### **Turn On the Lights!**

Washington has just welcomed a new administration-and finding living quarters in the capital is again the order of the day. The imagination that is bringing downtown Washington to life might well spark renewal in other areas

Why not turn the lights on in some of the city's splendid historic houses, which are now occupied primarily as daytime showcases? Gracious residences could come to life again as homes for the distinguished citizens who will make up the new president's Cabinet. The late Mrs. Bacon's house could serve as a permanent house for the secretary of state. The historic Octagon House could serve as the home of the secretary of interior.

These houses and others could, in their private living quarters, provide homes for Cabinet members whose families would instill life into buildings by restoring them to their genuine function as houses for the living. Public rooms and gardens could remain available, as are those in the White House, for appropriate official and public gatherings. People coming and going would enliven these venerable buildings with the pulse of the federal city once more.

The vice president's house has shown us the way. The houses provided to our ambassadors all over the world further suggest the advantage of providing suitable residences for those whose work is crucial to the country's well-





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
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Carole Farley is Susannah in Baltimore Opera's presentation on Floyd's opera of the same name, Feb. 12, 14 and 16.

The Dance America series returns to the Kennedy Center Opera House with three spectacular American companies. The first is six days of the Dance Theatre of Harlem (beginning Feb. 10), a superbly trained company noted for its brilliance in both classical and modern ballet.

On the 17th, the Eliot Feld Ballet begins a six-day engagement of vibrant, exciting and humorous dance guaranteed to please and intrigue. And on the 24th, the Martha Graham Dance Company arrives (thru March 1) with a dazzling repertory of new works and classics. All three companies perform with orchestra.

The College Park-based Maryland Dance Theater continues its 10th anniversary celebration by appearing at Goucher College's Kraushaar Auditorium Feb. 12. Featured on the program is Murray Louis' Bach Suites, Larry Warren's Playlet and other works. Also in the contemporary line is CODA (Contemporary Dancers of Alexandria), D.C.'s guests at The Dance Place Jan. 31 and Feb. 1. Baltimore choreographer Jeff Duncan premieres a period piece entitled Knoxville, Summer 1915, and Cathy Paine includes her work Duet.

Both city classical companies are performing this month. The newly reorganized **Baltimore Ballet** presents their winter repertory program "Dance Fantasies," at Goucher's Kraushaar Aud. (Feb. 6 & 7) and at Notre Dame's Le Clerc Hall (Feb. 10 & 11). Works include

# What's Happening!

New Hope Valley, Tennessee is an unlikely setting for grand opera, but that's what the **Baltimore Opera** audience will see and hear February 12, 14 and 16. The opera is Carlisle Floyd's *Susannah* loosely based on the Apocrypha addition to the *Book of Daniel* and updated to a rural church setting in the 1930s, mixing hymn tunes and folk songs in Americana-flavored arias.

The beautiful and devout Susannah is seen bathing in a stream by four elders of the church. In reaction to their lustful thoughts the elders decide to "punish the shameless wench," thus setting in motion events that shatter the peace of the community and turn the young maiden into a derisive, vengeful woman.

In a special fundraising event for the Baltimore Opera, Baltimore-bom James Morris gives a recital at the Peabody Conservatory Concert Hall, Feb. 22 at 3 pm. Single tickets range from \$10 to \$20 and are partially tax-deductible.

The musical community of Baltimore takes another plunge forward this month by the launching of the Baltimore Chamber Opera, with former BSO Associate Conductor Andrew Schenck as music director. For their first production, they are offering a double-

bill at the Walters Art Gallery February 2: Pergolesi's La Serva Padrona, and Cimarosa's Il Maestro di Cappella.

Both comic operas are sung in Italian and star Ezio Flagello, one of the world's leading singing actors. The first tells of a serving maid who cleverly flirts her way into marriage with her master; the second is a charming vignette of a conductor in rehearsal, first cajoling, then cursing, and finally congratulating his musicians.

Don Giovanni, Mozart's tragi-comedic opera, is presented in English by the Annapolis Opera, Feb. 19 and 21; and on the 6th, 7th and 8th, Catholic University's Department of Music gives Mozart's Cosi Fan Tutte. The Washington Civic Opera presents a fully-staged version of Donizetti's comic Elixir of Love at Lisner Auditorium, Feb. 28 and March 1. (This marks the company's 26th year of presenting free opera).

The Victorian Lyric Opera, which previously has performed only in summer, presents its first winter effort Jan. 30, 31 and Feb. 1, 6 & 7 with Gilbert and Sullivan's *The Mikado*. Colorful kimonos and flashing fans take the stage at Paint Branch High School in Burtonsville in a production that includes portions of the version presented in London 1885, a departure from the more familiar D'Oyly Carte staging.



The love lives of sopranos who have sung the title role in Puccini's Madama Butterfly are the unusual subject of Robert Glick's lecture for the Washington Opera Guild on February 18. On the 25th and on March 4, Paul Hume gives musically illustrated talks on the history, background and music of Montemezzi's L'Amore dei Tre Re. Both operas are part of the Opera's spring season.

Balanchine's Waltz Fantasy and Tchaikovsky Pas de Deux, John Clifford's Charleston, and Tangos, by the company's artistic director Alfonso Cata. On the same performance days, the company is also presenting matinees for children of Peter and the Wolf.

The Washington Ballet, also performing in February, calls their program the spring series and includes Lambros Lambrou's Summer Interlude, Choo San Goh's Synonyms, and Serenade, by George Balanchine. They dance in Lisner Auditorium, Feb. 13, 14, 20 & 21.

# Concerts of Note

A first for the Kennedy Center, the Choral Arts Society presents Mozart's Grand Mass in c minor, Feb. 15. The beautiful music was composed as a wedding gift for Mozart's wife Constanza, and features especially lovely music for soprano (sung by Phyllis Bryn-Julson). Rounding out the program is Vivaldi's setting for Psalm 111 and Dallapiccola's Tre Laudi.

St. Cecilia, patron saint of music, is the subject of Odes by Britten and Purcell Feb. 27 by the National Shrine Music Guild. Vaughan Williams' popular Fantasia completes the tribute to some of England's greatest composers. Handel is honored by a performance of Judas Maccabeus by the Southern Maryland Choral Society, and orchestra, Feb. 28 at the Penn. Ave., Baptist Church in Southeast D.C.

Romantics will be charmed by a Valentine program of love songs Feb. 13 & 14 in the Kennedy Center Terrace Theater. Norman Luboff leads the Washington Singers (a chamber group directed by Paul Hill) in a program of Schubert, Brahms and American music.

As a final tribute to the intimate Barker Concert Hall at the YWCA on K St., (it's being torn down and relocated later this year), the British Embassy Orchestra presents a concert on the 14th (for reservations, call 638-2100).

Interesting concerts on area free (or almost free) series includes "A Renaissance Beastiary" program by the New York Renaissance Band at the Library of Congress Feb. 6, and the New World String Quartet with Doriot Dwyer, flute, Feb. 27. Among others, the National Gallery of Art will feature pianist Stewart Gordon on the 1st, and guitarist Larry Snitzler on the 15th, both area musicians. Tenor James McDonald joins guitarist Michael Cedric Smith at the Dumbarton Concert Series, Feb. 13; works range from Britten's Songs from Chinese to Stephen Foster!

The Leider Quartet presents unique vocal music on the Candlelight Concert Series in Columbia, Feb. 7; and pianist Louis Shub offers his second concert this season, Feb. 8, with Scarlatti's Four Sonatas; Beethoven's Appassionata Sonata; and Gershwin's Three Preludes and Rhapsody in Blue (at Goucher College).

The Mount Vernon Brass Players present five world premieres of works by Baltimore composers - Maud Hodgman, Richard Lake, Terry Plumeri, R.V. Reaser and Faye-Ellen Silverman - Feb. 1 at Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in Baltimore. Black History Month begins with a gala concert at the Univ. of Maryland Baltimore Campus, Feb. 7 with music by the "Big Nick" Nicholas Quintet and jazz bassist Ron Carter appears on the Univ. of Md. College Park campus, Feb. 2, with the UMCP Jazz Band. The legendary guitarist Laurindo Almeida gives a one-night performance at Charlie's of Georgetown, also on the 2nd. The American Popular Songwriters Séries continues at the Corcoran Gallery Feb. 8 (George Gershwin) and 22 (Irving

Beginning February 8, the United States Air Force Band offers its annual free Guest Artist Series at DAR Constitution Hall, every Sunday thru March 29, at 3 pm. Reilly Lewis' Washington Bach Consort continues its free monthly series, this time on the 22nd at National Presbyterian Church.

# Portrait of a Gallery

In February, 1871, W. H. Veerhoff quit his government draughtsman position and, with a cousin, opened a shop selling moldings, wall decorations, comices and wallpapers. In less than a quarter century, the business had expanded to three locations and, by 1902, a newspaper account is quoted as calling Veerhoff Galleries "the most important gallery south of New York City.'

By 1905 W.H.'s son Otto Louis Veerhoff inhereted the business and consolidated it by selling the art supply department to George H. Muth (still in the business today). Old ledgers and scrapbooks show that during this period the Gallery sponsored exhibits for such artists as Frederick Remington, Lucain Powell, W. M. Chase and Max Weyl. In turn, O.L.'s son Otto took over the business in

Today, one hundred ten years after its founding, Veerhoff Galleries is still thriving, and

still in the same family. Margaret Veerhoff (fourth generation) began working for her father in the galleries as a teenager. She bought the business in 1976.

Margaret has seen a lot of changes in the art and framing business over the years. Old prints and contemporary graphics have surpassed oil paintings in popularity. She speculates that as people move back into the city into restored Victorian houses, they tend to decorate according to that period. The single, dominant painting per wall has given way to clusters of smaller works. "Why have one large painting when seven smaller ones will do?" she says with a laugh.

Recently, the gallery has seen an increase in the business of repairing, restoring and reframing paintings and prints. About 30 percent of the present business is in selling old prints and graphics, paintings, sculpture and reproductions. Veerhoff moved to its present location -1512 Connecticut Ave, NW just above Dupont Circle-fifty-five years ago. when the corner lot was a LaSalle dealership!

The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra pays special tribute to the 100th anniversary of the birth of Ernest Bloch presenting his Sacred Service (or Avodath Hakodesh) for orchestra, baritone and mixed chorus at the Lyric Theatre, Feb. 18 & 19. Bloch's piece is a musical setting of the morning service used in American Reform Temples. He considered its message as a musical gift of Israel to all of mankind.

Edward Polochick directs the chorus, and Sergiu Comissiona conducts the orchestra. Also on the program is Mendelssohn's *Fingal's Cave Overture* and Mahler's *Ruckert Songs*. The *Sacred Service* will also be presented at the Kennedy Center Feb. 22, as part of an all-Bloch program including cellist Leonard Rose playing the *Schelomo* (the Hebrew name for Solomon) rhapsody; and *Proclamation for Trumpet and Orchestra* with soloist Dan Tison. (Polochick also leads the Peabody Chorus in Bach's *Mass in b minor*, Feb. 15).







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

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

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# Stage 4

February is particularly rich in the diversity of theatrical productions appearing on area stages. Leading the "world premiere" category is Ruth Wolff's new play Sarah in America, starring stage and film star Lilli Palmer at the Eisenhower Theater. The play coincides with the 100th anniversary of Sarah Bernhardt's extensive trips to the United States. The two-character play, in which Sarah's maid has no spoken lines, covers 37 years of the actress's impressions of theater life on the road and a changing America.

Palmer is internationally known for her appearances with her former husband Rex Harrison in Venus Observed, The Love of Four Colonels and Bell, Book and Candle; and film performances in The Fourposter, Murders in the Rue Morgue, Oedipus the King and The Boys from Brazil. Palmer's autobiography, Change Lobsters and Dance, about her escape from Nazi Germany, her early career in World War II Paris, and her Hollywood years, has sold millions of copies in over a dozen languages. Her current autobiographical-novel A Time to Embrace is receiving high critical acclaim. (Feb. 4 - March 7).

Also premiering at the **Kennedy Center** (in the Opera House) is *Sophisticated Ladies*, featuring the music of Duke Ellington, including his ballet, symphonic and sacred compositions, as well as jazz. The 25-piece stage band is under the direction of Duke Ellington's son Mercer; his granddaughter Mercedes is the assistant choreographer and a member of the cast.

