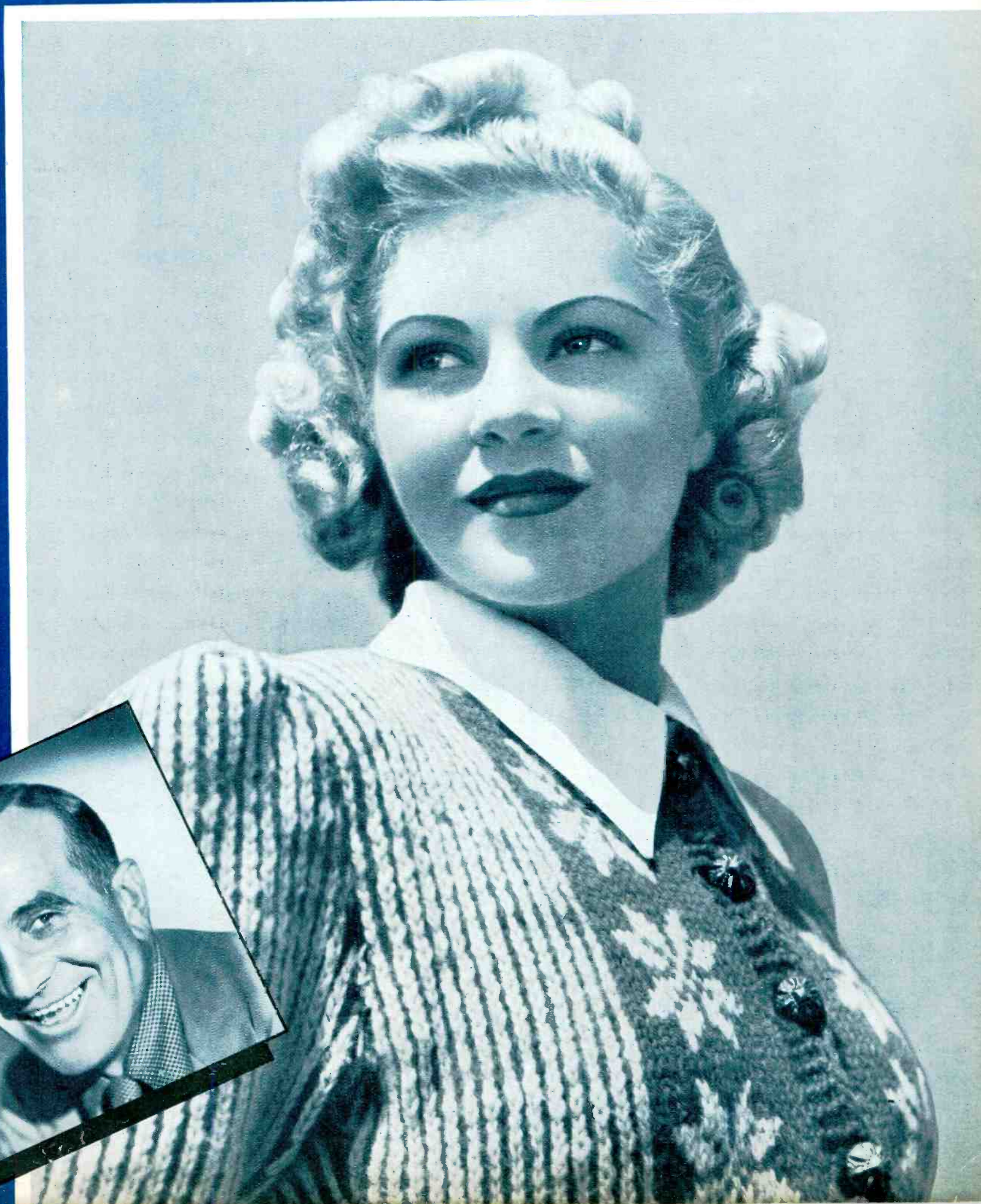

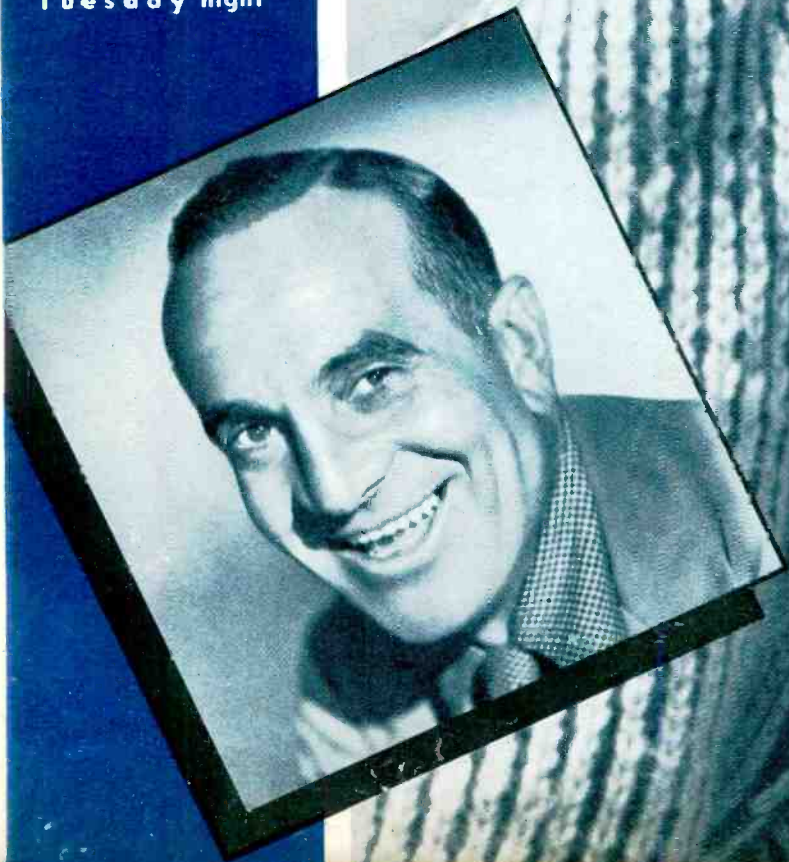

It Can Happen Here

If President Roosevelt—or indeed any President of the United States—were minded to do so, he could seize upon any crisis to proclaim a state of national emergency and could take over or close down any or all broadcasting stations.

Thus by a thin thread, even thinner than the six-month licenses under which broadcasters operate and against which they have raised such bitter objections, does the freedom of radio in the United States hang. For there is no specific limitation placed upon what may be construed by the President as a "national emergency."

Some legalists purport to see an easy path to dictatorship over the radio if any President should be inclined that way, recollecting that along with the press the first instrument to be seized and "coordinated" by dictators is the radio. Others, after more than eleven years of operation of the Radio Act of 1927 and the Communications Act of 1934, profess to see no danger even in the loosely drawn "emergency" section of the act—at least not under President Roosevelt, who has frequently avowed his belief in freedom of the air and who has gone through various crises, using radio for reassuring "fireside talks" but never once laying hands upon or threatening the private American system.

A FAULTY LAW

The section of the Communications law, which would make it easy for any dictator-minded President to take over the radio, reads:

"Upon proclamation by the President that there exists a war or threat of war or a state of public peril or disaster or other national emergency, or in order to preserve the neutrality of the United States, the President may suspend or amend, for such time as he may see fit, the rules and regulations applicable to any or all stations within the jurisdiction of the United States as prescribed by the Commission, and may cause the closing of any station for radio communication and



the removal therefrom of its apparatus or equipment, or he may authorize the use or control of any such station and/or its apparatus and equipment by any department of the Government under such regulations as he may prescribe, upon just compensation to the owners."

THE BANKING "EMERGENCY"

Was the night of March 5, 1933, the banking emergency, such an emergency as this section contemplated? A few broadcasters seemed to think so, for they hurried to Washington the day after Roosevelt's first inauguration, suggesting that he appoint one of them as liaison between the administration and

the radio networks and stations. Other radio companies balked at this; the administration quickly put thumbs down on the idea, and the first step toward a potential dictatorship of American broadcasting was promptly nipped.

But the provision still remains in the act, and whether the crisis be war, a banking holiday, flood or disaster, radio can be expropriated or shut down overnight. Former U. S. Senator Clarence Dill, who helped write that portion of the act, admits today that it was badly drawn. He insists such plenary powers, in the event of war or drastic emergency, must be vested in the President, but he thinks now that a qualifying clause to the effect

that he can exercise them only "for the duration" should have been written in.

It is recalled that the Radio Act of 1912, written to cover trans-oceanic and marine radio, inasmuch as broadcasting was not yet born, empowered the President to close down or control all radio stations only "in time of war or public peril or disaster."

SHALL WE TRUST?

Explaining why the phrase "other national emergency" was incorporated, Senator Dill asserted that he felt there was little danger that any man elected to the Presidency would seize upon any actual or synthetic emergency as an excuse for taking over or shutting down the American radio. "If we cannot trust our duly elected President," he said, "whom can we trust?"

It is generally conceded that radio under Roosevelt, as under Hoover and Coolidge, has been singularly free from governmental censorship or control, at least so far as what is uttered over the microphones is concerned. Politics has played a big part in wavelength and power assignments, etc., but the Presidents during radio's inceptive years (since 1921) have shown no disposition to clamp down on those who displeased them by their utterances on the air. Thus Roosevelt, for example, permitted Huey Long, Father Coughlin and Gerald Smith, let alone his countless Republican and anti-New Deal critics, to have their say on the air without once lifting a hand in reprisal upon the radio managements.

