

BOB BURNS WAS BORN ON BROADWAY

BY JAMES STREET

IS real name is Robert Burn, Jr., but his mother called him Robin and the boys called him Bub.

He was born on Broadway, in Van Buren, Ark., which was a thriving community when Los Angeles was a mud-hole, Miami a wind-blown wilderness, and Detroit's mass production was measured in wampum and papooses.

He was graduated from high school at the age of forty, and is remembered at home as the boy who got sick when he ate sweets, and ran the wrong way in a football game, almost making a touchdown for the other team. He hasn't any relatives in Van Buren or in all Arkansas, so far as the home guard knows.

He left Arkansas in the days when the Titanic was news and the Taft recession was called a panic in the cities and hard times in the sticks. And if Bob Burns is a country boy, so is Franklin D. Roosevelt, who was born a fair-to-middling piece from town himself, and Herbert Hoover, who went barefoot as much as Bob did, and even Queen Victoria, who lived 'way out from town as a child and played with the imperial cows and the regal geese and had a grandpa named George III, who was as big a cut-up as Grandpa Snazzy.

Grandpa Snazzy.

If Bub Burns is a hillbilly, so are Mary Mc-Cormick, Mary Lewis, Col. Jay C. Flippen and

Dick Powell, because they all came from the same neck of the woods. But none of Brother Bub's colleagues of corn pone and Crowder-peas childhood got rich or famous by kidding the public with tall tales of their native state. It's amazing how many folks believe him.

That's why thousands of Arkansans resent Bub's stories, although they are proud of him. They laugh at him, but in their hearts they are sick of other folks laughing at them, and they think Bub, who wouldn't knowingly hurt anything, is leaving the impression that Arkansas is so far in the backwoods that the natives put sandpaper in their shoes, fooling themselves into thinking they are barefoot.

Here is a typical incident. A hotel clerk, pardonably inquisitive but unpardonably brazen, gaped—at his register, then at his guest and bleated:

"From Arkansas, eh?" He accented the "kan." The visitor snorted. "Yes. But it's Ark-an-saw. Now laugh!"

The clerk did. "Know Bob Burns?"

THE Arkansas traveler visibly was irked, for he had been asked the question many times. "Listen, brother, I'm one of more than a million and a half Arkansans who never heard of Burns until he began tooting melodies through a whisky

funnel and teaching America a little bit about geography and a whole lot about exaggeration." "Is there such a place as Van Buren?" The

clerk was persistent.

The visitor grunted his disgust, muttered something about "read history and geography" and turned away. You can't blame him, for the name of Arkansas has brought titters from Yankee


sophists for fifty years.

It's like Hoboken, Brooklyn and Kokomo in one way only—the mention of Arkansas always brings a giggle to vaudeville gags. And Arkansas is weary of being the butt of wise-cracks which were fresh twenty years before Grandpa Snazzy came wallowing down from the Ozarks with a jug of white lightning under each arm and two jugs under his belt and stomped the stuffin' out of John Henry, Stave 'n' Chain, Mike Fink, Paul Bunyan, St. George, Don Quixote, Baron Muenchausen, Hercules, and all the lads who have amused an easily amused people with wild stor-

ies of their achievements.



TED HUSING TO DESCRIBE 64th

ANNUAL RUNNING OF KENTUCKY

DERBY OVER CBS THIS SATURDAY

THERE are races with richer purses than the Kentucky Derby, but there is none with richer traditions, and it's a safe bet that when some fifteen or twenty high-strung three-year-olds mince toward the post at Churchill Downs on Saturday, May 7, one of the greatest radio audiences of the year will be leaning toward loudspeakers in every part of the United States to hear a detailed description of the Derby.

Maybe it's the legends of the bluegrass country that have nourished the traditions. Maybe it's the great age of the 64-year-old classic. Maybe it's the presence of innumerable Kentucky colonels, battalions of sports writers, droves of movie stars, radio stars, stage stars, political poobahs, Broadway playboys and other characters who bask eternally in limelight, that has fed the fame of the Derby. But whatever the contributing causes there's no disputing that fame; and there's no argument about the fact that the Derby and the World Series, for the average American citizen, are the two biggest sporting events of the year.

