SHE'S a rip-snorting man-chasing fiend! She's a female ogre forever tracking down a male! And what has been the reward of this heinous creature who hides behind such a lie—a million laughs and the adoration of a nation that loves comedy.

Imagine a success based on episodes of this nature. From Melbourne, Australia, comes word that she has just been adopted by 645 soldier boys, who voted her the "Girl They Would Most Like to Leave Behind." From Escanaba, Michigan, they tell her she has been adopted by the bachelor girls of the town as "The Career Woman Most Likely Never to Get Married." Letters from plastic surgeons and cosmeticians from all parts of the nation guarantee that with their treatment she could be made into a reasonable facsimile of a not unattractive woman.

Always one thought is uppermost in the minds of her fans: She can't possibly look as bad as we think. Or can she?

Her pictures prove she can't. And Hollywood knows her to be one of the most steadily dated glamour girls, in a town where even the dime-store

clerks and waitresses look like Hedy Lamarr.

When questioned on the point, Elvia Allman, radio's Cobina, replied in all modesty, "I'm very happy to talk about myself. At least it's one subject I'm well versed in. Of course I like men. Every girl does. The success of my radio character is based on that. I realized this when I was in my teens. It's something as fundamental as Adam and Eve. And the Bible is still selling a lot of copies.

"To sell the I-gotta-have-a-man idea you can't play it straight. It's got to be overdone, otherwise it becomes personal and insulting. The man-chasing personality evolved through many parts that I played until they all merged into the supercharged 'Cobina.'

"I was born in North Carolina, literally almost in a cotton-patch. My entrance into the world was ill-timed and caught my mother in the fields of our farm. It was my first lesson in ironical comedy and Mother says I was very good-natured about it.

"After my father died we moved to

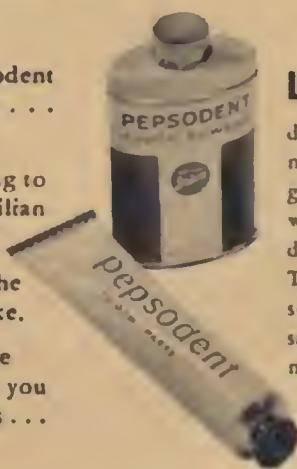

THE FIFTH FREEDOM

By ELIZABETH BEMIS

Analyst of World Events Speaks for the Axis-Oppressed People of Europe

Elizabeth Bemis, first woman ever authorized to cover official U. S. Army war games in the South, came to radio straight from the newsroom. We might say that she was born with the smell of printer's ink in her nostrils and a love of it in her heart. For her father, Edwin A. Bemis, is manager of the Colorado Press Association and a prominent Rocky Mountain publisher, and her mother is a newspaper editor. Small wonder, then, that young Elizabeth failed to follow the medical career she had mapped for herself after college graduation. Instead, she traveled through Europe and Africa; in fact, is one of the few American women today who knows well the Dark Continent of Africa, at present so prominent in the news headlines.

A student in Paris at the outbreak of World War II, Miss Bemis has lectured and written extensively on current problems of the Continent. For two years she served as top newscaster on Denver's KLZ, and then joined the staff of WLW in Cincinnati. Here she gained recognition as one of the outstanding headline analyzers of the nation. One reason for that success lay in the fact that she had—and still has—the knack of "humanizing" her authoritative comments.

Now newscaster over stations of the Columbia Pacific network, Miss Bemis still "pounds out" the scripts for her Monday-through-Friday broadcasts, and does the research as well. Her views on "The Fifth Freedom" which follow, we believe tie in admirably with Bob Hope's "Freedom for Laugh-

ter," published in **MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE** some months ago. For in the words of the ancient king, "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine; but a broken spirit drieth the bones."

ONCE there was a man who wanted to be a philanthropist. He went around handing out hundred-dollar bills (this was before the time of war taxes) to needy people—just like that. The result was that

many of the people he helped with those bills sat around and waited for him to come back again. Or else they grew ashamed of the fact that the Fates were against them, and began to feel subsidized. All of them began to hate the man who was taking away their pride in return for a piece of printed paper.