The talents assembled for this production are superb: Judith Jamison, internationally recognized as a member of the Alvin Ailey Dance Company; Gregory Hines, Tony Award nominee for his roles in *Eubie* and *Comin' Uptown*; top recording artist Phyllis Hyman; Hinton Battle, an extraordinary dancer last seen here in *Dancin'* at the Warner; and P.J. Benjamin who charmed Washington audiences in Folger's *Charlie and Algernon*. (Thru Feb. 8).

The Folger Theatre Group presents the American premiere of *Crossing Niagara* by Peruvian playwright Alonso Alegria. The play deals with the real-life character Blondin who made something of a profession of crossing Niagara Falls on a tightrope in the late 1800's. The story concerns the events leading up to Blondin's 22nd crossing, unusual because that time he carried a passenger on his back.

To get the proper spirit of the affair, Folger has retained the consulting services of Philippe Petit, a Frenchman with a 20th century reputation not unlike Blondin's. Petit attracted international attention with his tightrope crossings between the towers of the Cathedral of Notre Dame, the pylons of the Harbour Bridge in Sydney, Australia and the quarter-mile high crossing between the two buildings of New

York's World Trade Center. Petit does not consider himself a daredevil, but rather a high wire artist. (Feb. 3 - March 15).

New to Washington audiences is I'm Getting My Act Together and Taking It on the Road, at Ford's Theatre. The contemporary musical, with words and lyrics by Gretchen Cryer, has successfully played off-Broadway for the last three years under the auspices of Joseph Papp's New York Shakespeare Festival. Additional companies continue in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Houston and Toronto.

The story revolves around a 39-year-old pop singer, Heather, who decides to throw out her old image, and create a new nightclub routine reflecting her new status as a liberated and independent woman. Unfortunately, her harried, chauvinistic business manager, disapproves of the whole thing. Louisa Flaningam, who heads the cast at Ford's, is originally from Bethesda and studied theater at the Univ. of Maryland. Her co-star Ralph Byers, another local product, studied at Catholic Univ. (Thru Feb. 22).

of life in the emerging Soviet system which was banned in 1932, and has never since been performed there. The story of hapless and lovable Semyon Podsekalnikov combines slapstick, vaudeville and absurdity to view postrevolutionary Soviet Russia through the eyes of the "little man." After chronic unemployment, his family fears Semyon will commit suicide-and when word gets out, a parade of outrageous representatives of disaffected segments of Soviet society descend on him, each cajoling him to take his life in the name of their cause. Unfortunately, The Suicide also proved to be the political suicide of the previously popular Erdman. Concerned about the volatile nature of his satire, he appealed to Stalin for prior approval (which he received) but it wasn't enough to save his career. Erdman never wrote again for the stage in the remaining 38 years of his life.

The first English performance of *The Suicide* was by the Royal Shakespeare Company in 1979. It was subsequently produced by the Trinity Square Repertory Company, Chicago's Goodman Theater (this is Arena's version, as well), and on Broadway and hailed by the press as a 20th century masterpiece and one of the most important plays of the current theatrical season. (*Thru Feb. 22*).

One of the most ambitious undertakings this month is **Trinity Players'** production of the Stephen Sondheim musical in three-quarter time, *A Little Night Music*. Based on Ingmar Bergman's film *Smiles of a Summer Night*, the Sondheim score is a stylish celebration of romantic love. Called "an elegant fairy tale for adults," it is set in the enchanted birch groves of turn-of-the-century Sweden, and peopled by a leisure class whose most pressing problems concern past, present and future affairs of the heart. The musical is conducted by Marc Tardue, who is also the musical director of the Laurel Oratorio Society. (Feb. 13, 24, 20-22, 27, 28).

#### Other Theater of Note

The Warner Theater has booked Yul Brynner to recreate his role in The King and I (Feb. 19 -March 15). Neil Simon's They're Playing Our Song has been extended at the National thru March 21. (See feature article on page 44). In Baltimore, the Morris Mechanic Theatre presents Brian Clark's Whose Life Is It Anyway?", starring Brian Bedford as the paralyzed sculptor who insists that his life-and ultimate destiny-are his own. (Jan. 27 - Feb. 14).

Also in Baltimore, Center Stage offers Robert Bolt's A Man for All Seasons, the 1962 New York Theater Critic's Award and Tony Award winner about Sir Thomas More's crisis of conscience between the early Church of England and Henry VIII. (Thru March 8).

The Source Theatre continues Eugene O'Neill's Anna Christie thru Feb. 15; and then opens Feb. 16 with For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide/When the Rainbow Was Enuf. The American University Department of Performing Arts presents the most classic version of Sherlock Holmes, by William Gillett and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Feb. 19 -George Washington's University Theatre's third production this season is Noel Coward's sophisticated comedy Blithe Spirit (Feb. 24 - 28), combining a ghostly first wife, a bizarre spiritualist, a psychic maid and the husband (as the "astral bigamist"). The University of Maryland's University Theatre, on the other hand, produces a revival of the rock 'n rebellion musical Hair (Feb. 5, 6, 7). Round House Theatre presents a mime show entitled Love Song Without Words, (Feb. 4 - 8

Baltimore community theater includes Mark Medoff's When Are You Coming Back Red Ryder by the Fells Point Theatre (thru Feb. 22); Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, a musical performed by the Loyola College Evergreen Players (Feb. 13, 14, 15); and Henrik Ibsen's Ghosts, opening Feb. 27 at Theatre Hopkins, and continuing thru March 22. 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## Jazz

#### by w. royal stokes

The economy is in a slump, inflation is pushing the price of an album toward a ten-spot, and rock and country dominate the entertainment scene and the media. Yet jazz perseveres even in adversity. Here are fifteen fine examples of the music in its modern form, all but three from small independents. In next month's column we'll do a round-up of recent releases in the traditional and swing bags.

Clarity can result from orderliness so let's sort the pile into four categories of piano, reeds, brass and voice. Not to slight the rhythm section, take note that they're omnipresent, supporting in fine fashion and often up front in solo.

The prodigious keyboard technique and fertile musical imagination of the visionary Lennie Tristane is well represented in a two-record set from the 50's, Requiem (Atlantic). Only now, several years after his death, is this blind pianist's anticipation of 'free' jazz being recognized. Experimental he was, but the tradition is present in his interpretation of standards, his feeling for the blues, and his debt to Hines, Tatum. Bird and others.

Haitian born pianist Andrew Hill, not as well known as his talents warrant, has worked with a diversity of jazz luminaries including Ben Webster, Miles Davis and Rahsaan Roland Kirk. On Strange Serenade (Soul Note), a trio effort with Alan Silva on bass and Freddie Waite at the drums, Hill synthesizes Bud Powell, Ellington, the Caribbean and Chicago (where he grew up). Two other pianists of foreign provenance but limited stateside exposure are the Spanish Tete Montoliu, born blind, and the Japanese Yamashita Yosuke.

Montoliu displays originality, an abiding passion for the tradition, and no nonsense swing on Lunch In L.A. (Contemporary). Little known outside of Japan, Yosuke in his solo album Breathtake (West 54) is introspective and 'laid back.' He bears watching-or, better still, listening to. Detroit spawned Tommy Flanagan, a ballad master as well as vocal accompanist par excellence, comes on strong in Trinity (Inner City), backed by the steady bass of Ron Carter and the steaming drums of Roy Haynes. And Chick Corea, who hasn't done much jazz recording lately, returns to the fold in emotionally rich solo and in impressive duo with vibist Gary Burton (In Concert, Zurich (ECM)

Dr. Stokes, well-known local jazz reviewer and commentator, surveys recorded jazz — past and present — on alternate Sundays, 7:30 - 10 pm on WPFW(FM).

A gem has been polished up and displayed anew in the re-mastering (by sonic genius Jack Towers) of Charlie Parker's One Night in Chicago (Savoy), a live session with the ambience of exactly what it is, one night in Chicago in 1950. Bird, backed by a local rhythm section, soars on these fragmentary pieces the documentation of which we owe to some unnamed possessor of an antique portable tape recorder. Absolutely priceless. Art Pepper, five years younger than Parker, was so intent upon fashioning his own voice that, unlike virtually every altoist of the 40's and 50's, he refused to emulate the great founding father of bop. Check out his still intact individuality on So In Love (Artists House) in quartet format with, on side one, pianist Hank Jones, bassist Ron Carter, drummer Al Foster, and on the flip side, George Cables, Charlie Haden and Billy Higgins.


Bring it all up to date with releases by three leading lights of the avant garde. In his third album as leader, Illusions (CBS), altoist Arthur Blythe blends the old with the new in an instrumental voice as distinctive as Parker's and Johnny Hodges'. Big toned tenorist Ricky Ford, as compelling a player on that horn as you'll find in the ranks of the "new music," pays his respects to the Duke, Mingus, and Coltrane in his (also third) album (Flying Colors) (Muse). And for final confirmation of the respect for and familiarity with musical ancestors that is the very essence of contemporary jazz, check out the latest of the trio Air, Live (Black Saint), Henry Threadgill on alto and flute, Fred Hopkins on bass, Steve McCall at the drums.

Transition from reeds to brass via Ira Sullivan is facilitated by his mastery of both. Hear him on trumpet and flugelhorn, tenor and alto saxophones and flute, in some passages dueting with himself, on the stunning and aptly titled *The Incredible Ira Sullivan* (Stash). A mature musician who has been somewhat underground for much of his three decade plus career, this genius has only recently surfaced to rave acclaims from all quarters. He also turns up on erstwhile Parker trumpeter Red Rodney's *Live at the Village Vanguard* (Muse), a sizzling session that has the two blowing the walls back.

A movement is afoot to crown Betty Carter the reigning sovereign of song, an honor which, although well deserved, she would likely decline in deference to her seniors. Her own label, Bet-Car, has captured *The Audience with Betty Carter* in concert at the Great American Music Hall in San Francisco, a double album that showcases the unique and extraordinary gifts of this idiosyncratic vocalist. Dexterous and an artist in his own right, pianist John Hicks heads up the supporting trio.

If you've been hanging in there hoping a drummer's album would make it in this piece, you can be happy that you didn't beat it. Jack De-Johnette (who doubles on piano) is all over his set throughout New Directions in Europe (ECM) in the sterling company of Art Ensemble of Chicago trumpet virtuoso Lester Bowie, guitarist John Abercrombie (also on mandolin guitar) and bassist Eddie Gomez. They cook.





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## the unique, Neil Sim oblique Neil Sim

Neil Simon, a man for whom the joy is in the doing, is the author of more plays and musicals than most people see in a lifetime. He has become America's most prolific and successful playwright. Some say that his success is only commercial and not artistic. Simon's theater producer of eight years, Manny Azenberg, comments on Simon's detractors: "I will say, 'Oh? Tell me, which of his plays do you like?' And the very astute critic will say, 'Well, certainly Barefoot in the Park and Odd Couple will be comedy classics and maybe even The Sunshine Boys.' And I'll say, 'Oh, you mean he's written three classics? A man you don't like! Isn't that enough for a lifetime?""

Azenberg adds that aside from Odd Couple, a universal favorite, the plays they like will vary. "The international world thinks The Prisoner on Second Avenue is sensational. Gingerbread Lady was a huge hit in England and the Sunshine Boys in Europe is stunning.

Which ones, in the long run, will hold up? Who knows? Simon feels *Odd Couple. Sunshine Boys* and parts of some others — *Prisoner* and *Chapter Two* — might have some longevity. And at age 53, Neil Simon will submit another candidate for posterity when he presents his 19th play in 20 years, this spring.

Theater critic Keith Montgomery brings to his reviews broad experience both as an actor and director, plus many hours spent on the audience side of the footlights. Hear him five times daily, Wednesdays and Fridays, on WEAM, Big Band Radio, AM 1390.

It is nearly impossible to go to any city and not find a Neil Simon play or musical or film. He has proliferated America with humor. Just humor? Not necessarily. "I rarely write a piece that doesn't have a good dramatic structure to it," he says. "There are occasional pieces that I do that are pure farce and comedy and these don't require that type of structure." However, Simon adds that pure farce is one of the "hardest kinds of things to do, because you have nothing to fall back on."

They Ought to be in Pictures or Chapter Twoare "basically serious stories that have a great deal of humor because the characters and situations that I'm dealing with have humor. But I don't say 'Well, I better put in a little drama.' They must all have a strong dramatic structure."

It's also very important to Simon that he must identify with his characters. "I must like them, even if I find enormous faults in them. They have to touch me. If they touch me, they have a good chance of touching the audience."

Simon doesn't write about villains per se-"I like society and the world to be the villain. The people are stuck in it. In ninety percent of the plays and in a great many of my movies, there's got to be that moment when the audience really is touched and laughter is the other side of the coin; I don't think anything in life is all tragic or all humorous."

