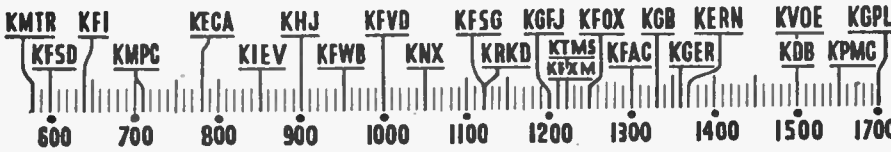

Two Fairs To Join In August 3 Blast

Nation-wide tribute to the broadcasting industry of the United States will be made by the New York and San Francisco Fairs, August 3. Ceremonies at the two expositions will provide a one-hour broadcast to be heard over KHJ and the Mutual Don Lee net and other major hookups from 4:00 to 5:00 p.m., PST.

Program details have not yet been completed. However, speakers will include Harvey D. Gibson, chairman of the board of the New York Fair; Marshall Dill, president of the Golden Gate Exposition, and Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters.

Amateur Programs Set Two On Picture Career

Singers, dancers, bone-clackers, banjo strummers, trumpet soloists, and other assorted amateurs parade before the KECA microphone Saturdays at 8:00 p.m., when Willard "Doc" Hall conducts hilarious "Tune Out Time."

Program is an hour-long fiesta of fun and entertainment. It features Southern California amateurs whose talent remains questionable until actual broadcast time. No artist who appears on the program has had previous auditions and no one knows how good or bad he will be.

Evidence the program accomplishes natural as well as fun results was given this week. Two of the amateurs heard on previous programs have been signed by major studios for small parts in forthcoming pictures.

No Planes, Please! Pleads Bing Crosby

Ever since articles of incorporation were filed in Sacramento, by a "Crosby Aircraft Corporation," Bing Crosby's life has been a continuous flight from inventors. They trail him to broadcasts, and follow him to his movie studio, and track him down at home, trying to gain his interest in carburetor needles, bombing sights, warp-proof valves, or rivetless fuse-lages.

"I am definitely not air-minded," annoyed Crosby insists. "I haven't a cent invested in airplanes."

Wars Add To Speech With Potent Words

The role of the radio commentator in streamlining the average American's vocabulary so that he may keep up with the lightning progress of the war in Europe is without precedent in the history of journalism, according to Raymond Gram Swing, popular news analyst for White Owl cigars, whose nightly program is broadcast over KHJ and the Mutual Don Lee net at 6:00 p.m., PST.

Many new words have become familiar through the efforts of radio and press: words such as "Blitzkrieg," for a lightning mechanized war, "Parashot," for British sharpshooters defending England from Nazi "parachutists"—itself a word the war has rightly extended in meaning. The "fifth column" marched into our vocabulary as a synonym for traitorous underground organizations disrupting industry and civilian morale behind the lines. Mr. Swing also explains that radio commentators have helped us understand the newly broadened meaning of such words as "appeasement," forever to be remembered in connection with Munich and former Prime Minister Chamberlain's ill-fated visit.

Mr. Swing himself may be credited with adding a new phrase to our language. It is "Mental Maginot line," referring to the doctrine of defensive warfare which has been instilled in us by the writings of Liddell Hart and others.

## On 'Sucker' Schools

### Credulous Are Warned Against Fake Promises Of Promoters Who Are Out For Easy Money Making

**"Wanted: Men and Women for Radio Announcing!"**  
**"Now Casting for Big Radio Show!"**  
**"Careers Open in Radio Writing and Acting!"**

IN THE above three blackface lines, Radio Life Readers, are the figurative traps into which annually thousands of credulous men, women and children fall.

They are the "Come-ons" of rattletrap "schools," the bait of conscienceless promoters who, shrewdly appraising the psychology of the average individual, "take" him and her for unestimated amount of cash, in exchange for which they give nothing of substantial benefit.

In the Los Angeles area are dozens of 'sucker' schools, operated by misfits in the entertainment world of Radio. Arsenalized with glib phrases and stock patier of a quasi-professional character, these charlatan 'schools' daily barrage the imaginations of ambitious and talented men and women, and youth to net a golden harvest.

Holding out the lure of 'Radio Announcing' to eager youngsters, these 'schools,' in many cases, are but recording studios, where voices are discsd at so much a disc. True, 'school officials,' as part of their selling talk, imply these recordings will be brought to attention of radio studio officials for study and consideration. But, the job for which one answered the advertising is, sadly enough, rarely, if ever, forthcoming.

There are two good reasons why 'jobs' in Radio do not come through the glib promises of such a school. First, the 'principals' of such 'schools' have no cooperative working agreement with major networks, and, seldom, with important independent stations. (2) Radio, itself, does not seek its material from sources outside of those it has developed over years of sound businesslike procedure.

