Inside Stuff Bows

George Herman "Babe" Ruth, Sultan of Swat, will tell his "Inside Story" on the premiere of the Socony-Vacuum program series bearing this title, at 9:30 p. m. Friday, January 17, over the Columbia-WABC

Thirty minutes will be packed with introductory interview by veteran newsman Edwin C. Hill, dramatic episodes telling the inside story of the incident which changed Bambino Ruth from ordinary mortal to a Texas leaguer deliverer, and concert music by thirty-five-piece orchestra under the baton of Nat Shilkret.

Series promises outstanding idea in microphone art. Weeks following premiere, in order, will bring scoop of how George Gershwin really wrote his immortal "Rhap-sody in Blue;" true secrets behind John McCormack, incomparable tenor; a gripping inside story from the lips of Warden E. Lawes, head of Sing Sing Prison, and untold facts from the life and adventures of "Lone Eagle" of women fliers Amelia Earhart, first of the fair sex to solo the Atlantic Ocean successfully.

Newsman Hill is the same ace reporter of he air whose past six months on the WABC-Columbia network have won for him such a wide following. He will stage "The Inside Story" interviews and dramatizations—all containing that touchstone of human interest that put their principal characters on the front page—against the colorful background of Shilkret's music and prominent vocalists.

Whiteman's Concert

Paul Whiteman, self-styled Dean of Modern Music, will uphold his title Wednesday, January 25, with his second concert at Carnegie Hall, New York City, at which he will introduce three new concert works by American composers Ferde Grofe, John W Green and Louis Alter.

Compositions to be heard by those present (not broadcast) for the first time are: Grofe's "Tabloid," musical story of a newspaper; Green's "Night Club" (the same chap who wrote "Body and Soul"). and Alter's "Mariwana," Harlem nocturne. Added program numbers are Grofe's "On the Trail" and "Cloudburst" from his Grand Canyon Suite; Negro composer William Grant Still's "Africa"; Robert Braine's "Concerto in Jazz," and a modern arrange-ment of Strauss' "Tales from the Vienna Woods.'

"Tabloid" has four movements: "Running the News," "Sob Sister," "Ballyhoo" and "Going to Press." "Night Club" typifies six impressions listed "Linen and Silver," "Ladies and Gentlemen," "Table for Two," "Dance on a Dime," "Tango at Midnight" and "Corke and Bubbles" and "Corks and Bubbles."

Warden Lawes, Actor

"Twenty Thousand Years in Sing Sing," Warden Lewis E. Lawes' true story of daily life in the famous penitentiary, will be dramatized weekly with the Warden a principal in the cast beginning Sunday, January 22, at 9 p. m. over an NBC-WJZ network. Broadcasts will follow book and motion picture of same title for which material was gathered by the warden during his thirteen years "up the river." Einstein on Air

Dr. Albert Einstein, world famous scientist and author of the theory of relativity, will be heard in the only radio address of his present visit to the United States when he faces a National Broadcasting Company microphone in Pasadena on Monday, January 23.

The broadcast, on the subject of "America and the World Situation," will bring to the NBC-WJZ network, in addition to Dr. Einstein, Henry M. Robinson, banker, and Dr. William B. Munro, historian. Speakers will be introduced by Dr. Robert A. Millikan, famous scientist, and will be heard at 11:15 p. m. (EST).

The addresses will be delivered before a meeting in the Civic Auditorium in Pasadena, arranged by the Southern California College Student Body Presidents' Association. The broadcast is presented under the auspices of the National Advisory Council on Radio in Education.

"The sole motive of the student-body leaders of the Southern California Colleges and Universities in presenting this program," their announcement stated, "is to arouse an intelligent interest in world affairs with the hope that such interest will crystalize into a rational public opinion.

"Dr. Albert Einstein's contribution to this program is provided through the interest and generosity of the Oberlaender Trust of the Carl Schurz Memorial Foundation which exists for the promotion of cultural relations between German-speaking peoples and the United States of America."

Cohen's New Mystery

Octavus Roy Cohen, famous author of mystery and Negro stories, has written a new detective serial especially for radio presentation which will be heard over nationwide National Broadcasting Company, networks beginning Tuesday, February 14.