That's why most of them will be listening on Saturday afternoon when Ted Husing and Bob Trout, of CBS, bring them an exclusive description of the race that thrills millions who

Below: America's greatest racing event, the Derby, attracts fans from everywhere, last year lured 65,000 will never see it, packs Louisville hotels with thousands of hopeful visitors every May, gives rise to more futile speculation (literary and otherwise) than a presidential election, breaks down more inhibitions than a rollicking spree, and produces, in passing, a style show second only to a Manhat-

tan Easter parade.

There will be two big Derby crowds on Saturday. There will be the crowd at the Downs, whose roar you'll hear through the microphone like the surf of seven seas assailing a single cliff, and there will be the crowd that is nameless and shapeless, scattered all over America and all America's outposts, in groups of half a dozen, in knots of twos and threes, with fear and hope and joy constricting their breathing as they hear the cry: "They're off!"

During the two brief minutes of the

race there will be a greater unity of consciousness and feeling throughout the land than during any other time of the year. There will be more people thinking about the same thing. There will be more silence. There will, in short, be a nation-wide focusing of attention upon a single object. That's what the Derby will do. That's what the thunder of hoofbeats and the roar of a crowd and the memory of champions and the wild thrill of conflict will do. That will be Derby Day.

IN 1875, the year of the first Derby, a gallant little red horse named Aristides galloped over the mile-anda-half course (in 1896 it was shortened to a mile and a quarter) in two minutes, thirty-seven and three-fourths seconds, and won a purse of \$2,850. Last year War Admiral captured a

purse of \$52,050. This year—well, nobody knows. Not even the racing experts, for, as usual in such matters, opinions are almost as numerous as the experts, and there are those who say one horse will win and those who say another—which is as it should be, for no man really knows.

Stagehand, trained by the great Earl Sande and winner of the Santa Anita Handicap and Derby, has been a winter-book favorite. But that's a simple statement of fact—not a prophecy. In this business prophets are entirely without honor. Who the winner will be nobody knows. It may be a favorite, and it may be an unknown colt who will gallop out of obscurity to join the host of previous Derby winners—the company of Flying Ebony, and Whiskery, and Reigh Count, and Gallant Fox, and Burgoo King, and Cavalcade, and Bold Venture, and War Admiral, and the amazing Twenty Grand, who streaked over the course in 1931 to set a record of 2:01 4-5 for the distance—a record which still stands. That's part of the thrill of the race.

The Derby broadcast this year will be an exclusive CBS feature. It will be Husing's seventh, and as he perches atop the clubhouse above the great (Continued on Page 15)

"DANCES of Galanta" derives its name from a small Hungarian town where Zoltan Kodaly spent seven years of his childhood and often heard a famous gypsy band in dance tunes of the countryside, some of which are in the present examples, ardent and sentimental.

Sibelius' work found its origin in the "Kalevala," the great mythological folk-epic of Finland, and treats an episode concerning a maid from Pohjola, "gloomy realm" and "home of somber songs." She sits on a rainbow, weaves glittering fabrics, and like her Chinese counterpart, Turandot, propounds unsolvable riddles to suitors. One of the latter seems to be portrayed in the agitated passages just before the quiet end of the composition.

S A build-up for music at the coming World's Fair in New York, the May Day Festival (on NBC-Blue at 4:30 p.m. EDT and NBC-Blue and CBS at 8 p.m. EDT) in that city gives an idea of the seriousness with which their duties are regarded by those in charge of the expositional music. From what I have heard whispered loudly, the musical part of the Fair is to be the "biggest and best" ever offered on a similar occasion. In fact, the director-in-chief says that if all the applications for solo, orchestral and operatic performances were accepted, the exhibits would have to be thrown out, and all the buildings turned over to the tonalists.

