# News and Views of the Week

## John Q. Public Is Radio's Czar

The moot question of whether broadcasting shall have a czar, with such names as Newton Baker, Congressman Dill and others flitting through the conversations on the subject, gives one pause for reflection. It impels such speculation as just what would a radio czar do?—how would he function?—and to what end would his services be used? Industrial czars have been appointed to iron out codes of ethics and to eliminate cut-throat competition within various industries, also to direct lobbying in legislative circles; but radio hardly comes within the scope of such action.

Radio is pretty well regulated. To begin with, Uncle Sam handles the necessary regulations. The life of a station is limited to the life of its license—six months. Every station, large or small, has to toe the mark twice a year and show a clean bill of health or suffer its voice to be silenced forever.

Three little words in one phrase in the Radio Act of 1927 give the governing body all the necessary power—"In the interest of public service, convenience and necessity." The moment a station runs afoul of the flexible and all-encompassing provision of that phrase, it is in plenty of trouble. So much for that part of the regulation.

However, long before the Government has knowledge that a station is slipping, the public reacts explosively. And when John Q. gets on his hind legs about anything, he fills the mail bags, congests the phone service and telegraph lines with protests of no uncertain tone. No station owner could neglect or fail to recognize his shortcomings. If he did, his commercial advertising account would not. In less time than it takes to say Jack Robinson, a station would be without an audience or commercial support.

Radio needs no other czar than the one it has always bowed to, their Imperial Majesties, Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Public.

## The Truth About Coughlin

Denials of internal pressure from high and influential dignitaries of his order forcing Father Coughlin off the air, have been confirmed in all quarters. Three things did, however, influence the Radio Priest's decision to bring his air campaign to an abrupt end.

The first was financial. The cost of telephone lines connecting his chain of 32 independent stations, plus station charges, represented a weekly outlay of more than \$14,000.

Secondly, the late hour at which he was obliged to broadcast failed to get him his usual large audience. Interest in his movement naturally lagged and the voluntary contributions fell off.

Finally, he listened to his chief radio adviser, Leo Fitzpatrick. Father Coughlin wanted to stay on the air while Congress remains in session. The long drawn-out battle in Washington looks like a Summer seige, and Coughlin was tired. His friends felt he could not stand the strain, and he finally bowed out under the three-fold pressure.

His rather cold reception in New York at Madison Square Garden may also have had something to do with his decision.

## Radio Drama at Boston University

A growing interest in broadcasting is evidenced by the attitude of colleges and universities. Boston University, sensing the all-importance of program building, makes the latest gesture of recognition in this direction.

Under the expert and practical guidance of Ralph Rogers, a new course will give academic consideration to writing radio drama in its various popular forms—comedy—mystery—modern plays—serials. Rogers, although an instructor in the School of Business Administration, is well known to radio through his very human

serializations of Briggs' famous cartoons, Mr. and Mrs.

Doctor John S. Young, one of NBC's foremost announcers, gave considerable emphasis to the commercial sides of radio at New York University last year in a short course.

Colleges have been reluctant to consider radio except from an engineering standpoint. Most of the technical schools throughout the country have had radio courses for more than a decade. It is gratifying to see that the other phases of radio are being given their proper place in the academic scheme of things.

## A.S.C.A.P. Anti-Trust Suit Pffts

The big charge of anti-trust dynamite with which the government was preparing to blast the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers missed fire. A postponement of the suit until next Fall in Federal Judge Goddard's court came on the eve of the National Association of Broadcasters' Convention at Colorado Springs, where the radio station owners are gathered to discuss foremost among their problems the A.S.C.A.P. licensing fees.

E. C. Mills, the wily little Texan, who is grand marshal for the A.S.C.A.P. forces, appears to have robbed the broadcasting nabobs of the one subject on which they would get together unanimously.

First he split the broadcasters wide open by getting Doctor Ike Levy, Vice President of CBS, to sign an A.S.C.A.P. contract for five years.

This contract gives the CBS chain the right to broadcast all of the music over which the Society has control. Practically every prominent composer and music publisher is a member of the Society. Without this license it would be just about impossible for a station to exist. It could only play old and obsolete music not protected by copyright.

Mr. Mills next appeared with a similar NBC contract, and now he gets a postponement of the anti-trust suit so as to see how many of the kilocycle boys he can bag before his organization goes back on trial—if the government ever reopens its case. The latter is problematical because the Attorney General asked for the postponement after a severe setback in his case.

Mills has whipped the broadcasters into line, and it looks as if he could keep them there. His favorite fighting expression is "a Colts makes 'em all the same size!" He doesn't carry a gun into his scraps, but he certainly uses some big calibre substitute. Why David Sarnoff let him go from the R.C.A. fold back to the Society, always has been a mystery.

## Cry-Baby Tactics Bring Grief

Before the broadcasters start objecting too loudly to the intrusion of the Federal Communications Commission into their private affairs, they should learn to settle things among themselves. The broadcasters accuse the Commission of giving the radio industry the jitters by its constant line of inquiries.

Broadcasters have brought it all on themselves. They run to the Commission like little boys to a school-teacher. Radio may be an infant industry, but why do station owners act like infants?

Take the latest amusing instance of teacher-he's-making-a-face-at-me, wherein WKAQ filed a brief with Anning S. Prall, F.C.C. chairman, accusing NBC of usurping the Commission's authority. It all arises out of NBC's refusal to permit WKAQ to rebroadcast one of NBC's opera programs, which was also being rebroadcast by short wave.

WKAQ was picking up the short wave rebroadcast and rebroadcasting it. The moment they were stopped, WKAQ, the sponsors, the advertising agency and everyone concerned got tangled in the controversy, with a shout of "Monopoly" growing out of the turmoil.

The whole thing is so involved that the Commission has to make a searching inquiry to find out just why it should be called upon for a decision.

If the broadcasters permit this type of hulabaloo to get before the Commission, they should stand for the accompanying inquiries without complaint.

Broadcasters want to use the Commission as an avenging angel to fight their battles, but resent it when the Commission tries to find out "what's it all about."

## A Few Natural Questions

Many station owners seem to be making a mountain out of a molehill in trying to get excited about a confidential order to the Federal Communications Commission field staff to report on certain phases of station operations in their respective districts. The list of inquiries is not formidable, and only asks for the following information:

- 1.—Unwarranted abusive attacks on government officials or departments.
- 2.—Programs that give unusually lengthy commercial announcements.
- 3.—Objectionable religious programs.
- 4.—Objectionable medical hours.
- 5.—Announcements containing fraudulent advertisements.
- 6.—Fortune-telling.
- 7.—Lotteries.

It would seem that anyone interested in keeping radio clean and profitable would be glad to cooperate with any governmental agency in an effort to stamp out these abuses.

As it is, most of the things about which the Commission inquires are covered by Federal statutes. Those not in this category come within the realm of good taste.