The Octavus Roy Cohen Murder Mystery will be the program listing and "The Townsend Murder Mystery" will be the title of the story which will be broadcast each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday under the sponsorship of the Westinghouse Elec-

tric and Manufacturing Company.

The drama, which will be heard in the East over an NBC-WJZ network at 7:45 p. m. (EST) and in the West over an NBC-Pacific Coast network at 11:15 p. m. (EST), will be an original adventure of Detective Jim Hanvey, a character about whom Cohen has written four novels and many short stories for the Saturday Evening Post and the American Magazine.

Doggy Program

"Uncle" Don Carney, known by millions of children around the New York Area as Uncle Don over WOR, local Metropolitan station, takes to the NBC microphones on January 30 for a series of coast-to-coast programs. New series, to be known as Don Carney's Dog chats, is sponsored by Spratt's Patent, Ltd., makers of dog food. Program is scheduled to be heard each Monday evening beginning at 8:30 p. m. Feature of broadcast is that listeners will be requested to "enter" photographs of their favorite canine pets in the show, which will be open to all types and classes of dogs. Aristocratic possessors of lengthy pedigrees, alley curs and "just plain dogs" will mett on an equal footing for the blue ribbons which will be awarded on the basis of the photographs submitted each week.

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FIRST week's returns placed Ben Bernie in the lead in RADIO GUIDE'S Jazz King poll. The "Old Maestro," who is heard on the Blue Ribbon Malt Hour as well as on frequent broadcasts over NBC as a sustaining program, received 1881 votes. In second place was Guy Lombardo, the CBS maestro, who received 1585 ballots. Third was Wayne King with 1112, while fourth was Rudy Vallee with 653.

Jack Denny only has 79 votes now, but when his followers get going, who can say that he won't zoom into first place? And there are literally dozens of others—each with a chance for the big prize.

Votes have been cast for more than sixty different orchestras already, and if you don't see your favorite listed, send in your ballot and get him in the running. Watch for the second week's results in next week's RADIO GUIDE.

Impartial observers believe that both Vallee and Whiteman will press Bernie and Lombardo for the lead within the next few weeks. And they say that the sudden rise of popularity of Wayne King may land the "Waltz King" on top. But whoever beats Bernie and Lombardo will have to do some real climbing, for the two leaders are receiving a large number of votes daily.

Music in the Air

-By Carleton Smith-

WHAT did you think of "The Emperor Jones"?

It was a change. Something new in operatic music . . . something American, owing little to another culture . . . something essentially modern, not based on precedent. The effect was overwhelming as the music rushed headlong from the first

deadly recurring beats of the tomtom, relieved only once by a single bit of lyric expansion, to the final flash of grandeur for the disintegrating Jones.

If you knew the story — or even if you didn't — you were caught at once by the strange potency of the music.

And your attention was held. Here was unity of conception, an instance where drama and music had a single purpose.

The music accentuates and punctuates the action, intensifying the emotions so that they gather momentum rapidly. It never obtrudes or retards, except when it hesitates for the "spiritual"—which has every aesthetic justification.

Mr. Gruenberg has produced a vital score. His instinct for the theater is certain. I would not agree with those who think the success completely Eugene O'Neill's and Lawrence Tibbett's. The music, it is true, may not be divorced from the drama. But that is not necessarily a fault.

Time and additional hearings will assay, finally, its musical value.

Tibbett As "Jones"

LAWRENCE TIBBETT must feel gratified with his performance. He has spent months of unflagging energy in studying and preparing a most brutal role. tenseness, the excitement, the natural buoyancy which he communicated to his first performance came across the ether. "Emperor Jones" was, perhaps, the outstanding creation of his career. Without him, the opera could not have been given. To my knowledge, there is no other baritone who could achieve, vocally and dramatically, such an interpretation of Brutus Jones.

Hilda Burke

Radio program-makers are finding increasing use for opera singers. Several of them are now occupying fifteenminute periods on the networks.

Hilda Burke, youthful wife of Desire Defrere (both of the former Chicago Civic Opera) is the latest addition to the roster, singing every Friday evening over NBC-WJZ at 7:15, EST.

Heard in the exacting presence of the microphone, the stainlessly beautiful texture of Miss Burke's tone is at once apparent. A delicate musical taste pulses in her finely proportioned phrases. Hers is the intelligence of an ordained vocalist, one who could, as she has, step into Elizabeth Rethberg's place and sing an "Aida" or a "Butterfly" on a few hours notice.