Who will write the typical composition for the Fair? The thought is well in order, for at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition of 1876 it came from the pen of Wagner in the form of his "Festival March"—and a sorry sort of work it was, too. America evened up matters later when we sent our John Philip Sousa to the Paris Exposition, and the March King had all the Europeans stepping to his strains.

It is certain that most of the major choruses and orchestras of America will perform at the New York Fair, and possibly a few may come from abroad. The Metropolitan Opera has not yet announced whether it is to take part, but I have my suspicions, especially as Lauritz Melchior confided to me the other day that he has been signed up for five appearances. "In what?" I asked. "Operatic music, of course," was the diplomatic answer.

Summer is drawing near, and with it will come enough radio music to keep us all dialing enthusiastically. Various cities continue their "Pop" series—indoors and outdoors, with Boston and Philadelphia representative in their respective fields. Toronto has its promenade concerts, Hollywood features its bowl, and Cincinnati offers opera at the local zoo, to the delight of the citizenry and the discomfiture of the menagerie. I shall never forget the performance I heard there a few years ago when, during the Nile scene in "Aida," we could distinctly hear the appropriate roar of the caged lions in the vicinity. With so much music imminent, lovers of the art rest content to have "Summer a-comin" in."

All of us probably have made up our minds that among the gentlemen of the baton there are high-voltage conductors and non-conductors.

Pianist Josef Lhevinne, a radio favorite and an amateur astronomer of ability, has given us something to reflect upon. He declares that at the end our earth will turn into a ball of ice and fall into the sun. Shall we get ready for furs or asbestos?

There is no more glorious conclusion of an opera than that of "Goetter-daemmerung" (Twilight of the Gods) when the noble Bruennhilde laments the tragic fate of her hero-lover, Siegfried, and rides his war horse into the funeral pyre to join him in death. The threnody sung by Bruennhilde builds the leading themes of the "Ring" cycle into a climax of overwhelming emotional effect.

By the way, when Miss Lawrence does the role at the Metropolitan, she mounts a real horse and rides him bareback into the simulated flames.

ALTHOUGH he wrote much in various forms, the late Horatio Parker's oratorio "Hora Novissima" seems to be his only generally known composition. Forty-five years old, it nevertheless retains its melodic freshness and fervent sincerity. "Mona," by Parker, which won the \$10,000 prize offered by the Metropolitan for the best American opera, has been buried in the dustbin of time.

Exultation and exaltation ring from the mighty pages of Beethoven, in which his chorus chants of universal love and the brotherhood of man. Were he alive today, he would be disconcerted to see how far humanity is from realizing the dream that moved his soul after the wars of Napoleon.

The words of the chorus in the last movement of the Ninth Symphony are from Schiller's "Hymn to Joy." Beethoven's feeling carried him away to such an extent that he wrote regardless of the singers.

Should National Music Week Feature Our National Music? Critic Weighs Question

AM asking the question contained in the headline of this article, because I sincerely would like to know the answer.

I am uncertain as to what exactly constitutes our national American music. Is it the aboriginal Indian tunes, is it Negro spirituals, hillbilly examples, cowboy songs, or jazz? Must it be written by Americans? And if so, just what is an American? Must his ancestry date back to a certain period on this soil? Must he be born here, or merely naturalized?

The Indians had no harmony, but accompanied their vocal chants solely with rhythm. Whatever has come into our standard music in the way of Indian material underwent harmonic treatment of European derivation. The source of American Negro music is problematical, researchers tracing to influences part African, part European. An amusing aspect presented itself just recently when Delius' (English composer) "Appalachia" performed by the Philharmonic at one of its Sunday radio broadcasts. The story told by the composer was that he picked up his main theme while he lived in Florida, where his colored plantation workers chanted for him and called it an old slave song. The melody is startlingly like the beginning of the famous quartet in "Rigo-letto," and as that work was in the regular repertoire of the New Orleans Opera as early as 1860 or soon thereafter, it is likely that the catchy air became popular all through the South and was adopted and adapted by the Negroes. Delius did not go to Florida until 18**83**.

