A memorandum from Paul W. White, director of news broadcasts for CBS, has just reached this desk. Although it is a memo addressed to the members of the CBS news organization, many of its points clarify so well the problem of news broadcasting that MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE prints excerpts herewith. We quote:

"PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has said that America is the best-informed nation in the world. This is because we have a free radio and a free press. In war-time it becomes more important than ever that we should continue to be the best-informed people in the world. This is essential for two reasons: First, in order that military and civilian morale be kept at the highest possible level so that we may win the war and win it as quickly as possible. Second, in order that the nation may be kept keenly conscious of why we are fighting this war, to the end that we may also win the peace . . .

"In keeping America the best-informed nation in the world in war-time we obviously face new difficulties and certain limitations. We should do our utmost to surmount the difficulties and to circumscribe the limitations to absolutely essential areas and to apply them, even within those areas, with common sense and judgment. In other words, let us never adopt a negative attitude of fear and retreat so that we search out for ourselves self-imposed areas of intellectual blackout. Rather let us try to keep on illuminating every area of the national life, our own military effort and the manifold phases of the world struggle as far as we can possibly do so with assurance that we are doing good and not harm. Thus, we will be using all our skill and judgment in adopting our trained resources of manpower and our technical

facilities to shedding light and not darkness. This, of course, we must do without running counter to the national objectives.

"American democracy has functioned always in a spirit of free speech, which has involved free and open criticism. This function must be preserved lest any serious mistakes go undetected and uncorrected, and lest the people lose confidence in their leaders because they feel that they are being told too little . . .

"Our news operation in war-time, therefore, is not essentially different from what it is in peace-time. We simply have to apply the same judgments and the same skills to new problems.

"In evaluating news we should, of course, look first of all to official and qualified sources, second to the press associations

and our own world-wide news-gathering facilities, and third to rumor, voluntary informants, broadcasts by enemy nations, and so on. Extreme care and vigilance must be used in accepting material from any of the last-mentioned sources . . .

"From time to time, as different conditions develop that cannot now be foreseen, we intend to issue supplements to this memorandum. They will be sent to every CBS news editor, writer, reporter, announcer and analyst . . . The important thing to all of us is that we build—and keep on building—public confidence in our news. That confidence should prove a valuable machine tool in the production of victory."

These columns have already touched upon the grand job radio has done in gearing itself to an all-out war effort. The excerpts quoted above are further proof.

