Christmas, 1942.

DEAR Little Son:

You are one year old today, little son, and so in a way this is your first Christmas. We are going to have a tree with shiny ornaments on it, and we are going to open presents, and listen to the Christmas music, and we are going to have a wonderful time—but, of course, you will know about all that because you will be with us, so I don't need to write to you about it.

I want to tell you about another Christmas which I don't think you remember very well now. It was really your first Christmas. It was a long time ago, a whole year. Autographs For the Axis

Bond Sales Boom as Hollywoodians Write Their Signatures on New P-38 Warplane

TRUCKS rolled through the night from the Lockheed plant to CBS studios in Hollywood recently. Police guarded the secret shipment closely. In the studio court mechanics took over the shipment and went to work. Under the skilled hands of mechanics the load was assembled into a sleek, deadly P-38 plane.

This, the first P-38 released for public exhibition, really "packed 'em in." The court filled with interested spectators. But the Lockheed plant didn't release the plane to satisfy public curiosity. The point of the whole move was to promote war-bond sales.

A booth was set up to sell the bonds and stamps that make such planes possible. Each purchaser of one dollar or more worth of the best investment in the world was given the privilege of writing his name on the plane as a salute "right in der Fuehrer's face."

Such sales gals as Ann Miller and Joan Leslie had no trouble finding customers. The appeal of putting his name alongside a machine-gun for a Jap or Nazi pilot to see during his last moments of life led John Q. Public to buy \$25,000 worth of securities for freedom.

A Great Actor Presents His Annual Performance as Scrooge in the NBC Production of Dickens' Ageless "A Christmas Carol" on Christmas Eve

NINETY-NINE years ago a man wrote a preface to a book. His pen traced the words, "I have endeavoured in this Ghostly little book to raise the Ghost of an Idea, which shall not put my readers out of humour with themselves, with each other, with the season, or with me. May it haunt their houses pleasantly, and no one wish to lay it."

The book was *A Christmas Carol*, the writer was Charles Dickens. His

wish has been fulfilled. No one seeks to lay the Ghost of an Idea that haunts us pleasantly—the Idea bound up in the story of Scrooge and Tiny Tim.

The story lives on through countless editions of books. It is a mother-to-son tradition in the English-speaking world, a story of the past that remains a story of the present.

To those of us who love the story, Lionel Barrymore has come to be a living part of *A Christmas Carol*. For

many years his portrayal of Scrooge has been a bright part of radio's celebration of Christmas.

Barrymore brings to this familiar tale the skill and tradition of a lifetime of stage, movie and radio acting of the highest caliber.

Barrymore loves the story he helps unfold. He has called Dickens "ageless." Here's what he says about Scrooge:

"Well, more of a caricature than a

straight portrait. But essentially true for all that. A good caricature must be recognizably true, you know—and Scrooge is just an exaggeration of someone we've all met. A very lonely, very unhappy old man trying to get some interest and color out of life by pretending to be a 'lough guy.'"

A Christmas Carol will be presented on the Rudy Vallee show on NBC, December 24, complete to Tiny Tim's final "God bless Us, Every One."

THE RADIO FRONT

COKE AND ELGIN PROGRAMS TO KEEP AIRWAYS HUMMING THROUGHOUT CHRISTMAS DAY

NEW YORK

Christmas in radio this year will be devoted to entertainment for our men in uniform on all fighting fronts.

The Special Services Division of the Army in cooperation with the OWI and the Bureau of Public Relations of the War Department will air a big Christmas radio show over all networks, in which leading stars of screen, radio and stage will participate. This program will be heard by the men on all war fronts and also those on the home front. One of the difficulties the Special Services Division has run up against is the problem of getting the program to the forces in different time zones. However, there is one thing we can be sure of—they will get their Christmas radio cheer from home ON TIME. In all probability, President Roosevelt will be heard!

Coca-Cola will also do its share in bringing fighting men and the homes from which they came closer together in a series of broadcasts from camps and stations all over the nation, starting at noon (EWT) Christmas Day and running until midnight. Forty top bands of the country will play from Army camps and Navy, Marine and Coast Guard stations in every part of the country. Each band will be on the air for fifteen minutes, Coast to Coast over the Blue Network. At the close of each fifteen-minute period the band will give a three-hour show for the fighting men of the camp or station from which the broadcast originates.

The program will bring the best in popular music and also music appropriate to the Christmas season.

CBS will have its scheduled pick-up of the two-hour Elgin show from Hollywood which will be ethered to our lads here, there and everywhere . . .