IN CASE OF WAR

Should war come, of course radio will necessarily be rigidly controlled—probably dictator-controlled, with either the Army or Navy military intelligence services undoubtedly taking charge. Some stations may be shut down, but it is unlikely that many will be—for the government and the military will lean heavily upon radio to maintain public morale. The prospects are that all or most stations and networks will continue operating as in normal times, being urged to make their programs as attractive as possible in order to hold the public ear for any sudden announcement, instructions or proclamations that the authorities may want to give out. In each station, of course, there will be a military censor, alert to preclude the use of broadcasts as signals or cues to spies.

DANGER BRAINS AT WORK

NATION'S GREATEST WITS MEET TO BANDY PHRASES, PARRY WORDS AND QUESTIONS ON "INFORMATION, PLEASE" TUESDAY NIGHT

WHERE is the Island of Reil? What's a pogonotomy? What present European premier was saved from execution because he was an American citizen? Who has the title, "Keeper of the Twenty-Four Golden Umbrellas"? Why might a gentleman pass up a date with a melanochroic female?

How'd you like to have questions like those hurled at you on the air, posed by a sharp-witted, caustic-tongued master of ceremonies, with a studioful of people watching it and the whole country listening in?

You wouldn't like it, and that's just the point. It's a whole lot more fun to watch other people and supposedly very smart people, too—floundering and rolling their eyes and biting their nails over such brain-teasers. On that idea was built the best of all the "question-and-answer" programs currently riding the airwaves—the National Broadcasting Company's "Information, Please." For everybody who has ever been "stumped" by a tricky, probing question—whether it's a grown-up staring hopelessly into the cold mouth of a microphone, or a youngster under the relentless gaze of a school-marm—there's a delicious twist to "Information, Please." On this program the tables are turned. It's the know-it-alls, the wise men, who must take the witness stand and squirm shame-facedly when they don't know the answer, while John Q. Fan, out there in the

studio audience, rocks with laughter and says to himself, "Boy, I'm glad I'm not up there in his shoes!"

It had to come. That's radio. For more than a year now, question-and-answer programs have been the sensation of the air. The Professor Quiz program, the True or False program and a dozen others were barraging the nation with brain-teasers of a dozen different kinds. All of these programs had one thing in common: it was people like you and me who did the answering. We were just beginning to get tired of it when along came "Information, Please" with the glad news that now, at last, we could ask a few questions.

"SEND us the toughest questions you can think up," the NBC moguls invited, "and we'll toss them at the brightest people we can find. If we use your question, that's two dollars for you. And if our bright boys can't answer it, it's worth five dollars more to you."

The result was startling. Every week, 60,000 people jumped at the chance to confuse and confound the "Information, Please" experts. They sent in questions that would strain the brain of a wizard—and why not? Weren't the "Information, Please" experts supposed to be wizards, or, at least, near-wizards? And when one of them stumbled over a question, guessed wrong, or tossed up his hands and quit, you could almost

hear the happy chortling of radio fans the country over. "Information, Please" was a solid success almost from the beginning, and right now it's one of the most entertaining things on the air.

Permanent head of the procession of wits, master-minds and near-genius who have come before the "Information, Please" microphones is Clifton Fadiman, book-critic on the staff of the New Yorker, literary figure in his own right and universally acknowledged possessor of as sharp a tongue as ever shaved off a quip. Fadiman's job it is to pose the twenty or thirty questions that are selected from the weekly batch of 60,000 to the members of the board of experts. Two of the latter are permanent fixtures, too: John Kieran, scholarly New York Times sports editor, and

Franklin P. Adams, of the New York Post, famous for years as "FPA" of the "Conning Tower" program. Each week the two "resident" experts are joined by two others, men and women of outstanding abilities and accomplishments. Paul de Kruif, famed chronicler of the heroes of medicine, has served as guest expert. So has economist Stuart Chase, Marc Connelly, the playwright; Carmel Snow, editor of Harper's Bazaar; John Gunther, a top-ranking foreign correspondent, and authoress Alice Duer Miller. It's pretty hard to dig up a question that can fool four such people, but it can be done!

WHEN George S. Kaufman, ace dramatist, appeared on the program he was stumped by a question regarding one of his own plays. And Franklin P. Adams pulled one of the prize boners of all time on the program. It happened when Clifton Fadiman read off two lines of verse:

"I for one deem it silly,
To attempt to paint the lily."

"Can you tell us, Mr. Adams," queried Fadiman, "the name of the author of those lines?"

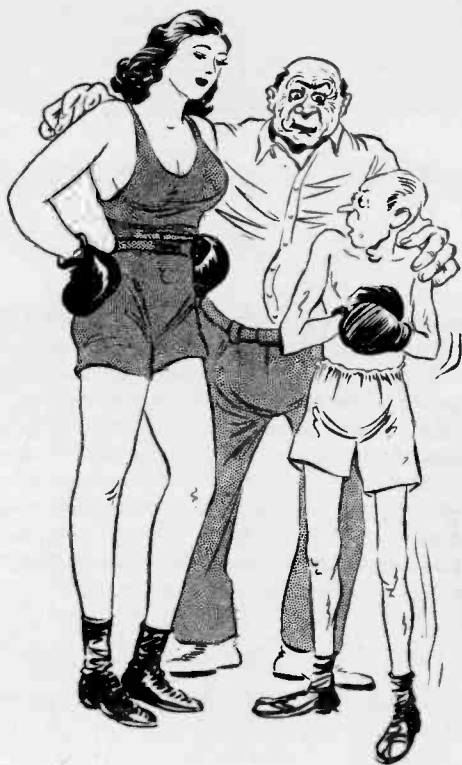
"Um, well, now, let me see . . . um," um-ed Mr. FPA. "I would say, yes, I would definitely say that those lines were written by—Dorothy Parker!"

Mr. Fadiman beamed—maliciously. "How droll, Mr. Adams," he said. "How very droll. It happens that you yourself wrote that verse about twenty years ago!"

Paul de Kruif struck out miserably on this question: "All of the following names, with one exception, apply to flowers. Which one doesn't? Arbutus, (Continued on Page 14)

Warfare Eternal —Monday-Tuesday

James Thurber, gifted cartoonist who has contributed much to the brilliance of the *New Yorker* magazine, for long ran in that publication a series of cartoons with the categorical title, "The War Between the Sexes." Satirical but highly amusing, these limnings depicted actual fighting to the death between massed groups of men and women. Comes now the same idea to radio, and on Tuesday, September 20, NBC will present Frank Crumit and Julia Sanderson in the "Battle of Sexes." (West Coast listeners will hear the show Monday.) It's to be a questionnaire program, with men pitted against women on the field of honor and erudition. To Frank and Julia, adding another to the already long list of question-and-answer programs being broadcast today, it might be said, "Come on in, the air is crowded but nice and warm." At 9 p.m. EDT. (Also Monday, 8:30 p.m. PST for the West.)

Word from Prague —Sunday

The title of a recent book on current European politics, "Insanity Fair," seems the best description yet of the maelstrom of men under arms, undeclared wars, harried diplomats, that is Europe today. With a vicious periodicity, the insanity center of the Continent shifts—from Spain to Italy to Germany to gay Austria, and now to the little democracy of Czechoslovakia, a nation few Americans know anything about, although its constitution was drawn up in Pittsburgh! There the battle of words, Chamberlain to Runciman, Runciman to Henlein, Henlein to Hitler, Benes to Hodza, is raging. Whether or not it will still be only a battle of words next week, tomorrow, no one knows. And everyone in Europe and the United States speculates. Will war come? Will Czechoslovakia give in to the Nazis? The man who coined the stark description of Europe, "Insanity Fair," Douglas Reed, has been touring Europe for the past months, gathering impressions and material. On Sunday, September 18, Reed will be interviewed by William Shirer, CBS central European correspondent, from Prague. The time: 1:30 p.m. EDT.

Scotch Humor —Saturday

A people much maligned are the Scotch. Popularly held to be dour, miserly, cold, like the bone-chilling fogs of their homeland, they are in reality only sober, thrifty and reserved. Scotsmen don't laugh a great deal, but when they are funny, they're very funny indeed. One

of the funniest Scotsmen alive today is Will Fyffe. On Fyffe's shoulders, some of his well-wishers say, has fallen the mantle of Harry Lauder. Maybe, and maybe not. But you can judge for yourself, for on Saturday, September 24, Will Fyffe will headline the British Broadcasting Corporation's Music Hall program, brought to America by Mutual short wave direct from old London town. Other British entertainers to be heard are George Doonan and the Variety Orchestra, conducted by Charles Shadwell. On the air at 3:30 p.m. EDT.

"Big Town" —Tuesday

Edward G. Robinson is a book-collector, a music-lover, a quiet, soft-spoken little man who once confessed that he was afraid of guns. But with the possible exception of the razor-voiced Humphrey Bogart, no actor on the screen or on the air today brings such thorough-going menace to the roles he plays. No one who saw Robinson in "Little Caesar," one of the first and, according to many reputable critics, still the best of the gangster films, could forget him. His interpretation of the part of the hard-boiled detective in "Bullets or Ballots" is another high-point in his career. Still a model of neatness and despatch is the way Robinson tossed a thug



through a plate-glass window and then arrested him for malicious destruction of property. (An actual incident, by the way. Johnny Broderick, famed New York detective on the Broadway beat, did just that one time.) On Tuesday, September 20, at 8 p.m. EDT (7:30 p.m. PST), Edward G. Robinson returns with his "Big Town" program, and radio listeners will once more have a chance to hear a case-hardened citizen in action. Claire Trevor's in the supporting role.