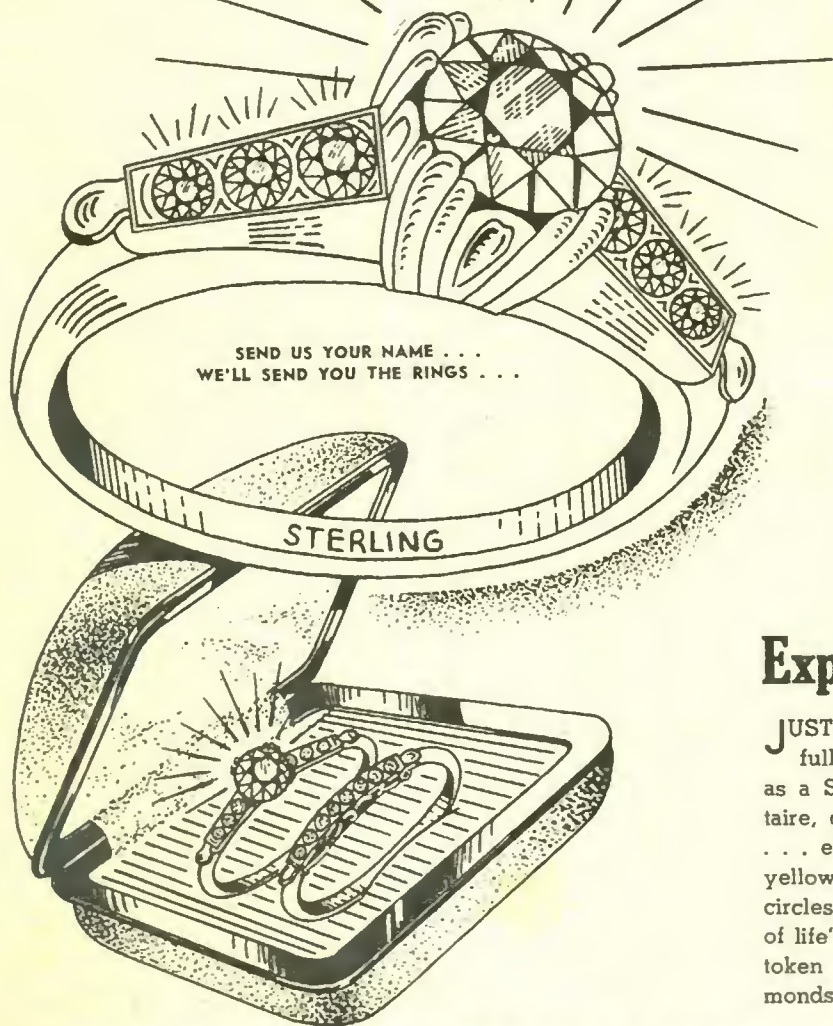

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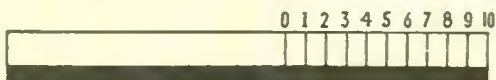

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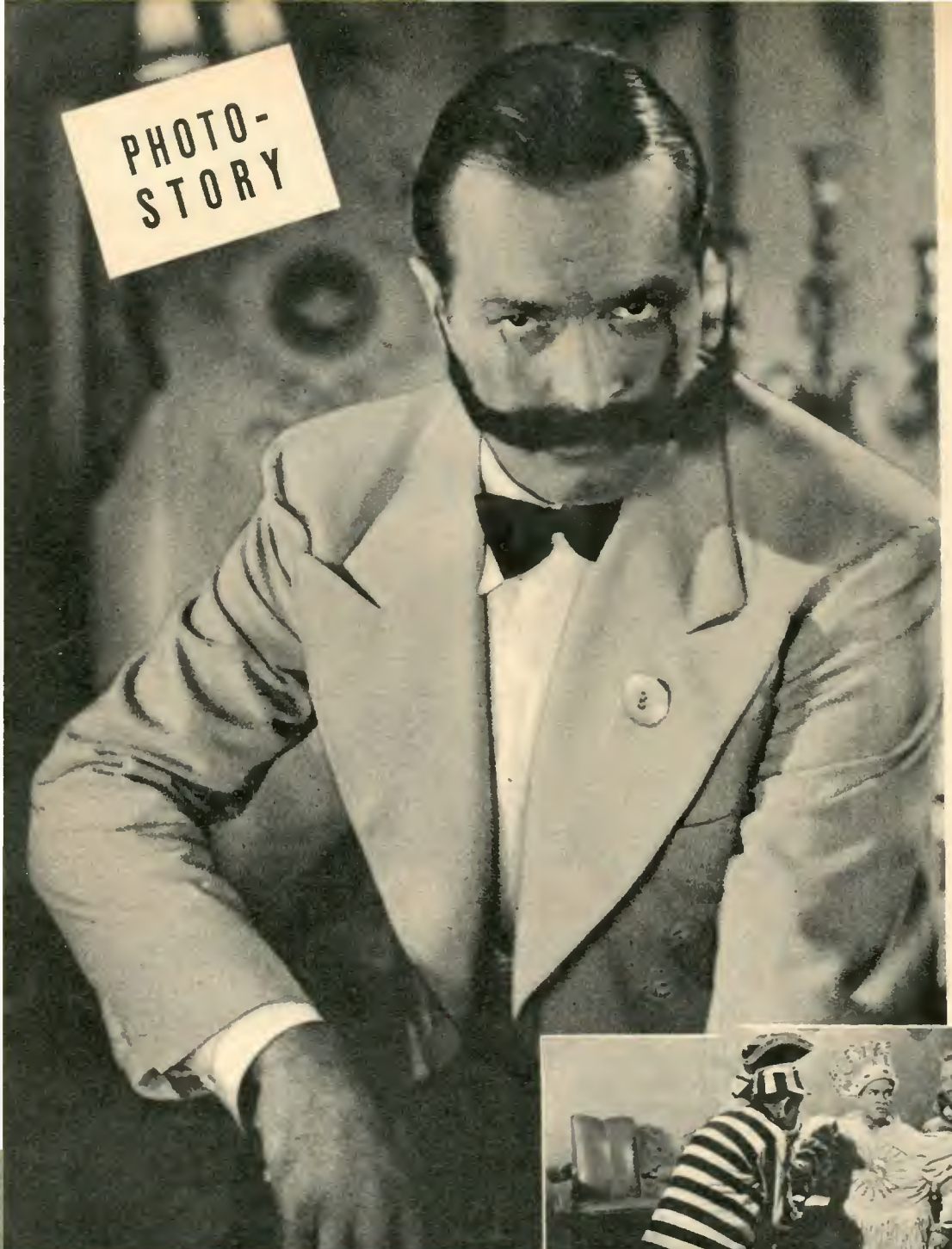

BOB HOPE'S FUNNIEST PICTURE YET!

