe inside the heads of the would-be robbers, Al Pacino and John Cazale, as they're holed up in the bank with nine hostages. Director Sidney Lumet perceives that in this case, as in so many human conflicts these days, the problem is not physical but psychological: greed, fear, love, hate, and the temptations of power and glory all come into play in the course of a day and night in which the cops try to coax the pair outside. Inconclusive, but engrossing. With Charles Durning. **R**

THE FOUR DEUCES — Shabby Prohibition-era gangster film that tries to be part comedy and part melodrama and fails at both. Signs of sloppy directing abound, such as a Danish modern sofa in one scene and, in another, a woman who is bound and gagged with her hands tied in *front* of her, so she could easily remove the gag if it occurred to her. It doesn't. With Jack Palance, Adam Roarke, Carol Lynley; William Bushnell, Jr., directed. **PG**

FRAMED — Joe Don Baker spends four years in prison for a crime he didn't commit, which is almost as unjust as having to spend two hours watching this disorganized and illogical action flick. With Connie Van Dyke; Phil Karlson directed. **R**

GIVE 'EM HELL, HARRY — Film of a live stage performance of Samuel Gallu's one-man play about President Truman, with James Whitmore in the title role. This filmed version enables us to watch the audience as well as the actor, and it seems to be cheering as much for Truman as for the play, and rightly so. There is plenty in the Truman story to inspire Americans, and much of it shines through here, but the trouble with the play is that it tries to turn a good man into a deity—which is, of course, what audiences crave after living through Nixon. Steve Binder directed. **PG**

HARD TIMES — Charles Bronson has been 28 FORECAST!

transplanted into Depression-era New Orleans as a bare knuckles street fighter, but otherwise it's the same old Bronson: he's still infallible, unbeatable, and inscrutable, given to epigrams like, "I don't look past the next bend in the road." If times are hard, Bronson doesn't act it. Beneath his shabby clothes is a fellow who proceeds with all the assurance of someone who has read the script. Strother Martin has a nice bit as a Tennessee Williamsish physician, and the actual fight scenes are gripping. With James Coburn; Walter Hill directed. **PG**

HEARTS OF THE WEST — Very pleasant low-key comedy, set in Hollywood, early 1930s. Jeff Bridges is a young would-be writer from Iowa who goes West to soak up cowboy lore, but the only cowboys he finds are on movie sets, and the bandits practice mail fraud instead of robbing stagecoaches. None of these disillusionments, though, diminishes our hero's pulp-novel vision of "parched desert sands" and "the vast Pacific." The director is Howard Zieff, which means that seemingly minor matters have a way of getting crazily out of hand and the tastiest morsels can be found around the edges, especially in Alan Arkin's performance as a Western movie director. With Andy Griffith, Rivthe Danner. **PG**

I WANT WHAT I WANT — Sympathetic portrayal of an effeminate young man in London who blossoms when he changes sexes. The film appears to have been made solely for its shock value; the story is negligible, and much of the footage is consumed by dead time and inaudible mumbling. With Anne Heywood; John Dexter directed. **R**

LET'S DO IT AGAIN — Good-natured but uninspired and totally predictable comedy sequel to *Uptown Saturday Night*. Sidney Poitier and Bill Cosby again play a pair of Atlanta factory workers who hit the big money in New Orleans, outsmart the black syndicate, and act out other blue-collar blackface vicarious thrills. Like *Uptown*, it's that rare black picture with no violence whatever, and it's a slight improvement over *Uptown* in that there aren't so many overacting guest stars clogging the landscape, but it's strictly a formula film offering formula kicks to undemanding audiences. It will make a fortune, no doubt. Poitier directed. PG

LOVELACE MEETS MISS JONES — Beware of this porno ripoff. Its title implies it's an original film, but it's just a string of peep-show films strung together with the flimsiest of pretexts. Linda Lovelace happens to be in one episode, and Georgina Spelvin in another. The film is heavy on dildoes and urination. Anglo Spavini directed. **X**

LUCKY LUCIANO — This disjointed Italian film covers the life of the late Mafia chieftain after his exile to Italy in 1946, when he reorganized the international drug trade that had sent him to a New York prison in the first place. Most of the film is expository talk—speeches, meetings, press conferences, testimony, interrogations—and the dubbing doesn't help. The most fascinating question about Luciano's life—why Governor Dewey set him free—is touched on but never explored conclusively. With Gian Maria Volonte, Rod Steiger, and Charles Siragusa playing himself. Francesco Rosi directed. **PG**

THE McCULLOCHS — Clumsy, simpleminded story of a two-fisted Texas trucking magnate whose macho stubbornness wreaks havoc with his sensitive adolescent children. In the final scene, the film degenerates into self parody—and thereby almost redeems itself—with a gigantic fistfight between the trucker (Forrest Tucker) and his daughter's fiancé (Max Baer) that manages to involve everyone in town, including a heart patient being rushed to the hospital. With Julie Adams and an assortment of other has-beens; Baer (Macon County Line) wrote, directed, and produced. **PG**

NIGHT FLIGHT FROM MOSCOW — Disorganized and pointless spy story about a Russian intelligence chief (Yul Brynner) who messes up Western espionage networks by defecting to the US and "betraying" lots of Western spies as Soviet agents when in fact they're really good guys. The CIA, which in this movie tapes and bugs and computerizes everything on earth, nevertheless blithely falls for Brynner's story, and with good reason: if it didn't, there'd be no movie. The characters seem to drift in and out of the story without rhyme or reason, and you will wait in vain for any night flight from Moscow, or even a day flight. With Henry Fonda, Dirk Bogarde; Henri Berneul directed. **PG**

PEEPER — Some atmospheric 1940s private eye capers are entertaining; this is not one of them. In place of style or intelligence, we have wisecracks and people constantly popping out of doorways or dark shadows. Michael Caine is a detective trying to find a woman for

reasons you'll neither understand nor care about. With Natalie Wood; Peter Hyams directed. **PG**

ROYAL FLASH — You expect more of a director like Richard Lester and a cast that includes Malcolm McDowell, Alan Bates, Florinda Bolkan, and Oliver Reed, but all you get here is great aspirations. They have set out to produce a European Little Big Man, but the result is a disjointed collection of slapstick scenes that is both witless and pointless. McDowell plays a 19th century British soldier who is kidnapped by Otto von Bismarck (Reed) and forced to impersonate a German prince for whom a politically sensitive marriage is being arranged. As in *The Three Musketeers*, Lester seeks to prick the pretensions of pompous societies, but this time he pursues his targets with a cannon rather than a scalpel. Bates, in particular, is totally wasted. **PG**

SMILE — The boobism of small-town Americana and the banality of beauty pageants are terribly easy targets; nevertheless, director Michael Ritchie hits them often and well in this intelligent spoof. The scene is a California town where the local Jaycees are sponsoring the finals of the California "Young American Miss" contest; the locals, schooled in the virtues of presenting a phony front to the rest of the world, do their best to transmit their values to the 33 competing high school girls. Bruce Dern is a used-car dealer and head judge of the pageant; Barbara Feldon is the girls' plastic head chaperone; Michael Kidd is a jaded Hollywood choreographer hired for a week to teach the girls to do dance routines. Gentle but continuous fun; you won't want it to end. **PG**

S.O.S. — The editors of *Screw* Magazine, after one hilarious pornographic movie — *It Happened in Hollywood* — are already trying to rest on their laurels. This sexual potpourri has its moments of wit and humor, but for the most part it just hangs there limply, like some of its male performers. Instead of novel ideas, we're given novel raunchiness: a man having his testicles tattooed, a woman who does tricks with her vagina, a male homosexual scene. Much of the film is consumed by plugs for *Screw* and for other porno films and celebrities. Jim Buckley produced and directed. **X**

THREE DAYS OF THE CONDOR — Robert Redford is a minor CIA bureaucrat on the run from his superiors, who seek to kill him to cover up their own mistakes. It's a standard escapist thriller, and director Sidney Pollack does a fine job of maintaining the tension throughout, but the film is twodimensional in its perceptions of the spy business: it accepts the current CIA paranoia as gospel, and assumes that Redford is the only humane guy in the organization. A fun flick, though. With Faye Dunaway; from the novel by James Grady. **PG**


THE ULTIMATE WARRIOR — Another future film that envisions a bleak post-plague world of 2012 in which the surviving New Yorkers are reduced to savages, living in armed communes that fight each other for survival. In Max von Sydow's compound, the chief asset is a horticultural genius (Richard Kelton) who's discovered a way to grow tomatoes and other extinct plants on his roof. All of which sounds interesting, but the real purpose of the film is simply to let us watch the compound's hired warrior, Yul Brynner, destroy the group's enemies. It might as well be a Western. Robert Clouse directed. **R**

WALKING TALL, PART II — The crooks and bootleggers in McNairy County, Tennessee, are a hardy lot: everybody's against them, and they have no friends inside the forces of the law. Yet instead of moving elsewhere, as most crooks would, they hang around, thus necessitating sequels in which Sheriff Buford Pusser can wipe them out. This version makes no more sense than the original, and it bears the added burden of a down-home sheriff (Bo Svenson) who speaks with a Scandinavian accent. Needless to add, the film opens with an affidavit from the scriptwriter, swearing that everything in the story is true. Earl Bellamy directed. **PG**

WHIFFS — Elliott Gould, after 15 years of testing poison gases for the U.S. Army Chemical Corps, is returned to civilian life a virtual vegetable and decides to take up chemical warfare as a trade. Cute idea, but under Ted Post's direction the comedy is strained, slow-moving, heavyhanded and not at all entertaining. **PG**

WHITE LINE FEVER — The trucker's answer to Walking Tall, and every bit as hokey. Jan-Michael Vincent is the idealistic young owner-operator who singlehandedly fights corruption, violence, and blacklisting in the shipping industry. The choice of subject is a good one; unfortunately, the villains in this piece are simply beyond belief — two-dimensional executives and lackeys who spend all their time diddling secretaries or playing golf—and thus the film is mostly blue-collar fantasy, not the hard-headed realism it claims to be. Jonathan Kaplan directed. PG

THE WILD PARTY — If La Dolce Vita had been written, directed, and performed by a junior high school class, this is how it might have turned out. Dull, slow, pointless nonsense about a bash thrown by a fading Hollywood star on the night his career turns for the worse, 1929; The Tame Party would be a more appropriate title. With James Coco, Raquel Welch; James Ivory directed. **R**

An Annual Dazzle of Dreamy Delights!

Where the Nutcracker is, holiday magic is found!

It is a time for merriment. The air is filled with expectancy, especially for the children, because it is Christmas.

The trees are trimmed, the tinsel shines through the lights, the toys sit all around the tall, awe-inspiring structure standing in the corner of the room.

There is music. The great choirs can be heard, the orchestras, and the carolers, who are heralding the solemn, but reverent notice that it is the holiday season.

It is a time to love, a time to remember, to dream and to renew hopes for the future! It is, in essence, "The Nutcracker Suite."

Can children and adults alike ever turn aside the grandeur of it all?

Never, despite the desperate occasions when a "Scrooge" appears here and there in the various realms of the world.

Perhaps Peter Illitch Tchaikovsky, the great Russian composer, captured the mood of Christmas best when he wrote the famed classic many centuries ago.

He put it together for children, of course. But the story and music have thrilled mil-30 FORECAST! lions, both young and old, through the years, making it one of the most popular ballets in existence.

In Milton Cross' Encyclopedia of Great Composers, Tchaikovsky is described as a genius.

Tchaikovsky's first musical impression, as the Milton Cross book tells it, came in his early childhood when he heard opera airs trinkled on a little mechanical instrument called the "orchestrion." Later he tried reproducing these tunes on the piano.

Can children and adults alike ever turn aside the grandeur of it all?

Music excited him. Once going to bed after hearing a concert, he was found weeping.

"The music won't leave my head," he wimpered. "It won't let me sleep." "What has set his music apart from the other great composers is its intense emotionalism and subjectivity. The effect on an audience is immediate and profound ...,"

And it is all of that in "The Nutcracker Suite."

At the present time, "The Nutcracker Suite" is being presented by The Washington Ballet Company, a semi-professional group whose main purpose in the entertainment realm is to perform ballet at its best.

"The Nutcracker Suite" will be on the stage at George Washington University's Lisner Auditorium through January 4.

"We've been doing 'Nutcracker' every year since 1962," said Harry Baernstein, Washington Ballet Company's manager. "It's like the circus, we always do it each season and always at Christmastime ..."

The company's headquarters at 3515 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W. is a beehive of activity. Besides rehearsals in several big halls there, the headquarters comprises a school for ballet dancers who aspire to great works of artistry like "The Nutcracker."

