

# EDITORIAL: Eye on the Newt

public broadcasting!

While thoughtful folks have been napping, the country has gone through an upheaval of voter fear and rage, and a bunch of very strange people have taken power. The oddest of the pack is Newt Gingrich, a self-appointed guardian of American wholesomeness, whose plan to turn this country around involves killing off such wicked influences as National Public Radio and its notorious cousin, the dreaded PBS!

pprently gays, non-Christians, liberals and other objects of state hatred have been getting a little too much exposure on NPR and PBS to suit this newt, and his shaky world is being threatened in ways a therapist could best explain.

In more reasonable times, somebody like Newt Gingrich would rightly be laughed into political impotence. After all, isn't this the same man who brays about the evils of "political correctness"? Surely he wouldn't impose some kind of ideological test on the content of our nation's publicly-funded broadcast system. We'd howl at such hypocrisy.

expand his commercial empire into the U.S. If the public radio and television system were to go belly-up here, it might create a sudden glut of cheap and available frequencies for his new best pal.

I, on the other hand, like to think that if Gingrich were so transparently corrupt, the press would have a field day! But then I am reminded that commercial media is otherwise preoccupied just now, and public broadcasting would likely be too cowed to dare.

to decide what is motivating

Gorbitz strives to keep relations between staff and management on relaxed terms by eliminating the "fear factor."


"I don't pressure my reporters to break a story every day," Gorbitz said. "We don't go on the air with rumors."



Public radio station KCRW (89.9) took one award for its series "The



### Ellen K Bustin' Loose

"I had a great time," she said. "It was a really fun experience. A lot of the executives at *Playboy* are women, and they were really cool. I lost all my nervousness when I walked in the door to begin the shoot, because they made me feel very comfortable about it. I never had any desire to do this kind of thing, but now I'm glad I did it." How's the Nastyman gonna top that?

### More 'All Things Considered'

National Public Radio will expand its 90-minute evening news magazine, "All Thing Considered," to two hours in June. This fall, the program will begin one hour earlier, at 4 p.m. (EST). News VP William E. Buzenberg described the NPR programming change as "one of the most important since 'Morning Edition' went on the air 15 years ago." "All Things Considered," which began in 1971, draws six million listeners a week, and member stations have clamored for

an expanded show for some time. The earlier time allows East Coast stations to reach a larger drive-time audience. NPR promises to increase its coverage of local issues by sending its Washington-based correspondents out on the road. NPR will add more sports, humor, business, music and technology reviews to the program's lineup.

### KNAC Fades to Black

The station dedicated to "pure rock" and offering the coolest black and white T-shirts signed off Feb. 15 after playing "Fade to Black" by Metallica. Lieberman Broadcasting, which acquired the station last fall, decided to stop serving metal heads in favor of a Spanish format. Through the years, KNAC fans have carried more than two million bumper stickers to the ends of the world, including the Great Wall of China. KNAC was the first commercial radio station to play Guns N' Roses. The 10.500-watt rocker's in-vour-face attitude was exemplified by their slogan: "KNAC is not your father's rock 'n' roll station —it is the station that sticks to the roof of your car." Listeners in dire need of metal vibes might find satisfaction with KLOS' modern rock format (95.5 FM) or try KXLU (88.9FM). The Lovola Marymount University station has a variety format but frequently devotes time to metal and alternative rock.

### Ira Fistell Arrested

The gods must not be smiling on Ira Fistell. No sooner is he rehired by KABC (which fired him back in 1992 and replaced him with Dennis Prager), than the talk show host gets arrested! The new king of the night was heading for his 11 p.m. shift Feb. 16 when he was hit by another car on Venice Boulevard. After finishing his all-night talk show, the police arrested Fistell for felony hit and run. He was later freed on \$20,000 bai.! The accident resulted in one fatality and one serious injury.

According to his attorney Marc Staenberg, Fistell was at the scene for 30 minutes. "After explaining the occurrence to his wife and emergency personnel at the scene, and not knowing how long before the police would arrive, Fistell



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took a cab to the radio station to do his program, leaving his wife and auto at the accident scene to assist the authorities," Staenberg said. KABC assigned fill-in hosts Doug Stephan and George Weber to cover Fistell's shift.

### L.A. Radio's Billing Hits Half-Billion

Los Angeles radio station ad revenues were estimated to have hit \$503 million for 1994, according to a report recently issued by the Southern California Broadcasters' Association. That's 15 percent ahead of No. 2 New York and keeps L.A. firmly in the No. 1 spot as the nation's premier radio market (in terms of billing). Among individual stations ranked nationwide, KABC came in at No.3 with \$31 million for the year: KOST was No. 6 with \$29.8; and KRTH was at No. 9 with \$27.2. (No.1 was Chicago's WGN-AM with \$37.5 million). Overall, Southern California radio revenues increased by 9.4 percent last year. Not bad for a recession.