In other words, the would-be philanthropist had used the wrong approach to one of the world's major problems, and his results were on the

debit side of the ledger. He had forgotten a psycho-sociological fact—that it's better, far better, to help people help themselves.

Today, the United States and the United Nations are planning to be philanthropists, to help the occupied countries. They are making every effort to liberate the oppressed peoples—which is, of course, an admirable effort, excluding the fact that this war is also one of self-survival.

But it is very necessary that we bear in mind one very important item—an item which will help secure peace and unanimity of purpose in the world of the future.

We must, even as we have begun doing in French North Africa, insure

LOTTE LEHMANN BEGINS SERIES OF SONG RECITALS OVER CBS FEBRUARY 15

Toscanini Features All-American Program of Grofe, Gilbert, Creston Works Sunday, NBC; Portrait of Irving Berlin, the People's Composer

LOTTE LEHMANN wanted to be a writer—more than anything else. So she studied voice. She became one of the world's greatest singers. She holds audiences in the palm of her hand, a trick she can perform in concert or on the operatic stage with equal facility. When she closed up vocal shop for the season, several years ago, she wrote a book. She wrote still another book. Both have been successful books. Lotte Lehmann the writer.

Now Mme. Lehmann, whose art is immeasurable, whose humanity is as immeasurable as that art, wants to paint. She has been painting for a considerable time, as a matter of fact. She took it up by herself. Her living-room, her foyer and, one presumes, the other rooms in her apartment at the Hotel Maurice in New York are stacked with paintings.

She said, rather ruefully I thought, almost to herself, "The wasted years."

Seated in a richly upholstered chair in that living-room, Mme. Lehmann was the very typification of the Princess von Werdenberg, the Marschallin, who dominates Richard Strauss' opera "Der Rosenkavalier." This might have been the first act of the opera where the Princess receives a host of visitors, interviewers, supplicants, salespersons. And to make it all the more real Mme. Lehmann was in a melancholy mood. She repeated the phrase, "The wasted years."

The distinguished artist, however, rallied quickly. She hastened to explain that life had given her many things; many honors have come to her; she had no right to complain. But it was obvious that this new interest of hers is a compelling one. She has finally found the one medium of expression most suited to her. To paint, to create in colors, to interpret life and the world. That was the gnawing compulsion through the years—to create. Only now does she feel the truth and the force of it.

Mme. Lehmann speaks softly, in well-modulated tones. She never hurries. But always there is the impression of great conviction, of intense sincerity in her words.

A rather prosaic question brought her out of her reverie. I asked her which she preferred to sing, songs or operas.

Her answer, as I had hoped, was revealing. She said, "Songs, of course, though there was a time, a long time, when I thought opera was the only thing. I change my mind so much, you see."

"Lieder," she explained, "is so much

more refined. It is intimate. In a brief moment you must reach your audience. You must set a mood. You must tell a story quickly. You have no supports like scenery, other characters, a symphony orchestra and a huge stage. You are there—you and the composer and the listeners. It is much more difficult to express musical and dramatic ideas through a song, much more."

One of the things she dislikes about singing in opera is that an artist becomes typed. "It is terrible to become known as a Wagnerian soprano," she said. "What is a Wagnerian soprano? There should be no such classification. You might say that such and such a person was a Mimi soprano, or a Violetta soprano, or a Tosca soprano. How silly that is. There should be no limits to the repertory of an artist."

"In this country I have been known through my performances of the Marschallin, Elisabeth in "Tannhaeuser," and one or two others. That sort of thing delimits the artist. She becomes stamped with certain parts. It was never like that with the great performers of the past, you know. Still, I suppose that certain modern-day rules must be observed. The public wants to hear certain artists in certain parts. That is the answer."

Mme. Lehmann, nevertheless, believes that it is as wrong to do the same roles all the time as it would be to sing the same recital program. The whole thing, she thinks, is too one-sided. No fun for the artist and, in the long run, no fun for the public.

But to get back to the real theme of this story, Mme. Lehmann expects, some day, to paint her impressions of

music—of operatic music, of song music, perhaps, even of symphonic music. She wants to paint people, too, people and scenes and life. So here is a salute to a gifted writer, who became a gifted singer, who wants to become a gifted painter.