"I generally like to put people in close quarters, living together if possible, and in a situation where their personalities conflict greatly until they learn either to separate or to live with each other."

funny, he sees some funny things." Things that to most of us might be aggravation, agitation and acrimony? "I think we wouldn't even bother. We would walk right by it. He sees two old vaudevillians and it suggests *The Sunshine Boys.*"

Simon says that some of his ideas just pop into his head, he doesn't plan a lot of his scripts. Azenberg agrees. "You never know what he's going to write about because he says, 'It's a great idea for a play,' and it has nothing to do with the previous idea that we discussed last week." It's what he saw, what hit him or bumped into him - "That's how *Playing Our Song* was written, Marvin Hamlish came over and described his relationship with Carol Sager. Neil said 'That's funny.""

Neil Simon did see the seed of a new play while working with Marvin Hamlish on a musical version of *The Gingerbread Lady* - the same play he is now making into a film with the new title, *Only When I Laugh*.

He told Hamlish that this would make a better film than a musical. Besides, "Learning about Hamlish's trials and tribulations of working with somebody that he was also having a relationship with, I said 'That would make a wonderful musical comedy.' The one thing you look for in musicals is *permission* to sing the song. When you're dealing with a composer and a lyricist, the songs come right out of their life."

Hamlish and Sager, therefore, were the basis of inspiration and *They're Playing Our Song* began to develop, not as a biographical sketch of the two. Simon was able to draw on that relationship, but he also experiences it himself. "I work with Marsha Mason and have a relationship with her (they've been married over six years), so I know the problems one deals with."

cumbed to a two year struggle with cancer in 1973. Mason is presently working with Kristy McNichol on Simon's newest film, the previously mentioned *Only When I Laugh*, and she also co-starred with Oscar-winning Richard Dreyfus in *Good-Bye Girl*, among others.

"My relationship with her is the same as it is with all of the other actors who are first-rate. She is hired only because she's one of the best actresses in America. I would never hire her because she's my wife."

Put into perspective as succinctly as he would create a scene for one of his characters, the conversation turned to other actors. "I love some actors. I hate some actors." And, "I do have relationships with actors that I don't like. When I get stuck in that situation, I'm glad I'm not the director because I don't have to deal with them every day."

Simon finds there's quite a difference between film and theater actors. In film, an actor may be chosen for reasons other than being the best possible actor available. Those compromises don't have to be made as much in the theater. "Especially in the position I'm in now. I don't need a big star to open a play on Broadway. I can go for the best qualified actor."

Simon also finds that theater people are somewhat more dedicated to their craft than film actors—especially the stars. The film stars "seem to think they know more about what the film, screenplay, is all about. In the theater, they would never invade that area. They know that's the territory of the writer."

Does he write for a particular actor when creating a new story or does he have to rewrite a script to fit the actor hired?

If the actors are any good, they'll play it.

A man who looks like he's been contemplating giggles all his life, Neil Simon tries to write about the human condition. "I would find it very difficult to write about a character as bad as Heinrich Himmler. I just couldn't do that. I leave that to the historians."

But Simon does want his characters to "take on a life of their own. If they don't then something is wrong. But if I establish them in an interesting enough situation and I know them in my mind quite well, then I just go along for the ride."

Will he go the way they're going? Yes. But he must set it all up, program them, as it were. "For example, in the *Sunshine Boys*, I knew these characters very well. I set up the situation where I was trying to get a reunion going. The nephew was trying to set up a reunion so that they would work together. That's enough of a situation for me to keep working."

Sometimes Simon will just start working on a project having no idea at all of where he is going with it. Sometimes it works. Sometimes he hits a dead end. When he does hit a dead end, it is a frustrating and unhappy experience, but "I do not find it a lonely business, as difficult as it gets."

Not lonely, even though he works alone, "I never want anyone else in the room," he explains. "I worked with other writers prior to my becoming a playwright and I never liked it. I like the idea of trying to work things out for myself."

How could it be lonely, with all of those characters and situations jumping around in his head? It's easy to picture Neil Simon sitting at his typewriter, closed off from the world, as his characters come out and play before him on the cover of his typewriter.

In his early years Simon read Mark Twain and Benchley and tried to emulate them. He was a writer for Jackie Gleason, Red Buttons, Sid Caesar and Tallulah Bankhead for ten years when he worked with his brother, Danny. Later he wrote for Garry Moore and the *Bilko* television shows. At the age of 33, he wrote his first play. *Come Blow Your Horn.* 

Since then, Simon has written a play every year. Is there any pattern to his writing? "Not really. I just keep working. Sometimes in the morning, sometimes at night. I manage to find time to write all the time."

Producer Azenberg adds that Simon has "an uncanny ability to rewrite. The whole third act of Odd Couple was a rewrite. We now have six drafts of The Curse of Kulyenchikov, which at this writing was two weeks away from going into rehearsal. It has also been said that as much as fifty to seventy percent of some plays are rewrites

This ability would not be possible in a person who takes himself too seriously—a malady that cannot be attributed to Neil Simon. He appears to be very straightforward, basic and does not



## They're Playing His "Song"

Marsha Skaggs, starring in *They're Playing Our Song* at the National, reflects "when you come in to see a Neil Simon for the first time, the script is overwhelming, because it is *so good!!* He's wonderful. And then you begin to see the pathos . . . the dynamics of it. At my first viewing, I was laughing at the script—it's hysterical—but when I went to work on it, I found that all these little things lead to something else."

"As an actress, the more I work on Song, the more I see the incredible structure of his plays. He will, in the first three scenes, make the rest of the play happen, especially the first scene. The disco scene will tie it all in. At the end he brings it all in and there is no unfinished business other than what is going to happen to their relationship. Hopefully, they will stay together at the end of the play - but..."

About the man, Skaggs says that although she has met him, at an audition and back-stage in San Francisco, "I'd really like to get to know him personally. Just trying to understand how a person like that perceives the world. He talks about truth, he talks about human relationships and he extends it. In my mind, I think he's talking about real relationship. I think he's talking about real people, and it's up to the actors to find that humanity."

"You can trust Neil Simon to be funny because he is such an incredible comedic writer, so you don't have to be funny, because it's already funny, so you just play it."

Skaggs' co-star, Victor Garber, was with the play when she joined him. Garber was actually the first person to audition for his role originally, in New York. Robert Klein was eventually chosen. Subsequently, he

was asked to try out for the road company and was given the part. How did that affect his approach to the play?

"Going into this show, I felt that someone else created this role. I was certainly going to be compared to him. But I was so different from Robert Klein that I thought whatever they think of me, it can't be in comparison to him. It just has to be judging me as an actor."

Garber went on from there to create his own character. He does feel that because of the solid structure and the excellence of the book, "it could be any two people up there doing it and it would still work."

"It's very nice to work out on a stage and

have that strong a book to support you. When you have no energy, you've got tremendous support because you just have to say the lines and you'll get the response. There's always something incredibly worthwhile within his writing."

What does author Simon feel about this company? "In some respects a more vital company than the original, more energy. Victor Garber has a certain kind of humor—different from what I had really intended, but he's not basically that New York-driven, energy-driven, somewhat neurotic character that I envision." But he's effective and together with Skaggs, Simon feels that "they are easily as good as the New York company."

seem to be bothered with frills. There is a depth, a kindess in this man, very real and self-assured, not wrapped up in himself. The "voices" sound off in his head (possibly as they do for the two principals in *They're Playing Our Song*) and his mind fills the room with characters.

"I read a great deal of biographies, because I'm fascinated sometimes more by the men's lives than by their works. I find that there has never been an artist, a so-called artist, who does not have his detractors."

The biggest problem, however, comes in trying not to believe either side. "If I believe the detractor, then I cannot accept those who like my work." If he only accepts the ones who like his works, he won't "learn from the detractors" and he will "get stuck!"

Simon would also prefer that his detractors be consistent. "John Simon never gave me a good review until *I Ought to be in Pictures* He gave that a good review and it threw me. Now if I have to deal with a good review from him, then I have to think about the bad reviews, was he right about them?"

Neil Simon's writing has changed since the days of the 'hilarious only' plays. "The death of my wife, my mother, my father, now suddenly

What do Richard Goode, Ruth Laredo, Murray Perahia, Pinchas and Eugenia Zukerman, The Tokyo String Quartet and Emanuel Ax have in common (beyond the fact that they are extraordinarily talented concert artists with international recognition)? They are among the 80-odd winners of the Young Concert Artists International Auditions during the last 20 years.

Young Concert Artist is a non-profit artist management organization that helps musicians bridge the gap between their years of study and launching a professional career. The YCA symbol, an opening lotus blossom, illustrates the hothouse attention with which these young musicians are nutured as the tender bud of their talent is carefully exposed to concert audiences, critics, recording companies and commercial managements.

The concept of Young Concert Artists was developed by Susan Wadsworth in 1961 when she was working in a multi-lingual position at the United Nations Secretariat. She had originally trained as a concert pianist, first privately in New York, and later at the Fontainebleau Conservatory in France with Jean Casadesus and Nadia Boulanger.

## Young Concert Artists

In the late 50's she returned to New York to study at the Mannes College of Music, and finally recognized that a concert career wasn't for her—she had little interest in the hours of keyboard practice. Instead, she turned her attention to the brilliantly gifted students who were starving and struggling because they didn't know how to get their careers started.

In the spring of 1961 Wadsworth organized a series of Monday evening concerts in the loft of an Armenian restaurant in Greenwich Village. Three of the then unknown artists on that first series were Paula Robison, Richard Goode and Ilana Vered. In the next few years the series moved to Mannes College, Carnegie Recital Hall, Hunter College and eventually to the 92nd Street YM-YWHA and Alice Tully Hall. In 1979, Young Concert Artists added a showcase series at Kennedy Center's Terrace Theater.

"We feel that New York and Washington are the two most important musical cities in the country," explains Wadsworth. "When Kennedy Center opened, we were very eager to be a part of what was going on. We talked to Martin Feinstein who thought it was a wonderful idea, but that everyone would lose a fortune. About nine months before the 500-seat Terrace Theater was due to open, I came to Washington again. This time there was hardly any discussion. Martin said 'Okay, this is it. Let's do it!"

By anyone's standards, presenting Young Concert Artists is still costing a fortune (except for the ticket buyer: \$20 for the five concert series, or \$6 per single ticket). Only about \$4000 of the \$35,000 cost is recouped at the box office. The shortfall this year is made up by a \$25,000 grant from The Pepsico Foundation (Pepsico is the parent comedy for Pepsi Cola) and a grant from Philip M. Fawcett.

What are these investments "buying"?

There is only way to qualify for the Young Concert Artist roster—to be between the ages of 18 and 28, be without commercial management and to win the annual spring audition. Everyone who enters (and that runs into the hundreds) is heard, either in person or by tape. Thirty or 40 usually make it to the semi-finals. Around a dozen become finalists. And here the YCA concepts departs from the competitive "routine."

The panel of judges is instructed to select as many artists as they think qualify on the basis of their musical future. In 1975, no one was selected; 1965 saw seven winners. As Toby Appel explains, "I didn't feel like I was competing against other good artists. The best ones regardless of the number, are chosen."

Once an artist qualifies, YCA presents them at a recital in New York, and then books them on other Young Concert Artists series throughout the country (currently there are 24 series). A participant can expect to give five to eight YCA recitals a year. And like other professional managements, YCA handles all other professional engagements including orchestral appearances and recitals on other series.

The artist is paid a fee, and after expenses, in turn pays YCA a fee for handling the booking, which can be as low as 10%. (In comparison, most commercial managements charge a straight 20% off the top, before expenses). YCA also pays for publicity materials, telephone expenses, arranges recording contracts and residencies. Equally important is the plain old-fashioned advice judiciously passed out—on how to deal with the public and press, how to bow and walk on stage, dress, repertoire, etc.

### Equally important is the plain, old-fashioned advice . . .

An artist must stay with Young Concert Artists for a least one year after his or her New York recital. Up to three years, renewals, some for as long as ten years, are not unusual. Ideally the artist is eventually offered commercial management, and then moves on.

Susan Wadsworth doesn't want Young Concert Artists to get too big, even though there is no other non-profit artist management offering what YCA does. "We do not try to limit, but the talent we are looking for is in limited supply. I like to think of it as an organization that has room for anyone who could start a career through us.

