

## Billboard Flak Fallout

Power 106 morning DJ Nick Vidal, one half of the station's popular Baka Boyz, sensed a higher power at work last month when 16 protesters — lead by a Loyola Marymount Chicano Studies instructor — irate over a recent billboard campaign, got stuck for an hour in the station's elevator.

"I guess the protest was just not meant to be," Vidal said. "I think everything happens for a reason, and the reason they got stuck was to keep them from protesting. I felt bad for them, though. There were too many people in that elevator, and not all of them were thin!" he said.

Thinness, or the lack of, was part of the protesters' beef with the Baka Boyz. Having dubbed themselves "2 Fat Mexicanz" a year and a half ago, the brothers — Nick Vidal and his brother, Eric Vidal — decided to incorporate their chosen label into some promotion-

al copy, among which was a series of billboards. One prominent example featured the brothers with trousers down around their ankles, eating pizza while seated on toilets.

"It was something no one else would think about doing, so of course we had to do it," Vidal said. "We were shooting the photos of us on the toilet and there was pizza in the studio, so we said, 'Bring that on over here,' and we started eating it while they shot pictures."

The bathroom humor of the billboard was not the impetus for the objection but rather the term "fat Mexicanz," which the group found racist and derogatory.

Prior to any sort of protest, the station management had already decided to take down the billboard in response to some quiet flak about the questionable taste of the picture, according to Vidal. Racism had never been the issue behind moving the sign.

"Also, the ads had been seen, and they generated attention and response, and that's the point, right?" Vidal said.

The Baka Boyz' listeners came through with predictable support.

"They started calling instantly [after news of the protest] to let us know that they took it all In fun," Vidal said. "It couldn't be racist, because we thought it up. We were sort of laughing at ourselves. Even our mom laughed."

#### **Fond Farewell**

Legendary broadcaster and sports commentator Jim Healy died July 22 of complications of liver cancer. He was 70 years old.

Best remembered for his trademark program on KMPC-AM, Healy's listenership loved him for his eclectic and manic mixture of sports journalism and humorous commentary, punctuated by his personally culled collection of voice tracks, sound bites and blunders from athletes, sportscasters and fellow journalists. In addition to performing on-air, Healy researched, wrote, produced and engineered his own program.

KMPC hosted a memorial for Healy, featuring interviews and tributes by some of the well-known personalities whom he lampooned and lauded over his 43 years on the air.

Healy, whose star graces the Hollywood Walk of Fame, gave his last live broadcast in late April of this year when KMPC changed from an all-sports format to talk.

He is survived by his wife, Pat, and his son, Patrick, a field reporter for KNBC-TV.

In a benefit for the American Cancer

Society, KMPC is offering a cassette of Healy's most memorable on-air moments. Titled "Jim Healy: A Tribute to the Legendary Sports Broadcaster." the cassette's proceeds benefit programs for children with cancer and their families. Total cost is \$12. # Looking for Love on KROQ's 'Loveline'

Where can a hip, high-tech, mediasavvy Generation Xer (people under 30) in Los Angeles turn for advice, encouragement, understanding, outrageous fun and community?

Not to the baby-boomer establishment, which Xers feel ruined their world, failed to create a community, valued money over family, brought them up in broken homes and didn't maintain their education system. Many Xers feel alone coping with a poisoned and decaying planet, life-threatening diseases (like AIDS), few skilled job opportunities, the debt crisis and repairing their own lives.

People young and old (ages 12 to 40) are finding a hip forum they trust on the "Loveline" radio program, which is broadcast live on KROQ, the alternative rock station, and L.A.'s third most popu-

lar radio station.

Five nights a week, this highenergy, unpredictable program combines a confessional, a party, group therapy, sex education, celebrity value and a fascinating study of urban youth.

Dubbed L.A.'s No.1 nighttime show, according to Arbitron (among listeners ages 18 to 34), "Loveline" listeners - many of them teens call in or fax questions and comments about love, sex, suicide, AIDS, drugs, family, morals, health, legal issues, body-piercing and just about anything callers want to discuss. Hosts MTV veteran Riki Rachtman and internist Dr. Drew Pinsky ("Dr. Drew"), and often a celebrity guest from the world of sports,

music or TV give free counseling.

"There is no doubt that there is a certain amount of distrust for establishment in urban environments," co-host Dr. Drew explained. "Adolescence extends well into the 30s and the whole adolescent mind-set is there."

The honesty, shock value, sad stories and outrageous humor compel people to listen every night for two hours. Because so many young people listen, they hear their friends revealing dark secrets ("I realize that I'm in love with my female roommate and I'm a lesbian."), seeking advice ("What is happening to me if I'm hearing voices in my head at night that say I will die in some strange way and my body feels like a round ball?"), and information ("How long is a condom good for? Are they more likely to break after a certain time?"), or offering declarations (I want to have my nipples pierced with a ring; I want to blow people's minds.").

People of all ages participate, and some wait as long as 85 minutes on hold to get on the air. Some try to get through much longer, such as Kathy, age 39.

"I can't believe I got through," she exlaimed. "I've been trying for a year."

KROQ has a reputation of cynicism and irreverence, fostered by the unique, semi-sinister appearances of drivers with KROQ stickers on their cars and the darkly hip tone of some of the on-air personalities. But behind the scenes, the producers and other staffers are professional, supportive and even sweet.

Rachtman sits at the controls, with Dr. Drew opposite him. On one September evening, there is no guest in studio. Rachtman described the show.