In the meantime, radio listeners will profit by tuning in to Mme. Lehmann's CBS afternoon programs. There is to be a whole series of them in which Paul Ulanowsky will appear as her piano accompanist. The programs will offer alternating groups of German and French songs, but each program will have a group of pieces by English and American composers.

(Lotte Lehmann begins a series of song recitals over CBS on February 15.)

The American Art

Arturo Toscanini's latter-day addiction to American music is one of the marvels of our time. His is not an idle interest, you may be sure, for the celebrated batonist never plays anything he does not genuinely consider true music. His recent and memorable performance of the Gershwin "Rhapsody in Blue" was, I trust, the rebuke proper to all those carpers who look on Gershwin as some kind of charlatan. That composer had a wealth of emotional expression. He was the possessor of a distinctive style. He was new in the concert cosmos. His music has given proof of possessing permanent qualities. Any questions?

Now Mr. Toscanini and the NBC Symphony will be heard in an all-American program and the piece de resistance, if you please, is to be Ferde Grofe's "Grand Canyon Suite." The other works listed are the Henry F. Gilbert "Comedy Overture" and the Paul Creston "Overture—a Rumor."

I like the Grofe work. I have liked it for years. I know a great number of fine musicians—Bachlans, Brahmins, Mozarteans, Beethovenians, etc.—who like it, too. It is a completely earnest work. It has no affectations. It tries to describe one of America's wonders. There is nothing wrong with that idea, certainly. The music doesn't pretend to be anything but straightforward program music. It happens to be interesting, melodious, well harmonized. It is, in short, highly appealing. I can think of many items which haven't got half the vigor or sincerity or downright directness that this creation boasts. Yet they grace the concert-hall lists often enough. Let's get away from stuffiness. Without being chauvinistic, let's give American music a chance.

The contemporary Russian composers, Shostakovich, Prokofieff, et al., are extremely interested in American music. Wouldn't it be a good thing for us to display a like interest?

Irving Berlin: His successes second to none

AMERICA has had several eminent representatives of people's composers, but surely none have been closer to the people or more of the people than Irving Berlin. Berlin may have had ambitions to write important music somewhere along the path of

his career, but, more than any observer of his work, he knew his own limitations.

Irving Berlin was born in Russia on May 11, 1888. His family name then was Baline. His father, a Jewish cantor, took his little family to this country, and the future pride of the Baline-Berlin clan was brought up on New York's East Side.

Like so many other little boys, Irving hated school. He hated work besides—the kind of work that his family might have picked out for him, at any rate. So he became a "busker"—that is, a saloon or sidewalk entertainer.

Not much later he joined the singing waiters' staff at a Chinatown place known as Nigger Mike's. There he rushed trays between vocal offerings.

His first effort at writing song words came later when he collaborated with the pianist at Nigger Mike's on a number titled "Mario from Sunny Italy." He knew little about his own ability to compose tunes.

One evening the manager at Nigger Mike's—maybe it was the owner himself—discovered Berlin asleep at the cash-box, which was equivalent to being asleep at the switch. He was fired. Armed with not much more than complete confidence in himself, he trekked Uptown to Tin Pan Alley and started, first, to write down his ideas and, second, to sell the completed product.

There and then began one of the fantastic careers in American popular music annals. From those eventful days to the present his string of song successes is second to that of no other composer. He has written songs of all types, from broad comedy items to heavy-hearted ballads. The list of his pieces reads almost like the complete encyclopedia of this nation's popular songs.

Irving Berlin has truly held his finger on the pulse of the people. He sings of their joys, their sorrows, their unimportant moments. He translates their thoughts into singable, simply worded songs, he has had hit after hit. His imitators have been numerous. He has started trends. Irving Berlin is very definitely a composer of the people.

FRANK CUHEL RELATES EXPERIENCES AS RADIO CORRESPONDENT IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC

Reporter Comes Home

THE new year was but a few days old and the Japs were poised to strike in the South Pacific when a handsome young American in Batavia, with no previous experience in newspaper work or radio, became Mutual's correspondent in the Dutch East Indies. That was in January, 1942. Today the name of Frank Cuhel is well known to millions of U. S. listeners who have followed his factual, unembroidered reports from that war zone for the past two years.