"The Nutcracker Suite" originated as a ballet score. It is one of the few works in

which Tchaikovsky is revealed in a lighthearted mood—with delight and wonder in a child's fanciful world. The "march" in the opus is a pert melody of clarinet, horn and trumpets. The "Dance of the Flutes" and the "Dance of the Sugarplum Fairy" are delicate melodies of rhythmic excitement.

Finally, the "Waltz of the Flowers" is a lilting refrain of clarinets, strings, horns, flutes and trumpets—bringing the fantasy of "The Nutcracker" to an exciting conclusion.

"The Nutcracker is a story borrowed from a tale called "The Nutcracker and the King of the Mice." Ballets are usually stories with music without words and the dances express what is happening in pantomime by movement and gestures.

In "The Nutcracker" the words have been put in the mouth of the characters to go with the thoughts and action. The words support what the characters would say.

The "Nutcracker" story begins when an old mayor of a town holds a Christmas party for his two children, a daughter, Clara, and a son, Franz.

As the invited guests—all children—open their presents under a vividly-lighted Christmae tree, a stranger arrives. He looks queer in his old clothes and a black patch over one of his eyes frightens the children as he speaks to them.

"My name is Dr. Drosselmeyer," he says. "I know it's a funny name, but I am a funny sort of man. I am a kind of Santa Claus and the toys I bring sometimes do funny things."

He hands Franz a present that looks something like a pie, but the minute Franz touches it, out pops a soldier ready to salute.

Turning to Clara he says, "I've got a cabbage for you. It's a queer kind of cabbage because in the middle of it is a puppet who can talk.

"And that's not all. I have one more present made especially for you, Clara. It's a nutcracker, but it's not an ordinary nutcracker. This one is shaped like a little man and was made by a magician. It is a magic nutcracker."

With this the strange little man bows to all the children and says, "And so good night and Merry Christmas!"

All the children, except Franz, are delighted with their gifts.

"I don't need another soldier," he grumbles. "I have plenty of them. I want to see if the nutcracker can make magic."

Franz asks his sister Clara to give it to him. But Clara holds back, saying "Dr. Drosselmeyer gave it to me and it's mine!"

The two children tussle for the nutcracker and Franz, in his anger, gets it away from Clara and tosses it across the room where it lands on a couch.

"Let it stay there for all the good it will do," Franz shouts.

The old mayor stops the two children's fighting and tells everybody they must go home.

"It's Christmas, remember," he admonishes.

The invited children leave the party and Franz and Clara go off to bed.

But Clara can't sleep wondering if the nutcracker really has magic powers. She tosses restlessly in bed until almost midnight, then gets up and goes to the room where all the toys have been left.

She cannot believe what she sees! The furniture in the room is the same, but everything else is different. Everything is alive, full of activity!

The soldiers are waging a terrific battle against an army of mice, under the command of a king. And the nutcracker is leading the soldiers into combat!

Clara cheers the nutcracker's regiment but when it seems that it is going down to defeat, she takes her shoe and hurls it at the King of the Mice.

The mouse army retreats and the nutcracker bows to her in appreciation.

Once, going to bed after hearing a concert, Tchaikovsky was found weeping.

"You have saved me," he tells Clara. "You will not regret your actions. I am just a nutcracker most of the time, but tonight I am a prince.

"Come, let me show you my magic kingdom."

He tells Clara she's going to see "one of the loveliest of lands—The Kingdom of Sweets."

He warns Clara, "We must go through a cold country to get there. But don't fear. I have a sleigh ready."

The snowflakes dance all around them, the sleigh bells ring, and the horses neigh as they whisk off to the "Kingdom of Sweets." On the way the Snow Queen and King appear and egg them on joyously.

The snowflakes finally stop falling and the cold white earth turns green and gay.

"Welcome to the Kingdom of Sweets," says a pleasant voice. "I am the Sugarplum Fairy and I have arranged a festival in your honor," she tells Clara. "My attendants will bring you cakes and candies from every part of the world and you'll be able to eat all you want without getting ill."

Then she informs Clara that the throne is hers while she is visiting and that she will be entertained by dancers from all nations.

The Sugarplum Fairy claps her hands and the drums roll.

"Chocolate!" cries an announcer. And a group of Spanish dancers perform variations of tangoes and fandangoes.

"Coffee!" cries the announcer again. And a troupe of Arabs exhibit their native measures.

"Tea!" the announcer shouts for a third time. And a group of Chinese trip delicately in front of the throne.

At this point, dancers from many other nations leap into action amid the strains of music from little people playing flutes and reed-pipes. Finally, all sorts of flowers join the melodious array of performers to dance in a grand waltz finale.

Clara is overwhelmed by this dazzle of undreamed-of delights. She alternately drifts from one beautiful moment to another until she finally falls asleep—to dream and dream and dream!

"The Nutcracker Suite" is definitely a work of grandeur. Again and again it melds artistry, music and fantasy for children, parents, sweethearts, even some "Scrooges," if

After searching in vain for a gift that looks like a million but doesn't crush your budget, do you decide that Scrooge had a point after all when he summed up this time of year as Bah, Humbug? Where, or where can you purchase the Christmas spirit anyway?

The Christmas spirit is alive and abundantly available at Valley View Farms in Cockeysville, Maryland. It lines the walls, covers the ceilings, dangles from branches, and shines in the eyes of sightseers and shoppers. Honest!

Right after Labor Day, the Foard family and their myriad staff begin setting up what is the **biggest** Christmas display on the East Coast! Inside Valley View's spacious building, the alcove lights begin to blink and bells chime; a forest of bushy trees springs up. Young girls spend hours winding miles of colored Italian lights around every twig of large tree branches. These are suspended from the ceiling (the branches, not the girls) to form a shimmering roof over all the glamorous trimmings and trappings below.

Remember the wooden dolls-within-dolls-within dolls? They come from Russia, along with carved bears that actually play ice hockey and wash their snouts at a pump.

If you have a dollar to spend, you have a large selection to contemplate. If you have \$5, or \$10, or anywhere in between, the same is true. Of course, if you insist, you can also buy a \$50 angel or an elaborate hand carved creche from Italy.

You may yearn for the 19th century music box on display, but its "not for sale" sign is firm. They'll play the music box for you, though, and you can watch carved musicians inside tapping silver bells.

Of the fifty countries represented in the International Christmas Shop, the leading source of handcrafted ornaments is Poland. Painted eggs, yarn creations, dolls in regional dress, or whatever, care was exerted in even the smallest detail of production. Under several layers of embroidered coats, skirts of hand loomed fabrics, the dolls wear neatly stitched underwear with lace trimming. The room next to the International Christmas Room is the International Gift Shoppe. Here are unusual gifts from 70 countries, including handmade jewelry from 47 countries. During a couple of hectic weeks last summer, Valley View Farms' buyers went to New York to visit 400 importers and 151 embassies. Through banter and bargaining Valley View succeeded in bringing to Cockeysville the most reasonably priced collection of imported goods to be found anywhere.

Chances are that even folks who "have everything" will find things they didn't know they didn't have!

You can buy long life and wisdom at Valley View. At least you can acquire a bracelet made of the hairs from an elephant's tail. The Cambodians claim that the wearer of such a bracelet is in a better position than other people to enjoy those two benefits.

If you never made a professional-looking centerpiece or door decoration, you can learn how at a demonstration lecture on the subject in Valley View's greenhouse. Or, if you are in a rush, you can buy a completed

arrangement of any kind. For that matter, it is possible, at this amazing emporium, to buy a completely decorated Christmas tree!

If the sight of all these delights stirs your appetite, you can enjoy a sandwich at the delicatessen. There's homemade soup to go with your sandwich and a great array of loaves of bread as well as salads, cheeses, smoked meats and assorted gastronomic accessories to take home.

Some people make special trips to Valley View from Pennsylvania and Virginia. Weekend sightseers and shoppers are so numerous that Valley View has to employ a special traffic cop to direct vehicles and pedestrians in and out.



Let Voices Be Raised!

Scribner Sets 17th Century "Nativity" to Music



Norman Scribner, conductor, recitalist, accompanist, musician and now — composer.

Musical Washington is familiar with the many accomplishments of Norman Scribner the conductor and Norman Scribner the keyboard recitalist, accompanist, and chamber musician. But not many Washingtonians are aware that Norman Scribner is also a serious composer who has spent the past six months fulfilling the requirements of a commission to write a full scale Christmas work for chorus, orchestra, and soloists.

The new piece is called "The Nativity" and is a setting of Richard Crashaw's great 17th century Christmas poem of the same name. The commission is from the Baltimore Choral Arts Society.

Theodore Morrison, Music Director of the Baltimore Choral Arts Society and Choral Director of the Peabody Conservatory, will conduct a 120 voice chorus with soloists Elaine Bonazzi, mezzo soprano, and John Aler, tenor. The orchestra will be composed of two distinguished ensembles, the Mostovoy Soloists of Philadelphia and the Satori Woodwind Quintet of the University of Delaware.

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Scribner said he approached his first major commission with great care and a profound respect for the poem he was to set to music. He spent more than a month studying and reflecting upon the one hundred lines of poetry which make up "The Nativity," deciding what kind of musical emphasis should be placed upon each segment of the poem in order to most effectively enhance its meaning.

Scribner spent more than a month studying . . . the 100 lines of poetry which make up "The Nativity."

Richard Crashaw (1613-1649) was an English convert to Roman Catholicism, and "The Nativity" reflects the depth of the poet's religious convictions as well as his mastery of language. It describes the Christ Child as the source of all light in the world and is considered by scholars to be Crashaw's finest work.

"Some parts of the poem," Scribner explained, "express the reverence and awe of the shepherds who were present on the

night Jesus was born. Other sections deal with the world and its response to the birth. And still others act as color and embroidery on the basic idea. Because the emotional and spiritual thrust of each segment is important to the whole, pacing is obviously an important factor for the composer." With this in mind, Scribner planned the structure of the entire fifty minute work before committing a single note to paper.

Scribner said he was pleased to have been asked to write for the Baltimore Choral Arts Society. "Mr. Morrison's chorus," he explained, "consists of light, clear voices who are capable of singing just about anything I should like to write, within their concept of choral sound, which is bright and European in character. And the Mostovoy orchestra is a spirited ensemble of instrumental soloists of the highest order."

"Mr. Morrison asked me to feature the Satori Woodwind Quintet, and that was a special pleasure for me," said Scribner, "since they had just premiered my Sextet for Winds and Piano at the Johns Hopkins University. The winds offer a wide variety of musical timbres that marvelously complement the string orchestra. And to further increase the colors of sound I have added piano, celéste, harp, two percussionists, and timpani."

The soloists assigned to the roles of the shepherds Tityrus and Thyrsis are wellknown vocalists. Elaine Bonazzi is renowned throughout the United States and Europe. On Christmas Eve she will be seen on CBS Television's premiere of Ezra Laderman's "A Handfull of Souls", and she is presently preparing for several other first performances of new works. John Aler has appeared many times with the Choral Arts Societies of Washington and Baltimore. He has sung major roles with the American Opera Centre, the Goldovsky Opera, and the Boston and Atlanta Symphony Orchestras.

Scribner has been organist-choirmaster at St. Alban's Episcopal Church for fifteen years and has been on the faculties of American University, George Washington University, and the College of Church Musicians. With the holiday season at hand, book lovers are attacking local book stores in search of the perfect gifts for those special someones. To make your selections easier, here's a list of 17 books that will make good gifts.

Unlike other gift book lists, this one is sensible: along with the expected expensive picture books, it contains some modestly-priced volumes that you can actually afford without going into hock.

Broadway (revised edition) by Brooks Atkinson, 564 pages, Macmillan, \$12.95.

Brooks Atkinson-dean of American theater, New York Times drama critic for thirty years, and the only drama critic to have a theater name for him. If anyone knows Broadway, he does. And in 564 pages of delightful prose, he gives a history of "The Great White Way"-the people, the theaters, the plays—from 1900 to just about the present. Full of photographs, this absorbing volume also contains a detailed index and, of course, the charm and wit of Brooks Atkinson.

Irving's Delight by Art Buchwald, 95 pages, David McKay Co., \$5.95.

At a recent American Booksellers Association luncheon, Morris the (television commercial) Cat got more applause and attention than author and columnist Art Buchwald. "Nuts to Watergate," he said, "they really want books about cats." And here is the result-a totally charming tale of the catnapping of Irving, advertising's most famous feline, and the adventures of getting her back. Irving's Delight is quick reading fun for lovers of Buchwald and cats. A pure delight.



"Laurel and Hardy" is everything a man could want.

Laurel & Hardy-text by John McCabe, compiled by Al Kilgore, filmography by Richard W. Bann, 400 pages, E. P. Dutton, \$19.95 until 1/76, \$25 thereafter.