"The big talents who don't need us, usually are people who have another sponsor . . . Rudolf Serkin knows them very well (for example) . . . or they happen to be Peter Serkin who Rudolf Serkin knows very well. Or they are Itzhak Perlman, who at the age of 16, was taken right over to his management. It's a wonderful way to start a career, but some people just don't have that kind of contact."

Toby Appel, with YCA only since last April, comments on the special warmth of being a member of the Young Concert Artist family. "I played in New York recently, and three people from the office came, even though it was something booked before I became a Young Concert Artist. That's an aspect many managements are not interested in. One gets the feeling that the artist's best interests really are the ones at heart."

There is a fantasy that has been circulating among music lovers for centuries. It is the fantasy shared by all those who have ever stood in the middle of their living rooms, energetically waving imaginary batons to a favorite march or overture, speakers blaring for the whole neighborhood to hear, the fantasy of conducting a symphony orchestra.

In my lengthy career as a living room conductor, I have led most of the world's major ensembles. My repertoire includes music from every country and ranges from baroque to modern. I once spent an entire weekend directing hundreds of singers and musicians in a complete performance of Wagner's Ring Cycle.

But all of these experiences combined cannot begin to compare with my one night of glory, the night my fantasy (almost) came true.

A friend of mine and I were attending a concert by the Philadelphia Orchestra at the Robin Hood Dell in Philadelphia's Fairmount Park. A very large crowd had turned out, primarily to hear guest soprano, Roberta Peters. Personally, I was more interested in the second half of the program, which featured my favorite symphony, Tchaikovsky's Fourth.

There had been some talk of rain earlier in the day, but by the time the concert began the sky was clear. It was clear throughout Miss Peter's arias and throughout her encores. It remained clear for the duration of the intermission.


Then, as though on cue, a thick mass of gray clouds appeared just as the horns blasted the symphony's opening fanfare. They hovered directly over the amphitheater, as if sensing that they had discovered an ideal target. Many heads among the audience began to turn skyward as the thoughts inside them turned toward the most expedient escape route in the event of a downpour.

We were spared for the first two movements, except for several claps of thunder, which were out of key. Toward the end of the third movement, however, a soft sprinkling of rain began to fall, accompanying as it were the delicate pizzicato of the strings. A few timid souls immediately got up and dashed for the refreshment stand in the rear.

My friend and I were seated on a grassy knoll behind about fifty rows of folding chairs. We

I alone remained in my place, drenched. All around me people were pushing and clawing their way toward the refreshment stand. The only thing on their minds was dryness. There wasn't a true closet conductor in the lot.

When I saw Mr. Smith nod his head regretfully, I realized that he intended to end the concert then and there. What else could he do? His audience was fleeing like a herd of frightened antelopes.

At that moment I decided to take action. I could not allow the concert to end without the symphony's finale. It was against my "professional" musical principles, one of which holds that, as long as there is a single person left in the audience, the show must go on. And there was, to be sure, a single person left in the audience.

I had to make certain, however, that the orchestra knew I was there. I squirmed and squeezed through the sea of bodies with a relentless determination and lunged over chairs and partitions. I heard myself screaming, "Play! Play!"

Finally, I made my way to the center aisle and ran to the foot of the stage. The rain was falling in sheets, but I could no longer feel it. I stood looking up at the orchestra with my arms stretched out at my sides. "Play," I beseeched

Mr. Smith turned and raised his hands. I closed my eyes and awaited the most exquisite burst of sound I have ever heard. The storm in the sky was no match for the storm which commenced on that stage.

As the music surged, I suddenly felt transported to another world. The universe itself became a gigantic replica of my living room, and I was standing in the middle of it, waving my imaginary baton. All of my years of experience as a conductor had reached their culmination point. I could not help but rise to the occasion.

I brought in the trumpets with a demonstrative point of my index finger. I lowered my left hand in front of my face, cautioning the clarinets to play the passage pianissimo. As a crescendo approached, I beckoned to the timpani for thunder.


Midway through the movement, as though awakening from a dream, I opened my eyes. What I saw was a closet conductor's idea of paradise. The entire front row of violinists, violists and cellists were looking directly at me and smiling approvingly. As startled and overwhelmed as I was, I didn't miss a beat. Under the trained guidance of my invisible baton, the orchestra brought the symphony to a rousing conclusion.

When the final triumphant chords filled the air, I could hear from behind me a chorus of bravos. There, in the water-logged distance, the refreshment stand set were clapping and whistling. They may not have been very brave, but they were appreciative.

Then, incredibly, some of the people ventured back into the rain to join me at the foot of the stage. A few patted me on the back and reached to shake my hand. Perhaps there were some closet conductors in the crowd, after all. "Great job," somebody said. "That was terrific!" said another. "Where did you learn to conduct like that?'

Where? "In my living room," I answered. Yes, in my living room, like my millions of colleagues throughout the world. We are the dedicated conductors of stereos and FM tuners. We are the weekend Toscaninis.

During the past 20 years we've attended literally hundreds of hi fi shows in the United States. It can be a real drag. You can go home with a head aching from the

assault of 120 decibels of sound from an over-enthusiastic amplifier or speaker maker; with feet to match after tramping miles of hotel corridors looking for Little Wizard Transducers who just happens not to be in the show, and with arms pulleo out of their sockets by a matched set of shopping bags stuffed full with new product literature.

It doesn't have to be like that.

#### What to Wear

The first step is to go properly attired. You wouldn't think of making an opening night at the Kennedy Center improperly dressed. You should be careful not to make the same mistake at an audio show! At a hi-fi show, the emphasis is on your feet while

at the National or Kennedy Center, it's on another portion of your anatomy. Accordingly, your typical hi-fi show calls more for a comfortable pair of shoes and a pair of white athletic sox.

From there up, it's a matter of clothes which are both comfortable and which blend in with your surroundings. If you stress youth in your attire—even if you're 50 and balding—you'll find that you get lots more attention from the exhibitors, as well as feeling more at home among the crowds.

#### When to Go

Well, the commuter crowd tries to catch the hi-fi show Friday evening after work, while the Montgomery and Fairfax County set usually wait for the weekend.

The best time, if your object is to find reasonably empty rooms and exhibitors in a fairly good frame of mind, is as early as possible. True, at opening time a sizable crowd will be awaiting admittance, but once inside its members will tend to disperse in different directions; and you will have a chance to make a beeline for your favorite manufacturers' exhibits before they are congested. Friday evening may not be too bad, but Saturday and Sunday afternoons are murder (football season is over!). By Saturday evening the crowd will probably have abated until the next day. As closing time on Sunday approaches. most of the representatives manning the exhibits will be in a state of near-terminal fatigue, and may be less receptive to complex technical questions than would have been the case twenty-four hours earlier.

#### What to Grab

For many showgoers, grabbing literature is the name of the game. Because it's visible, demonstrable (like the bound volumes of the Federal Register), you and others can judge your effectiveness by the amount of paper you carry home.

Of course, anybody can amass an amazing pile of literature by taking ten copies of every spec sheet and catalogue. And any sharp-eyed spouse or housekeeper can catch you at it when riffling through the pile. The trick is to race through the show grabbing one of everything and stuffing it into a large shopping bag. If, at the end, your bag isn't full, or if you want to show

extra effort, start through again. Duplicates are permissible—but only if spaced properly throughout the pile.

Getting serious, let's discuss shopping bags. Fortunately for you, several exhibitors usually give these useful tools away, complete with technicolor commercials for their products and usually with a start on your literature library inside. It's a good idea to head for one of these manufacturer's displays right away and get a bag or two. How can you tell who's got them? Just keep your eyes peeled to see the names of the bags other people are carrying.

#### Balloons, Anyone

Doubtless you'll have heard tales about the great samples they used to pass out at hi-fi shows. One such story tells about the cartridge manufacturer in the early days of stereo who passed out sample stereo cartridges. Don't you believe it. The most useful things we ever got at a Washington hi-fi show were a yardstick, and a sample copy of FORECAST!

Which is not to say that nothing is being handed out. If you're not careful, somebody's likely to pin a button on your lapel or a balloon which, when properly inflated, reads "Super-scope." And, of course, there are those shopping bags—each a bit more colorful than the one which preceded it.

While these doodads may not be exactly what the doctor ordered — and certainly are no substitute for a free sample of record cleaning fluid, a free quadriphonic test record or a gift patch cord — don't knock them. If you have kids at home, these freebies will keep them off your back at least long enough for you to riffle through the product literature once or twice.

Once upon a time, when you visited a hi-fi show, you stood a good chance of having Mr. Koss put a pair of headphones on you, shaking hands with Mr. Klipsch and having Mr. Fisher tell you what was different about his receivers. Unfortunately, few of the audio pioneers make the shows these days, and your chances of meeting and talking to one are vastly reduced. But not eliminated. There's always the chance that the quiet man with the big dark eyes really is Saul Marantz!

#### Listen!... Here?

If you're going to the hi-fi show to *listen* to speakers, to get an idea how different amplifiers sound, forget it. True, the hi-fi show features many times the number of loudspeakers, amplifiers, receivers, tape decks and other components that even the largest audio dealer in Washington can carry. But no sensible audiophile would consider trying to *listen* to them at a show.

For one thing, the models on display have been selected with care by the exhibitor and tuned to perfection. What you hear—if you can hear them— is the best that model can produce, not necessarily what it'll produce in your living room.

Next, there simply are too many people milling and thronging in the average ex-

hibit room to permit any kind of serious listening. In order to attract people into the rooms and let the equipment be heard over the buzz of half a dozen conversations, manufacturers are forced to play it at much higher sound levels than your neighbors or other members of your household are likely to permit. Because as many as 50 manufacturers are doing the same thing at the same time, the resulting cacophony is unlikely to produce a pleasant listening experience.

Finally, since the acoustical conditions vary from one exhibit room to another (and all of them vary from your listening room), it's not possible to make valid comparisons between the ABC Model 1 and the XYZ Model 303.

#### Why Go To The Show At All

Why do the manufactureres bother with all that racket? They bother because the din brings in the public. The public presence, in turn, insures that every major manufacturer is on hand with personnel who really know the equipment. Accordingly, you're likely to find a tape deck by a little-known manufacturer that's just what you've been looking for, but isn't carried by your neighborhood audio salon. His representative will tell you who does, and he'll be able to answer your questions about the equipment.

Indeed, it's this answering of individual audiophile questions that's perhaps the biggest single reason for going to a hi-fi show; along with the possibility of encountering some brand-new products, especially when, as is the case this year, the Washington show follows hot on the heels of the international trade show—the Winter Consumer Electronics Show.

#### If You're Serious About Getting the Most Out of the Show

Ask yourself before you go exactly what you want to see, which manufacturers and which models. What do you want to know about the equipment? What literature are you going to need or want when you get home? Find out what you came for first. Use any extra time to see what's left of the show. You'll find that if you don't concentrate on the sound, you'll experience less hearing fatigue (and actual hearing loss) even though there's no decrease in the sound level. That's not what you're there for, so ignore it.

By following these few simple rules, I think you'll find this show and future ones less exhausting and more enjoyable.





### Bob Carver tells you (briefly) how Sonic Holography works. (Others tell you how it sounds.)



- Q. Exactly what is Sonic Holography?
- A. It's a term I use to point up the similarity of the sonic illusion that enables one to hear a stereo recording in three dimensions, and the optical holographic illusion that allows one to see a flat photograph in three dimensions
- Q. What does Sonic Holography sound like?
- A. I'll let others answer that for me. Hal Rodgers, Senior Editor of Popular Electronics: "When the lights were turned out we could almost have sworn that we were in the presence of a real live orchestra

Julian Hirsch of Hirsch-Houck Labs: "The effect strains credibility—had I not experienced it, I probably would not believe it...the 'miracle' is that it uses only the two normal front speakers.

Larry Klein, Technical Director of Stereo Review: it brings the listener substantially closer to that elusive sonic illusion of being in the presence of a live performance.


And High Fidelity put it this way: ". .. seems to open a curtain and reveal a deployment of musical forces extending behind, between and beyond the speakers...terrific

- Q. How many speakers are needed for Sonic Holography?
- A. Just your usual two. But for optimum Sonic Holography, the speakers must be equidistant from the listening position, and somewhat closer together than is usually required for stereo.

- Q. What do I hear when I'm not in the middle?
- A. We'll let Julian Hirsch describe what he heard: "still noticeably better than normal stereo, particularly in respect to a greater sense of 'warmth' such as is experienced in a concert hall.
- Q. How is Sonic Holography achieved?
- A. The technology is fairly complex, involving acoustic. psychoacoustic and electronic factors. Using standard stereo program sourcesdiscs tapes, FM broadcaststhe Sonic Hologram Generator recreates the spatial information of the original recording that is all but lost during normal stereo presentation.