Before he became a radio correspondent Frank Cuhel was, as he describes himself, "the guy who introduced Hormel's Ham to Palestine and Scott Tissue to Persia." As traveling representative of an export firm, his trail led through thirty-five nations in Europe, Asia and Africa. This valuable experience, giving him an intimate knowledge of global geography and a personal appreciation of the ideas and characteristics of people in all parts of the world, helped him immeasurably in the important radio assignment that so unexpectedly dropped into his lap.

When Frank Cuhel returned to America he brought back some hair-raising accounts of his experience as a radio correspondent. He took over in Batavia at the request of Elizabeth Whyne, Mutual's correspondent there, when she left the Dutch East Indies. He reported regularly from Batavia until March 2, 1942, when Jap pressure forced him to move to Bandoeng with the few remaining correspondents who had stayed on till the last safe moment. From there he escaped by automobile to a Dutch steamer, the *Janssens*, which was the last to leave the Indies before the Jap invasion became complete. On board also were George Weller of the *Chicago Daily News*, Bill Dunn of CBS, and Winslow Turner of the *Australian Associated Press*.

Although the *Janssens* was built to accommodate forty passengers, it set out for Australia with 700 on board. Before it got very far it was attacked

by a squadron of Jap Zeros, who strafed and cannonaded the ship until they ran out of ammunition. Fortunately there were only eleven casualties, and the skipper managed to steer the ship into a cove close to shore.

The captain then told them that the chance of getting through to Australia was one in ten, and offered those who did not want to risk it an opportunity to get off and make for shore. Those who stayed with the ship had to sign on for duty. Cuhel and the other correspondents stayed with the ship and, although the *Janssens* could make only six knots an hour, she finally reached Fremantle, Australia, on March 14. From that date until December 3, Cuhel stayed in Australia, reporting via Mutual to the U. S. from there. Leaving Stanley Quinn at his post in Australia, Cuhel returned to the U. S., arriving in San Francisco on December 24.

"Wiping the Japs out of the Pacific and constantly improving relations between our country and Australia are the two vital jobs being done," said Cuhel upon his arrival. "And," he added, "American fighting forces are doing both of them."

"We must remember," he warned, "that we did not come to Australia specifically to save that country, but to eliminate the Japs. This 'American Saviours' theme should be dissipated for the benefit of both countries."

Particularly harmful to the relations between the U. S. and Australia, he pointed out, are reports in American newspapers—which finally turn up in Australia—that praise only the efforts of our troops and do not give the Australians their share of credit for victories.

"I saw the Australian people's reaction to these reports," he said, "and it certainly did not help strengthen a mutual trust."

According to Cuhel, our troops landed in Australia looking trim and

well pressed and were welcomed with open arms. "Not only are they a fine representation of the cross-section of America's fighting-power but in all their actions it is evident that the job of licking the Japs is constantly in their minds. In the forward areas, particularly, you see a marvelous demonstration of real determination and fighting spirit toward cleaning up the Japs as soon as possible."

Australian girls, he noted, were impressed with the uniforms of our nurses. American nurses have two uniforms, whereas Australian have but one, and that made of inferior material because all the wool is being shipped out of the country to America, England and Russia.

We shouldn't try to force American ways upon the Australians, he advised. "We expected the Australian to change overnight. We were used to drawing on a vast store of supplies that Australia did not have. We forgot that Australia lost almost a complete generation of men in the last war, and has lost in killed or captured almost another generation in this one, all of which has left her short-handed in manpower."

Frank Cuhel is thirty-eight years old, unmarried, of medium height, with light-brown hair and a quiet charm. He's a rugged individualist with a subtle sense of humor, but does not try to impress others with his knowledge. And although he's traveled all over the world and has seen just about everything there is to see, his friends suspect that Cedar Rapids, Iowa, his home town, still rates as the best spot on earth to him. At the State University of Iowa, his alma mater, he was a track star of no mean ability—a statement that is verified by the fact that he was a member of the U. S. Olympics squad in 1928.

