It was the "luck of the Irish" that brought Maureen O'Sullivan to the screen and to Hollywood. Born at Boyle, in the Emerald Isle, Maureen as a student at finishing-school had dreamed of a stage career, but hardly hoped to follow it in real life. She reckoned without director John Borzage and her Irish luck. The year she finished school, Borzage was in Ireland seeking a pretty Irish lass to play opposite John McCormack in his first talking picture. When he met Maureen at a party, he knew that his search was over. A month later, with permission from her father, a major in the Connaught Rangers, Maureen and her mother left for Hollywood, arriving there in September, 1929. She began a long series of screen appearances in such films as "Strange Interlude," "Connecticut Yankee" and the "Tarzan" pictures. Her newest and soon-to-be-released film is M-G-M's "Pride and Prejudice." M-G-M is her contract studio. Hollywood Declares War!

AMID a world aflame, with attacks, counter-attacks and territorial losses and gains uppermost in the public's mind, the film capital lashes forth with the first big motion pictures which concentrate on the human side of Europe's conflict. Two such pictures will be released almost simultaneously this month, M-G-M's "The Mortal Storm" and 20th Century-Fox's "Four Sons." The Duke AND The Duchess



TYRONE POWER, the "Dark Duke" of Hollywood, is Irish and temperamental—and one of the screen's finest actors, born to the theater

This is the second of three articles, each complete in itself, about Tyrone Power and Annabella, revealing how they have found happiness in marriage.—Editor.

ANNABELLA wanted a hot foot. Fresh from France, the elf of Champs Elysees had heard that a person was not an American until he had tried a hot foot and a hot dog. The toast of 50,000,000 Frenchmen, who will always be right when it comes to choosing beautiful women, had just hied herself over on the Normandie, the pride of the French merchant fleet.

It was fitting that she should come to America on the pride of France, for she, too, was the pride of her country. She glanced around at the reporters, who were sizing her up as a judge studies a beautiful filly. Annabella was not embarrassed. She smiled at the boys and asked for a hot dog and a hot foot. One reporter spoke out of the side of his mouth to a colleague, "She's got class. As long as there are Frenchwomen like that, France will always be a high-class place. She'll get what she wants."

Annabella never got the hot foot. Even reporters can be gentlemen and will not go around burning the tootsies of beautiful foreigners. No, she never got the hot foot, but she got something just as exciting—she got Tyrone Power.

Annabella will tell you her name is Anne Charpentier. That's close enough, but really her name is Suzanne Charpentier and she was born in Paris on Bastille Day in 1913. Her father is Pierre Charpentier, who was a French travel editor. She is as French as crepe suzettes and her whole family was so Gallic that they thought there were only two cities in the world—Paris and all the others. She was a movie star in Europe in those strange forgotten days when blitzkrieg sounded like a sneeze instead of a scourge.

She spoke virtually no English. She married Jean Murat, a French star, and bore him a French child; she loved France more than life. Now, I ask you, what chance has any American in a combination like that—what chance has any man to win such a prize? Only an Irishman could do it, and one by the name of Tyrone Power did.

There are those who say if you go back far enough you will find that the Irish and the French are cousins under the skin. Be that as it may, only the

movies could have brought together two such completely different persons as Ty Power, the dark duke, and Annabella, the blond duchess.

IF THE fates had been kinder, they might have met in Hollywood years ago when both were failures. Oh, yes, they both flopped. The kicking around that Power got in Hollywood at first is well known, but the studio moguls have managed pretty well to hush-hush the amusing fact that Annabella was not a stranger to America when she came to our fair land on the Normandie and begged for a hot foot. She came over first in 1934 to do some foreign bits, but Hollywood allowed her to cool her charming heels. So she went back to France, where they loved her, and got married. And America forgot all about Annabella-Suzanne Charpentier-Mrs. Jean Murat until a British production gave her to us in Technicolor, and we, the people, went just a little

bit nuts over her. She ran back to us on the Normandie.

Sitting in the cool, friendly living-room of the Power home the other day, I did not reveal to Mrs. Power that I was one of the pack of reporters who met her on the Normandie and yapped and barked at her. But she made a profound impression on us, and not one out of a hundred foreign visitors, or one out of a thousand movie stars, makes an impression upon ship-news reporters. The boys chided Annabella a bit that day and she gave out better than she took. At her hotel, a photographer asked her to sit on a radiator and pose. She glanced at the radiator and said pertly, "What do you want to do—make me look like a waffle?"

She was very lonely for a while, and three times a week she telephoned Jean Murat. Charles Boyer, a countryman, had been imported with her, but Annabella had few other friends in

Hollywood. She got a house, a staff of English servants and an English secretary, and determined to master our language. She would not allow French to be spoken in her home. She was doing so-so in the movies and they east her in "Suez."

Ty Power was in the same picture.

AND now let's go back to 1914. It was in that year that Tyrone Power III was born with a heritage of the theater, a genealogy that reads like *dramatis personae*, and two strikes on him—puny health and the burden of being the son of a very famous father.

The Power clan came from County Tyrone in Ireland, and Sir William Power was quite a somebody. Tyrone I was the rave of the English theater 110 years ago. He came to America in 1833 and was lost at sea on his way back to Europe. His son, Harold, studied music and wound up in the British diplomatic corps, which is a strange place for an Irishman to be. Harold's son was Tyrone II, and he came to America to grow oranges and lemons and lived to be called "the greatest hope of the American stage." He and Patie Rayome, an actress, were the parents of Tyrone III. Ty was educated in Cincinnati parochial schools and was graduated in 1933 from high school. He was no great shucks as a student.

AT HOME he heard nothing but theater. When he was graduated from high school he determined to begin trouping. He already had made his debut. He was seven then and appeared with his mother at San Gabriel, in the famous Mission Play.

Tyrone wouldn't go to college, but teamed up with his father in "The Merchant of Venice," his first Shakespeare. The pair worked with Fritz Leiber, and during a Chicago performance the career of Ty Power almost ended. He was playing the role of an old man when one of the actors accidentally dropped a knife which just barely missed Tyrone's head. The audience didn't catch on, but Tyrone II whispered out of the side of his mouth, "Great God, son, are you hurt?"

The boy whispered back, "No."

It was one of the best examples of self-control in the history of the theater, and the other actors showered the boy with praise. Only a real actor can miss death so narrowly without his audience knowing it.

The boy's father took him to Hollywood, where Power, Sr., was cast in

"The Miracle Man." He wanted young Ty to work with him, but the elder Power died suddenly.

The family was broke. Once, the Powers had had a beautiful home in Canada, and they had had fame and fun, but no money. Ty tried to get into the movies, but he got only rebuffs.

His mother joined him and they began plugging together seeking a job for the duke. A guest came to dinner one night, and after a none too sumptuous meal Mr. Power kicked off his shoes and rubbed his aching dogs. The guest said, "Is that a nice way for a potential star to act?"

The guest was one of the movie moguls. Ty looked at him for several seconds and said, "My feet hurt. The only time they ever hurt more was when I used to walk to your office trying to get a job. I walked because I didn't have the carfare."

The guest was flabbergasted. "But you always looked so nonchalant."

"That was acting," said Mr. Power. "The next time some young man comes to your office, remember that he might have walked there."

With only rebuffs from the movies in his box score, Tyrone Power decided to leave Hollywood. He wasn't embittered but his Irish was up.

It's a shame that he and Annabella didn't meet then. They could have consoled each other.

The black duke smiled. It was more of a grin of triumph, as he recounted his experiences.

HE WAS dispossessed and swore some day he would buy the apartment from which he had been evicted and fire the superintendent who had kicked him out. Ty Power was acting as a juvenile acts when he made that resolution. Ambition is a terrible taskmaster and ambition was driving young Power. As a boy he had worked in a drug store and had vowed that some day he would come back to the drug store and buy all the ice cream he wanted. He had worked as a theater usher and had resolved some day to come back and buy the best seat in the house. And now he was a failure in Hollywood. Or so he thought. That's youth for you. That's the Irish for you, too. Mr. Power was not quite old enough to shave often, but he thought he was a failure. Now he smiles about it.

"I couldn't get a job in pictures for three years," he said. "Oh, I got bit parts, but I couldn't click. In "Flirtation Walk" I was a West Point cadet for one day at \$5.50 a day. So I decided to leave Hollywood. That was 1934."

Annabella was leaving Hollywood at the same time, but their paths didn't cross.

"I traveled by day coach from Los Angeles to Chicago," Mr. Power said, "and landed a job at the Chicago Fair. I worked in a concession that showed how movies are made. For two bits a patron could come in and watch the production of a movie. I guess I was one of the stars, but nobody knew me."

In Chicago he also did radio work on the Sears-Roebuck religious hour, and he was on the same program with Don Ameche, with whom he now works so often. But it still was tough sledding.

"Now I travel in style," Mr. Power said. "I eat what I want when I want it. The newspapers and magazines are nice enough to make a fuss over me, but I postponed many meals when I was trying to catch on. Chicago has always been my favorite city because I always had a job there and always ate regularly."

Tyrone's mother, who saw Annabella act in one of her pictures, told Ty she was a great actress; he agreed—and discovered she was also a charming person. They haven't appeared together since "Suez."

Power might have stayed in Chicago, but he wanted to act, so he went to New York. The name of Power carried no magic in Hollywood, but in New York the name meant something, and when Ty reached the metropolis, Helen Menken told Guthrie McClintic to be sure to talk to Ty when the boy called on him, as he was sure to do. There's something funny about that. Here was a boy whom Hollywood had kicked around but who meant something to the great Menken and to the smart McClintic. Ty called on McClintic and asked for passes to see a Katharine Cornell show, and McClintic not only gave him passes but gave him some parts to study, and the next day he was assigned to understudy in "Flowers of the Forest."