Explained one Major Network official:

**"The Radio industry, in general, recognizes no school of acting, engineering or announcing. It, therefore, indorses none, save those a network system will create for its own special uses. And such schools do not advertise. This doesn't mean, of course, that there are not schools**

which turn out competent material in writers, technicians and actresses and actors. But, Radio knows its own field best. It can draw from hundreds, nay, thousands of proved

men and women in their various metiers. It has a scouting system by means of which, through motion pictures, booking agencies, casting and advertising agencies, in little theatres and good schools, in night clubs, etcetera, it locates the cream of talent.

Radio writing, like all writing, demands specialized ability. This ability can be studied in many competent schools in the Los Angeles area, as can talent for acting. In the main, however, Radio Life Readers are cautioned to proceed sensibly in the matter of acquiring knowledge of subjects with which they hope to break into radio. Sound instruction is needed, and it must be acquired, somehow. For those youngsters who cannot attend University courses, there are schools which prepare students sufficiently to give them a far better chance in radio work than the wildly promising 'school.'

Go back to the beginning of this article. Read the first blackface line:

**"Wanted: Men and Women for Radio Announcing."**

If you are sufficiently interested to respond to this advertisement, or one like it, ask the 'school' promoter these pertinent questions:

**"Is there a legitimate opening for Radio Announcers known to you, and for which this advertisement was written to fill?"**

**"Have you been asked to supply Radio announcers for any Station or Network?"**

Make the promoter answer these questions. If he won't or can't, leave him strictly alone.

Read the second and third blackface lines. Ask the promoter:

**"If I take a course with you, have you radio connections that will assure me a place in radio?"**

**"What is your particular background in Radio?"**

**"You say I will be placed in a production. What sort of a production? For how much? With whom?"**

Don't be afraid to ask these questions. No honest school official will hesitate in answering. The dishonest one will try to cover up with oratory and entreaty. He traps himself under pertinent questioning.

Radio Life, as a public service, has compiled a list of accredited radio subject schools. The principals of these are community figures whose reputations are beyond question. For parents planning radio studies for their sons or daughters, Radio Life will undertake to give kindly and constructive information. You need but mail in a school query with a 3 cent stamp.

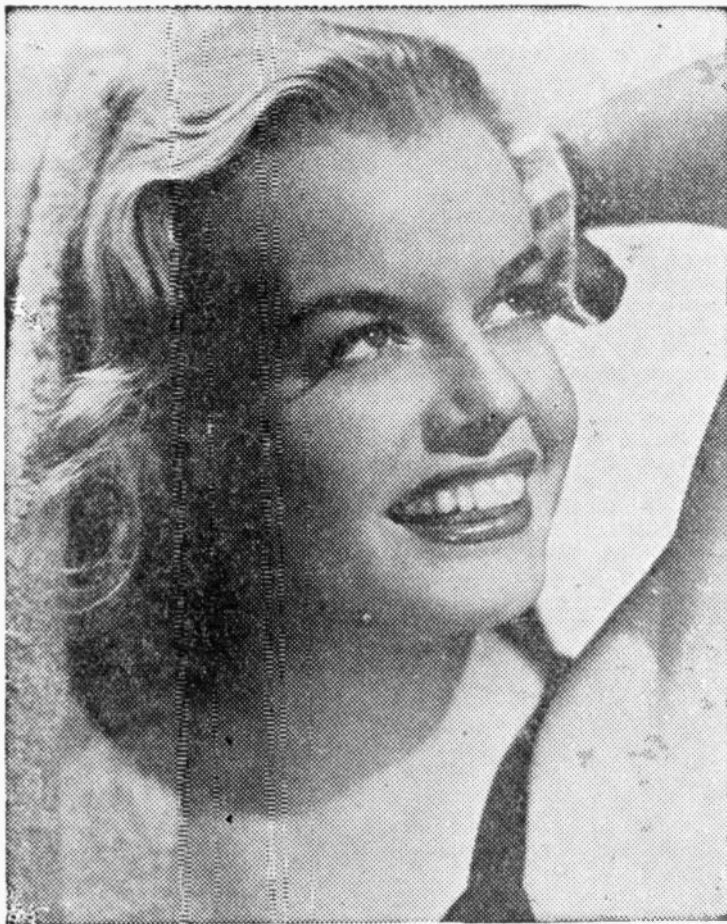

## CENSORS AND FACTS

French Blunders Beat Nation,—Taylor

Arduous at any time, more than arduous in these critical times, is broadcasting of European news to this country. Graphically illustrated was this statement this week by Edmond Taylor, CBS correspondent in France.

For Radio Life Readers Broadcaster Taylor gave highlights of difficulties met in following the French Government as it scurried ahead of advancing Nazi Legions, desperately seeking a place to light and conduct affairs of a country soon to be without affairs to conduct.

Coupled with the difficulties of war time censorship was the job of getting bewildered French officialdom to cooperate with American broadcasters, as well as working with makeshift emergency equipment.