"We all have problems," he said.
"Every night is something wild — people breaking down crying. There is no way to

predict. The program gives the callers a place to ask questions they never knew how to ask."

Rachtman, the grittier half of the show, has hosted MTV's Headbanger's Ball for five years and plays in his own band called Battery Club. Colorful tattos decorate his arms and rings embellish his ears and nose. Sometimes his hair is platinum with dark roots; other times it is coal black. On the air he discusses his recent marriage (at which Julio Iglesias was the witness), his Jewish heritage and taking off Yom Kippur to race cars.

When a female caller revealed that she was having an affair with someone in her AA group, which is discouraged, Rachtman responds from the gut.

"When the relationship fails, if it does, and as we know it probably will, it will put you in such an emotional state," he said. "So newly sober, it would be easy for you to say, 'Oh, forget it,' and just hit an old depression and maybe get loaded or God knows what."

A fax came In, which Rachtman read aloud: "I think my boyfriend is on drugs. I don't know what to do."

Rachtman's analysis?

"I think this is written by someone with a crayon in her teeth or is very young," he said.

Periodically, the DI/VI offers an unscientific theory.

"If you eat a lot of chocolate before you go to bed, you will have psycho dreams," he announced one night.

Listeners really like him and value his outrageous and perceptive feedback. Every night, at least one listener comments about seeing him on MTV: "Hey, Riki, I saw that cheesy ad with this guy with tattos skipping rope."

Rachtman started on the show as a guest and has been filling in for a year, without a contract.

"I first came on this program, and I tried to have the right answers," he recalled. Then I decided to just say what

was on my mind. I am recognized around town from my show on 'Loveline' much more than on MTV. People often comment about the show — everywhere I go."

Dr. Drew is also a familiar character to listeners. Unlike other celebrity doctors, Dr. Drew Pinsky has an authentic medical degree. An internist who practices general medicine in South Pasadena, he is also chief of medicine at a psychiatric hospital in charge of chemical dependency services. For 8 years, he has been providing mature, professional and sympathetic advice to the "Loveline" clientele.

"It wouldn't work without the doctor," concluded "Loveline" producer Ann Wilkins-Ingold.

While listening to the callers through his headphones, he looks at his fingernails and listens very intently, like an old-fashioned family GP. He gives the numbers for Planned Parenthood and the genetic disease information service or where to call if people suddenly find themselves cutting themselves with glass. One caller reported that his eyes were vellow and he was smoking pot. The radio doc advised him to see a physician immediately because he may have hepatitis. When a 13-year-old described watching her best friend's mother hit, scratch and pull her best friend's hair, Dr. Drew remained practical.

"That's not cool," the doctor replied.
"You have to encourage your friend or yourself to make a report to the Child Protective Services or stay out of it."

According to Dr. Drew, the contrast between his sidekick and himself is one of the reasons why the program works.

"Riki and I know what we are trying to do with each other," he said. "The basic concept of what we are trying to play out is a yin-yang, parent-child conflict, which is what adolescents are really drawn to. They don't want the child running amok, and at the same time they don't want a parent there who is nagging at them.

"They want that sort of tension there that they are so used to and which they value in some ways as part of the process. We just embody that. We got criticized for not having enough of a female perspective. I don't think you could get the real duality going if you had a male and female. You could have two males or two females. The real conflict is within a single gender.

"We are racially homogenous, and that's a problem. We have a reasonable audience in South Central and East Los Angeles. We try to bring guests in who incorporate other cultural orientations. Two white guys from the Valley is a weakness."

Dr. Drew breaks down the callers' experience on "Loveline" to a safety issue.

"There is a kind of catharsis from this sort of dissociative phenomenon — calling on the phone," he said. "It's anonymous. It is in their environment, which they trust and feel comfortable in. I, fortunately, am welcomed into this environment. The program is a place for the caller to ventilate, to educate, to learn from their peers' actions, a place to get advice about some basic issues and get some basic questions answered. And around that I try to provide routine primary care and different kinds of advice from someone who has a lot of psychiatric and medicine background.

"The numbers show that people listen to it constantly. If they want to say something and have all their friends hear it, they just get on the air. It is creating a community of young people."

Dr. Drew added that young people learn from their peers by listening to the terrible consequences of some behavior.

"I highlight and make sense of the actions of these people's peers," the radio

doctor explained. "They do not learn from old guys in white coats didactically educating them.

"I get shocked by the comments about every 30 minutes. Some of it, I am not sure I can listen to. I want to just leave the room. In the years past we used to get really ridiculous topics. But it's important stuff. This is urban America. This is what I see in practice, what's happening in the hospitals. People want to keep their heads in the sand, and we've got to help the young people in some way. It renews me every night. It's hard for me to keep this on my schedule, but it's so compelling."

While Dr. Drew is in his eighth year of helping "Loveline" callers, September marked Rachtman's first year as co-host of the show.

On the night of Rachtman's anniversary, the team plays highlights of past programs, including unusual calls and faxes:

•A call from Tony, 17, from Downey who kissed a guy. Rachtman asked Tony.

"Is it possible that you are gay and don't know it?"

- •A call from Mark, age 24, who is going out with Sarah, age 17. "No one makes me feel the way she does. I used to take speed, and now I don't. I am on parole for grand theft." Dr. Drew pointed out that going out with her is OK, but sleeping with her is illegal.
- •A woman caller said she thinks she is pregnant, but she can't call the guy to tell him. Rachtman was firm with her: "You're able to lay on your back naked, but you can't tell him you are pregnant? You must be an easy lay."