For Women Only —All Week

The annual Women's National Golf Championship at Westmoreland Country Club, Wilmette, Illinois, running from Monday, September 19, to Saturday, September 24, will be put on the air every day by Dave Zimmerman, ace NBC sports announcer. Progress of the tournament will be reported at 7:45 p.m. EDT, on Monday and Tuesday; 7:30 p.m. EDT on Wednesday and Thursday; and at 8 p.m. EDT on Friday and Saturday. The entrance list for this, the forty-second annual competition, includes the country's leading players.

Lost—5,000 Sailors! —Wednesday

Five thousand missing seamen found! That's the amazing record of "Mother Janet" Roper of the Seamen's Institute in New York. And she still continues her unique career. In 1915 Mrs. Roper's husband died, leaving her three

children and no means of support. But she had an idea, and she took that idea to the Seamen's Institute. Every year, she argued, hundreds of seamen drop out of sight, leaving behind them bewildered, sorrowing friends and relatives. Why not set up an organization devoted to the single purpose of finding these lost men of the sea, helping them, setting them back on their feet again? She finally convinced the doubters, and the Missing Seamen's Bureau came into being. To "Mother Janet" Roper goes all credit, for it was a single-handed job. Because she represents a tenacity and a degree of mercy and helpfulness that is not often found today, Mrs. Roper will appear on the "It Can Be Done" program over CBS, Wednesday, September 21, at 10:30 p.m. EDT.

Statesman —Wednesday

Anthony Eden, former British Foreign Secretary, has been called a sissy because he carries his handkerchief in his sleeve. But those who knew him when, as a teen-age boy, he went into the trenches in France, to come out a full captain, can tell you better. So can those who watched him rise to high power in England, and those who have stood by to watch his firm course since he resigned from Prime Minister Chamberlain's cabinet because of a difference of opinion over treatment of the dictators. Today, more than ever, a large group of the English public supports Eden's argument that the dictator nations should be firmly, vigorously dealt with, in contra-distinction to Chamberlain's policy of conciliation. On September 21, Eden will speak at the annual dinner of the Startford-on-Avon branch of the English-Speaking Union, an organization formed to cement friendly relations among the English-speaking countries. It is considered likely that Mr. Eden's talk, short waved to America by CBS, will deal in strong terms with the present European crisis. On the air Wednesday afternoon.

Pilgrim's Progress —Sunday

In November, 1660, John Bunyan, honest son of an honest tinker, preacher and religious fanatic, was thrown into Bedford Jail, and there he stayed for twelve long years. Out of that prison sentence there came one of the few truly immortal books of all time, "Pilgrim's

—Tuesday

Asa Yoelson, once of St. Petersburg, Russia, is coming back to radio this week, and there'll be some hundreds of thousands of Americans to wish him well. For Asa Yoelson—Al Jolson to you and me too—is one of this country's best-loved entertainers. Maybe it's because he never fails to "deliver"—never fails to make felt the impact of his high-tension personality, and maybe it's because his is a typically American story. For Al Jolson has come up the hard way—on his own. He ran away from home before he was into his teens, and did it again every time he was brought back. He ran away to New York to join a circus and to be mascot for a Spanish-American war regiment, before his father gave up bringing him back. Veteran of vaudeville, stage, screen, radio, in fact practically every form of entertainment known to man, Jolson goes into the current season riding high, his new show full of great promises. Martha Raye will be with him, so'll Parkyakarkus. Tuesday, CBS, 8:30 p.m. EDT. (8 p.m. PST for the West.)

Cattle Country

—Sunday

Most of us think of the cattle country as the home of gaudily dressed cowboys riding wild steers and yelling "Yippee!" hard-riding men who "roll their own," take their liquor straight, and shoot from the hip. Once upon a time, perhaps, but not today. Today, like other farmers, cattle-ranchers are businessmen, concerned with the serious matter of breeding and raising cattle to ship to the great stockyards of the middle West. Like other farmers, they have specific problems of over-production, bad seasons, slumps in the market—and, yes, rustlers. There are still a few rustlers, cattle-thieves, although today they work with high-powered rifles and fast trucks. Dallas, Texas, heart of the cattle country, will be the scene of an informal conversation between cattlemen at 2:30 p.m. EDT, Sunday, September 18, over CBS, part of the "Farmer Takes the Mike" series.

Save the Children

—Saturday

Every year, American automobiles kill thousands of little children. Sometimes it's the driver's fault, sometimes the child is to blame, but in any case, the mounting death toll repre-

sents a tragic and a useless slaughter of the innocents. Only sure remedy, of course, is education. Education, education, and more education—nothing else can help in the least. But if it is important that automobile drivers be taught to make allowances for the vagaries of children playing near busy streets, it is also important that the children themselves be taught how to take care of themselves. It is with this in mind that NBC is presenting the program "No School Today," beginning Saturday, September 24. There'll be instructive stories and music by Jolly Bill Steinke, and Fields & Hall, safety team of the program "Sunday Drivers." On the air at 11 a.m. EDT.

Public Hero

—Monday

On a cold January morning in 1937, Sergeant Nathan H. Massie of the Missouri State Highway Patrol received a report on a missing man—Dr. James Davis, physician and friend to practically every one of the 1,500 men, women and children in the town of Willow Springs. The doctor had no known enemies, yet he had left his home the previous afternoon, hadn't been seen since. His wife, distraught, could offer but one clue: Dr. Davis, acting as administrator of an estate, had deposited \$3,000 in a bank the day before. Perhaps someone had thought to rob him. Swinging into action, the highway police soon found men who had seen the doctor entering a brand-new car with a young stranger. His office attendant reported that he had said he was going to make a call at the home of a man named James. Investigation revealed there was no such person in Willow

Springs. But next day, at 4 a.m., a ransom note was delivered. It demanded \$5,000. Because it had been sent through the U. S. mails, the G-Men were sent for. On February 2, they arrested a suspect, obtained a confession, and—but it's too good a story to spoil. Tune in the "Public Hero No. 1" program on Monday, September 19, at 8 p.m. EDT over NBC and hear the dramatized version of the case of Dr. Jim Davis.

G. O. P.

—Friday

Symbol of the Republican party today is not the lumbering, massive elephant that has been for so long a standby with political cartoonists, but a lean, idealized, streamlined pachyderm bearing the quaint legend, "Let's G.O.Places!" Whether or not the Republican elephant can outrun the Democratic donkey is a question that only 1940 can answer. It can freely be predicted that predictions will freely be made about that answer this Friday, when the Republican National Committee gathers at the Palmer House in Chicago to hear National Chairman John D. M. Hamilton and Marion E. Martin, assistant chairman in charge of women's activities. Miss Martin will speak on the task of Republican women during the next two years, Hamilton on "National Objectives." Both talks will be broadcast over CBS, beginning at 10 p.m. EDT.



It's Football Time!

—Saturday

When sports authorities representing Yale, Columbia, Princeton and Rutgers got together in 1873 to draw up a set of rules governing the game, played before that time in pretty much haphazard fashion, they didn't know what they were starting! In those days, a crowd of 1,000 spectators was sure to be described in the press as a vast, howling multitude—by reporters who couldn't dream that the day would come when 100,000 people could watch a game, with ten millions more listening to it on the radio! But that's today's football, an institution and a big business as well as a game. And it's a game that never loses its thrill. There's something in the air, on autumn Saturdays when the crowds throng into the great stadia, a sharpness, a pungency, that strikes straight into the heart of everyone who has ever seen football played. The hushed tenseness just before a play, the thud of a kicked ball, the deep-voiced roar of the crowd—a sound that no other sport produces—all these form a deeply moving symphony. And it's time that symphony was played again! First contest of the new season will go on the air Saturday, September 24, when Ted Husing takes the mike for the Minnesota-Washington clash. Both teams are of championship caliber. Last year the Washington eleven won five games, lost two and tied two, while Minnesota carried off the Big Ten championship, symbolic of supremacy in the toughest league in the game. CBS carries the broadcast at 3:45 p.m. EDT. Also on NBC.

Music, Please!

—Wed.-Thur.-Fri.

Centuries ago, when royal banquetees demanded music as a background to good food and brilliant conversation, the form known as chamber music evolved. The musicians were always placed in a corner of the room, so only a small group could be used. The music was quiet, restful in tone, in order that it might not interfere with the small-talk at the dinner-table. Because chamber music was a vague form, with considerable variation allowed in the instruments, the great composers were able to experiment with it, mold it into a finer form. Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms and many others wrote chamber music. For the past twenty years, Americans have had a unique opportunity to hear some of the world's greatest chamber music, during the annual Berkshire Festival of Chamber Music, held at South Mountain, Pittsfield, Massachusetts, each fall after the regular symphonic Berkshire Festival has ended. Started at the end of the War, the Berkshire Festival has continued each year to play some of the finest music to be heard in this country, with well-known instrumentalists and directors performing. This year, for the three days of the Chamber Music festival, September 21, 22, 23, the Columbia Broadcasting System will air part of each day's program, beginning at 4 p.m. EDT.

Born in historic Salzburg, cradle of music, Wolfgang Mozart first appeared in public at the age of 5

"It is an honor for us to help a great master."

The singers resume, but after a few moments the invalid stops them, and covers his face with his hands. He is weeping. "I can't stand it," he whispers. "I feel that this is the end. I have written my own requiem." His wife and the quartet quiet him and he begs for the music to continue. Toward the final measures he droops, his head falls forward, and he slumps slightly in his chair. The singers are silent, and the wife admonishes them: "Sh! He's fallen asleep." She hands the visitors their hats, and while her back is turned, Hofer goes to the chair, looks closely at the invalid, touches his forehead, and falls to his knees, sobbing. The wife rushes to her husband, and realizes what has happened. "No—no—Oh God, no. Don't take him from me. Please, please, dear, good, kind God, you mustn't. He's so young, so sweet—he's my child, my lover. I need him. He wanted to do so much more—his wonderful music. You mustn't . . . He's gone—gone away from me—forever."