Sidelights: U. S. citizen John Gunther, author of the best-selling *Inside Europe*, *Inside Asia* and *Inside Latin America*, is writing another "inside" story. Title: *Inside the United States* . . . When Larry Lesueur, CBS correspondent in Russia who recently returned to the U. S., sent around a questionnaire among Russian school-children, he found that they believed Churchill was "a friend of Stalin's" and President Roosevelt was the American ambassador . . . William W. "Bill" Chaplin, veteran newspaperman now heard on NBC, has contracted to write a book tentatively titled *Maginot to Moscow* . . . John Gunther and John Vandercook are joining forces in a new series scheduled to begin over the Blue Network on or before February 28. Wichita Falls, Texas. I was reared in a convent, taking music and dancing-lessons on the side. My mother was paying for elocution lessons long before she knew what the word meant.

"When I graduated my drama teacher convinced me that 'genius' such as mine was due for larger fields. The big city was beckoning little girls like me.

"I borrowed enough money to get to Chicago, convinced of my success. I had a great lead at Marshall Field's department store selling dresses, and did a bang-up job as a real-estate saleswoman in a wildcat development. Seriously, I did get a part in the road-show of 'Smilin' Thru,' with Maurice Carnovsky.

"Convinced that Chicago was not for me I went to New York, where I was told that producers fall all over themselves when talent such as mine

is presented. They didn't!

"I worked department stores, Hoboken and agents' offices. Vaudeville was going full blast and I was finally hired to play the piano for a female singer. I'm still afraid that woman will sue me. I was so bad.

"New York wasn't paying any attention to me, so I decided to go to a milder climate and a place called Hollywood and let them not pay any attention to me there.

"I found a new media out there called motion pictures. I made the rounds, telling them I had just come from the big city and had starred in such and such a production, only to find out the guy I was talking to had been a stagehand in the same show.

"I found a job in a department store.

"When it looked for sure like the career ship of Allman was sinking, I got work on the 'Uncle John' hour reading children's poems at the old KIJ station in the now extinct Times Building. When it lasted more than

two weeks, I felt pretty good because it seemed to me I was managing to cling to the first rung of the ladder.

"At that time radio was in its infancy and all you had to know was nothing about a program and you were made program manager. I was promoted. Finally I was sold with the fixtures to the new owner of KIJ, a man named Don Lee. He gave me my own show, 'Surprise Package.'

"Came 1933 and I began to consider myself big-time. New York offered me a thirteen-week contract on a major network. My appearance in Gotham again was catastrophic. But not in the manner I had hoped it would be. The financial panic had set in. All the banks closed. And I was billed as the 'California Cocktail Girl' when everybody was thinking of straight bourbon or gins.

"When I came back to Hollywood, radio had changed. It was now a big business, as things must be with the advent of agents and agencies. It was

much easier. I started in my first of a long series of big shows with Jimmy Durante and Ruth Etting. Since then I have played various characters on the Fred Allen, Jack Benny, Rudy Vallee, Bing Crosby, Joe E. Brown, Burns and Allen, Abbott and Costello and Bob Hope shows.

"It was on the Hope show that I established the Cobina 'personality.' Bob decided that Bill Goodwin and Skinnay Ennis would, via the script, have blind dates. They needed two girls that had to be 'ugly' as voices. So Brenda with the Bronx cheer and Elvia with the gravel in her throat made it. The names were supplied by the leading debs of the day and the dialog was supplied as only a Hope writer can do it.

"In the meantime I have become what is called a comedy lead in the cinema. My latest is in M-G-M's 'Three Hearts for Julia,' where I wear four Irene dresses, three hair-dos by Sidney Gullaroff, and speak one line!"

BBC SERIAL, BORN DURING BLITZ, PORTRAYS DAY-TO-DAY LIFE IN WAR-TIME ENGLAND

Nazi Private Describes Ordeal in Russia; New "Freedom" Station in France; Revised Schedule of Australian Overseas Broadcasts