He understudied Burgess Meredith, John Howard and John Emery and got his first real role with Miss Cornell in "Saint Joan." The duke was in. Soon Hollywood talent-scouts were wiring frantic messages back to their bosses that they had found a star. They had come 3,000 miles to discover a man who often had cooled his heels in their offices. In 1936 Fox signed him for sixty bucks a week and cast him first

with Alice Faye and Shirley Temple in "Sing, Baby, Sing." A director hounded him off the lot and told him to go back to Broadway and to Shakespeare—that he never would be a movie actor. Miss Faye went to bat for him and he got a teeny part in "Girls' Dormitory." His name did not appear, but seeds of letters came in asking who he was. You can't fool America. A heap of folks in Hollywood say they discovered Tyrone Power. Tommyrot! Tyrone Power was born an actor and America discovered him.

AMONG the first things that Power did when he began making money was to buy that apartment from which he had been evicted. Then he went to Cincinnati and bought the ice cream he had promised himself.

Power has a race-horse temperament, but the studio began working him as though he were a mule. In 1937 he starred in five pictures, and in 1938 he was starred in \$10,000,000 worth. They have worked him in everything in the world, and he has never flopped. He has had some terrible stories and has saved them. It should be against the law to work a


man like Ty Power in a poor story. He was so busy that even the press-agents didn't have time to fake a romance for him.

But in 1938 he was cast in "Suez."

And that's where his life really began, for Mr. Power didn't build that canal for the glory of France and to be the lifeline of England, but he built it for the love of a woman. The movies said so, and for once the movies were right. Annabella was in the same picture, you remember, and by the time the black duke had hopped from "Suez" to Missouri to become Jesse James, he had stolen her heart.

He surprised about 100,000,000 Americans and proved that 50,000,000 Frenchmen could be wrong.

"Lillian Russell" (A Review)

Cast: Alice Faye, Don Ameche, Henry Fonda, Edward Arnold, Warren William, Leo Carrillo, Helen Westley, et al. A 20th Century-Fox picture, with novelties by Weber and Fields and Eddie Foy, Jr.; produced by Darryl Zanuck; directed by Irving Cummings, who also directed "Girls' Dormitory"; screen play by William Anthony McGuire.

ONE never thinks of the Gay Nineties without thinking, too, of Lillian Russell, most colorful character of the American stage in graphical film which Hollywood has learned to do so well, Lillian Russell comes alive in a fine portrayal by Alice Faye—perhaps the best piece of Faye acting to date.

To bring the amazing life and loves of Lillian Russell to the screen, 20th Century-Fox spent two years in research, ten months in production, and a generous fortune in recreating historic landmarks of the New York of yesterday. Among these were Tony Pastor's Theater, the Weber and Fields Music Hall, Rector's famous restaurant. Incidentally, Weber and Fields, playing themselves in the film, earned liberal applause from the preview audience.

The whole picture is studded with characters drawn from life, from the obscure musician she first married, Edward Solomon, played by Don Ameche, to shrewd, gigantic and genial Diamond Jim Brady, who once offered Miss Russell a million dollars to marry him. It is not alone the story of a famous actress. It is also the story of an era, and Lillian Russell, who never knew a failure except in love from the day she was first discovered by Tony Pastor, is simply a part of an amazing era faithfully recaptured.

Epic in its sweep and the sheer magnificence of its production, only regret of those who see it is that it is not in Technicolor.

To have seen the wardrobe of Miss Russell, as copied by Travis Banton in the twenty-seven gowns designed for Miss Faye, together with the ostrich-plumed hats of that day, the glittering jewels, the regal fittings of Rector's in actual color would have been something to remember. Even so, audiences will leave the theater remembering the reverberating laugh of Diamond Jim, played by Edward Arnold, and the stormy emotional scene in which Alice Faye really is Lillian Russell following her rejection of Brady's proposal.

"Down Went McGinty" (A Review)

Cast: Brian Donlevy, Muriel Angelus, Akim Tamiroff, William Demarest, Allyn Joslyn, et al. A Paramount picture, produced by Paul Jones; directed by Preston Sturges from his own screen play.

THE Republicans stage their political powwow June 24 in Philadelphia; the Democrats stage theirs in Chicago July 15, and Paramount launches its campaign in Hollywood July 19 with the release of "Down Went McGinty." For sheer entertainment value, it three, be a toss-up between the "Down Went McGinty," one of the best political stories to come to the screen in many a moon, MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE readers can bet on Paramount.

McGinty (Brian Donlevy) is first seen as a bartender in a tropical hideaway for fugitives from the U. S. He is consoling a down-and-outer. "Things can't be so bad," he says. "Take a look at me. Once I was governor of a state."

From that point, the story is told in retrospect, and for sheer authenticity which approaches the documentary in revealing how graft is levied and collected in American cities, the picture is unsurpassed. At the same time, it possesses a fine humor and a gripping story. McGinty tells how, a few years back, he stood in a breadline awaiting a handout. Attached to the free meal was the stipulation that the diners must vote for a certain candidate in a mayoralty election.

McGinty, broke and hungry, votes thirty-seven times during the day and so impresses the Boss (Akim Tamiroff) that he is given a permanent job collecting graft. From this job, he is elected alderman, then mayor. While campaigning for mayor, the Boss decides that McGinty should have a wife, and the Boss' secretary, Catherine (Muriel Angelus), agrees to marry him as a matter of campaign convenience. The marriage of convenience turns into a marriage of love, which eventually leads to McGinty's resolve to go straight.

By this time, however, McGinty is in the governor's seat, and when he turns upon the politicians, he breaks the Boss. The Boss, in his turn, manages to break McGinty by exposing his earlier record. At this point, the film cleverly reverts back to the present and to bartender McGinty with a subtle—if bitter—concluding touch.

Because "Down Went McGinty" was reviewed by Movie and Radio Guide before the regular press preview, the "What They Thought of It" feature is necessarily omitted.

"Sandy Is a Lady"

Cast: Sandy, Butch and Buddy, Eugene Pallette, Nan Grey, Tom Brown, Mischa Auer, Billy Gilbert, Edgar Kennedy, Fritz Feld, et al. A Universal picture, produced by Burt Kelly, directed by Charles Lamont, who also directed "Shadows Over Shanghai" and "Pride of the Navy."

DESPITE the fact that you will encounter here all the time-honored gags and thriller-diller complications which once were reserved for Harold Lloyd productions, "Sandy Is a Lady" leaves no sense of "I saw all this before" but settles right down to the business of keeping audiences pre-occupied and wholly amused throughout.

As cute as ever, Baby Sandy is left in the hands of neighbor Billy Gilbert and his two dead-pan sons, Buddy and Butch, while Mother Nan Grey goes off on a clam-buying expedition. The clams are very important because Daddy Tom Brown's boss, Eugene Pallette, is coming to dinner and clams are his favorite food. Also, Nan and Tom plan to hit the boss for a raise for Tom right after dinner.

Escaping the two boys with whom she is left, Sandy becomes the buddy of inventor Mischa Auer, gets lost, hauled away in an ash-can, is rediscovered on a narrow girder atop a sixteen-story building under construction. Even so, she manages to wind up safely at home to greet her mother when she returns from her clam-hunt. But of course a lot of other things have been happening, too. Sandy, for example, has saved a big job for the boss and insured her Daddy's raise, wangled an acceptance of a Mischa Auer invention and spread sunshine wherever she appeared.

This sounds terribly complicated—and it is. But as it unreels at its breathless pace, it is fresh and new and manages to grip its audience, varying thrills with chuckles in nice proportion. Definitely, it is reminiscent of the Harold Lloyd technique of comedy, with never a dull moment, chills, spills and thrills at a mile-a-minute pace which Sandy takes in a calm, unemotional stride with an occasional grin of enjoyment. Definitely, too, it is a welcome relief from the sophisticated comedy with which we have been deluged of late.

This is Baby Sandy's fourth picture. Definitely it establishes Sandy as a lady and, even more definitely, it establishes her as one of Universal's brightest stars. Dead-pan Butch and Buddy, who panicked audiences in the "Underpup," follow through with outstanding performances here, as do Eugene Pallette, Edgar Kennedy, and Mischa Auer as a lovable, half-mad, half-brilliant Russian inventor.

"Women in War"

TWENTY-THREE years ago, when the American expeditionary forces were first sent to France, Elsie Janis—then one of Broadway's brightest stars—left New York for the war zone to take charge of A. E. F. overseas entertainment, and became known, very shortly, as "The Sweetheart of the A. E. F."

Today Elsie Janis has the leading role in a film as timely as a newsreel and set in this, the current, world war. Miss Janis plays the part of a mother whose daughter, unwittingly injuring a British officer, is involved in a military trial. Her mother manages to extricate her and sends her to France as a nurse. Recalcitrant and bitter, the girl hates her existence, but in the end comes through with flying colors, thanks to her mother's aid.

Most interesting thing about the film is the part Miss Janis plays. As a nurse back of the lines, she manages to relive, for the brief period of the film, a part she wrote herself in the trying days of World War I. Oldsters will love it for just that reason. Youngsters will enjoy it for the timely drama it is, a tense and melodramatic picturization of the truth that more than soldiers and arms enter into winning wars. Not the least of these are the nurses.

"The Way of All Flesh"

BACK in the early days of sound, Emil Jannings, the noted German actor, made a silent film synchronized to music which, for its deeply moving theme and magnificent character portrayal on the part of Jannings, left an ineradicable impression upon movie-goers of the day. Now that film, "The Way of All Flesh," has been made over with Akim Tamiroff in the part played by Jannings. To say simply that it is far and away the best thing Tamiroff has yet done is to say that the new version of the picture is as effective—if not more so—than the original.