'Though McCabe's writing leaves much to be desired, this encyclopedia of Laurel & Hardy is everything a man could want short of a complete collection of the films themselves. This guidebook, the authors explain, "is to serve largely as a focus of memory." A quick mental recreation of the films if you've seen them before, or a short preview if you've never had the pleasure. Complete

with listings of casts and crews, summaries of plots, hundreds of photographs and an analysis of each film (rated with from zero to four derbies), the volume preserves the essence of the comic duo. Laurel & Hardy come alive.

My Life In Pictures by Charles Chaplin, 320 pages, Grosset & Dunlap, \$19.95.

With his baggy pants, big shoes, derby hat, cane and small mustache, the innocent little Tramp shuffled across the screen and into our hearts. Now in his ninth decade, Chaplin has collected film posters, cartoons, drawings; black and white, sepia, and color photographs; scrapbook pages and a filmography to create a personally narrated tour of his life and works. On tour, he's a writer, director, actor, composer and producer. In the introduction, Francis Wyndham sums him up—"He is simply an entertainer." One of the best that ever lived.

Elvis In Hollywood by Paul Lichter, 188 pages, Simon and Schuster, \$12.95 (cloth), \$6.95 (paper).

This Elvis picture book is only for the diehard fanatic. If you love everything about the King of Rock and Roll, this slight collection of largely uncaptioned photos, copies of movie posters, and summaries of all his films is a dream come true. For the rest of us, it's a coffee table book that would get better use as part of the coffee table. This story of the rise of Presley is not bad, but the phenomenon called Elvis deserves a better job.

The Monopoly Book—Strategy and Tactics of the World's Most Popular Game by Maxine Brady, 144 pages, David McKay Co., \$5.95.

Monopoly fanatics rejoice! There is now an annotated rule book to solve your arguments, a strategy and tactics guide to give you a better chance of winning with just fair luck from the dice, a history of how the game started and where the cult is going, and a manual for dealing with players who cheat or have tantrums. All this is Maxine Brady's The Monopoly Book. It also contains numerous charts, diagrams, calculations, guides and tables showing the best ways to win. It's a welcome companion to the world's most popular board game.

Without Feather by Woody Allen, 211 pages, Random House, \$7.95.

Woody Allen's movies exhibit a very broad sense of humor. His essays and plays in this collection are satire-funny, but not in the same slapstick style as his movies. The best essay is "The Whore of Mensa." Here Allen tells of a private detective who investigates a ring of intellectual prostitutes who sell the products of their minds---"I don't want an involvement-I want a guick intellectual experience, then I want the girl to leave," says a customer. On a cold night, snuggle up with Without Feathers, the laughs will keep you warmer.

The Politician Primeval: From the Amoeba to the White House by Edgar Berman, 206 pages, Macmillan, \$6.95.

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Berman makes a humorous yet engaging case for political genetics—that politicians follow the findings of Darwin and Mendel, and are born and not made. While rightfully cutting down everyone involved in politics (voters, press, party hacks, political females and especially politicians), the talented heart surgeon and political satirist outlines his theories on the predetermination of political skill and preference.

Analyzing voters, he says "The National Institute of Mental Health estimates as many as six million red-blodded Americans with schizophrenic symptoms, nine million alcoholics, and many millions with anti-social behavior—all loose and able to vote. Sure, the voters can't be all bad, but allowing them to choose their leaders is like allowing the denizens of a nursery school to choose their teachers—which would unanimously be Chuckles the Clown."

The First World War In Posters as selected and edited by Joseph Darracott, 95 pages, Dover Publications, \$9.95.

A stern-looking patriotically costumed Uncle Sam points his finger straight at you and blasts, "I Want You For U.S. Army." The famous James Montgomery Flagg recruiting poster is just one of 75 black and white, and color posters from the United States, Great Britain, Austria-Hungary, Russia, Canada, Italy and Australia included in this beautiful collection. These are the best posters of the period including Alfred Leete's "Britons [Lord Kitchner pointing a finger] Wants You-Join Your Country's Army!", on which the famous Flagg poster was based; and Howard Chandler Christy's "Gee! I Wish I Were A Man. I'd Join The U.S. Navy," which today might disturb the women's liberationists. Here the poster's power of persuasion and communication is obvious.

"Godfrey Daniels!"—verbal and visual gems from the short films of W. C. Fields edited by Richard J. Anobile, 224 pages, Darien House/Crown, \$8.95.

By enlarging 800 frames from the original movies and adding the dialogue, Anobile has reconstructed Fields' best short films: "The Fatal Glass of Beer," "The Dentist," "The Pharmacist," and "The Barbershop." With his odd-ball language, full of nonsense and asides that almost no one understood, the bulb-nosed comic has presented himself as a totally unorthodox rascal with an outrageous sense of individuality. Seen "on screen as a braggart and a windbag, a coward and a schemer—and perpetually in need of or in search for a drink," the Fields characters will not easily be forgotten.

Kings of the Bs—Working Within The Hollywood System—an anthology of film history and criticism edited by Todd McCarthy and Charles Flynn, 561 pages, E. P. Dutton, \$12.50 (cloth), \$6.95 (paper).

The B movie. It was that **other** flick on the lower half (for obvious reasons) of the double bill that audiences demanded along with their cartoons, newsreels and previews of coming attractions. "Their utter disreputability," . . . "their bargain-basement budgets, and their single minded purpose:

to, make money," the editors wrote, are what most "schlock/kitsch/nack" movies had in common. Crowded with fascinating essays and interviews, and a filmography for 325 directors, this exhaustive examination of the products of Hollywood's factory days is a boon to film buffs who know that loving films is more than just looking at pictures.

Stop The Presses, I Want To Get Off!— Tales of the News Business from the Pages of (MORE) Magazine edited by Richard Pollak, 337 pages, Random House, \$8.95.

(MORE) editor Richard Pollak writes that the heart of the magazine's mission is "to embarrass the nation's media managers whenever they deserve it-and thus (with luck) to nudge change." He quickly adds that (MORE) also says good things about American journalism, and tries to have some fun. This is the best of those tales-Alexander Cockburn writing that what readers want in a free press is "dramatic descriptions of other people being killed:" "Anderson Price" (a Washingtonian in the know who leaks things to the press) writing "I'm the most reliable kind of source there is, because I do it just for fun"; and many other good journalists writing thought-provoking commentary.

I Am King—A Photographic Biography of Muhammad Ali by David King, pages not numbered, Penguin Books, \$4.95 (paper).

"I'm gonna float like a butterfly and sting like a bee, his [George Forman's] hands can't hit what his eyes can't see ... I am King. I am Champion of the World." That's Muhammad Ali, maker of creative wise remarks and good hard fights. The highly verbal champ has been captured in this collection of brilliant photographs and interviews with Ali and his associates. Most of the photos catch Ali either fighting or in a very typical pose—with his mouth wide open.

A Fine Mess!---Verbal and Visual Games from "The Crazy World of Laurel and Hardy," edited by Richard J. Anobile, 256 pages, Darien House/Crown, \$9.95.

Anobile's frame blow-up technique is used here to capture the Laurel and Hardy madness from the 1965 compilation film "The Crazy World of Laurel and Hardy." The more than 1,000 frame blow-ups froze famous comic antics and dialogue so they may be reviewed and studies over and over again. In this tradition of Anobile's film comedy series ("Why a Duck?, "Hooray for Captain Spaulding!"—Marx Brothers; "A Flask of Fields," "Godfrey Daniels!"—W. C. Fields; and "Who's On First?"—Abbott and Costello) this is another fine mess!

The MGM Story—The Complete History of Fifty Roaring Years by John Douglas Eames, 400 pages, Crown, \$19.95 until 12/31/75, \$25 thereafter.

Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, one of the great movie companies, created "That's Entertainment" to show off its 50 years of movie making. The film had scattered scenes from the best of MGM. **The MGM Story** is better. Here is a year by year chronicle, with words and mostly black and white pictures, of **every** film MGM made or distributed between 1924 and 1974. Each photo is accompanied by a mini-review and an abbreviated cast listing. The volume is tied together by a huge index to all MGM stars and all 1705 films. Now that's entertainment!


In Their Own Words—Twenty Successful Song Writers Tell How They Write Their Songs by Bruce Pollock, 231 pages, Macmillan, \$8.95.

Finally there is a book about the song writers of our day. Rock music writer Pollock has interviewed selected song writers of the last twenty years in an effort to try to find out how and why they write in their particular style. This brightly written volume is the result. With Pollock's introductory essays giving the sound and the feel of the times, these interviews allow readers to gain a basic understanding of several modern writers and their music.



An unusual and beautiful way to send Christmas cards is to send post cards from the various local galleries that print them. There certainly is no shortage of lovely cards to choose from.

Christmas card-senders seem to fall into certain categories. There are the ones who observe the primary reason for the season and send religious cards. There are the "Christmas-is-for-children" senders. These people rejoice in toys. There are Christmasis-for-music greeters who like musical instruments, singing groups, and—sometimes 40 FORECAST! —angels. There are those who rejoice in beauties of nature—which may or may not include landscapes but most certainly does include animals. Some people send cards to show the beauties of the towns they live in, and there are plenty of those to choose from. Others get stuck in one period of history—quite often Medieval or 18th century—and send cards representing that era. Medieval scenes seem to make people think of Christmas even when they are of haymakers in June.

Listed below are a very few (out of oh-somany) post cards that are available from the non-commercial galleries and museums in Washington. The regular suppliers of formal Christmas cards such as the Cathedral, the Library of Congress, the National Gallery, the Free Library of Philadelphia, The Walters Gallery in Baltimore, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, The Corcoran—all have their 1975 greetings ready. But for those who need to save a little money both on cards and on postage, here are some beautiful, beautiful cards to send and receive.

RELIGIOUS CARDS

From the National Gallery. "New Mexico Retablo: San Procopio," a 19th century watercolor rendering by Majel G. Claflin, from the Index of American Design. "Window with the Angel of the Annunciation," Florentine from the XV Century. An "Adoration of the Magi" by Giovanni di Paolo. Raphael's incredibly serene "Alba Madonna." Donatello's elegant and happy "Madonna and Child," and Fra Filippo Lippi's more subdued "Madonna and Child." A "Holy Family" by Giorgione, an "Adoration of the Magi" by Fra Angelico and Fra Filippo Lippi, and an "Annunciation" by Jan van Eyck—the angel has marvelously colored wings.



Celebrate

If you call the cathedral an Art Deco building, eyebrows raise. But then, Baltimore's Cathedral of Mary Our Queen has seen raised eyebrows throughout its relatively short history.

It's located in the 5200 block of North Charles Street—not hard to find since it takes up the whole block. The Cathedral's history, its architecture, and its music program are worthy of note at any time of the year. And at this time of year because of the Festival of Lessons and Carols presented on December 21 by the Cathedral Choir of Men and Boys.

Its geometric, pseudo-Navajo designs smack of the Art Deco.

Robert Twynham, Director of Music, has directed the Cathedral Choir since 1961. To this acoustically superb building he brought a background of musical training at Peabody Institute and the Paris Conservatory, laced with experience in Boston and South Baltimore youth groups. The Cathedral had no musical tradition at all, but that's not surprising since it was only a year old, infancy for a Cathedral.

Setting out to form a choir, Twynham auditioned 4th grade boys in the church-affiliated school. "All of them had to audition," Mr. Twynham said. "If they could carry a

tune in a bucket, they joined the Junior Choir." Randall Mullin, Associate Director of Music, takes on the task of teaching the youngsters to read music and develop their tone quality.


A problem for first year choristers is overcoming a reluctance to sing, according to Twynham. In the rest of the world, singing is as much a sport for boys and men as is football (or what have you). Some parents in this country worry that their boy will be considered weak or silly if he sings in a choir, he said.

"I can't wait for women to get liberated," sighed Twynham, "so that the men can finally feel free also." Meanwhile, he said, he's managed to dispell doubts in his young singers' minds about the virility of song.

The Junior Choir's training is rigorous. As they proceed up to the higher ranks of the Senior Choir, the boys pass strict examinations and, if successful, win the right to wear special medals. Graduates of the Junior Choir wear light blue ribbons around their necks, and a medal bearing an inscription and representation of the patron saint of singers, St. Nicholas. The inscription, in Latin, says "I will sing with the spirit and understanding also." Recipients of a dark blue ribbon are rated very good; those who are fantastic earn a red ribbon, and a special medal. The Cathedral Choir is affiliated with the grand-sounding Royal School of Church Music in England, which was founded in the 1920's.

Years in the Senior Choir give a boy not only mastery of sight reading and related skills, but in general a keen sense of professionalism. About eight hours a week are spent in rehearsal; in addition to singing during regular services, the choir also tours the city and the area giving special concerts.

The Festival of Lessons and Carols is derived from a monastic daily prayer form of the 19th century. Carols alternate with readings from the scriptures, appropriate to the Christmas season. It was perfected by the world famous choir at Kings College Chapel in Cambridge (England).