It seemed that Tiny had bounded up to the door to greet me—he really is awfully fond of strangers. But as Irene explained it, he's just a little big for his canine age, and is really quite uncontrollable when he instinctively likes some one's face. (I used to have a very kind face.)

**R**ALLYING sufficiently to take stock of my surroundings, I carefully looked around to see if Tiny was controlling his affection—and wasn't a bit surprised to see a complete horse-stall installed in the right-hand corner of the living room. Tim explained that he had started out to get a race-horse to keep Tiny company, but that he had a little trouble getting Fluffy (that was the name of the horse) up and down in the elevator. Poor thing—he had to send her to a glue factory.

That was all well and good—but it certainly wasn't getting RADIO GUIDE an intimate interview with two of radio's most interesting performers—some such thing as Tim 'n' Irene at Home or Tiny's Radio Papa and Momma.

So before she had time to think twice, I turned around quick as a flash and said: "Irene, how much

# HERE COMES THE SHOW BOAT

The Magic of Microphone Technique Has Created an Illusion That Thousands of Persons Have Declared a Holiday to Witness

**T**HE BROODING silence of the early Summer night was undisturbed save for the rhythmic whirr of a propeller as the sharp prow of a vessel bit deeply into the Mississippi, churning the coffee-colored surface of the Father of Waters into a white foam. Overhead an enveloping canopy of clouds unsheathed the captive moon, and a deluge of light burst from the skies, bathing the scene in soft, tranquil rays.

The hush was shattered abruptly by the off-shore tolling of a bell. Nine brassy strokes proclaimed the hour. The gongs seemed to act as a signal, for scarcely had the echoes died away when the deep-timbred moan of a steamboat whistle sounded, only to be succeeded by the blaring notes of a wheezy calliope. The swish of a paddle-wheel floated clearly across the water, and from the deck of the boat an unseen company of vocalists burst into full-throated, lusty harmony: "Here comes the Show Boat—Here Comes the Show Boat. Puff-puff-puff-puff-puff-puff-puffing along."

The Mississippi Show Boat, floating citadel of joy and rhythm of a bygone era! A wraith from the past. Calliope tooting bravely, the gallant ship seemed to nose in toward the bank, preparatory to tying up along the levee.

With sound effects, music and a few well-chosen words is created the illusion that sets the scene for the magic hour of nine of a Thursday evening—precisely at the moment when the Radio Show Boat takes to the uncharted wastes of the ether.

The Radio Show Boat is a non-existent craft, an illusion created of sound in space. Modern science has reduced the proud Show Boat and the even prouder Mississippi to the lowly status of a miniature mill-wheel which splashes around in an ordinary wash tub

filled with water. This gives listeners the thrashing and churning of the paddle-wheels on Captain Henry's Show Boat. The river boat's whistle comes from a wooden box. And the calliope tune is played on a miniature instrument run by compressed air. Set them all in action before a microphone, and the sounds of an actual river steamboat are reproduced with a faithfulness and accuracy that are amazing.

Yet, so realistic is the Show Boat illusion that it has become as tangible and real as the Statue of Liberty or the Empire State Building to thousands of listeners.

**T**IME and again crowds have turned up in the river and lake towns where the Show Boat was supposed to be playing, and awaited the arrival of the craft. A short time ago when the script called for the Show Boat to make an appearance in Buffalo, New York, a score or more of boats on Lake Erie awaited its arrival, prepared to salute the Show Boat as it sailed into port. On another occasion at Erie, Pennsylvania, several thousand fans swarmed to the dock prepared to roar a royal welcome. Even the listeners who reside along the swampy banks of the Mississippi are taken in by the fictional docking of the boat at towns and cities which used to be played by the river boats. Biloxi, Mississippi, and Natchez, Louisiana, declared holidays so that its citizens would have an opportunity to see Captain Henry's Show Boat dock, and if possible to go on board for the show.

A visit behind the scenes of this ingenious illusion will show just what kind of microphone legerdemain is employed to make the mythical Show Boat so convincing.

A magic carpet whisks the observer off to the bright lights and glamour of studio 8 H, the largest sound

auditorium in the world, located in Radio City. Almost 2,000 devotees of the program are seated in the red leather chairs of this ultra-modern radio theater to witness a performance of Captain Henry and his cohorts.

A red hand creeps resolutely past its black brothers on the face of the electrically synchronized clock on the studio wall. In a few seconds, say the hands, it will be 9 o'clock, and another Show Boat journey will be echoing in the loudspeaker in millions of homes from coast to coast.

**TINY RUFFNER**, radio's tallest announcer, has just finished telling the studio audience that their cooperation is essential to the program. Tiny expects to use the visible audience as extras, and has instructed them to applaud when he raises an *Applause* sign and to stop when he turns the *Stop* sign in their direction.

On the stage in back of Tiny is the Show Boat troupe, seventy-three strong, the largest regular cast in radio history. Grouped in front of microphones are the world famous principals of this show—portly Frank McIntyre, the Captain Henry of the program; Lanny Ross, Muriel Wilson, Conrad Thibault, Irene Huhhard, Molasses 'n' January, whose faces have been furnished coal black with charcoal; Helen Oelheim; and the Show Boat Four, a singing quartet. Gus Haenschen's orchestra is grouped in a half circle at the rear of the stage. Hunched over their instruments in the control room are Ken MacGregor, director; Bernard Dougal, author of the scripts; Tom Revere, of Benton and Bowles, the advertising agency which represents the sponsor, and several engineers.

A cathedral-like hush settles in the studio as the clock ticks off the seconds. The red hand lurches past the zero hour, and a red light flashes on. Tiny's poised hand drops suddenly, and Harry Saz, chief sound effects man, sets off the compressed air button that starts the calliope. Radio's best-known sound effect, the swishing paddle-wheel, is touched off. Gus Haenschen waves his baton, and the orchestra bursts into rhythm. The entire ensemble sings the robust Show Boat signature song.

Announcer Ruffner, alert, intense, one eye glued on the script, the other directed to the control room, introduces the principals to the radio audience. Frank McIntyre, genial 275-pound skipper (Charles Winger's successor) who looks amazingly like his predecessor, picks up where Tiny left off. The skipper's cap is thrown back carelessly on his head, one hand buried deep in the pocket of his rumpled trousers, as he delivers his cheery "Howdy, howdy, howdy, folks" line. Without benefit of river or boat, the Show Boat hour is under way.

The plot of Show Boat surely is known to all—a simple tale dealing with the vicissitudes of a roaming theatrical troupe aboard a Mississippi river tug. Despite its simplicity, it retains unflinching sparkle.

For a full hour the pageant of talent parades on the stage. One by one and in groups the actors and singers march up to the microphones. Dark-haired, blue-eyed Mary Lou (Muriel Wilson) purses her lips and snuggles against the mike as she sings a romantic ballad. Lanny Ross, a sprucely slender lad, breathes softly and rhythmically into the shining black disk. When he finishes, Gus Haenschen and his men sweep into a throbbing number. A magnificently proportioned chap rises to a mike. Both hands in his pockets, glance never wavering from the music stand, he begins to sing. This is Conrad Thibault. At the close of his song the applause is deafening, and Tiny has all he can do to silence the audience.