"LOUISIANA PURCHASE" has no connection with the deal whereby Tom Jefferson paid Napoleon Bonaparte \$15,000,000 for the Louisiana Territory. As a Broadway stage hit, in which form it grossed \$1,679,000 during a fifty-eight-week run, it was strictly modern musical comedy. It's still that in the Technicolor screen version by Paramount. What's more, it's Bob Hope in the most uproariously funny picture he has yet made! It also has six members of the original stage cast, including Victor Moore, Zorina and Irene Bordoni.

Paramount's stubby, moon-faced Buddy De Sylva is the gentleman responsible for this extravaganza. Writer of five hundred songs (fifty of them hits), old hand in the theatrical game, De Sylva became head of Paramount Studios about a year ago, prepared to give motion pictures the benefit of his magical hit-producing touch. At the time, he had three Broadway musical-comedy hits—"Panama Hattie" and "Du Barry Was a Lady," besides "Louisiana Purchase."

The story idea for "Louisiana Purchase" is De Sylva's own—a frivolous, gag-bedecked affair in which a bunch of political tricksters in the mythical town of New Orleans, Louisiana, get into trouble with a U. S. Senator, and in which color runs riot with spectacular scenes, ranging from the gorgeous Mardi Gras to the climaxing filibuster by Bob Hope. Portraying a state representative, Bob packs the filibuster with typical Hope humor, comes through with what is probably the funniest scene of his film career.

Music in the film is superb with eight Irving Berlin tunes. Girls are legion with front-line beauties picked from over eight hundred tests. Mardi Gras scenes set a record in Hollywood extravagance, with dream-like floats and bacchanalian frolics. But it is Bob Hope's performance that makes "Louisiana Purchase" unique, even compared with the stage version, even compared with previous Hope laugh riots.

NEITHER "Dog Bites Man" nor "Man Bites Dog" is a startling headline any more. But "Crocodile Eats Man"—that's news! And when such a saurian snack happens to be a photographic illusion, it's still an interesting item because of its goose-pimpling realism. It just goes to show what magic the movie cameras can work these days. They can show a man in the water very obviously being devoured by a huge live crocodile—and the

next day the man shows up with a sound body ready for more work of the same sort. You'll see this and many more wonders that are wrought by a Technicolor camera and the \$1,000,000 Alexander Korda spent reproducing in authentic detail the tropical color of Rudyard Kipling's "The Jungle Book," to be seen very shortly on the country's screens after three years of preparation and production. —D. M.

WHATEVER the props, it's always a pyramiding sequence of hysterio-comics when Abbott and Costello are let loose before the grinding cameras. This time, as a pair of drug-store cowboys from Brooklyn who get jobs as peanut-vendors at a Long Island rodeo, the boys suddenly find themselves shanghaied into a transcontinental trip where they play

nurse maids to a herd of wild steers. With the Merry Macs of radio as music-makers, with Dick Foran and Anne Gwynne providing romance, Universal's "Ride 'Em Cowboy" may well be the greatest funny-bone tickler Abbott and Costello have yet made. It's burlesque on bucking broncos. It's slapstick in sage-brush! —J. C.

WALT DISNEY'S never-never-land animals, Donald Duck, Mickey Mouse and all the others, have made friends for the U. S. in every corner of the world. Everywhere these lovable creatures are greeted with shrieks of delight. Everywhere they are ambassadors of good-will. Because of this, if for no other reason, Walt Disney may go down in history as one of the United States' ace diplomats of World War II.

In French Equatorial Africa, General DeGaulle's Free French planes are adorned by portraits of an aviator Donald Duck pulling a Hitler-faced worm out of the ground. Mickey Becomes a Husband

By far and large the most important happening of the fortnight at the film capital was the marriage of Mickey Rooney, twenty-one, to Ava Gardner, nineteen, on January 10 at Bullard, Calif., about forty miles north of Santa Barbara. Nuptials, carefully planned in secret to avoid crowds, news cameras and newshawks, took place in the morning, and by noon "Andrew Hardy" Rooney and his pretty southern missus were speeding northward to the Del Monte Hotel at Del Monte, Calif., there to honeymoon a few days before Mickey had to leave for Boston, Mass., where he is scheduled to appear January 22 at a Red Cross fund rally—accompanied by his pretty brunette bride. Strangely enough, just prior to his wedding, Mickey had completed his latest Andy

Hardy film, titled "Andy Hardy's Courtship." It may, therefore, be assumed that the screen-going public may next see "The Marriage of Andy Hardy."