Garry Moore's morning program on NBC is one of the most informal we have ever attended. "Everything Goes" is the title, and you can take our word for it, anything and everything goes. We managed to get ourselves to the studio ten minutes before the show went on the air. Though the program is strictly on the zany side, we listened to one of the fiddle-players practising Paganini. After the broadcast (and we hadn't had our one cup of coffee allotment for the day) we found ourselves in a gay mood as we left the studio. TOSCANINI DIRECTS BRAHMS CYCLE SUN. ... KIDDIES CONCERT BY GANZ

Dimitri Mitropoulos Directs New York Philharmonic Sunday, CBS;
Bernard Herrmann Conducts Berlioz' "Infancy of Christ" Christmas Day

ARTURO TOSCANINI has not too infrequently, during his long career, devoted concerts to the music of one composer. In fact, he has even gone in for cycles, that is, a series of programs based on the works of one man. With Beethoven he has done that most often. Brahms, too, has had his Toscanini attention in such events.

With the Maestro's return to the NBC Symphony podium, the cycle idea returns and Brahms is the subject. For the December 20 concert of the NBC Symphony, Mr. Toscanini has devised a program consisting of the Variations on a Theme of Haydn, and the Third Symphony. Both of these works, I need not remind you, are masterpieces.

The Variations Brahms wrote in two forms—for symphony orchestra and for two pianos. There has been much controversy over which came first. In any case, Brahms came across the theme he employs in 1870, when one Karl Ferdinand Pohl showed him some Haydn manuscripts. The extract came from a piece for two oboes, two horns, three bassoons and a strangely named instrument, the serpent. Title of the work is "Divertimento with the St. Antoni Chorale."

Even now it is not known whether or not Haydn wrote the "St. Antoni Chorale." Some have advanced the idea that it is of different origin. Brahms, however, confidently saw it as Haydn's own.

A great deal has been written—and a great deal more will be written—about the Brahms development of the allegedly Haydn music. Certainly few works in the orchestral repertory—or the piano repertory—possess the magnificent structure and wonderful scope of these Variations. In this music Brahms the master, the amazing intellect, the singer of lofty melody appears. The pattern of the intricate composition requires a conductor of great penetration, splendid control over musicians to be clearly stated. The piece is a challenge to conductors. Most of them accept it, play the notes and that is about all. A Toscanini interpretation of his music is like nothing else in the world. It is clarity personified. The composer's ideas are conveyed to the listeners in a wizardly manner.

By all means tune in to this program, for you shall hear Brahms as he is at his best. And that includes the Third Symphony, of course.

A Stormy Petrel Returns

Ernst Krenek, one of the much-discussed musical figures of a decade or so ago whose music has not been heard much since, reappears by way of the Philharmonic-Symphony broadcast program. Dimitri Mitropoulos, functioning as guest conductor of the orchestra, has listed for performance the variations on a South Carolina folk-song, "I Wonder as I Wander."

Ernst Krenek, Vienna-born, though of Czechoslovak origin, studied music in the Austrian capital until his twentieth year. He worked with Frank Schreker in Vienna and later in Berlin, and in 1923 he composed his first opera, "Zwingsburg," which was premiered at the Berlin State Opera in 1924. For a period of ten years he was conductor at the state opera houses of Wiesbaden and Kassel, during which time he wrote ten more operas, among them being "Jonny Spielt Auf," which is based on American jazz idioms. It has been produced in many of the world's theaters, including the Metropolitan, where it was given in 1929.

Still other operas came from his pen, one of them "Karl V," a work of psychological implications. In this the composer took up anew his interest in atonality, which had been his predilection during his student days. He wrote, as in others of his operas, his own text.

In writing of the event for "Musical America," H. H. Stuckenschmidt declared that "Karl V" had been banned in Vienna because the composer was of "bolshhevistic" tendencies. At any rate, that reviewer found sections of worth in the opera and he even welcomed the composer back to "the

sphere of pure and intellectually refined art."

Not having seen a score of the variations on "I Wonder as I Wander," I do not know whether Krenek has gone atonal or twelve-tonal again on us. Whatever he has done, however, promises to be interesting.

Music for Christmas

I notice that Bernard Herrmann, inquisitive young conductor of the Columbia Concert Orchestra, has been making further researches. This time he comes up with an appropriate Christmas gesture, for he has scheduled the Berlioz "Infancy of Christ."

This work is what is known as a sacred trilogy or oratorio. Its three sections are entitled "The Song of Herod," "The Flight into Egypt" and "The Arrival at Sals." Hector Berlioz completed it in 1854. Brahms, for one, was enchanted with the "Infancy of Christ," and particularly with the second section. Berlioz' own succinct description of it is revelatory. He said, "The entire work is sunned up in this vocal expression [he meant the concluding choral epilog]. It seems to me to contain a feeling of infinite, of divine love."