**THE** show broadens in its outline as the clock hands spin around. A hush falls over the audience as Lanny and Mary Lou play an exquisite love scene. The same audience is convulsed with noisy laughter a few seconds later when Molasses 'n' January take their turn at the mike. One joke after another spins into the ether, and they sit down amid a wave of mirth. The Show Boat Four chant a torrid number into a low-swung mike. More dialogue. More songs. More orchestral music. The minutes pass quickly . . . and the show begins to build up to a soaring climax.

Once more the interest of performers and onlookers alike is centered on the control room. Signals between the control room and the stage are exchanged continuously as the closing time nears. Apparently the show has been losing time and must be speeded up, for a quicker tempo is noted. But never fear—nothing ever plays havoc with the split-second schedule of a radio program. As the musicians bend earnestly over their instruments, Captain Henry shouts farewell and the Show Boat shoves off from the imaginary levee. Another journey has been completed.

It was a smooth-running show, to be sure. But not by accident. For every hour this troupe is on the air, it spends dozens in rehearsal. Each broadcast is preceded by almost a full week of activity.

Before that show went on the air there were rehearsals. Before that there were business meetings between the sponsor and the agency executives who plan the show. Before that there were conferences between the script writer and the director. Special orchestrations for the music had to be arranged. The author submitted perhaps two or three scripts before the final one was okayed. Experts had to examine every line faithfully, for the radio Show Boat adheres meticulously to the dialogue and customs of the real Show Boat era. (A

lapse in this respect invariably brings a flood of protesting letters from Southern listeners.) And in the matter of sound effects, accuracy is drawn to a hair-line. All of this spells work—hard, nerve-wracking work.

The Show Boat routine is split into two divisions—one for the actors, one for the vocalists. No sooner is the curtain rung down on a broadcast than the wheels are set in motion for the following episode. Thursdays to Sundays, inclusive, are taken up by author Bernard Dougal. The script is delivered to Mr. Revere each Monday morning, when it is subjected to a thorough scrutiny. Usually many changes are to be made, but the script is in shipshape order by Tuesday morning.

Copies are dispatched immediately to the principals for study. Meanwhile, the sound effects men produce and write in the proper noises and effects as called for in the script's action. This, of course, entails constant experimentation. Tiny Ruffner helps Gus Haenschen in the selection of musical numbers, whereupon a staff of arrangers compose special orchestrations for the songs. It is now Wednesday—time for the first rehearsals. Two studios are required—one for Haenschen, his orchestra and vocalists; the other for the actors.

These rehearsals are held simultaneously in different parts of the building. The many speaking and singing doubles that once plagued the Show Boat performances were brought about by this difficult situation.

At one time Lanny Ross, Conrad Thibault and Muriel Wilson all had doubles for spoken parts. Lately, however, Lanny and Conrad have dispensed with their doubles, even though this means dashing from one studio to the other. Muriel still retains her double, and it is Rosaline Greene's voice that is heard in the romantic verbal exchanges with Lanny Ross.

**THURSDAY** the entire cast comes together in the one studio for the first time. Producer, sponsor and agency executives sit enthroned behind the glass windows of the control room, as MacGregor directs the cast. Shouted commands are exchanged continuously between the director and those in the control room. Sound, music and dialogue are blended, and the show is tuned perfectly.

The rehearsal proceeds, stops, picks up again. Finally everything is working smoothly. A halt is called about 5 o'clock to permit a hasty combination lunch and dinner.

An hour later the all-important dress rehearsal is staged—and at 9 o'clock the Show Boat is ready for another flawless journey.

Show Boat is broadcast every Thursday over an NBC-WEAF network at 9 p. m. EDT (8 EST; 8 CDT; 7 CST; 6 MST; 5 PST).

"I hate that word," warns Phil Baker's comedy butler. "I detest it so heartily that I can't even repeat the injunction. 'When you call me that, smile.' I couldn't hear it if you were in spasms of laughter. It would be best if you didn't think of it in connection with me."

**I**T ALL began in the corridors of NBC's Chicago studios. Crowds awaiting the opening of the galleries for the Phil Baker broadcast caught a glimpse of the British ex-soldier and comedian walking toward one of the entrances.

A lass with an eye for manly beauty breathed a sigh and said to her escort. "Gee that's a good-looking fellow! Did you see the nifty clothes he was wearing?"

The devoted lad, reduced to rank bias by the laudatory comment, said knowingly:

"Don't you know who that is? That's Harry McNaughton, Phil Baker's stooge?"

Harry heard—and thus was animosity crystalized in the breast of a chap who has achieved too much in the realm of the theater to be classified among the performers whose stock in trade is a willingness to absorb assault and battery and verbal punishment from some master mind of comedy.

"I'd rather be dead than be called a stooge," whimpers Harry.

**I**N A more serious vein, McNaughton carries the torch not alone for himself but for all artists whose duty it is to provide the openings for the star jesters' gag lines, for those whose position in the theater gives them almost equal billing with the name artists—those with Thespian standings big enough to contribute to the commercial ballyhoo for the sale of dramatic products.

"You might just as well call Brian Aherne Katharine Cornell's stooge," Harry complains. "He's a supporting player. If those who assist comedians deserve the ugly title, then just so surely do those who are secondary to the star in any cast."

Making a name for one's self is sufficient in McNaughton's mind to elevate a person out of the stooge

rating. And he rightfully feels that he has done that. As a co-star with Baker he knows that he has set up a definite characterization for himself, as have many who are members of supporting casts.

"When a man has something to offer other than merely throwing back answers," he explains; "if he becomes a definite and outstanding part of a program, a character in himself—you couldn't correctly call him a stooge. When he becomes an individual, it is necessary to find a new name for him. And the word *Stooge* no longer applies."

**H**ARRY points to his own achievements in the theater, on the screen and in radio as a defense for his hatred of the highly resented term. On the strength of them he thinks *co-star* would be far the better word—and that applies not alone to himself but to all whom he describes as supporting players.

McNaughton has traveled many and devious routes

since the days when he risked his youth for his country in disease-ridden trenches and under the relentless hail of enemy lead. He has followed opportunity like a heagle since the memorable day while he was awaiting demobilization in France and obtained instantaneous, honorable discharge upon receipt of a cable from America asking him to take the leading role in the famous war comedy, *The Better 'Ole*.

**T**HE breath of the moors that is in Harry's accent was honestly acquired. He was born in Surbiton, Surrey, England, April 29, 1896. He had reached the age of only fifteen when he decided that his schooling was sufficient to permit his abandoning it in favor of a theatrical career. His handiness with a jest and his very persuasive tongue won him a place in an English production called *Matrimony, Ltd.* It should have been *Engagement, Ltd.*, as Harry held his part just two weeks. His youth militated against immediate success, and the experience taught him that a further try at education would equip him better for the work he wanted to pursue.