### KGRB Restores Big Band

KGRB (AM 900) upper management fired operations manager Steve Ray in January after he failed to revamp the station and to attract a bigger audience. Ray changed the format from big band to adult standards last fall. The adulterated sound apparently did not go over well with listeners. According to insiders, the station lacked the resources to promote the new format. A programming service in Seattle supplied the music. Ray removed the studio turntables to keep the deejays from playing selections from the vinvl archives in the KGRB library. Now the turntables are back, and with them the old big band stuff. The little 500-watt AM wonder has revised its weekday lineup as follows: Program Director Bob Stone holds down the morning slot; followed by Tom Murphy from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and Operations Manager Lyman Jay is host from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. "The Late Late Show" with **Tom Snyder** and **Elliott Forrest** are on from 8 p.m. until 11p.m. from the CBS Radio Network.

### **New Ears at KROQ**

KROQ is back with a full-time music director by the name of Lisa Worden, a Southern California native and longtime fan of the mighty 106.7 FM. Her young ears are no doubt an asset at the highly rated rock station, where most of the air talent is considerably ahead of her in years.

"All the jocks here are just awesome," she said, trying not to sound too excited. "I can't honestly say that I feel one [dee-jay] is any better at playing music than the rest."

Before landing the high-profile position, she worked in the record industry at EMI for three years and then for about nine months at RCA. Now just 24 years old, Worden does not sweat the competition in the No. 2 radio market.

"We set the standards; we know what we want," she asserted.

Who are the competitors for the "world-famous" KROQ?

"We watch MTV," admitted Worden. She noted that the newly reformatted KLOS, is "trying to get a younger audience [by] playing a lot of '80s KROQ hits."

Her favorite new bands are Elastica and Better Than Ezra.

### **KMAX Gets Competitive**

This former ethnic enclave and Asia One affiliate is jumping into the radio mainstream. Since Feb. 27, KMAX - FM(107.1) has broadcast sports talk shows nine hours a day, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday. KMAX will add to its sports commitment incrementally until turning all-sports sometime this summer, according to General Manager **Keith James**.

### TGIF at KBIG

KBIG personality **Steve Woods** brings back the age of Madonna every Friday night from 7 p.m. to midnight with "The Friday Night '80s Party" starring such artists as the Bangles, the B-52s and Wham!

At the other end of the weekend.

Casey Kasem is counting down the current adult contemporary favorites Sundays from 8 p.m. to 11 p.m. with "Casey's Hot 20."

### Sunday Night Juice on 710

KMPC's Steve Futterman has taken on the task of preparing listeners for the week ahead at the trial of O. J. Simpson. Every Sunday night from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. the host summarizes the developments from the past week at the courthouse.

### KLOS Cans A.M. Newsman

Yet another ouster took place at the venerable rocker as it continues to shed its old skin and slide into the '90s. This time the axe came down uncomfortably close to the wonder boys themselves, Mark and Brian.

Longtime morning newsman Chuck-Moshontz was shown the door when station brass declined to renew his contract. On the air the dynamic duo professed to be surprised and confused, vowing to get



Hamilton is dear in the hearts of San Diego football fans as the voice of the Super Bowl contending Chargers as well as the host of "Sportsnite" on XTRA (AM 690/670) Monday through Friday from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. The sports dynamo began his career in Cleveland at WWWE Radio after majoring in journalism at Ohio University. Hamilton spent seven years at KTAR (AM 620) in Phoenix covering Arizona State football and hosting talk shows before beginning his eight-year gig in San Diego. — Sandy Wells

# Master of the Eclectic Universe

The host of KCRW's "Morning Becomes Eclectic" doesn't look just now like one of L.A.'s most influential deejays.

asually dressed and unpresuming, Chris Douridas is trying to coax something besides shrugs and grunts out of his guest, pop anticon Beck, who has just been nominated for a Grammy.

Douridas is reading Beck a list of the other nominees for best male rock performance: Bruce Springsteen, Neil Young, Peter Gabriel, Van Morrison. But Beck doesn't seem as overawed as Douridas

by the names.

"I'm sort of the water boy in the heavy hitters," Beck remarked, deadpan, before hunkering over his guitar once again for a Johnny Cash-like ditty to which Douridas listens intently, eyes closed, his

hands cupped over his headset.

Later in the broadcast, though still laconic in his replies, Beck begins to warm up to the Q & A that Douridas works in between songs. By the end of the show he is volunteering anecdotes, showing an expansiveness belied by such lyrics as "I have nothing to say; my tongue is barely there." The performance/interview is a success.

At one point, the musician paused and

asked for a glass of water.

"Do you have a water boy or a water girl?" the guest asked.

"Sure, a water boy for a water boy,"

Douridas replied slylv.

