

Good Morning, Los Angeles! Can you imagine sitting down for a meal in a restaurant without a menu? And in L.A.? Just as L.A. has more of everything than most places in the nation — more cars, more people, more restaurants — it has more radio stations. Radio listeners in the L.A. metropolitan area have no choice but to surf through about 80 stations.

"I didn't have a clue what was going on," Denny said to an Associated Press reporter. "I hadn't paid any attention to the news. I usually don't. When traffic's heavy, I tend to listen to all-music stations because it calms me down."

TV host Arsenio Hall, who thought of radio as a means to curb the violence, simulcast his TV show on radio, according to Los Angeles magazine.

"I put together a simulcast on several radio stations," Hall said. "My thing was I gotta get to people in cars. There were young guys in cars saying, 'I'm gonna f--- somebody up.'"

But besides its serious mission of informing the masses, radio's other purpose is to entertain with music and conversation. The trick for listeners is to figure out what's on the myriad dial numbers. Most people can relate to Long Beach resident Teri Frisch's comment: "I'd love to listen to some stations and programs, but I can never find them!"

KMPC Armed For Talk Wars

KMPC's new talk lineup is loaded with ex-KFIers who are looking to sink their former employer in the ratings. Peter Tilden, who hosts KMPC's morning show — "The Peter Tilden Show with Tracey Miller (a former KFIer)," just wants to have fun. He figures others can fret over the likes of Bill Handel and Rush Limbaugh of KFI or Howard Stern on KLSX.

"I don't give a ----- about beating Howard [Stern, whose time slot at KLSX was Tilden's before the classic rock station canned him]," Tilden said. "I'm not from KFI. I'm not gung-ho about burying anyone. I never really think about it. Rush is only on for an hour [at the end of Tilden's show]. Rush will blow himself away at some point.

"You have to have a good time. There's no secret to what I do. I just go on and have a blast. Anyone who's successful at this has a good time."

Tilden enjoys the grind of morning radio. He began his radio career in 1988 as a morning-drive disc jockey while running his own advertising agency in his

Tilden came to L.A. to become KLSX's morning-show host, but was fired in 1990. He hooked up with KABC (KMPC's sister station) where he hosted an afternoon talk show for the past year and a half. Because of KABC's commitment to broadcast the Dodgers games, Tilden was subject to preemption for more than half the year.

"I was at KABC for one year and five months, but I was really on five months [because of the preemption]," Tilden said. "Don't get me wrong. I love the Dodgers. I think we would have buried John and Ken if it hadn't been for the preemption."

Tilden can be heard from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. weekdays. He also has a prerecorded Saturday "best of" show.

Besides Miller, KMPC boasts former KFIers Tom Leykis (3 p.m. to 7 p.m.) and Joe Crummey (noon to 3 p.m.). Other names in the lineup include Leslie Pam and Ann Christie who host a sexual relationships show (10 a.m. to noon); Xavier Hermosillo (7 p.m. to 9 p.m.); and Tavis Smiley and Reuben Navarette (9 p.m. to midnight).



Rush Limbaugh KFI Not To Be Underestimated

While it is true that KABC beats KFI in the L.A. ratings game most of the broadcast day and that KMPC's new "710 talk" format launch makes for KFI's first direct competition, don't count KFI out just yet.

It usually takes a long time for a talk station to build up solid ratings, and KFI has a six-year head start over KMPC. In addition, a quick glance at the Arbitron ratings for areas surrounding Los Angeles shows some surprising results.

For example, in Anaheim/Santa Ana, KFI is No. 1. Same story for Riverside/San Bernardino. And in San Diego, KFI earned a solid 2.7 rating in the last quarter — better than many San Diego local stations. Furthermore, KFI has Rush Limbaugh, America's most popular radio personality.

Obviously, KMPC has its work cut out. Can it defeat KFI in the ratings as KMPC afternoon talk show host Tom Leykis has promised? Perhaps.

If KMPC can grab one ratings point from KFI, it will have done its job. And

KABC (KMPC's sister station) would become the No. 1 talk station in L.A.

The Duff Touch

Opera fans who like their CDs served up with the Duff Murphy touch can now get that special blend of knowledge and good cheer by tuning in to KUSC (91.5 FM) Friday evenings from 7:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. for "The Opera Show" with Duff Murphy.

Murphy, a 15-year veteran of classical music radio in L.A., believes that "opera should be fun, not intimidating." He rarely plays complete operas, focusing instead on solo arias and ensemble pleces. His interpretative commentary ties it all together.

• XTRA Sports 690 became the only all-sports station in Southern California once KMPC dropped its sports talk format after being purchased by KABC last month. (Tiny KMEN 1290 AM in Riverside was also all-sports until a month ago when it turned into an oldies station.)