Calling for a narrator (tenor), other solo voices and chorus, "The Infancy of Christ" is not, as one might expect, a creation typical of Berlioz in that he is anything but overwhelming in the size and sonority of his orchestration. The characters in the Trilogy are Herod, Joseph and Mary. Most of the writing for the voices shows Berlioz' clear understanding of the art, the Chorus of Shepherds in the second section being a particularly effective one. There are poignant lines for a duet between Joseph and Mary in the last section. All in all, as has been observed by J. H. Elliott, this work, "at its finest moments is exquisitely beautiful."

For the Children

The youngsters should find a good deal of enjoyment in the concert promised them by the Philharmonic-Symphony under Rudolph Ganz' direction on December 19. Mr. Ganz' program is certainly calculated to catch the elusive attention of children, and it wouldn't hurt some of the grown-ups to listen in, too.

The list holds the Weber "Euryanthe" overture; the first movement from Haydn's G Major Symphony, No. 13; the aria, "C'est bien l'Air," from Meyerbeer's "The North Star"; two Christmas songs, the polonaise from the Rimsky-Korsakoff "Christmas Night" and Tuthill's "Bethlehem Pastorale."

Billie Rogers; Woody Herman's star trumpeter

ALMOST every little girl who sets her mind on a musician's career begins by studying piano or violin. She usually winds up as a pianist or violinist. But take Billie Rogers, for instance, who started as a piano student. She is now a hot trumpet player, a featured

trumpet player, if you don't mind, with Woody Herman's orchestra.

Odd as that may seem—a girl giving out with the hot licks in the company of top-notch jazzists—it is the gospel truth. This pretty, slender brunette has made the grade; the grade of her own choosing, what's more.

She is a native of North Plains, Oregon, a place which isn't exactly a metropolis. When she was one year of age the family, showing a singular lack of civic pride, moved to Rainier, Washington. Because her parents and older brother had been trained musically, it was thought imperative to provide her with the lessons. At the age of six, accordingly, she began with the piano. Young as she was, however, she manifested strange rebellions. She could take only two years of the piano stuff, then she gave it up. There was a cornet lying loose around the house. It was an instrument that her brother had done some fooling with. She became interested.

In the space of a few weeks she was able to do things with the instrument. She could play scales, "hated scales," as she puts it; she could play little tunes, and, most important, she had devised a fingering-system of her own.

One day the cornet fell to the floor. The valves and tubing broke. She cried. It was the end of everything. But her joy was unbounded next day when her parents presented her with a shiny new brass instrument—a trumpet.

By the time she was fifteen she was already quite a virtuosa, making amateur appearances at local dances, in theaters and such. Then she got her first professional engagement, specifically a job with a band that played at surrounding resorts and at school hops. Later, at college, she joined her brother's band, which was the talk of Mis-soula University. When her brother died she decided to give up college and take up the band work seriously. She formed her own unit and did quite well with it.

A short time ago Woody Herman heard her at Columbia Pictures. He offered her a job with his orchestra. After some hesitation she decided in favor of it. And there she is.

WONDERED what it was like to prepare an honest-to-goodness dinner on a submarine. I had heard that the entire cooking-compartment on even the largest submersibles was hardly bigger than a telephone booth, and, with fifty husky bluejacket appetites to appease, it seemed to me impossible to do the job to anybody's satisfaction.

So I got in touch with some of my old buddies at Uncle Sam's submarine base at New London, Conn., and they arranged to take me down in one of their newest subs.

Since Pearl Harbor, volumes have been written about life on the U. S. Navy's undersea boats, how each sub is divided up into numerous watertight compartments, how every inch of space is utilized to meet the needs of subsurface warfare. But one of the most remarkable features of a sub, and one that has been pretty much overlooked, is the feat our sub cooks accomplish in cooking swell, wholesome meals in galleys that are never larger than four by four feet, five by two, and sometimes even more cramped.

Next time you feel inclined to complain about getting up a man-size dinner in your kitchenette, pause and consider the problems our sub cooks face every day under the sea. Remember—they don't just get up three squares a day; to satisfy our undersea gobs, who normally lose weight consistently when on cruise, food has to be on tap at all times. Whenever a subsurface sailor feels like eating, the grub has to be ready and waiting. To best appreciate this space limitation, measure out an area of sixteen square feet on your living-room carpet. Then realize, if you can, that into this space must fit an electric stove, oven, sink, potato fryer, work table, closets for huge pots and pans, food storage, bread-box, refrigerator, etc., etc.