Nazi Officers Desert Men

NAZI officers are brave men—as long as they are winning. Once they are trapped and see defeat staring them in the face they run like rabbits, leaving behind them anything or anyone that hinders their flight. They left whole divisions of their Italian comrades abandoned and stranded in the Libyan desert. In Russia they have even been abandoning their own enlisted men. To prove this I cite the radio story of Private Rulfe Jegosch of the 83rd German Infantry Division, which was captured at Velikie Luki. He stated that their last days and hours in the town were horrible. Large ammunition dumps were blown up by several direct hits and the explosions thundered all day long. In his own words Jegosch said: "The situation as regarding ammunition became so grave that our command requested that shells be sent by air. Several loads of ammunition on parachutes reached us, but this was not enough. The thunder of guns and the heavy fire of heavy Russian trench mortars forced us to huddle in cellars. Some men lost their reason before my eyes; others, unable to stand it, committed suicide. The desertion of our officers from the blockaded town was a terrible shock to the men. In the heat of the battle an airplane landed in one of the streets. We thought it brought us good news, but we soon learned that our officers had deserted us and used this plane to save their own skins. The soldiers cursed them up and down. Unfortunately they learned too late what their superiors are worth. Rumors reached the soldiers that the Soviet command had proposed to the garrison to lay down its arms, and had promised all officers and men their lives and a safe return to Germany after the war. The garrison command declined this proposal, and preferred to pay with the soldiers' lives, while they themselves fled from doom like rats from a sinking ship."

"Front Line Family"

The BBC's "soap-box opera" is the serial "Front Line Family." It is followed religiously by untold thousands of short-wave listeners in all parts of the world. Not only is it dramatic and thrilling but it is true to life in that it strives to portray an average family as they live from day to day in war-time England.

According to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, the idea of "Front Line Family," which has been broadcast regularly since April 28, 1941, was born during a bad London blitz. Alan Melville, of the BBC, was in a restaurant with E. L. Bushnell, of the CBC, during an air-raid, and bombs were falling so close that every now and then they had to dive under the

table. In the intervals, they were discussing what happens to ordinary people when war drives its wedge into their lives. Eventually, they conceived the idea of a serial reflecting the excitements and tensions of a typical middle-class British family in war-time.

Although sixty or seventy other characters weave their way in and out of the story, the plot revolves round the five members of the Robinson family and the girl and the soldier who are going to marry into it. In the early days it was easy to get material for "Front Line Family," as some of the most dramatic London raids took place soon after the serial started. Many of the actors found themselves rehearsing situations in which they had just been involved in real life. A number came to the microphone swathed in bandages. When the Luftwaffe ceased its nightly visits the finding of material became more difficult, as the Family was not so dramatically in the front line, so the author concentrated on their domestic life.

"Front Line Family" may be heard every evening except Saturday and Sunday at 4:30 and 8:45 p.m. CWT over London stations GSC (9.58), GSL (6.11), GRN (6.20) and GRC (2.915). It can also be heard over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation network.

(London)—According to some Frenchmen, it isn't *Deep in the Heart of Texas*, but "Dieppe in the heart of the Axis" . . . (London Radio News-reel)—According to Monsieur Mayo, just returned from North Africa, the political set-up in Tunisia and North Africa is dangerous; may be even dangerous for the new France—civil and military. Eighty to ninety percent of the French in North Africa are pro-Ally but many people are confused at present and thus susceptible to enemy propaganda . . . (Berlin)—The cost of living in London has risen by forty percent since the beginning of the war . . . (Berlin)—The RAF lost 150 airmen in their last raid on Berlin. These raids are certainly not worth while for the British when viewed in the light of such a tremendous personnel loss . . . (OW1 "News from Home")—The AEF has the largest factory in Britain. It is a machine-shop which covers more than a square mile. In it anything from a wrist-watch to a tank can be repaired . . . (London Calling)—The new tune, *The Eighth Army March*, was composed by Eric Coates under odd circumstances. "The BBC wanted it in a hurry," said Mr. Coates, "and I got the idea for it while walking down Oxford Street one day. Notes About the Stations

The number of clandestine, "freedom" and otherwise unlicensed short-wave transmitters in Europe is on the rapid increase (this is to be expected as the day of liberation for the oppressed peoples draws ever closer). One of the more recent to take the air identifies itself as "La France Fidele." Its programs, which are mainly in French or Arabic, may be heard daily from 1:30 to 3:15 and from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. CWT on 9.575, 7.315 and 7.25 megas. The last named is the best heard of the three frequencies . . . The Roumanian Freedom Station is still operating daily on 11.60 megas, 12:45 to 12:55 p.m. and 3:15 to 3:25 p.m. CWT, in Roumanian . . . "Radio Metropole" (the old Belgrade transmitter) operates from 10:00 to 11:45 a.m. and from 3:40 to 3:58 p.m. on 9.48 megas; from 4:05 to 5:05 p.m. CWT on 6.100 megas. English news is given at 4:15 p.m. CWT . . . Home Service Transmissions of the Budapest short-wave station are currently broadcast from about 2:30 to 5:55 p.m. CWT over HAT2 (6.66). News in English is given at 4:25 p.m. CWT.