Twynham recalled that when the Kings College Festival is performed, broadcast live on radio, "everything in England stops to listen." It's a national event. He said he'd like to see this happen here—at least in Baltimore. In the meantime, a recording of the Festival of Lessons and Carols was made and may be purchased at the Cathedral.

The Cathedral had no musical tradition at all.

The first year the Festival was performed, 50 people came to hear it. Now its popularity is such that one would do well to be there an hour and a half early, in order to get a seat. Free concerts are given in the Cathedral from October through May. They include organ concerts, and pianists' performances, along with programs by visiting choirs. On January 2, at 8:15 pm the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra will fill the place with sounds of Haydn (this is the only concert in the Cathedral's season program requiring tickets); later, in March, the Cathedral will resound with the strains of the musical, "Oliver!".

"No," said Twynham, "it is not usual to have such an extensive and varied musical program in a Roman church."

But then this is not a usual Cathedral. It owes its existence to the stubborn Last Will and Testament of a Baltimore millionaire, Thomas O'Neill, who left funds for the building of a great cathedral. The story of the realization of O'Neill's wishes is told in a beautifully illustrated book available at the Cathedral.

Yes, the red ceiling with its geometric, pseudo Navajo designs smacks of the Art Deco. So do many of the sculpture details. Other sculptures, as well as the soaring lines of the main body of the cathedral, might be called "Contemporary Gothic".

The stained glass windows, seemingly acres of them, are contemporary. They splash their colors on the pale stone walls up to the ceiling, and bathe the side chapels in confusions of blue.

The organ, custom built for the Cathedral in Hagerstown, Md. by M. P. Moller, Inc. has been called one of the great organs of the Western Hemisphere. Solid and mighty as this stone-on-stone edifice is, you can still feel vibrations in the floor and walls when the organ grumbles in its deepest voice.

It's a warm, human cathedral. Its art records historical events, and persons; here and there are side comments on life such as the series of stained glass windows portraying the arts. And the reminders and monuments of suffering are presented with simplicity that gives them a universal message.

Washington, D.C. and New Orleans may appear to have little in common. Both, perhaps coincidently, have rivers flopping through their centers. Washington, unfortunately, failed to build a French Quarter, but recompensed Dixieland music fans by giving belated birth to the Potomac River Jazz Club.

It sounds like Bourbon Street on a Friday night, alcohol, loud and slightly sad.

The Potomac River Jazz Club (PRJC) is the rather innocuous name for some 700 people, mostly from the Washington-Maryland-Virginia area, who are admitted Dixieland addicts.

On September 20, over 300 of these club members gathered under the shade trees outside Max Blob's Park in Jessup, Maryland to listen to thirteen different bands play seven hours of classic jazz.

The 5th Annual PRJC Picnic was held in September to honor the birthday of "Jelly Roll" Morton, the famous New Orleans jazz pianist who, along with Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, is one of the "big names" of classic jazz.

Had he lived until 1975, he would have been 90 years old, and probably too cantakerous to sit patiently to seven entire hours of his kind of music, some played by good, tight bands. Even at the closing jam session, the people still clapped along between slurps from the beer truck which they steadily drained all afternoon. 44 FORECAST! Dixieland is enjoyable music, good-time music; it sounds like Bourbon Street on a Friday night, alcohol, loud and slightly sad.

The Dixieland Jazz sound which draws the largely suburban audience of the Potomac River Jazz Club away from their Saturday morning routines started, say jazz historians, in spots its present fans might find unsavory. Jelly Roll Morton and Louis Armstrong both acknowledged their early playing centered around Storyville, a semilegal redlight district in New Orleans after the turn of the century.

But Dixieland, 1975-style, is good, clean fun of the middle-class variety.

Dixieland music has come a long way in the D.C. area in the past few years, pushed along by the PRJC and cooperative disc jockeys from local stations.

Formed in the spring of 1971, PRJC espouses to promote and preserve classical jazz. Whether or not it can be successful in preserving that kind of music in years ahead, it does gather lots of people together who show no shame at having a good time.

Not all the Jazz Club members are mere spectators of jazz. Several, like Gary Martine, of Arlington, confided their earlier days of playing in jazz groups, giving it up to work 9 to 5, and turning back to the music to stave off post-retirement blues.

The bands (with names like the Basin Street Jazz Band, the Original Washington Monumental Jazz Band, and Southern Comfort) which shuffled on and off the makeshift stage for the PRJC picnic seemed familiar to the audience. Most of them, composed of the Jazz Club members, play regularly at one of the weekly jam sessions sponsored here in D.C. by the club (see box).

Most of the players are semi-pros, men who work another job but play Dixieland Jazz whenever they can find a paying gig. Some are retired professionals such as "Wild Bill" Whelan, who was the band leader at Georgetown's Bayou Club, when jazz was served there instead of hard rock.

Wild Bill played trumpet there until a burst blood vessel felled him and the medicos made him slow down. But, he doesn't always heed that medical advice and played some frantically enthusiastic horn for appreciative Jazz Clubbers at their picnic.

Washington is fast becoming the classic jazz capitol of the Northeast.

Some of the picnic audience came from out-of-town to find music which they couldn't locate at home. Jim Fitzroy, a husky, bearded 30-ish Philadelphian complained "You just can't find this music in Philly, and that's unbelievable in an area with 4 million people."

Though Dixieland doesn't seem to have made it to Philadelphia, several listeners at the Jazz Club gathering swore it had survived the transatlantic crossing to England. Sue Fitzroy, who grew up in postwar London, began listening to the music when American neighbors in her family's flat played Dixieland jazz, "24 hours a day."

Now the British threaten to usurp one of America's few native art forms. At this year's First Annual World Championship of Jazz, held in Indianapolis, Indiana, an English group, the Max Collie Rhythm Aces, was picked as the best traditional jazz band in the business.

Even as traditional jazz spreads to other countries, Dixieland is enjoying a revival in American circles and Washington is becom-

ing the classic jazz capital of the Northeast. Four years ago, when the PRJC was formed, the only Dixieland around was an occasional group playing at Blues Alley, haven for local jazz buffs.

Now, area residents can find live Dixieland almost any night of the week or hear it on any of several radio stations. The club president, Edwin Fishel, who doubles as a casual cigar-smoking piano player with The Band From Tin Pan Alley, still calls the more-than-700 members "an underground, an insignificant number among the three million Washingtonians."

This underground may be recruiting new, younger members in the nostalgia-crazed Seventies. One of the newer events sponsored by the PRJC, a Sunday evening Dixieland Jazz session in the Pub at Georgetown University, has had overflow crowds in recent months.

Whether the kids really like the music or its obvious camp value, the crowds are growing.

This could be the year for Dixieland in the District. The "ragtime" songs of Scott Joplin, from nearly the same period of time, have blossomed into the public spotlight in the last few years. "Ragtime," a new book destined to be a best-seller, is attaching itself to coffee tables across America.

If you need music to read "Ragtime" by, tune in a Dixieland program or get in touch with the Potomac River Jazz Club. They are still in touch with those "good old days."

Say It Again, Harry!

There's a unique library and museum on the eighth floor of the National Archives Building at 8th and Pennsylvania. It's the Audio-Visual Section, which serves as custodian of some 70,000 recordings made since the beginning of the century, and an even greater number of still photographs and films.

While the recorded sound section of the Library of Congress concentrates on music, the Archives' recordings are nearly all of speech, mostly of persons prominent in

public affairs for the last three-quarters of a century.

"Our charter provides that we document the role of government in people's lives," says Leslie Waffen, the curator of the collection. "Until recently, the people in charge of the Audiovisual Section took that charge fairly literally, but it's open to more liberal interpretations now."

The collection includes not only some extremely rare tape and disc recordings (including a set of metal stampers containing speeches by Mussolini), but wire recordings, dictabelts of World War II propaganda broadcasts from Germany and Japan, sound recordings on film and even videotapes. To play them, the Audiovisual Section maintains its own museum of reproducers, including an Edison cylinder machine, an early Magnecord PT-6 tape recorder, Brush Soundmirror wire recorder and other goodies.

And because the entire collection belongs to you, the taxpayer, it's available to you upon request. If you walk in off the street, you may be disappointed because the particular recording you want to hear isn't available in a form so that you can hear it, Waffen cautions, so it's best to phone a specific request ahead. For those items which have been transferred to audio tape (or which were recorded on audio tape in the first place), you can simply walk into the Archives, get yourself a researcher's pass, go up to Waffen's eighth floor hideaway and order the particular recording you want to hear. A technician then shows ycu to a booth, sets up the tape and leaves you alone to enjoy the voices of yesterday.

Just what sort of things are available? There are the complete arguments before the Supreme Court since 1955, 'including such major cases as Miranda, the one-manone-vote case and others. There are the voices of all the presidents since William McKinley and the proceedings of the Nuremberg War Crimes Trials. There are videotapes of every CBS Evening Newscast since April 1, 1974, and a complete day's programming from WJSV one day in September, 1939. That project alone occupies 19 hours' worth of transcriptions, and includes everything from Arthur Godfrey's sign-on in

the morning until the big band remote broadcast which closed the schedule for the day.

The National Archives are a repository of papers, documents and records that other federal agencies no longer want. Beginning in the 1930s, the Agriculture Department, Navy Department and others began turning over films, still photographs and sound recordings along with their dead paper files. At first, the Archives merely stored audiovisual materials, not knowing what else to do with them. In the 1960s, however, specialists began to catalogue and file these materials. More recently, they've made an effort to make them more readily available to researchers and the general public.

"We don't take our charter quite as literally as they did a decade or so ago," Waffen explains. "At that time, there were a number of recordings from the Agriculture Department in the files explaining various programs and giving tips on getting more corn to the acre. Those recordings clearly fell within our charter, and they are in the collection. But the estate of Fulton Lewis Jr. offered us a number of recordings of his broadcasts-many of them critical of the Agriculture Department and of the programs mentioned in our recordings. The person in charge at the time decided that those broadcasts didn't fall within our charter, and rejected them. I hate to think how many other good things we let get away for the reason that they were not produced by the government. We take a much broader view now."

Waffen, who has a master's degree in history, is one of four people on the audiovisual section staff. Another is the technician who presides over the extensive collection of recording and playback equipment. Listeners to WAMU in August heard Waffen providing background details for the nine hours worth of news broadcasts covering V-J Day in 1945— donated to the Archives by NBC and broadcast by special permission. NBC and WJSV (now WTOP) are only two of a number of private donors whose gifts have enriched the Archives, and whose permission must be obtained before Waffen or his staff can make copies of their material for others.

Researchers or the merely curious who are unable to visit Washington can ask for tape copies of anything in the Archives. If the program in question was an outright gift an Office of War Information broadcast during World War II, for example; or in the public domain (a Presidential speech), the Service makes them available on open reel tape at a charge of about \$7.50 per half hour. Duplication is done on $1\frac{1}{2}$ mil mylar tape at $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches per second, open reel. If the program in question is restricted, the Service will still duplicate it for youprovided you get permission in writing for them to do so. Waffen's staff will tell you whom to contact, but the responsibility for getting clearance—and notifying the Archives that you have done so—is up to you.

Yesterday's trash is tomorrow's nostalgia.

Washingtonians have an advantage over their out-of-town cousins. Not only can they hear any recording in the collection on demand; they can bring in their own recording devices and make their own tape copies without cost from any unrestricted recording in the collection. The same rules regarding restricted material apply: you may listen but not copy without permission. Once you convince Waffen's staff that you have permission, you may also copy.

The NBC broadcasts aired by WAMU are part of the pride of the Archives' sound collection—recordings dealing with World War II. Not only are complete speeches by Hitler, Mussolini, Franklin Roosevelt, Winston Churchill, Madame Chiang Kai-Shek and other wartime leaders available, but there are broadcasts by Joseph Goebbels, Tokyo Rose, Axis Sally, Ignace Jan Paderewski, Charles Lindbergh, Elmer Davis and others. In addition to the NBC VJ-Day broadcasts, there are D-Day newscasts from CBS, Pearl Harbor newscasts and other items.

The World War II section even includes such GI favorites as Command Performance and Mail Call, two stellar series produced in Hollywood during the 1940s for Armed Forces Radio Service. "We don't ordinarily take entertainment programs, and if these series became available to us in their entirety, we probably wouldn't take them," Waffen observes. "But these shows were very much a product of their time. They featured every big-name entertainer in Hollywood at the time, and they were produced for a government agency. So we keep several examples." Although performers like Kay Kyser, Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Dinah Shore, Tommy Dorsey, the Ink Spots and others donated their services for the broadcasts, they are on the restricted list "because we don't want to run the risk of having commercial use made of them," Waffen explains.