KMPC still has plenty of sports, however. KMPC remains the flagship station of the L.A. Rams, California Angels and L.A. Clippers. KMPC was the flagship

station of the UCLA football and basketball teams. Now Bruins fans will have to tune to XTRA, which recently inked a three-year contract to broadcast UCLA football games.

XTRA talk show host Lee "Hacksaw" Hamilton is favored to become the voice of the Bruins.

"We haven't decided yet," said Hamilton, who also serves as the voice of the San Diego Chargers and the San Diego State football team. "I'm really concerned about the travel. We're still discussing it with the UCLA people."

According to Hamilton, Bruins coach Terry Donahue picked him. Should "Hacksaw" become the voice of the Bruins, XTRA will have to find someone else to do San Diego State play-by-play.

Reportedly, Noble Broadcasting, XTRA's parent company, is looking to buy another station so it can broadcast San Diego State games without conflicting with UCLA games. The L.A. Kings are also looking to renew their contract with XTRA, which could add further overlaps when hockey season starts in October.

"We know of only one conflicting date so far with the Aztecs," Hamilton said.

• Hockey has become a year-round sport propelled by the roller-blading boom. Professional roller hockey games can be heard this summer on KORG AM 1190, the flagship station of the Anaheim Bullfrogs, the defending champions of the Roller Hockey International League.

"This is their second season and our first," KORG operations manager Lou Salatino said. "We're going to carry all the games. They've sold quite a few season tickets compared to last season."

KORG will also broadcast the Anaheim Splash (professional indoor soccer games).

Billboard Fuss

Last month, Cal-Trans and the state Department of Transportation ordered KGGI (99.1 FM), an urban contemporary station in Riverside, to remove the mannequins from its advertising billboards along Inland Empire freeways last month. Apparently, many motorists thought the figures were real people who were about to jump to their deaths. California Highway Patrol reported receiving more than 15 calls per day from frightened drivers.

KGGI general manager David Presher agreed to remove the mannequins under protest.

"In a way, we feel like we're being singled out since there are several other similar billboard campaigns with mannequins around the state, including Los Angeles and Sacramento with no reports of traffic problems," he said.

KGGI replaced the mannequins with live dancers on a billboard at Citrus Ave. in Fontana for one day.

AM Band to Expand

A plan that was expected to allow 250 radio stations across the country to either move to or begin broadcating in an expanded AM band (1605 to 1705 KHz) has been scaled back to fewer than 100 allotments, according to a story in the May 4 edition of *Radio World*.

The expanded band is part of the FCC's plan to help lower interference across the entire AM band by moving some stations out of the traditional part (540 to 1610 KHz) and into the expanded section. Extra space left by the moves will reduce interference between stations because fewer signals will be competing against each other in the limited space.

The plan calls for existing stations moving to the expanded band to simulcast on both the old and new frequencies for a period of five years, after which the original frequency would "go dark" or be turned off. The scaling back of the number of allotments reflects the FCC's concerns about the protection of signals from Mexico and Canada, as well as avoiding congestion in the expanded section.

Brazen KMPC Superstar Aims To Wipe Out KFI's John and Ken BY RICHARD WAGONER

"Oh, God ... Tom's Back." That slogan, spotted on the back of a black T-shirt, began as a spoof of a KFI (640 AM) billboard ad campaign. Yet the people of KFI were probably thinking just that when new talk competitor KMPC (710 AM) announced that Tom Leykis — the very same Tom Leykis that KFI fired on September 25, 1992 — was returning to Los Angeles as host of the fledgling talk station's afternoon show beginning May 2.

Call it fate. Call it destiny. Leykis calls it justice, and he minces no words about the satisfaction of returning.

"My coming back to Los Angeles proves that there is justice in life," Leykis said. "Sometimes you just have to wait a while."

KMPC believes he'll be worth the wait.

"Tom is an entertainer, and his program is very entertaining," KMPC president and general manager George Green said. "He is a very compelling person; his fans love him, and his listeners adore him."


For those unfamiliar with Leykis, his show isn't meant to be taken too seriously. Like conservative talk host Rush Limbaugh, Leykis is, first and foremost, an entertainer. Politics and issues are secondary. In sharp contrast to Limbaugh, Leykis leans toward the left politically, and he is an avowed atheist.

Also unlike Limbaugh, he invites guests to his show roughly half the time. But he doesn't let his opinions affect his interviews. In spite of his reputation as a screaming, combative interviewer, he is quite skilled at letting his guests speak and allowing them to talk with his audience uncensored.

Making good on his promise to "talk about things that are important to you," guests on "The Tom Leykis Show" range from former L.A. police chief Daryl Gates to actor Tom Arnold. Mayor Richard Riordan, who appeared on Leykis' program recently, insulted the city of Bakersfield, among other things.

"Bakersfield is boring," the mayor said.

Something Leykis definitely is not.

