## Baloney

In the recent news from Washington was the story that the American Telephone Company had invented and used for several years radio tubes which would last a lifetime. The inference was that our present radio manufacturers were a bunch of heels for forcing listeners to replace their own tubes every two years. Some busybodies with long noses and axes to grind asked us to believe that the manufacturers were monopolists engaged in bleeding the public.

## Jumper-Upper

We visited in a friend's home and, as the radio was on, started to tune to a

favorite program. "Don't get that one," she begged. "It's a jumper-upper."

"What's a jumper-upper?" we inquired.

"It's a program in which the speeches can barely be heard when the music is right. When you tune the program up to hear the speeches, you have to jump up and turn the volume down when the music comes on."

We listened, and the lady was right. It made us wonder how many other listeners have formed the habit of avoid-

ing those programs that are jumper-uppers. The fault lies with the engineer, of course. He can turn a dial and save our ears or our distress, but does he? As often or not, he seems to tune it the wrong way. It seems too many times that he wants to impress the listeners with the enthusiasm of the audience's applause or with the importance of the announcer's message.

Jumper-uppers, we agree with the lady, are not good for listeners and therefore not good for radio.

## Patron Wanted

Is there a millionaire in the house?

The question is perfectly serious, for if there is we seek his attention for a project which, though a bit unusual, can benefit both broadcasting and that portion of the human race which listens.

Recently we pointed out the plight of the poor radio-writer. This week we return to him, for we still believe that the measure of our entertainment is only as great as the intellects employed in perfecting that entertainment.

Now, to our brain-storm. Centuries back, the rich and royal men of Europe selected promising painters, goldsmiths or musicians and endowed their work, giving them freedom from the worry of earning a living and affording them opportunity for the expansion of their talent. To some extent, the same practice is followed today; there are foundations and fellowships and scholarships supported by the wealthy, and certain artists or architects are benefiting thereby.

So now, why should not writing for radio provide a worthy field for endowment by some modern man of wealth? Today's writing for radio is exclusively commercial except for occasional flyers taken in the medium by men who have already made their mark in other fields. Today's style of radio writing is going nowhere because it makes no pretense of being anything more than makeshift adaptations.

But the magic of words is as fresh and as amazing today as ever. If only radio's relentless hunger for "material" would give one time for thought, experiment and "impractical" excursions.

So, if there is a millionaire in the house, won't he please come forward and agree to underwrite one of the half-dozen young writers who already know the medium of radio, who are aching to do finer things, and by whom we must ultimately measure the greatness of this thing called the American system of broadcasting.

## Proceed With Care

We stand behind no man in advocacy of education in radio, but we do wonder if the cause of education or radio is being well served by some of the stations which are stampeding to the cause.

We heard a dramatization the other day, presented by a big station, which would have been jeered off the stage of our own childhood Pin-and-Penny Theater.

Education in radio can benefit both education and radio, but it must be presented with the same care and showmanship that are used in presenting any other first-class program. Anything less than first-class has no business on the air, even though it bears the tag "educational."

education in political problems is of outstanding importance we have radio to help develop it. Democracy is being challenged all over the world. The challenge is real. When one sees the efficiency of the dictatorships, he senses the fact that they cannot be defeated by mere negation. We must learn how to develop and emphasize the positive side of our democratic institutions. We don't really know, many of us, why we believe in democracy. What a chance there is to use this magic instrument, the radio, to develop greater knowledge of democracy! Democracy is the world's only hope, the only chance for human individuality to survive. Yet the world tends more and more to become mechanized, organized, collectivized under the leadership of individuals who have lost all moral perspective. Let us, with the help of radio, educate our people to a greater knowledge of democracy and a greater belief in it. Radio stands ready and able to serve as one of mankind's greatest aids to the progress of civilization. Let it continue and increase its mission of convincing Americans that the American way of life and conduct and government is the best way and the only way of growth. Let it continue to stand as a symbol of individual freedom and of loyalty to truth. That is the service which I hope this instrument will perform in increasing measure as the years roll on.

I believe radio will fulfill that mission.

**R**ADIO is a blessing which we do not deny or begrudge to those in need, to the invalid, to the family with few opportunities for enlightenment or entertainment. It has become a boon to mankind which makes all that has gone into it well worth while. But we are beginning to realize that its values must be appraised wisely. We can afford to rely on its mechanical efficiency, but we must also see that such an invention finds its best purposes and uses. It is by no means automatically beneficial. Once we have familiarized ourselves with all its possibilities, for good and evil, we will be better equipped to

find its true value, to find in it the means to worthier ends, to ensure the great hopes and promises mankind has set for it.

Radio has, for the first time, made all our people government-conscious. Every important figure in the Government speaks to us over the air. We get a closer knowledge of their personalities. We have an immediate, direct, personal, emotional contact with every outstanding individual in public service. Having heard him, we have much more interest in what he says and in what he does.

# THE SAINT IS A SINNER

CONCLUDING THE STORY OF LADY LUCK'S FAVORITE

The story of Don Ameche's rise from bit radio parts to the top of the heap does not follow the trite formula of overnight transformation. In fact, it was a long, hard grind from his \$60-a-week Chicago radio program to stardom in radio and movies. But with the aid of his lovely Lady Luck and, of course, hard work he made the grade

Winner of practically all popularity polls as radio actor and master of ceremonies, Don Ameche herewith becomes our favorite subject of a *James Street* biography. We take unusual pleasure in presenting this portrait of a young man on his way to the top.

**T**HE embroidered Hollywood saga of Signor Dominick Felix Ameche is the same old hackneyed fairy-tale that a talent scout spotted him from afar and that a twentieth-century genius grabbed a telephone, called Don, and Don grabbed his hat and shinnied up the ladder to fame. It's a nice story with only one weakness. It ain't so!

He was plugging along in Chicago with "Empire Builders," a good radio show, and pulling down his \$60 a

week. He wanted to sing, but his sponsors didn't want him to. They had heard him.

But he'd sing at the drop of a cocktail, and he had many opportunities. For back in 1931, when Don was first building his fame on the air, he took his fun pretty much where he found it, and he often found it in speakeasies. He didn't make much money, and he scattered all he did make at race-tracks, dice-tables and bars.

There was a "speak" near the Chicago NBC studio. The boys called it "The Gym," and often would drop by for a little workout. Mr. Ameche was among the better athletes. He was in "The Gym" one day taking a little workout, a slight bit of elbow bending, when he suddenly got the moodies.