Here is the tragic, heavy portrait of a father who, because of a sin committed in a moment of weakness, pays throughout his living days. Tamiroff is the father, and while he is adequately supported, his part naturally overshadows all others. In the beginning, he is seen as the cashier of a small-town bank, the father of a fine family, a respected member of the community. Sent to the city with bank funds to be deposited there, he succumbs to the lure of a siren (Muriel Angelus), and when he awakens, the funds entrusted to him have disappeared. Rather than return and bring with him disgrace for his family, he disappears, planning circumstances to make it seem that he died an honorable death. All the while, he sinks lower and lower until he is little more than a tramp.

Particularly poignant are the two scenes in which he encounters his family, unknown to them. One is when he sits in a balcony as his son, now a famous violinist, plays a concert. The other is on the occasion of his son's marriage. Here the father hovers outside the home, watches as his son goes to leave flowers on what he supposes is his father's grave before the ceremony. Later as he looks in at his family through the window from the snowy night outside, longing to go in and make himself known and yet knowing that he cannot, the tender, restrained performance of Tamiroff is a thing long to be remembered.

This must be listed as purely a personal achievement on the part of Tamiroff. Other characters—Gladys George, for example, has the part which Ruth Chatterton played opposite Jannings—are submerged in the tense story of the father's drift away from his family down into the dregs of humanity.

THE MILLION-DOLLAR KID

Can "Croucho" Godoy make a chump out of the champ again? Read here about his chances and tune in Thursday

Jolting Joe Louis means to prove once again that no man can fool him twice

JOE LOUIS has one of the most impressive collections of nicknames in all sport. He is called, among other things, Brown Bomber, Dark Destroyer, Amber Assassin, Butcher Boy, and Sticker of Human Pigs.

He is pictured as a "killer" whose one ominous assignment in life is the destruction of those Lilliputian larrupers unfortunate enough to get in the way of his tank-like strides and machine-gun blows.

In this conception, Joe Louis is in no way a bargain for the lesser lights that flicker and blink (mainly blink) in heavyweight pugilism. But please do not be unduly depressed by it. This deliciously lurid chapter in the world's horror literature is greatly overwritten.

Truth of the matter is that Louis, all terror tales notwithstanding, is a heaven-sent angel of palookadom! He is the pugugly's dream come true—good fairy, one of the Magi and Santa Claus rolled into one. He is the Midas of Maul who makes them big money.

Louis strokes his opponents on the chin, as Aladdin rubbed his lamp, and treasures of gold pour into their laps. In three years, Louis' fists have earned close to \$1,000,000 for the fighters who have opposed him. In the course of this "maltreatment" he has made wealthy young men of some of those chosen to participate with him in ringdom's melon-cuttings, and he has inflated earnings of all far beyond their own purse-drawing capacities.

IF SOME of these beneficiaries had not had Louis, they would have had as opponents a posse of butcher, baker, rent, tailor and other bill-collectors. And while on the subject of monsters, now we're really getting hot!

On Thursday night, June 20, an unhandsome and in some ways uncouth youth from South America, Senor Arturo Godoy, will oppose Louis in New York's Yankee Stadium ring. They will fight fifteen rounds or less for the world's heavyweight championship, and

via this medium Godoy will collect the second installment of a fortune that has come to him jackpot style.

Four months ago Godoy was a fistic nobody. He had been around for a number of years, engaging in unimportant bouts, sharing in minor purses. Then destiny singled him out. An opponent was needed for Louis, and Godoy was as eligible as anybody else in view of the dearth of worthy title challengers. So on February 10 Arturo was dispatched to the slaughter. Box score of the "slaughter":

1. Godoy sprang a brainstorm style, featuring an anthropoid crouch that completely befuddled Louis. The champion hardly landed a punishing blow, Godoy wasn't the least bit hurt and the bout went the full fifteen-round limit.

2. Godoy pocketed \$9,250 earnings for the evening and hurried forth to do some real cashing-in. Through picturesque speech on the radio and aided on the stage by a beauteous dancing

wife, Godoy captured the public fancy. In a veritable box-office "blitzkrieg," he has cleaned up several times the amount of his fight wage.

3. Now Godoy is all set to face Louis' punches again and counter with another neat tapping of the old cash-register. Brisk ticket sales are reported by promoter Mike Jacobs, and Godoy's share of what may be a surprisingly large gate will set him up for life.

Admittedly, the Louis touch on a young man's chin has its inconveniencing aspects, but there certainly is no complaint with his helpful touch to the opponent's bankroll. Since he knocked out James J. Braddock in eight rounds on June 22, 1937, to win the championship, Louis has engaged in ten defenses. Each time he proved a box-

office angel to somebody. Braddock himself, so low not long before then that he had been on relief, profited from the Brown Bomber's magnetic draw to the extent of \$200,000. Including Braddock, Louis' eleven title opponents have been enriched to the extent of \$775,734, an average of \$70,000 per man.

THE accompanying table shows just whom Louis has fought since hitting championship stride, and the approximate amount he helped each man earn. Note that Max Schmeling, who gave the worst account of himself, collected the most—\$349,228—from his return match with Louis. So valiant in their first encounter when he kayoed Joe in twelve rounds, Schmeling proved to be a complete washout in the encore. He went down screaming from the first punch, a whack across the flanks, and failed to last out the opening round. Herr Schmeling took a bitter drubbing, but that \$349,228 sugar was plenty sweet.

Name your own palookas on the list and then note just what the angel has done for them. Imagine two-bits-an-hour laborers like some of those guys getting that kind of dough! Call it "butchery" if you will, but the line of those eager to have a taste of it still forms at the left and right.

Lest a suspicion be born that we are trying to build up the Louis lad for a philanthropy award, or something, let it be said here and now that he also has done a bit of all right by himself. As usual, the lion's share of the booty has been seized by the champ. In his five-year career, Louis has collected \$1,699,322 as his end of the purses. He has had forty-two fights, winning thirty-four by K.O.'s and seven by decisions, losing only the knockout by Schmeling. He has fought a total of 206 rounds—thus has been paid \$8,248 per round, or \$2,749 per minute of actual performance.

A wolf of Wall Street would have to

go some to equal this rate of "take" by the panther of the ring.

And now promoter Jacobs is talking of a \$500,000 gate for the next meeting of Louis with the swarthy and sinister-faced gent from Chile. Godoy definitely has registered with the fight fans. The public has been intrigued by his radio talks in thick, broken English and the self-assurance he exudes. The pub-

lic again. Such a screwy and confusing style has the South American "Croucho" that students of such things doubt Louis ever would be able to solve it, not after fifteen, thirty or even forty-five rounds of intimate study.

Louis knows exactly how to deal with bipeds, but when an adversary comes bounding across the ring in quadruped manner, on knuckles and

arms, he smothered all Louis' efforts at in-fighting. The result was a haywire fight which was not at all soothing to the practised ringside eye. Louis looked bad and Godoy looked worse. There were forty-five minutes of it, and many a delicate sniffer was quivering long before they opened the doors to let the crowd out and some fresh air in.

Godoy is fearless of Louis, and that always helps. In the ring he faced the "hardest hitter since Dempsey" without a qualm. Two nights later he stood up to him again, only a radio mike between them, and broadcast a taunt:

"Next time, Cho Looley, I beat you."

What Louis said in response caused those who are familiar with Joe's capacity for developing a "hate" to shudder:

"The next time, Arturo Godoy, I knock you out. And you better bring your five brothers along."

Louis freely admits that he is gunning for the man who made a sucker out of him.

"I'M A little bit mad at that Godoy,"

he says, "and I'm going to put him away if it's the last thing I do. That freak style won't save him this time, because Jack (trainer Blackburn) and I have worked out a way to solve it. You'll see."

Louis is not given to loose talking and he usually proves his own best prophet. Sometimes he has called the exact round in which he would kayo an enemy. When he announces he is even a "little bit mad" at somebody, it's always well to check up on the supply of ammonia.

Such a resentment Louis took into the ring against Schmeling, details of which massacre already have been related. And now he announces the Godoy number is up!

String with the champions and you'll be right most of the time, so we here-with are stringing. Louis says he will get Godoy. Louis doesn't mention the round, but we'll do that for him. Let's take No. 7, a good enough number on the first throw but never on the second.

ONE answer is that the overwhelming majority of fans only "heard" the first Louis-Godoy bout. They didn't see it, and the battle sounded much better and closer than it actually looked. Thus, thousands who missed the first match are being encouraged to attend this next time. Many competent boxing critics believe the crowd will see a repetition, with Godoy going the limit

toes, even the champion becomes upset. The first Godoy fight proved it. From the moment he ambled out of his corner and forced Louis to reach way down to shake hands with him, Senor Arturo had Joe off balance.

Bobbing, crouching and weaving, Godoy offered Louis no target for telling bombs. Louis couldn't get his punches down that low. Hitting this fellow is comparable to driving railroad spikes, calling for the same kind of stroke.

Godoy's battle plan was to crawl in close and then bury his head on the champion's chest. With his big, strong

I have never heard of either name." Nevertheless he allowed the production, which resulted in one of the most famous of musical failures chiefly because the fashionable Parisians, accustomed to a third-act ballet in most of their operas, objected to Wagner's putting his dancing at the beginning, just after the overture.

With high hopes, Wagner had rewritten and enlarged the short ballet scene of the original version of his "Tannhaeuser" premiered at Dresden in 1845. However, the result was the aforementioned disaster.