The Beck set demonstrates the breadth — and the sneakiness — of Douridas' talent. The host often exhibits unfailing graciousness, even humility, without succumbing to sheer fawning.

Yet graciousness by itself would not be enough to win over a guest like Beck. Douridas is also intuitive, deceptively knowledgeable and unafraid to do things — like swallow a few seconds of dead air, or play along with a performer's idiosyncrasies — to bring the best out of his guest.

The interview is telling for one other reason. It is not the first time Beck has been in the studio. With his nose for talent, Douridas was instrumental in hastening Beck's unlikely ascent on the pop charts, giving early exposure to the song "Loser" that eventually got him the Grammy nomination.

ouridas' coupling of dis-

parate skills — instinct and preparation, ingenuousness and wit — have garnered him the respect of his guests, colleagues and listeners, making "Morning Becomes Eclectic" one of the most successful noncommercial programs in the country. As both a coveted gateway for breaking artists and a haven for musical genres that don't fit any commercial niche, Douridas' show, and others that he has launched as the station's music director, have helped make KCRW a giant in public radio.

Surprising, since Douridas has only been at the helm for four years.

Although many listeners now associate the show with Douridas, Isabel Holt (now with KPCC) launched "Morning Becomes Eclectic" 12 years ago. Tom Schnabel, host of the weekend show "Cafe L.A.," took over in the mid-'80s. When he quit as music director in 1990, the station's brass began sifting through hundreds of applicants from around the country to find a replacement. After a lengthy trial period, they chose Douridas.

Sarah Spitz, publicity director and "Which Way, L.A.?" producer, who had a hand in the hiring process, cites Douridas' "breadth and broadcast talent" as the deciding factor. His trial broadcasts proved very inspiring — and to the people who counted most.

"We had so much confidence in him."

Spitz said. "The only person who clicked with the audience was Chris."

Douridas noted that the show has changed somewhat since he took it over. Once a fairly even mix of jazz, classical, world and un-pop pop, "Morning" now features less of the first three and more of the last one.

At first, tampering with the format was not an easy thing to do.

"I had to prove myself to a very enthusiastic audience."
Douridas recalled. "At the beginning it was more like what Tom Schnabel does now on the weekend."

Since then, the show has become more up-tempo and less esoteric, with more of an emphasis on current and breaking artists. The playlist is still far-flung compared to that of most commercial stations, yet these days Douridas shows a definite preference for recent recordings of living artists such as Portishead. Sinead O'Connor, The Latin Playboys, MC Solar, Tori Amos, Nick Cave — just to name a few.

Has the "Morning" become something besides eclectic? Douridas thinks not. Although once in a while the show has the feel of adult album alternative (AAA).

Douridas emphatically denies any great resemblance.

"I don't think we're in danger of sounding [that way]." he said. "In AAA, you know the parameters of the show."

Nor does the 32-year-old host think he has catered to tastes of a younger audience, so as to wrest listeners from stations like KROQ-FM.

Indeed, while album-alternative and alternative-rock stations are often more rigid in reality than their appellations imply, "Morning Becomes Eclectic" remains open to just about any listener request, from Charles Ives to Throbbing Gristle.

"Do you think I would be throwing in Sainkho from South Siberia to reel in some GenXer?" the youthful music director asked to make his point.

Born in Ohio, Douridas grew up in the Midwest. Although as a child he played piano, guitar and saxophone, he had to chose between music and drama in high school. He chose drama. He found success in acting from the beginning, landing sundry television and movie parts in Texas, where he was a theatre major at the University of North Texas.

Radio was the actor's second choice. Since he didn't want to wait tables, he was looking for a more rewarding way to make money.

Like many deejays, his college station. KNTV-FM, was his stepping stone. The University of North Texas, he pointed out, was "a huge music school," the first in the nation with its own jazz program.

After college, at KERA-FM in Dallas, he and a couple of former classmates

changed the format from classical/jazz to eclectic. When the station began to slide into AAA several years later, Douridas knew it was time to leave.

In May of 1990 he headed to Los Angeles — the perfect place to pursue his dual interests of radio and acting. After a brief job search, he managed to get his foot in the door at KUSC-FM. With deejay Iim Svejda out ill, Douridas substituted for six months, putting his former experience spinning classical music to use. When the KCRW opportunity came at the end of the year, Douridas grabbed it.

As music director of the station, Douridas' influence immediately went well beyond the 9-to-12 weekday time slot of "Morning Becomes Eclectic."

"I was looking for a station that was a precursor to Triple A," he explained. "But even at KCRW, there were some gaps I thought we could fill."

He sensed an opportunity to reach a wider audience without abandoning the eclectic format.

Since coming to the station, he has hired several deejays whose own shows have developed their following. Liza Richardson, whom Douridas has known since his days in Texas, made "Man in the Moon" a popular nighttime program offering a mixture of (mostly overlapping) spoken word and international pop and rock. She now hosts a show on weekends called "Total Eclipse."