Levkis, 37, was a natural radio talent. He began his radio career in 1970 at age 14 when he entered a contest sponsored by a Long Island radio station. He submitted a winning essay on the theme "why I wanted to be on the radio."

"I sent the entry in and then forgot about it, until a few weeks later when the station called and said I had won." Levkis said.

It was supposed to be a one-time deal: spinning records on a Saturday morning.

"I really had no intention of getting into radio," he said. "But they ended up liking me enough that they brought me back for fill-ins."

He stayed on, substituting for full-time DJs when they were sick or on vacation. The part-time gig lasted him through high school. Leykis' talk radio career got underway in 1979 when he landed a job at a New York music station.

"The station had just made the switch to New Wave from Top 40 and consequently had a four-hour block of time open on Sunday mornings where Casey Kasem's countdown show had run." Leykis explained. "I teamed up with a guy named Mark Simone, and we spent

the four hours doing comedy bits and taking telephone calls between records. We eventually worked out a nightclub act based on our radio program."

While in New York, Levkis sent tapes of his show to program directors around the country. Nothing happened until 1981 when he received a call from the general manager of a station in Albany, New York.

"This was a station with a daytime signal, meaning that it broadcast only from sunrise to sundown every day," Leykis said. "They had just received authorization for limited nighttime broadcasting, and they wanted a controversial host to fill the gap between the daytime programming and Talknet, which ran at night.

"Now keep in mind that the audience for this station was in the age group of 55 to death. But I didn't know that. I went on the air with Steve Fritz, the afternoon host, to promote my first show. when Steve asked what my show would be like. I stated, 'Steve, let me put it this way. My show won't appeal to the hemorrhoid and laxative crowd that are usually attracted to these shows."

Despite the fact that listeners sent hate mail to the station because of his

remark, Leykis' show quickly caught on. The nighttime show ratings soared from 0 to 5.8. Management soon moved their golden boy to morning drive and promoted him to program director.

Battle-hardened Ratings Warrior

His success attracted the attention of a competing station's consultant who wanted Leykis out of town. The consultant offered Leykis a Miami radio job, which he accepted.

"It was great," Leykis said. "They put me into the best hotel in Miami. I ordered room service every day. Unfortunately, as a friend told me, I was walking into a buzz saw, and I didn't know it.

"The guy I replaced — Neil Rogers had been No. 1 in Miami for six years, and he left to go to another station. He was still extremely popular, and it turned out that I was competing directly against him."

Rogers began attacking Leykis immedlately.

"I didn't say anything for the first six weeks," Leykis said. "But then I got sick of it."

When Rogers announced that he was going to appear on a local television talk show, Leykis decided to fight back.

"I got into the crowd, but didn't say anything until the end of the show," Leykis explained. "Just when the show was about to end and the host was taking final questions, I stood up, pulled out the Arbitron [ratings book], and said, 'Neil, why do you think your numbers have gone down 40 percent in the last four years? Look. I've got the numbers to prove it.' "

That was the beginning of a war that

lasted nine months.

"Neil bashed me every night," Leykis said. "When a caller commented on his statements about me, I replied, 'If he wanted to have it out with me, he should have the guts to say it to my face.'

"Listeners then called Neil to ask if he really didn't have the guts. It was great! And by the fall of 1984, Neil was down to third place in the ratings, while I made No. 1."

A year later, Leykis took his act to a Phoenix station with about 50,000 listeners.

"There were so few listeners that we went through long periods without any calls," Leykis said. "When we did get calls they were something on the line of: 'Did you say you were from New York? You must be a Jew.' I did 45-minute monologues because I didn't have any callers."

A Short Stay in L.A.

In two years, however, the Phoenix station moved from 31st place to ninth in the ratings. Leykis once again picqued the interest of a competitor's consultant, who happened to be a client of KFI. Leykis interviewed with then-KFI programmer Ken Kohl, and in May 1988, Leykis moved to L.A.

KFI was changing its format from light rock to talk. Leykis became part of KFI's new all-talk format, designed to appeal to a younger audience than crosstown talk station KABC (790 AM). His liberal slant complemented KFI's mid-morning star Rush Limbaugh. Angelenos enjoyed the new host. Soon he and Limbaugh became synonyms for KF1 — until the fall of 1992, that is.

Suddenly, management fired Leykis. He was replaced by former L.A. police chief Daryl Gates and, eventually, the current afternoon-drive team of John Kobylt and Ken Chiampou. John and Ken moved to KF1 from a station in Trenton, N.J.

Leykis will not talk about the details

of his dismissal. The facts and rumors surrounding the firing point to KFI costcutting moves. It appeared that the radio celeb wanted more money than KFI was willing to pay, so management decided to replace him. (Although there's no official comment on his salary, Leykis recently told a KMPC caller that he makes "quite a bit more" than John and Ken.) After being sacked, Leykis took a job at WRKO in Boston. To this day, KFI refuses to discuss the famous firing.