He attended Sussex College for the full term, then left the University, only to find a world aflame and his own country in the middle of the fire. He joined the British Rifle Brigade and managed to escape serious injury during the three years and nine months which he served in all of the principal actions of the World War. It was just after the signing of the Armistice that he received the message bidding him to come to the United States for a starring role. He had been recommended by an uncle who knew the requirements of the part, and was justifiably convinced that his nephew could make *Alf* live for American theater-goers.

**H**ARRY attributes his prematurely gray hair to his military experiences, including the loss of several of his best friends, shot down at his side—and to a later experience with fire when he rescued from a burning motion-picture studio a young extra player who since has gone on to stardom. She is Constance Cummings.

Harry was starring in a two-reel version of *Ben Hur* when the blaze and several celluloid explosions wrecked the studio. Without benefit of a tread-mill he ran a race with the flames, seizing Constance as she lay overcome by fumes and smoke on a dressing-room floor. After he had delivered her to firemen for resuscitation he stood around watching the stubborn fire, unmindful of his tropical zone costume and a temperature which stood at 11 degrees above (Continued on Page 25)

## The Capture of the Ghost Gang Leads Nowhere Unless John Fairchild Can Put Over His Biggest Coup

**F**OR AN instant John Fairchild stood uncertain. Everything seemed to be happening at once. And in that brief moment while he paused irresolute, the tableau in WWP's studio was branded upon his memory—as lightning on a dark night may burn into the eye a swift impression of a landscape.

There was Tubby—usually so easy-going—leaning nonchalantly out of his control room, pistol in hand. There stood the stranger, a stunned look on his dark and cruel face. He was nursing his bleeding right hand, looking stupidly down at the gun on the floor. There was Devine—huge, swift and competent, with his own gun out. Rupert, Golden and Oakwood sat like three dummies in a waxworks show, too astounded to move. As for Helen Wright, her lovely blonde head was turned towards the control room and upon her face was a look of dawning horror.

Why had he accused the good-natured little control engineer of murdering Workman? Could it be that Stewart, their red-headed, freckle-faced friend, was the deadly inside-man of the Ghost Gang? How, otherwise, could be explained the sudden appearance of an utterly unexpected pistol in Tubby's hand—and his amazing swiftness on the draw?

**S**UDDENLY there came another shot in the corridor outside the studio. And instantly, John understood it all. His indecision vanished. Before Devine could raise his voice to stop him, the young announcer had dashed from the studio, across the outer office and to the hall where the shooting was taking place. He was gone for a few seconds—and when he returned, his eyes were blazing.

"Hey, you!" he snapped at Devine. "Lay off my control engineer." Devine was in the act of handcuffing Tubby. Other detectives had taken hold of the bleeding bandit who had tried to shoot the little man. John gave Devine a little push.

"Tubby!" he snapped. "Get back in there and put me on the air! WWP has got the radio scoop of the year—of all time!"

"Say—" Devine growled.

"Shut up!" commanded John. Never, Helen realized, had she seen him so thoroughly in command of a situation—even though to her it was by no means clear just what this situation might be. "I tipped you off that the Ghost Gang was going to try to raid us, didn't I?" the announcer rapped. "Well—"

But by now Stewart had raced into his control

room. John stepped up to the tall standard mike. As the red light flashed on he began to speak:

"Ladies and gentlemen, stand by for the most spectacular news flash of the year. The Ghost Gang has just been captured. This is Station WWP, happy to offer its listeners the greatest radio news scoop of all time! Less than two minutes ago the dreaded Ghost Gang was captured at the very door of this studio!"

The gangster-brother of dead Doctor Workman looked across the studio with burning eyes turned towards John. He seemed utterly oblivious to the detective who was crudely treating his wounded hand with the help of the studio first-aid kit.

"... your announcer, John Fairchild," John was saying. "Thanks to the shrewdness of Detective Devine, working with the staff of WWP, it was learned early this evening that the Gang planned to make a second raid on this station. Devine planted scores of detectives and policemen throughout the Potter House, especially in the corridors leading to this studio. A few minutes ago we heard a shot just outside the door. Several of us dashed into the corridor, and your announcer was thus able to obtain an eye-witness account of this most spectacular arrest of modern times!"

**T**HERE was electric excitement in every word the young announcer ripped into the microphone. Even the detectives who stood in the studio, unfamiliar though they were with radio affairs, sensed that they were listening to a broadcast which would make radio history, both for its dramatic subject matter and its brilliant delivery. And what a sensation, Helen Wright realized, must those words be causing in the thousands and thousands of homes that nightly listened to John's voice!

"Never will I forget the drama of the scene that lay before me, just outside our studio!" John continued. "At each end of the corridor, police officers were stationed with machine guns. And right in front of me, between WWP's outer door and the elevator, stood four men with black instrument cases in their hands. Beside them, on the floor, lay a fifth man. But the instrument case he had been carrying had fallen to the floor, and lay there, open. And inside that case, ladies and gentlemen, was no innocent musical instrument—but a machine gun!"

"You could see at a glance what had taken place. These five members of the Ghost Gang had set out to raid Station WWP. With the diabolic cunning which has characterized every move of this amazing gang of criminals, they concealed their weapons in instrument cases. **J**OHNSON laughed at him. "Meaning," he glibed, "that I'm a nice fellow and all, but you still aren't sure that I didn't kill Workman."

**N**OT ONLY the most significant move of the week, but I believe of the year, was the appointment by the Columbia Broadcasting System of Doctor Arthur T. Jersild to serve as consulting psychologist for the network in revising juvenile entertainment. Doctor Jersild is with Teachers' College at Columbia University, and recently has engaged in scientific surveys covering radio entertainment and its influence on the young.

The Doctor tells us not to expect an immediate and revolutionary rehabilitation or a list of formulas. He doesn't believe in the value of any single type of program. He will disapprove at once, however, of the sensational and melodramatic shows that make kids do incredible things. But he intends to encourage the right kind of thrill and mystery programs as long as they do not resort to hocus-pocus and magical solutions of life's problems. Under the Doctor's direction, children's programs will not, he promises, become dead dry, forcefully educational, et cetera, but will be lively and entertaining, fraught with a copious amount of comedy—all basically capable of communicating knowledge. Catch-lines which tend to make children impatient will be frowned upon.

AT NBC, children's programs are quietly undergoing an official once-over, too. A trend is there for the

Summer, to spread programs for youngsters across the board five days a week in late afternoons, in order to keep the kids, now free of school chores, interested enough that they won't pester mothers. Two of these new serials have just got underway—The Old Skipper and His Gang, and Pals. Still another is readying—it will be a technically approved story of a young flyer, the son of a war ace. Pals is the serialized adventure of a couple of orphans newly released from an institution. The Skipper is piloting a show that is pretty much of the variety type.