The old melancholia got him. It often happens to men who take too many workouts in "the gyms."

"If I could just get in the movies," Don said, and began feeling rather sorry for himself.

The more he thought about it, the more determined he was, so he paid his own way to California, was tested by M-G-M and was turned down. He returned to Chicago and radio and began taking singing-lessons.

He'd never miss an opportunity to sing. One day he was in "The Gym" and suddenly broke out with an Italian song. The Irish bartender asked if he knew "When Irish Eyes Are Smilin'."

Don rattled the rafters and the bar-keep wept. He decided Don was the greatest man in the world. He bought

the drinks and put his arm around Ameche and said, "Sing it again and I'll give you my race-horse."

Ameche did it all over again, and he John Brown if that Irishman didn't produce papers that proved he *did* own a horse. He tried to give the nag to Don, but Ameche was sober enough to say no. But he vowed then that if he ever got rich he'd own a stable. Now he owns one.

On the "Empire Builders" program, Signor Ameche often amazed the cast with his versatility. In one episode he was required to tussle with a villain, and when the going got tough, a gun was to explode and Don was to say, "Drop that gun or I'll shoot you." The tussle was okay, but the sound-man's pistol wasn't, and it snapped instead of

exploding. Old Minute-Man Ameche switched his lines and roared, "Drop that gun or I'll stab you." Just then the gun got back in working order and went off. Don had a hard time explaining that one to his fans.

Also, during the "Empire Builders" show he had to use dialects of many nationalities. It gave him invaluable training.

In 1931, "Empire Builders" collapsed and Signor Ameche was back on his uppers. He had a hit on a program called "Rin Tin Tin Thrillers" and it earned him \$15 a week. He picked up a little change here and there in bits and boarded with the Boh White family to cut expenses. Many times when the Boh Whites wanted to go out for an evening, Don would stay home and mind the baby.

In 1932, when things looked blackest, he married Honore Prendergast, his first sweetheart, and right away his patroness, Old Lady Luck, took him in tow again. He was cast in "First Nighter," a very successful radio show. Next he became Boh in "Betty and Boh," and in 1934 he got an opportunity to be master of ceremonies in "Romantic Melodies" and he clicked. His sponsors let him sing, and Lady Luck and the fans did the rest.

Meanwhile, "Grand Hotel" was opened, and Ameche got the lead. Tom Oakey, a pal of Ameche, told Don he should be thinking of Hollywood, and Don said, "Yeah. They got my seat."

Out on the Coast, Oakey looked at M-G-M's test and liked a part of it. 20th Century-Fox was interested, and Don flew to New York and made another test. It was pretty good and was being run through the regular Hollywood mill, which, incidentally, goes round and round.

Old Lady Luck got tired of waiting for the movie tycoons to take an interest in her boy, so she took a hand. Two 20th Century-Fox moguls were watching a test of a girl who was on the same reel with Ameche.

Don and Honore were at her home in Dubuque. Donnie Ameche, now five and a half, was expecting a brother or sister, or something. It was Christmas of 1935.

After seeing the test, the movie men ament for Ameche's agent

"Get him," they said. "He's having a baby," the agent explained, "but I'll get him."

He wouldn't leave Honore, however, until Ronnie was born on December 30. Then Honore made him go. In Hollywood he signed to play in "Sins of Men" at \$3,000 weekly. His radio sponsor agreed to move "Grand Hotel" to Hollywood.

Don telephoned Honore and yelled, "Come on out, everything's happening at once!"

"I'd just come home from the dentist," Honore recalled. "I'd had a tooth pulled at 1:15. Then Don phoned, and at 2 p.m. I was on route to Chicago to get a check-up from my doctor. My baby was only a few weeks old. The doctor said I was okay, and two days later I left for Hollywood."

She attended the preview of "Sins of Men" with Don, but wouldn't sit with him. She was afraid he might ask her something about the show and she didn't want to add to his nervous strain.

After the preview, she was with Don when a fellow walked up to him and congratulated him.

"Who is that guy?" Don asked his agent.

"That's your boss, Darryl Zanuck."

We are glad Mr. Zanuck liked "Sins of Men." Most of the populace thought it was a sin against men. As a matter of fact, Ameche's tremendous radio audience was disappointed in his first movies. He was miscast. In two of his first shows he was cast as a lounge singer and wore outlandish costumes. Even his friends couldn't recognize him. And he was a serious fellow. Don Ameche aerious! He knew enough book-makers, crap-shooters and bartenders to swell his fan mail, but when the boys saw his first pictures they cried in their beer and said, "That ain't Dominick!"

The word got around that Signor Dominick was about washed up in the movies. One of his shows never was even presented in America. But Old Lady Luck hadn't forgotten him. His agent kept plugging Chase and Sanborn was casting its big show. Nelson Eddy was being considered for the m.c.

job. Danny Danker of J. Walter Thompson's Hollywood office was readying the format for the production. It was April, 1937.

In spite of poor casting, Ameche's fan mail was terrific, mostly because of his radio success. His old pals hadn't forgotten, even though they didn't recognize him in "Ramona" and what-not. Fox was wondering what to do with him. His fans were too numerous and were demanding that he be given a decent role.

The clever Mr. Danker knew all of that. He saw Ameche at a race-track one afternoon and wrote him a note asking if he would be auditioned as m.c. for the Chase and Sanborn show.

So Don was auditioned. The record

was rushed to New York and the heads of the agency were intrigued by the "new star."

"But it's like marrying a girl by mail," said one of the bosses. "I want to see him."

He had missed all Don's films, or if he had seen them he hadn't recognized Ameche.

So they stoned him at \$3,000 a week. His agent took the contract and went to the bigwig of 20th Century-Fox.

"Laugh this one off," he said, and waved the contract before them.

They picked up Ameche's film contract and tied him up again!

Old Lady Luck was on a spree.