Then there comes the matter of Americanism. Our first native-born composer of importance was Francis Hopkinson (signer of the Declaration of Independence and friend of George Washington), who published his first song in 1788. All the Hopkinson music derives from Purcell, Bull and other antique Englishmen. The first opera written in America—don't laugh—was written by an English composer, and the title was "The Archers of Switzerland." New York had the premiere in 1796. In the same year, nine months later, the second opera born in America, "Edwin and Angelina," had its first New York hearing. The composer was Pellesier, a Frenchman. But why should those happenings be remarkable when it is remembered the music of our national anthem is that of an old English drinking-song?

In 1620 the Pilgrims landed on these

shores with a cargo of hopes and hymns, and the latter became the chief musical recreation of the Colonies. It was nearly two hundred years later before wicked concerts and operas began to attract the impious, the music being, of course, all imported. One hundred years subsequently, the European tincture still flavored our music. In fact, following the political unrest of 1848 across the seas, the vast numbers of immigrants that came here brought us their own musical culture, which we were quick to make our own. Talented young American musicians felt that their musical salvation could be achieved only through study abroad, and it was not until the twentieth century that our common sense succeeded in exploding the myth.

The first American opera written by a native American made its emergence in 1845 (Fry's "Leonora"); first real American opera (although purists do not call it such) was Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" a few years ago.

And that brings us to the subject of jazz, about which I shall let my readers form their own conclusions. It has divided our musical circles into three schools of thought: one looking upon it with horror, the second fearing its influence upon art-music, and the third adoring it. Serious composers (even of Europe) have experimented in every form with the exotic stuff. It has swept the world, and by many in this country and abroad is considered the typical American expression in tone. Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" continues to thrill, or, as the lamented George might have said, to "wow." It now remains for one of our talented, strictly symphonic composers to create a work to rival the "Rhapsody" in originality and raciness. The joke of the whole matter is that Gershwin's parentage was Russian, as is Irving Berlin's; and that Jerome Kern's is German. Another accepted "American" composer, Victor Herbert, was born in Dublin and educated musically in Germany! The real American composer, and best-beloved, was Stephen Foster.

I ask again, Should National Music Week feature our national music; and what is our national music?

Today there are many excellent serious American composers — never mind how American their works are —and some of them will be heard at the NBC Symphony concert (Saturday, May 7, at 9 p.m. EDT on NBC-Red) in its first program devoted nearly altogether to our own creators.

Books

Composers in America, by Claire Reis (Macmillan's, New York, \$3.50).



Addressed primarily to student contemporaries around the globe, the program will bring adult listeners an interesting peek behind the scenes of youth's most practical contribution to the cause of world amity-a report on international cooperation that is really functioning.

N MAY 4, the "Voice of Costa" Rica," TI4NRH (9.70 megs), celebrates its tenth anniversary as a short-wave station. They would not believe that this little station, heard so well in the States, was operating on a scant 7½ watts. Upon sending two of their engineers to Costa Rica to measure the power of the station, they learned that it was operating not on 7½ watts but on 5! In the words of Sr. Marin, "TI4NRH has grown and is now wearing long

has grown and is now wearing long pants." The power has gradually in-creased from 5 to 500 watts. In comcreased from 5 to 500 watts. In commemoration of its tenth anniversary, Sr. Marin is issuing a special certificate of verification of reception even more attractive and elaborately designed than those previously issued. 

In Fort Smith, you wait for traffic

In Fort Smith, you wait for traffic lights and then head across the Arkansas River bridge. "Where is Van Buren?" you ask.

'You are in it now," the native will "You are in it now," the native will say, and laugh. The natives enjoy a visitor's surprise. It's then you realize that Van Buren is a suburb of Fort Smith but the county seat of a different county. From the center of Van Buren to the main drag in Fort Smith is five miles, but it's all one settlement and the only break between the two and the only break between the two communities is the river. It's like Manhattan and Long Island City, At-lanta and Decatur, or St. Louis and

East St. Louis.
"Know Bob Burns?" you ask the native.