The Bacchanale, as it is called, takes place at the Court of Venus, where Tannhaeuser is enjoying the sinful delights that later cost him the pure love of Elizabeth and bring about her death and his own.

Nicolai Berezhowsky's third symphony dates from 1936 when he was thirty-six years old and is music of ultra-modern flavor and complexity. The work has been performed by the leading orchestras of Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Minneapolis, Philadelphia and New York where the composer lives.

The American Prix de Rome (Prize of Rome), established 1921, is a copy of the long famous Paris Conservatoire Prix de Rome inaugurated there in 1803 after Napoleon I had reorganized the school in 1800. Both honors have to be gained through competition of composers, the American winners being selected for three fellowships given by several organizations devoted to the welfare of music in our land. For both Prix winners, free residence is provided in Rome with money for living purposes, extending through several years.

Howard Hanson was the first recipient of the American Prix in 1921, and that is why his symphony (written in 1930) holds place on today's program. Among other Americans who won the prize are Leo Sowerby, Randall Thompson and Robert L. Sanders; a symphony by the last-named was broadcast recently by Howard Barlow.

There is no special "story" connected with Hanson's score and its best explanation is his own: "My Romantic Symphony represents my escape from the rather bitter type of modern musical realism which occupies so large a place in contemporary thought . . . I do not believe that music is primarily a matter of the intellect, but rather a manifestation of the emotions."

He was particularly fond of writing variations, the best of his examples in that form being the set based on a violin theme by Paganini and the one heard at this hour, taking as its subject some lovely measures by Handel.

Brahms puts them through all sorts of moods, serious, gay, solemn, pastoral, sentimental, humorous, brilliant, using marvelous resources of harmony, counterpoint and coloring, and ending with a prodigious fugue, piling up chords and climaxes to lead to a highly glorified finale.

Miss Brodsky prefers Brahms and Debussy to all other piano composers, and as she is as gifted a young American pianist as this country possesses, her opinion deserves ripe consideration.

Summer Days in Radio

By Leonard Liebling

OUR fifth column in South America evidently is to be established partly through music, what with exchange of concerts, conductors, lecturers and composers.

Good news along those lines is the recent announcement that some of the South American concerts of Toscanini and his orchestra (they sailed from New York May 31) will be broadcast to the United States; and also several "preparatory" programs, conducted by H. Leopold Spitalny, are to be aired for us while the group is en route aboard the S. S. Brazil.

It is possible that our dials might bring the very first of the concerts in South America, scheduled to take place the day the orchestra disembarks at Rio de Janeiro, Brazilian capital, where Toscanini made his debut fifty-four years ago as a conductor.

Do you remember the story? He was a cellist at the opera house there when, during a political embroilment, the regular leader fled from the platform just before curtain-time. In desperation the management called on Toscanini—then exactly nineteen years old—to direct the delayed performance of "Aida," which he did without any printed music before him. He scored a success so sensational that then and there he gave up the cello and entered on his glittering career with the baton.

What do musical artists do in summer, and where do they spend their time? Most of them rest and rusticate, and the others keep on making public appearances, occasional or regular.

Heifetz and Hofmann are to be in California (where they have homes) during the hot months, and the same state will harbor Bartlett and Robertson, John Brownlee, Lotte Lehmann, John Carter and Paul Robeson. Vronsky and Babin intend to do some composing in New Mexico. Richard Crooks is to divide his time between a cottage in Pennsylvania and a camp in Canada. Albert Spalding summers in Massachusetts but leaves there for participation in several outdoor concerts. Helen Jepson retires to Wurtzboro, N. Y., to rest and learn new roles. Robert Virovai listens to what the wild waves say at Nantucket Island, Mass. Vladimir Horowitz sandwiches his leisure at

Riverdale, N. Y., with engagements at the Philadelphia Dell, Hollywood Bowl and Ravinia Park. Sviyeti and Piatigorsky are avoiding the turmoil in Europe by spending summer in America for the first time—and your editor will mop his brow in New York City and hunt items to fill "The March of Music"

You've got all summer to read up on your opera librettos, for the Metropolitan—safe now with its million-dollar (and over) guarantee fund—reopens on December 2 for sixteen weeks of lyricizing and the customary broadcasting.

New Books and Records Reviewed

THE CRITICAL COMPOSER. A collection of literary material by Wagner, Schumann, Debussy, Hugo Wolf and other composers. Edited by Irving Kolodin. (Howell, Soskin & Co., New York.)

This volume by one of the music critics of the Sun (New York) will reveal to many who did not know it before that a number of great tonal masters could write articles, essays and criticism as fluently and intelligently as they composed music. In addition to the giants aforementioned, Kolodin quotes too from Gounod, Berlioz, Tchaikowsky, Gluck, Liszt, Mendelssohn. (Also Weber, Spohr and Saint-Saens might have been profitably included in the collection.)

Of course real interest attaches to what such men say about music in general, but positively absorbing are the opinions, favorable and unfavorable, they express of one another. Here is criticism voiced by minds which understand the processes of musical creation from the inside, from actual experience. (Schumann, Wolf, Berlioz and Debussy were professional music critics for a time.)

Highly arresting are the revelations of what Wagner thought of Beethoven and Weber; Schumann of Schubert, Chopin and Liszt; Tchaikowsky and Debussy of Brahms and Wagner; Gounod of Mozart; Wolf of Bruckner; Mendelssohn of Schumann and Liszt; Liszt of Chopin. Not the least important part of Kolodin's fascinating book is his foreword with its thoughtful and suggestive deductions.

O WOULD I BUT EXPRESS IN SONG (Malashkin). **TILIM BOM** (Stravinsky). **THE CAPTIVE** (Gretchaninoff). Sung by Alexander Kipnis, basso, with Celius Dougherty at the piano. Victor 15894.

Alexander Kipnis' recordings for Victor continue to be a delight. This latest record, of three Russian songs in widely different styles, is a triumph of dramatic and exciting singing. Particularly lovely is the lyric Malashkin piece, which contrasts with the acid humor of the little excerpt from Stravinsky's "Story of a Soldier." For lovers of fine singing, Kipnis recordings are a "must."

GOIN' HOME (William Arms Fisher, arranged from the Largo of the "New World Symphony" by Dvorak); **THE BAILIFF'S DAUGHTER** (Old English Ballad). Sung by Lawrence Tibbett. Victor 15491.

Our own Lawrence Tibbett records the beloved "Goin' Home" and a quaint English ballad in fine style. The ballad has a slight edge on the "Goin' Home," which Tibbett sings with excessive solemnity.

Musician of the Week

James Newill

RADIO has a way of lulling you into listening without protest to the same people week in and week out, and then with no warning suddenly introducing a newcomer who galvanizes you into attention. That's what happened several weeks ago when a smooth, resonant, beautifully trained but totally unfamiliar baritone voice started to sing Vincent Youmans' "Through the Years" on the "Ford Summer Hour." Most of the dialers were tuned in to hear Jessica Dragonette's welcome return to the air and were only mildly interested in the male star of the show. Before the hour was

were limited for fear his voice would be injured. Football was strictly taboo. But he must have sneaked up to the corner lot and done a little bit of playing, because he eventually entered the University of Southern California on a football scholarship, in company with Ernie Smith, all-time, all-pro tackle.

Newill quit college to take a job singing on a local radio station, sang small parts with the Los Angeles Opera Company. When he made the big decision to go back to being a baritone, he retired for a year and worked hard under the famous Russian singer, Nina Koshetz. He learned operatic roles,

up, listeners were scrambling for radio listings and asking each other: "James Newill—who's he? Why haven't we heard of him before?"

Residents of California probably know him, as he has been singing on local stations for some years. And Burns and Allen fans may recall a young tenor who sang popular songs on their show for a while. That was James Newill, too, during his tenor period.

"I noticed that tenors seemed to get more breaks and more money," he said. "So I decided to be one. But it didn't work. I had changed to tenoring to sing popular songs. And I realized that popular songs weren't in my line. So I went back to baritoning."

He was making \$100 a week at the time, owned a car, and was riding the crest of the wave. But the serious music bug, which had bitten him quite early in life, wouldn't leave him alone. And his mother protested silently that she hadn't raised her boy to be a tenor. She was satisfied with his natural baritone, which she had trained since his childhood. There had never been any question of his being anything but a singer. All his activities were channeled in that direction, and even sports

spent a lot of time studying style, languages, diction. That year made him a polished singer, with fine style and technique.

"Then I married, Look!" He pulled out a snapshot of a lovely blond girl, who looks as if she has a sense of humor and who makes an ideal contrast for Newill's tall, dark, broad-shouldered good looks. His looks evidently registered on a film, because Monogram Pictures signed him for a series called "Renfrew of the Mounted," in which he plays a highly moral young man who doesn't smoke or drink, gets the girl, and brings the villain to justice in every picture.

Newill and his wife live near Beverly Hills in California, and he frankly admits that the climate is more suited for loafing than for work. And that's why he likes it. His loafing is pretty strenuous and includes studying, playing a crack game of golf and making amateur movies.

He was never superstitious in his life until he sang on a broadcast with Mario Chamlee, who afterwards presented him with a dime for luck. The next day Newill was signed up for the Sunday "Ford Summer Hour"!

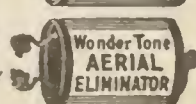
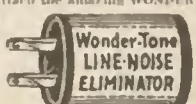
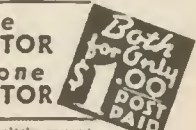

ANOTHER THIN MAN (M-G-M). William Powell and Myrna Loy in a not-up-to-par sequel to the "Thin Man." Only occasionally amusing.