Command Performance and Mail Call aren't the only entertainment programs to be found in the collection, "although we're not building a library of music or entertainment." Other series donated to the collection include Here's to Veterans, produced by the Veterans' Administration and distributed to U.S. commercial radio stations during the late 1940s, and Treasury Star Parade and Guest Star, both produced by the Treasury Department on behalf of savings bonds during the same period. All three series featured big-name radio talent from the period in short plays, concerts of pop or classical music, with a pitch for defense bonds and hiring the handicapped GI.

More typical of the material donated by governmental agencies are "Uncle Sam Calling," the story of the 1940 Census, produced for domestic radio stations by the Bureau of the Census; Meet Your Navy, a similar series produced during World War II by the Office of the Chief of Naval Op-

The Cream of the Classical Crop

by robert e. benson

Here's **Forecast**'s yearly list of the cream of the classical crop with the accent on quality of reproduction. Any of these should delight the audiophiles who might be on your Christmas list. In their own ways all of these records are something special in both performance and sonic quality. As the sound of a symphony orchestra is the best way to show off equipment, most of the discs on this list feature the orchestra with added percussion, choruses and soloists. You can't go wrong if you put any of these under the tree.

BERLIOZ: Fantastic Symphony, Op. 14; Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra conducted by Colin Davis; Philips 6500 774, \$7.98.

Each year we have several new recordings of this dramatic symphony. Davis' new version is even better than last year's Ozawa-Boston Symphony LP on Deutsche Grammophon. The mighty Concertgebouw Orchestra seldom has been so vividly recorded.

RAVEL: Daphnis and Chloe (complete ballet); Cleveland Orchestra and Chorus conducted by Lorin Maazel; London CS 6998, \$6.98.

A lustrous interpretation of Ravel's glowing score, brilliantly played by one of America's finest orchestras and stunningly recorded. The dynamic range of this recording is outstanding.

KORNGOLD: The Dead City, Op. 12; Carol Neblett, René Kollo, Hermann Prey and others with the Munich Radio Orchestra and Chorus conducted by Erich Leinsdorf; RCA Victor ARL3-1199, \$20.94.

The problems of recording the large orchestra, chorus, soloists, bells and organ in this neglected opera have been stunningly solved. The opera itself is hauntingly beautiful and makes a welcome recording premiere in this excellent 3-LP album.

"CITIZEN KANE": National Philharmonic 48 FORECAST! Orchestra conducted by Charles Gerhardt; RCA Victor ARL1-0707, \$6.98.

This LP contains music by Bernard Herrmann written for the films **On Dangerous Ground, Citizen Kane, Hangover Square, White Witch Doctor** and **Beneath the Twelve Mile Reef.** The augmented orchestra consists of the top players in London; their playing is incredible. Herrmann's colorful scoring gives RCA's engineers plenty of opportunity for sonic fireworks. The first cut on side one, "Death Hunt," is my current favorite display piece.

SCRIABIN: The Poem of Ecstasy, Op. 54; Czech Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Leopold Stokowski; London Phase Four SPC 21117, \$6.98.

Recorded during a concert in Prague in 1972, this Scriabin shows Stokowski's talents at their peak. He identifies perfectly with the score, which has never before sounded quite as voluptuous. The LP also contains Rimsky-Korsakov's Capriccio Espagnole and a Dvorak Slavonic Dance in arbitrary readings, but the Scriabin alone is worth the price of the LP.

WAGNER: Overture and Venusberg Music from Tannhauser; Prelude to Act I of Lohengrin; Prelude and Love-Death from Tristan and Isolde; Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Herbert von Karajan; Angel 37097, \$6.98.

This LP sets new sonic standards for the magnificent Berlin Philharmonic, which here sounds massively powerful. I've never before heard the Venusberg Music played as well as it is here. This is Volume I in a projected Wagner series for Angel; Volume II, already issued (S 37098), unfortunately is not as good technically as the first LP.

BEETHOVEN: Symphony No. 5 in C Minor, Op. 67; Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Carlos Kleiber; Deutsche Grammophon 2530 516, \$7.98.

After an exciting Der Freischutz disc debut the son of the famous Erich offers this re-

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sounding performance of Beethoven's most popular symphony, beautifully played and clearly recorded. This is just about the most expensive recording of this music in the catalog, but well worth the expense, deserving an honored spot next to Erich's incredible version with the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra recorded by Decca-London more than two decades ago.

SIBELIUS: Symphony No. 5 in E Flat, Op. 82; Symphony No. 7 in C, Op. 105; Boston Symphony Orchestra conducted by Colin Davis; Philips 6500 959, \$7.98.

Davis' recording debut with the Boston Symphony marks the first Philips recording of this orchestra, and the results are marvelous. Every facet of these scores is powerfully developed, and the Philips engineers have done an absolutely magnificent job. This is a most auspicious beginning of a projected Sibelius cycle with the same orchestra and conductor.

CHOPIN: Etudes, Op. 10 and 25; Vladimir Ashkenazy, pianist; London CS 6844, \$6.98.

These twenty-four Etudes contain the quintessence of Chopin. The highly-charged emotions of many of these studies, and their sheer beauty make them far more than mere digital exercises. Ashkenazy's performance is a rare combination of insight and coruscating virtuosity, with a fantastic range of coloring and dynamics,

"GOLDEN DANCE HITS OF 1600": Archive 2533184.

Here is a collection of no less than 36 French, German and Italian dances, performed by Collegium Terpsichore and Ulsamer Collegium, specialists in this repertory. It's all delightful to the ear, and the liner notes even give step-by-step instructions on how to dance the "tangel," popular in France during the early seventeenth century.

ORFF: Carmina Burana; Judith Blegen, soprano; Kenneth Riegel, tenor; Peter Binder, baritone; Cleveland Orchestra, Chorus and Boys Choir; Michael Tilson Thomas conducting; Columbia M 33172, \$6.98.

A brilliant individual approach to Orff's vivid cantata, orchestrally and vocally scintillating and recorded with remarkable impact. I know of no other recording of this score that presents a stronger case for it.

SCHONBERG: Pelleas and Melisande, Op. 5; Transfigured Night, Op. 4; Variations for Orchestra, Op. 31; **BERG:** Three Orchestral Pieces, Op. 6; Three Pieces from Lyric Suite. **WEBERN:** Passacaglia for Orchestra, Op. 1; Five Movements, Op. 5; Six Pieces for Orchestra, Op. 6; Symphony, Op 21; Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Herbert von Karajan; Deutsche Grammophon 2711 014, 4 records, \$31.92.


This deluxe collection of music of the Vienna School is the product of much time and effort from Karajan and his orchestra. Some listeners will find Pelleas and Melisande far more "listenable" than most of the other music in the set, but it is all presented with the ultimate in precision and virtuosity. According to Karajan, the engineers have produced a sonic atmosphere that is "an imaginary sound which was never known to be heard in concert halls," and indeed they almost have.

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The latest excitement in Audio Expo's theater of sound is the new line of AR speakers. The AR 10TT's represent a significant breakthrough in speaker technology. erations; Cabinet Series, a talk show produced by the Office of Government Reports featuring Franklin D. Roosevelt as host, with members of the Cabinet as guest panelists; Your AAF in Action, a series devoted to the glorification of the Army Air Force, and more.

The Audiovisual Section's major failing lies in its catalogue. There hasn't been a formal one of the entire collection since 1972, when the number of items was approximately 47,000. That catalogue, consisting of 30 single-spaced typewritten pages, left a lot to be desired in Waffen's opinion, but it was better than nothing. There is a handsome 16-page printed catalogue featuring selected recordings from the World War II portion of the collection. It includes an order form for tape copies, a list of prices and a specification of restrictions on certain items. But today's working catalogue for the entire collection is a file cabinet in Waffen's office containing hundreds of thousands of index cards. "We're working on updating the catalogue and publishing a comprehensive one, but it's all a matter of money. We have a number of demands on our budget, and cataloguing is merely one of them."

Since there's no complete catalogue, researchers residing outside the Washington area must first write Waffen to determine whether the collection includes the specific recording they're hunting—or to inquire what recordings there are in their area of interest.

The Archive tries to maintain a constant temperature and humidity in the stacks— 70 degrees and 50 per cent—considered the optimum for storage of film, records and tape. While sound recordings tend to deteriorate less rapidly than film, they do deteriorate, and the Audiovisual Archives Service must be on guard to protect them. "We have no systematic program of rerecording," Waffen admits, "although we do try to rewind each reel of tape at least once a year to guard against print-through, and we do make visual inspections of our older, more fragile recordings at least once every two years." What the staff looks for is oxide flaking on recording tape, particularly a problem with early polyester-based tapes; and peeling of the coating from some transcriptions. Some of the discs donated to the Archives have glass bases, and must be handled very carefully to avoid breakage.

Gradually, however, recordings on the more exotic mediums like wire, cylinders and dictabelts are being transferred to the more manageable medium of tape. If the staff finds a disc, cylinder or wire recording suffering the effect of old age, they'll transfer it to tape. If you ask to hear one of the Mussolini broadcasts, they'll make the necessary transfer from the metal stamper to tape, then file the tape copy for future use. Eventually, there will be safety tape copies of every item in the collection.

Waffen winces at the suggestion that the audiovisual library he presides over is the result of scavenging other peoples trashparticularly the waste of other governmental agencies-though in a candid moment he'll concede that's the case. "We don't take just anything, though," he notes. "Whenever we get word that a federal agency is planning to clean house and has a number of sound recordings, films or photographs it's planning to get rid of, we send over an appraiser who decides what to save and what to throw out. If it deals with the role of the federal government and is visual or aural, generally we'll request it-provided it isn't a duplicate of something we already have." The result is that at any given time, there are literally hundreds of recordings awaiting appraisal, cataloguing and filing.

The National Archives are only too well aware that yesterday's trash is tomorrow's nostalgia—and the stuff of which doctoral theses are made years hence. For that reason, the staff takes great care in what it selects for preservation. "When he left office, nobody wanted a recording of Harry Truman's voice at any price," says a Waffen co-worker. "Today he's a pop hero, and thanks to Les' work, you can hear dozens of recordings by him and by all the other presidents."



Saturnalia was followed shortly by Kalends, a celebration of the new year. At Kalends, houses were decorated with lights and greenery. A Greek philosopher who happened to be in town for Kalends one year noted that during these days people were seized with an uncontrollable mania for spending. Even the most miserly were so afflicted.

In the days and lands of barbarians winter festivals were more or less loosely linked to the winter solstice. Lighting fires and, later, lighting candles served to symbolize the hoped-for return of the sun which at that time was furthest from the Earth.

Plants were involved in winter rituals, especially straw which was thrown around the house and fields to suggest to Mother Nature a fertile harvest in the next year. The Druids were excited about mistletoe since they felt it was endowed with healing and life-giving powers. Holly and ivy were somehow identified as masculine and feminine, respectively, in Merrie Olde England's carols, and holly was useful to have around the house because witches hate it.

The nature of the winter solstice is dual. You're frightened because it's the darkest time of the year; you're glad because from then on it's going to get lighter each day. This explains the old custom of a good guy and a bad guy running around town together.

In Alsace in days of yore a young girl with flour all over her face skipped from house to house ringing a silver bell and carrying candy in a basket. Close on her heels came the terrible Hans Trapp dressed in bearskin and carrying a stick. This chap would have trounced all the naughty little children were it not that the good maiden stopped him every time.

Elsewhere the good guy was a man dressed in straw, named Ruprecht, or he was called Christmann and wore white ribbons. Christmann's sidekick was Schimmelreiter who raced ahead to each house where he immediately jumped over a chair.

Ruprecht's good image and straw outfit was lost in Lower Austria where he accompanied St. Nicholas on his rounds. Instead, Ruprecht lurked in doorways, dressed in animal skin, and his eyes glowed in the dark. He didn't do anything much except glow and drool a bit.

The obvious cure for darkness is light. Hence all the bonfires, candle processions, etc. of winter festivals. Imagine, though, that it's very early in the morning of December 13 and you're fast asleep in bed in Sweden. You hear something, open one eye and see Saint Lucy standing there. She's wearing a white dress with a red sash and on her head is a crown of wortleberry twigs and nine burning candles. This walking fire hazard offers you a cup of coffee and launches into song. You're supposed to be so happy to see her that you immediately get up and dance.

Saint Lucy has counterparts in many other lands and traditions of course.

A charming personage of light was the Star-Singer of Tyrol. He appeared in groups of 52 FORECAST! three, and carried a golden star at the end of a long pole. In exchange for a song, or a dramatic presentation, the Star-Singer got something to eat, or a gift. He was often asked to run around the house and fields first, since that was supposed to be good for next season's crops. The star at the end of the pole was replaced, in some regions, with lighted candles carried in paper lamps.