What she yet needs, perhaps, is to bring from the background of her imaginative experience, a greater richness of feeling, a more vivid sense of life. For this, really, is the purpose of music.

Richard Crooks: Crooning

TOO bad Richard Crooks cannot hear himself broadcast. Some one should record one of his arias as it comes over the air, and send it to him. I am sure that

he wouldn't recognize his own voice.

Evidently he has been led to believe that he should whisper softly into the microphone. He does, and the result is something akin to crooning. His tone has a mushy, sentimental timbre and is not at all like Crooks' natural voice. It might be suitable for some songs, and the public may like it. But it isn't Richard Crooks.



Ed McConnell-Air Salesman

THINGS were not running according to schedule in an Atlanta, Ga., broadcasting station on a certain evening away back in 1922.

The studio director was pacing the floor, and using words decidedly not suited to microphone use. A program booked for the next hour had not put in an appearance, and it looked as though the station might be in for what even in that day was known as "the razzberry." The minute hand was almost on the hour when two visitors were announced from the little down-state town of Newman. One introduced himself, and added:

"And this here friend of mine is Ed McConnell, 'Smiling Ed' we call him down in Newman. He plays the piano a little and sings a little."

So in the brief span of thirty seconds the chap who is now heard over the WABC-Columbia network each Sunday, broadcasting for the Acme Paint Company, had entered the tadio business.

EXCEPT for occasional vaudeville tours, "Smilin' Ed" has been close to microphones since that night

Smiling Ed McConnell, the radio's master salesman, knows so much about the "home folks" because he is one of them. You see him, in these pictures, with his lovely young wife, and his bright little daughter, Mary Jane, who has reached the age of two. He's crazy about them—and why not!



in 1922. The fact that only recently did he become known to the national radio audience is explained by the fact that "Smiling Ed," on single station contracts, demanded and received salaries comparable to that of the network top-notchers. He has received as high as \$1,750 for these one-station broadcasts, on long run contracts.

The son of a minister, McConnell cannot remember when he started to sing in church affairs. There was a piano around the house, and again he cannot remember when he started picking out tunes. Even before his introduction to radio he was always in demand at any gathering where the proceedings were to be enlivened with entertainment. Even if there was no scheduled entertainment Ed was invited. He could talk to people and keep things moving.

It's the ability to talk that "Smiling Ed" considers his forte on the air. He objects now to the term "artist." He admits there are piano players who play rings around him. He admits that as a singer he is quite mediocre. He prefers the term "radio salesman." Yet the combination of the piano and voice, with McConnell's cheery philosophy and bluff humor attract thousands of listeners.

MCCONNELL exhibits another unusual trait that has discouraged a couple of persons from even attempting to manage him. After a prospective client is sold on him, he must be sold on the client. He'll pin the advertising manager down, question him as to the truthfulness of his advertising claims, demand a sample of the product, and, sometimes, even test it himself. "Smiling Ed" flatly refuses even to attempt to sell something on which he himself is not sold.

Away from the microphone, Mc-Connell is the family man. The night life attracts him not at all. His wife, his baby, Mary Jane, and his library are sufficient. For out-of-doors relaxation he takes long drives in the rural regions around Cincinnati and across the state line in Kentucky, calling on farmers who have written him fan letters, staying to discuss the crops—and he knows his farming—and usually staying on for supper (it's not dinner in these parts).

They say that Ed McConnell truly has magic in his voice.

T IS a novelty—as well as a pleasure—when you're able to report with authenticity, that business is good. And all you need do to convince yourself that radio will be the first industry to throw off the ponderous pall of depression, is to make a daytime call to the national advertising agencies, and the radio studios. There you'll find an average total of forty auditions a day, from which, eventually, will grow a sufficiency of 1933 radio advertising accounts to show a nice ledger this season, with no tinge of red in its

A portentous aspect of these auditions is their tendency to set into motion a new cycle of entertainment—to create a diverting trend away from the beaten path of comedy shows, which, with a few outstanding exceptions, as you may have noticed, are going stale and sour. I don't mean that this digression from comedy will remove all the fun from the air; the movement, as I am able to interpret it, is merely one to surround the funny phases of a program with other types of substantial entertainment. Voices of the

I-IOW many of the great publicists of the world—men and women who are often heard on the radio and command instant audiences because of their personalities or positions—would be engaged as radio announcers if by some turn of the wheel of fortune they should need jobs and turn to radio? This is a favorite speculative query addressed to officials of the broadcasting networks, when questions arise concerning radio voice quality or the relative merits of various announcers.