War Ends Studio Tours

Unpopular yet necessary evil that Hollywood movie lots have endured these many years have been the studio tours whereby movie-goers, almost total strangers to the screen show industry, might see how pictures are made and clamor at the stars for autographs. Tours have been a pain in the neck to the producers. And now the pain is cured. As an emergency war measure, and to protect the lots against possible saboteurs, no one, not even a producer's cousin or maiden aunt, will be admitted to the lots unless they happen to be officially and fully accredited newspaper or magazine correspondents, or actually

"Vaudeville for Victory"

Vaudeville came to life for a night in Hollywood January 24 when the stars staged "Vaudeville for Victory" at the Music Box Theater. Glamour boys were ushers, glamour girls dispensed programs, vaudeville-wise stars entertained—and every penny from the cash-box went to help buy a bomber for the American air force. In charge of Peter Godfrey and Howard Young, the show highlighted Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, amateur magician Chester Morris and Reginald Gardiner, famed for his imitations.

Sequel for "How Green"

Darryl Zanuck announces that 20th Century-Fox will make a sequel to "How Green Was My Valley," which already has been hailed as one of the great films of the last decade. Richard Llewellyn, author of the best-seller novel, will write the sequel, bringing the surviving characters through the pre-war years and up to the present, with Welsh miners back in the pits to give Britain the coal she needs in her war effort. Roddy McDowall, Walter Pidgeon and Maureen O'Hara, who appeared in "How Green Was My Valley," will star again.

Gorilla Priorities

Hollywood producers have been warned that their present stock of gorillas probably will have to last for the duration of the war. Max Factor, Jr., who makes the animals from leather and hair, mounts them on aluminum frames, said the industry has just four now. Since real gorillas aren't good actors on movie sets, the Factor creations are "musts" for many film thrillers.

Cast: Bob Hope, Vera Zorina, Victor Moore, Irene Bordon, Dona Drake and Raymond Walburn. A Paramount Technicolor production; directed by Irving Cummings; screen play by Jerome Chodorov and Joseph Fields. based on the musical comedy by Morrie Ryskind from the story by B. G. De Sylva. Music and lyrics by Irving Eerlin.

Type of Picture: This is strictly a musical comedy fantasy in color, with accent on the comedy (Bob Hope) and story, a thinly disguised variation of the maudlin political situation in Louisiana during the Huey Long regime.

This Is the Story: Bob Hope, a candidate for Congress, becomes elected Rex, King of the Mardi Gras, and with it he gets mixed up in a love affair with a countess. Between his political ambitions and the machinations and love affairs of his opposition Congressman, Victor Moore. Hope has his hands

full, hires the countess (Zorina) to feed Mickey Finns to Moore to get him out of the way and more particularly to get away from him certain damaging evidence he carries with him in his briefcase. In a hilarious scene, Zorina does get Moore under the weather, and in his hangover scene, during which he takes grotesque Mardi Gras costumes and masks to be his own bad case of heebie jeebies, he compromises himself. One of the funniest scenes in the picture is Hope's filibuster in Congress—a take-off on Jimmy Stewart's in "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," or the late Huey Long at his worst, perhaps.

Verdict: This is an exceedingly funny and beautifully colorful musical comedy, and one which the entire family will enjoy if one does not object too strenuously to drinking scenes.

Now Axis Propaganda Stoops to Stupidity

THE one thing one must remember in telling a false story is to be very careful in repeating it to recall exactly what you said the first time. Goebbels' bunch don't bother much about such minor details. They rely entirely upon the "first shock effect" of the original statement. For example, two or three weeks ago the Berlin Radio came out with a flash that a 23,000-ton British aircraft carrier had been sunk in the Atlantic. Later details named the class of the ship and gave an intimate account of its sinking, saying that it was hit first in the bow, then amidships, then aft. Next day's broadcast reversed these important details, stating that the ship was hit first aft, then amidships, lastly in the bow. Said the commander of the submarine which was supposed to have sunk the carrier, "I have never seen anything like it," and well you might, too, if you were shown a picture of a small British merchant vessel which you had sunk and then had the propaganda boys tell you that this was a 23,000-ton aircraft carrier. The actual purpose behind this tall yarn was to see if they could get the British to reveal the real location of the 23,000-ton aircraft carrier *Audacious*.

Japs Take the Cake

Japan really takes the cake for stupid lies, however. Claim: "The U. S. battleship *Houston* has fled from the Philippines to the Netherlands East Indies." Later they remembered to their chagrin that U. S. battleships never bear the names of cities, always states. You will all recall that during the original attack upon Hawaii the Japanese claimed to have sunk the aircraft carrier *Langley*. Almost a month later to the day came a flash over the Tokyo Radio: "The aircraft carrier *Langley*, 11,500 tons, has just been sunk off Johnson Island."