"Yep. Brung up with him." The fellow's eyes will twinkle and you realize that his accents are a pose. "Come on, show you his house."

He takes you by a rambling white house and explains that Bub lived there. Then you go back to Main Street and have a bottle of beer and you get friendly with the native and he takes his hair down.

Pact is, "he'll say, "I never knew Bob. I moved here from Oklahoma. But half the folks here say they know him. It's good business. The oldsters remember him, of course. Ruie Ann Park knows Bob better than any press-agent. Her husband is Hugh Park, editor of the *Press-Argus*, which Bob quotes so frequently. Mrs. Park does a weekly column called "Bob Burns and His Bazooka."

"The kinfolks" she says, "are those creatures of Robin's imagination placed in this local setting. As to how Van Buren feels about that Grandpa Snazzy stuff—why, they don't give him any concern at all, just leave him to his egg-frying while they wait on the tourist trade. Snazzy is one of the most-beloved citizens of Van Buren, but there isn't one who has ever laid eyes

There is a genuine devotion in Van Buren for Bub among those who knew him as a boy. There is not a black mark against him in his home town.

The Press-Argus expressed it this

way in an editorial:

"The voice of Bob Burns will go far
to future advancement of Van Buren
... Bob Burns probably never thought of this feature when he began to bring Van Buren to fame along with his own personality . . . But not for selfish financial reasons do people of Van Buren love Bob Burns. They love him because they have known him as a boy and as

Bob was born on August 2, 1896, on Broadway, in a section of Van Buren known as "Lick Skillet." His home was called the "second boathouse" because it was made of lumber from an old river boat. While he was just a child his father, Robert Burn, Sr., a civil engineer, moved his family to a white frame house in a better neighborhood. There are only two children in the Burn family. Farrar Burn, a West Coast writer, was the first born. Bub's mother named him Bob after his father, but soon she began calling him Robin because he chirped so much.

because he chirped so much.

Bub wore dresses until he was four and a half, and then Cy Cordell (Bob still talks of him) took the boy to his clothing store and outfitted him. The fellows stopped calling him sissy and called him Bub. He could play any musical instrument as a child, talent he inherited from his mother's people, the Needhams of Tennessee. Still at the button-shoe stage, he began studythe button-shoe stage, he began studying music under Frank McLean, the head man of the Queen City Silvertone Cornet Band. Brother Frank realized he couldn't teach Bob very much music because Bob already knew as much as Brother Frank. Bob played a mandolin in the band, but also doubled in brass. He had an affinity for the trombone, and one day he went to Hayman's plumbing shop, took two pieces of lead pipe and welded a whisky funnel on their mouth. When he blew through it, it sounded like a dying calf—"baaa

-zooooo-ka.
"The thing ka,'" Bob com

-zooooo-ka."

"The thing is saying 'baa—zooooo-ka,'" Bob commented. So the bazooka was born, but for a long time folks in Van Buren simply called it "the thing."

Students in Bob's school were divided into two groups. One group—the energetic crowd—was called "salt of the earth." The other group was called "the sons of rest," because they loved to do just that thing. Bob was called "the sons of rest," because they loved to do just that thing. Bob was a "son of rest," and his mother realized that the only way to get him out of high school was to take him out. So she took him up to Fayetteville, where the University is. Bub had a letter from his high-school principal to the University which said simply: "Hope you will be able to interest this boy. I haven't been."

Just how Bob was able to get in the University without a high-school diploma is one of those strange things that can happen in Arkansas. Bub stayed at the University two years learned two new songs on his bazooka but not much else.