Other Douridas recruits include Jason Bentley, whose "Metropolis" brings weeknight prime-time listeners a good dose of acid jazz, hiphop and other mostly danceable miscellany; and Tricia Halloran, host of "Brave New World," a show that features "alternative" rock in the truest sense of the word — tunes that haven't (in most cases) yet cracked the Top 40.

The music director also staged a rather large coup when he arranged a satellite exchange with France. Americans heard Paris' vaunted "Radio Nova" for the first time; and he sent four

KCRW shows, including "Morning Becomes Eclectic," to France.

His success has not come without some snags. A few months ago, the station caught criticism from some listeners for canceling "The African Beat" — a weekend show focusing on African music — in favor of "Total Eclipse."

Douridas described the cancellation as "an executive decision, a collective decision," and noted that KCRW is no longer a block-formatted station. He sees the station evolving into a slightly different creature than before, one in which the different shows that air go "through the filter of eclectic music."

Despite Douridas' position of influence within the station, the show

remains his signature. In a way, "Morning Becomes Eclectic" is the mothershow from which the others on the station draw varying degrees of sustenance. For example, it is not uncommon to hear pieces from his show on "Metropolis" or "Total Eclipse." By the same token, Douridas often plays songs that first aired on other shows.

At times there seems to be no music — nor even musician — unfamiliar to him. The music maven's credibility

among his colleagues is clear.

Gary Calamar, the tracking coordinator for the station's large music library and host of the early Sunday morning show "The Red Eye," is continually impressed with the wealth of his colleague's musical knowledge.

"He's always finding great things," Calamar commented. "He can talk oneto-one with these artists, and that's why

they come back."

Besides his rapport with recording artists. Douridas is in constant contact with record executives — who just as often want to pick his brain for ideas as pitch their own. Geffen Records has commissioned him as a consultant, and he is a soundtrack consultant on two movies.

Joel Amsterdam, director of press and artist development for Elektra Records, finds that Douridas has a big impact on

the industry.

"'Morning Becomes Eclectic' [represents] a very important part of what we think is essential to a young band's career," Amsterdam said, adding that many of the people who listen to the program are "gatekeepers."

As to what sets KCRW's music authority apart from other deejays, Amsterdam finds he possesses clusive qualities that give the show a distinctive, and, of

course, eclectic, sound.

"Very few people have the passion and musical education in the way that Chris does," Amsterdam said. "He lets you discover the music instead of hitting you over the head with it. He's almost subversive that way."

For an individual of such broad talent, isn't Douridas tempted to expand his horizons? The answer is yes and no. He admitted he "seriously considered" working for AAA upstart FM 101.9 last year until, he says, negotiations broke down. However, he is having ongoing conversations with VH-1 execs about their new program development.

As for the possibility of spreading the gospel of eclecticism to other regions,

Douridas is doubtful.

"We're in L.A. and all music is considered," he said. "Most people [in other metropolitan areas] look at KCRW and think, 'Well, this wouldn't work here.' It's an anomoly."

Perhaps a greater temptation than other music offers is the allure of Hollywood. After all, acting was one of the main reasons that he came to Los Angeles in the first place. By most actors' standards, he has so far had a fairly successful go at it. He recently guest-starred on shows such as "Ellen," and he will soon appear in "Waterworld," an upcoming feature film starring Kevin Costner.

Asked if he feels powerful in his radio position, he says no. Although he clearly has a role to play in exposing little-known or much-forgotten artists to the public ear, he contends it's a role of facilitator, not kingmaker.

"I feel we have an audience with power," he said. "I think Beck would have happened somehow anyway. Good

talent will get out there anyway."

For the time being, the young talent claims to be satisfied where he is. It seems radio just won't let him go com-

pletely.

"I keep choosing it, and I keep having to make that choice." he said. "I'm certainly not stuck here. It's not the only thing I could be happy doing. But I love what I do. For radio, this is mecca to me."

# Will the GOP Pulverize Public Radio?

While courting conservative and commercial talk radio, the new Republican Congress may have a contract out on public radio.

In its ambitious plans to change how government is run and how government money is spent, the GOP-dominated Congress has asked the Corporation for Public Broadcasting to justify its existence. More than 1,000 television and radio stations around the country funded by CPB find themselves making a case for the federal dollars they receive to a Congress bent on reducing the deficit while cutting taxes.

In Los Angeles County, a fleet of publicly funded stations sail the airwaves from Northridge to San Bernardino, including KCRW (89.9), KUSC (91.5), KPCC (89.3), KPFK (90.7), KLON (88.1) and KCSN (88.5).

"We've never been in such jeopardy before," said Will Lewis, a management consultant for KCRW. "There have been fights over funding and all that, but never a consideration to kill the Public Broadcasting Act of 1967, which, of course, is what we're talking about."