HOFER and the other men cross themselves, and kneel, praying. The baritone, sobs choking his voice, says to the wife: "God has taken him—to let him live forever!"

And so died Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, in his thirty-fourth year of inspired genius, with his wife, Constanza, the love of his life, at his side. Al-

THE place is Vienna, in 1791; the scene, a poorly furnished room. In an invalid's chair sits a thin, wasted man, well proportioned, with small feet, graceful hands, profusion

of fine brown hair, prominent nose and large blue eyes, somewhat bulging. Not a handsome individual, but one who looked to be important and confident of his own worth and culture. Near him, a pretty, solicitous young woman, his wife, gives him his medicine and pats him affectionately. On the floor are pages of music manuscript, and on the arm of the chair, more of them, with one inscribed "Requiem" . . . Four men are singing, and the invalid is conducting weakly with a pencil . . . He stops them and makes a correction in his manuscript.

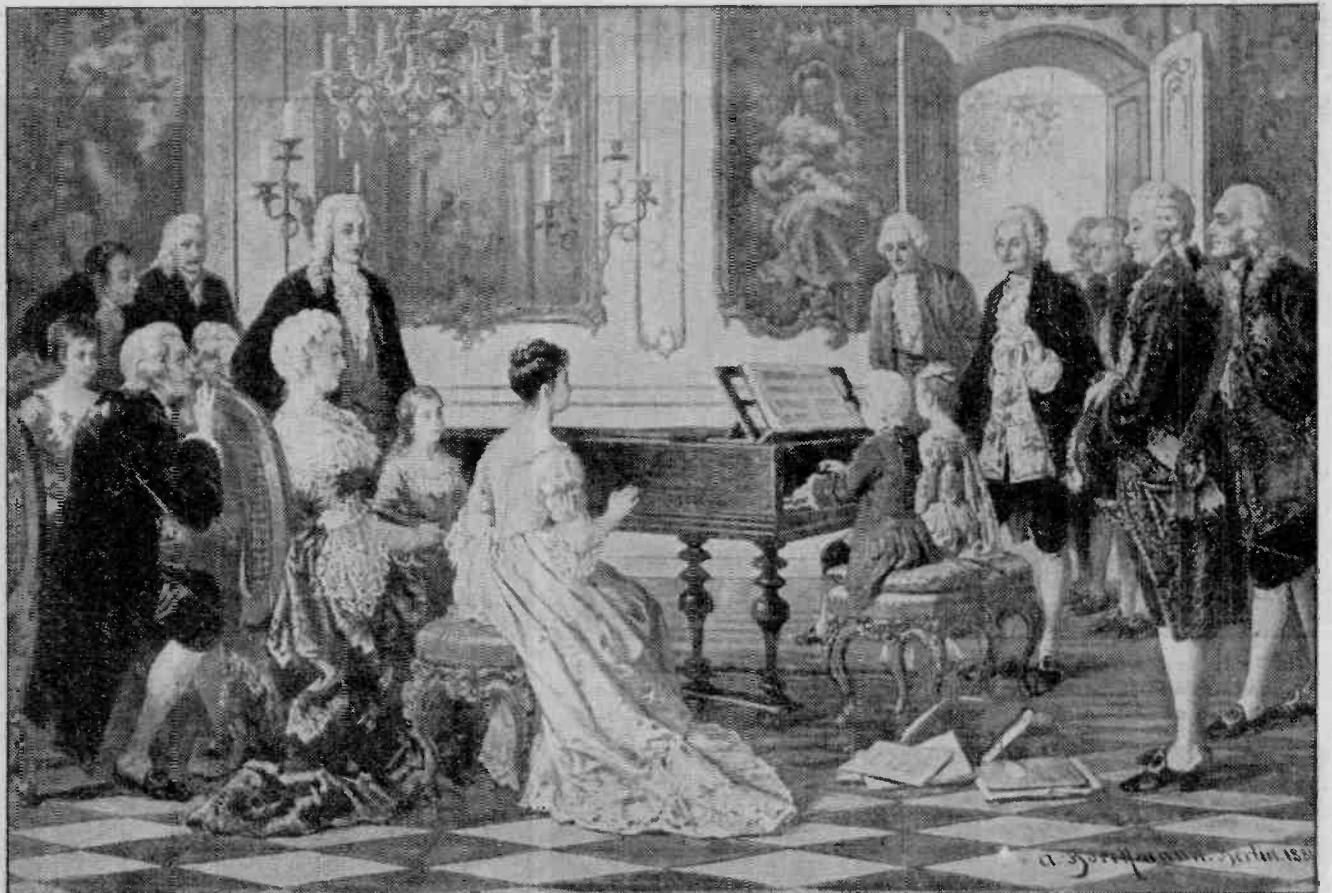
"Meine Herren," he says, "you are singing the 'Lacrymosa' of a requiem, and the passage is marked 'largo'—very slow—and very sad." To his wife, the invalid remarks: "It is kind of my friends to come and rehearse my music so that I can hear how it sounds." Hofer, the baritone, protests:

though they had never been far removed from poverty, the pair led a happy, merry life, picnicking in the park of a Sunday, and rolling downhill together like two scatter-brained children. In his letters to his wife, Mozart always addressed her with a string of affectionate adjectives, and in one letter he sent her 1,095,060,437,082 kisses!

Mozart never quite grew up from the time when, as a four-year-old, he picked out tunes on the piano which he heard his father, musician to the Archbishop of Salzburg, play on the violin. The child mastered that instrument himself, and also the organ, after he had become proficient on the piano. He seemed almost to have been born a master, for when he was only twelve his father wrote in a letter to his wife that their son had all the knowledge of a grown man. He was exhibited publicly in concert at the age of six, together with his sister, who also showed amazing musical talent, and astonished all hearers. At a command concert at the royal palace in Vienna, the Emperor Francis I even allowed the youthful virtuoso to romp with the tiny princess who was subsequently to become the fateful Queen Marie Antoinette of France.

DESPITE Mozart's triumphs in most of the capitals and courts of Europe, and despite his writing symphonies and concertos, and playing and conducting them when he was eight years old, the boy grew up in financial straits and was destined never to be quite free of them. Once he was appointed musical director by the appreciative Archbishop of Salzburg, but the latter died and his successor cared little for Mozart's genius, and finally had him actually kicked out of the palace. In Vienna, where the light-spirited composer went to live, he was under the protection of Haydn, the omnipotent favorite of his day, who had quickly recognized the marvelous gifts of the younger man, but in spite of that, Mozart's life was a continual struggle against jealous rivals to gain a musical post which might insure him a bare living. In



Greatest of the creative musicians, John Chrysostom Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was born on January 27, 1756. When Mozart died at 35, he had written twenty-three operas, forty songs

those times a composer could not earn enough through the sale of his works; and those came pouring from Mozart in endless profusion and greatness. His fertility and industry were prodigious, as exemplified strikingly when, within a period of not many weeks, he wrote his greatest three symphonies, in C major ("Jupiter"), C minor and E flat. Sonatas, trios, quartets, concertos and operas, crowded with immortal melodies, were created with equal speed and skill.

Several of the last-named were produced in Vienna without much acclaim, and it remained for the city of Prague to discover that Mozart was one of the celestial creators. His "Marriage of Figaro" captivated the Czech music-lovers and the next year he set them wild with his incomparable "Don Giovanni." He was the hero of the hour, and returned to Vienna laden with triumphs, but unfortunately only a scant reward in ducats. He used them up quickly, giving parties for his wife and

friends, spending happy seances in billiard-rooms (he was an expert player) and making the nights joyful with dancing, an art at which he excelled.

The Mozart purse grew slimmer and slimmer as the years went by, creditors hounded, and the harassed musician composed day and night in order to provide food and shelter for his Constanza, himself and their children. However, his prolonged reverses are reflected only slightly in his music, for his spirit always lifted him above his material condition. Some of his most gracious and merry pages came into being when his fortunes were at their lowest ebb. He never used his creative powers as a medium of protest, never stormed and fulminated like Beethoven, the Prometheus. Mozart remained a combination of Pan and Puck.

ALL, and with the shadow of death approaching, the composer finished his inspired opera, "The Magic Flute," and started to write the "Requiem," commissioned by Count Waldegg. Before its completion, Mozart breathed his last. The funeral took place on a stormy day, only a few friends following the cheap coffin to the cemetery. The body was buried in an unmarked pauper's grave, and when Constanza, too ill to attend the funeral, tried to find the grave a short time after, no trace of Mozart's last resting-place could be found among the many new graves filled in since his burial, nor have subsequent efforts ever succeeded in discovering the site where the master musician is buried.