The practical doctor added, "The first thing you need to do is find out if you are pregnant."

- •Someone called and droned on and on. The hosts played loud music off and on while the irritating caller keeps talking. "We do this sometimes when a narcissist is going on a monologue," Dr. Drew explained off the air.
- •They played a tape of the predictions of guest psychic Kenny Kingston from

last October. Kingston predicted that "Loveline" will be syndicated to different cities. Rachtman affirmed this fact. Kingston told Rachtman that he needs the public, that he will get married and that he has an overactive conscience.

Rachtman reported Kingston was right on all counts.

•Rachtman described a previous guest named Fletcher. "He is 6 foot 8 inches tall and weighs 300 pounds. He had eaten a pizza and drunk tequila when he came here to be a guest." They play a tape of the sound of him throwing up all over the studio.

·lennifer, 22, asked on the phone, "If you use a condom every time when you have sex with someone who is HIV-positive, will you get AIDS?"

•The hosts played the tape of the Julio Iglesias show when Nana, age 91, called to say, "I feel something I shouldn't feel when I hear you. I feel so young." Iglesia replied, "I love you, Nana." KROQ gives Nana tickets to his concert.

·A caller complained, "Last night I went to the Troubadour because I got tickets from you and I got mugged." Rachtman and the doctor agreed that this is a serious issue and plan to devote a long discussion to the subject at a future date.

On "Loveline" the callers are tive supporting cast. According to Rachtman, a good guest is one who can put his image aside.

"If someone is promoting a TV show, they could get overwhelmed by kids' talk about blowing their brains out," he said. "The guests get real or [they get] quiet."

Dr. Drew pointed out another advantage to the celebrity input.

"The guests are another level of influence on young people," he said. "When they [the callers] say they feel uncomfortable in the locker room and they hear that Hammer was too when he was 14, they think, 'Wow, he seems OK now.' "

Celebrities often sit in on the discussion for the two-hour program and promote their latest project, give tickets

away or play their newest musical releases. Listeners call in and tell the stars what they think of their work. The star can give very real and helpful advice for the callers' problems, based on their own experiences.

The show has a huge celebrity guest roster: Ozzy Osbourne, Ice-T, Rob Lowe, Pauly Shore, Jerry Lee Lewis, Julio Iglesias (not to promote an album or a show, but because he says he cares and wants to have a good time). Eazy-E. Tone Loc, Debbie Gibson, Lighter Shade of Brown, Keanu Reeves, Terence Trent D'Arby, Lenny Kravitz, John Wayne Bobbitt, Eve Plum from the "Brady Bunch," Gene Simmons from KISS, L.A. Kings and L.A. Clippers team members, Duran Duran, Harry Connick, Jr., KROQ artists Candlebox, Jellvfish and the Cranes.

The British pop act, Soho, stormed out of the studio after 30 minutes, enraged that they were expected to discuss such personal matters.

"Guests occasionally leave," Dr. Drew explained. "But most of them know what they are getting into. Sometimes their publicist or their people refuse to let the show run. We had Harry Connick, Jr. and he just didn't want to talk about himself, just kept it real sterile. That is to the guest's detriment and the caller's detriment. It needs to be abjectly honest."

On the other hand, there are practical obstacles involved in scheduling celebrities, according to the "Loveline" producer.

"It is hard to get guests," she said. "It's late at night, and many celebs want to promote their movie for five minutes and leave."

Booking celebrity guests is a tricky business, but screening the calls takes an iron stomach and an erudite ear. Screeners go through hundreds of calls every night, screening out pranksters and keeping the topics up-to-date. Very few calls actually get through, according to Scott Hutcheson, who has been sorting through the "Loveline" lovelorn, lost and laughable for six years.

"We let only 3 percent of the calls in," he said. "Some people say too many umms and ahhs, and they don't know how to carry on a conversation or don't

have anything to say."

Dr. Drew recalled the origins of the show.


"When the show first started, listeners were calling in response to two DIs who would turn on the mike and ruminate and obsess about their love lives," the host with an M.D. explained. "They very quickly got into areas where they had no understanding about what they were dealing with. I had just graduated from medical school and they thought maybe I could come on and talk about ... they didn't know what they wanted me to talk about."

At one time, there were as many as four hosts on the show: an attorney, two co-hosts and Dr. Drew as an adviser. Jim "The Poorman" Trenton was one of the original hosts of the advice show. An aspiring lawyer who failed the bar exam three times, Trenton met KROQ's program director in a restaurant. The program director invited Trenton on the air to give food reviews.

A neophyte resident when he began his tenure on "Loveline," Dr. Drew has witnessed not only changes in staff, but in the nature of the calls.

"I'll never forget walking into the studio [for the first time] and seeing the most important issues for young people being presented to FM DJs," he said. "I had this naive idea that I could really help these kids if I could just demystify this basic stuff. Now we deal with more of the chemical dependency issues and some more serious psychiatric issues."

"Loveline" is heard on 106.7 KROQ-FM Sundays 8 p.m. to 10 p.m.and Monday through Thursday, 10 p.m. to midnight. Syndication of "Loveline" to San Diego and San Jose is pending.

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# BILL BALLANCE BURSTS FROM HIDING AND LANDS ON CATALINA

Some credit him with originating the "shock jock" genre of radio by combining sexual innuendo and racy double entendres on a highly rated show appealing primarily to women.

He has been the subject of numerous newspaper and magazine articles in the United States as well as England and Germany.