The Japanese really are very concerned over the location of the American Pacific fleet, are daring it to come out of hiding. The Japanese spokesman for the Japanese army challenged our officials to bring out the fleet and fight. Says he, "It would save a long and protracted battle for everyone." "We can't lose anyway," he continued. "for our navy has had years of experience and discipline for just this sort of thing. There are no so-called 'suicide units' in our military troops, for every soldier and sailor is out to fight to the bitter end. Every Japanese feels he cannot afford to die without first inflicting a mortal wound upon his opponent." Is it possible this spokesman has not heard of the epic of Wake Island; of the gallantry of a handful of American Marines who wouldn't say die? Is it possible the Japanese have forgotten already about Captain Colin Kelly, who dared to die that he might inflict a "mortal wound" upon the proud *Haruna*.

The Game of Name-Calling

For a long time now each Berlin propagandist has ended his spiel with this slogan: England has always stood for war, Germany's victory will end this once and for all. Now the Germans have conferred this one on us: Franklin Delano Roosevelt promised you peace but brought you war. Churchill is called "The Prince of Blunder"; Roosevelt "The Prince of Boast." Is it possible that Germany hasn't heard of the American sense of humor that they really think they can get our goat in this way?

Incidentally, the Soviet newspaper *Red Star* has recently changed its slogan from Proletariats of All Nations Unite, to Death to All German Invaders.

Is This Another Nazi Trick?

Every Friday recently from about 9:15 to 9:30 p.m. EST there has been something screwy going on over the Berlin Shortwave Station. It goes like this. At 9:15 the announcer will say, "We are now going to entertain you with a gramophone recording from the studio." An American jazz record of the most blatant sort is put on the turntable and it starts to blare away. Meanwhile someone starts talking in the background that sounds like another station butting in on the same frequency. The speaker, a woman with a slight German accent, starts making plugs for Kellogg's Corn Flakes or it may be Kellogg's Rice Krispies—but always a Kellogg's product. She then starts into a spiel about some German commentator. One night it was Freddy Kaltenbach and another night it was Jane Anderson. From time to time the "spook voice" breaks in with another Kellogg's commercial and then more

intimate details about one of the Berlin personalities. At times the recording in the foreground will be so loud that it will drown out the speaker, again the voice comes out on top. At any rate it is the most hashed-up mixture of American jazz, Kellogg's Corn Flakes, Jane Anderson and Fred Kaltenbach all at the same time you have heard. Whether someone is actually breaking in on the German program or whether it is just another clever Goebbels trick to cause interest, you can figure out for yourself. Frankly, I don't know.

Soviet Broadcasts on Increase

For a time, seemingly coinciding with Russia's greatest reverses, it was difficult to tune in any short-wave broadcasts from that country. Now the situation is reversed and, according to air announcements, at least three great short-wave centers are now active in the U. S. S. R.

"Radio Kuibyshev," Kuibyshev, is being heard on a frequency of 10.04 mcs daily from about 7:00 to 10:00 a.m. EST and at various other times throughout the day. The news in English, read by a woman announcer at 8:30 a.m. EST, is usually received with good strength and intelligibility. Radio Kuibyshev also operates daily from 6:40 to 7:55 p.m. EST on a frequency of 15.23 mcs. This is the second half of the evening period in English from Russia.

"Radio Center Moscow," Moscow, is being heard at present from 9:20 to 9:50 a.m. EST, with a news period in English, which is broadcast on 9.73, 10.66 and 15.77 mcs. The 10.66 mcs frequency is usually best. Radio Center Moscow may also be heard each day from 6:00 to 6:37 p.m. EST on a frequency of 15.23 mcs. This is the

first half of the evening period in English from Russia.

"Radio Sverdlovsk," located at Sverdlovsk, in the interior of Russia, is being heard from 6:30 to 8:00 a.m. EST on 12.06, 12.23, 14.91 and 15.08 mcs. News in English is now given at 7:20 a.m. EST. The 12.06 mcs frequency provides the best reception from Sverdlovsk. Radio Sverdlovsk is also operating on a frequency of 9.88 mcs from approximately 12:00 noon to 1:30 p.m. EST, with the news in English at 12:20 p.m. EST.

Civilian Defense Advice from London

In pursuance of its policy of offering public service programs of interest to an America at war, Stanley Maxted, young Canadian radio man, is giving a series of five-minute talks on blackout precautions and the general technique of getting through an air raid. Stanley Maxted's "Civilian Defense Notes" may be heard daily at 7:25 p.m. EST over London stations GSC (9.58), GSL (6.11) and GRH (9.825).