KFI's attitude makes the return to L.A. that much sweeter for Leykis — especially since he's competing directly with John and Ken in the afternoon. Leykis is employed by the Westwood One radio network, which syndicates his program to 30-plus stations nationwide, including KMPC, the upstart talk station recently purchased by ABC radio and KSDO in San Diego. The radio avenger can't wait to swap blows with his former employer.

Leykis Drops the Gloves

"KFI is a one-trick pony," Leykis said, referring to the popularity of KFI's Rush Limbaugh show and the lower ratings for the rest of the broadcast day. "It is a mediocre, poorly produced radio station, and we're going to wipe them out."

Leykis is not too impressed with John and Ken either.

"John and Ken are proof-positive that you get what you pay for," Leykis said. "They are low-rent, low-budget, smallmarket no-talents about to get some comeuppance. They know nothing about Southern California, and they don't care to learn. If they don't like Southern California, maybe they should go back to Trenton."

Neither John, Ken nor KFI management would comment on Leykis, who has always loved agitating the enemy. However, KMPC's Green can relate to his competitors. He was once a target of Leykis.

"Nobody does a better job at guerilla warfare than Tom Leykis," Green said.

"When he was at KFI, I hated the son of a bitch. He was the most aggressive on the staff at attacking KABC [KMPC's sister station], and constantly took shots at me as well. He was the most obnoxious of the bunch.

"Of course, now that he's with KMPC, I feel a blt differently. He is straightforward with his opinions and tells it in a way that is very compelling. He is extremely bright and one of the best broadcasters I've ever known. Very driven."

And very happy to be back. Now Leykis and his wife, Susan, can watch their beloved L.A. Kings whenever they like. (The two met while attending a game at the Forum a few years ago.)

"I love Southern California," Leykis said. "I love Los Angeles. I kept my season tickets for the Kings while I was in Boston and even made it to many of the games. I am definitely glad to be back."

Judging by the comments from callers on his first week back, so are his listeners.

id you ever hear your parents or grandpar-

ents wax nostalgic about the radio shows of their childhood? Or perhaps you're old enough to remember the likes of Fibber McGee & Molly, Jack Benny and Abbott & Costello.

In its heyday, the '30s and '40s, AM radio was as popular as TV is today. Families would gather around bulky console

radios in their living rooms and listen to classics such as "The Lone Ranger," "Burns & Allen" or "The Shadow" just as today's families watch programs like "Beavis & Butthead," "Beverly Hills 90210" or "Wheel of Fortune."

Maybe you've wondered about those old radio shows and why your folks can't stop talking about them when someone brings up the subject. Or perhaps you simply can't stand to watch one more rerun of "Cheers." If that's the case, two local stations offer alternatives that are certain to get your imagination working.

"KJOI Radio Theatre" airs weekdays from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. on the KJOI stations (KJQI AM 1260 and KOJY AM 540). And each evening at 9 p.m., KNX AM 1070 breaks its hard news format to run a series called "KNX Drama Hour," which repeats at 2 a.m. for night owls. (See schedule on page 16.) BY BEN STURTEVANT These shows aren't just for the senior set, according to Gary Nice, president of Equity Radio Network, which sells the programming to KNX.

"A lot of stations think it's for older people, but a lot of younger people like them," he said. "I'd say the young and middle-aged people are enjoying this. It's not just for people 65 and over."

Nice has agreements with stations in 22 markets to broadcast the shows. Charles Michelson, an 83-year-old Beverly Hills program distributor, supplies the programming to Equity.

"He's been in the radio business all his life," Nice said. "I wanted to syndicate something different. I wanted to find a niche. Originally, I was syndicating talk shows, but they're a dime a dozen nowadays — especially conservative talk shows."

Others have attempted similar ventures, but no one had access to as much

programming as Michelson and Nice.

"We have all 52 episodes, and we can feature the same program each week so people can follow it," Nice said. "[The stations] can air it in order. You start to look forward to it. 'When Radio Was' (KJOI's syndicate) doesn't run it in order. We're doing it just the way it was then.

"It's TV without all the pictures. I've gotten calls from KTRH (Houston) and KMOX (St. Louis). Every station says people are calling them and thanking them for the shows."

Ask almost anyone who was alive in the '30s and '40s — radio's "golden age" — and they're sure to gush about their favorite programs. There was no TV to dull the imagination in those days.

"AM radio beat the hell out of other

media," Rod Page, a 30-year San Diego radio personality, said. "There was so much more participation. It was larger than life. Today we get so much visual that we don't have to use our minds. Radio is infinite. It's whatever you want to bring to it."

Harry Goldstein, a retired radio actor who was a regular on "The Lone Ranger," "The Green Hornet" and "Sgt. Preston of the Yukon," agreed.

"TV is so graphic," Goldstein said. "It's a lazier way of listening or watching. You had to use your imagination [with radio]. And your imagination was fed by great writers. The sound effects were very important too."