John Carlile, Production Director of the

John Carlile, Production Director of the Columbia Broadcasting System, has some interesting opinions of the radio voices of many of the world's great who have been heard on the air. And he speaks with authority, since it is part of his job with the world's largest network to select new announcers for the chain, with the requirements for announcers becoming more and ments for announcers becoming more and more exacting.

NE of the finest voices on the radio is that of President-Elect Roosevelt. It is pleasant and clear, with a pleasing inflection. But above all it has a tone of perfect sincerity—a quality that we consider supremely essential in the voice of anyone aspiring to be a radio announcer,' said Carlile.

"Former Governor Alfred E. Smith's voice is one entirely his own, and obviously would not do on the air for anyone other than the Governor himself. Ex-Mayor Walker's voice is probably one of the most colorful we have ever observed here in our study of radio speakers. It is a free voice, as ready and apt in the sounding of sentences as is its possessor in the framing of

"President Hoover's voice is typical of a kind of man who is so often inarticulate as a public speaker. The engineer, generally speaking, is seldom an interesting talker on the air. The President has improved vastly since his presidential campaign days, but he still speaks to a large

audience with a deliberate effort which is betrayed by the acute microphone. The importance of a President's utterances, however, will always insure the largest possible kind of a listening audience, no matter what the quality of his radio voice

"LEOPOLD STOKOWSKI'S voice is interesting and compelling through the use of skillful deliberateness. Naturally, Stokowski's accent, were it to come to us as part of an unknown person's equipment, would militate against his acceptableness as an announcer."

Turning to radio speaking qualities of certain foreigners of eminence who are heard occasionally through international broadcasts, Carlile discussed Ramsey MacDonald, Premier Mussolini and Lady Astor.

"I'd like to point out that Premier Ramsey MacDonald, allowing for his Scottish burr, has one of the richest, fullest and most flexible voices ever heard on the air. It responds readily to his feeling and emotions and carries an air of almost profound conviction that impresses the hearer. He has made British problems understandable to the American public. Scotch burr and all, we would be glad at any time to consider a radio voice like his for addition to our announcer staff.

"PROBABLY no voice ever heard on the radio has so much character, or so thoroughly paints a man's character as does that of Premier Mussolini. I doubt if we will ever hear again in one century a voice so utterly self-confident. Mussolini's voice is that of a master of men, the mere sound of it tells the story of the life and the power that we know lies be-hind it. It is likewise, I think, the most optimistic sounding vocal organ ever broad-cast. It seems to breathe cheerfulness. We would be glad to have in an announcing staff a voice so distinctive in character."

Virtually every National Broadcasting Company star has a hobby and rides it hard. The sideline interests are as varied as the broadcasters themselves.

For example, Graham McNamee, NBC's punning sports announcer, takes the proverbial busman's holiday. When away from the studios he devotes much time to playing golf, attending sports events, listening to the radio and announcing news reels.

Groucho, most notorious of the incredible Marx Brothers, assumes an air of mystery when the subject of hobbies is mentioned.

"I'd rather not tell," he says, with a knowing wink.

Jack Pearl, the modern Munchausen, claims the world's most complete collection of stray pins and needles. He can't resist the inclination to pick them up on the street or in the studio. He also reads classical literature. His straight-man, Cliff "Sharlie" Hall, is addicted to light literature.

Irene Taylor, Paul Whiteman's blues singer, and Rosaline Greene, dramatic actress, are devotees of swimming. Aside from cooking Southern dishes, the Pickens Sisters, harmonizing trio from "Jawja," go in for reading and golf. Little Patti is the champion of the group.

ALTHOUGH Jessica Dragonette, golden voiced soprano, is one of the hardest working artists on the air, she finds escape from studios and rehearsals in poetry, which she writes as well as reads, and the theater. She also devotes much attention to answering fan mail.