Then he went to New Orleans and blew his bazooka for bread and meat, but he still was unhappy, so he went to Boston and a few way stops, and wound up in Chicago selling adver-







grandstand at Churchill Downs where he can watch the colorful panorama of the track and the swift. hard-driving race itself, he will be surveying the scene with the practised eye of a veteran. With him on this assignment will be Bob Trout, who will be stationed in the newly erected reviewingstand in the infield, whence will come sidelights on the brilliant spectacle. When the race has been run Trout

will arrange brief interviews with representatives of the host of celebrities who invade Kentucky every year for the Maytime classic. Two sure-to-bepresent speakers on this part of the program will be Gov. A. B. ("Happy") Chandler, of Kentucky, and Col. Matt Winn, the venerable director of Churchill Downs.

NOT the least entertaining part of the Derby is the Mardi Gras atmosphere that prevails in and around Louisville during the week before the race, and to convey to listeners throughout the United States a picture of the Derby Week carnival CBS is arranging a series of network broadcasts covering the four days of feverish activity that immediately precede the day of the race.

This Derby preview program will get under way on Tuesday, from 6:15 to 6:30 p.m. EDT, when Husing broadcasts the running of the Derby Trial from Churchill Downs. Next morning, from 9 to 9:15 EDT, he will go out to the track to describe workouts and interview such trainers and jockeys as he can persuade to go on the air.

On Thursday and Friday, from 6:15 to 6:30 p.m. EDT, he will round up arriving celebrities for more interviews, and on Friday, from 11:30 to midnight EDT he will describe the annual Kentucky Colonels' Dinner at the Hotel Kentucky in Louisville. On this broadcast Ferde Grofe will introduce his newest composition, "The Kentucky Derby Suite," to be played by a 23-piece orchestra; Gov. Chandler will speak, and so will John J. Pelley, generalissimo of Kentucky Colonels.

On Derby Day itself last-minute information as to scratches and betting fluctuations will be broadcast from Louisville from 4:45 to 5 p.m. EDT. At 6:15 p.m. EDT the running account of the race will begin, and sometime during the next three-quarters of an hour you'll hear the cry: "They're off!" That's what you'll be waiting for.

Too Much Ballcasting

We know a lady who would like to take all the baseballs in the world and run them through a meat-chopper. That might, she thinks, stop baseball broadcasting.

RADIO GUIDE likes a ball game. It likes a broadcast of a ball game. But it also likes to be able, through the functioning of this great service to mankind known as broadcasting, to tune in something else during the summer afternoons when it is not in the mood for a ball game.

Last summer, that was practically impossible.

This is what happens. An advertiser knows that a broadcast of a Chicago Cubs-St. Louis Cardinals game will attract a considerable audience. He contacts a station and makes a deal for a broadcast. But three other advertisers recognize the same fact, so they contract three other stations and make three other deals.

So, when the Cubs play the Cardinals, every station in town is broadcasting the same game, appealing exclusively to the ballconscience audience and splitting it four ways, while the man who wants music or news or poetry or inspiration becomes, for several hours, the Forgotten Man.


Of course, contracts for baseball broadcasting are worked out on the basis of an entire season, but that does not change the effect of our illustration. Instead, it simply binds sponsors and stations to commitments whose ridiculousness is emphasized for months on end.

In some cities there is but little baseball broadcasting. In most, there is hardly anything else during the afternoon. To repeat, there is no music, no news or poetry, nothing but ballcasting.

Is that in the public interest?

Out on a Limb

A special dramatic show is announced by network program chiefs. Far-flung publicity heralds

A \$5,000 artist on a \$25,000 program announces that this week's extra-special guest will be the famed Countess Somethingorother of Delta-On-The-Rhine. Tune in and you get the \$5,000 artist and the \$25,000 program, but with a two-bit quest who happened to be roaming about the neighborhood when the Countess was junked.

Out in Detroit there is a minor feud on between radio editors and broadcasters. Say the editors to the broadcasters: "You're constantly changing your minds, never sticking to announced plans, always leaving the poor listener out on a

RADIO GUIDE rolls up its sleeves, pitches into the feud. Not because the constant changing of programs on a minute's notice or no notice at all gives its staff headaches, but because the situation is reaching the serious state of giving the impression to listeners everywhere that radio is still a spoiled infant.