The Public Broadcasting Act of 1967

founded the Corporation for Public Broadcasting to establish a system of locally-owned public television and radio stations as an alternative to their commercial counterparts.

Of the money appropriated for the CPB, 93 percent of it goes to individual stations. KCRW relies on CPB for 17 % of its income, which accounts for about \$620,000 of a total budget of about \$3.5 million.

"Without that, public radio as we know it would not exist," Lewis said. Noncommerical stations such as KCRW already run on a bare-bones budget, making a leap of faith into every new budget year by projecting that the one in 10 listeners who donate will come through with enough money to pay the bills.

Public stations use the funds not only to meet everyday needs, but as critical seed money to forward to producers seeking matching grants. General managers said that every dollar in funding from CPB leverages five dollars in donations from corporate, foundation and individual donor sources.

In addition, the security of a revenue stream based on government funding enables public stations to acquire expensive programming such as National Public Radio.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich and company make the case that public radio carries a liberal bias. Not only then is the decision one of clear-cut dollars and cents, but one rife with political implications. The right-wing politicians have to be convinced to fund their political adversaries to save the public broadcasting budget.

Lewis defends public radio as generally objective but admits to liberal overtones to the programming.

"I think there's a slight unconscious bias because the media reflects society; and Democrats have been in power all those years," Lewis said.

The government has the power to influence what is reported by allowing or

restricting access and determining the legislative agenda that becomes the subject of reporting and debate.

However, Lewis emphasized that a cutoff of federal funding is not likely to make public stations more objective. Just the opposite could occur. Just as commercial radio can be perceived as beholden to its corporate sponsors, public radio could also be driven by the purse strings, whether they be from the government or huge private foundations that the stations briefly recognize on air in lieu of direct advertisements.

"The freest money is probably the federal dollar because all these foundations have social agendas," Lewis said.

Not only that, he added, but from a political standpoint the government loses its ability to influence the direction of public radio by drawing the purse strings shut. Lewis argued that a far better step toward objectivity would be a CPB with an appropriation insulated from the political jockeying of Congress.

George Nicholaw, general manager of news giant KNX 1070 AM, dismisses such claims of threatened objectivity. He has 28 years experience at the commercial station in Los Angeles to inform him.

"Not once during this entire period

has a sponsor interfered with any editorial content on this station," Nicholaw said. "I think that's a myth."

If Congress does cut, though, the effect could be significant, particularly in remote areas with small donor bases. Stations hit their fund-raising high points fairly early on and are unable to generate more individual contributors because of the limited audience, particularly for public radio. And with the lower ratings, commercial dollars would be hard to come by even if they were permitted to seek those dollars.

And larger stations in major markets could find themselves cutting back on their expensive, locally-produced programs that gain a national audience.

At KCRW, the cuts could result in the cancellation of "Which Way, L.A.?" — the popular community forum that promotes dialogue on social, political and economic issues.

Lewis added that KCRW may no longer be able to afford a legal correspondent for the King. Denny and Simpson trials. Another possibility in the worst-case scenario is the loss of translators that deliver KCRW's signal to outlying areas.

At KPCC (89.3), snipping the funding lifeline from CPB could mean the closure of its full-time broadcast laboratory for scores of Pasadena City College students, according to General Manager Rod Foster. Of course, programming

would be affected too, and the most expensive programming would be looked at first: NPR.

On a national scale, programs such as "Morning Edition" and "All Things Considered" could feel the pinch as subscribing stations are forced to make cutbacks.

If individual stations cannot afford to subscribe to NPR, the Washington D.C.-based news organization may find its own budget strained, forcing the closure of news bureaus and the cutting of staff. Stations that survive CPB cutbacks and continue to subscribe to NPR will have to pay more to receive the same programming because of the reduced pool of subscribers. The costs of the programming could be prohibitive for even more stations.

"You could get sort of a spiral effect that could essentially bring down the whole system as we know it," said NPR spokeswoman Mary Morgan.

The funding of NPR does not flow directly from Congress to the D.C. head-quarters. Congress makes its appropriation for CPB, which distributes the money in the form of regular allocations and special grants to its member stations. Those stations, in turn, can choose to purchase programming from NPR, or in the case of television stations, buy locally produced programming from other individual stations, much the way many buy the popular science show "Nova."

Because of theses nuances, the effects won't be discernible until the CPB funding is determined and the individual stations make their final decisions on how to react to their allocations.

As hearings on the matter opened in January, NPR president Delano Lewis argued for continued government support of the nation's 520 public radio stations' in the name of educating and informing citizens.

At a news conference earlier this year, Gingrich called public broadcasting a "sandbox for the rich."