Don bought a big Packard twelve (Continued on Page 37)

## THE PROFESSOR CHOOSES DEATH

No better sample of distinguished broadcasting has ever been heard than Ronald Colman's recent remarks on "The Circle" (Sunday, NBC), which we present, lifted bodily from the adaptation printed in the correct Radio Digest. He said:

This concerns a certain teacher of philosophy abroad; some of you are probably familiar with his work. Anyway, he was rather outspoken in his criticism of the government of his country—which shall be anonymous—and he was thrown into jail on charges amounting to treason. They gave him a chance of retracting everything he had thought and co-operating from then on, or death. A reporter who was present at the trial made a transcript of the man's last words. He said:

"Gentlemen who have condemned me, I am going to prophesy to you; for I am about to die and that is the hour in which men are said to be gifted with prophetic power. I prophesy to you who are my murderers that immediately after my death punishment for heavier than you have inflicted on me will surely await you. Men you have killed because you wanted to escape public censure. But that will not be as you suppose—for otherwise, for I predict that you will have more occasions than you have now; occasions whom you will be more severe with you and you will find them harder to brook.

"If you think that by killing me you can suppress criticism of your actions, you are mistaken. The way to do that is not by crushing others but by improving yourselves. Bear this in mind, too—that so evil a crime as to come to a good man, either in life or after death, I see clearly that to die and be released from this world is best for me, and that is why it was ordained. For that reason, also, I am not angry with my accusers or my condemners; for you have done me no real harm, although neither did you let me do me any good, and for that I may justly blame you . . .

"The hour of departure has arrived, and we go our ways—I to die, and you to live. Which is better, God only knows."

Well, the old professor went his way, but his followers, as he prophesied, still speak out against intolerance and injustice and oppression. The professor was Socrates and the reporter, Plato.

**100TH INNING** Sunday, NBC

Before 1839 the great American pastime was "one of cat," and it was a sissy forerunner of the way they play politics in parts of the world today. There were 35 on a side and the idea was to knock an opponent out with the ball. In 1839 a West Point cadet, home for a vacation at Cooperstown, N. Y. got to thinking that knocking the other fellow out might be all right in war, but in play it might be more fun to just knock the ball out. So Abner Doubleday invented baseball substantially as it is played today. It certainly caught on. They say that when the Chicago Convention Committee went to Springfield to notify Abe Lincoln that he had been nominated for President, the Great Emancipator was playing baseball and informed the committee it would have to wait till he had his time at bat. to resolve to take the fix completely out of the Traffic Court; but it wasn't so easy to bring about a complete reformation at once. There were difficulties, such as getting the violators into court, awaking the public interest and activity, and convincing former "influential" customers and even his own acquaintances that the day of free-and-easy traffic violation was gone.

FOR instance, just a few weeks after Judge Gutknecht took over the bench, a defendant appeared, accompanied by a very prominent politician who was accustomed to the breaks in judicial matters. The judge shocked the politician by fining the defendant. When leaving the courtroom later, the judge passed the two, stopped and spoke to the politician:

"Well, George, you don't like this new deal in the Traffic Court, do you?"

The bigshot said, "Judge, I wasn't going to say anything, but I want to ask you one question: Is there a back door?"

"George," was the reply, "you can be sure that as long as I'm here there will be no back door."

The bigshot could take it. He put out his hand. "Judge, I'm with you. We must do something about the traffic problems if there is no back door, I'm with you. If there is, I want it. If nobody else can get a pass, I'm satisfied."

In the first year of Judge Gutknecht's tenure two hundred less lives were sacrificed on the altar of speed in Chicago, even while the country as a whole was suffering an increase in auto deaths. Now, instead of two hundred thousand cases a year with a 90-percent fix, Chicago's "Lone Ranger of the bench" can boast of cutting the number of cases in half. Moreover, he long ago offered \$100 reward to anyone who could demonstrate that a single ticket had been "fixed" in his court, and the reward is still unclaimed.

## MR. DEATH COMES A CROPPER

A CHICAGO JUDGE AND RADIO  
SET AN EXAMPLE FOR SAFETY

IN THE last fifteen years automobile accidents have killed more people in the United States than all the wars the country has fought since its birth. Last year over forty thousand were slaughtered in the traffic-pen. With the increase in automobiles, highways and population, the American traffic problem grows more and more acute. There will probably be over fifty thousand such deaths this year unless something is done to check the traffic carnage.

What can be done? There are several methods of approach, among them education, closer regulation and stricter law enforcement. Perhaps you have your own pet remedy for curing the traffic plague for your own community or for the nation.

Judge John J. Gutknecht is a man who had one for Chicago, and the nation may well consider it. The example is well worth passing along.

In 1934 Mayor Kelly's administration started a "Keep Chicago Safe" cam-

paign. In line with the movement, the mayor and the Municipal Court were feeling around for some judge to put on the traffic court "hot seat." Judge John J. Gutknecht happened to be roaming through Europe. The thirty-six other municipal judges were at home. The prodigal, therefore, was elected to the mission of belling the cat, a mission no other judge relished.

Judge Gutknecht went into the Traffic Court with his fingers crossed and his jaw sticking out aggressively over the bar of justice. He found the court, literally, in a "fix." He believed, as every honest citizen believes, that the behind-the-hand procedure of disposing of traffic cases according to "influence," along with other dishonest practices and haphazard methods, is responsible for much of the grave traffic toll of today—not only in Chicago, but throughout the whole country.

Upon investigating the situation, he found that the city was issuing over 200,000 traffic tickets a year, and he

declares that an average of 90 percent of these in years past had been fixed by "seeing the judge" or had been ignored altogether by the court. One hundred and eighty thousand tickets a year illegally handled, a mounting death-rate, and only scattered, half-hearted protests from the public—this was the situation Judge Gutknecht inherited, for better or worse.

Something had to be done and done quickly. It wasn't so hard for this gray-haired, steely-eyed, iron-jawed fellow

Other means were employed to bring about a rapid reformation. Gutknecht introduced a "cafeteria" into his court. This means that first-offenders may simply file by the cashier and pay a specified fine rather than demand a hearing and risk getting a court record as well as a fine.

Also upon Gutknecht's suggestion a branch called the Safety Court, with various other judges sitting on the bench, was instituted to relieve the overcrowded Traffic Court of the more

aerious cases, such as drunken driving, hit-and-run acts, and collision cases. Judge Gutknecht was left the cases involving speeding, parking violations, driving without license, stoplight-running, and similar minor offenses.

It didn't all happen as easily and rapidly as it sounds. There was from the outset the need for some unusual and dynamic force to strike at the root of the evil by appealing directly to the public at large.

Radio stood ready with the answer. One day in September of 1934, when the defendants lined up before the Traffic Court bench, they faced not only Judge Gutknecht, but also a live microphone.

"JOHN BROWN, state your case," said the judge.