The reason is no mystery.

The average program begins to take feeble form about five days in advance. No rehearsing is done until the afternoon of the broadcast. That rehearsal is a bedlam of conits coming. On the appointed hour fusion, caused many times by exmillions tune in. But no drama! ecutives who see no good in any teners have been left out on a limb.

three hours of this kind of rehearsing, the sponsor or his representative will often junk the entire show, making it necessary for his stooges to build a completely new program in three to four hours.

This is how the guest-star program works. A New York executive, upon hearing that a movie star is coming to his city, makes tentative arrangements for her to broadcast. In the intervening days, little thought is given the matter. At the last minute the star decides to stay in Hollywood. "Okay," says the program-builder, picks up a phone to ask the town's agents What have you got that's free Thursday?" He finds several persons available. One is chosen.

The profession is fully aware of its haphazard methods of operation. It is accustomed to having programs fall through at the zero hour. The most remarkable aspect of the situation is that many radio producers admit frankly that they prefer to work that way. Their production of the listeners' fare is simply a projection on the air of their own lack of organization.

Because of these methods the business of broadcasting is suffering. It has left itself wide open for ridicule.










Here is McCall with an eight-month-old lion. This cub has had two months' training and has shown that his disposition will be good. He won't have a mane until he is about a year old


The actor seldom reads his rare books, but instead finds his reading-matter in a small closet, which is packed full of current literature, all valued under \$5

O MILLIONS of radio and picture fans, Jean Hersholt is a distinguished actor, but to thousands of book-lovers he is even more distinguished as an authority on first editions. In Hersholt's Beverly Hills home is a library valued in excess of \$100,000, representing a collection of 30 years and considered the finest private collection in the world, exceeded only by the Royal Library of Copenhagen, to which the valuable Hersholt


book collection will go at Jean's death. In the library are works by Hans Christian Andersen, a handwritten copy of Homer's "Iliad," a page of the Gutenberg Bible, a series of pamphlets of Dickens' "Pickwick Papers" in their original published form.

"Book prices fluctuate slightly," says Hersholt. "However, the trend is toward continual rising prices. I consider good books one of the safest investments in the world."



RUSH HUGHES, son of novelist Rupert Hughes, had a hard time deciding whether to be an actor or an author. So he became a radio columnist, is rapidly building a substantial reputation as a news commentator and featurecaster. His father wanted him to write. From his mother, Adelaide, a stage beauty, he inherited a love of the theater. For a time he was on the stage, and for a time he wrote short stories. But when he got a job as a night clerk in a San Francisco hotel he paved his way into radio. As a substitute announcer for a broadcasting dance band he was so successful that he soon had a regular job. Now he is heard from Coast to Coast daily, from Monday through Friday, at 4:30 p.m. EDT over NBC-Red.







So you Like Contests?

MONTH ago RADIO GUIDE | brought readers of its contest department face - to - face with contest judges' own problems. Five entries which had failed to win in the contests in which they had been submitted were reprinted, and readers were asked to see how well they could spot the reasons why. Below are the entries themselves, with remarks by readers under each entry:

"I like Ivory Soap because I trust its purity, gentleness and softness to share my responsibility in guarding and taking care of my baby's health and beauty."—L. E. T.

"This entry lacks originality. P & G have always stressed Ivory for baby's skin. It does not praise Ivory when it speaks of 'its softness.' Suds are soft; soap should not be. The statement is extravagant . . . One would hardly trust the baby's health to any soap. Health is more than just cleanliness Every word counts in a short statement. L. E. T. did not require both 'guarding' and 'taking care'."—Mrs. P. Cannon, 5717 Swope Parkway, Kansas City, Mo.

"I like Ivory Soap because I adore digging in my garden, but soil chaps my hands and I need a mild yet cleansing soap like Ivory to check irritation." -T, W, S,

There was one word practically none of the reader-judges liked: "like." Jean Murray, of Casselton, N. D. wrote: "'A mild soap like Ivory' kills your entry. Ivory must be the one and only soap!"