He has since softened his rhetoric as polls show strong public support for government subsidies to public broadcasting. The CPB maintains that 60 percent of the households that watch its programming make less than \$40,000 a year. Viewers and listeners get quality cultural, educational and informative programming for about one dollar per person per year, defenders counter those fiscal conservatives looking for places to drop the budget ax. For radio, the cost is only 29 cents per capita annually.

But Nicholaw insists that public broadcasting has proven it can collect money from its listeners and may be ready to go on its own after a proper phase-out period. In an editorial broadcast on KNX, he advocated a phase-out period of five years for TV and 10 for radio.

"They have a very solid base of upscale listeners and viewers," he said. "Don't ignore that. These listeners and viewers

are not going to abandon ship.'

And if the public stations need to sell commercials make up the shortfall, so be it, according to Nicholaw. The stations have tremendous assets and should be able to survive on their own eventually, he argued.

But Morgan of NPR counters that commercialization of stations that "narrowcast" to

select audiences may not be such an easy proposition.

'If what we were doing were viable commercially, we would see people doing it," Morgan said.

Public radio administrators emphasize that already they have stretched their contributions to the limit and have tapped into the donation base as much as they can. To deliver such a prominent attack on \$285 million in a budget of \$1.4 trillion smacks of partisanship, general managers contended.

"Why would budget-cutting a Congress start wish such a little expendi-

ture?" KPCC's Foster said.

Lewis of KCRW tried to deflect the

focus from public radio by mentioning that farm subsidies, for example, dwarf appropriations for CPB.

A House Appropriations subcommittee recently recommended a two-year recision process cutting the current budget by 15 percent in '96, 30 percent in 97 and "zeroed out in '98.

Republican Larry Pressler of South Dakota will likely introduce the Senate legislation that will determine CPB's funding.

Differences between House and Senate bills must be reconciled in a legislative conference before being passed as a single piece of legislation by Congress. President Clinton has declared he opposes zeroing out public radio, but

> cuts in a broad appropriations bill may be difficult to veto.

Anv decision could include cuts in the \$285 million Congress appropriated for CPB in the current fiscal year, which started in October.

"In the worst-case scenario the average listener is not going to hear National Public Radio anymore," NPR's Morgan proclaimed.

That is the worst- case scenario, though.

"I think we'll take some cuts, but I think the system is going to survive," Lewis said.

# L.A.'s Only Free-Form Chicano Show

If there is one place on the dial where Spanish mixes freely with English, where pachuco horseplay mingles with minisermons on education, and where one song by the Midniters gets played 12 times in a row, it has to be Saturday night on "The Sancho Show."

"I got música para arriba; I got all kinds of música," says the eponymous host of KPCC's "The Sancho Show." "If you want some mean boleros [slow, romantic Latin music], if this don't do it for you, not even champurrado [Mexican

broth going to do it for you."

On comes the classic "Sabor a mi," whose chaaa cha-CHA-cha chaaa backbeat and mellow guitar bring the mood to a bittersweet lull.

But only for a moment.

Sancho suddenly freezes the disc and plays an acoustic guitar riff again. And again. And again.

"Hey, you guys catch that mistake?" he repeats, as though he himself is doing

the picking.

Meanwhile, he and his helpers are frantically taking calls from all over the area. Sancho wonders aloud if he should keep playing boleros. But what he's really after is response: communication.

Between songs, he entreats his audience to let him know what they are thinking. For a while, the phone lines light up. Assistants pop in from time to time, dropping the latest numbers in front of the microphone. Most listeners, it seems, are in favor of more boleros, so Sancho keeps them spinning.

Gradually, interest begins to wane.

Sancho resorts to wheedling.

"If you dig boleros, that means you're cosmopolitan," he said.

Finally, with the calls no longer com-

ing in, he feigns injury:

"Hijole, I wanted to play you some more, but you guys are getting really cold

about calling."

It is just one episode in an evening of spontaneous, sometimes maddening fun typical of "The Sancho Show," which can lay claim to being the only authentically free-form Chicano music show on the radio. From Los Lobos to Los Tres Ases, The Midniters to the Texas Tornados, the program serves an array of music conspicuously absent from almost all other stations on the air.

Yet "The Sancho Show" is not just about music; and its host is not as frivolous as his on-air style might suggest.

Most of the time, Sancho calls him-

self Dr. Daniel Castro. A native of Pasadena, Castro. 50, got into radio rather late in life. Early on, he was clearly too busy educating himself to do much else.

After getting his bachelor's degree from UC Santa Barbara in the mid-'60s, he developed an interest in criminal justice. For a while, he wanted to be a lawver. It took attending law school at USC to dissuade him. Next enrolled in Occidental College's Urban Studies program as a Coro Fellow, then on to a number of other universities around the country.

Several graduate schools and a few jobs later (including a stint with the Bureau of Prisons). Castro is now provost of East LA College Southwest Educational Center (a satellite campus in Huntington Park).