BABES IN ARMS (M-G-M). A grand musical with plenty of plot about old vaudevillians and their young, with Mickey Rooney, Judy Garland.

BEYOND TOMORROW (RKO). A story of life after death which doesn't quite come off despite fine performances by Harry Carey, Charles Winninger, C. Aubrey Smith and Maria Ouspenskaya.

THE BISCUIT EATER (Paramount). The simple, beautifully told James Street story of a boy and his dog in hunting country. Good production, good cast and good scripting throughout.

BROADWAY MELODY OF 1940 (M-G-M). Lavishly produced musical that rings the bell, with Fred Astaire, Eleanor Powell and a George Murphy, who nearly steals the show with his dancing.

CASTLE ON THE HUDSON (Warner Bros.). Prison melodrama from Warden Lawes' "20,000 Years in Sing Sing," with John Garfield, Pat O'Brien, Ann Sheridan. Ann is at her acting best in this.

CONGO MAZIE (M-G-M). Sometimes amusing, always melodramatic story of a showgirl stranded in African jungle. Ann Sothern, John Carroll are in it.

THE COURAGEOUS DR. CHRISTIAN (RKO). Jean Hersholt in a film version of the kindly and benevolent country doctor he popularized on radio.

CURTAIN CALL (Warner Bros.). Light backstage drama of Broadway, with Barbara Read, Alan Mowbray, Helen Vinson.

THE DARK COMMAND (Republic). A stirring drama of guerrilla days in "Bleeding Kansas" of the '60s, with Claire Trevor, John Wayne and Walter Pidgeon. A spine-tingling historic western of near-epic proportions.

EDISON, THE MAN (M-G-M). Inspiring sequel to "Young Tom Edison" with Spencer Tracy as the adult Thomas Edison in a screen biography every American should see.

FARMER'S DAUGHTER (Paramount). An amusing comedy of summer theatricals, with Martha Raye and Charles Ruggles. Will bring many giggles.

FIGHTING 69th (Warner Bros.). Somewhat fictionalized and considerably dramatized version of a famous regiment's part in war. Effective, melodramatic and absorbing. Stars James Cagney, Pat O'Brien, George Brent and others.

FLIGHT ANGELS (Warner Bros.). A better aviation film which treats air stewardesses as human beings, not angels. Virginia Bruce, Dennis Morgan, Wayne Morris are in it.

FORTY LITTLE MOTHERS (M-G-M). Eddie Cantor plays a simple, straightforward role effectively, with a cute baby and forty little Hollywood cuties of seventeen or so supporting him.

GERONIMO (Paramount). Indian fighting in the '80's which will please youngsters, bore adults.

GHOST COMES HOME (M-G-M). A rib-tickling comedy-drama of a ne'er-do-well who

comes home after being given up for dead, makes good. Frank Morgan is whole show.

LILLIAN RUSSELL (20th Century-Fox). Alice Faye, Edward Arnold, Don Ameche revive the Gay Nineties in a screen biography of glamorous Lillian Russell. Elaborately produced, beautifully mounted.

LITTLE OLD NEW YORK (20th Century-Fox). A romanticized version of how Fulton built his steamboat, which nicely mingles history with fiction and stars Alice Faye, Fred MacMurray, Richard Greene and Brenda Joyce.

MAN FROM DAKOTA (M-G-M). A melodramatic story of prison break during the Civil War, intrigue and war adventure, with Wally Beery, Dolores del Rio.

MY FAVORITE WIFE (RKO). Another in the cycle of two-husbands-and-a-wife-or-vice-versa films, with Cary Grant and Irene Dunne as amusing principals.

MA! HE'S MAKING EYES AT ME (Universal). Light comedy with songs, starring Tom Brown and Constance Moore.

NORTHWEST PASSAGE (M-G-M). Spencer Tracy gives vivid portrayal of Major Robert Rogers and trail-blazing in this thrilling adventure drama of the Indian wars. Filmed in Technicolor, its excellent cast includes also Robert Young and Walter Brennan.

TORRID ZONE (Warner Bros.). Adventure in a banana republic which is lusty and hard-hitting, with Ann Sheridan, James Cagney, Pat O'Brien.

TURNABOUT (Hal Roach). Imaginative—and entertaining—piece in the "Topper" style about wives and husbands who exchange places. Very well done, with Carole Landis, John Hubbard, William Gargan, Adolphe Menjou.

TYPHOON (Paramount). Dorothy Lamour and Robert Preston in a "Hurricane" style film which has breath-taking Technicolor photography of tropics.

20 MULE TEAM (M-G-M). Wallace Beery is tough-skinned, tender-hearted mule-skinner in tale of good women and hard men who live off burax deposits in early Death Valley.

THREE CHEERS FOR THE IRISH (Warner Bros.). Simple, unpretentious comedy which is nicely handled by cast. Tells story of policeman forced to retire, his enmity for son-in-law who takes his place. Featured are Thomas Mitchell, Priscilla Lane, Dennis Morgan.

TOO MANY HUSBANDS (Columbia). A screwballish modernization of the Enoch Arden theme finds Jean Arthur the wife of two husbands, Melvyn Douglas and Fred MacMurray, in a riotous, laugh-provoking comedy-drama.

'TIL WE MEET AGAIN (Warner Bros.). Merle Oberon, George Brent, Pat O'Brien in a remake of "One Way Passage," a love drama of two lost souls and a love that lives after death. Thrilling and touching.

THOSE WERE THE DAYS (Paramount). College days of the early 1900's are faithfully—and humorously—portrayed here in a grand picture based on the Siwash tales, with William Holden, Bonita Granville, radio's Ezra Stone (Henry Aldrich).

TWO GIRLS ON BROADWAY (M-G-M). Joan Blondell and Lana Turner are two dancing sisters in love with George Murphy, a triangle which breaks up the vaudeville act, to say nothing of hearts.

WATERLOO BRIDGE (M-G-M). A timely remake of one of the best films to come out of the last war—soul-stirring love story of an officer and a maid parted by cannon. Robert Taylor's best. Vivien Leigh's continuing proof of her artistry.

THE WAY OF ALL FLESH (Paramount). Akim Tamiroff, as the tragic father in a heavy, sordid film, proves his ability as a character actor in the part which Emil Jannings played in the silent films.

WOMEN WITHOUT NAMES (Paramount). A capably produced and acted melodrama of a woman's prison, which is grim and unrelieved but deeply absorbing. Ellen Drew, Robert Paige and Judith Barrett are in it.

WOMEN IN WAR (Republic). Elsie Janis, "Sweetheart of the A. E. F.," lived her part in this war story in 1918, acts it now in a story of women and World War II. Melodrama of curses behind the Allied lines.

YOU CAN'T FOOL YOUR WIFE (RKO-Radio). Light comedy of young married couple's efforts to get out of the rut, with Lucille Ball, James Ellison.

YOUNG TOM EDISON (M-G-M). An excellent dramatization of Edison's boyhood days which is real and homey under the deft handling Mickey Rooney gives it. It is a splendid production, dramatic and gripping.

WAR-TIME TRANSMISSIONS FROM PARIS

WITH mechanized armies swarming like ants along the highways of northern France and dive bombers darting here and there like wasps to deposit their deadly venom, the terrible death-struggle between Allied and Nazi troops continues.

With the whine of air-raid sirens or the dull booming of not too distant heavy artillery fire sometimes audible in the background, the broadcasts from "Paris Mondial," the French government short-wave station, take on a grim reality that fairly chills one's blood.

French short-wave transmissions cannot be silenced with one successful attack, as could those of the British Broadcasting Corporation, for the simple reason that each of the three French transmitters is situated at a different location. The old 8,000-watt, "Radio Coloniale," transmitter still in daily operation, is located at Pontoise; the site of the new 25,000-watt transmitter is Les Essarts; that of the new 100,000-watt transmitter is Allouis. Transmissions of the Pontoise station are identified with the call prefix TPA; those of the Essarts station are identified with the call prefix TPB, and those of the Allouis station with the call prefix TPC.

By means of highly efficient directional aerials, French broadcasts are radiated to various parts of the world daily. Those transmissions beamed on North America are received in the United States with consistent regularity, while transmissions directed to other continents are often audible, depending upon prevailing reception conditions. The latest complete schedule of transmissions from "Paris Mondial" follows. (Clip this schedule out and keep it near your receiver for reference when tuning in short-wave programs.) Time is Central standard.

GENERAL NOTES: All outstanding prize-fights staged by Mike Jacobs and Madison Square Garden during the next year will be short-waved to Latin America over NBC short-wave stations WRCA and WNBI, under sponsorship of Adam's Hats. The return bout between Champion Joe Louis and Arturo Godoy of Chile on Thursday evening, June 20, is the first broadcast in this series. . . A new Montevideo, Uruguay, station, CXA5 (9.485), is being heard almost every evening up to approximately 7:20 p.m. CST. . . The broadcast of the Peruvian Automobile Club, for North American listeners, may now be heard over DAX4R (15.15) of Lima Saturday from 3:00 to 3:45 p.m. CST. . . The main transmitter of Chinese International Broadcasting Station XGDX-XGOV, Chungking, China, has been temporarily closed down for overhaul. In the meantime the programs are being transmitted by a low-power auxiliary station. . . VUM2, Madras, India, has shifted in frequency from 11.87 to 11.83 megs, where it can be heard coming on the air at 8:30 p.m. CST in parallel with VUD4 (15.29) of Delhi. . . WLWD, the International station of the Crosley Corp., Cincinnati, is making experimental broadcasts over its new 50,000-watt transmitter on the following frequencies: 21.65, 11.87, 9.59 and 6.06 megs.