Another poetry lover is Howard Claney,

once a college professor but now pilot of the Magic Carpet. Occasionally he pre-sents special poetry reading programs of his own. He also is a competent painter and does portraits of his studio associates.

SPEAKING of announcers, the entire NBC staff is concentrating on the great indoor game, that is, ping-pong since, under the direction of Bunny Grauer, the entire gang purchased a ping-pong set. Most of the talking boys can be found in their recreation room during spare hours.

Julia Sanderson is devoted to shopping,

housekeeping and gardening, but her ballad singing husband, Frank Crumit, tries his skill at gardening in that popular form known as divot digging. Frank plays a bang-up game of golf, and has won tournaments.

Put-putt Eddie Cantor of the saucer eyes also swings a golf club occasionally and likes automobile driving, but his chief interest is work and more work. When he completes his own tasks, he helps others.

Ford Bond composes music, writes short stories, sings, plays tennis and trys vainly to defeat Mrs. Bond at camelot.

Gertrude Berg is as conscientious and busy a wife and mother in her own home as she is in the radio serial, the Goldbergs, of which she is both author and leading lady. She has a husband and two children that require as much attention as "Jackie," "Rosie" and "Sammy" of the air.



Radio's Beau Brummell?

IT is more than likely that should Beau Brummell be reincarnated and return to this life today he would become a radio announcer, orchestra conductor or air artist. Radio's best dressed men are out to challenge any other profession in the land on a sartorial basis, and the attention they are paying to their socks, their shoes, shirts and ties, and suits and overcoats these days would warm the heart of any clothier.

Spats are so commonplace in the studios today they no longer bring forth the snickers that marked their appearances a year or so ago. More and more artists are seen carrying walking sticks, and as for gloves—they are beginning to buy them in dozen lots of varying shades and colors; a special shade for every mood.

Many of the boys are beginning to send

Many of the boys are beginning to send to England for their shirtings, and local haberdashers are finding it harder and harder to satisfy their tastes in stock ties. No, they must be made to order and bear the name tag of the leading custom tie maker. Even hats have not escaped attention and black Homburgs which enjoy such popularity in the Latin Quarter of Paris are seen in increasing numbers daily. Tweed suits, the staunch favorite of the

Tweed suits, the staunch favorite of the English country and sporting gentlemen, are affected by several young gentlemen about the studios and serve as an excellent foil for the dressier and more formal clothes which they wear in the evenings. Yes, radio has "dressed up" and with a vengeance.

To attempt to name the best dressed man in radio would be to invite certain death, for many of these air performers take their dressing seriously. So let's mention just a few of the leading stylists who are heard over the ether.

Edwin C. Hill, the news commentator

Edwin C. Hill, the news commentator for Columbia Broadcasting System and known as the best dressed reporter in New York City, is a study in correct attire. From his spats and striped trousers to his smartly tailored overcoat and expensive hat, he is a shining example of the well turned out man. And his ties! The utmost care and study go into the selection of every

cravat he buys, with the result that studio habitues have never seen him with an inharmonious ensemble.

CHARLES CARLILE, CBS tenor, is finicky about his overcoats and owns several sport coats of camel's hair material. He must have several fittings before he will accept a coat from his tailor, and even then is apt to return the garment after he has worn it a few weeks, for further alterations

John S. Young, the dapper NBC announcer, has dozens of suits which are always well pressed and neat. He never appears without a white carnation in his buttonhole, even in these times of depression. Lewis Dean, CBS announcer, is especially fond of fine shirts and buys them in two dozen lots. Richard Gordon, the Sherlock Holmes of the air, is strong on vests and has practically every color represented in his wardrobe. He always wears vests with white piping on them when he dons a dark suit.

dark suit.

Eddie Duchin, one of the most popular orchestra leaders in New York, particularly among the Park Avenue debutantes, picks his clothes with as much pride and care as he does his musical arrangements. His suits, overcoats, topcoats and formal clothes are all made by the same tailor who fashions the suits of Jimmie Walker, the spruce little ex-mayor of New York.

LANNY ROSS, the singer, is another who can claim to be the well dressed man. Whether in formal or informal dress, Lanny is correct. His shirts and ties play an important part in his attire and blend harmoniously with the rest of his outfit.