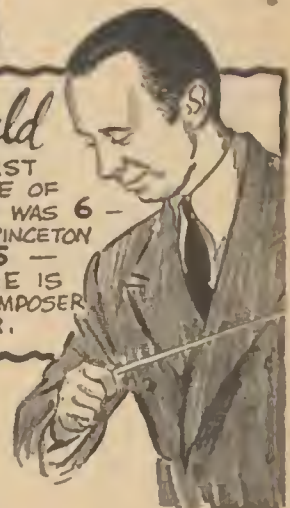

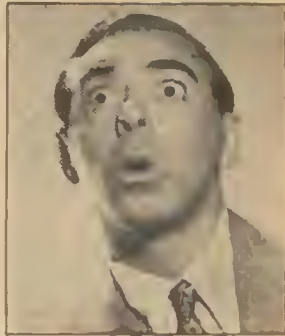

Fete the Furlough Bride!

These days, with Romeo in an Army camp and Juliet busy at work in a war plant, the King of Hearts has a hard job. But he has his moments and those moments are when Private Romeo comes home on furlough!

Then St. Valentine is in his glory, and often it's the cue for wedding bells to ring. Maybe you know a furlough bride-to-be—maybe she's in your family; whoever she is, you don't want her to miss all the fun and fixings that came before a peace-time wedding. She should have a shower luncheon, and what better time than St. Valentine's Day!

Nowadays, of course, February fourteenth means frilly lacepaper hearts, candy and flowers, but in old-time England it was a far different story. A century ago, the hopeful suitor would rack his brains for sweet and sentimental rhymes, but no paper hearts for him! He tied his verses firmly to a large red apple and presented it as a tribute to his beloved. Early on St. Valentine's morning, he'd steal into her garden and toss the love-message through her window. And if he was lucky, she would blow him a kiss in return!

Of course, our Valentine symbol isn't an apple, but a big red heart pierced by one of Cupid's arrows. So hearts should be the theme of your Valentine luncheon. The invitations must be heart-shaped of course, and you can even build your meals around them! Here's a sentimental menu:

- Cranberry-pineapple Juice Cocktail
- Baked Ham Loaf
- Candied Sweet Hearts
- Valentine Salad
- Heart-shaped Baking Powder Biscuits
- Queen of Hearts Tarts
- Coffee
- Candy Hearts

Decorate your table with tiny cupids or fat red hearts, and pile all the shower gifts at the head of the table for the guest of honor. Think up funny fortunes for the others and hide them in the napkins or nut-cups. Try it. Your Valentine shower luncheon will be a great success!

Candied Sweet Hearts

Boil large sweet potatoes until almost tender. Cool, slice thickly and cut each slice heart-shaped with a cookie-cutter. Place in a well-greased pan and pour over the hearts a slrup made of two tablespoons melted butter, one-half cup brown sugar, and one-fourth cup corn sirup, cooked together for about a minute. Bake in a 325-degree oven until potatoes are candied. Lift out carefully and arrange dots of pimento on each heart.

Queen of Hearts Tarts

Line muffin-tins with pie pastry, prick and bake. Mix and cook until thick in a double boiler one-half cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon salt, two tablespoons flour, one cup evaporated milk, three-fourths cup of water, two tablespoons butter or margarine, and three beaten egg yolks. Flavor with one teaspoon vanilla and chill. Fill the cooled tart-shells half full of this chilled mixture and top with drained, sweetened canned cherries.