Someday a treatise on ancient and amusing traditions may include a description of Santa Claus, U.S.A. No tramping from house to house for him, knocking at the door and all that. He whips through the air laughing, and slithers up and down millions of chimneys in one night, delivering packages that he stuffs into old socks. One of the horned animals that pulls his vehicle through the air has a permanently inflamed nose that is the subject of song.

The great universal tradition we all share, in whatever form, is that of having a merry time. Therefore, to you and yours, best wishes for a MERRY SOLSTICE!

you will, into a blend of Christmas tinsel that can't help touch the hearts of everyone.

The Washington Ballet Company is making the Tchaikovsky opus come to life once more during this Christmas season. It is, moreover, as the Milton Cross books points out, "not only one of Tchaikovsky's cornerstones of musical culture and world music. It is at the same time a creative encyclopedia to which every Russian composer has reference in the course of his own work."

One more look at the Washington Ballet Company . . .

The school itself is academic in nature, but includes a program that is dance oriented. There are about 100 students taking classes and they range from the seventh grade level to high school.

As for the dancing part of the curriculum, the school has three large rehearsal studios —with mirrors and bars all around—where the youngsters can perform and perfect their "arabesques and attitudes." Founder of the school and the ballet company is Mary Day, a Washingtonian who, in Baernstein's words, "is the best teacher of academics and ballet in the country."

Because the Washington Ballet Company is doing 29 performances of "The Nutcracker," three separate casts are performing the classic opus, Baernstein said.

"This is to ease the hardships that might occur during the long run of the show," he says. "After all, it's a real endurance thing for the youngsters and just one cast of characters wouldn't do."

He was talking about the youngsters, of course, from the ballet school. The guest artists who'll portray the leading roles will be performing throughout the run of the show.

They include Jeremy Blanton, from the National Ballet of Canada; Kevin McKenzie, the Joffe Ballet, of New York; and Lydia Diaz-Cruz, the Miami Ballet. The first two are dancing as cavaliers; the latter is the Sugarplum Fairy. As Baernstein walked us through the Wisconsin Avenue building, we came upon the "Call Board" in one of the corridors.

It listed the days and times for rehearsals of the several segments in the play. One was marked for the "green military dolls" and listed which studio they'd be rehearsing. Another was for the "Snow Corps," and still another for the "Sugarplum variation," then a time and day for the Spanish and Arab dancers, the soldiers and mice, and finally, the "Corp of Flowers."

"'The Nutcracker' is a full-staged production including costumes, scenery and orchestra," Baernstein said. "It's a real test each year, but we all love it."

"I've been in this sort of thing for many, many years now," he said, "But you never lose your enthusiasm for it, especially where the 'Nutcracker' is concerned. How can you when you're dealing with some 100 to 125 people, young and old, and especially the little tots who are among the large cast for the dance sequences."

Baernstein comes by his love for the ballet company and ballet itself by his long background. Before hitting the Washington scene he was assistant manager of the Baltimore Symphony, assistant manager of the Lyric Theater in Baltimore and company manager of the once-active National Ballet Company of Washington.

Why is "The Nutcracker" so popular with everyone?

Baernstein explains emphatically:

"First it is a Christmas story. Second, it has children in it. Third, it not only appeals to children, but to adults as well.

"Then there is the glitter of the production itself and its aggressive, yet beautiful music." And finally, he added, "'The Nutcracker' is a tradition!"







NEWS FROM THE STATIONS

WAMU. Out of 170 public radio stations surveyed by the American Research Bureau, WAMU ranked 16 in size of audience.

The survey, taken during April/May of this year, shows 45,600 weekly listeners to WAMU in the Washington metropolitan area. The survey did not include outlying areas in West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania reached by WAMU's signal.

The ARB's survey showed that during the survey period, 3,263,400 people tuned in public radio during an average week. The public radio stations surveyed are located throughout the United States and are all members of the National Public Radio network. About 75% of the public radio stations are licensed to colleges and universities.

WAMU, reached its \$50,000 public fundraising goal in October as a result of a 161-hour round-the-clock radio marathon.

This marked the station's fifth successful annual fund drive.

To reach the marathon goal, WAMU listeners invested almost \$7,000 in the last five hectic hours of the fund-drive.

Close to 65 percent of the station's contributors were new listeners, with 35 per cent renewing their support to the station. While the bulk of pledges came from all 54 FORECAST! over the Baltimore-Washington area, a substantial number of pledges came from as far away as Beaufort, N.C., western Pennsylvania, and Charlottesville, Va. where WAMU is carried on the Jefferson cable system.

Listener support accounts for about 30 per cent of WAMU's operating budget. The marathon funds will go to support the station's program service in its diversified 24-hour format. With 86 per cent of the program service produced in WAMU studios, listener pledges will support quality improvement for each program segment.

Five special vintage radio broadcasts will highlight WAMU's December schedule of holiday programming. At 9 pm, Sunday, December 21, "Recollections" host John Hickman will rebroadcast a special NBC holiday program, "What Christmas Means To Me." The show features Helen Hayes, Frank Sinatra, Tyrone Power, and a galaxy of Hollywod's greatest stars offering their views on Christmas.

Hickman will also host his annual "Christmas Eve Recollection," 7 pm, Wednesday, December 24, featuring complete holiday programs by Phil Harris and Alice Faye, Amos 'n' Andy, The Great Gildersleeve, Lionel Barrymore, Bing Crosby, Lum 'n' Abner, Morgan Beatty and Paul Whitman.

Other special holiday offerings include John Meston's original story, "Twelfth Night", to be heard on Gunsmoke, at 9:30 pm, December 17, with William Conrad starring as Marshal Matt Dillon. The Du-Pont Chorus will be featured in a special program of carols on "The Cavalcade of America" at 7 pm, December 21.

On New Year's Eve, WAMU will again present the "All Star Parade of Bands", featuring dance band remotes by some of the best bands of the 1930's and 1940's. Among those heard will be Glenn Miller, Harry James, Tommy Dorsey, Count Basie, Vincent Lopez, and The World's Greatest Jazz Band. "The All Star Parade of Bands" will also feature NBC commentators Ben Grauer and Bob Wilson as they report directly from Times Square on the arrival of 1976. The program will be hosted by John Hickman and begins at 9:30 pm New Year's Eve and runs until 2 am.

Some program changes also highlight WAMU's December schedule. "Voices in the Wind", NPR's arts magazine, moves from 11 am Monday mornings to 10:30 am as a continuing feature of "Kaleidoscope." David Eccleston's "90 Minutes 'til Lunch" leaves the air in December as a regular feature of "Kaleidoscope" and will be replaced with a new feature presented Tuesdays and Thursdays at 10:30 am entitled "Science Report", also produced by David Eccleston. "Washington Review of the Arts" moves to 10:30 am Fridays and Irma Aandahl will be host of a new weekly series entitled "Lifestyle" heard at 11 am Fridays.

WETA. This month WETA will broadcast the 1975 Salzburg Festival, one of the major musical events of the Foreign Festival Concert series, throughout our regular programming schedule. Highlights include: The London Symphony directed by Andre

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Previn, Seiji Ozawa, and Karl Boehm; The Vienna Philharmonic, conducted by Riccardo Muti; The Vienna Symphony under the direction of Carlo Maria Giulini; and the Mozart operas plus a new production of Verdi's Don Carlos. Featured soloists: Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Leontyne Price, Emile Gilels, Alexis Weissenberg, and Leonard Bernstein.

On Decembr 24, from 10 to 11 pm, WETA-FM-TV will offer a locally produced simulcast featuring the Paul Hill Chorale in a program of American music.

"In Concert" will feature the Philadelphia Orchestra's performance of Handel's "Messiah" at 9 pm, December 23.

On December 25 Johann Sebastian Bach's "Christmas Oratorio" will be heard during "AM" featuring the Bavarian Radio Chorus and Orchestra conducted by Eugen Jochum. Following the performance practices of early 18th-century Leipzig, WETA will broadcast each of the six cantatas on the day specified in the manuscript during "AM" and "Classical Weekend" programs until the last is reached on Epiphany, January 6.

In addition, Steve Ember will present a two-week Noel Coward Festival on "PM", starting Monday, December 8 and running each day except Wednesday through December 19.

And don't forget Steve Ember's annual Year-End Operetta Twin-Bill on the "Saturday Show," at 1 pm December 27, featuring two complete performances: Strauss' "Die Fledermaus," and Lehar's "The Merry Widow."

WETA's fund-raising marathon this year brought in more than \$96,000. According to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, this is the largest amount ever raised by a public radio station in the marathon's timespan. The amount added up to approximately \$1,000 raised by the station for each hour of the marathon!

WGAY. 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



Special Beethoven programming will be heard on Dec. 15, in celebration of the birthday of the composer who has become the symbol of WGMS and their fine arts programming.

The Christmas traditions as celebrated by the diverse groups who came to this land and the singularly American tradition which evolved will be explored. Join the Boston Symphony Orchestra each Sunday afternoon at 2 pm with music from both standard and modern repertoire. A special intermission feature explores some of the fine Bicentennial projects or writings.

On December 29, WGMS will present the 4th in its series "200 Years of American Music." With the special assistance of guest producer Jon Newsom, head of the Music Reference Department at the Library of Congress, WGMS presents "From Minstrelcy to Ives."

Each Monday evening at 10 pm Allegheny Airlines sponsors "Music of America," a program in which the rich treasures of the American composers, past and present are explored.

At 10 pm on Dec. 6, WGMS will present the Washington premiere of the Gabriel von Wayditch opera, "The Caliph's Musician." Also on December 6, WGMS will present the opening of the Metropolitan Opera's new season at 2 pm, Verdi's "Un Ballo in Maschera," and continue throughout December with Bizet's "Carmen," Mozart's "Cosi fan Tutte" and Humperdinck's "Hansel and Gretel."

WITF. WITF will bring its listeners a new production of an enduring radio classic, "The Man Born to Be King," a cycle of 12 plays on the life of Jesus Christ, written for the BBC by Dorothy L. Sayers, a noted





Profile: Joe Spicer



Sharing Classics With Special Style

What do you say when you're the host of a morning classical program and there's been "dead air" for a sustained amount of time? "You say something like we've just been listening to a selection from John Gage's 'Silence'," Joe Spicer laughs.

That laugh is the key to Spicer's popularity on the "Daybreak" and "Afternoon Serenade" programs on WGTS-FM — Spicer doesn't take himself all that seriously if a mistake is made.

"I listen to other stations . . . other people who are really embarrassed when they make a mistake," he says, "but I don't know . . . it makes me feel they're human, too."

That's the tip-off—the fact that Spicer thinks in terms of individuals. He doesn't treat his audience as though he were the expert on classical music and they the novices. He'll tell his listeners that maybe he'll be listening to a selection for the first time or that, perhaps, they may have known a fact about a work that he has just learned. But, throughout the program he's aware that "there are listeners who know much more than I do about music."

Sometimes, he says, he does make a mistake in his commentary about the recordings. Just recently, he recalled, he introduced Richard Strauss' "Ein Heldenleben" as the last tone poem written by the composer. The phone rang almost immediately in the studio. A listener wanted to tell him that 'No, he was wrong,' that there are other later ones by the composer.

Spicer likes that kind of feedback; in fact, he encourages it. Not only does he then know that "someone out there is listening," but that there are people who are interested in what's being played and said.

"It's a lonely feeling, early in the morning, being the only one in the studio. And, when someone calls me, they get me at that time of the morning. No one's in the place and I answer the phone personally." 58 FORECAST! Spicer has come up with some interesting statistics about his listening and calling audience. The first hour, the 6-7 am time frame, most of the calls are from women.

Then, for the next hour, it's the men who call and the hour between 8-9 am when they have a book reviewed he hears from many librarians.

Spicer likes to key his music into the mood of his audience. He does his own selecting of the music and he'll try to tie it into what's happening that day be it along political, weather, or general lines.

Once a year he goes through his entire musical library and then selects pieces for the program. Using that as a core, he fills in with shorter works, trying to select compositions that aren't too heavy or too light.

Spicer does his morning program live and tapes his afternoon show. He operates on a tight schedule, doing two programs, and on alternate afternoons teaching in the Departments of Communication at both Howard University and Bowie State College. In addition, he's also taking courses at Maryland University.

Spicer's one of the few people who plays operatic selections within a classical program format. That's when, he says, he gets his most feedback.

"Opera-haters are very vehement," he laughs. "You know, I find people who are that vehement are trying to set standards telling people what they should or shouldn't listen to according to their own taste. I don't think that's right.

"And, people still tend to think of opera as silly." He hums a few deep notes, one hand on his chest, the other extended. "You know how every kid used to mimic opera."

Spicer has always been interested in music. As a youngster he played the piano.

"I gave it up at a very early age when I realized my fingers would never grow long," he laughs and then holds up his hands. "They're short—my whole hand's small and whoever head of a pianist with stubby fingers?"