"Well," began the middle-aged man holding the aleman's derby. "I was going south on Sheridan Road at a moderate speed, and just as I got to Bryn Mawr the stoplight turned yellow. I put on the brakes but couldn't stop on the ice. The cop stopped me and gave me a ticket."

"Discharged. Watch your step."

The public listened and thought, "He's not so tough."

Came the next case.

"Officer Moriarty, how about this case?"

"Well, your honor, the defendant was driving north on Sheridan Road, ran a stoplight at Diversey at pretty fast clip, then jammed on his brakes, just missed several other cars and tied up traffic for several minutes. I gave him a ticket."

"Had he been drinking?"

"Yea, and he offered to fix it up with me, and when I refused threatened to punch me."

Here the shifty-eyed defendant remonstrated with his own viewpoint—to no avail.

"Five-and-five. And next time remember that you can't fix it with a policeman in Chicago any more."

The public listened and thought, "Maybe he is going after those guys."

That air-court premiere in the fall of 1934 was the first regular radio broadcast of that exact nature in any big city. When the "Keep Chicago Safe" campaign got under way, two alert publicity men of station WBBM, Bob Kaufman and Hal Burnett, had sold the city authorities on the idea of broadcasting Traffic Court proceedings as an auxiliary safety measure. Judge Gutknecht accepted the proposition as the one

Sensationalism is contrary to the dignity and conservative tradition of the legal bar. Indiscriminate courtroom broadcasting might conceivably come under the head of sensationalism. It looked like a publicity stunt. The Chicago Bar Association strenuously op-

posed the idea and has continued to oppose it. To the bar Judge Gutknecht said, "Which do you prefer—dignity or integrity? You may keep your dignity I'll take integrity."

We, the people, speak with the ballot, and a loud voice voted Judge Gutknecht a green light for his ideas of justice and safety—including his broadcasting. His pioneering also won him the honor of being only recently elected president of the National Lawyers Guild, an organization overflowing with big names.

Radio, of course, was not an immediate cure-all. There were other problems. One of the biggest was that of how to handle most effectively youthful offenders. There is where radio played its biggest part.

IN CASES involving minors, Judge Gutknecht always insists on Mom or Dad also being present. He gives the parent the chance to spare the lad a court record if it is a first offense. The parent is allowed to name some fit punishment, or have the boy's driving-privilege taken away, or most effective and most generally prescribed sentence—may send him to the county hospital and morgue at a specified time.

The boy is at that time guided through a tour which shocks and sickens him with the realization of what ghastly things recklessness can do.

There lies a woman with only one eye glaring at him. The other side of her face is bloody pulp. Here, within reach of his arm, is a boy, no older than himself, with his arm gone—the driving arm, and the arm that might have painted or plied a tool or embraced a sweetheart.

And out in the morgue on the cold slabs—men, women and children with skulls bashed in, some practically beheaded, twisted and mangled by the sudden whims of the traffic ogre.

They were once drivers or passengers.

# The March of Music

"... An ampler Ether, a diviner Air..."—Wordsworth

**Q**UITE some pother has been stirred up by columnist Westbrook Pegler with his article in a New York evening newspaper taking Beniamino Gigli to task for criticizing America upon his return to Italy after his recent visit here. He is reported to have said to interviewers that our land is "decadent," "full of corruption and extortion"; that the Metropolitan Opera is in a state of artistic descent; and that its American singers are of inferior talent and ability.

Mr Pegler is exercised chiefly because those views come from a famed opera singer and are therefore quoted by our press. He says that "singing is the lowest and most vulgar of the arts," that "the fact of Gigli's being an opera singer imparts no special value to his remarks on matters beyond opera"; and "that it is time to destroy the superstition that because a man or woman can shriek louder and a little less sharply than most human beings, that person's views on politics, economics or cultural topics deserve reporting and editorial discussion."

Having set that down, the columnist sees vivid red and launches an immoderate attack on the lyric art and its male practitioners who "are not original creators except to the extent that one singer emits a special gurgle, grunt, gasp or snuffle; or brays, moos, or yowls the music written for him by the composer..." The singer's function can be likened to that of a train-caller in the Northwestern station in Chicago."

It may be guessed by even an on-shrewd reader that Mr. Pegler does not like singing as such and dislikes singers in particular. Perhaps a prenatal cross influences his opinion, or maybe his cradling nurse crooned inferior songs out of tune.

Of course there is much more to the art of singing that Mr. Pegler divines or admits. Its best exponents are not the result of accident but of years of hard study. Aside from the physical cultivation of the voice, there is the matter of adapting it expertly to musical expression and interpretation, achieved only through intense application and long experience. Texts must be understood and assimilated; tone modulated to many varying moods and emotions; diction polished and style acquired; and in the case of operatic artists there are the learning and memorizing of long roles and their truthful and telling enactment and characterization. Altogether the process is perhaps somewhat more arduous than learning to be a columnist who writes at the top of his voice.

Mr. Pegler might rather have objected to the tactlessness of Signor Gigli, who made his statements about America just subsequent to his having earned around \$80,000 here this winter. Also to his Metropolitan ref-

erence... Far from slipping downward, the institution scored one of its most productive and profitable seasons in 1938-39. And lastly, to Gigli's fling at American artists, the best of them at the Met are, to put it modestly, fully the equals of that tenor, whom some competent critics think not nearly as eminent today as he was when he first charmed our audiences with his golden tones and melting delivery.

True, he sang in a few Sunday night concerts. Is that considered opera? Does that fulfill the promises of the auditions sponsors? We'd like an answer to that, and we'll hold open our space to publish the reply just so no one can say we're being unfair.

In the meantime, we'd like to take some bets on this year's Met Auditions finalists. The first three are to be heard this Sunday and the last three the following Sunday. We pick Mack Harrell, baritone; Anna Mary Dickey, soprano; Robert Topping, tenor; Winifred Heldt, contralto; Morton Bowe, tenor, and Emery Darcy, baritone. Best bet—Mack Harrell.

Recently a two piano transcription of his popular polka was played for the composer at a private musicale and he liked it not at all, saying (much to the embarrassment of the arranger): "You have made an elephant out of a mouse. You have put evening dress on a simple little peasant. You have covered a field flower with gold paint."

# Something About Symphony

By Leonard Lieblich

THE previous article on this subject traced the origin of the symphony and showed its derivation from the earlier operatic overture of France and Italy. Readers were given the names of the leading composers who for the next two hundred years or so gave the overture ampler form, structured its movements more skilfully, blended them cohesively and worked improvements in the combinations and treatments of the instruments.