Some like to dream of what Mozart might have achieved had he lived longer, for his command of orchestration and his dramatic eloquence appeared to be reaching their fullest flowering when he was stricken down. Richard Strauss effectively dissipated all such speculation when he said a few years ago: "Why ask what Mozart could have done more, when he did so much?" (See Page 17 for Mozart Bibliography)

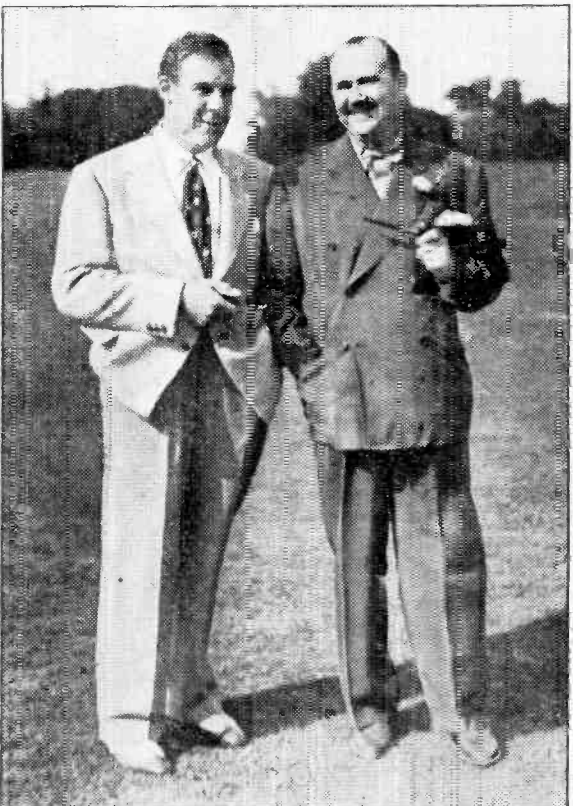

THE "Monday Night Show," featuring Richard Himber, Henny Youngman and Connie Boswell, was slated to leave the air a couple of Monday nights ago, but was renewed at the last minute. Nevertheless, Connie leaves this program and Ted Husing is also off.

Prof. Quiz will not leave the air after all. He starts a new series for a new sponsor on October 1. Listeners in the East will hear him one-half hour earlier than at present, but the West Coast period remains the same. There won't be any battle for listeners between the Prof. and the Vox Pop show, because of the new time. V. P. will not be heard on the West Coast at all.

A new dramatic show called "Quite By Accident" will be heard Wednesday nights starting October 5. Program will point out how some people became famous—quite by accident . . . Grantland Rice will be back on the Cities Service program with his football talks, starting September 30 . . . From now on, Horace Heidt's program will feature weekly guest stars . . . No doubt many readers will be happy to learn that Norman Brokenshire is staging a comeback. He has a weekly sponsored show heard only over Station WOR, and your reporter, for one, sincerely hopes he makes good and that it is only the beginning for bigger shows.

Franklyn MacCormack is waiting patiently for reports on his "Sunday Evening Hour" audition. In the meantime, he is playing the lead in an eight-reel industrial movie being filmed in Chicago for a farm-machine company. Last week he was assigned the announcing job for the "Jack Armstrong" series, and he can also be heard as Frank Fletcher, a banker, in "Stepmother"

Elaine Sterne Carrington, author of "Pepper Young's Family," has been given the job of writing at least six of the "Dr. Christian" scripts, featuring Jean Hersholt. Program starts October 4 . . . Gang Busters has discovered a new actor whose specialty is policeman roles. His name is Ed Stansbury, and he's almost a dead ringer for Paul Muni of the screen.

The Fibber McGee program came back on the air Tuesday, September 6, without Molly. It was hoped and even planned for her to appear on the new series. As a matter of fact, Don Quinn, the author of the show, had been working on the script eighteen hours a day for several weeks, and Molly was included. A few days before the program was to go on the air, the doctor advised Fibber (Jim Jordan) that it would be best if Molly rested some more and did not go on right now. Quinn had to write a complete new script on just a few days' notice.

Few orchestra leaders are more meticulous than Rudy Vallee. I sat in at rehearsal last Thursday afternoon and listened to Rudy tell his music-makers a thing or three about their work. For instance, during one number Rudy sat in the control-room trying to get the proper balance. The boys didn't please the boss and he stopped them in the middle of the song and yelled into the mike: "You're not playing in dance-music rhythm. There should be style in there. Our flutes could be stronger. I want a little more volume." The band started, and after a few bars they were stopped again. This time Rudy hollered: "You do that like amateurs; you don't do it well. Why don't you trumpet-players go up to Harlem sometime and hear how they play trumpet?" The band started again, and this time it seemed to please. After the number, Vallee pleaded: "Why didn't you play it like that in the first place? Why do I have to get on my knees and argue with you fellows?" Rudy excites himself aplenty during rehearsal, but when the music comes out of your loudspeaker it's almost perfect, which is probably one of the reasons why Mr. Vallee is going into the tenth year for the same sponsor.

Alice Frost, the "Big Sister" star, helped Producer Jack Johnstone of the "Johnny Presents" program register a radio first. As Jack's dramatization started,

a woman's voice yelled, "But I want to ask a question, Dr. Carrington," and a woman dashed up from the audience to the microphone. The audience sat spellbound, thinking it was someone that had gone wacky all of a sudden, but it was only Alice Frost giving the audience a thrill and working out a new technic on the microphone so that she really sounded like she was coming up from the audience—which was what she was doing.

At a Hal Kemp program: Kemp's music is so rhythmically danceable that it even has members of the program cast, who've heard it all during rehearsal, indulging in a little swing of their own. Producer Ed Cashman bobs up and down in time to the music; Announcer David Ross taps out the rhythm with his foot; and songstress Judy Starr does a little peckin' at the microphone, and then trucks her way off the stage . . . Overheard at the broadcast: "That Bob Allen is the best-looking band singer on the air!" . . . That catchy little melody that Hal Kemp's orchestra plays when David Ross reads the commercial is called "A Little Boy, A Little Girl, A Little Moon." It was the first recording the orchestra ever made, twelve years ago, and Hal plays it for purely sentimental reasons.

Vicki Vola, a radio actress from San Francisco, arrived in New York recently to seek work. She went over to CBS, and while in the office of the program director an order came through to hire a girl who could do a Scotch dialect. Miss Vola assured the P. D. that she could do it. He listened and she was hired on the spot—only two days after arriving in the big city, which I can assure you is quite unusual in this business.

Ethel Shutta was singing at the Chez Paree in Chicago, where Abe Lyman and his band furnish the music. One night last week, while Miss Shutta was on the floor doing her number, one of the ring-siders who obviously had had a little too much giggle-water, started to throw cubes of ice on the floor. Lyman, who is over six feet tall, left the bandstand and walked over to the pest, grabbed him by the collar and marched him out of the place. My informant tells me the ork pilot taught this fellow a lesson he won't forget for some time.

Several weeks ago I told you that Bess "Hilltop House" Johnson's little daughter, Jop, broke her ankle while at camp. Miss Johnson went up to the camp to bring the child home. On the way back their car collided with another one and now Bess is hobbling around on crutches. But that isn't the end of the story. The other day a fellow actor accidentally stepped on her injured foot while "Hilltop House" was on the air. It pained badly enough for almost anyone to scream—but not Miss Johnson. There was a slight pause—and she went on with her next line, giving no sign of the agony she suffered.

Myrt and Marge are doubling between the radio studios and the theater. After playing to packed houses in "Yes, My Darling Daughter" at a summer playhouse a few weeks ago, Myrtle Vail and Donna Damerel have resumed their stage roles as mother and daughter and are playing in Brooklyn, N. Y. These stage appearances in no way interfere with their broadcasts.

Fred Waring told me the stork is preparing to make another visit at his house . . . Billy House, comic of the new Wrigley show, has dropped twenty-five pounds since he started his radio series. He weighs "only" 275 now . . . During the World's Fair, Rudy Vallee's program will originate from the sponsor's building on the Fair grounds . . . The Hoosier Hot Shots are seeking an injunction restraining another group from calling themselves "Hot Shots" . . . Marie Nelson is hobbling around on crutches because of a sprained ankle . . . Members of the Hal Kemp orchestra must pay a fine if they're ever late in getting to the bandstand between dance groups . . . Two music-publishing houses are scrapping over the rights to the use of the title "Why Doesn't Somebody Tell Me These Things," which was made famous by Fred Allen.

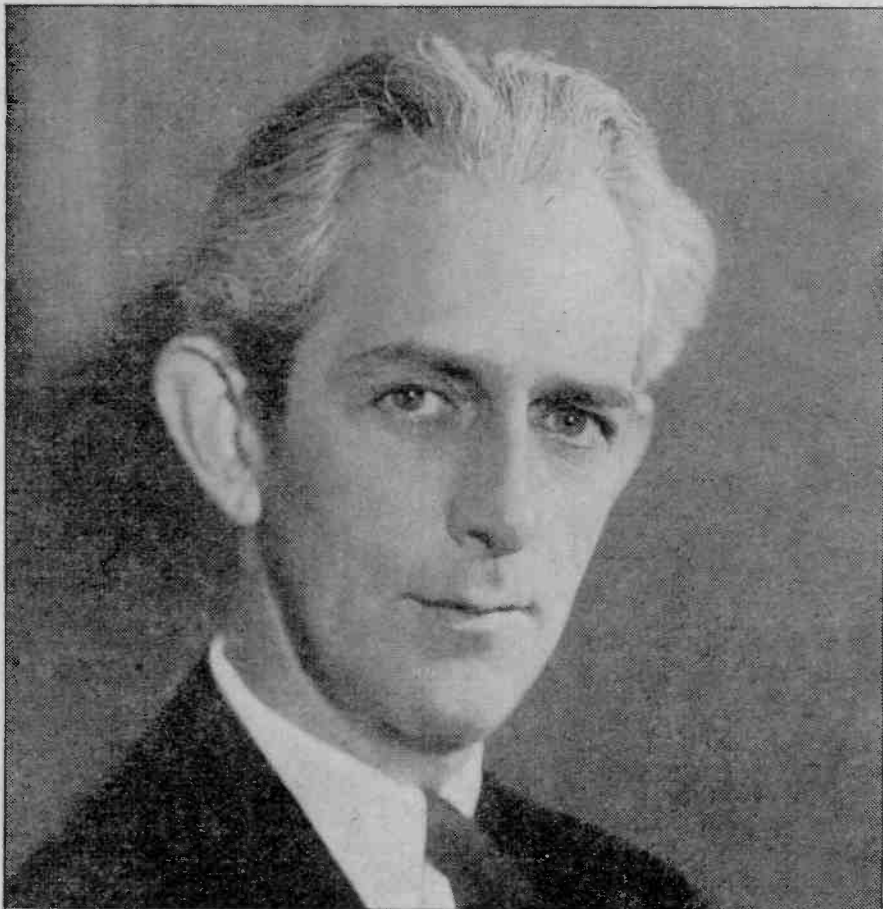
THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK—"YOUR FAMILY AND MINE"

THE story of "Your Family and Mine" is just what the title sets forth: the life, loves, problems—big and small—of every small-town American family from Maine to California. Into it is woven the snobbishness of those who live on the "right" side of the railroad tracks, and the heart-break of those who live on the "wrong" side, plus those who find themselves half-way between because they have been caught in the whirlpool of depression. The Wilburs of "Your Family and Mine" belong in the last-named class. There is Matthew Wilbur, his wife Winifred, and their two children, pretty teen-aged Judy, and Ken, the sturdy twelve-year-old son.