During the Great Depression, dramatic radio served as an escape from financial woes.

"You could forget about your troubles through the radio," Page said. "It was like a good book."

Programs like "The Lone Ranger,"

Jack Benny and Burns & Allen became popular in the early '30s. The networks, CBS, NBC, Mutual, and later, ABC, quickly caught on to the growing attraction of entertaining radio and competed for actors, comedians and directors.

Jack Benny, the tightwad violinist who was on for more than 20 years, was a big hit. (On Saturday nights, KNX revives the spirit of Benny, along with those of Burns & Allen.)

"It was satire," Page said. "He never made fun of anybody but himself. Jack Benny's character was stingy, vain and effeminate. He was sometimes like a girl, but they always had a character with a higher voice than him. He was always the victim. He gave all the funny lines away, but he had great timing."

Timing — not necessarily comedy timing — was a necessity for a radio actor, according to Goldstein.

"Those shows were precision-timed," he said. "You learned to handle the time element. You couldn't do it any other way. We never improvised."

Listeners can hear Goldstein in "The Lone Ranger" and "Sgt. Preston of the Yukon," a Western series focusing on the adventures of a Canadian Mounted Police officer stationed in the wilds of Yukon.

"I started out as an actor while I was a senior at Wayne State," Goldstein said. "I was a teacher in the Detroit public

schools. My schedule allowed me to act. It was a part-time job that paid more than the teaching job."

Eventually, Goldstein gave up his teacher role to become a freelance actor "for anyone who would hire" the young man.

"It was a very pleasant way to make money," he added.

Welles and Westerns

Well-known TV westerns like "Bonanza," "Gunsmoke" and "The Rifleman" were inspired by radio westerns such as "The Lone Ranger," "Tales of the Texas Rangers," "The Six Shooter" and "Hopalong Cassidy." KNX carries them all, and KJOI has "Hopalong Cassidy."

The "KNX Drama Hour" lineup also features an Orson Welles classic — "The Black Museum," a BBC and Mutual Network-produced show that was launched in 1951 and lasted for a year. The sequels took place in the fictional Scotland Yard Black Museum, which contained artifacts from gruesome murder cases. Welles would stroll through the museum to open the show. An item would catch his eye and quickly prompt him to tell a fascinating murder story. Because Welles was such a great yarnspinner, many British citizens actually thought a Black Museum existed.

"When we were running it on the BBC, Scotland Yard called the BBC up and asked would you please announce that 'The Black Museum' isn't a museum at all because we've been getting hundreds of calls from people who want

tours," Michelson recalled.

"Dragnet," which went on to become a huge TV hit, was the first police drama to offer its listeners realism. Jack Webb starred as the main character, Sgt. Joe Friday of the Los Angeles Police Department. "Dragnet" fans can tune in to this show on Tuesday evenings. Other programs include: "Night Beat," a newspaper series; "The Damon Runyon Theater," wise-guy drama and horse-racing tales; "Voyage of the Scarlet Queen," sailing adventures; and "Screen Directors Playhouse," radio adaptations of hit movies.

KJOI's series features: "Duffy's Tavern," "Our Miss Brooks," "The Great Gildersleeve," "Ellery Queen," "Perry Mason," "Academy Award Theatre" and "The Traveler."



KFI's Dr. Laura Schlessinger: Speechless in San Diego

Laura Schlessinger was speechless in San Diego, but laryngitis didn't stop the KFI AM 640 talk radio psychologist from communicating.

The Los Angeles on-air advisor used gestures and family members to make her points during a recent book promotion at Barnes & Noble bookstore in Del Mar.

Schlessinger nodded "yes" when asked if the way she was raised is reflected in her new book, "Ten Stupid Things Women Do To Mess Up Their Lives." "Dr. Laura" mouthed words that were translated by husband, Lew Bishop, and their 81/2-year-old son, Deryk.

"This is a family business," Bishop, who serves as his wife's agent and manager, said.

The family business attracted around 400 people, including children who seemed to enjoy the family outing. One can picture a Southern California family gathered around the radio when Schlessinger's show airs from noon to 2 p.m. weekdays.

Her callers always have something urgent on their minds. For example, a mother called to ask what to do about death threats from two girls. Schlessinger told the San Bernardino woman, "I care about you. You've got little monsters out there, and you've got to do something."

A 40-year-old Vista man was told to forget the 22-year-old woman who planned to visit a former flame.

Schlessinger teased the caller. "Trying to raise children at your age," she said. You've been out-daddied. I think you ought to go off in the sunset and find someone your own age."

Another woman's lover refused to wear condoms. He said they had been tested for AIDS, and if they contacted the HIV virus, they could die together.

"If you don't want him, I'll take him," Schlessinger quipped.