CINCINNATI, OHIO.—On May 31 L. B. Wilson, president and general manager of station WCKY, Cincinnati, issued this statement with reference to a proposed radio talk by Earl Browder: "We fully sympathize with the position of the Columbia Broadcasting System in the matter of Earl Browder's Sunday night talk (June 2). Columbia believes that the law should be changed so that no broadcaster is compelled to give time to the candidates of any political party if it is proven to be subservient to a foreign power. We agree with this belief and hope that the law will be amended quickly. WCKY also believes that it is not the intent and purpose of the Federal Communications Act to force American radio to give aid and comfort to the enemies of our republic. Earl Browder, now under indictment for alleged violation of a federal law, has publicly admitted taking orders from a foreign power. His party is not legally recognized under the laws of Ohio. The

President and the Congress, as well as other patriotic Americans everywhere, recognize our need for tightening defenses on every front. We are certain it is not in the public interest to broadcast pro-Nazi, pro-Communist speeches at this time. No issue of free speech is involved when the flames of the European catastrophe menace our institutions. WCKY will not broadcast the Sunday night speech by the Communist candidate. Instead we shall devote the period to a program of patriotic music."

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The Columbia Broadcasting System broadcast the talk of Earl Browder June 2, upon his being chosen as presidential candidate by the Communist party. Before and after the speech, however, the CBS announcer explained that the law compelled the network to extend facilities to all political parties alike, but that the network had made the official suggestion that the law be changed so as not to compel networks to grant time to parties proved to be subservient to foreign governments.

CHICAGO, ILL.—While changing trains in Chicago, Eddie Cantor revealed that

he had sold that magnificent Tudor mansion at Great Neck, L. I., for \$40,000, less than ten percent of its original cost of almost a half-million dollars when it was built in 1929. The Cantors had occupied the place only about six months in over ten years. The comedian also disclosed that his fall program for Ipana and Sal Hepatica will originate in New York, not Hollywood.

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—It is pretty generally rumored that all is not well between Lana Turner, movie glamour girl, and Artie Shaw, stormy petrel of swing, who surprised the public with an elopement a few months ago. Some rumors say Lana will divorce Artie and marry Greg Bautzer, her former fiance.

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—A commendable step is being taken by Al Pearce with a novel program idea. Recognizing, as do many people, that there is much good professional talent in radio deserving of a broader outlet than is given them by local stations where they perform, Pearce is doing something about it. He is prospecting for

outstanding talent throughout the country to give the "hidden light" pros an opportunity on his Coast-to-Coast Camel show. The first lucky artist spotlighted was Bonnie King, of station KMBC, Kansas City, a singer with a fresh style. She was presented June 7.

CHICAGO, ILL.—Bob Hope and troupe broke all records, including Sally Rand's 1933 draw, with his one week's appearance at the Chicago Theater recently, pulling 128,000 persons into the theater, with crowds lining up around the block at each performance.

ON THE BANDWAGON

News of the band world—record reviews, romance rumors, gossip about your favorite melody men

IN THE summer of 1935, at Westchester County's (N. Y.) Glen Island Casino, the freres Dorsey—Tommy and Jimmy—came to a parting of the ways, split their band partnership and embarked upon individual band careers. The brothers had a wealth of experience on trombone and saxophone, respectively, had played with the nation's foremost jazz orchestras. Their musical ideas, as to their own band, just varied. Today in New York both brothers, Tommy at the Astor Roof, Jimmy on the Pennsylvania Roof, are in direct competition. The saga of Jimmy's band we will reserve for next week's Bandwagon. Now we tell you about Tommy's great crew which, in addition to its NBC stints from the Astor and its Victor record session, takes over the Bob Hope commercial time for the summer. Highlighting Tommy's golden trombone tone, the trumpeting of Bunny Berigan and the vocals of Frank Sinatra, the Dorsey band is equally deft at sweet and swing, as witness its arrangements of "Fools Rush In" and "March of the Toys." Its song-title ensemble backgrounds to solo vocals, as typified in "Marie" and "Yearning" among others, immediately identifies the Dorsey band to Mr. Average Radio Listener. The band, theme-singing "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You," lines up with Tommy, Mahanoy Plains, Pa., George Arus, Detroit, Mich., Lowell Martin, Coral Gables, Fla., Les Jenkins, Shawnee, Okla., trombones; Bunny Berigan, Fox Lake, Wis., Jimmy Blake, Medford, Mass., Leon Dobrow, Bloomfield, N. J., Ray Linn, Chicago, Ill., trumpets; Fred Stulce, Dallas, Tex., Johnny Mince, Chicago Heights, Ill., Hymie Shertzer, New York City, Don Lodice, Long Island, N. Y., Paul Mason, Marlinton, W. Va., saxophones; Sid Weiss, Sche-

nectady, N. Y., bass; Buddy Rich, Brooklyn, N. Y., drums; Joe Bushkin, New York City, piano; Frank Sinatra, Jersey City, N. THE SOUND- MAN

This man presides over a library of 12,000 canned sounds.
He has the most fantastic job in radio. He's a soundman

Here is the fifth article in a "Men Behind the Dial" series. It is NBC soundman Walter Snow's story of his job, as told to Kate Holliday, and it will be followed in next week's issue by a sixth article, on the musician, presenting Leith Stevens, brilliant young musical director of such shows as "Big Town" and "Ford Summer Hour."—Editor.

CAN you imagine a radio program without sound? It doesn't matter which type it is—dramatic show, comedy show, or even news broadcast—can you conceive of a half-hour of only dialog? If you think of radio without sound, then you realize what a tremendous part auditory effects play in the broadcasting industry.

Radio being one dimensional, being concerned only with the ear, it is naturally handicapped. For that reason, every element which will convey an audible image is highly necessary. The preconceived sound-effect is, of course, one of the most powerful of these elements, in that the mere suggestion of an idea—by the use of sound—will often carry more of an image to the listener than reams of dialog.

You have probably read in the past of the many strange things we soundmen do to get our effects, and it may seem to you a very screwy business. It may seem as if we were only undeveloped boys who were still playing with toys and blocks. But I assure you that our work is by no means simply done. Neither are we simple-minded.

In the first place, our field is divided roughly into three parts: Effects which are on records; effects which are manual and must be done by the soundman himself while the program is in progress; and combinations of the two. When I tell you that there are about twelve thousand sounds on records alone, you will begin to realize that the making of noises is no simple thing.

In the NBC studios in Hollywood, we keep our record collection in a room lined with shelves an inch apart. The records are cataloged much as you would catalog books, and are divided into ten main groupings. These are: Human sounds, which include crowd noises of varying types; natural sounds, which take in wind, surf,

thunder, water, etc.; domestic-animal sounds; wild-animal sounds; automobiles, and all the hundreds of noises one associates with a car; trains; aircraft; bells, whistles and sirens; crashes of all kinds; and warfare, both personal and national.

Each of these main classifications is subdivided dozens of times. For instance, the group on aircraft not only includes planes idling, planes taking off, planes diving, spinning, crashing, but also the types of planes, and the noises you hear from different makes and sizes of motors.

These disks are made in the same way as the records you buy, with the exception that there is rarely only one noise to a record. In many cases there are as many as ten to one side of the recording. We tell which is which by a small index which is printed on the label and then counting the bands to find the right cut.

The records themselves are played on a series of turntables on the top of a movable sound-truck which is wheeled into the studio and placed near a separate microphone from the one used by the actors. In rehearsal or on the air, these turntables—usually mounted three to a truck—are all in motion constantly. Thus a record may be played in a minimum of time, and we may use two or three records at once to get a combination of effects.

MANUAL effects include those things which cannot be recorded well and those which must be created by the soundman. There are hundreds of these, of course.

But before we get into the more difficult things, let me surprise you. For telephone and door bells, we have actual instruments which are fixed on portable boxes and run by batteries. This is one time when the sound you hear is really what you think it is! The same is true of door and window noises. In the sound-department, we have dozens of doors and windows of all types which are set into portable frames, and are identical to ordinary doors, except for their height. The soundman opens and closes these as specified by the script.

Manual effects, however, also include sounds which we have to dream up for a difficult program. For instance,

when Arch Oboler and James Cagney dramatized "Johnny Got His Gun," we wanted you to hear the vibrations which a basket case feels while lying in bed, caused by footsteps in his room. You can see that this is a very delicate thing to put on the air. It was finally solved by the head of our sound-department, Harry Saz. A crystal microphone, of the type used in airplane factories to test strains in construction, was placed on the top of a box in which were mounted a set of bed-springs. The microphone picked up the vibrations caused by moving the box slightly, and the sound was then amplified. The amplification was played in turn through a small speaker, which gave the desired effect not

only of the vibrations of bed-springs but also those vibrations as heard by someone lying in bed. Incidentally, that was the first time that this particular microphone had ever been used on the air.

Do you still think this is a simple business?

From this you can see, I'm sure, one of the prime requisites of a good soundman—he must have imagination. He must be able to "hear" sounds mentally and know what will produce them. The men in my department, you see, ultimately will have invented a good reproduction of practically every sound in the universe. But even though we have devised thousands of them now, we have really only started on the task. The noises that we have not already used must be created whenever they are called for by a script, usually on one or two days' notice.

ANOTHER requisite is that we have manual dexterity. We often use as many as thirty different records on a show, as well as an infinite amount of manual effects. I have wished many times that I had at least three extra pairs of hands!

A soundman should also be what is called in the theater a "quick study." We hardly ever have time to look at a script while the show is in progress, and we must, therefore, often memorize our cues so that no time will be lost. When you have fifty or sixty cues, this is not too easy!

But, besides the requisites mentioned above, the most important single element is an excellent sense of timing. To my work, this is just as important as it is to an actor.