His popular "Feminine Forum" program at one time spawned numerous imitators across the country, and he successfully transferred his wit and wisdom to the record and book mediums.

He's Bill Ballance, and he's reviving his Feminine Forum-style show back to Los Angeles via KRC1 Avalon (Catalina Island), after a 15-year stint at KFMB in San Diego. Not bad for someone who had to be dragged, kicking and screaming into the program concept, according to Ray Stanfield, former manager of KGBS, where Ballance's "Feminine Forum" was born.

"Bill didn't want to do it at first," Stanfield said. "He wanted to do a show like he did at KFWB [where Ballance worked for 10 years]: spin records and play funny sound effects. But once he started it, he was hooked."

For the uninitiated, the "Feminine Forum" (now simply called the Bill Ballance Program) is a show during which women call Ballance and bare their souls on any topic imaginable, from crummy lovers to infidelity. Yet it is definitely not a psychotherapy show like that of KFI's Dr. Laura Schlessinger. Ballance, in fact, never intended to give advice.

At the genesis of his show, Ballance might have been termed an early form of Howard Stern, breaking through broadcast barriers and sending shock waves through the calm social mores of the time. He was among the very first to: openly address sexuality, regularly refer to the act of sexual intercourse, unabashedly discuss sexual preferences and offer open airwaves and airtime to women who wanted a place to air out their skeleton-stacked closets.

While not a counselor, he employs similar tactics to get the goods on his callers.

"I use gentle nudging and creative jibes in order to get them to pour out their hearts," Ballance said. "I am a disembodied voice. Because of that, women will reveal to me things that they have told nobody else."

Instead of taking a set number of calls each hour, Ballance spends as much time as necessary getting to know each caller.

"I spend two to three minutes just getting acquainted, asking random questions so that the caller will be more relaxed," the veteran radio personality said.

His callers might not be so relaxed if they were equally as acquainted with the "disembodied voice." Ballance claims to love women, and expounds on the wonder of the feminine mystique; yet his book, record albums and frequent on-air diatribes reveal a generous measure of caveats and exceptions to this affection.

"Women are dangerous domestic pets, always ready to slip their leash and always in need of a distemper shot," he wrote in his book, "Bill Ballance Reveals How to Cope in Situations of Utter Copelessness." a slender volume written in the '70s but rife with philosophies that date back to the Stone Age.

"You should never put a woman on a pedestal, for a woman is like a bird; look up to it and what happens?" he wrote.

Ballance's book features chapters on love, marriage and women. The latter

chapter is Ballance's own personal feminine forum, in which he clearly delineates his opinion of his callers:

"When I take calls from my dollbabies, I am reminded minute by minute that those listeners out there are not just disembodied voices; they comprise one woman, yearning to be seduced."

He dedicates pages to his disgust with fat women (no mention of fat men), and when asked if he still embraces the ideals described in his book, answers affirmatively.

"Well, maybe I was a little hard on the lard-os." Ballance amended.

During his on-air conversations. Ballance frequently drops in some of the philosophical and social observations that are a staple of his program and of his life. Such penetrating thoughts as:

- \* "No one is ever as punctual as a woman you have ceased to care about."
- \* "At parties, married couples ignore each other watchfully."
- \* "Muggers demand your money or vour life. Wives demand both."
- \* "Women's greatest asset is man's imagination."
- \* "Men: Never tell a woman you are unworthy of her. Let her find out for herself, for a woman never marries a man unless she has a far better opinion of him than he deserves."
- \* Bill's secret for eternal youth: "Arrested development what I call I.P.A. (Indefinitely Prolonged Adolescence)."

Ballance's program dates back to 1970 on KGBS (now KTNQ) when the decision was made to tape his conversations with listeners. The best ones were played between records. The response was tremendous, and soon people were asking for less music and more talk.

"I knew in my heart that we either had to go all music or all conversation," Ballance said. "So I pushed Ray into buying a tape-delay machine and continued to push for dropping all the music."

On January 1, 1971 KGBS installed a tape delay [a machine that allows calls to be taped, edited and played within two or three minutes of the actual conversation], and within a few months the music was gone. Ratings skyrocketed, taking Ballance as well as KGBS, a station that was licensed to broadcast only during daylight hours, to the top of the Arbitron listings. Yet not everything went quite as smoothly as hoped.

Take the first call on the tape delay, for instance.

"I had never used a tape delay before," Ballance explained. "The first call that I took was a woman who said, 'My husband wanted me to move to Nebraska and I said, "B\_\_\_\_!" I immediately pressed the button on the machine and held it for a few seconds. What made it on the air was only the word "b

Stanfield, who had been told that the experienced broadcaster knew how to use a delay, strolled into the broadcast booth and said sarcastically, 'Perfect, Bill. Perfect,' "

Ballance left KGBS in 1974 to move to KABC. In 1978, he transferred to San Diego and KFMB, where he stayed until 1993.

"KFMB is by far the best station I have ever worked for." he said.

This is significant praise considering that his career has spanned many years and stations, including KNX, KOA in Denver and a TV station in Chicago, where he hosted a live-audience show.

Yet he is glad to be back in the Los Angeles market.

"I love the idea of getting into the rough-and-tumble, competitive, anxiety-ridden, high-pressure arena of Los Angeles," the seasoned broadcaster said. "I yearn to rejoin the mainstream media. I am a city-bred, coin-fed communicator."

Stanfield, who helped launch the program that made the man famous, is happy to see him back.