**M**UCH has been said about the new type of amateur hour which NILS THOR GRANLUND is bringing to the NBC Blue network weekly, starting July 9, in which the most beautiful chorines and showgirls of Broadway will be given an opportunity to solo. So far as networks go, this is a brand new notion, but it really got its start fourteen years ago when Granlund was one of the country's outstanding announcers. Old-timers will remember the custom of labeling announcers with initials only. Granlund picked his letters, and immediately became famous in the metropolitan zone of New York. To listeners who now will get an earful of Granlund, affectionately known on Broadway as Granny, perhaps a brief summation of Granny's radio career might be of interest.

Granlund started out as a newspaper man, and was a good one. They took him away from journalism to head the press and publicity department of Loew's, Inc. A few years after that radio broadcasting came into being, and it was Granny's job to preside over the new

Loew station, WHN. It was at that time a mere toy, and few there were who visualized its potentialities. It was just an outlet for exploiting some of the Loew vaudeville acts and for mentioning Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer film releases. Long before any of the executives realized what radio really was to become, Granlund had the vision. But they cried him down. Then he began to clown on the air, and introduced many comic Broadway characters—a stunt for which he was severely criticized, because in those days nobody believed that you could project comedy successfully over the radio. There are some who still believe that you can't.

Granny's real fame did not come, however, until he began to recite poetry. He was perhaps the country's first radio poet. He specialized in the poems of Robert Service and Rudyard Kipling, and he skyrocketed to success when he did Boots. He was the first man in America to elicit a thousand fan letters in a single day. He was virtually forced to do Boots five times a week, and The Shooting of Dan McGrew was a runnerup. From all this you can see that Granny is a pioneer. But he was also the first man to put a variety show on the air—direct from the stage, too. He was first among the air impresarios to bring musical composers to the air personally to introduce their new tunes. And when you remember that all this was happening back in 1922 and 1923, you probably will walk away with the idea that, after all, there's not much new on the air today. In fact, Granny's parade of beauties will be the revival of one of the oldest shows in radio.

**S**O MANY radio anniversaries are occurring during this month, and there were so many in June, that it appears that most of the celebs must have come into the radio picture during the theater's off season. The subject of anniversaries recalls the days when radio performers were catapulted to fame almost overnight, through a system of publicity build-ups which don't thrive much nowadays. Many of those who reached the top have fallen into oblivion more or less. A great many of them were at the peak of their kilocycle success within the last eighteen months. But who hears anything today, for instance of RUBINOFF? GEORGE JESSEL got off to a good start and then—got off. JOEY NASH was near the top not long ago. JACK PEARL faded abruptly, though they tell me he'll be back in the Autumn as *The Baron*. Others you don't hear much about any more include the BOSWELL SISTERS, the MILLS BROTHERS, VINCENT LOPEZ, GYPSY NINA, JIMMY KEMPER—who was among the best; CAB CALLOWAY—who was a real sensation and a house record-breaker; PAUL KEIST, ROXY, and last but not forgettable, DANNY MA-LONE.

## Plums and Prunes

**S**OMETIMES we get a little bit fed up on this critic business. Right now the wind happens to blow that way—and all because we complimented GRAHAM McNAMEE for a grand job of announcing the *Baer-Braddock* bout.

The next few days' mail brought scores of letters from disagreeing listeners who felt that Graham was just as bad as he has been several times in the past. Enclosed with many of the letters were newspaper clippings of columns of radio writers who lampooned McNamee once again.

Frankly, it is our opinion that most of the dial twisters and radio writers are suffering from inflexible minds. In other words, they have grown so accustomed to commenting unfavorably on the ace announcer's sportcasts that they refuse to permit their minds to get out of the rut.

Come on now, let's be fair. McNamee, we said, did the best job of fight reporting in his thirteen years of broadcasting. And, please believe us, we have been for thirteen years a strong opponent to Graham's methods. But we stand behind our original opinion. That was a swell job.

WE FEEL a particularly prune-hurling mood coming on. The first throw will be directed at those local stations whose officials feel it necessary to interrupt network programs every half-hour with their station identifications, even though such interruption may ruin a sequence of dramatic or comic dialogue being presented at the moment. For a direct citation of such a breach of broadcasting etiquette we name WMAQ on the night of June 26 for cutting into the Fred Allen show.

AND NBC'S CHICAGO staff was a wee bit careless; enough, we think, to earn a package of prunes for the Wednesday, June 26, production of the hair-raising *Lights Out* thriller. Perhaps you heard the drama. If so, you will recall that a motorcycle officer arrested a young couple who were fleeing a chanel house. He directed them to return in their car; he would follow. But only the auto sound effects were heard. There was no motorcycle exhaust.

Again, the script had the officer telephoning headquarters from a phone in the house which had been vacant for a year following the commission of a crime there. Just what telephone company is it that leaves telephone installations in houses vacant an entire year?

**O**N THE CREDIT SIDE of the week's ledger falls the plumful stunt of AMOS 'N' ANDY, of witnessing the Louis-Carnera fight and immediately working the details of the important bout into an ad-libbed conversation which was employed as the material for their second or Midwestern and Western broadcast *the very night of the fight*.

More plums are enroute to the *Hollywood Hotel* sponsors for their farsightedness in signing LIONEL BARRYMORE to portray each Christmas Day for the next five years the role of Scrooge in Dickens' beloved Christmas Carol.

EDWARD REESE, too, comes in for his share of

the juicy fruit on the occasion of his return to the perennially favorite *Crime Clues* program after his recovery from the unfortunate automobile accident which took him off the air. Somehow *Crime Clues* hasn't been the same without Reese, the original *Spencer Dean* of the series.

**A** WHOLE flivverful of plums is awarded to Henry Ford for the superb lineup of soloists he has signed to appear on the first fourteen weekly programs of his Sunday Evening Hour when it returns to the air on September 29. In order, the stars will be: Jascha Heifetz, Lucrezia Bori, Julius Huehn, Daliés Frantz, Richard Crooks, Joseph Szigetil (radio premiere), Mischa Levitzki, Cyrena Van Gordon, Kirsten Flagstad, Albert Spalding, Lauritz Melchior, Elisabeth Rethberg, a quartet made up of Grete Stueckgold, Kathryn Meisle, Richard Crooks and Ezio Pinza, and finally, Jose Iturbi. The 1935-36 series will run for 39 weeks.