His interest in youth reform and education led him to "The Sancho

Show." In the early '80s, KPCC (89.3) was looking for a Chicano show. However, the station manager at the time wanted a talk show in either English or Spanish, involving "role-model Chicanos."

Meanwhile, Castro and his colleagues on the Pasadena Scholarship Committee for Mexican-Americans were trying to solve some urgent problems. Drop-out rates among Latino high school students were pushing 50 percent, even among fourth- and fifth-generation Chicanos.

Suddenly, the community leader had a brainstorm. As he saw it at the time: "Seventy percent of the information our kids get comes from the radio." When he realized KPCC and the committee had something in common, he agreed to host

a one-hour show Saturdays at 5 p.m.

The only question that remained was the nature of the show. Castro was dead against the type of talk format that KPCC wanted. He believed it would be too stale and wouldn't reach the type of audience he felt needed to be reached. Another obstacle was the station's insistence that the show avoid mixing Spanish and English, a routine practice among many Chicanos.

The determined educator eventually got his way.

" 'If it doesn't work, you can kick us off,' " he recalled telling management at the time.

Eventually, he changed the show to its current 6-to -2 slot Saturday nights.

"We broke all the rules," he said. "We

don't do it in English, and we don't do it in Spanish."

Asked if he has aimed the show at the Chicano community, the unique host says ves and no. He likens the show to. of all things, the taco: You can't restrict it to the ethnic group that came up with the idea. He reported that about 30 percent of the pledges the station gets because of "The Sancho Show" come from black and Anglo listeners. More than half the music aired is in English; and the crossover appeal of the playlist is apparent to many who chance upon the show while stationsurfing.

Since the "Airwayes of Aztlan" — as "The Sancho Show" is also known benefits a Chicano scholarship fund, it should come as no surprise that the provost inevitably sprinkles the music with serious words on the importance of staying in school.

There are limits, however, to the community activist's expectations. He doesn't hope to reach all Chicano listeners with the show and considers some well beyond his reach. He believes in preventive medicine — keeping the good kids good, rather than trying to rescue the ones who have already strayed off course. From time to time he gets calls from Latino vouths who address him as "homeboy." His stock response: Don't call me Hispanic, and don't call me "homeboy,"

The first label annoys Castro because of its political connotation. ("That's a name someone else put on us.") The second one just plain makes him angry. It's as though Latino gang members interpret the looseness of "The Sancho Show" as a tacit approval of their lifestyle. Castro is quick to let them know that he wants no part of their world; and, until they straighten up,

they can have no part of his.

Sancho's love is, without a doubt, conditional. He laces his banter with reminders that truancy is uncool. When he dedicates Los Lobos' Motown-sounding "Rosa Lee" to all the "Rosas and Rosies and Rosa Lees out there," he reminds his listeners that "this is only for Rosies who are in school." At another point, he says, "sin libros (without books) you're in trouble." Later on, he gets in another dig, and this one seems wellrehearsed: "You either get down with the libros, or you end with the burros.

At times the talk becomes too much for some listeners. At one point during the show, an older woman calls in to complain that she stopped tuning in as often because Sancho interrupts the music too much. Sancho, nonplussed. answers the woman on-air.

"I just play music in between my rhetoric," he said with a hint of defiance in his voice. "We have to get that straight, comadre. I don't talk between music. I play music between my talk."

Of course, if Sancho is (as he says) a man of the word, then Castro himself is a man of action.

Mollie García (a.k.a. "La Reina"), the co-host who takes over the mike from 10 to midnight, has nothing but respect for Castro.

"A lot of people just talk about doing things," she said. "But his actions speak a lot louder than other people's words."

García has seen the host in more than one environment. She first heard of him through his wife, Consuelo Rev, who teaches political science at East Los Angeles College. To this day, García often visits him at his other job.

"He takes the time to speak with every student," she said. "He motivates people. He might give us a hard time about school; but at the same time it's effective."

García is living proof of Castro's motivational prowess. A year ago, she came by the station to meet him and sit in on the show. He gave her an announcement to read over the air. Castro liked what he heard and invited her to be a regular on the show. In addition, he encouraged her to apply for a tranfer to some competitive four-year colleges, including private schools. She is now a junior and on scholarship at Claremont McKenna College, where she has a double major in literature and international relations.

Castro's energies have led to several local community efforts. He recently helped organize a toy drive for the organization Padres Contra Cancer (Fathers Against Cancer). He has also assisted families displaced by disasters. After last vear's Northridge earthquake, he met Latinos in public parks who craved Mexican food. The result: Castro and others launched a successful "burrito brigade" over "The Airwayes of Aztlan."