"Bill is one of the most brilliant met I have ever met," he said. "He has a marvelous command of the English language,

and all I can say is Welcome back!"

His program on KRCI will not be exactly the same as it was before.

"I have 23 years of experience and new knowledge, compared with when I started the program," the quipster said, before correcting himself. "Now that I think of it, I haven't learned a damn thing."

He has been married twice, but doesn't plan to stop there.

"I'm auditioning for my third and final wife with the requirements that she owns cotton skivvies and has five good, serviceable teeth, preferably in front," he said.

He hinted that he met someone who meets the requirements.

"I am seeing someone special," Ballance said.

This is a man who wrote in his book, "For a bride,

a wedding means showers; for a groom, it means curtains."

"I've seen and experienced everything," he said. "The secret to the success of my show — and relationships — is to listen. Listen attentively. I never put down or embarrass callers, and I listen to every word they say. I've had callers tell me I am the only male in their life who actually listens."

With all this knowledge and experience with women and relationships, what advice would Ballance give men on how to deal with women?

"Do everything they demand," he joked.

The new "Bill Balance Program" can be heard simulcast on 92.7 FM KRCI and 900 AM KGRB from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Saturdays, according to KRCI's general manager.

# Radio Catalina: An Island Unto Itself

Radio Catalina (KRCI FM 92.7) has been on the air for more than nine months, but had to wait 11 years to get FCC permission to broadcast.

It's been worth the wait for the Avalon-based adult standards station. With its 3,000-watt transmitter, Radio Catalina reaches affluent mainland audiences in Malibu. Newport Beach and Santa Monica — listeners that its landlocked competition struggles to reach through natural impediments like moutains and canyons, claims KRCI general manager Steve Ray.

"Being on the island is a huge advantage," Ray said. "We reach people no other station reaches, not only geographically, but economically. We are geared primarily to an upscale audience."

According to Ray, one of Radio Catalina's key selling points to the FCC was its unique location.

"Originally, the license was to be assigned to Long Beach," he said. "But they found out the community of Avalon wasn't being served. A million people came to the island last year."

Since 92.7 FM was the last available frequency in Los Angeles, competition for a broadcasting license was keen.

"We beat out eight other licenses for the last FM frequency in Los Angeles," Ray said. "I'm not surprised it took so long [for the FCC to grant the license]; it takes six to eight months to get a call letter change."

KRCI also won the battle for Bill Ballance, the legendary radio personality who regularly pushed the envelope on issues of on-air propriety. (See story, page 16.)

"We out-negotiated some major players," Ray said. "We offered him a platform for syndication that other stations couldn't. We will start with a regional

network and move across the country."

Ballance's gabfest began Sept. 24 at 9 a.m. He conducts the program from a mainland studio because of the transportation restrictions.

The Bill Ballance Program is heard Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

This doesn't mean Radio Catalina will become a talk station, however.

"I hope people don't think we're going to change to talk," Ray said. "I want people to listen to us because they like the music. I don't want to be No. 1. We're not going up against Howard Stern, Mark and Brian or Rick Dees."

Ray insists KRCI's format is different from other adult standard stations. For one thing, KRCI has its own music library supplier — "Radio DeLuxe." Don McCullough, a former KMPC DJ, developed the format and provides KRCI with an adult-standards music collection of 4,000-plus titles.

"It's not old folks music," Ray said.
"It's a modern treatment of standard songs — standards by artists who have an adult contemporary image.

"The new standard for adult standards is a good description of what we're trying to do."

Listeners will hear the likes of Harry Connick, Jr., Linda Ronstadt, Frank Sinatra, Barbra Streisand, Dionne Warwick, Tony Bennett, James Taylor and The Beatles. There will also be monthly music specials Saturdays at noon.

The DJ lineup looks like this: Ron Baxley (3 a.m. to 8 a.m.), Joe Lacina (8 a.m. to 1 p.m.), Eddie Hubbard (1 p.m. to 6 p.m.). Dave Rafferty (6 p.m. to 10 p.m.) and Patti Pratt (10 p.m. to 3 a.m.). KRCI runs ABC news briefs at the top of every hour, but stays away from traffic reports.

"We're an escape from the traffic," Ray said.

Ray added some new responsibilities and headaches to his career when he took over the reins at KRCI.

"If you want to get technical, I went from running the board at one station to being general manager of another," he said. "It's a hell of a leap."

The 20-year radio veteran started out as a "Boss DJ" at WPGC in Washington. D.C. He moved to California in the early '80s to get involved in the film business. When that didn't work out, Ray took a job at KIST in Santa Barbara as the station's program director. Later, he ended up at KMPC and KLIT (now KSCA) after landing a producer's position. When it was announced that the stations were being sold to Capital Cities, Ray wondered how long his job would last.

"Everyone was getting laid off," Ray said.

About that time, a listener, of all people, helped him land the head position at Radio Catalina.

"One of my faithful listeners, Steve Hampton, had heard that Radio Catalina was going on the air, and he called them and recommended me." Ray said.

He got the job. Now he has the most enjoyable commute of any radio executive in greater Los Angeles.

"I go out there about three to five times a week," the general manager said. "I love it. You can get a lot of work done on an hour boat ride."

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# Classical Music Host Moves Back West

# From Mozart to Film Scores

It's his mission to bring an important, vital part of culture — classical music — to the people of Southern California. As KUSC's new weekday "Morning Program" host/producer and with an audience approaching a half million weekly, Tom Crann is in a good position to do just that.