If, for instance, on a comedy show there is a definite laugh-line followed by a sound-effect which starts a new gag or sequence, the soundman must know exactly when to use that sound. If he waits too long he will drag the show. If he comes in too soon he will kill the laugh. Either way, it's bad. And, since the audience laugh is of indeterminate length, in this case there is no actual cue to work from.

A BASEBRAWLER

Talks

Back!



Bob Elson, the gent who's looking you in the eye at the right, is one of radio's pioneer baseball announcers. He has announced several World's Series for MBS, and regularly announces White Sox and Cub games over station WGN, Chicago. Because he is one of the oldest and best of the broadcasters whom famed ex-ballplayer Guy Bush called "basebawlers" in a *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* article last week, Elson has been invited to answer here the charges Bush made in "Those Basebawlers."—Editor.

MY GOOD friend, Guy Bush, in last week's issue of *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE*, took a full wind-up and cut the inside corner with what he figured was a strike in a little satire on my profession, quaintly titled "Those Basebawlers!"

Guy seems to object quite strenuously to a form of sports presentation that dally brings entertainment to millions, among them the sick, the blind, the hopelessly crippled—the latter people who enjoy sports too but are denied actual attendance by physical frailties beyond their control. It is a type of sports presentation that has received the whole-hearted endorsement of progressive major-league magnates, and includes among its staunch advocates P. K. Wrigley of the Chicago Cubs, with which team Bush himself put in the most productive years of his baseball career.

Mr. Bush, in his literary effort, showed the same intense concentration which marked his career out there on the pitching-mound, but from here on the similarity ceased. When the editors of *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* asked me to sit down and tap out a rebuttal for the good Guy's mutterings, I must confess I soon find myself wondering what all the shouting was about. If Guy made any really solid points, I failed to catch them, but since I am this far along, I might as well take this opportunity to present a few observations on baseball broadcasting as drawn from a background of some ten years on the assignment and covering everything up to and including the world series over an exclusive Coast-to-Coast Mutual network.

In the first place—and I wish to emphasize this—baseball announcers have never made any pretense that a baseball broadcast was anything but second best to actual attendance at a game. Secondly, I should like to make it clear that we do not set ourselves up as paragons, but we do feel, quite decidedly, that we have improved from

year to year, learning as we go along in what necessarily must stand as a new field, and that today the vast listening audience is getting an accurate, intimate and complete word-picture on what is transpiring on the various baseball fields throughout the nation.

Now, as to the fellows actually working before the microphones from the ball parks, I should like to take the liberty of quoting Guy.

"Is that stuff that comes shrleking

out of a loudspeaker what they call baseball broadcasting?" Mr. Bush would know. He then goes on to say: "Personally, I like baseball broadcasters (and we like you too, Guy). Everyone I have met is a fine fellow, possessing a degree of talent, else he wouldn't have his job. But the point is, why don't they get those talents together?"

Mr. Bush invades a delicate field with this pitch—the field of human na-

ture and human capabilities. We might, along the same line of reasoning, ask Guy why Terry Moore's place in the major leagues is founded to a great extent on his remarkable fielding, while a fellow like Rudy York, say, owes his place in a major-league lineup to his ability to hit a baseball often and for prodigious distances. George Case has built his reputation on searing speed, which he last year crystallized into the base-stealing championship of the major leagues.

How many men in Guy Bush's own field do we find able to hit, to field, to run, to throw in the manner of a Tris Speaker or Joe Di Maggio? In other words, how many perfect ballplayers do we find?

In baseball broadcasting, a similar situation prevails. We have announcers who appeal to different groups by following the style to which they are best adapted. Some are highly technical, as is charged, and matter-of-fact, but if there be any doubt that some baseball fans like their broadcasts that way, you have only to remember that the matter-of-fact announcer has a sponsor, and if the appeal wasn't there, he wouldn't be there—make no mistake about that.

The same goes for the others Guy has "typed"—the hysterical type, the slow type, the casual type.

They have styles just as ballplayers have styles. When you get an announcer who combines the various features, the best features, of all of them into a smoothly blended product acceptable to the great majority, then you get a standout, of course, and if one is inclined to press the question, "Why aren't there more of this kind?" we could come right back with the counter-query:

"Why aren't there more Joe Di Maggios in big-league baseball?"

But the basic point in this line of reasoning, the thing to remember, is that all the various types that are broadcasting baseball are selling not only baseball but the products of their sponsors, and when you get into the commercial side of it, you'll discover that a pretty universal truth holds: the man putting his money into a baseball broadcast wants results. And don't think that if he wasn't getting results he would continue to make baseball available to the listening public.

In his attempt to "type" the baseball-announcing field, Guy came up with a couple of points on which I should like to dwell for a few moments.

On these pages last week, Guy Bush bawled out the basebawlers. Now a veteran ballcaster replies

He classifies one group as the "quick on the trigger" type, and then pulls forth the old chestnut of the announcer who tells of the "long drive towards right field that looks like a homer" which ultimately winds up as a pop fly in the hands of the second baseman. In other words, exaggeration for effect—by Mr. Bush, not the announcer. This is one of the old saws of the profession, and it has been kicked around from one sport to another ever since someone in the infant days of radio possibly became involved in such a situation.

But if you tell me that present-day baseball announcers who are used to looking at 154 ballgames a season can't tell whether a ball is going to be out of the park or into the hands of the second baseman, I'll tell you, quite frankly, that you don't know what you're talking about.

NOW let's consider the second point, namely, that of the broadcaster whom Guy chooses to call "the over-enthusiastic, home-town fan type." Again using Mr. Bush's own words, this fellow "gloats mightily when his pets are in the lead, literally sulks when they're having tough going. In his eye every feat by the homelings is magnificent and heroic, every accomplishment by the other side is lucky, fluky or the result of skulduggery by the umpire."

On this charge, Mr. Bush can rightly be accused of the most violent kind of overstatement.

Speaking for myself, I can sincerely say that I have never followed any other policy than that of building up the Chicago Cubs and the Chicago White Sox, which happen to be the home teams in so far as our WGN broadcasts are concerned, only in the proportion to which they fit into the general pattern of the game itself, and certainly never to the disparagement of other teams in their respective leagues.

A majority of announcers operate along this theory, and I question whether one of the type mentioned by Bush could survive for long. After all, even the most partisan of baseball crowds generally are quick to applaud superlative effort on the part of a rival, and we always have taken as much pleasure in achievements of other individuals and teams as we have in those of the Cubs and White Sox.

I do not mean by this that an announcer should be completely impartial, because there is a rooting element

in all of us and the listener wants this satisfied. But the announcer's enthusiasm for the home-town club should be of a restrained type, the kind that enjoys and hopes for the success of the home team, but certainly not to the extent of moaning and alibiing when that success is denied by the superior play of a rival.

Then, too, there's another angle, although not many stations run into it. We do, because the station for which I broadcast, WGN, regularly is heard throughout the Midwest, and that means we go into the locale of other fan followings—those of the Cincinnati Reds, the St. Louis Cardinals and Browns, the Detroit Tigers and Cleveland Indians. You couldn't expect these listeners to keep tuned to an announcer who belittled the talents of their own heroes while falsely building up the virtues of what, to them, are rivals.

But the main point in this particular discussion is that it is not, in the final analysis, a single team that counts, but rather it is the game of baseball itself which is all-important. The various teams are merely contributing factors, and nearly all broadcasters recognize this and slant their programs accordingly.

The radio booths have, in recent years, absorbed many former players, and even an umpire—fellows like Charlie Grimm, Lew Fonseca, Frank Frisch, Tris Speaker, Jack Graney, Harry Heilmann, Gabby Street, Waite Hoyt and Dolly Stark. Guy finds fault with them on the grounds that—and again I quote—"they speak the language of the diamond, which all of us who have been in the game understand. But I'm wondering if the every-

day fan, whose knowledge of inside baseball naturally is limited, gets all the fast pitching of the player-announcers."

I'm glad he brought that up, because it sets up a point which I have long held: Is the so-called "inside baseball" so highly technical that it is beyond the grasp of the average fan? Frankly, I don't think so, and have come to believe that dugout erudition is overemphasized.

BASEBALL is, by structure, a game of sporadic action—its plays leave time for anticipation and retrospection. The squeeze, the hit-and-run, the cut-off—their mechanics are, I believe, as familiar to the baseball fan as they are to the player, for in no game is the fan as keenly alert to what is happening as is the case in baseball. Perhaps he doesn't always know the situations which would call for the use of the different machinations which go to make up "inside baseball," but he quickly spots those machinations once they do go into effect.

I like to think that radio has helped build up the fans' knowledge of this technical side of the game through our field interviews with players and managers and umpires, and our constant reference to this phase of baseball during the course of our play-by-play accounts of games.

No, I don't think anyone is talking over the head of today's baseball fan, and to say that they are is, I believe, to insult the intelligence of the most highly intelligent fan-following now extant in the wide realm of sport.

During the course of Mr. Bush's rambling epistle, he has occasion to

refer to the 1932 world series and the celebrated case of Babe Ruth calling his "shot"—the shot being a Gargantuan home run into the center-field bleachers at approximately the spot where the Babe had pointed meaningfully a moment before.