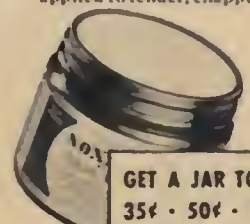

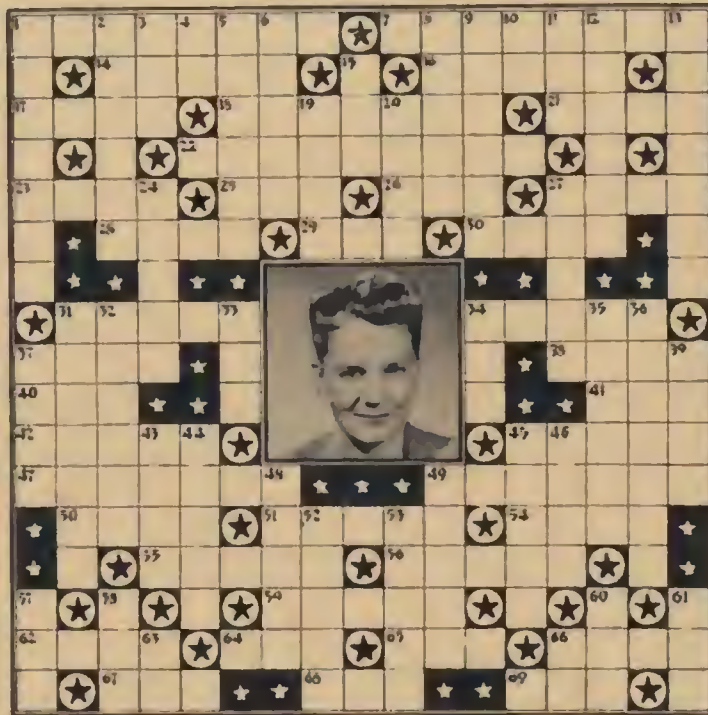

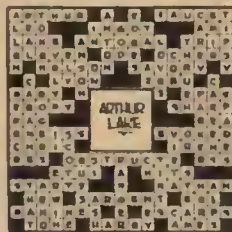

every member of the occupied countries the chance to strike its own final, complete blow for liberation against the Axis. The French on the Continent must feel that they have given that blow for their beloved France, the Greeks for their Greece, the Norwegians, Czechs, Poles, Yugoslavs, the Danes, Netherlanders, Belgians—each must be accorded the right to help push the common enemy to the knees, both militarily and psychologically.

In other words, they will have to (and there is not the slightest doubt but what they will, if given the opportunity) gather behind their own fighting forces to free themselves.

After all, the fact that they have continued their resistance to the invader at the price of food, family, imprisonment, torture and death, earns for them the right to give that final blow in their own names, rather than owing everything to the Americans, the British and the Russians.

That way, and that way only, can they be our friends and self-respect-

ing allies, rather than our wards and "weak brothers."

That way, and that way only, shall we all meet at the peace table on equal terms, and with equal human rights in reconstruction for the future. Freedom of religion and speech, freedom from want and fear—yes, all four of those. But to that list, add a fifth: Freedom with honor.

Valentine Salad

- 2 tablespoons gelatin
- ½ cup cold water
- 2½ cups stewed tomatoes
- 2 slices onion
- Pieces of bay leaf
- 2 whole cloves
- ½ cup flaked shrimps
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Few grains cayenne
- 1 tablespoon capers
- 1 tablespoon vinegar

Soak gelatin in cold water five minutes. Cook onion, spices, seasonings and vinegar with tomatoes. Strain, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool and add shrimps and capers. Pour into heart-shaped molds which have been dipped into cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise and slices of olive.

arches and brings leg muscles into play. Another good exercise is to pick up a marble with the toes of one foot and place it on the floor beside the other foot. Reverse the process and repeat several times. See if you don't feel the pull on all the muscles in your feet!

Plunge your feet into a basin of hot water for a few minutes, switch to cold for just a jiffy. Repeat this one about five times, then lie on the floor with your feet propped up on a chair for about fifteen minutes. After this, you'll be on the road to recovery. 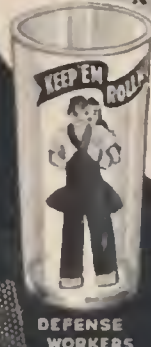
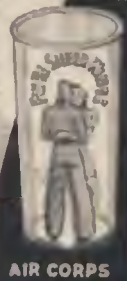