The primitive symphonies had rather crude instrumentation. The violins were always playing, the oboes and flutes at times reinforced them and the horns sustained the harmonies. (If some of those ancient composers could be brought back now to hear a symphonic score by Strauss or Stravinsky, their wigs would doubtless rise straight up in horror!)

WHEN Haydn was only nine years old, Carl Philip Emanuel Bach (son of Bach the Great) was perfecting instrumental balance and contrasts. When Haydn wrote his first symphony, Mozart was a babe of three. However, in his brief life, his genius was not without imprint upon Haydn, whose final symphonies far exceeded his first in craftsmanship and importance. The two giants soon drove their symphonic predecessors into the bin of oblivion, where they still rest.

Haydn's last symphony came to creation in 1795. Beethoven's first had its premiere in 1800. Only a few years later he poured out his "Eroica" and thereby advanced symphony from a mere exposition of themes, structure and treatment to a medium for the direct expression of emotion and human personalities and events. In 1808, came his "Pastoral Symphony," again with a definitely stated idea, the wonders and beauties of nature as an inspirational basis. Beethoven, disclaiming any intention of imitating nature realistically, said that his "pastoral" music voiced only his esthetic "impressions" of the countryside, but he definitely made the instruments reproduce the exact calls of birds and try to sound like a rippling brook and a thunderstorm. He believed, like Rousseau, that "Music does not express things directly, but evokes in the mind the same sentiments that are felt in seeing them."

For a long while before Beethoven, composers had toyed with realism in their music, and especially solo instrumental pieces had the calls and cries of birds and sounds of the marketplace, the chase, and the battlefield. It was Beethoven who stopped the practice for a while when he issued his dictum that only "states of the soul" rather than natural objects were the real interpretative media for music.

The admonition was not heeded by Hector Berlioz. He devoted himself to the type of composition known as a

"program symphony" (earlier essayed by Ludwig Spohr), frank pictorial matter tonalizing a story or a series of events. In 1832 he issued his "Symphonie Fantastique," or "Episode in the Life of an Artist," setting forth the reactions to his love for Harriet Smithson, Shakespearian actress. The five movements of the symphony are labeled (1) "Dreams, Passions"; (2) "A Ball"; (3) "Scene in the Fields"; (4) "March to the Scaffold"; (5) "A Witch's Sabbath." Other "program" symphonies by Berlioz are "Lelio, or the Return to Life," "Harold in Italy" (after Byron), "Romeo and Juliet." All those works represented an immense stride forward in orchestration, as to brilliancy, complexity and instrumental coloring. Another innovation was the "Idee Fixe" in the "Symphonie Fantastique," a "fixed idea" or recurrent theme which the hero finds and hears everywhere. To Berlioz the melody symbolizes his Miss Smithson (He married her later, and they lived unhappily ever after.) The "Idee Fixe" is undoubtedly the precursor to the "leit motif," or leading motive, of Wagner.

The youthful Liszt, living in Paris during the vogue of Berlioz, eagerly imbibed that firebrand's principles, and in his own two long symphonies uses "Faust" and Dante's "Divine Comedy" as mottoes and maternal Raff joined the programmatic writers of symphony with his "Forest" and "Lenore." Rubinstein wrote an "Ocean," Richard Strauss told his household secrets in the "Domestica" and his admiration of Switzerland in the "Alpine." Vaughan Williams honored a city with his "London Symphony." Scriabin stepped higher with "Poem of Ecstasy," "Poem of Fire" (employing color effects thrown on a screen), "Divine Poem" and "Prometheus." Also other Russians contributed to the "story" repertoire.

AMERICA has program symphonies by Edgar Stillman Kelly ("New England" and "Gulliver"), Howard Hanson ("Nordic" and "Romantic"), Robert Russell Bennett and Daniel Gregory Mason (each with "Lincoln"), Werner Janssen ("Louisiana"), Ernest Block ("Israel"), Roy Harris ("1933"), Harl MacDonald ("Rhumba"), Arthur Sheperd ("Horizons"), William Grant Still ("Aro-American"), and more.

Music, traveled far since Beethoven's day, has outmoded his prejudice against "program symphonies." We no longer care what the title or tendency of a work might be so long as it appeals through authority, distinction and art. If the score bears a "program" the intelligent listener still is concerned with the music itself before judging its fidelity as description.

From the "program symphony," Liszt evolved the symphonic poem, and that form will occupy its in the next article of this series.

The entire program, which is one of the more popular shows on the air, went haywire and lost its informality. It isn't the first time I've seen this happen, and for that reason I suggest, SPONSORS, PLEASE KEEP OUT

# AIRIALTO LOWDOWN

Another program that went slightly haywire was the all-star "Hobby Lobby" show of a couple of Wednesdays ago which featured Ben Bernie, Gabriel Heatter, Lanny Ross, Al Pearce, Morton Downey and Phil Baker. During rehearsal, the program ran more than eleven minutes overtime, and if you know your radio, that means a terrific headache for the production-man, whose job it is to cut the program in order to have it come out "on the nose," as they say in radio. Came time for the program and the studio was jammed. The first one to face the mike was Ben Bernie, who told about his horse-racing hobby, then Gabriel Heatter, who appeared slightly nervous, telling a story about a dog, during which time Lanny Ross walked into the studio with his guitar in hand ready to go up on the stage to sing and play the songs that attract the foxes. Al Pearce told one of his fish-stories and Morton Downey sang an Irish song. Then came Phil Baker, and the fun began. The program was running way over, and as Baker was reading his lines the production-man was trying to signal him to skip over some lines to make up the time. This caused a lot of confusion and muffling of lines, and when the program went off the air Baker yelled from the stage, "Everything happens to me."

From "Hobby Lobby" we walked across town to visit Kay Kyser's "Kollitch of Musical Knowledge." For the past two weeks Kay had been doing five shows a day at the Strand Theater in New York. When he walked on the stage of the radio studio, you didn't have to be a detective to see that he was a mighty tired man—and he still had another show to do which was scheduled to start eighteen minutes after he signed off the air. Announcer Ben Grauer has a new gag. He yells, "WPA, New York," into the microphone just before the program goes

on the air, and then pulls a shovel out from underneath his collegiate gown. It gets a big laugh. Incidentally, the Kyser show now ranks in fourth place of all the radio programs on the air, according to the latest surveys, and it was only a little more than a year ago when I was on a short visit to Chicago that Kyser took me up to his office to tell me about his new idea and to show me the cartoons and cartoons of mail which was the response to the first two programs of the "Kollege of Musical Knowledge." Time marches on!