Crann, whose voice is familiar to many listeners from his '91-'92 tenure at USC Radio, recently moved back to California from Buffalo, N.Y. where he was also a classical radio host and producer. This time, he's here to stay.

"Los Angeles is a great market and a great city," Crann said. "I'm happy to be back."

A mandatory high school music appreciation class piqued the young man's curiosity about classical music.

"She was one of those rare and enthusiastic teachers," he said. "She really got me interested in classical music."

After graduating from college with a major in English, the budding announcer landed his first professional radio job at KWMU-FM in St. Louis. He's worked in his favorite format ever since.

And although he appreciates what commercial classical radio stations are doing, Crann enjoys the flexibility of a public radio station.

"Commercial stations — and they are doing a good job, by the way — play more of a meat-and potatoes-repertoire," Crann said. "At the USC stations, we have a mission to educate, and as a result we have a broader window of repertoire."

That broad window of repertoire means that the host/producer programs a spectrum of music that includes everything from the esoteric vocal art song to choral music, acoustic folk music, selections from film scores, Renaissance music, modern music, and, of course, favorites like Mozart.

"I put the music together in a way that will be interesting to the listener," he said. "It can take some time to plan, but it's worth it."

Along with a high-interest factor, the KUSC's morning host strives to find music that reflects L.A.'s cultural makeup. Among his recent musical explorations, he has been studying Latin-American composers, inspiring him to play rarely heard musical gems from such treasure troves as the Mexican Baroque.

"Classical music is an important part of culture, and it's very important that new listeners are attracted to it," he said.

Like all radio hosts, Crann wants to be interesting and entertaining, but he also wants people to pick up his enthusiasm.

"This is the new challenge for me," he said. "Not everyone listening has the knowledge of the previous generation, so we're freshening our approach to the music."

Part of the eclecticist's approach means that he's always on the lookout

for new music, especially pieces that reflect the diverse traditions of Southern California. Does that mean he'll be playing any of the instrumental works of Frank Zappa soon?

"Maybe," he said. "Zappa has been recommended to me by a number of people."

# The Voice of Orson Welles on 'The War of the Worlds'

The most famous radio program of all time was broadcast over 50 years ago. It was on Sunday evening, Oct. 30, 1938 that Orson Welles frightened a nation out of its wits with his program "The War of The Worlds."

The story was based on the famous novel "The War of the Worlds" by renowned British author H.G. Wells (no relation to Orson Welles).

During 1937 and into 1938, Mr. Welles performed on hundreds of radio programs, including the title role of Lamount Cranston on the popular "Shadow" program.

In July of 1938, Mr. Welles began a new program, "The Mercury Theatre on the Air." At that time, the most listened-to program was the "Edgar Bergen/Charlie McCarthy Show" on NBC. It was heard every Sunday night from 8

p.m. to 9 p.m. As a result, CBS had an hour of time that they could not sell.

They decided to present a weekly one-hour anthology program, and the powers at CBS asked Orson Welles to produce and to host the program. Thus, "Mercury Theatre on the Air" came into being.

The program began with very little fanfare on a Sunday evening in July 1938. It wasn't until 16 weeks later that Mr. Welles decided to present "The War of the Worlds" as a modern story in an updated version.

It seems that most of the country was tuned in to NBC and the "Bergen/McCarthy Show." However, after the opening, during the first commercial break, much of the

audience tuned over to CBS for a brief moment.

What they heard was an announcer cutting in to the broadcast in a panicked voice saying, "We interrupt our program of dance music to bring you a special bulletin from the Intercontinental Radio News. At 20 minutes before 8, Central time. Professor Farrell of the Mount lennings Observatory in Chicago reports observing several explosions of incandescent gas, occurring at regular intervals on the planet Mars ..."

The audience was hooked. Most had not heard the opening of the program indicating it was a radio play, therefore listeners took the news as authentic and thought the Martians were landing in Trenton, New Jersey.

Orson Welles was 23 years old at the time; but with that program, he became known to every man, woman and child in the United States

When Mr. Welles was on my "Golden Days of Radio" program a dozen years ago, we talked about his Mercury Theatre radio series and in particular about "The War of the Worlds" broadcast.

Following is a transcript of a portion of the interview.

BRESEE: Your program was on the air on CBS and on the opposing network, NBC, was the "Edgar Bergen/Charlie McCarthy Show." It seems that night many listeners were tuned in to your "Mercury Theatre Show."

WELLES: A wire, which I got from Alexander Wollcott [a famous author/personality in the '30s], read as follows, "Dear Orson. This only goes to prove what I've always contended, that all intelligent people listen to Charlie McCarthy!" The ratings were very high. We were giving Charlie a good run for his money.

BRESEE: Charlie was No. 1. What happened then?

WELLES: They had Winchell [newscaster Walter Winchell] who came on at the end, who said, "It is not true, ladies and gentlemen, that the world has been attacked by Martians."

BRESEE: By that time they had turned the dial and were listening to you!

WELLES: They weren't listening to anything by then. They were out with towels on their heads.

BRESEE: Now, when you and Howard Koch and the others were putting the show together, did you say, "That will really get 'em. This will really scare the pants off everybody!"?

WELLES: Yes. But we didn't think it would get them that much, or that many. This was done for the benefit of a certain lunatic fringe. We didn't realize the extent of the fringe!

BRESEE: I understand when the broadcast was over, the police arrived at the studio in full force.

WELLES: The police were already in the control room during the broadcast, not knowing who to arrest.

BRESEE: What happened then?