He first listened to progressive jazz, moved on to opera, went through the romantics, into baroque, and then the 1900's. He's not too much into the modern composers although he does play their compositions for the listeners.

Spicer came to WGTS-FM from Columbus, Ohio, in 1967 and still thinks Washington's a mecca for music lovers. He, himself, tries to go to Kennedy Center, Wolf Trap and Columbia as often as possible.

And he highly praises the National Symphony and Antal Dorati. He's convinced the National will someday attain the prominence of the Boston and Philadelphia Symphonies.

"They'll make a name for themselves. I'm convinced!"

As for favorites that might creep into the programming, Spicer pauses and thinks a moment.

"Well, Vivaldi for one. I didn't like him at first. I thought everything he wrote sounded alike, but now I recognize the subtle differences. And, Bruckner—he reminds me of Rembrandt."

But, he says, the best part of his show, is the communication with the listeners.

"That's it," he says simply. "When you play the recordings and when you speak to your listeners, you feel like you're sharing something."


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I had planned a report on my visit to this celebrated outdoor Italian opera theater for last month, but this space was occupied by observations prompted by the death of Dmitri Shostakovich. Now, before memory dims, let me comment on this world-famed institution.

Rome!

It must be said at the outset that sturdy legs are an absolute essential when planning to attend the opera at Caracalla. From the main entrance to even the nearest seat, one faces a hike that seems to stretch for miles, and to sit alla Destra (right) as we did, means that one must walk the entire exterior span of the structure parallel to a main Roman thoroughfare before turning into the fanlike amphitheater. At this point you still have a good two city blocks to go.

There are numerous strategically located stands where one may purchase anything from sumptuous Italian ice cream to incongruous hot dogs, and this is fortunate. You develop a fierce appetite just finding your seats. Expeditions to the rest rooms had best be started well before the point of critical need, for these facilities, too, are leagues distant.

Two live camels undertook starring assignment, loping off with high honors.

We had the best seats available, coincidentally the best in the house, and they cost (last August) 9,000 lire each. This translates to about \$14.40 in American currency, which may seem a bit high, but then this included transportation. A tidy little bus which only broke down twice, came to our hotel, picked us up and delivered us into the swarming midst of some 10,000 other customers (the performance was completely sold out, as always) and picked us up again after final curtain. This is a neat arrangement, as anyone mad enough to try and cope with congested Roman traffic will agree.

I recall when we purchased our tickets, I was influenced by the ghastly weather we enjoy in Baltimore, so I asked the girl behind the counter: "What happens in the event of rain?" She gave me a slightly

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superior smile and replied: "I refuse to discuss the matter. There will be no rain."

She was right.

It was a spectacularly beautiful night, complete with a deep velvet sky, half a glittering moon that was just beyond reach, a few million twinkling stars, and amazingly rare jets overhead and almost no traffic noise from the city to mar the ensemble. Before the first note of music sounded, I had already been thrilled to the bone.

The setting is awesome. Le Terme Di Caracalla (The Baths of Caracalla), is a monumental archaeological site near the center of the Eternal City, named for its founder, Antonius Caracalla. He was made Caesar in the year 196, Augustus in 198, and he obviously had a passion for cleanliness, the baths opening for business under his aegis in 217. All these dates are A.D.

Caracalla provided hot, warm, and cold bathing facilities on a massive scale, and it is said that in addition to a communal capacity for hundreds, as many as 1,600 persons could bathe in private. The edifice consisted of a main block housing the various baths, surrounded by enclosures for gymnasiums, meeting halls, offices and libraries, plus which there were expansive gardens in which the customers might stroll.

The vast structure fell into ruin through the centuries, but so much remained that through restoration and reconstruction it was possible to build in, on, and around the wondrous remnants complete facilities for grand opera production. The section originally known as the "calidarium" became the stage, and it is widely referred to as the world's largest; it covers an awesome area of 1,500 square meters. The first performance of opera was given there in 1937 and to this day everyone in the audience has an unobstructed view of the stage. The acoustics are phenomenal. The orchestra pit can accommodate 120 musicians, and there are copious backstage areas as well.

Aida is ideal for Caracalla. The repertoire for the summer of 1975 was limited, including eight scheduled Carmen's, eight Rigoletto's and sixteen Aida's. This huge stage, framed by towering red stone ruins, employs a horizontal "curtain" which effectively breaks the action. Lighting and scenery are amazingly workable.

There was a casual air about the performances we attended. At about nine o'clock someone apparently felt it might be well to get the show on the road, so Maestro Nino Bonavolonta tapped his baton and we were under way. We reached our hotel. later, well past 1 in the morning.

Now the entire opera provided an eye and ear filling spectacle, but the second act was, of course, the biggie. Rhadames returned victorious from the wars in a real chariot drawn by four live horses. They were, I'm certain, veterans, for they seemed to know every note of the music from memory, and they did not miss a cue, if you follow me.

Half the population of Rome had apparently been pressed into service to appear as supers, and at the finale there were indeed hundreds of people onstage. Costuming, lighting, direction, were fantastic! In the later Nile scene, two live camels undertook starring assignment, loping off with high honors.

I realize the use of four handsome white horses and two stately camels was as nothing to the Aida's staged in the United States by Alfredo Salmaggi (who died last September). He once produced the opera with a brace of horses and camels, plus an elephant for good measure. And when staging Aida at Madison Square Garden one time, his zoological cast listed fifty horses, four elephants, four camels and two bulls. But the Caracalla Aida is something else. You are practically in the shadow of the Coliseum, a short walk from the Roman Forum, a stone's throw from the Appian Way. The Caesars walked these grounds. Spine tingling whispers of ancient history float on the air. This is wondrous Rome!

Oh, yes. The cast.

I hope I will not be misunderstood when I say that at Caracalla (at least for this American's first visit) everything is secondary to the site itself. For the record, our Aida featured Paolo Dari as the King, Mirella Pautto as Amneris and Claudia Parada in the title role. Her colleagues included Luigi Ottolini as Rhadames, Lorenzo Gaetani as Ramfis, and Antonio Boyer sang Amonasro. The acting was terrible, the voices fair to good, and several of the leads (I will be discreet and not name them) were long overdue in attendance at the nearest Roman chapters of Weight Watchers.

But I say again, no matter. It was a glorious summer evening in one of the world's most beautiful cities. It was a spectacle on an undreamed of scale at Caracalla. It was Aida. What more could one want?

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

Singer Tony Bennett not too long ago ended a very rewarding collaboration with Columbia Records, one which made him a millionaire and them better off for having signed him almost two decades ago.

So now Bennett, like so many other artists, is wealthy and yearning to do some things he was not able to do because of constraints put on him while he was in the process of "making it." It is to our benefit that Bennett has been an admirer of pianist Bill Evans because the two have collaborated on a new record called The Tony Bennet-Bill Evans Album on Evans' current label, Fantasy.

It came about this way.

Bill Evans' longtime manager Helen Keane got in touch with Bennett's manager and suggested the idea. Bennett was delighted at the thought of doing a record with a musician he had admired so much over the years. Evans felt the same way. So the die was cast.

The result of the merging of these two great talents is what you might expect; suberb. But there are a couple of interesting aspects of this new duo.

Bill Evans has always been a delicate, introspective kind of musician who tears hell out of a ballad. So I am not surprised to hear him in that role again. Tony Bennett, on the other hand, to my knowledge has never recorded in a duo format. Usually he was showcased with large string orchestras or big bands. It is because he appears alone here with Evans that Bennett emerges significantly different than you're used to hearing him. It's as if he's calmed down a bit because he doesn't have to fight the large orchestra anymore. The result is the warmest, most intimate Tony Bennett I have ever heard on record.

All of the selections are ballads of the highest order. Songs like "My Foolish Heart," "Young and Foolish," "We'll Be Together Again," and for the first time a vocal version of Evans' popular "Waltz for Debbie." This last song in particular struck a respondent chord in my bones because I had become so familiar with the lilting melody line only to have it enhanced 1000 percent by Bennett's lovely performance of the Evans lyric.

Two more items need to be pointed out here. First, had Columbia Records had the foresight or the desire to match up these two, they could have done it very easily ten years ago, while both were recording under their roof. But I'm sure if the

Columbia brass gave it a thought, it would have been poo-pooed by a chorus of corporate bosses saying IT WON'T SELL!

And that leads me to my next point: this Bennett-Evans record is in more danger of not selling now than it would have been ten years ago because it simply has fewer places where it can be heard. There are perhaps ten radio stations in the country that would play this record on a regular basis. So it's a matter of the general public never finding out about it. This is tragic because the record is outstanding.

Even if you haven't been a Tony Bennett fan in the past, give it a listen and see if you don't agree that this collaboration of Bill Evans and Tony Bennett brings out the best of both of them.

Three of my favorite discs from years past were music of Wagner played by the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra. One was Eduard van Beinum conducting the Prelude to Act III of Lohengrin, and the other two featured Willem Mengelberg conducting the Prelude to Act I of Die Meistersinger and the Tannhauser Overture. The sound reproduction was rather dated, but the rich acoustics of the hall were ever apparent and the performances themselves were the last word in virtuosity in execution and insight in interpretation.

Thus it was with great anticipation that I listened to the first Wagner disc since the forties (why has it taken so long)? played by this magnificent orchestra. Bernard Haitink leads the Prelude to Die Meistersinger, Prelude and Love-Death from Tristan and Isolde, Prelude to Parsifal and the Act I and Act III Preludes to Lohengrin (Philips 6500 932, \$7.98). It is a glorious disc in every way.

At this stage of his career Haitink is a rather straight-laced conductor for music of Wagner. There is little passion in his readings, and the magical sounds Stokowski finds in these scores are alien to him. Still there is a rock-solid rightness in these performances, and a logic that is totally convincing. And the sounds made by the Concertgebouw Orchestra are incredibly beautiful, with a spacious richness that is balm to the ears. The dynamic range of this recording is quite remarkable, from the softest solo strings to the massive sounds of the entire orchestra during climaxes.

The performance of the Lohengrin Act I Prelude is an object lesson in perfection. This music, perhaps more than any other, mercilessly exposes faulty intonation in high strings and woodwinds; I have never heard it played better than it is here. This, then, is a Wagner LP to cherish. It will not replace Karajan's recent Angel discs, but will take its place right alongside them as another equally valid approach to some of the world's most extraordinary and powerful music.

OTHER NEW RECORDINGS IN BRIEF:

CHOPIN: Etudes, Op. 10; Etudes, Op. 25; Vladimir Ashkenazy, pianist; London CS 6844, \$6.98.

There are a dozen etudes in each set, all written from 1829 to 1834. These are far re-

moved from etudes of many earlier composers, many of which were fine for developing technique but offered little to stimulate the mind or imagination. Chopin, too, was concerned with technical problems, and his etudes are among his most difficult works, particularly from Op. 25, No. 6 in G Sharp Minor in double thirds, No. 10 in B Minor mostly in octaves, and No. 11 in A Minor, appropriately subtitled "Winter Wind." But along with this we have some of Chopin's most beautiful writing.

For some reason the Etudes have been neglected by many of today's leading pianists. Rubinstein and Horowitz, for example, play only a few of them, even though the etudes are a major legacy of Chopin. Ashkenazy has always favored the etudes, and his affinity for them was demonstrated years ago via a splendid Russian recording long deleted. Now we can hear them in this new recording which is a superlative accomplishment. The most difficult passages are made to sound easy, and yet there is no glossy accent on virtuosity. I will listen to this LP often for my own enjoyment, and will play it more often than the remarkable Maurizio Pollini Deutsche Grammophon disc. London's reproduction is solid and clear, putting the big concert grand right in your living room. A remarkable LP by any standards.

DVORAK: Violin Concerto in A Minor, Op. 53; Romance in F Minor, Op. 11; Itzhak Perlman, violinist, with the London Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Daniel Barenboim; Angel S 37069, \$6.98.

Today's music scene boasts an almost embarrassing supply of superlative young violinists, with Perlman right in with the top few. This is a magical view of Dvorak's concerto, with a secure technique always at the service of the score. The London Philharmonic has never sounded better on discs, and the quality of reproduction is fine with a nicely balanced solo violin.

Barenboim doubtless is much happier about the success of this recording than he was about his earlier recording of the same composer's Cello Concerto with Jacqueline Du Pre as soloist, just before she retired from the concert stage. In spite of the excellence of this new Angel LP there is formidable competition. Nathan Milstein's version on Angel gets the Dvorak onto one side with Glazounov's Concerto in A Minor as a generous filler, and the idiomatic Josef Suk-Czech Philharmonic-Karel Ancerl LP on Vanguard Supraphon, which also contains the Romance, lists at only \$3.98 and is well recorded even though it is a dozen years old.

composer whose duty it was to place his art at the service of the Soviet state and people.