Carefully calculated and controlled psychoacoustic crosstalk cancellation techniques expand the sonic image beyond its normally confined area between the two speakers and deploy instruments and voices naturally in front of the fistener over a broad deep arc.

Sonic Holography does not create this illusion artificially, but rather lets the listener hear fully for the first time the phase and timing information on the original recording that up till now could not be heard.



That's why Larry Klein described Sonic Holography in Stereo Review as producing "a far more plausible sonic illusion of space and localization than is produced by normal stereo.

Q. Isn't Sonic Holography something like time delay?

A. No. Sonic Holography takes the normal stereo signal and feeds it through the normal two speakers in a

way that recreates the actual locations of instruments and voices throughout the front hemisphere where they were originally "heard" by the microphones.

Time delay, on the other hand, feeds the stereo signal through additional amplifiers and rear speakers in a way that recreates only the spatial ambience of the original recording environment.

## Decorating With

#### by michael walsh and ed richards

Have you ever wondered how the art of beautiful home decorating and the science of beautiful home hi fi can live happily under the same roof? To find out, we asked some of the nation's leading decorator/hi fi experts for some tips on combining good sound with tasteful decor. Here are some of their comments.

What to do with the speakers? Speakers are (quite literally) the biggest problem facing the stereo buyer and home maker. Coping with speakers no larger than, say, a shoebox is no problem.

So the new generation of high-quality miniature speakers can solve the problem before it even exists.

However, most audiophiles prefer cabinets called bookshelf speakers (which overhang all but the deepest bookshelves) or the kind that stand upright on the floor. Stands to fit medium-to-large bookshelf speakers and make them floorstanding are now widely available.

Coping with speakers no larger than, say, a shoebox is no problem.

Decorating with speakers requires some imagination and creative thinking, but it's usually achieved by arranging furniture properly.

Every room where people spend any amount of time has what is called a Center of Interest. It may be a picture window, a fireplace or merely the television set. It's the area of the room which captures the attention. Opposite the Center of Interest is the Listening Area—a sofa, a grouping of chairs and coffee table—where visitors sit, converse, and listen.

Now, do you want to display your speakers or hide them? Have you sufficient floor space to devote to large units or would they be better mounted on the wall?

Chances are you're going to aim the speakers toward the existing listening area. Textbooks claim that stereo speakers should be placed six to eight feet apart and that the optimum listening area lies along a line drawn midway between them. For optimum stereo spread, the listening area should be at least six feet from a line drawn between the speakers.

Textbooks also suggest putting one fourchannel speaker in each corner of a room and angling them toward the center.


Most rooms won't cooperate with these requirements. Usually the Center of Interest gets in the way. What the text-

bocks don't tell you is that none of these rules is carved in granite. Take the case of the Arlington bachelor whose L-shaped living room featured a picture window view of the Potomac along the longer wall. The window dictated that the listening area would be along the opposite wall, where the decorator had located the couch. Next came the question of the location of a couple of large bookshelf speaker cabinets. Should they stand in front of the window as part of the scenic panorama? Should they double as end tables for the couch? Could they be suspended from the ceiling?


While any of the above would have worked, the decorator suggested marble slabs be cut to fit the tops of the speakers. Placed at the ends of the couch, their sound was directed against the hard surface of the window, which in turn reflected the sound back to the listener seated on the couch. To add warmth to the room (and to absorb any random reflections) the decorator used a bright red broadloom on the floor. Due to the flexibility of hi fi components, it is possible to have both the sound and the view.


A few changes can turn a so-so sound into something sensational.

Another audiophile with a Potomac River view, living in Georgetown in a 19th century townhouse, found a different solution to his speaker placement problem. His living room was a classic rectangle with a fireplace on one long wall. Opposite was an archway, and floor to ceiling windows

claimed the walls at each end. The solution: hang the bookshelf speakers from the tops of the window frames and cover with a valence. To provide sound to the listening area, the speakers were angled down into it.

Hiding Your Hi Fi. If you wish to conceal your home entertainment equipment, there are a number of inventive ways it can be done. A favorite is to erect a false wall alongside a fireplace and conceal the speakers on shelves behind it. Or, speakers can be tucked behind tapestries and paintings hung on the wall.

Built in bookshelves and wall systems provide a ready-made haven for loud-speaker systems . . . and turntables, amplifiers, stereo tuners, TV sets. Modular wall units adapt easily to any sort of living area; tucking into narrow spaces, expanding to cover whole walls; sometimes doubling as room dividers. They include special sections for storing tapes and records,

drawers to hold the many accessories, from headphones to cleaning fluids. They are designed specifically to accommodate the extra depth and weight of many speakers.

Many component manufacturers, recognizing their customers' needs, are now offering vertical racks able to house a full complement of equipment except speakers. They vary in appearance from rather stark "radio station" to quite domestic.

Speakers can be built into the walls of your room. But, the walls must be thick enough, you have to find suitable loud-speakers, and it's preferable to plan for it in a new house. If you're going to break into a wall to install naked loudspeakers or even to install a complete speaker system plan to run the necessary wiring up inside the wall itself.

Use caution when attempting major renovation. Is the wall structural? Will you en-

counter plumbing, wiring, or heating ducts to interfere with your work?

Not Hiding Your Hi Fi. Amplifiers and tuners, particularly those with brushed aluminum or gold face plates, can be used in any modern room and with most traditional settings. Most loudspeakers come in cabinets which might loosely be described as Danish modern; fewer are now available in Early American, Spanish, or French Provincial styles than formerly.

There are dozens of "neutral" cabinets which blend in with almost any decorative scheme. A few pieces are furniture in their own right. Then there are some unfinished speaker systems on the market which can be painted, stained or styled to fit into your own design or color scheme. These models enameled in white or brilliant colors are particularly striking in contemporary informal design.

Any reasonable porous fabric can be used as a grille cloth, to further blend into your surroundings. Thus, you could use left over drapery fabric or upholstery covering to match couch or drapes. In the past years several speaker manufacturers have experimented with sculptured grilles in dramatic new colors. Molded grilles come in a variety of colors, in sizes to fit standard bookshelf speakers.

Relative newcomers on the home speaker scene are the six and seven-foot tall speakers, elegantly housed, that simply stand against a wall taking up a good deal of height, but not much depth or width. There's really no need to hide this kind of speaker. Flanking a picture window or fireplace, they are as much impressive pieces of furniture as they are sources of sound.

The Smaller Problems. Turntables, amplifiers, receivers, etc. pose less of a problem to the hi fi loving decorator, simply because they demand less space and their placement is not critical, sonically.

Turntables have two important requirements: they should not be placed too close to the speakers, lest acoustic feedback be a problem; and they must be level and secure, so that the stylus doesn't skip grooves whenever somebody walks across the room.



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
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


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Some turntable bases have self-leveling legs or rubber feet. A turntable level, obtainable from most record or hi fi dealers, will help you level accurately. A tinted plexiglass cover not only protects a record player or tape deck sitting on an open shelf, but tends to hide it from view when you're not using it.

In one suburban Maryland home, the turntable is whimsically mounted on an old Singer sewing machine base (the wrought iron, treadle type). This is not only attractive, it is extremely steady, as those bases were designed to withstand vigorous mechanical vibrations.

Be sure to include storage space near your turntable for such items as extra cartridges and cartridge shells, a 45 rpm adapter, a brush for cleaning the stylus, and so on. A similar storage space should be provided for such tape accessories as microphones, cable, empty tape, reels and splicer. You'll want them handy whenever you use the recorder. In general, you should consider whether the

placement of your components leaves them easily accessible. Not only should all the controls be at a convenient height, but be sure to leave enough overhead space for changing tapes and records.

The possibilities for arranging your hi fi components are unlimited. While unusual room shapes and sizes may require a little experimenting, you'll find that you can fit stereo or four-channel into T-shaped rooms, L-shaped rooms, even in those in which all four walls parallel! A few changes in room furnishings, or even just a few inches' movement of the speakers themselves, can change a so-so sound into something sensational.

Some Practical Tips for Home Hi-Fi Installations

Wires can be a problem. Try flat, twinlead wire coated on one side with adhesive. It comes single for mono installations or double for stereo. Simply pressed in place along a wallboard it connects amplifier and loudspeakers. Or, try flat cable, such as TV antenna wire, under the rug.

You can bring speaker leads up through a broadloom by making a small slit in the carpet backing, pulling the weave apart enough to make room for the cable, then pushing it back again around the wire.

Check Wire Size and discuss it with your dealer. Length of run and your particular type of amplifier could dictate a different size wire than you're planning to use. Using the wrong size can harm your system! Your dealer probably has the correct wire size; so discuss the matter with him and be sure not to use a smaller size than he recommends!

Running Up The Wall, wires can be hidden inside aluminum tubing such as the type used to support column lamps or modern bookshelves.



Wires needn't be a problem!

When Building A Recorder into your system, you may want to look for one whose outputs and inputs are accessible equally easily from front or back. Of course, rear connections can be made at the time of installation, and the wires remain neatly out of sight.

To Protect Speakers from animals or small children, remove the grille cloth, staple heavy hardware cloth firmly across the face of the enclosure, then replace the grille cloth.

Horizontal Amplifier And Receiver Mounting is not a rigid law. Some models may be mounted vertically by supports around their face plates (inside drawers, or certain types of consoles, for example). Others require support for the entire chassis. Before attempting this type of mounting, find out from the manufacturer whether the face plate of his unit will support its entire weight. Double check ventilation requirements!

Bedside Speaker Controls should include a rack for stereo headphones which automatically shut off the loudspeakers in the room. Stereo head sets not only enable one person in the room to listen while another is sleeping; they also provide high quality stereo sound.


With Youngsters Around it's wise to place your hi fi components out of reach, on shelves or in a cabinet. Not only can

equipment be damaged by inexperienced hands, but audio equipment can give children a shock if they try to explore the insides of these components.

A Speaker Control Switch, wall mounted like a light switch, should determine the volume for speakers in each room, if you're operating more than one pair of speakers from your receiver or amplifier. You may want the volume louder in one room than another. Most modern receivers and amplifiers contain switches and terminals for two or three pairs of stereo speakers.

Wall Mounting Speakers is easily done with the aid of a pair of brackets and molly bolts, provided the plaster is in excellent condition. It will pay you to test first to see whether the wall can support the weight of your speaker. Check with your neighborhood hardware dealer for the proper type and size bracket and molly bolt for your needs.

Loudspeakers ideally should be placed at ear level. But the same effect can be obtained by mounting them higher and angling them downward toward the listener. Speakers also can be mounted on swivels in room dividers so that they can be aimed into either room. Swivels are mounted in the center of the two sides of the speaker cabinet, with cable mounted on a spring arrangement so that it can move freely when you rotate the speaker.





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

### Mind-Blowing Recordings to Test Your Stereo System

One might expect that, in this day of advanced technology, state-of-the-art recordings would be prevalent. Unfortunately, that is not the case. Often producers of recordings do not know how to use equipment available to them. Even many of the latest digital recordings are disappointing, at least to this listener. But, fortunately, over the years there have been a number of recordings that combine sonic excellence with interpretive insight. All of these discs are guaranteed to get your woofers, squawkers and tweeters working to their fullest, with the happiest of results to your ears.

STRAUSS: Also Sprach Zarathustra, Op. 30 Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra conducted by Bernard Haitink. Philips 9500624.

Strauss' massive symphonic poem took a new lease on life with the appearance of "2001: A Space Odyssey." There are few today who are not familiar with its opening "Sunrise" section, which starts with an ominous low rumble and, through a series of trumpet calls, finally reaches a stunning C-major climax.

There are many recordings of this score, most of them rather inadequate, but when there is one of the quality of Haitink's, no others are needed. Haitink takes the opening at a fine, slow pace and his recording is the only one that noticeably articulates the soft organ entrance at the beginning.

The luxurious sounds of the Concertgebouw Orchestra have been splendidly captured by the Philips engineers. The Dutch orchestra is a specialist in things Straussian, and it is a pleasure to hear their rich sound so vividly conveyed.

C.P.E. BACH: Six Symphonies for Strings. The English Concert performing on original instruments, directed from the harpsichord by Trevor Pinnock. Archiv 2533 449.

Anyone who thinks the talent in the Bach family

He has been Forecast!s classical recordings reviewer continuously since 1963. resided only in Johann Sebastian should listen to the remarkable music on this superb new Archiv disc. Carl Philipp Emanuel wrote prolifically during his long lifetime, composing 19 symphonies including the six for strings heard here.