JANE AND GOODMAN ACE, the bridge fiends, feel oppressed by the amateur majorities that are swarming the palatial network emporiums. Goodman, who claims to be head-man of the Easy Aces, relates that shortly after the picture shown elsewhere on this page was snapped, Jane and he adjourned to the foyer where they saw an immense crowd around a rather seedy looking individual. Asked what all the milling was about, the hostess informed them that it was a MAJOR BOWES' Amateur Hour winner being lionized for autographs. . . . COURTNEY RYLEY COOPER, the well known author, recently auditioned a script based on the adventures of the government agents, and at this writing it appears as if the deal will be consummated within a comparatively short period. Another crackerjack scrivener who is devoting his talents to the task is TOM CURTIN, author of the Black Chamber stories. Tom,

who knows many of the G-men personally, is working with a specific commission in view. A sponsor who has been away from the airwaves for quite a spell, wants to come back with a bang. A G-men story will do this literally and actually.

So-o-o-o, you-all had better buy your earmuffs early this Fall, for we're in for a noisy seige of prop screams, grunts and machine-gun fire. Unquestionably it'll be hard on the ears and nerves. But one man's poison is another man's meat. Already the sound effects

crews are licking their chops in anticipation of a profitable season's work.

In the Summer an amateur's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love—or so it seems; for a talent drought has struck the shows featuring simon-pure performers.

Time was when the reserves had to be called out to maintain order among the thousands of eager, unmanageable hopefuls who responded to every audition call. But not now, Roscoe—alas, not now.

CBS' National Amateur Hour seems to be the show most seriously affected by the blight (maybe it's a blessing, depending on the point of view)! At any rate, RAY PERKINS and ARNOLD JOHNSON used to audition about 800 amateurs each week. Now, despite the weekly appeal for talent, they're lucky if 60 or 70 aspirants show up.

MAJOR BOWES, too, is seriously concerned by the inexplicable loss of interest among the amateurs. A living human wall used to engulf the Major at the NBC audition sessions; it was no rarity for amateurs to arrive early in the morning and depart late at night, without being heard. Often this procedure was repeated for days before the contestant was called to take his or her turn before the mike. Now it's only a question of a few hours before the hopefuls are auditioned and sent on their way.

Can this condition be the handwriting on the wall that presages the end of the amateur hour?

LIFE seemed pretty dark to GEORGE FRAME BROWN last week. In the midst of his radio comeback he was stricken with an illness that necessitated an immediate operation. So they carted poor George off to the hospital, while MARIO CHAMLIE, his part-

ner, took up the burden of the Tony and Gus scripts. Soon George was carrying on via bedside broadcasts—but he wasn't responding satisfactorily, and his doctor worried. Then came word from the sponsor that the show had been renewed for an additional thirteen weeks. That's all the medicine George needed. Three days later he limped out of the hospital, and the medico still can't get over the miracle of his patient's speedy recovery. Well, it wasn't a miracle that did it, Doc—it was a contract. Ask George. He knows!

DALE WIMBROW'S sponsor threw a birthday party for him at NBC last week, and everyone had a swell time except Dale. The reason?—

The party was scheduled to start at 6 o'clock and the merry minstrel's sponsor sent several gallons of his product—ice cream—up to the press department, where the joyful session was to be held. The cream was delivered at 5:30, while Dale was in the studio broadcasting his regular half-hour stint. When the portly and perspiring artist finally reached the scene of activities, he found the room was crowded with a grinning array of assorted newspapermen and women—but there was nary a drop of ice cream in sight! It had been consumed long before his arrival.

But Dale didn't even notice it, for he was too excited thinking about the bear his wife had presented him with that day!

S'HELP US, we can't resist telling you about BLOCK AND SULLY'S new status as variety artists now that they're trouping the boards for the Summer.

When Block and Sully quit vaudeville several years ago—or was it that vaudeville quit Block and Sully?—they were averaging about \$400 per week—when they got bookings. Now, as radio headliners, they're getting \$2,500 per date, with the theaters fighting for their services. *Some jump, I'll say!*

LAST WEEK, three bandleaders, well known along Radio Row, met accidentally and stopped off at a bar to have a drink and to discuss such things as bandleaders might discuss. At the bar they drank a toast to a night club which is no longer in existence.

The three maestros were JOLLY COBURN, JOHNNY JOHNSON and LORING "Red" NICHOLS. The night club they toasted was the well remembered Pelham Heath Inn where each of them played his first professional engagement.

A CHANCE meeting with LEO REISMAN, who celebrated his fourteenth anniversary in radio last week, afforded us one of the best yarns of the year, which we're passing on to you:

Leo, who led his first orchestra when he was only seventeen years old, making his initial broadcast over WJZ in 1921, recalled an incident that graphically reveals the uncertainty of remote-control broadcasts in those early days.

Reisman and his men had been rehearsing for more than an hour for that initial broadcast—with all the hullabaloo and cussing that goes with a practice session—when word came through that somehow the rehearsal had gone out over the air. Later, when they had started the actual broadcast, Reisman and the boys played for about fifteen minutes before they discovered that they were playing into a dead mike!

As a champion, MAXIE BAER was no great slucks as a radio hero; that is, if fan mail is any criterion of an artist's popularity. Up until the eve of the fight which resulted in his losing the title to JIMMY BRADDOCK, Maxie's Lucky Smith performances were drawing but a few hundred letters a week, from the

listeners. Now that he's lost the heavyweight bauble the talkative Max seems to have taken on a renewed glamour, for he's receiving several thousand letters per broadcast, and is a greater hero than ever with the ladies.

Incidentally, here's something for his sponsor (who sells razor blades) to worry about: Eighty-five percent of Maxie's fan mail is written by the fair sex! What are the gals doing with that product?

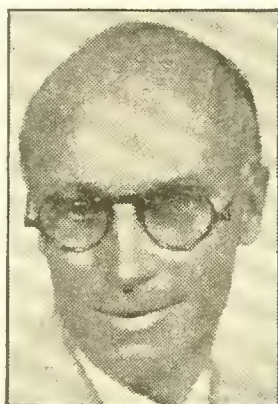

## Music in the Air

By Carleton Smith

**N**OT enough is known about the Salt Lake City Tabernacle Choir, which broadcasts every Sunday (CBS at 11:30 a. m. EDT; 10:30 EST; 10:30 CDT; 9:30 CST; 8:30 MST; 7:30 PST). Its present members are grandchildren and great-grandchildren of the original vocalists in this famous organization.

Under the direction of the learned ANTHONY C. LUND, this vast chorus of 262 mixed voices gives concert programs which are most impressive for sincerity, beauty of tone and richness of shading. No attempt is made for the dramatic or for that highly stressed type of musical detail which would interest the pedant but would by comparison seem overly ornate.

Though secular music is included in its vast repertoire, the choir's singing is essentially devotional and is at basis the expression of a congregation. The choral parts flow easily and fervently, with graceful expressiveness. And the great thrill of their performances lies where it ought, in the perfect clarity of a text unanimously voiced.

The Choir has a large repertoire, which it alternates in broadcasts with selections on the great organ of the Mormon Tabernacle. It has sung at practically all the great Expositions, including the two Chicago World's Fairs, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific and the San Diego National Expositions. This choir is certainly one of the world's most famous bodies of singers, and one of the West's earliest and best claims to musical fame.