Another who pays minute attention to detail is Abe Lyman, the orchestra leader, who, in addition to having thirty-two suits in his wardrobe, carries out color schemes as regards socks, ties, shirts and accessories. He is another who has all his shirts custom made and spends tremendous amounts on his underwear.

Guy Lombardo changes his suit every day, and sometimes twice or three times daily, according to his appointments. All his business suits cost in the neighborhood of \$150 or more, and his dress clothes and dinner jackets would make a belted earl turn green with envy. He considers sticks and gloves as necessary to his equipment as a baton, and as for ties, he must have a trunkful, for he discards them after wearing them once or twice.

Freddy Rich, CBS musical director, dresses conservatively and resembles a broker when about the studio. Andre Baruch, CBS announcer, has a number of black felt hats and loads of ties. He was a pioneer in effecting richly colored flannel and knitted neckwear.

KELVIN KEECH, the announcer, has all his shirts made in England and always keeps about three dozen on hand. Frank Crumit, Cliff Hall, Jack Pearl's stooge, and James Melton, the tenor, all display unusually good taste in their clothes.

Contrary to general opinion, Carson Robison and his Hill Billies, Bill and John Mitchell, exhibit an excellent taste in their suits and overcoats, and although originally from the hill country in Tennessee, they say they learned to dress while attending Columbia University. Lowell Thomas would never give you the impression of a rough and ready explorer and usually wears suits of excellent tweed material.

of excellent tweed material.

All in all, radio can well feel proud of the dress of its stars and musical directors. They spend tremendous sums for their wearing apparel, and the smart New York tailors bow them in and out of their shops with the deference usually reserved for visiting noblemen. They rarely go to the extremes, either in style or color, and are willing to match their individual or collective tastes in dress against their brothers of the stage and screen.

Rise of the Drama

UNLIKE England and Germany, which have made a specialty of broadcasting plays either written for the radio or adapted from the stage for radio, American broadcasters have not yet arrived at the point where they are allowing the drama to take a paramount place on program schedules.

This is primarily due, according to competent observers, to the fact that the American ear prefers music and snatches of the lighter entertainment. Relatively few listeners, it would seem, have the patience to sit through a one hour dramatic production and not many more will listen even for a half hour. Few plays can be presented in less time.

Nevertheless, the trend in this country is toward more drama on the air, as evidenced by the increasing popularity of mystery and thriller serials and the fine work being done by such organizations as the Radio Guild on NBC and the dramatic laboratory on CBS.

How to get an adequate supply of material for radio drama? That is the simplest of the problems facing the radio impressarios. Not only are established playwrights of stage and screen only too eager to turn their talents to radio, but throughout the country there are thousands upon thousands of aspiring radio playwrights who are daily submitting manuscripts to the networks and the stations.

WHEN a "big name" is wanted for a radio dramatic production, it can readily be supplied, as witness the fact that Booth Tarking:on's "Penrod," Sax Rohmer's "Fu Manchu" and Octavus Foy Cohen's negro humor stories have been adapted to radio production under the author's personal direction. But radio's demands for more and more copy can only be met—indeed, is now being met—by the hosts of relatively unknown writers employed in the continuity departments of networks and stations and, to an increasing degree, by

the free lance writers who submit theif scripts to radio.

Some radio organizations take just pride in their own playwrights, but the fact remains that these are practically unknown to the public. Few know that a Miss Lulu Vollmer is author of the popular 'Moomshine and Honeysuckle" series; that Edith Meiser is author of the radio adaptations of Sherlock Holmes, and that Ruth Cornwell is author of the "Death Valley Days" scripts. Perhaps Gertrude Berg, who writes and plays the lead in "The Goldbergs," is better known, but that is because she actually plays in her act.

THE obscure free lance playwrights, for the most part, apparently have not yet gotten "the hang" of radio drama, and probably ninety per cent of their offerings are returned with polite rejection notes. Radio, lacking the visual feature of drama, makes exceptional demands. Words and sound effects alone must convey the whole story.

effects alone must convey the whole story. We are told by network continuity chiefs that most aspiring radio playwrights—and they seem to be legion in the ranks of doctors, lawyers, salesmen and those who simply must write—like to write about situations or settings about which they know nothing. If they live in the country, their manuscripts usually are about metropolitical life, or the Riviera or some equally sophisticated spot, says Madonno Todd, San Francisco continuity editor of NBC. If they live in the cities, they often write about the mountains of Tennessee or the snow wastes of Aleska.