Pacific War Zone Notes

The Australian Dept. of Information has been directing experimental broadcasts again to eastern North America from 4:15 to 4:45 p.m. on VLG7 (15.16), VLG6 (15.23) or VLG3 (11.71), and from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m. EST on VLG2 (9.54). Anyone hearing these tests is requested to send reports to David Bailey, Australian News and Information Bureau, 610 Fifth Ave., New York City . . . The English press bulletin for the A. I. F. is now broadcast over Melbourne station VLG7 (15.16) daily from 11:25 to 11:55 a.m. EST . . . India may break into the war news any day. Get the official slant of the India Government by tuning in the English news from Delhi daily at 7:30 a.m. EST over VUD3 (9.59) and VUD4 (11.83) . . . Exclusive information: "Radio Francaise Libre de Orient" is operated from the Free French Headquarters in Bombay, India. This Freedom station operates on 9.045 mcs daily from 12:30 to 1:45 p.m. EST.

GENERAL

NBC Splits Networks

NEW YORK.—Listeners may have noticed recently that announcers say, "This is the Blue network," after programs where they used to say, "This is the National Broadcasting Company." The Radio Corporation of America, parent organization of NBC, has taken the first big step in disposing of its Blue network, as ordered by the Federal Communications Commission. With a transfer of stock and setting up of a separate personnel organization NBC has created the Blue Network Company, Inc., preliminary to selling this one of its two networks altogether. Meanwhile the Federal Government has brought formal suit in Chicago against both NBC and CBS as monopolies. And further com-

NEW YORK.—Because of a shortage of violin students, noted in a music-schools survey, a contest to select an outstanding young violinist for a year's scholarship at the Juilliard School of Music is being sponsored by the Juilliard School, the National Federation of Music Clubs and NBC. The contest is open to young men and women between the ages of sixteen and twenty-two. Preliminary auditions will be conducted by the National Federation of Music Clubs, and regional auditions will be held in March in New York City, Chicago and a western city. The final competition will be broadcast over NBC.

Tabu All-Net Shows

NEW YORK.—In view of the attitude of the Planning and Advisory Committee of the Red network of the National Broadcasting Company, there is little likelihood of radio listeners hearing those "blanket" programs in which all national networks carry one special program at the same time. The board, in a recent decision, explained that it believes this type of programming not only is difficult to arrange but has the tendency to "coerce" listeners to hear what the broadcasters want them to hear. Exceptions will be made for the Federal Government.