Matthew is an idealist and a putterer who is forever inventing little gadgets, a man who sees the world through the rose-colored glasses of the dreamer. Because she has to be in order to keep the family together, Win, his wife, is a realist. Judy is at the age when she is attracted to and by numerous boys. A sensitive girl, her family's obscure social standing and her attitude toward it keep her in a constant emotional turmoil. Colt-aged Ken is practical like his mother. He is self-reliant and she depends on him. The Wilbur family's fight for an existence makes the story, broadcast five days a week, Monday through Friday, from 5:30 to 5:45 p.m. EDT over NBC

MATTHEW WILBUR, played by Bill Adams, is an unsuccessful inventor who always dreams of making a fortune on one of his many gadgets, but never does. He loses job after job, and if his wife Win didn't make a living for the family by making and selling homemade cakes, the family would be without means many times. Matt owns his own home, a modest dwelling in the shabby section of High Falls, Indiana, bought when he and Win were married and he was an accountant able to afford the purchase. About 50, Matt is a small-town man by birth and nature. Right now he has a job with Lem Stacey, a High Falls storekeeper who runs a branch shop in near-by West Hills. Judy has talked Lem into giving her dad a chance as manager. Matt takes a bus to work each morning

WINIFRED ("Win") WILBUR was born in a small midwestern town, but is a descendant of the eastern Masons, a family of means. Matt was the only man in her life, whom she married when she was 19 and he was 29. She is now 39. A strong character but not a dominating one, Win is tender, honest, sincere. Her big desire is to serve rather than to manage, yet what little management exists in the Wilbur family is due to her. She's a home body who spends her time making cakes, which she sells from seventy-five cents to two dollars, depending on the size and kind. If necessary, she can turn out four or five cakes daily, which helps to keep the family in ready cash for every-day needs. When Matt works, he tries to make Win stop baking. FRANCESCA LENZI plays the part of Matt Wilbur's 27-year-old married sister, Laura Putnam. A vivacious flirt, Laura fascinates men, has many admirers. A schemer at heart, she is nevertheless fond of 6-year-old daughter Barbara, and devoted to attractive niece, Judy



DONALD PUTNAM (Maurice Wells), Laura's husband, has inherited some money from his folks, but is only moderately well off. Seemingly weak, Don is a fine man, devoted to his wife and baby. Laura is not in love with Don, married him only for spite when another man jilted her



BARBARA PUTNAM is a pest and a darling combined, who insists on going to sleep with the lights on. She has a childish adoration for her cousin Ken, in whose home she and her mother are now living because her parents can't get along together. Joy Terry plays the part of Barbara



LEM STACEY, played by Parker Fennelly, is now Matt's employer. A bachelor in his fifties, Parker's shrewd, honest, but stingy, hides behind a slight deafness. Quite wealthy, he becomes aware of his own lonely life after he meets the Wilburs. Admires Judy, Ken's pride



"THE BOSS" of High Falls is Silas Drake, played by Arthur Maitland. He's ruthless, rich. President of the Drake Water Company, his scheme to make more money has put the Wilbur home in danger. A widower of sixty, Silas meets Laura Putnam, becomes infatuated with her



ARCH HADLEY is the banker's son and Judy's ideal. Now twenty-one, he hasn't much character, is a smoothie. He desires Judy, although his mother has just announced his engagement to Nancy Hicks, a wealthy girl, and he has accepted his mother's wish. Carl Frank plays part of Arch



DICK BURGESS (Peter Donald, Jr.) has always loved Judy Wilbur, but she can't see him. He is poor, has worked his way through college and is trying hard to save enough for law school

SKETCHES for "Your Family and Mine" are written by Lilian Lauferty, who has gravitated from newspaper work to radio, is also the author of "Big Sister," another leading air serial. Originally a protegee of the late Arthur Brisbane, Miss Lauferty was for many years "Beatrice Fairfax"; in fact, her radio debut was in that role. In between times she wrote novels, articles, short stories for leading national magazines. "Your Family and Mine," launched last June over NBC, is something of a pet brain-child of hers, because the problems in it are memories of her own childhood, her experiences as "Beatrice Fairfax," as well as dream hopes of her own dream family. In private life, Miss Lauferty is the wife of James Wolfe, the Metropolitan Opera basso. She has no children of her own, always says that "Your Family and Mine" is really her family, her heart-interest

UNUSUAL is the nature of the Handel quartet sonata, with a violin in place of a viola and the piano giving way to the harpsichord. That ancient instrument will have an informed and practised performer. His solos by Scarlatti are the shortest sonatas in the world!

Alfred Pochon's "Hebrew Fantasia" shows warm coloring and skilful writing, the latter not surprising, for Mr. Pochon was a long-time member (violin) of the famous Flonzaley Quartet, now disbanded.

Some highly placed personages are remembered in history only because of their association with famous composers. So it is with the music-loving Prince Rasumoffsky, to whom Beethoven dedicated several works, including the three quartets, opus 59. The one in E minor has special nicety of form and epigrammatic terseness.

In the scherzo you may be able to detect a theme (Russian in origin) somewhat like the merry old tune of "We Won't Go Home Till Morning."

Disguised Ethics

WOLVES in sheep's clothing are those jazz and swing compositions which masquerade themselves as "arrangements" or "adaptations" of works by the masters. The perpetrators evidently assume that if some great name is attached to the title-page, the music becomes semi-sanctified and reaches for the respectful consideration of the better musical circles. By the same token, performing individuals who invite the response of the man in the street frequently try to retain also higher standing by advertising some affiliations which bestow a certain prestige. We have Benny Goodman reminding us that he started as a concert clarinetist, Whiteman and Grofe exploiting their early careers as players in symphony orchestras, Kostelanetz priding himself on his former activities as a recital pianist and accompanist; and even the Metropolitan Opera stars insisting on having that connection flamingly announced when they have the poor taste to sing mediocre ballads and popular songs of the moment. I remember, too, the late Victor Herbert, whenever I praised his current successful operetta, would quickly switch the conversation to his past achievements as a solo cellist and symphonic composer, to say nothing of his conducting the Pittsburgh and New York Philharmonic Orchestras.

There is a distinct cleavage between entertainment music and art music, and only in rare cases do the two meet. The apologists cut a sorry figure. They should be frank enough to admit to themselves and to us that when they enter the former field they are frankly urged not by inner conviction but by the desire for financial profit. Luckily, in that event, the great composers are not demeaned; and luckily, too, the Broadway composers are not ennobled.

Bouquets Afield

As a member of the editorial staff, I feel pride also in the general response being won by our journal. Last week I motored through part of the Adirondacks for the end of my vacation, and stopped at Lake Placid, N. Y., to buy a current copy of RADIO GUIDE. "None left," said the leading newsdealer; "sell 'em out as soon as they come in." Going on to Elizabethtown, a tiny village high up in the mountains, I made the same request at a general store where I saw a bundle of RADIO GUIDES on the counter. "I couldn't let you have one of these," said the owner, "for they're all ordered in advance by regular customers. I use even more in the winter. That's the time RADIO GUIDE is our Bible around here." For me, the rest of the trip to Lake Champlain was like riding on air.

One sometimes wonders what those two giants might have achieved had they possessed the advantages of our modern orchestra, our improved instruments, and twentieth-century freedom of expression. On the other hand, did not the genius of the two classicists lay the foundation for progressive development? Pretty questions to ponder.

Today's soloist in Franck's amiable "Variations" is young Elsa Anneck, of Duluth.

ORMANDY proves that it is possible to devise an enlivening concert of general appeal without the sacrifice of dignity and class. No listener needs an analytical compass and chart to understand the orchestral part of this program, and its solo and choral features also require no guiding buoys and lighthouses.

Miss Swarthout sings one of the loveliest of all contralto arias, "Che Faro Senza Euridice" (I Have Lost My Euridice) from Gluck's opera. The immortal number expresses Orfeo's noble lament over the death of Euridice (the legend is from Virgil's "Georgics"), and so touching is the plaint that Amer restores the lady to life. In its sublime grief, passion and despair, the aria is a fitting forerunner to Wagner's "Liebestod" in "Tristan and Isolde."

I feel certain that you will like, too, the refined simplicity of John Dowland (1563-1626) and the engaging and tuneful little song by Randall Thompson, living American composer.