**Fred Allan Makes a Light Ramble**

From the Kyser show back to Radio City to witness the repeat Fred Allen show, which hits the air at midnight. Five minutes before broadcast time, every light in the studio went out and the place was in complete darkness. Production-men and studio officials were frantic—every available telephone was put in use and in about two minutes the electricians were on the stage with emergency lamps and searchlights all set up. One minute before going on the air, the lights went on and Fred Allen walked on the stage and remarked, "I was just walking into the studio and noticed it was dark, so I said something BRIGHT and the lights went on."

Ezra Stone, who is "Henry" of the Aldrich sketches on the Kate Smith show, was in the studio with an attractive young lady enjoying the broadcast, and along about the middle of the program Paul Douglas, announcer of the Burns and Allen show, came in the back way. Paul has been flying to New York from California between broadcasts for the past two weeks in order to be near his best love—so they say. Douglas wouldn't deny or confirm the rumor.

**Vallee Works Overtime**

After the Allen show, while waiting for the back elevator which is used by the artists and musicians, the door opens and out walks Rudy Vallee with a flock of his men. Mind you, this is almost 1:30 in the morning. I asked Rudy what he was doing coming into the studio at that hour and he told me that they were going to rehearse the rest of the night for the next day's program. Vallee was playing five shows a day at a theater in Newark, and this was the only time they had for rehearsal. Whadda life!

If you're in New York on a Wednesday afternoon around 1 p.m. you can always be sure to find Fred Waring in the Automat Restaurant on Broadway near Fifty-fourth Street. Lunching with Fred is practically every song-publisher and song-plugger in the business. Fred generally invites a guest orchestra-leader to join him. Last Wednesday Red Nichols was the honored guest, and a huge cake was baked, and all around the top were forty nickels that had been dipped in red nail-polish. Fred gathers the song-pluggers together for this weekly luncheon because he is generally too busy to see them during the week. If they have a new song they'd like Waring to play, they usually hand him a copy to take back to the office. Very little business is discussed but a good time is had by all.

Several dramatic serials had to be canceled the day the networks announced the election of Pope Pius XII, which was followed immediately thereafter by announcements direct from Rome. The last-minute canceling of the serials gave a few practical jokers the opportunity to perform. The director of "Big Sister" hadn't told anybody about the program being off the air, so the entire cast went to work as usual. In the middle of the script the director came

Your Hollywood reporter would like to remind Cantor's sponsor of two things: (1) That Cantor without a campaign wouldn't be Cantor, and (2) that the Nazis smoke few cigarettes; prefer smelly pipes and stogies. And CBS might turn an ear westward and make a note of this: Radio has reached adulthood and should start becoming the powerful medium for molding public opinion that it has a right to be. Also, the networks have been censoring themselves ridiculously. It is high time that radio stop its Nazi-like suppression of "dangerous thoughts" and start employing the fundamental democratic American principle of free speech! . . . Let's laugh boogymen Hitler into the insane asylum, where he belongs.

**W**HEN Orson Welles' big scare proved that not all listeners tune to the same program at a certain time, not even to hear Charlie McCarthy, broadcasters got a shot in the arm. They began to waken to the fact that keen competition is healthy for radio. Rudy Vallee and Kate Smith both have their audiences. Now a comparatively new program called "Tune-Up Time" has the courage to challenge what many had considered a monopoly

by Bing Crosby and Bob Burns of the Thursday night spot (10:00 p.m. EST, 9:00 p.m. CST, 8:00 p.m. MST, 7:00 p.m. PST). The young show is doing very well, too, for it is presenting sterling entertainment. The cast is composed of comedian Walter O'Keefe as emcee, Andre Kostelanetz and his orchestra, Kay Thompson's Rhythm Singers, and name guests. This week soprano Grace Moore, popular in opera, concert, films and radio, will be the visiting soloist.

## Meet the Faculty

## Person-to-Person

• Following close on the heels of NAB's (National Association of Broadcasters) handbook, *How to Use Radio in the Classroom*, the Chicago Board of Education's Radio Council announces the completion of a handbook on utilization prepared by members of the Radio Council staff. The R. C. handbook will be distributed to Cht teachers to aid in the handling of programs heard both in the school and at home; NAB's book contains much valuable material information for educators anywhere and may be secured by writing to your local station.

• Definitely a move in the right direction toward a healthier democracy is the Lay Conference established by Teachers' College, Columbia University, five years ago. At a date following the conference at which educators have presented their views to the lay public, a second conference is called in order that representatives of the lay audience, after a careful study of the issues previously presented, may criticize frankly the policies of the educators, express their own wishes, and make their own suggestions. These sessions sound interesting enough to be aired, having all the potentialities of a nationally popular series.

• Most interesting (and probably most significant) radio-education experiment being conducted in this country today is William B. Levenson's work with the ultrahigh-frequency station, WBOE, in Cleveland. Top floor of Cleveland's Board of Education building houses studios, experimental classrooms and offices. Many important advances in the use of radio in the classroom will come from this laboratory.

## A LAZY LISTENER?

**Y**OUR radio will pay you dividends in something more valuable than money if you give it half a chance. Maybe the dividends won't be anything more tangible than the satisfaction of having spent some of your leisure time broadening your mind. But this is something that money can't buy! Or maybe the dividends won't be anything more concrete than the pleasure of having an active, healthy mind. Try to buy that! Let your own living-room be your classroom and your own radio your guide to a fuller, richer existence.

We are all prone to pass up the things that come easy to us. Usually it is only those things that we have to go after and fight for that assume any value. You won't get the best that radio can bring you by just listening to anything that happens to be on the air. To get the best, you have to make an effort—not a great one—but an effort nevertheless. When a worthwhile program comes to our attention, don't we say to ourselves, "I'll tune that one in next Thursday night." But do we? Nine times out of ten we forget all about it when the hour arrives, and miss the program completely. If, by this time, you have made up your mind to start taking radio seriously, don't let the matter stop there. Grab a pencil and proceed with this problem in an orderly fashion. Start by turning to "This Week's Programs" (pages 19-35). Scan all the programs on the air from Sunday morning to Saturday night, marking the ones you think will interest you and pay you

some of the dividends of radio. When you have finished this, make up your own personal listening-schedule, somewhat in this fashion:

### SUNDAY—

- 12:30 p.m. Chicago Round Table Discussions (station).
- 2:00 p.m. Americans All — Immigrants All (station).
- 4:30 p.m. World Is Yours (station)

### MONDAY—

- 2:30 p.m. American School of the Air (station).
- 7:45 p.m. Science on the March (station)

Proceed this way through the rest of the week, and then post your schedule where it will be a constant reminder to you to listen to your favorite programs.