The free lance writers who really want to sell radio plays, says Miss Todd, must first study the technique of microphone drama and its peculiar demands, and then must follow three basic rules. First, they should write about incidents and places familiar to them; secondly, they must keep their plots as uncomplicated as possible, and, third, they must keep their casts down to six or less characters.





Lucky Strike to Change-

I HAVE it on good authority, that Lucky Strike is considering a revolutionary change in its style of presentation at the expiration of Jack Pearl's contract in May. The agency is toying with the notion that it may lift a few Broadway shows of some years ago, and revamp them into light and airy musicals. And here's a bit of scoopee for the boys and girls-Old Gold practically has closed with J. P. Medbury, the West Coast humorist, and is negotiating with Fred Waring's band, for a series to begin at WABC within a month. The band and Medbury will form the nucleus for a fast moving variety show, not unlike the type now being aired by the Rudy Vallee outfit. Socony Vacuum already has prepared its new CBS series, wherein, newsman Edwin C. Hill will give some startling "Inside Story" interviews with music. Hudson-Essex is building up a show that will follow the variety pattern. There are half a dozen other large accounts looming-all of which seem to justify the conclusion that a new trend is about to materialize.

Will Beer Hurt Music?

THE NEW YORK HOTELS are counting on the return of beer and wines to jack up business-and it occurs to me that should the cheerful juices restore prosperity to the hostelries, the quality of dance music might suffer. It is an admitted fact that prohibition had one good effect on the country: It brought a big improvement in our orchestras. In the good old days, patrons packed the merry spots and after soaking up a lot of liquid, were content to dance to anything that resembled a tune. But when John Law dried up the better spots, the managements became competitive ir the matter of selecting music that would attract customers. The result was plenty of inducement for band leaders to seek prestige and thus get into the big money Dozens of bands cropped up, and from them arose some of the big names who enjoy today's spotlight.

What I fear is a managerial laxity, after beer returns-with the old hops and sparkling wines attracting the trade and thus spelling obscurity for some of the orchestras. The only saving factor is radio. The listener will continue to demand quality in music. The public, happily, has been educated to the best.

Note to Evans Plummer: Why don't you give yourself up? They're saying in New York that they've known all along you were Gracie Allen's brother!

ANOTHER SCOOPEE—There are 90 musicians in the Radio City Music Hall pit. The pit is in the path of a vicious draft -and since the rehearsals began for the opening of the center, every one of the 90 men have been stricken with colds, and have been home in bed for days, at one time or another. Only 89 had thus been knocked off their pins until this writing. The survivor was Rudy Wiedoft, the saxophone virtuoso, and mentor of Rudy Vallee. But today, Rudy, as the saying goes, is sick in bed.

It has added zest to the often tiresome business of dialing.

GERTRUDE NIESEN (Wednesday, Jan. 11, at 9 p. m. CST on CBS) came through on a non-commercial build-up program, but we were not startled. Miss Niesen has a nice voice but not alarmingly so, and she shouldn't try to imitate Connie Boswell until she does it better. Prunes for the time being.

EASY ACES (Wednesday, Jan. 11, at 9:15 p. m. CST on CBS) proved a pruneful dud with the supposedly comical stare of the bridge-robot inventor. Worst script to date from the Aces, and the commercial credit is too blatant. Come on, Goodman Ace, get funny!

WAYNE KING (Tuesday, Jan. 10, at 7:30 p. m. CST on NBC) and his music have not been reviewed here for some weeks, but that is because this show is forever one of the smoothest and most pleasing. Ex-





Artists were anxious and willing for the success of the first Radio Charity Show in Ecuador. Hotels and theaters did their bit for the poor and unfortunate. Songs, string music, bands, native dances, novelties by Mr. Jones, in fact everything that went to please the souls of the South Americans were done by these radio artists. It was over at midnight and people were still walking about in the early morning hours talking about it.

This show not only did more for radio than anything else heretofore, but was a complete financial success. Senor Parra has done more to promote the buying of radio sets for the people down there than any man in the country. He is not in the radio business, just a lover of it. Parra is in the yeast business. His wife is a former East Orange, N. J. girl. The citizens of Quito have requested Senor Parra to arrange for another show similar to the last and to have him tune in New York on his short wave set as an act.