FRANK BLACK'S translations of noted piano works into orchestral versions are beginning to assume an impressive total, in spite of those old fogies who continue to whine that hallowed music should always be left in its original estate. "If Beethoven had intended his keyboard sonatas for orchestra," they say, "he would have written them that way." The argument is a poor one, as the piano pages are always available for those who prefer to enjoy them in that form. Skilful orchestral treatment serves but to add color and tonal contrasts to the compositions, and to intensify their dramatic moments. The Black treatment, never impious or unstylistic, is well set forth in the sonata scheduled.

In previous issues I have discussed the solid musical qualities of Frank Bridge, based on formal methods; and the advanced harmonic practises and subtle orchestral adeptness of Leo Weiner. Neither the English nor the Hungarian composer is what one could call a genius in melodic invention.

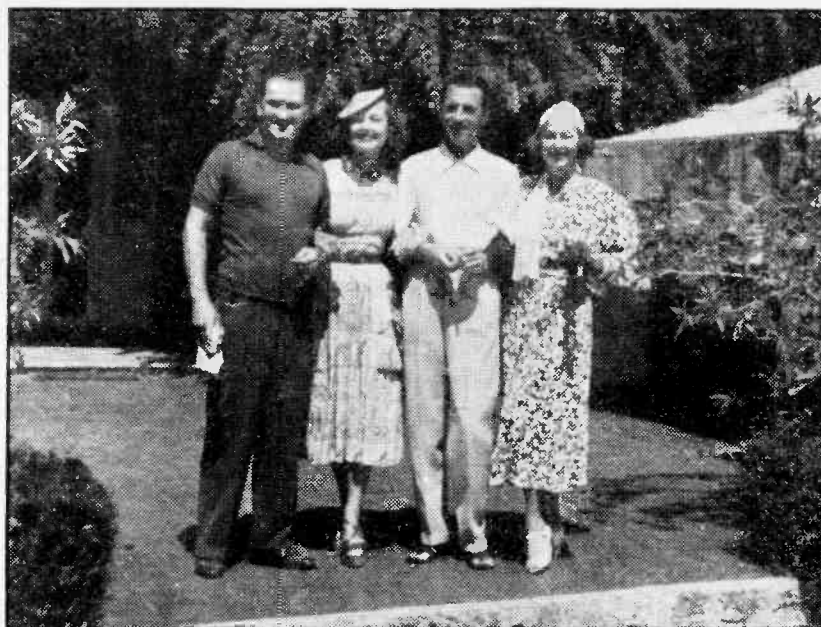

Ernest Toch may jar you with the clipped themes and vinegary harmonies in his recently finished quintet, but he commands respect for his sincerity and smooth craftsmanship.

American Spirit Voiced In Jerome Moross' Music

Sunday, September 18, at 3 p.m. EDT, on CBS.

"HEAR America singing, the varied carols I hear," wrote the good, gray nineteenth-century poet, Walt Whitman. He used the phrases figuratively, referring chiefly to our national expression in energy, but I like to think that he also divined how eloquently we were destined to voice ourselves in art.

In music, the present century sees a small army of American tonal performers and an imposing number of orchestral composers who are conceiving and writing works more and more nationalistic in character, idiom and subject-matter. A native music is vitally in the making, different from the styles of the past, and if it does not equal the old masterpieces, at least it is fully as good as the examples produced nowadays in Europe.

Of recent weeks we have been listening to the output of typical American compositions on the programs of Everybody's Music, and they give instructive clues to the direction in which our creators are heading. Individual hearers may like or not like this or that score, but all must agree that the composers show definite purposes and a surprisingly high average of skill in the technic of instrumentation.

This Sunday brings "Tall Story,"

music from the pen of twenty-five-year-old Jerome Moross, born in New York and now active in Hollywood. Moross is known to us watchers in the critical tower as the fashioner of impressive ballets, orchestral works, and interesting pieces for one and two pianos.

Instead of my guess as to what Moross' "Tall Story" might tell, readers of this department have the advantage of learning what the composer himself says about his pages. I elicited this expression of his intentions: "I am not trying to tonalize any particular tale or happening, but I hope that radio listeners will get from my effort a feeling of western America, and of the love I have for this country as a whole. These days, when people are always asking you whether you are Right or Left, I suppose it is terribly reprehensible to be merely Nationalist—perhaps almost as bad as to be Fascist. Well, consider me guilty then, of being Nationalist, for I feel completely enthralled with America and Americans. I know that many of my composing colleagues share with me in that feeling; but even if they did not, I still would look upon it as my mission to undertake, if necessary, a one-man campaign to interpret and express typical Americanism in art."

Fine Bach Cantata Series Offers Noble Master Music

SOMETHING quite new for radio and a rare treat for followers of classical compositions will come to the air over WOR and the Mutual network on Sunday (September 18) from 8 to 8:30 p.m. EDT, when Alfred Wallenstein launches his weekly Bach Cantata Series, with orchestra, chorus and soloists.

These cantatas, composed about 200 years ago by Johann Sebastian Bach (then organist and choirmaster in Leipzig), were designed by him for use in church service for each week in the year. Since then they have been heard regularly on alternate Sundays in that city, at the Thomaskirche and Nikolai-kirche.

Under the direction of the indefatigable Alfred Wallenstein, the seldom-heard cantatas represent a com-

pletely novel course, for never during the two centuries since their creation have they been performed as a complete series except in Leipzig churches. All the cantatas have titles or texts that indicate eloquently what Bach sought to record as an intensely personal expression of his religious reactions and aspirations. The more widely great music spreads, the more firmly is Bach established as the model and master of all composers.

Wallenstein now offers a priceless chance for many radio listeners to become new subjects of the acknowledged king of music. The first cantata in the series is No. 78, "Jesu, der Meine Seele." Genevieve Rowe, soprano, Mary Hopple, contralto, William Hain, tenor, and Raoul Nadeau, baritone, are the soloists.

coreopsis, rubeola, phlox, wistaria." De Kruif didn't know that rubeola is another name for measles. Stuart Chase, who is popularly supposed to know everything there is about economics, flubbed the simple question, "What are 'multiple shops'?" No one had ever told the erudite Mr. Chase that the phrase "multiple shops" is the British counterpart of our "chain stores." Another expert couldn't see any reason why the English should call cheese-cloth "butter-muslin."

BUT the experts don't always miss. They know most of the answers. You can't fool John Kieran, for instance, by asking him to define the words dodo, zobo, koto, Yo-Yo, popo, bolo, Locofoco, and John Gunther knew that the name of the Shah of Persia is Riza Pahlevi. "Are you shah?" Master of Ceremonies Fadiman punned. "Sultanly," was the quick retort. Extemporaneous remarks like that qualify "Information, Please" as the wittiest unrehearsed program on the air.

A bespectacled, soft-spoken gentleman named Dan Golenpaul is the creator of "Information, Please." A nine-year-old boy gave him the original idea, although it was destined to be much changed before the first broadcast. This

little boy had been able to obtain a certain telephone number from the information service, despite the fact that he could offer the operator almost no clues. Golenpaul was impressed. These telephone people, he thought, are pretty good. So are the telegraph companies. And what about the information clerks at the big railroad stations? They can answer almost anything. Why not put them on the air, with questions from the studio audience?

It seemed a good idea at first, but somehow, it "just wouldn't fit." Mulling it over in his mind one night, Golenpaul happened to tune in one of the "quiz" programs. He noticed that he resented the fact that the participants from the studio audience, the ordinary men and women up there answering questions, always took a beating from the quizmaster.

"Like vaudeville," Dan Golenpaul mused, "radio has a tendency to make the audience the 'fall guy.' Why not just turn that around. Why not have a quiz program in reverse?"

The more he thought about it, the better he liked the idea. It was hot. It clicked. It was a hit!

AT FIRST Golenpaul wanted someone who'd undertake to answer any and all questions tossed up from the studio audience. He started looking up pro-

fessional know-it-alls, men and women who make their living as "mental wizards" and "memory experts." Every one of them said, "Sure, I can answer any question, any question at all. Go ahead, name six." But every one of them, too, fell just short of requirements in some other way. Golenpaul put all the big-brained wizards back where he'd found them, and started on a new tack.

HE ASKED advice from Philip Carlin, NBC executive, and Professor Lyman Bryson, of Columbia University, a radio counsellor. Bryson said he didn't think anyone would go before an audience to answer any and all questions. There would surely be impossible and unfair queries asked. So it was decided to have an editorial board select questions, those questions to be put to a board of experts.

All that was left now was to choose the personalities to head the show. Golenpaul was riding along on one of New York's Fifth Avenue busses one day, mentally sorting over a baker's-dozen people, when he bumped into Franklin P. Adams. He had thought of FPA at the beginning, and now he asked him what he thought of the idea.

"Go on the air?" Adams said. "I'd like nothing better. Matter of fact, I've been thinking lately I'd like to do

something in radio. Maybe this is my chance. I'm with you."

John Kieran of the *New York Times* was next to be recruited, and then Clifton Fadiman, chosen because of his wit and his wide experience in the literary field. The program was whipped into shape, rehearsed, auditioned on April 20, 1938, and unanimously passed by the NBC Board of Control. It was the first time in NBC's history, incidentally, that the Board of Control had approved a program without a single dissenting vote!

That's the story. That's how "Information, Please" came to the air, with its brilliant answers to obscure questions, its spontaneous wit and satire. And, some listeners would say, its puns. Puns are frequent on "Information, Please," although the experts have been warned that they'll be punished if they pun—too much. To date, FPA's Shakespearean effort, "Tuba or not tuba" is tops.