All this work takes up much of Castro's free time. He isn't payed for

"The Sancho Show," and he spends about \$200 per month on the job. One of his biggest expenses is, of course, the tapes, records and CDs that he plays on the air: He does his own shopping. It is a task that never ends and — if he wants the program to sound fresh each week is always challenging. Castro grew up with the music he spins. He recalled a time in the '50s when "the best rock 'n' roll around" was heard on Saturday nights at the auditorium at East Los Angeles College, when "The Battle of Bands" featured The Midniters, Ruben and the Jets and other artists that figure prominently in Sancho's record collection. Nevertheless, Castro estimates that "only about 10 percent of the old stuff ever got played on commercial stations."

Castro refers to "The Sancho Show" as a "church" and "a cheap psychiatrist." For many Angelenos, the show appeals to a sense of reassuring nostalgia. Its closest cousins on the dial are both AM oldies stations — KRLA and KXED, one English, the other Spanish.

But the "Airwaves of Aztlan" are made up of more than voices from the past. Castro is free to play anyone and anything he chooses. This includes the occasional nortena tune typical of FM powerhouse KLAX and other breaking music by American artists like The Iguanas that one can hear only on noncommercial stations.

Castro holds strong opinions about

the path of Latino music in L.A. He clearly believes that he is doing things musically that no one else will. Although he has nothing against KLAX, he pointed out that "they're not playing the music from here" but rather trying to recreate the airwayes of Mexico.

On the other hand, he bemoans the fact that KPWR-FM (Power 106), in many ways a polar opposite of KLAX in that its music reflects little of Mexican culture, is capturing the attention of many young Chicanos.

"We need to have Chicano music integrated with other music," Castro said.

Castro himself can afford to be an integrator. The fact that "The Sancho Show" airs on a public radio station gives him freedom to do things most commercial stations wouldn't dare.

Case in point: Perhaps mindful of the lack of listener calls on this particular night, Sancho resorts to fearless gimmickry — a sort of caricature of the ratings-driven cajolery of many commercial stations — something he is not beyond doing if he feels he is losing his audience.

He announces that he will play "Come Back Baby Come Back" by The Midniters 12 times to break the old record of 11. After the first turn, he warns everybody, "If you don't like this song, check back in about an hour, because we're going to play it over and over. It's world record time, gente."

ICK CANON,
PRINT DETECTIVE: The comedy
approach saved the
day for what might
have been two very

forgettable radio commercials for Canon color copiers. The hero is a hip know-it-all by the name of Nick Canon, Print Detective. The first spot features a colorblind guy who's hot pink necktie and orange leisure suit gets picked up by the color patrol's violation detection equipment. Not to worry. Nick Canon comes to the rescue. He hits the print sample button on the BIC-600e, kicking on the printer's exclusive Color Advisor Feature, which automatically picks out a customized color scheme for the guy in the leisure suit. Whew!

The second commercial spotlights a colorful character named Thelma Murtz, owner of Thelma's Hot Rod Heaven. Thelma makes fast cars for fast people. Her problem is that she can't print estimates quickly enough for her demanding clients. Nick the Print Detective arrives to save the day with Canon's speedy BJC-4000, which also enables her to print color invitations to the monster truck rally. Naturally, Thelma and Nick become buds for the long haul. Adam Kaufman and David Trim created the commercials at Hajjar/Kaufman in Marina del Rey.

The Hajjar/Kaufman commercial was successful because it made specific technical problems understandable through the use of strong word imagery and humor. The Canon copier commercials

can be heard on KABC (AM 790), KLOS (FM 95.5), KTWV (FM 94.7), KSCA (FM 101.9), KBIG(FM 104.3) and KACD/KBCD(FM 103.1).

On a 1-to 5-scale, I give these spots four stars (\* \* \* \*) for getting their message across in an innovative manner.


iTY NATIONAL SAVES EXEC: A raspy-voiced secretary's interruptive repartee sets the stage for one of five smart, humorous 60-second commercials selling the financial acumen of City National Bank of Beverly Hills.

In the spot titled "Under One Roof," a conservative, business-like voice extols the virtues of City National Bank as "the right place to consolidate" all your business and financial needs. As he points out important benefits such as lots of money to loan and asset-based lending and management, the nasal, frustrated secretary comes on the intercom annoucning in a progressively agitated tone: "Your business broker on line two...your broker on line three...your estate planner on line five...your investment planner on line two...your precious gems advisor on line nine...your psychic financial astrologer on six."

The commercial skillfully suggests that the bank has a wide variety of services under one roof and that all the other advisors in your life may be eliminated. The City National spot represents a break from the usually staid copy associated with banks and other financial institutions. Frances Jones, account director at Sacks/Fuller in Los Angeles, says that all the City National Bank commercials attempt to "build a relationship with small business owners and entrepreneurs through accessiblity." Sacks/Fuller creative director Carv Sacks and copywriter David Moss wrote the spots, which are airing on KNX, KFWB, KABC, KFI, KACE and KJLH through early April

On a 1-to-5 scale, I give City National Bank five stars (\* \* \* \* \*).

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
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