Showing wise judgment, WOR has decided to give us the entire Stadium opera on Thursday evenings (8 to 11 p. m. EDT;

7-10 EST; 7-10 CDT; 6-9 CST; 5-8 MST; 4-7 PST) and the entire symphonic program on Saturdays a half-hour later.

We are grateful to WOR, one of the earliest and most consistent sponsors of good music on the air, for this excellent new series. The operas scheduled are: *Boris Godunov*, July 11; *La Boheme*, July 18; *La Traviata*, July 25; *La Tosca*, August 1; *Prince Igor*, August 8; and *Carmen*, August 15.

So successful was the recent series of Gilbert and Sullivan operettas presented by NBC's National Light Opera Company that the cycle will be heard again, Fridays at 2:30 p. m. EDT (1:30 EST; 1:30 CDT; 12:30 CST; 11:30 a. m. MST; 10:30 PST). There will be full hour presentations.

A selection I wouldn't miss on the NBC String Symphony broadcast this Sunday (NBC at 8 p. m. EDT; 7 EST; 7 CDT; 6 CST; 5 MST; 4 PST) is Arnold Schoenberg's *Verklarte Nacht* (*Enchanted Night*). It is representative of the early style of Schoenberg and is one of the landmarks in contemporary 20th Century music.

But more than that, it paints a mood and a story that, once heard, are never forgotten.

*Frank Black* has also programmed Paul Stoeving's *Capriccio in Moto Perpetuo* for violin choir, and Paul Graener's *Symphonietta*, Opus 27.

The role of *Gilda* in two performances (July 20 and 21) of *Rigoletto* on the Steel Pier at Atlantic City has been awarded to MARION McAFEE, NBC coloratura soprano, heard often on the Women's Radio Review, Morning Parade and Revolving Stage programs. Miss McAfee's contract came as a result of two appearances at Atlantic City on Decoration Day, where JULES FALK, musical director of the Steel Pier Opera Company heard her. We suspect we'll be hearing more and more about this young lady, whose voice has a lovely quality and is well used.

Several persons have written in to commend the recently re-inaugurated Columbia Concert Hall programs heard now on Saturdays at 9 p. m. EDT (8 EST; 8 CDT; 7 CST; 6 MST; 5 PST).

This new Summer series has reversed its customary policy of presenting only artists of established reputation, and is now introducing vocalists who are comparatively unknown and who show promise of developing into the leading stars of the future.

For some wholly unexplained reason, the makers of the product that sponsored the Metropolitan Opera Song Title Contest will not publish the winning titles for which they awarded prizes, although they have announced the prize winners.

Since every one knows the melody of Wagner's autograph to the Princess Mettermeh, there is considerable interest in what title the judges thought most appropriate.

In response to inquiries, they replied: "The prize names were selected by the judges from lists which gave no hint of identity of the person who composed each title."

You can readily see, therefore, that GERALDINE FARRAR, LAWRENCE HIBBELL and HERBERT R. MAYES, magazine editor, judged the suggested names solely on their merit.

"Each name on the judges' list carried merely a code number, so that names and addresses could be later collated by the clerical staff; and legal reasons make it inadvisable to publish the prize winning titles."

The company has not announced the legal reasons.

No one has made the accusation that there was any unfairness in choosing the winners, but every musician is interested in the title selected. Perhaps some way could be found to surmount legal reasoning.



# Your Announcer: Jean Paul King

This Roving Knight of Radio Has Tasted  
Success in Several Fields—and Has  
Ambitions to Go on to New Conquests

**A**NY summary of Jean Paul King's life must look like a composite chapter from The Rover Boys in College, The Rover Boys in Vaudeville, the Rover Boys in Radio and the Rover Boys at Large. Jean has roved through them all with calculated determination, almost from the day of his birth in North Bend, Nebraska, December 1, 1904.

His nomadic disposition took him westward in line with the best tradition. It wasn't so many years ago that he rode in from the West to Chicago and, Lochinvar-like, swept up opportunity in stride and, mounting her in front of him on the steed Ambition, carried her on to success. It's all a mixture of allegory and fact.

Jean's initiation into the field of radio came while the enterprise still was distinguished for its informality. It hadn't had its dignity lifted in those days before awards were distributed for perfect speech—in fact, that might have been called radio's pre-diction era. But who possibly could have predicted Jean Paul King?

**T**O THIS announcer the job in hand was to get across to the listeners a ringing, convincing message. Somehow or another a dress suit or proper attire didn't strike him as an absolute essential. Came the day—after a trying night which made a return to bed a bright prospect as quickly as he could get back from a morning broadcast—Jean appeared in the best lounging attire discreetly covered by an overcoat. NBC officials remembered their positions in the mounting important business of radio, and informed Jean that when he signed off the next time he might best add something to his speech that would smack of finality. Jean did. That ended that!

But radio is one line of endeavor in which the sponsor is the link that is stronger than the chain, and sponsors had come to respect Jean's artistry with the spoken word, the vocal lure to profitable sales. Regardless of the network fiat, they insisted on King as announcer; so Jean set himself up as one of the original free-lance mikemen, a field in which he still is away

out in front of most of his competitors.

Thus does his voice ring out over the hookup from which he theoretically is barred. At present he is in New York, and from that point he will continue on the programs for which he has become famous.

Withal that Jean has had his moments of irresponsibility, he is no swashbuckler. He has applied himself assiduously and with a marked degree of thoroughness to all of his radio as well as his theatrical work. This spirit of application developed during his school days. He first attended Miami University, but eventually was graduated from the University of Washington. It was during these university days in the Northwest that he developed his leaning for theatricals and music. He was manager of the college glee club, and made his first radio appearance in Seattle, Washington, in this capacity.

**B**UT he was not yet ready for the air. His early venture was in vaudeville. Then he drifted into the silent pictures and eventually turned up in that ace of theatrical finishing schools, a stock company. He played a variety of parts in the four years he was a member of the Dully Players in San Francisco, but they all led to the day when he made his microphone debut.

His first connection was with NBC on the Coast. From there he went to KGW in Portland, and finally began the Eastern hegira which landed him in Cincinnati with WLW. A trip back to the West was followed by the aforementioned descent on Chicago, the event around which his current affairs revolve.

It was while Jean was at KGW that he met Mary Cogswell, a fellow entertainer on the air. It wasn't long until Jean was the only fellow that Mary was entertaining, at least privately; and their marriage followed a brief but ardent courtship. They have one son, about a year and a half old.

Jean has ambitions that augur a short life on the air. He would rather write fiction. Already he has found a ready market for his work. Doubtless he will wind up his career as an author. He is five feet, seven and one half inches tall, weighs 145 pounds and has brown hair and eyes.

## Gasaloons and Bitamin V's

**G**ASALOON for gasoline; Sleen of Queba; Maroon Reef for Marine Roof; Hoobert Herver for Herbert Hoover; emnity for emnity; im-pot-ent for impotent; Bitamin V; Tito Guitar and his romantic guizar; seme timgature for theme signature; acidity editor instead of city editor!