STILL, the experts must be allowed a little fun. They work hard. FPA paid off for his sins on the May 31 broadcast when he correctly distinguished between the words mazuma, Mazola, Montezuma, zeugma and sigma. "Zeugma" was the stickler in that one. It's Latin for "yoke." Bernard Jaffe, well-

Paul Wing's Spelling-Bee Begins New Series

The spelling-bee was not first introduced via radio. For many years before radio was even so much as a remote dream it was firmly established in the little red schoolhouse and wherever educated people gathered for recreation and relaxation. In January, 1937, Paul Wing tested it as a national network feature, and received such great response from listeners that it soon ranked near the top as a regular NBC program.

Paul Wing, who is spelling-master of the bees, is also a director of NBC's production staff and a former newspaperman. His book, "Take It Away, Sam," was recently published, and he also has authored children's tales, which he began writing for the amusement of his three children.

From his experience with the broadcast spelling-bee, through which he has tested the spelling and pronouncing erudition of scholars on two continents and people from all walks of life, Mr. Wing has formed some opinions that are very interesting. His own words follow: "Good spellers are born, not made. The best spellers I have come in contact with have been those who syllabized each word. The persons who spell words at random, that is, without grouping them in syllables, are much more apt to make mistakes. A good speller is picture-minded. By that I mean he visualizes the word before him as if it were spelled out on an imaginary blackboard."

So says Paul Wing. Whether this be fact or not, it is certain that every time he throws out the challenge to his studio contestants he will be answered in several thousand homes throughout the country. C-A-T spells "cat" and we all get a big kick out of doing it right.

Paul Wing's Spelling-Bee, a new series now in its second week, is heard Sunday afternoons over NBC stations.

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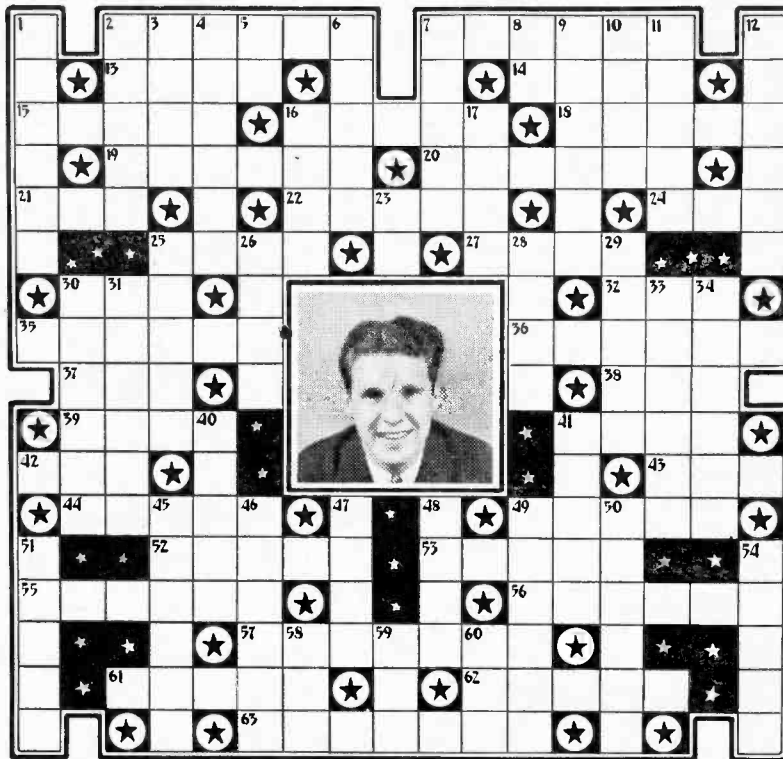

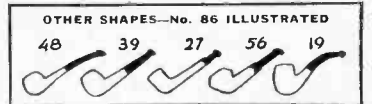

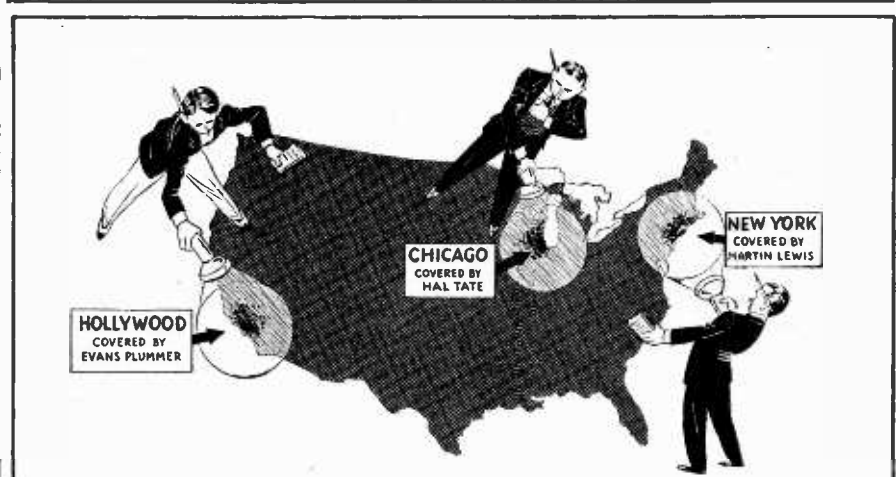

SIRELA, the Spatari Radio Language, created specifically for international broadcasting purposes, and now being used experimentally by a number of short-wave stations, is based simply on the names of the notes of the musical scale, namely, DO, RE, MI, FA, SO, LA, TI, DO. Years ago it occurred to Professor Carlo Spatari that since the notes of the musical scale are pronounced the same in all languages it might be possible to devise from the combination of these notes a means for international communication.

Though, admittedly, there is ample need for a language which can be understood internationally, all efforts in the past to achieve that goal have been doomed to failure simply because people will not take the trouble to learn a new language involving the study of grammar, pronunciation and the memorizing of thousands of words. Spatari is not learned, nor memorized. It is a spoken code language, which conveys ideas clearly. The words formed by the combination of syllables are easily pronounced and universally understood. Anyone with normal intelligence can, without elaborate study, receive and transmit messages covering the entire range of daily activities.

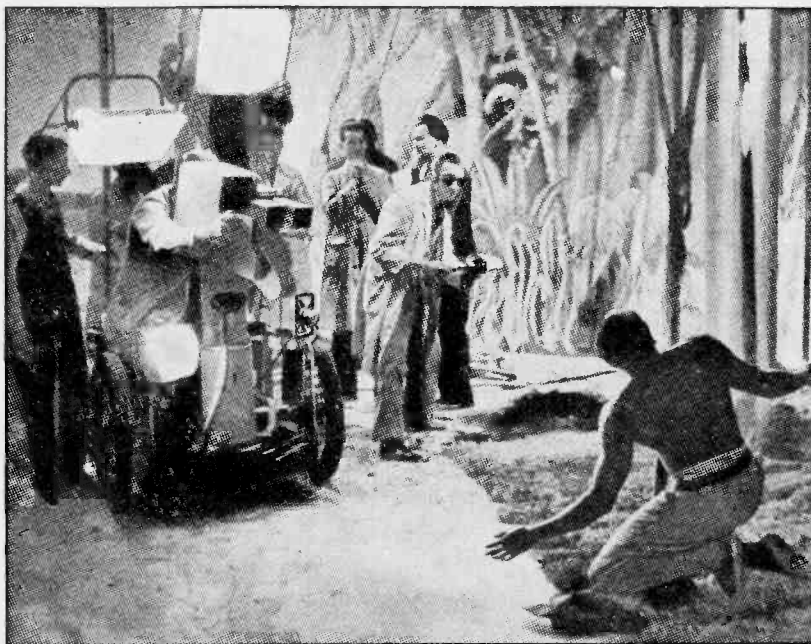
Professor Carlo Spatari of 2720 25th Avenue, Astoria, N. Y., a modest Italian-born music teacher who has devoted his entire life to the creation of this new radio language, will be glad to answer any questions concerning, or forward further information about "Sirela" to anyone writing him.

HJ7ABD (9.63), "Radio Bucaramanga" of Bucaramanga, Colombia, has inaugurated an English program sponsored by the Mild Coffee Industry, called the "Bucaramanga Mild Coffee Hour," which is heard daily from 11:30 p.m. to 12 midnight EDT. The program starts with the news in English, followed by exchange items and a talk about Colombia. At times letters from listeners are read. The

On Tuesday, September 20, at 7:30 p.m. EDT, the Honorable Andres Pastoriza, Minister Plenipotentiary of the Dominican Republic in Washington, will discuss the important topic "The Creation of a League or Association of American Nations" over W3XAL (17.78). On the same evening at 10:15 p.m. EDT, the opera "Der Rosenkavalier," by Richard Strauss, from the Festival program in Salzburg, Germany, will be heard by North American short-wave listeners over DJB (15.2), DJL (11.77) and DJP (11.855). The story of Big Ben, that famous clock on the tower of the Houses of Parliament in London, whose chimes are familiar to millions of radio listeners in all parts of the world, will be told over Daventry Stations GSG and GSP on Sunday, September 18, at 8:20 p.m. EDT. The bell of Big Ben, which weighs thirteen and a half tons, was hoisted to its eyrie, some 200 feet above the ground in October, 1858. On November 11, 1927, the bell was first heard by overseas listeners through the medium of G5SW, the original short-wave broadcaster of the BBC. The parent clock, the largest and most powerful striking clock in the world, is not automatically controlled from Greenwich Observatory, as many listeners think, yet official records prove that it varies hardly more than a second either way throughout the year. The materials used in the clock's construction were of such excellence that, when the mechanism was overhauled some four years ago, no replacements were needed although every part is original, just as it was made more than eighty-four years ago.

The WCAU Broadcasting Company of Newton Square, Pa., has been granted a modification of license for Short-Wave Station W3XAU to add the frequency of 15.27 megs in addition to those already authorized.