P.S. I received the above stuff from Mr. Boyd, a friend in Quito, and thought you might be interested as a bit of out-of-theordinary news. I have always bought two copies of the GUIDE a week and sent one down there and as American stuff, so far as reading goes, is mighty scarce down there I guess it is well handled and passed on. I hear that the operators in the Quito station have the pictures in the GUIDE plastered all over the place. Good luck to you and a long future for the RADIO GUIDE. J. R. Walsh

California Station Claims It's Granddaddy of Them Al

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Into the peren-nial dispute over who was first to broadcast radio programs in America now comes little station KQW, San Jose, Cal., which claims that on January 16 next it will observe its twenty-fifth anniversary. Since all previous claimants to pioneer distinction in America and world radio date their anniversaries back only a little more than twelve years to 1920, the entry of the California station into the contest has aroused considerable curiosity.

The flat assertion is made by Fred J. Hart, owner and operator of KQW, that it was founded in 1908, that it began proadcasting music in 1909 and that it has been on the air ever since. Thus it is said to be fully twice as old as KDKA, Pittsburgh, generally reputed to be the first broadcaster in the world to go on the air with scheduled programs and to remain on the air continuously since its birthdate,

EVEN WWJ, Detroit, which is known to antedate KDKA by some months, but which did not remain on regular schedule, although it still exists, is alleged to be superseded as a pioneer by the San Jose station. There were many other amateur or experimental wireless telephone stations before KDKA and WWJ, including those of Dr. Lee DeForest, but none of these is still existent.

According to Mr. Hart's story, Charles D. Herrold, an inventor of San Jose, early in the century had studied the work of Marconi, Poulson, Arco, Carty and others with the new-fangled thing called wireless. He decided to undertake some experiments of his own. Quietly and unostentatiously, he constructed a huge "carpet" aerial containing some 11,500 feet of wire. He suspended it between two 7-story buildings in San Jose and began sending out both telegraph and telephone messages.

Dr. Herrold still lives in San Jose, and his operator at the time was Ray Newhy, who now resides in San Francisco. Between 1909 and 1912 they devised a means for modulating the voice in the antenna circuit, hooking four microphones directly to it and cooling the apparatus with a water-circulating system to keep the current from breaking it down. In 1912, two-way voice communication was established between Dr. Herrold in San Jose and George Davis, in THAT the experimenters were not aware of the importance of their work is indicated by the fact that their first broadcast-literally-was not staged until 1913 when, instead of confining their messages to a restricted receiving point, they played a record of "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine" for all who could hear. Radio operators at the naval radio station at Bremerton, Wash., wrote in that reception was very clear.

It was in 1912 that the first international radio treaty led to the first national radio law, then regarded as applying only to maritime radio. Dr. Herrold immediately applied for a license, which has been reissued to the station regularly ever since except for the world war period when all private radio was shut down. One of his licenses authorized the variable use of any wave length between 150 and 25,000 meters and any power up to 1,000 watts.

IN 1915, as related by Dr. Herrold to Mr. Hart, Lieut. Ellery Stone, then federal radio inspector at San Francisco, later president of Federal Telegraph Co. and now a vice president of the International Telephone and Telegraph Co., suggested to Dr. Herrold that he broadcast regular programs for reception at the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. This was done for six to eight hours daily, and many persons still remember hearing the strange phenomenon of voice and music, coming from fifty miles away without wires, in the listening booth established in the Tower of Jewels.

Contemporaneously, Dr. Lee DeForest, venerated as the "father of radio" for his invention of the vacuum tube, had a radio booth at the exposition. But his transmitter failed, and reception in his booth was also from the San Jose station. Not only were the programs heard in these booths, but enthusiastic amateurs for miles around reported reception.

The call letters KOW were assigned to Dr. Herrold's station on Dec. 9, 1921, and he continued on the air with the same transmitter used for ten years previously. Dr. Herrold transferred his license to a church in 1925, and its present owners bought the station in 1926. One of the other claims to distinction made for KQW is that it is partially supported by voluntary memberships of \$2 a year in its "KQW Radio Club," and that one of its listeners actually willed the station a legacy.