WELLES: By that time, people were phoning in, waiting for the end of the world. I had a dress rehearsal in my theater. I had to leave. You know a dress rehearsal for a play is much more important than anything else to an actor.

BRESEE: What did it do for your career?

WELLES: Everybody thought I was done forever, except myself and I think two or three other people. I thought it was a riot — very funny — and could do nothing but good. But of course at CBS it was very funny, because there wasn't a vice president seen in that building for weeks!

Mr. Welles was a giant in the entertainment industry, not only on radio, but on the stage, in motion pictures and on television. He will be remembered, always, as will the closing of his program that evening.

"This is Orson Welles, ladies and gentlemen, out of character to assure you that 'The War of the Worlds' has no fur-

ther significance than as the holiday offering it was intended to be — The Mercury Theatre's own radio version of dressing up in a sheet and jumping out of a bush and saying Boo!

Starting now, we couldn't soap all

your windows and steal all your garden gates by tomorrow night, so we did the best next thing. We annihilated the world before your very eyes, and utterly destroyed the CBS studio.

You will be relieved, I hope, to learn that we didn't mean it and that both institutions are still open for business.

So goodbye everybody, and remember, please, for the next day or so, the terrible lesson you learned tonight. That grinning, glowing, globular invader of your living room is an inhabitant of the pumpkin patch. And if your doorbell rings and nobody's there, that was no Martian. It's Halloween."

# Martians Return

An L.A. couple driving through the redwood forest in Northern California hear the broadcast just before they run out of gas. They pull over, hold hands and wait for the Martian monsters to appear over the tops of the trees.

The year is 1938 and Orson Welles' Mercury Theatre has just scared the bejesus out of radio listeners all over America in what has become known as one of the

greatest incidents of mass delusion and hysteria this century.

This month the Martians are returning to mortify local radio fans once again.

Actually, for listeners of KNX 1070, this will mark the sixth invasion in as many years. Every Halloween since 1988 — the 50th anniversary of the original adaptation of H.G. Wells' classic tale, "The War of the Worlds" — the station has offered a rebroadcast to titillate listeners.

Bob Sims, KNX's news director said the rebroadcasts (this year's will air at 9 p.m., Oct. 31 and again at 2 a.m., Nov. 1) do not generate many calls from panicked listeners, perhaps because the



show is by now so famous.

However, this does not mean that the rebroadcasts have not been popular. According to Sims, they are much anticipated, and not only with older listeners — for whom the broadcast carries a certain nostalgia —but with younger listeners as well.

# Civic Groups Decorate DJ of 40 Years

He got his start in the '50s, sitting in the window of Dolphin's Records in Hollywood, spinning the brand new sounds that radio fans came to know as rock 'n' roll.

Forty years later, Dick "Huggy Boy" Hugg's nightly "Request and Dedication" show on KRLA 1110 AM continues to outrate many of the FM stations in the same time slot.

His perennial popularity was evident at the recent KRLA Family Music Festival in San Dimas, where Huggy Boy received a Lifetime Achievement Award from Chapman College in Orange and a Special Achievement Award from the city of El Monte. Hugg has been hosting and producing special-edition shows for the El Monte Legion Stadium since 1959.

Fans flocked to the daylong Labor Day concert, which also marked KRLA's 35th anniversary. Promotion director Pam Amaya said Huggy Boy's show is an obvi-

ous favorite with listeners of

many ages.

"When it came time for him to go, we had to pull people away from him," she said. "People mob him. Adults, kids, they all just love what he does."

What the oldies jock does is what he's been doing with aplomb for four decades: playing rock 'n' roll to the people who love it.

"Back then, it was mostly the rhythm and blues sounds," he said. "When I began, R&B was already popular with the black crowd, and it was just catching on in other communities."

When he first stepped behind the mike in the window of Dolphin's Records on the corner of Vernon and Central streets, he was broadcasting the Harlem Hit Parade via remote to KRKD.

"The white kids from the San



Huggy (left) at KRLA's 35th Birthday Fernando Valley would come down to watch me, hang around and talk with me and the other kids about music, you know, like kids do," he said. "They'd buy records at the shop and things like that. There was none of this prejudice stuff with those kids and the music."

Because he had been spinning the hits from a remote location, the station's personnel had never laid eyes on him.

"They got a surprise when I went down [to KRKD] to record a few public service announcements and station IDs," he recalled.

The visit earned him more than just an extra \$15 per week; he also got a nickname.

"The station managers and such stared at me and said, 'We thought you were black! And you're just a boy!' " Hugg recounted with a laugh. "The disc jockey before me kept introducing me by saying, 'Here comes Huggy. He's just a boy. Go on down and see Huggy girls. He's nothing more than a boy.' It sort of took off from there."

Forty years later, Hugg is still spinning the hits that made great talents such as Little Richard, Smiley Lewis and Fats Domino into legends. He remains matter-of-fact about the irony of his career's roots.

"I played these guys the first time around, and people are still asking for them," the radio vet said. "I sure didn't think that playing records in a window all those years ago would lead to this. I could write a book."

# **RATINGS RETROSPECT**

Nearly 30 years of Los Angeles radio ratings reflects a history both unique to California and influential to radio's evolution across the country. FM radio was reinvented here when stations stopped simulcasting and new formats were created for FM's pristine sound. Talk radio's coast-to-coast success today is really a revival in Los Angeles. And like other cities, stations didn't just go up and down in the ratings. Over time, many went down and out. How many do you recognize from yesteryear?

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# La X's A.M. Men: Numero Uno!