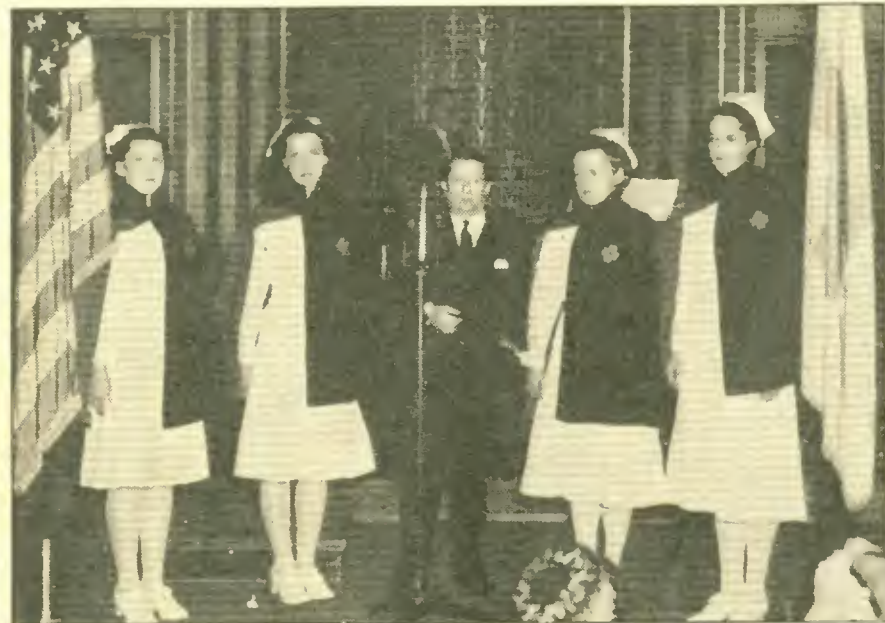

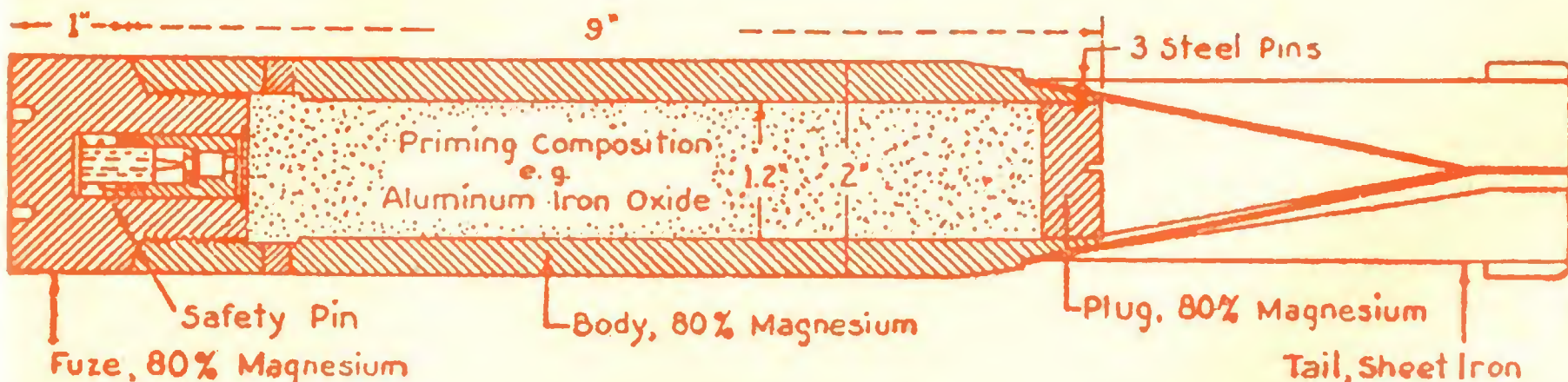

FIRE-BOMBS . . .

How to Fight Them



TO BING CROSBY they're hot eggs. To the War Department they're incendiary bombs. To everybody they're ugly, dangerous weapons the enemy eventually will try to use right here in the U. S. A. Fire-bombs by the hundreds can be planted over a large area by a single plane within a very few seconds. If one should land on YOUR home you must know what to do.

Bing Crosby, despite his funnyman lingo, thought the fire-bomb a big enough threat to the lives and homes of U. S. citizens to invite Major John S. Winch, U. S. Marine Corps, to his "Kraft Music Hall" January 8 for the purpose of telling "what to do if you get a hot egg laid on your roof." And what Major Winch said that night is important to every American.

First thing to know about a fire-bomb, said Major Winch, is where it lands. If you don't know where it is, you can't get rid of it. You can't get rid of it unless you have many small fire-watching parties constantly on the alert, properly equipped to deal quickly, effectively with any bomb.

Even more important, though, is to know what a fire-bomb is, how it acts. A long, slender affair, the most common type of bomb (magnesium) contains two main parts. First, the core

(see diagram above), composed of a priming mixture which ignites upon impact with some solid object and generates heat to fire part number two—the magnesium body of the bomb—which will burn fiercely for ten to twenty minutes.

Fire-bombs, said the major, are not explosive. Their function is purely to start destructive fires. Only way a fire-bomb can be made to explode (causing burning metal to scatter and spread fire) is to pour a solid stream of water directly on it. Therefore: *Never apply a solid stream of water directly on a bomb.* A burning, glowing bomb can only be attacked with a *fine spray of water.* The water will not put it out. Quite the opposite, it hastens the burning, so that a bomb that might normally smolder at white heat for twenty minutes will burn only one or two minutes.

Biggest danger from fire-bombs comes when they hit roofs and attics. The typical bomb weighs about two pounds and dropped from the usual flying height will penetrate any ordi-

nary roof, including tile, slate, corrugated iron and patented roofing materials.

A four-foot layer of sand spread over a roof might stop the bomb, but it would also cause the roof to collapse. More feasible idea is to keep buckets of sand near danger points.

BUT the bomb should not be approached until fifty or sixty seconds after it lands. Even then some protection is necessary—a table turned up, a door or a chair. Eyes, particularly, should be guarded. And these are the all-important preparations:

1. Have all equipment handy. Speed is the most important element in fighting fire-bombs.
2. Use a hose with adjustable nozzle that can be changed from spray (to put out bomb) to a steady stream (which will combat fire caused).
3. Have long-handled shovels, or scoops, with which to remove bombs to a place where they can do no harm.
4. Have several tin or galvanized-iron buckets, half full of sand, in

which burning bombs may be controlled.