Another common criticism was this one, as presented by Staunton B. Moran, 252 Sixth St., San Francisco, Cal.: "This statement does not sell Ivory Soap; It induces women to buy gloves and hand lotions!" Miss Merry Berry, of Route 2, Lowell, Ark., called it "an excellent example of the good contest idea poorly handled." Other critics seemed to agree.

"I consider Oxydol the perfect laundry soap because for an 'enviable white' wash Oxydol is complete in itself without the use of any other 'whitening aids'."—C. M.

"Envy" was the word that made trouble in this entry. Many critics pointed out that the idea is old; others felt that stimulation of envy was immoral. Discussing the entry as a whole, Innes Whalen, Box 578, Omaha,

Neb., wrote:

"Firstly: Why inclose phrases in quotation marks? If you write intelligible English, they're unnecessary. If they're necessary, your words are not the crisp, forceful ones that make rushed, jaded readers take notice, and

sponsors pay.
"Secondly: Oxydol's slogan is The Complete Household Soap . . Why should Oxydol pay you for telling them what they told you in the first place?

"Thirdly: You're buying Oxydol. You're the person to be gratified, or the sponsor loses a customer . . . If you're envied because of it, that's of incidental, not prime, importance."

"I like Ivory Soap because when hard times come and costly skin aids must go, it provides a simple, safe, thrifty way to retain complexion love-liness."—D. C.

RADIO GUIDE's reader-judges were more than ninety-nine percent unanimous in their major criticism of this entry! Voicing one opinion with the entry! rest of the critics, Mrs. Roy Widner, of 315 Court St., Ellsworth, Kan., said: "The sponsor will not be flattered to learn that Ivory is a depression-enforced substitute for 'costly skin aids.' The implication is that the writer, with more money, would again use the costlier aids. Poor winning psychology when the prizes are that 'more money which would turn her from the sponsor's products!"

Other critics emphasized this defect time and again. Priscilla Evans, 10 Anthony Ave., Pawtucket. R. I., wrote: "The statement is possibly the true reason why she uses Ivory Soap, so we can call it sincere—but is it tactful?" Maudia Glenna Lowe, Box 668, Farmington, N. M., pcinted out that the "entry has 'customer appeal,' in that it really solves a problem for many of us—but what about 'sponsor appeal'?"

"I consider Oxydol the perfect laundry soap because it enables me at the age of 77 to put out every Monday a wash so white it is the envy of my neighbors."—A. J. K.

On this entry, critics simply could not agree! Some praised the obvious sincerity of the entry while questioning other points. Others doubted its sincerity, calling it exaggerated. (RA-DIO GUIDE is informed that the writer was telling absolute truth.) Some said it had no new ideas; others called it original. A majority agreed that it dealt too much with the writer and not enough with the soap, but Mrs. Reid Evans, 3 Bruce St., Nashua, N. H., thought: "It would have been of more interest had she been able to state, truthfully, that she was a grandmother assisting her daughter with the weekly wash of grubby little children's clothes that had been made sweet and clean with the help of Oxydol." Mrs. William H. Duls, 4320 Arcady Ave., Dallas, Tex., wrote: "I think the writer has a good thought that she did not express. She implies that Oxydol has such cleansing powers that it does not require strength of effort to make clothes clean and white."

Most of the critics agreed that this entry came closest of the five to winning standards. The disagreements of the unofficial judges themselves would indicate as much. Probably its greatest possible improvement would have been to state so clearly what Oxydol does and how it does it that the writer's conclusion would clearly apply to others not yet 77.

Perhaps there is no reason for the failure of this entry except that when thousands are submitted, many good entries must fall by the way. Small consolation, that, but a perfect truth in all big contests!

As promised, RADIO GUIDE awards \$5.00 for the best criticism submitted each time losing entries are printed for criticism. This time the most complete, constructive criticism was submitted by Mrs. Reid Evans, who dissected the final entry in detail and demonstrated corrective improvements.