This is only the start. There are other things to be done to insure those dividends, and they include forming a set of habits—the habit of taking notes on what you hear; the habit of discussing with your friends all matters that arouse your interest; the habit of reading when you want to know more about a certain subject; the habit of continuing study and doing research when you are so motivated. Now you have a start, you are making a bid for those dividends, you are getting an education or building upon the one you already have.

An education used to be something you had to fight for and then very often didn't get. Now it is at your very finger-tips.

## Radio at I. S. T. C.

Promising is the future of radio as a tool of education when you consider the thousands of students studying broadcasting in more than five hundred colleges and universities in the United States today. Definitely radio-minded is Indiana State Teachers College, Terre Haute, Indiana, where a course in radio has been made a regular part of the curriculum. Here, under the direction of Dr. Clarence M. Morgan, the teachers-to-be are acquainted with radio in the raw, get a chance to work at the various phases of broadcasting from program research, writing and production to the actual presentation over the air.

Radio-broadcasting was introduced as a definite course at I. S. T. C. in the summer of 1937\* and made a regular part of the English work of the college. The course opens with a series of explanatory lectures on the history and objectives of educational broadcasting, and follows in order into the study of studio etiquette and mannerisms; radio terminology, signs and practices; microphones and the physiological aspects of speech; auditions and corrective drills.

In considering the broadcast, types of programs are studied first, their advantages and disadvantages discussed. Following this, the class is divided into production units, grouped according to the ambitions of the students. Each production unit then functions to build a program which, when ready, goes on the air.

Unique is the college-commercial station set-up in Terre Haute. Station WBOW supplies time gratis, pays line charges from the college studios to the station's own main control-room, offers listeners an organized schedule of educational broadcasts; I. S. T. C. trains teachers-to-be in the many phases of radio without the usual exorbitant costs attending the operation of a college-owned broadcasting unit.

Much of the "mystery" is being taken from broadcasting at Indiana State Teachers College and more than five hundred other educational institutions in the United States—a move that will pay dividends in the not-too-distant future through a widespread, keener understanding of the unlimited potentialities of this thing called radio.

\* I. S. T. C. actually entered the field of education by radio as early as 1930, when president L. S. Hines appointed Harold Wright as director of radio and requested him to develop a radio program for the college.

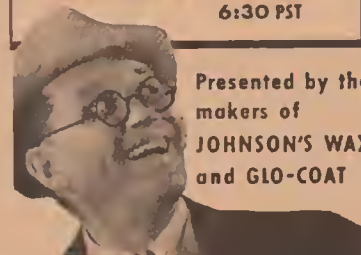

A description of the arrival of the King and Queen of England and the president of France and his wife at Covent Garden, where they will witness a command performance of Tchaikowsky's "Sleeping Princess," will be heard in this country Wednesday, March 22, over W8XK (11.87), Pittsburgh, Pa., as a transatlantic pick-up of the NBC-Blue network, beginning at 4:50 p.m. EST. A portion of the actual performance will be broadcast over the same station at 6:05 p.m. EST.

Station W6XBE (15.33) on Treasure Island, San Francisco, Calif., was officially dedicated with an elaborate program on Thursday evening, March 2. It is now broadcasting as follows: From 7 to 10 a.m. EST to Asia, and from 6:30 to 10 p.m. EST to South America.

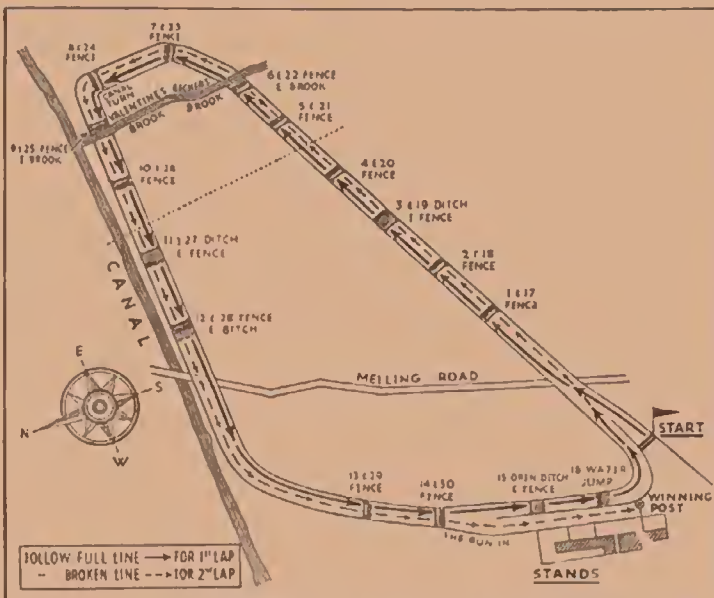

## GOOD RECORDS

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

### All-Classic Review

**Haydn Symphony No. 102 In B Flat Major.** You'd think a fellow would run out of spark after writing a hundred-odd symphonies. Not Papa Haydn. His No. 102 is as bright as his No. 1 or No. 50. Koussevitzky and the Boston Symphony Orchestra are at their best, which is very good indeed. (Victor album 529 \$6.50.)

**Bach's Concerto in A Minor for clavier, flute and violin.** A real recording event, this musically magnificent blending of three solo instruments with string orchestra accompaniment. Three brilliant movements—endless ingenuity... with the famous Yella Pessi playing the harpsichord, Frances Blaisdell, the flutist, and William Kroll, the violinist. Carl Bamberger directs the orchestra. (Victor album 534 \$6.50.)

**Mozart Concerto No. 1 in F Major for harpsichord and orchestra.** Another harpsichord work by a woman, Marguerite Roesgen-Champion, is of note. The romantic purist Mozart offers continuous pleasure to the listener. This set, made in Europe, with the Orchestre Symphonique of Paris, M. F. Gaillard conducting. (Columbia set 114. \$3.25.)