5. Have an auxiliary supply of water and stirrup pumps (in a big fire-raided normal water supply drops sharply).

A quite different type of fire-bomb mentioned by Major Winch is the paper bomb. The British call them "calling cards." They can be printed to look like leaves or even advertising throw-aways. Actually they are absorbent sheets of paper impregnated with a solution of phosphorus and dampened with water. Dropped when wet, the bomb bursts into flame as soon as the water evaporates. These bombs are effective against farmlands and forests, the major told listeners. There are other types, but the most destructive and the most difficult to combat are the magnesium incendiaries.

Even now Major Winch's words are of immediate personal interest to "Kraft Music Hall" folk and their West Coast brethren, threatened as they are by Jap invasion. Soon the major's advice may be of as immediate interest to all Americans. The fire-bomb *will* be used on U. S. soil and many a listener may find himself thanking Bing Crosby and Major Winch.

PRECAUTIONS

1. Never approach a burning magnesium bomb within fifty feet during the first sixty seconds after ignition.
2. Never apply a solid stream of water from a nozzle directly on the bomb. **THIS WILL CAUSE AN EXPLOSION AND SCATTER BURNING METAL!**
3. Never allow the fire to get out of control. It is sometimes advisable to neglect extinguishing the bomb to prevent the spread of fire throughout the premises.
4. Never expose yourself more than necessary while extinguishing the fire. Protect yourself by a partially opened door, an overturned table or similar device.
5. Always have an avenue of escape available.
6. **REMEMBER THE SAVING OF YOUR PROPERTY IS NOT JUSTIFIED BY THE LOSS OF A LIFE!**

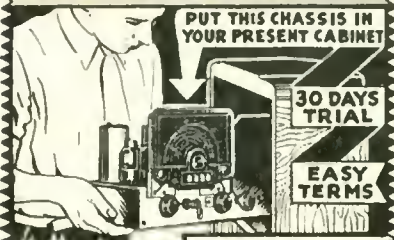

Fragrant Facts

THE first glamour girls got the idea of using perfume (which means "through smoke," suggesting incense, one of the first forms of perfume) from the ancient priests who used to burn fragrant mixtures of myrrh and saffron and the like to soften the hearts of the gods.

When Cleopatra discovered that it worked even better on the hearts of men (she got herself two mighty Roman conquerors, you know), the perfume industry really began to boom. The intoxicating secrets of the East were carried to the West, and all the great ladies of Europe learned the subtle magic that was contained in perfume. But it hasn't been until this century that perfume has stepped down from her lofty luxury perch and made herself available to the great masses of women.

Now every toilet-counter in America has high-quality perfumes within your means. There are perfumes like Bourjois' Evening in Paris, Coty's L'Origan, and Houbigant's Skylark, which give you glamour without sacrifice.

Perfume-users like yourself have a big advantage over Cleopatra in that you can get a perfume which suits your particular type. The choice of perfume is like the choice of make-up—it should go with you, be your own, whatever type you are. For instance, an outdoor girl will want a clean and spicy kind of perfume; the frilly feminine something of hearts and flowers; the career girl something bracing and gay; and so on.

The most effective way to use perfume is with an atomizer—spray it lightly on your underthings and your skin before you dress. The fine, light spray will distribute the perfume subtly and evenly, save you from becoming a walking perfumery, and if you use one of the handsome crystal DeVilbiss atomizers equipped with a leak-proof closure you'll avoid the waste of spilling and evaporation.

There are a lot of little tricks to

perfume—using that the wise woman uses—things like perfuming the inside of your gloves, putting a dash of it behind your ears, inside your elbows, at the back of your neck, and the hollow of your throat. Did you ever think of putting a bit on your hatband or on the trimming? Una Merkel does this. Spray it lightly on your furs and faintly on your hair.

Although perfume thus applied will give you a subtle and fairly lasting fragrance, it's a good idea to carry a small dram bottle in your pocketbook in case of an extra-special emergency like an unexpected date. Or better yet, because there's no danger of its fragrance seeping out, carry the Charm Perfume Stick, which is reasonably priced and convenient to handle.

COLOGNE (made of alcohol and aromatic oils) or toilet-water (a diluted perfume) are essential parts of the dressing-table, but they don't take its place. They are lovely and cool and refreshing but they aren't designed for dash! They don't give you that final touch of umph! It's a good idea to keep your cologne or toilet-water in an atomizer too—it's so much easier to apply and so much more economical than the old-fashioned "daubing on."

Sachet belongs to the big perfume family, and most perfume manufacturers put up sachet-bags with their representative scents. The miniature four-poster in the picture above contains Lucien Lelong's dream sachet. Hang one in your closet and put another in with your lingerie.

The modern woman doesn't have to envy Cleopatra or Madame Pompadour. She knows all their tricks and a few more besides.