The question of what intellectual paths he might have followed had he lived in a free society is unanswerable. But the view that his creative output would have been significantly higher in quality is open to serious doubt. Shostakovich was, after all, a Russian composer, and his greatness as well as his tragedy stemmed from that fact.

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

HELPFUL HOLIDAY HI FI SHOPPING IDEAS

Selecting gifts for Hi Fi fans on your list can pose quite a problem. Unless you are better heeled than most of us, you may not be in the market for a \$500, preamp let alone a \$3000 amplifier, but you don't want to settle for ties and bottled spirits.

What can you find for someone whose interest runs to high fidelity and music which won't put you in the same financial predicament as New York City?

There are many items which cost only a few dollars but will still be much appreciated by any person with a musical or Hi Fi bent. If the person lives here in the area and is not already a **Forecast!** subscriber, your troubles are over and the chore of tramping around from store to store disappears. Even if those on your list are already subscribers, you can extend their subscriptions. After you have taken care of that, what other Hi Fi related gifts can you come up with?

Books on audio or music always make good gifts. For the builder of a recorded music library, a good stocking stuffer is the Schwann catalog of recorded music. This well known publisher offers three basic editions. Schwann-1 is a monthly and contains listings of some 45,000 presently available recordings on 702 record labels and 231 tape labels. Quadraphonic selections on 82 labels also are included.

Schwann-2 is a semi-annual publication which lists specialized recordings such as pop tunes more than two years old, jazz, vintage classics, reissues etc.

In addition, Schwann makes available a handy booklet listing 1000 selections considered to form a basic classical library. Your record dealer can supply these Schwann publications or you can write to the company at 137 Newbury Street, Boston, MA 02116.

There certainly are many more Hi Fi and music books and similar material which would make fine gifts. They should come to mind with a little shopping in your favorite record or audio equipment store.

Records are always a possibility. For something a little out of the ordinary in this department, consider some of the specialized labels such as Ambiphon. The company produces outstanding records as well as superb prerecorded tapes. There are

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several audio stores in the area which carry the so-called "exotic" label records. If someone on your gift list has tape equipment, perhaps some prerecorded tapes would go over and may represent something which the recipient might not buy for himself. Blank tape is also nice to get, especially some of the new wide frequency range low noise formulations. There are now many of these tapes on the market.

Also for a tape fan, a tape splicing kit might just be the ticket. Such kits are now available for cassettes as well as for reelto-reel tapes.

A hand accessory which ought to make a hit would be one of the many record and tape storage devices available. They can be very useful in bringing order out of the chaos which prevails in the abodes of many music lovers and Hi Fi hobbyists.

Record and tape care kits are also appropriate and there are many from which to choose. The various products offered by the Watts Company have been around for a number of years and are quite well known. In the last few years, the name Discwasher has gained prominence in the field. Their little wooden handled brush with its receptacle for storing the plastic bottle of fluid is very familiar to record lovers and does a creditable job. Recently Discwasher has introduced additional products. One of these is an antistatic turntable mat. They also offer a stylus care kit consisting of a magnifying instrument for examining the stylus for wear and a stylus cleaning brush. Use of a brush of this type is definitely recommended over the common practice of flicking dirt off with one's finger!

Another record care product is Groov-Kleen, marketed by Bib Hi Fi Association of Syosset, N.Y. It represents a convenient approach to keeping records free of dirt. The device consists of a brush and felt pad mounted on an arm which looks for all the world like a tonearm.

Another handy gadget is offered by Fidelitone of Palatine, IL. It's called the "Record Washer" and consists of a stand with a slot in it into which the record is placed. Using a special cleaning fluid, the record is then spun by hand. Pads in the slot clean the record.

A line of record and tape care products which has recently come to my attention is put out by Metrosound Audio Products Ltd. of Essex, England. This firm offers a wide range of record and tape care aids at quite attractive prices. One of these products which is quite interesting is called the "Metro-sound loniser." It consists of a velvet brush into which water or a special fluid is introduced through two holes in the handle. This activates the antistatic agent and the brush is then wiped across the record surface.

This operation is intended to eliminate the static charge which usually builds up on the record. Since it is this static charge which causes dust and dirt to cling, getting rid of this static charge altogether, or at least reducing it substantially, helps to keep records clean. Especially if your record collecting gift recipient is unaware of

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


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THE COMPLEAT DISCOGRAPHER MENDELSSOHN: SYMPHONY #4 IN A, OP. 90, "ITALIAN"

Philharmonia Orchestra, Otto Klemperer cond., Angel 35629, \$6.98, with Schumann: Symphony #4.

Boston Symphony Orchestra, Charles Munch cond., RCA LSC 2221, \$6.98, with Symphony #5.

Mendelssohn's position in the musical hierarchy is most curious. One finds it well nigh impossible to discern in his music the man who rescued Bach's major works from oblivion, who admired Berlioz and Wagner, and who was instrumental in creating the musical environment of the mid-nineteenth century.

Yet this last gives Mendelssohn's game away, for not since Handel had the world seen a more pragmatic musician. Indeed this is an apt comparison—more so than one with, say, Bach or Haydn. For like Handel, Mendelssohn uncovered substantial support for musical endeavors in the middle classes.

Adherents of early nineteenth century music often find Mendelssohn somewhat embarrassing as he steadfastly refused to conform to the romantic ideal of musician as individualistic anti-social madman. No comfort is found either in that his reputation is founded more solidly as a performer than as composer. Both Mendelssohn's music and character are distinguished by their sophistication and urbanity, the unobtrusive craftsmanship of his music being often overlooked. Since he composed for audiences who wished to be entertained, not inspired, Mendelssohn never demands the emotional involvement of Beethoven. Neither does he attempt to overpower the listener with virtuosity.

His virtues have always appealed to the English and it is hardly surprising that most of Mendelssohn's major works, including the Italian Symphony (the significance of the designation 'Italian' being pertinent only in the sense of general inspiration), were written in response to English commissions. Because the Italian is the most genial and least pretentious of Mendelssohn's symphonies, it has gained the largest following.

The 'Italian' is a work that will almost 'play itself.' Genuinely bad performances are rare. The worst that can be done to it is overstate it. Too big is far more dangerous than too small. It isn't a work one would expect to be congenial to Otto Klemperer . . . yet it is. The genius of Klemperer's performance is that unlike no other he exposes the infinite care and meticulous skill on which the Italian is grounded. And he does so without killing the unfettered spirit of the work.

Students of the Prestissimo Furioso Conservatory of Music will carp at Klemperer's tempos, the difference between spacious and lethargic being a matter of opinion. But students of the PFCM cannot deny that real vitality proceeds from accurate inflection, not raw speed, as Dr. Klemperer proves in this record.

At the other extreme, Charles Munch's performance is the quintessence of a "standard" Italian Symphony, clear concise, and succinct. It is unmarred by any idiosyncracy. Its distinction lies in that it does not attempt to be distinctive.

While both recordings are more than a decade old, both were extremely well recorded and still sound vivid and true. There is no technical advantage to either. Nor do their more recently recorded competitors offer major improvements in sound quality. And so different are their virtues that almost no one will want both. For each individual the choice by now is probably obvious.



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

J. GEILS BAND—Hotline-ATLANTIC ROY BUCHANAN—Live Stock-POLYDOR

There comes a time when everyone (including politicians and rock critics) has to admit they've made a mistake. One of mine has been to misjudge and underrate the J. Geils Band since **Bloodshot** in 1973, after I perhaps overrated them in the three previous years. I approached **Ladies Invited** and **Nightmares** too cynically, and didn't listen carefully enough. Listening to them now I find worthy rock albums, though still not as good as their first album, or **The Morning After.**

Hotline is no different from what they've done before, but it's loose, yet assured, and the songs are the best they've come up with in four years. Besides the originals, there is a nice version of Don Covay's "Believe In Me" (written by Curtis Mayfield in the early 'sixties), and "Love-Itis", originally done by the late 'sixties Canadian band Mandala. I think **Hotline** will win back some of the J. Geils Band's fans who deserted them over the last few years.

I've never considered myself to be much of a Roy Buchanan fan, even if he is from D.C., and even if I can acknowledge his mastery of guitar. I don't care for his long tortured blues runs, or the singing and playing of his various sidemen (Roy just plays guitar, he does not sing). Live Stock is a little different, however. Recorded live in New York, the band's approach isn't quite as ferocious as before, and it rocks directly yet in a relaxed way. It opens with "Can I Change My Mind", which you'll also find (in a version I prefer) on the new Johnny Rivers album. Although I can't really enjoy blues songs like "I'm Evil" and "Roy's Bluz", I'm sure his fans will like them a lot. But I would like to hear him do one all rock'n'roll album, and I bet there are lots of others who feel the same.

JOHNNY RIVERS—New Lovers And Old Friends—EPIC

Johnny Rivers is the only artist I can think of who has a comeback every year. Last year's, though, never did come through, because the album he attempted it with, **Road**, was distinctly unexciting. After having spent ten successful years with United Artists, he left to join Alantic, which was probably thrilled until they heard the tapes of **Road**. That arrangement only lasted for one album, and now Epic has him. Luckily for them, he's presented them with a strong album, on a par with 1973's **Blue Suede Shoes**.

Rivers' best moments have almost always been with rock'n'roll, and wisely he sticks to that form on his new album. He usually displays faultless taste in picking material within his vocal capabilities. He does a





pretty good job with the Beach Boys' "Help Me Ronda," though it's a good-time type of arrangement and nothing startling.

The same is true of the Four Tops' "It's The Same Old Song." The King Harvest hit of a couple of years ago, "Dancin' In The Moonlight," is a nice surprise, as is Arthur Alexander's "You Better Move On," a 1962 soul song that was covered by the Stones, among others. Continuing his devotion to reggae, he does Jimmy Cliff's "You Can Get It If You Really Want."

The two best songs on the album are unknowns: a nice soul ballad called "Spare Me A Little," and a well-paced rocker, "Can I Change My Mind," which Roy Buchanan does on his new album. It sounds better in Johnny's hands, and could be his first big hit since 1972's "Rockin' Pneumonia and Boogie Woogie Flu." It might have been the return to his home grounds of L.A. that did it for him, but Johnny Rivers is back on the right track with **New Lovers and Old Friends.**

THE IMPORT BIN

Leading my list of favorites this month (and not just among imports) is the second LP from G. T. Moore and the Reggae Guitars, Reggae Blue (U. K. Charisma). They were by far the best band I saw during my recent trip to London, turning on a packed house at the Nashville Rooms. There is no room for arguments as to whether the Reggae Guitars are as authentic as The Wailers or Toots & The Maytals, because G. T. & Co. are white and from England, with the exception of one Yank. Even if they didn't grow up in a Jamaican slum, these guys churn out burning reggae with a healthy mixture of rock and rhythm'n'blues. Moore is an exciting songwriter; well in command of melodies and capable of turning a neat phrase when he wants.

Every song on this album is a winner, and the same can be said of his year-old debut album, also on the Charisma label. American record companies don't know what they're missing if they persist in passing up this fine band.

Man's latest is a live set, Maximum Darkness, recorded at The Roundhouse, one of London's choicest venues. The album is on British United Artists, though Man is attempting to sever relations with their U.S. counterpart, so a Stateside release is doubtful. Playing on some of the cuts is an old hero of Man's, Quicksilver guitarist John Cipollina, who did a British tour as a guest guitarist with them last Spring.

There are good versions of time-tested Man oldies like "Bananas" and "Many Are Called But Few Get Up," and a couple of early Quicksilver pieces, "Codeine" and "Babe I'm Gonna Leave You." One of the many former members of Man, guitaristkeyboard player Clive John, makes his solo debut with You Always Know Where You Stand With A Buzzard (U.K. United Artists). There's no surprise that it sounds much like Man circa Be Good To Yourself At Least Once A Day, Clive's last album as a member of the band. The latest roundup of Man offshoot groups now includes Clive's new band Opening Time; The Neutrons, who have two U.K. U.A. albums, Black Hole Star, and Tales From The Blue

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


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
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Cocoons; The Knees, which did a single for the same label of "Day Tripper" b/w "Slow Down"; and a new band, Alkatraz, with bassist Will Youatt, who is not only an ex-Man, but an ex-Neutron.

The latest rage of the pub rock scene is the Kursaal Flyers, who have a promising, but by no means outstanding, debut album on Jonothan King's UK Records, **Chocs Away!** Country-rock takes up about a third of the album; fortunately, it is done not only competently but with a sense of humor best indicated by the line in "Tennessee" (which they confess they've never visited): "I've never had my passport stamped by a man who was wearin' a gun."

Most of the songs are concise, but could do with a bit more punch. When they show off their power, as they do on Micky Jupp's "Cross Country," they indicate that there are very good things to come from this band.