These, and a few more, comprise some of the lingual lapses that have contributed to your announcers' gray hairs. Most of them have been made by men who earned their places in radio by a comprehensive knowledge of the language, and have won diction awards since entering it. None has a single excuse for his tongue slips save that inexplicable mental flurry which results in temporarily garbled expression.

The avidity with which the nimble-brained Ed Wynn seized on Graham McNamee's most widely publicized boner, *gasaloom*, never will be forgotten by listeners to the Philadelphia jester's programs. He hasn't let Graham bury that one. A reference to it is apt to find its way into any of Wynn's scripts. Mac, in turn, has fastened his teeth into a few of Ed's slips, but Ed's line is so zany-like at best that the most glaring error on his part is accepted as just another Wynn gag. The odds are heavily against Graham's ever getting even.

**H**ARD ever to live down will be Andre Baruch's greeting that went awry when he launched a program with, "Good ladies, evening and gentlemen." Equally permanent is Bill Brenton's commercial suggestion

to listeners that a certain type of bread for which he was program announcer would taste much more delectable when eaten with a "call, tool glass of milk."

But it is not the Spoonerisms that most terrify announcers. Single words, many of them with moot questions of pronunciation, are the ones that really give the jitters. Much in evidence in the past year has been the word *quintuplets*, which has been used variously by news commentators and station attaches in connection with the Dionne family.

**I**T IS believed to be Bob Trout who first braved adverse authorities by calling it *quin-tyou-plets*, with the accent on the first syllable, a pronunciation since accepted as absolutely correct. David Ross, no amateur at the business of using words correctly, takes on the appearance of a comedian in a fright-wig when he is faced with using the name of *Popocatepetl*. Another word that blanches the cheek of this authoritative speaker is *musicianship*.

Any sentence in which one word ending in *st* is followed by one beginning with the letter *s* is poison to the mikemen. An illuminating example is *these analysts'*

*statistics*. Andre Baruch confesses that his favorite spine chiller is the simple phrase *under the direction of*.

**T**HERE is no guessing what imp of perversity infests an announcer's brain and prompts what seem like impossible contortions in speech. Perhaps too many rehearsals bring about the familiarity which in turn breeds contempt.

Surely there is no precedent by which to make comparison to the memorable slip recently made by Alois Havrilla, one of the most impeccable of the NBC spokesmen, when, in describing a previous episode in the affairs of Gail and Dan, he recalled that the pair was on the African desert, trapped in a severe snowstorm. Of course he meant to say sandstorm.

The fact that recent news dispatches carried word of heavy snows in Africa doesn't relieve Havrilla of the dolor which assailed him when thousands of letters revealed the wariness of the listeners, as well as their knowledge of weather phenomena.

All of these are admissions off the records. Around the studios the boys have learned never to dwell either secretly or openly upon the slips possible in a given word or sentence. To do so means almost to assure error when it comes time to take the air. It's a psychological adventure, but it's nevertheless a fact.

So all the while you are thinking that announcers are talking with tongue-in-cheek, many of them in reality are wrestling with the problem of holding their tongues in check.

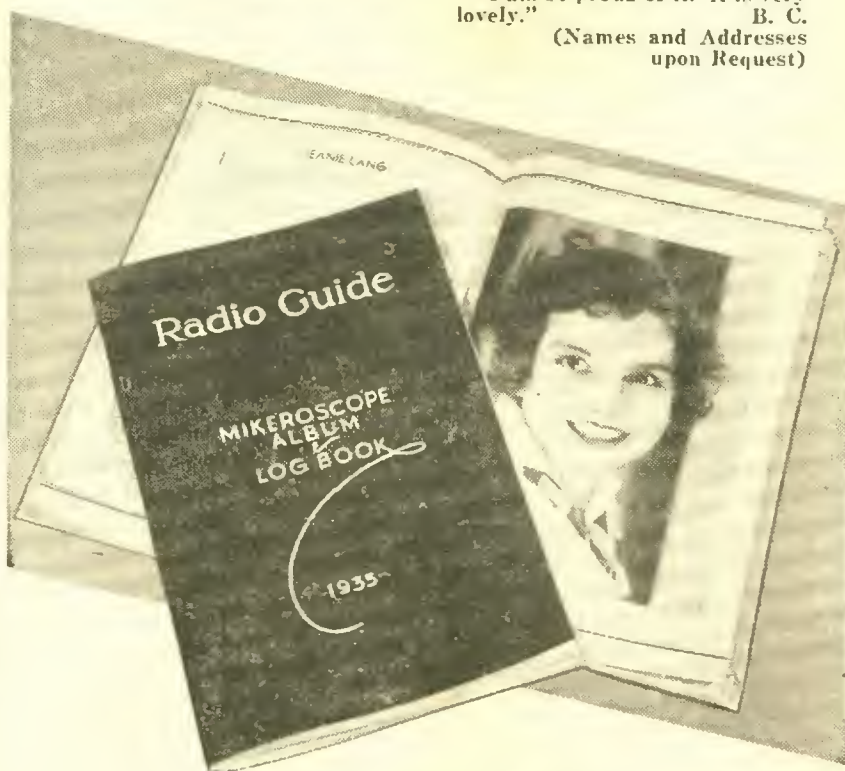

the brakes on a train like I did or make permanent waves like you did. Haven't we gone to a lot of vaudeville shows—and haven't we learned a lot of jokes? So let's become radio comedians."

zero. The reward for his bravery was a case of incipient pneumonia. But to Harry that all comes under the head of trouper business.

However, the motion-picture experience was a development of several previous years on the stage following his national success in the Bairnsfather farce. From the role of Alf he stepped into parts in *Topics of 1923*, *The Passing Show of 1924* and eventually into the lead of the George Cohan production, *American Born*.

It was after he made his debut in the Cohan show that McNaughton enjoyed one of the memorable thrills of his life. Cohan tore up the contract under which Harry inaugurated the role and offered him a new one at twice the salary Harry had agreed to accept. And they want to call a fellow like that a stooge!

More stage successes followed, and in 1922 Warner Brothers prevailed on McNaughton to make a tour of their theaters in personal appearances. They then drafted him for the talkies; before he came to radio McNaughton made 35 pictures. His first four films were with Evelyn Knapp, during which time Harry was as wrapped up in his work as a tuba player. After all he is an impressionable bachelor, and Miss Knapp is a test for any man's susceptibility. He still manages to retain celibacy but has had several weakening experiences until now it is rumored that the current romance will jell.

Harry is an ardent sportsman. Next to ping-pong, he goes for cricket with all his ardor. He is likewise devoted to rugby—but all in all he's a soccer for a blonde, a brunette or a redhead. Aren't we all? **BUT NEVER CALL HIM STOOGE**. Them's fightin' words.