They are remarkable works, full of often violent contrasts and energy, always inventive and graceful. The performances here are exemplary in their precision and insight; the engineering remarkably clear and lifelike. For the Baroquophile, this is an essential disc.

RESPIGHI: Roman Festivals; The Pines of Rome. Cleveland Orchestra conducted by Lorin Maazel. London CS 7043.

These are among the more spectacular display pieces for the audiophile. Both of these symphonic poems are examples of imaginative orchestration, utilizing the full resources of a large orchestra with particular accent on percussion. *The Pines of Rome*, in particular, has always been a spectacular sonic showpiece. The popularity of "Pines" is reflected in the number of recordings it has had over the years. Maazel's is one of the best, with the Cleveland Orchestra in top form.

The overside Roman Festivals is perhaps even more spectacular in its kaleidoscopic range of sounds. It, too, is given an "all stops out" interpretation. All of this has been spledidly captured by London's engineers.

SAINT-SAENS: Symphony No. 3 in C Minor, Op. 78 Gaston Litaize, organist, with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra conducted by Daniel Barenboim. Deutsche Grammophon 2530 619.

This is another sonic blockbuster, represented in the catalog by a number of disappointing recordings. To hear how it *should* sound, try this superlative version which fully captures the majesty of the score.

As the organ in the Medinah Temple in Chicago, where the orchestra was recorded, is not adequate, the important organ part was recorded separately at the Chartres Cathedral and dubbed in. It is so perfectly accomplished that one would never suspect the procedure. The result is an unqualified success.

HOLST: The Planets, Op. 32 Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra conducted by Walter Susskind, with the Ronald Arnatt Chorale and Missouri Singers. Turnabout QTV-S 34598.

The hall in which the Saint Louis Symphony records obviously is first class, with both warmth and clarity—qualities not too often found together. Sonically, this performance of Holst's massive symphonic suite, in which each of the seven movements depicts one of

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
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
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the major planets, is superb. The orchestra plays as if they were one of the major ensembles of the country.

While this is impressive as a standard stereo recording, hearing it via the DBX encoded version (SS 3002) changes a superb sonic presentation into a thrilling display of orchestral sonorities and wide dynamic range with a total absence of surface noise. Of course, the DBX decoder is essential for this vivid listening experience, and you must have the DBX encoded version of the disc. It is worth the investment.

RIMSKY-KORSAKOV: Scheherazade, Op. 35 Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra conducted by Kiril Kondrashin. Philips 9500

Every record collection should have a Scheherazade. This is one of the finest in every way. Kondrashin's exotic flair for orchestral textures is always apparent and for him the Concertgebouw plays magnificently. The many brass fanfares and woodwind solos are models of controlled individuality. As sheer sound, this is extraordinary, with no edge whatsoever to the strings, plently of clarity and remarkable dynamic range. Hermann Krebbers is the masterful violin soloist.

PROKOFIEV: Alexander Nevsky, Op. 58 Eleana Obraztsova, contralto. London Symphony Orchestra and Chorus conducted by Claudio Abbado. Deutsche Grammophon 2531 212.

Prokofiev's colorful score for Eisenstein's early film has enjoyed modest popularity via recordings. But even the best of the past must bow to the splendor of this relatively new Abbado set.

Obraztsova is the ideal soloist in Field of the Dead, while the London Symphony Orchestra and Chorus produce an authentically Russian atmosphere. DG's engineering is a model of clarity, particularly in The Battle on the Ice.

WAGNER: Overture and Venusberg Music from "Tannhauser," Prelude to Act I of "Lohengrin," Prelude and Liebestod from "Tristan und Isolde." Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Herbert von Karajan. Angel S 37097.

This disc has been available for some years now, but remains one of the most powerful, and best recorded, examples of the mighty sound of the Berlin Philharmonic. Karajan's masterful way with this repertory is legendary. Here, more so than in his Wagner recordings for Deutsche Grammophon, we have his interpretations conveyed with uncommon depth, dynamic range and clarity. The piling up of orchestral sonorities at the climaxes of the Tannhauser Overture and Tristan Prelude are totally realized. This must be counted among the finest of Wagner orchestral recordings.

BERLIOZ: Fantastic Symphony, Op. 14 Royal Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Rene Leibowitz. Quintessence PMC 7057.

It is unbelievable that this recording, with its stunning clarity, richness and dynamic range, was made as far back as 1962. it just proves that a finely produced recording holds up well over the years.

Originally issued on Reader's Digest label, this performance is now reissued on the budgetpriced Quintessence LP, a worthy addition to the catalog. There is sufficient sonic and interpretive merit here to place this disc in that top group of preferred recordings.

For some sound buffs the filler, Rakoczy March from The Damnation of Faust will be a standard display piece with its brilliant brass, rich strings, wide dynamic range and, particularly, because of the inclusion of the massive sound of the cannon drum. Alexander Gibson conducts the New Symphony Orchestra of London in this performance, recorded in 1962. You must hear it t believe it.

#### "THE POWER AND THE GLORY" M & K Realtime RT 114.

This is an appropriate title for this sonically splendid direct-to-disc album, offering Lloyd Holzgraf performing on the Organs of the First Congregational Church of Los Angeles. Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor is the featured work. A Vivaldi Largo, the Grand March from Wagner's Tannhauser and Russell's Bells of St. Anne de Beaupre fill out the disc.

For those who enjoy massive pipe organ sound in a resonant acoustic, this is it. Purists probably will not particularly enjoy Holzgraf's bigscale performance of the Bach, but doubtless others will revel in the massive sonorities of this magnificent instrument with its 11,848 pipes. The low frequencies are particularly well captured; the subterranean rumblings will tax any woofer system. A possible drawback is the limited playing time on the disc; it contains less than a half hour of music and the price is

SHOSTAKOVITCH: Symphony No. 5, Op. 47 New York Philharmonic conducted by Leonard Bernstein. CBS Masterworks IM 35854.

This masterpiece has been a sonic showpiece for years, ever since Artur Rodzinski's stunning early Westminster monophonic recording. There have been some fine stereo recordings since then, including one by Bernstein with this same orchestra. But there is no question that Bernstein's new version is the one to have. Interpretively vivid, it is easily the finest of the initial batch of CBS's audiophile digital series.

RAVEL: Piano Concerto in G; Piano Concerto in D for the Left HandJean-Philippe Collard, pianist, with the French National orchestra conducted by Lorin Maazel. Angel SZ

I have found most of Maazel's recent recordings rather disappointing. But here he shows just the right Gallic spirit for Ravel's only keyboard concertos, offering superb accompaniment for Collard's dazzling playing. Sonically, too, this is one of Angel's best achievements, with solid, brilliant piano tone, well balanced with the orchestra.

GOULD: Latin-American Symphonette; Cotillion from "Fall River Legend"; Festive Music; Philharmonic Waltzes; Quickstep from "Symphony on Marching Tunes" London Symphony Orchestra conducted by Morton Gould. Varese Sarabande VCDM 1000.10 (digital).

Morton Gould is most effective as a conductor when he is performing his own music. On this superlative disc he offers rousing performances of these audience-pleasers, including the world premiere recording of Festive Music, a brief, three-movement suite with two vigorous outer movements separated by a quiet jazzy interlude.

The sound on this LP is sensationally clear and wide-range, particularly so when heard on the DBX encoded disc played back with the DBX decoder. The latter must be considered among the more awe-inspiring listening experiences for the audiophile.

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
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### Turntable Myths of **Our Time**

Since the beginning, the audio industry has been plagued by myths. Not the romantic, heroic tales of ancient Greece, but misinformation concerning their products that has been passed on from one uninformed individual to another until accepted as fact by a large portion of the consuming public.

But it's not all the public's fault. Retailers and manufacturers and indeed even the press, must all share the blame. In the heat of competition all have at one time or another made questionable claims about their own products or passed on half-truths concerning products from a competitor. In addition, consumer confusion is a problem for any industry dealing in technical products that the average consumer just doesn't understand.

While these myths permeate every component category, it seems that turntables and cartridges create more than their fair share of confusion. To help clear the air, we offer here some of the Great Turntable Myths of Our

MYTH 1: Multi-play turntables damage records by trapping dirt between records and grinding it into the grooves.

There is no evidence to support this contention, perpetuated frequently in audio showrooms across the land. The fact is that the playing surfaces of records never come in contact with each other thanks to the raised label area and a bead around the outside edge of the record. The actual gap between the playing surfaces of two perfect records is 0.15 inches, which may not sound like much, but comes out to the average depth of 125 long-playing record grooves stacked one on top of another.

#### **Turntables and** cartridges create more than their fair share of confusion.

Music comes not from the tops of the grooves, but from the groove walls. A typical stereo groove measures 0.0028 inches at the top by about 0.0012 inches in depth and is V-shaped. Dirt big enough to do damage when one record drops on another is simply too big to fit in such a small groove; tiny particles of airborne dirt which do get into the grooves frequently settle to the bottom of the groove, below the area of the groove contacted by the rounded stylus tip. Research and electron microphotography done by Discwasher, Cecil Watts and other firms indicates that the dirt which does the most damage in record grooves is the small airborne variety-particles too small to be contacted by two facing playing surfaces.

MYTH 2: The lightest possible tracking force is

Ideally, this is true. As a practical matter, however, it usually takes a bit more than the lightest possible weight to keep a stylus in the record groove. Although it's possible to track a properly designed cartridge installed in the right arm at 1/4 to 1/2 gram, you may find that hard-to-track passages in the record may pop the stylus right out of the groove, causing more damage to both record and stylus than might occur by tracking as much as 1/4 gram higher. A turntable whose base can't absorb such room vibrations as heavy footfalls or traffic passing by outside may also require heavier tracking than the minimum possible. In other words, optimum and lightest tracking weights usually are not synonymous.

MYTH 3: You need variable speed to insure accurate turntable speed if there are voltage fluctuations in your home or if you have appliances (such as a food processor) which draw large amounts of current.

The truth is that variable speed adjustment has nothing to do with current drain or voltage fluctuation, since it would take a musician with true pitch to be able to make such adjustments. Instead, most turntables use direct drive (with or without quartz speed control) or hysteresis synchronous motors, both of which are designed to correct themselves in cases of current fluctuation.

Variable speed adjustment's main advantage is for the musician who wishes to perform with a recorded accompaniment and finds it easier to adjust the pitch of the accompaniment by altering turntable speed than to retune his instrument.

MYTH 4: The J-shaped or straight tonearm with offset head is inherently superior to the S-shaped arm (or vice versa).

This one is a favorite with manufacturers pushing one type of tonearm design or another. The fact is that any tonearm design involves tradeoffs-minimum tracking error over the greatest area vs. minimum tracking error at the crucial inner grooves, mass vs. resonance vs. stability, and so on.

Two factors determine the quality of any pivoted tonearm—the care taken in its design and the quality of manufacture. In short, a wellthought-out S-shaped arm is superior to a poorly-designed or badly-machined offset straight arm (the kind we used to call a Jshape), and vice versa.

MYTH 5: With the coming of the digital disc, it'll be all over for conventional record-playing equipment as we know it.

First, last year in the U.S. alone, some 290.2 million long-playing records were sold, and estimates have put the total number of longplaying discs now in circulation in this country at well over three billion. Equipment that will play these discs will be in demand for many years to come, even if new analog records were to disappear tomorrow. As late as the early 1970s a significant minority of new equipment buyers still insisted on turntables that could handle 78 rpm records, even though the last 78 rpm record had been released commercially in the United States in 1954.

Second, nobody seriously argues that the record industry will convert from analog to digital overnight. The transition period could take the ten years or so it took to switch from mono to stereo, or even longer.

#### It would take a musician with true pitch to make such adjustments.

Third, some superdisc manufacturers argue that they can obtain sound very close to that produced by digital records without the need for purchasing new playback equipment. As the major commercial record producers start turning out better-quality recordings, the need for digital will become less obvious to the average consumer.

And as if that's not enough, there are the dramatic improvements in cartridge, turntable and tonearm design which have occurred in the past few years to make today's record playing equipment demonstrably superior to that of only a few years ago.

MYTH 6: Direct disc is inherently superior to helt drive

All else being equal, one could make a good argument for this thesis. But all else is seldom equal, and there are a number of good examples of direct drive systems which are inferior to much better-designed and executed belt drive turntables.

MYTH 7: Automation detracts from performance.