**Purcell Suite for Strings,** with four horns, two flutes and English horn. Another work derived from the earliest of composers, this one in a fine arrangement by John Barbirolli, conductor of the Philharmonic-Symphony of New York, who perform this music. Purcell's themes are on the smoother, richer side, still bearing the stamp of the early classicist. Mr. Barbirolli's revival is most welcome. (Victor album 533. \$4.50.)

**Williams Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis.** This is another revival of an ancient English composer by a contemporary one. No recordings of any of Tallis' works are known, but Mr. Vaughn Williams has suitably orchestrated one of his themes with warmth and depth. The Boyd Neel String Orchestra perform. (Decca 25567-8. \$1.50.)

**Harris Chorale for String Sextet.** The Kremer Quartet plus violin and cello offer a modern American's work, an ingratiating piece by Roy Harris. (Victor 12537 \$1.50.)

**Havanaise by Saint-Saens.** Heifetz, master of violinists, once again displays his power, clarity and supremacy. It's a vari-colored and agreeable eight minutes by the French genius. (Victor 15347. \$2.)

Three standard concert works are freshly recorded and adequately

sedan and drove it home. Honore saw it and said, "Are you crazy? We can't afford that."

"Oh, yeah?" Don said. "I just signed a big radio contract."

His fan mail began mounting until it was the largest on the Fox lot, even greater than Shirley Temple's.

They gave him better pictures, but his fans squawked. They were tired of his playing second fiddle to Tyrone Power, who always got the girl. He's now making two pictures, "Midnight," with Claudette Colbert, and "Alexander Graham Bell" for Fox without Power. The studios finally heeded the voice of the multitude and gave him a show of his own.

He is sailing away about \$1,000 a week in annuities, and still has plenty left for fun. Don is an ardent churchman and has great faith in his religion. When he is moody, which is seldom, he goes to a priest and unburdens his heart, then feels better. He never misses mass, and observes his church's fast days, although it takes much will-power for him to refuse steaks, even on Fridays.

He was hurt when his church started the wave of disapproval of the Mae West skit. He and Honore had combed the script for objections but had found none.

"I won't play in a show that is suggestive," he said. "I'd never read a line that would offend Father Sheehy, who has been such a warm friend to me. After all, it isn't necessary. Entertainment needn't be off color."

**HE REFUSES** flatly to pose as something he isn't. It's not the best press in the world for a studio to say one of its stars is the son of a saloon-keeper and came from across the tracks. But Don won't let it be different.

"My Dad was a miner and crosstie-layer," he said proudly. "He worked with his hands. He was good to his family. He educated all of us. We had a happy home. Dad ran a good saloon. Tavern, my eye! It was a saloon."

His Mama and Papa now live on a ranch he built for them.

His first love is his family, his second the church, his third the theater and his fourth is gambling.

His memory is wacky. He forgets to answer the phone, write letters and change his shirt. His home is a madhouse. One morning he and Mrs. Ameche woke up about eleven and photographers were bunched around their bed.

She asked Don, "Friends of yours?" "I forgot," he said. "We were supposed to have pictures taken." The photographers tripped over dogs, babies and toys.

He and Honore rib each other constantly. She likes to tell about the time, as children, he got riled because she had a soda with another boy and wrote her a note. It said, "It isn't any other girl; it's just that my care for you is dying out."

He evens matters up, however. Often when they have an appointment at some ritzy club, or something, he'll spot her in a crowd and shout, keeping a straight face, "What are you doing here. I told you to stay home and mind the babies." She always blushes.

Or they'll be walking along a crowded street, and Don suddenly will say to her in a loud voice, "I've got a notion to slap you! Do that again and I'll push your nose right into the back of your neck."

She pleads with him to hush, but it's

no use. Passers-by stare and feel sorry for her.

Don will kid anybody. On the Paramount set where he is working with Claudette Colbert, he recently hired an old man to visit the set and ask her autograph. After getting her name, the old fellow said the line Don had taught him. "Thank you, Miss Colbert—I've been a fan of yours since I was a little boy."

His friends agree that his most impressive characteristic is his love of lun. He always enjoys himself, whether he's broke or flush, and money means nothing to him.

Back in his early radio days in Chicago he was the brokest man in town and had the most fun. He is an extremist in everything he does. He'll gamble for a dime or \$10,000 with the same gusto, and if he loses he simply shrugs his shoulders and reckons the Old Lady is pouting.

Don loves to reminisce and will sit for hours with old friends and recall funny incidents. One of his pals is Evans Plummer of RADIO GUIDE's Hollywood staff, who knew Don back in the up-and-down days.

"He never changes," Plummer said. "He's the same likable guy now that he was when he was plugging along back in Chicago. He's a sweetheart in every way, nothing bogus. He's a booming, hale and hearty guy, who loves fun and who has had an almost eerie run of good luck."

Don must have his sleep, at least eight hours at a stretch. He sleeps raw. He is a heavy eater and goes for steaks, broccoli and spaghetti. He's an excellent cook himself.

When he is serious or sympathetic, he will wrinkle up his nose and curl his lips. He talks usually with his hands in front of him, as though he were holding a basketball. If he's thinking, he will dig at his hair with one finger as if afraid he will muss a lock.

"He's always done that," his wife said. "He was always careful not to muss his hair."

He enjoys laughing, and if he is really tickled he'll draw his knees up to his chin and guffaw, then puff, "whoop, whoop." And he'll laugh at him self. One of his favorite cracks now is, "Sure, I'm getting a vacation. I get twenty minutes off between pictures."

He and his pal, Chet Lauck (lum of lum and Abnei), were trying to decide whether to buy some race-horses, and they nearly drove Mrs. Ameche insane.

"You would have died," she recalled. "Don and Chet met here at our house to decide if they should buy Dave Butler's horses. Chet and Don rolled on the floor and talked, then they phoned Butler and asked a question or two. Then they hopped over some furniture and did some more discussing. Then back to the phone. Finally they thought maybe if they stood on their heads they could arrive at a decision. So they did, and decided to buy. But Butler had decided, in the meantime, not to sell. He changed his mind later, however."

Don has lots of imagination and builds huge castles in the air, then knocks them down. He hopes some day to build a great orphanage.

His favorite game is poker, with everything wild, including Ameche. He also likes the game "indication."

Don is very careful about his appearance and always waa, even back when he had to keep his pants under his mattress to press them. When he's lounging around the house, he wears neatly pressed pajamas and a robe