The popular host fielded those calls hours before her San Diego appearance. She wore a "Star Trek The Next Generation" sweatshirt, a salute to one of her television credits. She used the rest of her outfit to answer a question about Deryk's future. Schlessinger pointed to her calves and Bishop said, "It's in the Jeans (genes)." Deryk looked at his mother's black boots and said he expected to follow in her footsteps.

Schlessinger may have been speechless, but longtime listeners Bertha and Ben Miller didn't seem to mind. They



found her charming and down-to-earth.

"Having grown children, I like to hear the problems they have when they're married," Bertha Miller said.

Many fans stood in line and read Schlessinger's book while waiting for her to sign her work, which evolved from the radio show and is aimed at ending selfdefeating behaviors.

"The ultimate stupidity is withholding from yourself the respect you deserve," she wrote. Schlessinger's "ouch list" of things include "stupid courtship." She repeated tenets familiar to listeners, such as: "It should be a felony for women to marry before 30."

That sort of philosophy could be syndicated nationally this summer Bishop said.

The 15-year radio veteran was discovered when she phoned Bill Ballance's KABC radio show. She was invited to the show, which led to weekly appearances. She moved on to KWIZ, KMPC, KWNK and the Sun Radio Network before arriving at KFI.



Karl Haas Spins Tales of Music

From the Australian outback to the Alaskan tundra, from Carnegie Hall to busy truck stops, Karl Haas is a wellknown and much-loved champion and translator of classical music.

For the past 30 years, Haas has lent his deep voice, his passionate love for music and his vast store of knowledge to "Adventures in Good Music," his onehour radio program of classical music and commentary.

"Adventures" is broadcast worldwide by the U.S. Armed Services Network, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, radio stations throughout Germany and France, and by stations in 150 cities in the U.S., including Los Angeles. Haas' work has netted him many awards, including the National Endowment for the Humanities' prestigious Charles Frankel Award as well as a Peabody Award, the Emmy of broadcasting.

Speaking from his Manhattan apartment, Haas shared his thoughts about music, his show and classical music broadcasting.

"First of all, I don't use the term classical music," said Haas in his resonant, German-accented voice. "I like to call it good music — the difference being that good music lasts forever, and bad music doesn't survive."

And Haas, who earned a Ph.D. in music literature from the University of Heidelberg and then went on to study with the legendary Artur Schnabel, knows a thing or two about music. Yet it is not Haas' Ph.D. that endears him to his listeners; it is his simple, friendly way of explaining the complexities of "good music" that people enjoy the most.

Haas' simplicity once netted him a letter of praise that still makes him beam with pride.

"A truck dispatcher in California sent me a letter saying how much he liked my program," Haas said. "I was inspired to do a program called 'One for the Road.' I received requests from truck drivers all over the country; and then the program grew into a whole series for truck drivers. It is by far my most popular series."

Angelenos who want to hear what all the fuss is about can tune in to Haas' program weekdays at 10 a.m. on KUSC 91.5. For those who are interested in a more intense dose of Haas' blend of musicology and story, two of his CDs are now on the shelves and a third is on the way.

On the specter of major classical radio stations folding, Haas is adamant.

"Rock 'n' roll and country will always fill a need, but the music played today on those stations won't be heard 200 years from now," said Haas with conviction. "It takes a bit of convincing to those in advertising that this type of music good music — is extremely necessary for a large segment of the population."

Considering the world-wide celebration of the 300th anniversary of Bach seven years ago, Haas may have a point.


The news of a Chicago Symphony recording of Bartok's "The Wooden Prince and Cantata Profane" winning a Grammy Award didn't surprise Haas at all.

"Anyone can enjoy a good meal: You don't have to be a gourmet cook to know what's good," said Haas, drawing a parallel. "It [Cantata Profane winning] just shows that there will always be interest in good music that is not too condescending. Good music is of the soil, not in an ivory tower. It belongs to everyone."

And if you ask his fans, Karl Haas' companionship and daily contributions belong to everyone too.



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DEAD—ICATED Two Stations Cater to Grateful Dead Fans

Chances are, you'll see a dozen cars with Grateful Dead stickers like the ubiquitous dancing bears or skeletons and roses before you hear the band's music on commercial radio.

Except for an occasional airing of "Truckin'" or "Casey Jones," radio has largely ignored the Grateful Dead. Only fleetingly in the '70s, did the band's music make stations' everyday playlists.

Despite radio's Philistine attitude toward the Grateful Dead's mesmerizing music, it's difficult to miss the popularity of one of America's longest running acts. Going on 26 years strong, the "Dead" has become a major part of Americana.

Since forming in San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury District and recording their first album in 1967, Jerry Garcia, Bob Weir and company have been touring and developing a cult following of "Deadheads" with their unique sound.

In Los Angeles, Grateful Dead fans are fortunate to have a choice of two radio programs dedicated to the band.