The fewer the number of moving parts, the argument goes, the less there is to go wrong. Quite true, provided the parts there are machined to close tolerances and properly designed in the first place. When the first Japanese-made manuals appeared they were a model of elegant simplicity-professional good looks, extremely good specifications, a minimum of parts. Fully automatic units of the same era often looked as if they'd been designed by Rube Goldberg. Designed to sell to a mass market, they compromised performance for popular price, while the manuals stressed performance and charged accordingly.

In the years since then, the Japanese have added automation to their formerly manual models and the parts to accomplish it, while the few changer manufacturers still in the business have upgraded their products, eliminated parts and improved performance.

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## Digital Recording

## Explaining the newest "buzz word" in audio

The newest buzz word in audio is "digital." Everyone is talking about it and predictions are flying thick and fast about the future of components and software.

Digital recording at home on tape appears to be more imminent than a library of digital discs, though here too there are conflicting opinions about the form digital software will take when it finally becomes a mass consumer item. So I thought it might be a good idea to back up a bit and explain just what digital recording is all about and how it works.

All the stored music we have listened to so far has been in the form of analog recordings. The wiggles in the groove of a record are supposed to correspond to the air compressions and expansions which we call sound. Loud sounds make for greater compressions and rarefactions of the air in our listening room and for bigger wiggles in the record groove. High frequencies make for more frequent wiggles in the groove (and faster compressions and expansions of air in the listening room). So, everything in the groove (or in the magnetization pattern on a tape recording) is analogous to the way sound is produced in air. Such recordings are analog, then, in nature.

But if you examine any waveform of any sound, you will see that at any instant of time (if we could "freeze" that instant), the waveform has a definite height or amplitude. Consider a 100watt per channel amplifier producing a steady tone at 400 Hz at full power output. The instantaneous power (or voltage level delivered to the speaker load) varies all over the place. First it is zero, a couple of microseconds later it has a positive voltage value. Later still, it reaches its peak voltage value and then it starts decreasing in amplitude, going through another zero value, then on to its most negative voltage value then back up to zero again. For a 400 Hz tone, it takes 1/400th of a second for the voltage to go through a single cycle, from zero, to some peak level, down to zero again, then to its most negative value and back again to the starting value of zero.

If you were to freeze the waveform at several points, you could spell out the shape of the waveform by assigning a number to each of the amplitudes you encounter at each sampling point. For example, if we had a sine-wave tone whose peak amplitude was 40.0 volts positive and negative (that's equivalent to the voltage you'd need for 100 watts across eight ohm

speaker loads), and sampled voltage at twelve evenly spaced points, you'd come up with values of 0, 20, 34.6, 40, 34.6, 20, 0, -20, -34.6, -40, -34.6, -20 and the start of the next cycle would be zero once again.

If you told someone these values and explained how often you had taken samples, that person could draw a pretty good representation of a single cycle of a 400 Hz tone. It would be a bit ragged in shape (instead of the smoothly changing shape it should be) because you didn't take enough samples, but would otherwise be a fair representation of the shape, amplitude and frequency of a single 400 Hz cycle.

#### **Binary Notation**


As you may know, numbers or amplitude levels can also be represented by a number system known as binary notation. In binary notation, only "zeros" and "ones" are used to represent any possible number. This numerical system lends itself particularly well to computers, because an electrical circuit can be turned "on" to represent a "zero."

In binary notation, the "zero" or "one" at the extreme right of the notation represents zero or one, just as in our familiar decimal notation system. The next "zero" or "one" to the left of that stands for either zero or four (the second power of two or 2 "squared"), then zero or eight, zero or 16, etc.

I ... wouldn't let the promising future of digital recording dissuade me from buying an analog tape deck or record player.

If all the numbers you needed in a system ended at nine, you would need a string of only four "zeros" or "ones." Nine would be written 1001 (starting at the right, that means one "one", plus no "twos" plus no "fours" plus one "eight", or 8. + 1 which equals nine.) Such a binary number would be called a four-bit system.

Obviously, to represent more numbers you would need a greater number of "bits." Thus, in an eight-bit numbering system, you could list numbers from zero to 255 (1+2+4+8+16+32+64+128) while a 13-bit system would



enable you to spell out numbers from zero to 8,191!

Referring back to our example of a 400 Hz tone having an amplitude of 40 volts positive and negative (peak) a 13-bit system, in which a sample of the amplitude were taken, say 45,-000 times per second, would enable you to "write" binary numbers for more than 112 times for a single cycle of the tone. With such frequent sampling, you would obtain a very accurate binary representation of this tone's exact shape, frequency and amplitude. All you would end up with, of course, would be strings of 13-bit combinations of "zeros" and "ones." But as we have said, these "zeros" and "ones" can be stored or transmitted electronically by simple "on" and "off" or "yes" and "no" states of an electronic circuit.

In terms of magnetic tape, the "on" and "off" states can be in the form of magnetic pulses. On the surface of a digital audio disc, they could be represented by tiny shadows or areas of light reflection which could, for example, be "read" by a concentrated laser beam.

#### The days of analog recording may be numbered.

The process of converting analog audio waveforms to digital information is called analog-todigital conversion, or simply A/D conversion.

An immediate advantage of the system is apparent. Once we are dealing with a series of pulses (which need not vary in amplitude or frequency, but only in presence of the pulse or its absence), we need no longer be concerned with the inherent noise level of the tape or, for that matter, its maximum recording level capability. As long as the pulses are a few dB greater than the lack-of-pulse notation, the system can "read" the "bits" accurately and will ignore the noise level or tape hiss which need only be a few dB lower than the pulse information. So, in an all-digital communications system, maximum signal-to-noise ratio is a function of the number of bits used, and not of the noise characteristics of the storage medium itself.

It turns out that every added "bit" contributes exactly six dB of S/N ratio. So, in our example of a 13-bit system, you could expect a maximum signal-to-noise capability of 78 dB. That's

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a good deal better than what you can expect today from even the very best master tapes recorded in analog fashion on a good open-reel tape deck. In a 16-bit system (such as is now used in some professional digital recording system) the dynamic range capability approaches as astounding 96 dB!

Even more important, when you transcribe a digital tape, you don't encounter the successive degradation of signal-to-noise that occurs when analog tapes are dubbed and redubbed in the usual studio mix-down process. In addition, there are two more advantages to the digital approach.

Let's refer back to the number of samples we would have available to describe the instantaneous amplitude of any point in our 400 Hz tone with a 13-bit system: 8,091. Even if the

system made an error of one bit during a given sampling analysis, that would represent an error of one part in 8,091. In terms of harmonic distortion (or error of waveform shape) that works out to be an error of 0.012 per cent. That sure beats the kind of THD figures we are accustomed to seeing with analog tape recorders and analog record players and cartridges!

#### Information Storage

As for wow and flutter, in an all-digital system those millions of "zeros" and "ones" we've been talking about are normally stored in a microprocessor during the D/A playback process. The digits are then released in an orderly and uniform manner by a crystal-controlled clock. So, even if the tape-transport system

has a fair amount of wow-and-flutter, none of this appears as an audible wavering of sound when the analog equivalent is recovered during the playback process. No more problems with wow-and-flutter!

It all sounds pretty simple, but there are of course a great number of problems to be overcome before we can abandon all of our conventional analog software and hardware in favor of digital recording. If you have been mentally calculating the number of pulses that would be required in a 13-bit system with a sampling rate of 45,000 samples per second, you quickly come up with a possible maximum number of pulses of nearly 600,000 per second. For tape (or any other medium) to "store" that much information would mean that the tape would have to handle a bandwidth of well over 1MHz. The same would hold true for any form of disc that is going to contain digital information of the sort we have described.

#### No more problems with wow and flutter!

In the case of tape, an obvious tape system to use is one of those now used for video recording. After all, video information contains frequencies well up to 4.0 MHz or higher. That's why the very first home digital tape add-ons being offered by such companies as Sony are intended for use in conjunction with their videtape decks. Even at that, the add-on device alone, known as a digital audio processor, carries a suggested retail price of around \$4,000 — to which must be added the cost of the VCR before you can start making your own home digital audio recordings. Nor are we confined to a single system.

In the case of digital audio discs, the situation is even more complex. Here it is even more important that a universal standard be arrived at, since in the case of discs the owner of a digital record player must be assured of a growing supply of compatible software (records) if he is to invest in such a machine. At the moment there are at least five different types of discs which have been announced, and not one of them is compatible with any of the others.

To be sure, some day we will record and listen to digital audio and the days of analog recording may be numbered. But there are still many problems to be solved and clarified; and I certainly wouldn't let the promising future of digital recording dissuade me from buying an analog tape deck or record player this year, or next year, or even the year after that.

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### Glossary for the Tape Recordist

The world of tape recording has a language all its own. Indeed, when the tape recordist feels he's finally mastered the rudimentary terms of Hi Fi and turns his attention to tape and tape decks, it's like starting all over again. To help you sort it all out, Robert Angus has prepared this tape terms dictionary. - Ed.

A-B: To make a comparison between two recordings, two channels of a stereo recording, or the incoming signal and the sound recorded on tape.

AMPLIFY: To strengthen a given electrical signal by increasing its amplitude or raising its level

ATTENUATE: To weaken a given electrical signal by reducing its level (usually by means of a volume or loudness control).

AZIMUTH: The adjustment of a magnetic head whereby exact alignment of the head gap with a correctly recorded magnetic pattern is achieved.

BASE: A thin, strong and flexible material, usually a polyester or acetate film, on which is deposited a magnetic formulation to make recording tape.

BIAS: An electrical signal of relatively high frequency applied to magnetic tape during the recording process, along with the audio signal to permit the recording of higher (treble) frequencies, ordinarily not possible because of customary magnetic characteristics of all recording tapes. The bias frequency is several times higher than the highest audible frequency the recorder can accept, in the range of 60 kHz.

BULK ERASER: A device used to erase an entire roll of magnetic tape without removing it from its reel. Generally employs a strong alternating magnetic field to which the tape is exposed in a manner which neutralizes all previously recorded magnetic patterns.

CAPSTAN: A revolving shaft or flangeless pulley which drives the tape by squeezing It against a pinch roller, and which controls the rate at which tape passes over the heads of a recorder or deck.

CARTRIDGE: A system of magnetic tape recording using a single-spool endless loop of tape. Most cartridges contain two-channel 8-track stereo program material

CASSETTE: A compact shell housing a miniature reel-to-reel tape system. It retains the flexibility and freedom of moving back and forth provided by a reel system and eliminates the inconvenience of tape threading. The compact elements of the system make for additional convenience.

CHANNEL: A single, complete sound or signal path through a system.

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

**COERCIVITY:** The demagnetizing force or field intensity required to reduce the induction of a piece of tape from saturation to zero. A figure of merit for magnetic tape useful for comparing relative bias and erase field requirements. Usually expressed in oersteds.

CPS: Cycles per second, a measure of frequency response.

CROSSTALK: Unwanted sound that comes through from an adjacent tape track or from some other program source, such as the FM receiver. Crosstalk usually is at a low level, but can be very annoying and should be remedied before any recordings are made. Often, crosstalk is caused by poor head alignment.

**DECIBEL:** A unit of relative intensity of sound or an electrical signal, used for comparing the loudness of two different signals (e.g., one may be 20 dB greater than another), often expressed with reference to some fixed, arbitrary level (e.g., zero dB). A difference of one or two dB is generally considered the smallest that can be distinguished by the human ear.

**DEGAUSSER:** A component or device for removing undesired magnetism that builds up (with use) in the heads of a tape recorder.

**DEMAGNETIZER:** See degausser

**DISTORTION:** Falsification of sound in reproduction. Extraneous tones or signals not present in the original sound constitute distortion, but the term may also broadly include noise, hum and peaks or dips (exaggerations or depressions) in the frequency response — in short, any departures from the original.

DOLBY® Brand name of a noise-reduction system available as a special circuit on some stereo cassette decks. Use of this circuit when the tape is recorded and during playback can reduce hiss level by as much as 10 dB. There is also a studio version of the Dolby® system, designed for professional use with open-reel equipment

IDOMAIN: In magnetic theory, that region of a magnetic material in which the spontaneous magnetization is all in one direction. In conventional magnetic tape coatings this corresponds to one oxide particle.

**DROPOUT:** The momentary loss or reduction in level of a recorded signal caused by an imperfection in the magnetic coating on the tape at the point where that signal is recorded.

**DUĂL-TRACK:** Usually a mono tape recorder with a recording head that covers slightly less than half the width of the tape, making it possible to record one track on the tape, and by turning the reel or cassette over, record a second track in the opposite direction.