At L.A.'s highest-rated radio station, English is rarely heard. And when it is, as on this particular morning, it is sung off-key.

"I'm dying to come back to you." wails Jesus Garcia (a.k.a. El Peladillo), giving his best Whitney Houston impersonation, which is emphatically — and hysterically — not very good at all. His partner on the airwaves, the only-slightly-less-frenetic Juan Carlos Hidalgo, is onto El Peladillo's karaoke antics. He begins moaning and grabbing his headset in mock exasperation.

"That's not Whitney Houston, that's opera!" Hidalgo cries, then caps his protest by exclaiming, "Ayyyyy! Hasta los puercos protestan!" (Even the pig are complaining.)

The pigs may be complaining, but listeners are not.

Such banda-flavored silliness is standard fare for Hidalgo and Garcia, whose weekday morning show has propelled KLAX-FM to the top of the local ratings

for a year and a half, leaving such formidable foes as KOST-FM and KLVE-FM—its closest Spanish rival—far back in the pack.

KLAX's victory has taken the whole industry by surprise. A Spanish station, after all, was not supposed to do this well in a market still dominated, in terms of listeners and advertising dollars, by English stations. Yet within months of its first appearance on the dial two years ago, KLAX had shot past hip-hop, alternative, news and soft rock to become one of the most influential stations in the country.

The triumph of "La X" (pronounced "la-eh-kees"), as it is commonly known, has, not surprisingly, won the station its share of both imitators and ridiculers.

Its imitators include Spanish stations across the nation spurred by the overnight success of KLAX.

Among its ridiculers is Howard Stern, who has taken more than one jab at La X. When Arbitron ratings first showed KLAX at No. 1, Stern seemed skeptical that a Spanish-language station could have risen so fast. Subsequent ratings have proved that the original figures were no fluke. Although the KLAX morning team has done some counterpunching over the air, Hidalgo privately shrugs off the criticism.

"In the end, it just gave us more publicity," he said.

Both Hidalgo and Garcia are humble and cautious about their extended victory. They realize that, sooner or later, the competition that they helped spur will some day threaten their throne.

"The rating are like the foam that rises from a glass of beer," Hidalgo said. "You know that pretty soon it has to settle."

Asked if his life as a DJ is harder now

than it was two years ago, Garcia responded flatly, without a trace of El Peladillo in his voice, "Harder. Much harder."

It's difficult to attribute KLAX's achievement to any single factor. The music format, unlike that of some of the other Spanish stations, is unambiguously Mexican. This might at first glance appear to be a disadvantage. But according to a KLAX staffer, it actually works in their favor.

"Nearly 38 percent of the county is Hispanic," KLAX's Patricia Coyle said. "Of those, the majority is of Mexican descent."

Besides, banda has an upbeat sound, in which traces of other musical styles, Mexican and non-Mexican, can be heard: cumbia, merengue, rancheras and rock. As a result, banda is a flexible musical genre.

Another factor is quebraditas, the fastpaced dance that recently has spawned fan clubs and fashions all over Los Angeles — a raza-friendly elective to the hip-hop and alternative scenes.


Yet music is only part of the storm. During the morning show, banda often plays a supporting role to the jibes and absurdities of the DJs, who frequently interrupt the music for the sake of showmanship.

Their banter has all the verve and speed of a soccer broadcast — one in which Garcia does color commentary, and Hidalgo does the play-by-play. The youthfulness of the on-air personalities (Garcia is 24, Hidalgo, 29, and many of the other DIs at the station are young as well) combined with amusing promos and slick production, give KLAX an energy that has an appeal to both young and old.

For Hidalgo, maintaining a balance between the hip and the traditional is crucial.

"This is very clean radio," he said. "We don't want to offend anybody."

With listeners ranging in age from 4



Jesus Garcia, alias El Peladillo to 80, they can ill afford to offend. The station's appeal to all age groups is a valuable commodity in the world of radio. The key has been wresting young, often bilingual listeners away from stations that specifically target under-30 audiences — most of them English-speaking stations like KROQ and KPWR (Power 106).

"Mexicans are very proud of their heritage," Coyle said. "It was just a thing that caught on, going back to the roots they can identify with."

In winning over the younger audience, KLAX has proven that regional Mexican music appeals not only to immigrants, but to their children. Conscious of its prominent position in the Latino community, the station actively promotes education and other social services. Its latest effort awards prizes and on-air recognition to honors students from L.A.-area high schools.

In a way, Hidalgo and Garcia are bridges between the generations. They are young and they are immigrants. Plus, many of their listeners have more than a language in common.

"The majority of the our audience comes from the lower classes," Hidalgo

said. "We just try to have fun and raise their spirits a little bit."

Both Hidalgo and Garcia are in a good position to understand their fans. When they first came to the United States in the 1980s, they worked in the fields in Ventura County, picking fruit while studying broadcasting on the side. After meeting several years ago, they first worked together at KTRO-AM in Oxnard, then at KOFY-AM in the San Francisco Bay Area. It was Alfredo Rodriguez, KLAX's general manager who asked them to come aboard two years ago, and to whom Hidalgo credits much of the station's success.

Still. Hidalgo reminds his listeners, despite their meteoric rise on the airwaves, he and Garcia don't exactly live like kings.

"Like our audience, we also have trouble paying the rent sometimes," he said.

Although both of them tend to attract fans whenever they appear in public, they say they don't exude the aloofness or resentment that often comes with fame

"We try to be, not radio personalities, but rather friends." Hidalgo said.

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