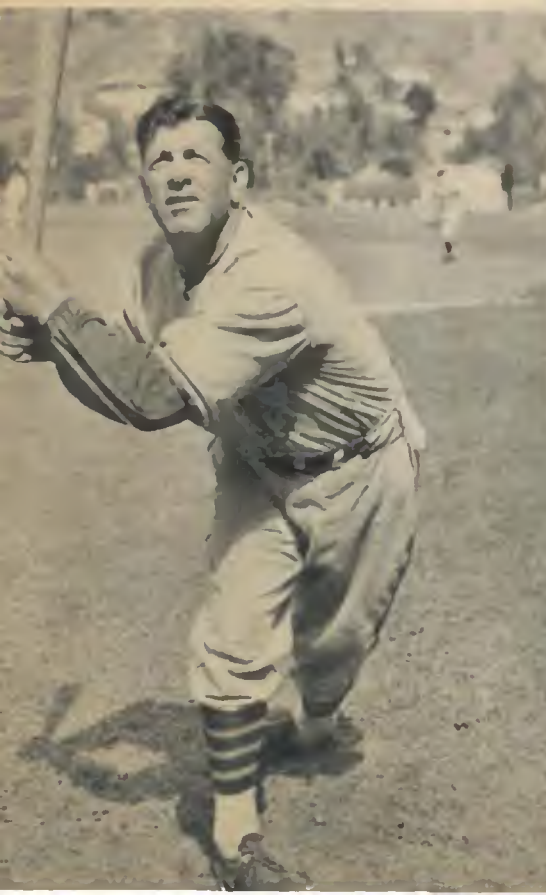
Mr. Bush cites this as an instance in which the inaccuracy of not only the radio but the newspapers as well stands forth in the most naked relief. For, according to the Bush version, Guy himself was the leader of a particularly vicious anti-Ruth campaign, and when the Babe had two strikes on him and majestically waved his finger in the direction of the center-field bleachers in the grandiose manner which only the Babe knew, he did so inadvertently, merely pointing out to the Cub bench, according to Bush, that he still had the big strike left.

The fact that his finger happened to be directed towards the outfield confines became just a coincidence, Mr. Bush hastens to tell us in this exclusive expose, when the next ball arched out of the park along the line of flight designated by the Ruth finger but a moment before.

It seems to have grieved Mr. Bush deeply that the radio and the newspapers painted the incident in such bold and Homeric strokes. I don't know what he expected us to do—dash down from the roof and demand of the Babe, then and there, that he state his intentions like a man. To one gazing down on the scene, Ruth pointed towards the center-field bleachers and then hit into them, and it seems at this late date that Brother Bush is putting quite a delicate shading on an exploit the sports world has seen fit to accept these many years.

But what if the Babe was only indicating that there was still one strike left and his finger just happened to sag along the line of flight of that home run? (Ruth himself said several years later that that had been the case.) What difference does it make? The Babe was mighty and so were his deeds, and if he happened into one here, it's just another tribute to a man who could accidentally make the fans, his fans, believe a story as fabulous as the one of the "called" home run.

It's things like that which put the bright splash of color on the sports scene, and Mr. Bush, and others, had best leave them stand as they are, for even if they don't accept them, the sports fans will—and do . . .

THE SOUNDMAN

He must know instinctively when to hit with his sound.

He must also be completely on cue when the sound is written into the script. For example, we make the noise of a person walking on snow by filling two smallish sacks with cornstarch and twisting these in the rhythm of the steps. If the actor is speaking in a labored manner, if he is acting out the fact that he is having difficulty climbing a snow-covered hill and is panting slightly, we must keep in exact time with his spoken footsteps—if you get what I mean.

On sudden sounds, such as the shooting of a gun, we must again have an instinctive sense of the precise moment when the sound will be most effective. And we must be prepared in advance in our minds so that there is not the slightest break between our thought and the sound as you hear it. That, my friends, is timing!

When a show is going into rehearsal, we get the script a few days ahead of time. As Carlton Morse and Vick Knight told you, the author or the producer writes into the script the effects he wants to hear over the air. But he may not realize that when he says "SOUND: WIND" there are dozens of different types of wind we could use in that spot. We have to figure out which type he wants, whether it is to be a zephyr or a tornado. When he goes over our material at rehearsal, therefore, we present him with several different noises of wind and let him make a choice. The effect he decides upon is rehearsed strenuously so that nothing can go wrong.

The noises on records are particularly rehearsed, since it is often their volume which is most important. For instance, the sound of a car skidding into a crash is recorded as one unit. However, we have to take into consideration whether that car is right in front of the actor, whether it is twenty feet away, or whether it is down a block or two. Also, we have to notice if the car skids as it is going by the actor and crashes away from him, or whether the whole thing takes place away from him. All of these elements enter into the volume of the sound as we take it off the record.

As you can see, the same is true of crowd noises, planes diving, animals howling, and all the other things.

WHEN the sounds are set to the producer's satisfaction, we must arrange them according to the script. This is highly important, since we are probably going to be working so quickly while we are on the air that we will not have a chance to pick out the proper record from the many to be used. Everything must be in order of play, and everything must be close at hand so that we shall not waste time getting it in front of the microphone. Add to the speed element the fact that we are often using both record and manual effects at the same time, and you evolve the reason why soundmen run from guys in little white coats!

As an example of a combination effect, let me cite that of Jack Benny's famous Maxwell. What you hear coming out of your speaker is composed, first, of an old-fashioned oval wash-boiler. Yes, the kind they used to use down in the Kentucky mountings! This is made of copper and is quarter filled with the most ancient of junk—nuts, bolts, tin cans and old motor parts. On the top of this are two boards on

which is mounted a small electric motor, the size used in a mechanical cake-beater. When we are on the air, you do not hear the motor, but the vibrations cause the wash-boiler to shake and rattle and make horrible noises such as an old Maxwell might make.

Besides this intricate set-up, we also use both a record and an oral effect. The record is of a comedy automobile, and gives us the sounds of headlights and fenders all clattering like crazy. The oral effect is one of steam, and is done by the soundman, who expels his breath abruptly through a half-closed mouth.

AND that is Jack Benny's Maxwell when you add it all up! But please remember that this is only one effect out of a half-hour program. You can see now why everything must be ready for our hands before we go on the air.

While the show is in progress, we are given our cues by the producer. He, after all, can hear how the show sounds, since he is in the control-room. So we must watch him constantly in order that he may tell us by signals if the volume and the quality of sound are correct.

And, after the show, we collapse! There are many tales, of course, of ingenious things which have been rigged up for special effects. And we soundmen love to tell them. Stop me if you have . . .

Do you remember when a dramatization of the "Telltale Heart" by Poe was done by Boris Karloff a year or so ago? You know the story, I'm sure. It's about a murderer who is trapped by his own imagination that he hears the heart of the person he has killed beating louder and louder in his brain.

That heart had to be beating all through the show, and our soundmen nearly went insane trying to get something that sounded heart-like. They tried tapping on leather, tapping on felt, and everything else they could think of. Finally, in desperation, one of the crew stripped to the waist, held a microphone to his chest, and asked how it sounded. It still wasn't perfect.

So the sound was piped from the microphone into one of our two echo chambers. These are rooms about ten feet square with absolutely nothing in them but a speaker and a microphone. The sound enters the room, bounces around from wall to wall, and the reverberations are picked up by the mike. When this particular heart-sound was run through the echo chamber, amplified and fed into a speaker, it was the telltale heart in person!

I have told you of some of the actual instances of sound-invention because I wanted you to know that some of the easiest sounding things are some of the hardest to produce. And I'm sure that you can see by now that we must have not only the item but the type of the item. If we have the effect of water, we must know what kind of water it is—whether it is from a tap, an ocean, a stream, a shower, a rainstorm, a heavy rainstorm, a cloudburst, or a super-cloudburst! All the various degrees and differences of sound must be duplicated.

It is a fascinating and fantastic business. All over the country there are men who do nothing but invent the sounds you hear so that your audible image may be perfect when you turn on your radio. And if you think their work is not important, just imagine radio without it!

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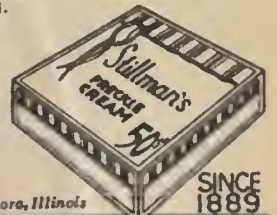
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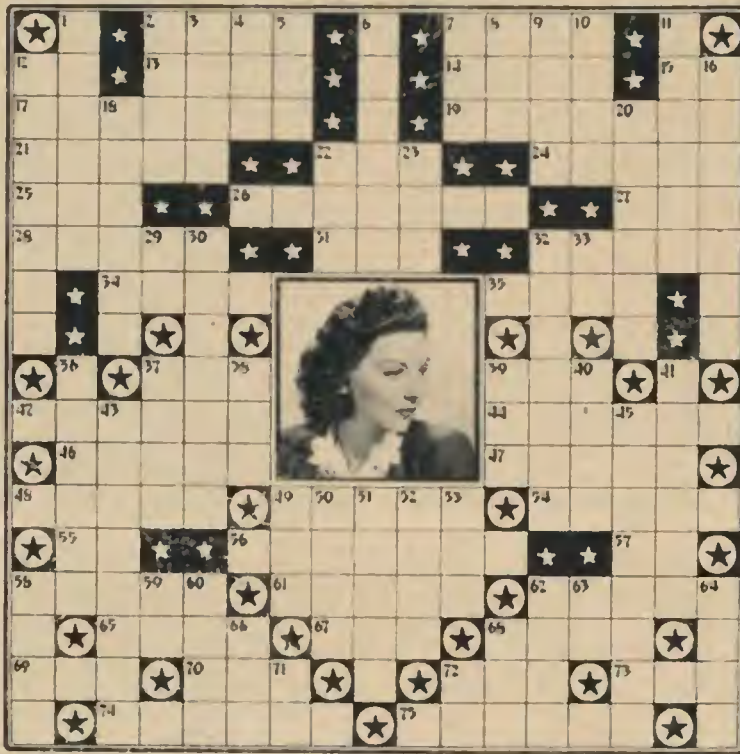