The stove is a two-burner. I know many housewives who would become so confused trying to cook a complete dinner for three or four people on a two-burner stove that they'd end in the booby-hatch. But Calvin Crouch, cook first class, who showed me how it is done on the submarine I boarded at New London, had good, well-prepared food all day long—not for three or four people but for fifty hard-working gobs with ravenous appetites.

GUERRILLAS FOIL NAZI ATTEMPTS TO GET OIL ... DUTCH SCHOOL CHILDREN RELAY NEWS

Listeners Warned Not to Send Stamps Overseas; American Doctors' Experiences in Buna Described; Schedules of West Coast Stations

No Maikop Oil for Nazis

ACCORDING to a Soviet correspondent the Maikop oilfields in the Caucasus continued to burn for many days after the Germans seized them. The flames spread rapidly and forests in the proximity also caught fire. Several German oil experts arrived in the town together with the troops, intending to begin the exploitation of the oilfields immediately. The Germans sought for wells but found it impossible to discover them, since all were completely ruined. Oil stocks and equipment had been evacuated in time. To resume work, a tremendous amount of electric power would be required, and the huge power station serving the oilfields had been destroyed long before the Nazis arrived. For three months the Germans have been searching for maps and charts of the oilfields, and for experts and workers in order to obtain information. But all their attempts have been futile. The Germans hanged many oil workers and shot whole families. Placards read, "For sabotage of oilfields." Trade has ceased in the whole district. Stores have been converted into stables. The population lives on wild forest pears and chestnuts, for the Germans have announced that no bread will be issued until the citizens help the German command to restore the oil industry. Several times the oil industrialists would have one well almost restored, but their work was always foiled by guerrillas, who have turned the whole area into a battlefield. After one of these attacks the workers would flee, and the equipment, which the enemy had succeeded in scraping together, would be destroyed. The Germans continue to search frantically for oil experts but the majority of the oil experts are with the enemy guerrilla forces. For three months of the German occupation these guerrillas have been engaged in the one task of struggling against the restoration of the oilfields. The Maikop oilfields remain dead to the enemy. Whatever the Nazis claim about the improvement of their economic position with the help of Maikop oil is a sheer lie—they have failed to obtain a single drop of Soviet oil in the course of these three months.

Dutch Children Spread News

Scene: A Dutch schoolroom in occupied Holland. The teacher, a Dutch girl, is speaking to her class: "Now, children, I know your parents are anxious to see examples of your work, so I am going to allow you to take your exercise books home tonight. Be sure to show them to your mother and father. Now take down this dictation: 'The King and Queen of England visited our queen today (she speaks slowly, spelling out the larger words) . . . The Russians advanced

on two fronts—at Stalingrad and at Rzhev . . . Thousands of Frenchmen are taking part in the advance in Tunisia!' " Even the smallest children realized they were carrying home something more important than ordinary exercises. Take, for example, one small boy who carefully shielded his book on the way home, and when greeted at the door by his father with, "Well, my boy, what did you learn today?" silently passed into the house and securely shut and bolted the door before showing his parent "the exercises." According to London's "Radio Newsreel" this is only one of the many tricks those in occupied countries are using to spread news items received in secret from London by short-wave.

A Jungle Hospital

ABC correspondent Hayden Leonard's description of a jungle hospital was read the other morning over the Melbourne short-wave station. "Not far from the advanced line," he wrote, "some American doctors are attending their first local cases . . . from the fighting along the Soputa-Buna track. Capt. Charles Lawrence of Chicago and Capt. Felix Schwartz of Colorado are at the moment operating on a pilot who just a quarter of an hour ago was fighting the Japanese . . . The hospital is a cool shelter made by natives from jungle materials. The operating-table,

too, was made by the natives. By the doctors' side is a large dixie of boiling water over an open fire . . . The doctors, stripped to the waist, are working like trojans. Other American doctors are working in an Australian clearance station four hundred yards away, helping our doctors deal with a steady stream of wounded being brought back from the direction of Gona. Now and then a group of natives comes trudging along, bearing another injured man. The natives are covered in mud almost to their waist. They trudge through miles of swamps . . . And when the natives put down their burden, they know, and the Australians know, the war of the jungle would have taken an even heavier toll of our forces were it not for their faithful, unselfish service . . ."

For years short-wave listeners have been accustomed to the courteous habit of enclosing a mint stamp of that country—for return postage—when writing to foreign short-wave stations. This is no longer allowed. Postage stamps may be sent to points outside of the United States only upon permit issued by the Office of Censorship. Every adult in New Zealand, he said, pays each week into the national treasury a definite sum, ranging from twenty-five cents to five dollars, depending upon his or her income. This one payment guarantees sickness, accident, unemployment, old age and death benefits for all . . .