The oddly named "Thursday Lunch" can be heard Fridays from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. on public radio (KPFK-FM 90.7).

On Sundays at midnight, KLSX 97.1 FM, airs "The Grateful Dead Hour," a nationally syndicated program hosted by Grateful Dead historian and author David Gans.

"Thursday Lunch" is hosted by "Master Deadhead" "Uncle Bob" Young and "Cousin Tom" Norton. The program features rare concert footage, interviews and activities to gain social and political awareness. The show also assists charitable causes. For example, Young and Norton once led a teddy bear drive for orphan children caught in the crossfire of the Bosnian civil war.

What is it about the Grateful Dead that seems to put fans under a spell?

"It's the freedom of music, pure and simple," Young said. "We're doing this because we believe in the music, and listeners believe and support us in the many things we do."

"Thursday Lunch" co-host Norton believes in the spirit of live music, the concert scene and the millions of fans who travel thousands of miles to see their band.

"When you go to a Grateful Dead concert for the first time, expect the unexpected," Norton said. "The excitement of seeing the band performing in a live setting, with thousands of free-loving fans will leave a noticeable mark on you. It will probably make you wanting to come back to another concert, maybe another city."

"Thursday Lunch," now in its 12th year, used to air on Thursday afternoons, hence the name. Young and Norton stayed on the Thursday schedule until 1987 when the show moved to Friday nights. Young kept the name,


"Why change?" he said. "I guess I'm not totally old-fashioned after all."

Norton contends "Thursday Lunch" is the best kept secret on the local airwaves.

"In this town, you have the syndicated show on KLSX and this one," he said. "And it's on a public radio station that is on the cutting edge, unraveling the evils in our society: the fat cats, the government and the ultraconservatives."

On the commercial side, KLSX is one of 70 stations nationwide that airs "The Grateful Dead Hour." Gans, the host, has authored two books on the band — "Playing in the Band" and "Conversations with the Grateful Dead." Gans produces "The Grateful Dead Hour" in his home studio in Oakland. His deep knowledge of the band and exclusive concert footage make the program popular with Deadheads coast to coast.

"Radio's never been particularly kind to the Grateful Dead," said Gans who initiated his show in 1987. "They made all their money from touring.

I did find a [radio] home for it immediately. The audience was there."

The Grateful Dead is famous and unique in that they allow their fans to bring recording equipment (sometimes amazingly sophisticated devices) to the concerts. Thanks to these "true folk historians," as Gans described the tape-makers in "Playing in the Band," there are countless bootleg tapes in circulation. Tape collecting is as much a part of being a Deadhead as wearing tie-dyed T-shirts and patchouli oil. Many fans take pride in telling tales of the great lengths they take to acquire or create the tapes. However, only Gans has access to the band's master concert tapes.

"I'm the only one with authoriza-

tion," Gans said. "Ifm the guy who can go into their vault and grab their gems."

KLSX DJ Jack "the Ripper" Davis, who airs the program during his Sunday night shift, thinks many people have the wrong idea about the famous group.

"You see some people knock down the band, saying it's music for people who take drugs and get into trouble." Davis said. "That's not true. Instead, the band sends out a message of love, peace and togetherness."

This year is productive for the Grateful Dead. With a summer tour set and a new album due out later in the year, the band continues to perform their timeless music to fans around the globe. And, radio - at least KPFK and KLSX — will follow in their footsteps.



Interplay of Radio and Listeners in Quake

For sheer listening displeasure, nothing can match the ear-splitting beep of radio's emergency broadcast system signal.

The EBS signal proved somewhat useless when the 6.7-earthquake hammered L.A. Jan. 17. When the earth shakes, the eyes and ears of the listeners are far more important than the EBS signal.


"EBS is something you run based on emergencies that don't devastate your area," said Mark Austin Thomas, news director of talk KFI AM 640. KFI, with a 50,000-watt transmitter, is the primary EBS station in the area.

"Listeners calling in is the most valuable air you can get," Thomas said. "There isn't an EBS message that I think as important as that data."

If you're a regular radio listener who usually listens to news and talk stations, you've no doubt heard the EBS signal about how to find vital information followed by a high-pitched 30-second tone that must be meant to prepare your dog's ears for a secret message. Instead it annoys the listeners. So how crucial was EBS in our most recent emergency on lan. 17?

Not very, according to some L.A. radio pros.

We in the L.A. area know all about emergencies: They're all covered extensively on live radio and TV. The one that we worry about most is the upcoming "Big One," the huge San Andreas fault earthquake that scientists predict will be powerful enough to register an 8.0 on the Richter scale and make the Jan. 17 quake look like a mere tremor. We know it will rock us; we just don't know the exact date. Even geologists, armed with hightech quake detection equipment, can't give us a ballpark figure. Maybe it will come before the end of the next centuy, or maybe tomorrow, the experts say.