**DUBBING:** Copying of already recorded material. In tape recording, playing a tape or disc on one machine while recording it on another. The copy is called

**DYNAMIC RANGE:** The voltage ratio, expressed in dB, between the softest and loudest sounds a tape recorder or other device can reproduce without undesirable distortion.

**ECHO:** An instantaneous repetition of the sound heard in playing some tapes or other recordings. Usually caused by print-through.

**EQUALIZATION:** Reshaping the playback characteristics of a recording. The simplest way is to adjust the treble and bass controls, but true equalization requires a continuous adjustment of the playback frequency response curve at several points. A graphic equalizer is often used for this.

ERASURE: The neutralization of the magnetic pattern on tape by placing it in a strong magnetic field thereby removing the recorded sound from the tape. An erase head on a tape recorder automatically removes any sound previously recorded on the tape just before the tape reaches the record head.

**FEEDBACK:** The howling, oscillation, or regeneration of sound caused by a system's microphonic pickup of the sound output from its own speakers. Negative electrical feedback in amplifier design is a singularly effective scheme used to improve stability and reduce distortion.

**FEED THROUGH:** The accidental or unintentional transfer of a signal from one track to another on a multitrack tabe.

**FIDELITY:** A measure of the degree of exactness with which sound is duplicated or reproduced. Faithfulness to the original.

**FLAT (RESPONSE):** A related but more definitive term than frequency response. Implies a degree of excellence, but must be further defined in terms of dB variation from absolute flatness over a specified frequency range (e.g., + 3 dB from 30 to 16,000 Hz), an indication of a sound system's ability to reproduce all audible frequencies supplied to it, maintaining the original balance between low, middle and high frequencies.

FLUTTER: A rapid, extraneous variation in the pitch or frequency of a sound, usually caused by mechanical deviation in an element that should maintain constant speed. In tape recording, this may be caused by a faulty mechanism or by momentary sticking of the tape as it feeds through the transport and past the heads.

**FREQUENCY:** The number of cycles or complete alternations per unit of time of an oscillation. In music and sound, this corresponds to pitch.

FREQUENCY RESPONSE: The relative sensitivity of a system, particularly any audio equipment, to different frequencies within the range it handles. With ideal or flat frequency response, all signals in the range receive the same degree of emphasis in passing through the sytem. Where there is deviation from flat response, some frequencies are de-emphasized or emphasized more than others.

FULL TRACK RECORDING: Using the full width of tape to record a single track.

GAIN: The voltage ratio of the output level to the input level for a system or component of a system, usually measure in dB.

GAP: The separation between the poles of a magnetic head, measured in microinches or microns. Most critical with heads used for playback where gaps must be short in order to resolve high frequency (short wave length) recordings. Recording heads generally have longer gaps. Dual purpose (record and play) heads have gaps governed by the same principles as for playback heads.

GAUSS: A measure of flux density, numerically equivalent to flux lines of maxwells per square centimeter.

**GROUND:** A point in an electrical circuit used as the zero voltage reference and which is connected to the earth or a part of the circuit serving as the earth.

GROUND LOOP: The path in a ground circuit between two or more points intended to be at the same voltage (zero) but which are not because of ground resistance. It can result in hum and other undesirable disturbances in circuits where signal strength is low.

HARMONIC DISTORTION: The production of spurious frequencies, not present in the original sound, that are multiples of the original sound frequency. For example, a 100-Hertz tone in the original may produce spurious tones of 200 Hz, 300 Hz, and so on. The result is an audible blurring or loss of clarity in the reproduced sound. Total harmonic distortion of no more than one per cent is considered to be inaudible.

HEAD: An electromagnetic device, usually consisting of a ring-shaped metal core wound with coils of wire, in which the continuity of the core is broken at one place, called the gap. Tape touches the head at the gap as it moves. A reproducing or playback head senses signals already magnetized (recorded) on tape and transforms them into electrical impulses which are then amplified and fed to a loudspeaker. A recording head accepts electrical signals and transforms them into magnetic impulses that are deposited on tape passing the head gap. An erase head, which the tape usually passes just before it reaches the recording head, demagnetizes the tape to remove previously recorded signals. Most cassette recorders use a single combination record/playback head.

**HEAD ALIGNMENT:** Adjustment of the recording or reproducing head so that it's at right angles to the longitudinal axis of the tape. Also called azimuth alignment.

**HERTZ:** A unit of measurement of frequencies, equal to one cycle per second.

HISS: Sibilant background noise heard when a tape is played. Although some of this noise is directly attributable to irregularities of the oxide coating, some also is contributed by the recording circultry.

**HUM:** An undesirable low-pitched tone present in the out-put of a device and most commonly having a frequency equal to, or a multiple of, the power source frequency.

HYSTÉRESIS LOOP: The graphical representation of the relationship between an alternating magnetomotive force and the magnetic flux density it pro-

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
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


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
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duces in a sample of magnetic material such as magnetic tape

MAGNETIC TAPE: A recording medium consisting of magnetic particles of ferric (or other) oxide bonded to a strip of polyester film.

MICROPHONE: A sound transducer, or device for converting sound waves into electrical energy of the same frequency

MIL: One one-thousandth of an inch. Tape thickness usually is measured in mils

MIXER: Device by which signals from two or more sources can be blended and fed simultaneously into a tape recorder at the proper level and balance.

MONOPHONIC: Single-channel.

MONITORING: Listening to sounds while they are being recorded, either in the form of the input signals going to the recording equipment or in the form of the already recorded material instantaneously being played back from the tape. Monitoring may also refer to adjustments (of volume, balance and the like) made during such listening.

NOISE; An undesirable and extraneous sound not found in the original live sound. Sometimes lumped with distortion, but different from conventional forms of distortion, which represent alterations in the nature of the original sound. Noise occurs independently of the original sound and may exist where there is no input

OPEN REEL: Designated reel-to-reel machines, as opposed to quick-loading types such as cassette decks. The tape is accessible for editing, which is not the case with cassettes.

OUTPUT: The useful power delivered by a recorder using a particular type of tape, usually at an arbitrarily fixed level of harmonic distortion (one per cent or three per cerit) and relative to the performance of a standard reference tape

OVERLOADING: Application to a system of more signal than it can handle, thus producing unacceptable distortion.

OXIDE: The ferro-magnetic particles which, when properly dispersed in a plastic binder and coated on a base, form the magnetic portion of magnetic tape. Conventional oxide particles are chemically known as gamma ferric oxide, are brown in color, aricular or needlelike in shape, and of micron length.

PARTICLES: Also known as domains, these small bits of oxide are the recording media on the tape. The smaller and more uniform they are, the better the tape's frequency response, provided they are evenly dispersed.

PEAK: The maximum level of a sound or electrical signal

PHASING: In stereo applications, the establishment of the correct relative polarity in the connection between amplifier output and loudspeakers so that one speaker tends to reinforce rather than cancel the output of the other (particularly evident at low frequen-

PINCH ROLLER: A spring-loaded rubber-tired roller which holds the magnetic tape tightly against the capstan, permitting the latter to draw the tape off the stock reel and past the heads at a constant speed

PLUG: A circuit connector which is inserted into a iack

POLYESTER BASE: A plastic film material widely used as a backing for magnetic tape.

PRERECORDED TAPE: Commercially available

tape recordings of program material.

PRESSURE PAD: A device which forces tape into intimate contact with the head gap, usually by direct pressure at the head assembly.

PRINT-THROUGH: The transfer of magnetization of recorded sound from one layer of tape to immediately adjacent layers of the wound tape. Print-through is encouraged by overloading during recording or storing for long periods of time at higher-than-normal temperatures. The audible effect of print-through is

REMANENCE: The Induction, in lines of flux per unit width of tape, which remains when the magnetizing field is reduced to zero from a level producing saturation. A figure of merit for magnetic tape indicative of relative output, distortion and response at low frequencies

RETENTIVITY: Equivalent to remanence except expressed in terms of flux density of flux per unit cross sectional area. A figure of merit for coating dispersions, independent of coating thickness, and thereby useful for estimating coating sensitivity at short wave

RF: Abbreviation for radio frequency, which refers to that part of the general frequency spectrum between audible sound and infrared light, about 10kHz, to 10,000,000 MHz.

SATURATION: The point where no more magnetic signal can be accommodated by either the head or by the tape; any additional signal beyond saturation causes distortion. Usually, the zero VU position of the VU meter indicates the point of saturation.

SENSITIVITY: The relative output for a given input in the linear (low distortion) portion of a tape's magnetic transfer characteristics. Sensitivity data plotted as a function of frequency gives frequency response, usually relative to a standard reference tape.

**SEPARATION:** The degree to which two stereo signals are kept apart. Stereo realism is dependent on the successful prevention of their mixture before reaching the output terminals of the power amplifier.

SIGNAL-TO-NOISE RATIO: The ratio, usually expressed in dB, between the level of the loudest undistorted tone that can be recorded and the noise that is generated and recorded when no signal is present.

SINGLE-TRACK: A recorder or head which records only one track at a time on the tape. A monophonic recorder.

**SPLICING TAPE:** A special pressure-sensitive nonmagnetic tape used for splicing magnetic tape.

SQUEAL: The audible noise caused by alternate sticking and release of tape. May occur at head, pres-

sure pads or guides where friction develops with face or back side of magnetic tape. Can be reduced or eliminated by use of a silicone lubricant and a regular program of cleaning suspect surfaces.

STEREO: Dimensional or directional sound reproduction, achieved by the use of two or more sound tracks or channels, heard simultaneously through loudspeakers arranged in the same relative positions as were the microphones during recording.

TAPE GUIDES: Grooved pins or rollers mounted at each side of the recording tape head assembly to position the magnetic tape correctly on the head as it is being recorded or played.

TAPE SPEED: The speed at which tape moves past the head in recording or playback modes. Standard tape speed for home use on open-reel equipment is 7½ or 3¾ inches per second; 3¾ inches per second for cartridge equipment and 1½ ips for cassettes.

**TONE CONTROL:** Control knob on tape recorder amplifier used to vary bass and treble response to achieve most desirable balance of tone.

**UNIFORMITY:** A measure of the tape's ability to deliver a steady and consistent output level upon being recorded with a constant input.

**VOLUME:** An acoustical, rather than electrical, measurement. The pressure of sound waves in terms of dynes per square centimeter. The louder the sound, the greater the pressure. Most technicians prefer to talk in Jerms of decibels.

VU: Usually used with meters, the volume unit is an arbitrary sound-level standard related to the decibel, and is used for calibrating recording levels on the tape equipment.

**WOW:** A slow periodic change in the pitch or frequency of a sound during recording or playing, usually produced by mechanical deviations in the tape transport.

WRAP: The length of the tape's path along which tape and head are in intimate physical contact. Sometimes measured as the angle of arrival and departure of the tape with respect to the head.

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

I'm a grandfather," he says. "Life puts you through such a wringer that you have so much more to draw upon than ever before."

This poses an interesting thought - While Neil Simon is growing and changing. . . are his critics doing the same?

Producer Azenberg, again: "I don't argue too much with the reviewers. In the long run, since he has somewhat of an audience that will come, the shows take care of themselves. If they're going to be major successes, the audiences decide that. If they're going to fail, they stop coming after three or four months. After eighteen pieces of work done for the whole world—there's an audience."

"You have to deal with Neil in his totality. He has to be permitted some leeway for not always being as good as his best. I get a sense sometimes that they (the detractors) are waiting for him to fall off a cliff. He will have to die, and then they will cherish him."

Often, Azenberg says, certain people will rap a play and then two years later, use it as an example when rapping a new product, saying: "It's not as good as the one that they killed two years ago."

Gingerbread Lady became a cult, but not immediately. Some major critic rapped it once, then called it one of the ten best plays of the decade.

Possibly Simon's place in history is illustrated by the pure proliferation of his works, or by the fact that four plays: Odd Couple, Barefoot in the Park, Star Spangled Girl and Sweet Charity, were all playing on Broadway at the same time.

The measure of the man will be made in the endurance of his works. It's said, "What's past is prologue." For Neil Simon's adoring public that is music to their ears. To his detractors it could cause a shudder of confusion. For as each new work of Neil Simon's is presented, they relentlessly compare it to what has preceded, without even giving any thought to the fact that the man has grown and changed and deepened and improved.

When a project has opened, he is done with it. He puts it behind him and starts looking for something new, looking for another story to tell, looking for another way to make people laugh, looking for that character that touches him and Neil Simon's imprint on the folklore of this country will endure because of his unique ability to relate to people and society and to reflect this relationship in his works.

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