(From Moscow)—A Soviet correspondent who visited a house in Stalingrad reported: "If you took a look into apartment No. 9 of this house, you would see a Red Army man sitting comfortably in a leather armchair and fitting a mine into his mortar as coolly as if he were fitting a cigarette into a holder. In the next room, which used to be a nursery, two men are busy pouring incendiary liquid into bottles."

Radio folk don't, as a rule, go in for Hollywood superlatives, but the Thanksgiving "Cavalcade of America" production, "Feast from the Harvest," written and narrated by Louis Bromfield, is being discussed as "super-colossal." The hoed owls and barking foxes had human vocal cords. Don Voorhees added an organ to his large orchestra, and three kettle drums announced the rising of the past. A grand piano, specially draped, was used to obtain the weird vocal effects of the ghosts. The large stage was so jammed that sound-effects men had to move an extra platform alongside of it to make a place for themselves.

It was one of a collection just acquired by Barry Wood, "Hit Parade" alumnus, who turned that record over to Murray. The chorus on the record was led by Billy Murray, famed gramophone artist of the early 1900s, and Lyn says the arrangement, even by present-day standards, was not bad! By a strange coincidence, the tune "Casey Jones" was Lyn Murray's first choral offering on his "Radio Header's Digest" Sunday night series.

WHAT'S COOKING!

Spread the Festive Board

IT'S Christmas again! And even with the war and the many problems that it has brought to us grown-ups, let's make it a happy one for the children and others in need of cheer who may gather in our homes for this Yuletide season. If your home has been chosen as the center of festivities, you will have the job of chef. So by all means plan a simple and appetizing menu. Cook well in advance so you can join the children and other guests in the living-room, knowing that all's well in the kitchen.

Fortunately for all concerned, the modern Christmas dinner doesn't include the complicated preparations it did in early American days. Certainly they are amazingly simple when compared to the elaborate spreads our grandmothers set forth on the holiday. But even so, there's a job to be done, and it's your responsibility.

First make sure that the dining-room conveys the holiday spirit. Hang Christmas bells, and go decorative for the table centerpiece. Red candles and sprigs of holly are old, old decorations, yet always new and lovely each Yuletide. Of course a small fir tree is an ideal decoration, but with trees so scarce this year, try this unusual de-

parture. Get a bunch of wayside weeds, dip them in paste made from laundry starch, and sprinkle them with quantities of Christmas "snow." Arrange them carefully in a frog and place on a small mirror in the center of the table. Your guests will admire your attractive centerpiece.

And with the children in mind, Santa Claus will be the byword of the day, so bring him to the table, too. You can use a polished red apple for the body. Then place a marshmallow on one end of a toothpick and insert the other end into the top of the apple. That makes the head! Eyes and nose can be made from cloves—the mouth from a bit of cherry. Dampen a wee bit of cotton and place on Santa's chin for the proverbial whiskers. Make his hat from red crepe paper and his belt from a strip of plain white paper. There he is—as true a Santa as was ever made!

Generally speaking, table decorations should be kept simple. After all, it's the food that is important—not the frills! So let's consider the menu. Try this on the family!

If a precooked ham is used, follow the directions on the wrapper around the ham in baking. If a smoked ham is used, scrub with brush. Soak twelve to fourteen hours in cold water to cover. Drain. Place skin side up in open roaster. If you have a meat-thermometer, place it in ham so bulb will be in center of ham but not touching the bone. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees Fahrenheit), allowing thirty-five minutes per pound for whole hams and thirty minutes per pound for small or half-hams, or cook until the final reading on meat thermometer is 170 degrees Fahrenheit. Take ham from oven, remove skin and glaze.

To prepare Virginia ham, soak twelve hours in cold water to cover. Trim rusty edges and scrub with brush. Place skin side up in kettle and (Continued on Page 36)





cover ham with boiling water. Cook covered over low heat, simmering very gently until tender, allowing about thirty-five minutes per pound. Uncover and let cool in stock twenty-four hours. Take from liquid, remove skin, bake and glaze.

Follow these directions for glazing: After removing skin from cooked ham, score fat with knife. Spread entire surface of ham generously with orange marmalade. To make holly-leaf design, cut leaves from angelica. Arrange leaves in decorative fashion over top surface of ham. At the base of each leaf, arrange three uncooked cranberries to resemble holly berries. Bake in uncovered roasting-pan in a hot oven (425 degrees Fahrenheit) about thirty minutes, or until the surface is nicely glazed. A ten-to-twelve-pound ham will make twenty to twenty-five servings.