As EBS is designed for an emergency that can be foreseen, that is, a tornado, a hurricane, a tidal wave or the dreaded Soviet nuclear attack ("missiles at three o'clock in two minutes"), except for the tidal wave, our local needs seem to require a different system.

Unfortunately, earthquakes don't send us any kind of warning. The ground simply starts shaking. The china rattles off the shelves; the walls start moving; and we head for the nearest doorway.

According to KFWB AM 980 earthquake specialist Jack Popejoy, radio plans for a quake in much the same way we should all prepare: by anticipating weaknesses in the places where we

spend time and trying to avoid these problem areas.

"[It means] having all the equipment tied down and secure, making sure the building is tied down and secured, making sure computer equipment is tied down and secured to the desk," Popejoy said. "Our response to begin earthquake coverage is not an accident; it's a result of tremendous planning, making sure our building and our equipment survive."

On Jan. 17, that plan succeed-

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ed to near perfection.

According to Nelkane Benton, director of community relations for crosstown KABC AM 790 talk radio, the current facility opened one year and two days before the quake: Jan. 15, 1993.

"The building held beautifully," Benton said. "I don't believe there is a crack [in any wall]. There's been an ongoing safety program. The new building's fixtures helped as well. The computers are locked down; we used velcro for fastening, thumb locks, book cases. There's very few things overhead."

Damage was minimal at KFWB's studio too.

"We lost a coffee cup in one of the back studios and some of our acoustic ceiling tiles shifted," Popejoy said. "The fact that only a coffee cup broke at the studio was no accident.

"The transmitter continued to work and the link to it continued to function. That is the weakest link and the one we're most concerned about. We have a spare transmitter tuned to 980 at about a 1,000 watts, powered by the same generator that powers the building."

When L.A.'s electric power went down, KFWB kept broadcasting with "an automatic power generation source that kicks in by itself," Popejoy said. "We have plenty of survival supplies — possibly the safest broadcast facility in the country."

KABC is just as safety-conscious. Benson said the station has "earthquake kits that will accommodate 10 people for three days; that's for employees."

Popejoy described KFWB's main duty: "what are you going to broadcast and who's going to do it."

That is a major training task.

"It involves teaching our anchors, having them feel comfortable at our station instead of running home," Popejoy said. "Our reporters self-dispatched

themselves to the story. One assigned himself to West Valley [which turned out to be the heart of the story]."

Scooping other stations became secondary, however.

"You have to stay on the air; that's your primary mission," KFI's Thomas said.

Thomas added that his reporters were ready for the disaster.

"We have different reporters who understand they have different assignments," he said. "They call in [with] what they know, to report on air. Other reporters grab their gear and go. Everybody knows the drill, knows what they're supposed to do."

The earthquake coverage brought the competing stations together. They praised each other's work.

"I think everybody did very well," Thomas said.

KABC's Benton applauded the medium.

"It was radio's moment," Benton said. "Radio is the only game in town in a disaster. It's the one source everyone seems to have: a walkman, portables, car radios."

Popejoy pointed out that radio took center stage when power failures left TV viewers with no other information source.

"I think L.A. radio did remarkably well,"

he said. "What's interesting is all the attention paid to TV coverage, [but because of complete power failures] nobody in the earthquake region saw [TV]."

Benton figured the emergency broadcast signal may have alerted listeners to call the station with reports.

"I think the warning signal we've come so accustomed to has its effect," Benton said. "The reporters on this station are the listeners. People who call talk radio have passion. That's why we're comfortable when we open up the lines. We got eyewitness descriptions. We have listeners from San Diego and Santa Barbara. Other people in a crisis need to know there's someone out there. The news presence is handled by the talk format."

But can't unverified call-ins cause problems?

"That can happen, but a couple of things help," Thomas said. "Having a screener who can read people, making sure they're sure of what happened."

Thomas added that the talk show host is also responsible for challenging callers. By asking revealing questions, the host can help winnow out the crackpots and even pathetic, blood-sucking businesses, which looked to make a buck at the expense of downtrodden quake victims.

Benton said such unscrupulous firms were more of a problem than the listeners who phoned with inaccuracies and fabricated tales.

"We had some companies who said they would help," Benton said. "[But] when it came down to helping people, [they became bait- and -switch offers]."

Bottled water companies and storage firms were among the worst, according to Benton.

"You can put your stuff here if you sign this contract, free bottled water if you take a year's worth," Benton said, quoting the water and storage companies' representatives.

On the part of the listening public, there were wide variations in response to the quake.

"The best predictor is: How vulnerable did you feel after the quake?" Popejoy



Jack Popejoy, KFWB's earthquake expert said. "If it's: 'Oh my God, I think I'm going to die,' it'll take you many months to recover.

"Making sure that people feel safe is crucial to covering the quake, making sure people listening to our station feel safe. We told them to look down and make sure you're wearing shoes."