"In Bordeaux and Tours, facilities were primitive, to say the least," Tay-

lor declared in an interview at Columbia's headquarters. "In Tours we could not even get a time check and when Eric Sevareid (chief of the CBS Paris bureau) and I protested to an unsympathetic French engineer he pointed to a kitchen clock on the wall of the improvised studio and said, 'What's the matter with that?'"

"In Bordeaux, we used a reasonably well appointed French studio but in the general confusion we were left to shift for ourselves. The night that the Reynaud government fell, Sevareid and I, after a wild dash without headlights through a mile of winding, inky black streets arrived panting in the studio and announced we had a flash for America.

"The studio engineer said it was all right with him, but there was a lady playing the mandolin to South America and she was to be

on for another fifteen minutes. We burst into the studio and, after an acrimonious argument which was probably heard all around the world, persuaded the indignant musician to yield us the microphone.

"On the other hand, the radio censors somehow evaporated in the general confusion, the authorities simply forgot all about us, and for three days we were able to go on the air whenever we liked and say anything we pleased."

Rumors about Balbo's assassination were due entirely to methods employed by Italian censors, according to Taylor, who explained:

"Actually there was no mystery about Balbo's death. He was shot down by a British fighter several days before his death was announced. The Italian censorship suppressed the news as long as it dared and then, to cover up this suppression, announced that Balbo had just been killed.

"This gave the British propaganda experts a wonderful opening. They knew perfectly well what had happened. But they were able to say quite truthfully that no British planes had flown over Libya on the day that Balbo, according to the Italian news, had been killed. It was a very effective attack in the propaganda war and the Italians had no defense because they could not bring themselves to admit they were covering up unfavorable news.

"Of course that was just an incident in the war between England and Italy but the blunders of the French censorship had a direct and important role in the downfall of France. French censorship was so fantastic that many of the American correspondents suspected one or more of the French censors were fifth columnists deliberately working for the enemy."

Taylor, author of the widely acclaimed book, "Strategy of Terror," expose of Nazi fifth column methods, arrived here last Saturday for Columbia network duties on this side of the Atlantic.

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## Swell Head No Asset In Making Radio Start

If you think you're dramatically "gifted" you'd better give up and start all over if you want to be an actor, advises Karl Weber who plays the leading male role in the *Woman in White*, broadcast Mondays through Fridays at 8:00 a. m., PST, over the NBC-Red Network.

No art is a gift, he maintains. But he will grant that certain basic attributes are essential.

"Given intelligence, a persistent curiosity concerning human nature, a tendency toward exhibitionism almost anyone can become an actor," is Weber's way of putting it. Also, a gift for mimicry may be an asset, as may good looks and a good voice. Beyond these the art of acting must be learned."

For the embryonic radio actor, Weber recommends, particularly, a course in muscle and breath control, voice control, study of emotion, together with every phase of acting technique.

# KINDLY 'DR. CHRISTIAN'

Jean Hersholt Throws Light On Self

"Oh, Doctor! May I speak with you a moment?"

In this one sentence Hollister Noble, publicity staff-man for CBS, illumined the principal figure of "Dr. Christian."

That figure was hurrying by to rehearsal on the stage of CBS' little theatre. It was a figure best described by saying it is "shortish-tall," surmounted by a thatch of graying hair and a head whose face was round, and in which deeply blue eyes glistened with a constant humor. The stocky, yet not short body, had an earthily solid quality about it. One felt its compact independence and self-reliance. Now the face turned toward us in the wings of the theatre and the sturdy legs, propelling the figure onto the stage where waited Rosemary DeCamp and other cast members, slowed their gait. A thick-lipped mouth opened and blue eyes, momentarily blinking against the wing lights, widened in recognition.

"In an hour, please boys! I am late."

In his dressing room Jean Hersholt weighed the question which I had chosen to break the ice.

"Have I a formula for life?" His voice was slow, soft and deliberate. He knocked ash from an old pipe and settled back in his chair. "No, I don't think I have." His lips curled in a thoroughly human grin. "But, I suppose, that means that I must have one." He tapped himself vigorously over the heart. "All right! Say I have a formula. Put it this way: No man or woman is worth his or her salt who is not sincerely interested in making life better for others. We emphasize too much what we as individuals are going to get, or which we should get, out of life. Too often we miss the point of living, which is that happiness for the individual can be possible only when the individual has tried to bring happiness to others."

He said this with a kind of ferocity that made me smile.

"Yah," he pushed on. Now that he was started a slight Danish accent marked his speech, "here's a formula. You may think it is 'corny'—but I can't help that. I believe with all of my heart that whatever good or bad a person does in life is bound to come back to them."

Corny? Perhaps. But, it certainly fits the young Danish actor who landed in America in 1912 and started to carve out the career that has been watched by millions since. Jean Hersholt is kind; but his kindness isn't sticky, self-seeking or ostentatious. It is a quality that must well up from a just heart and mind. Hersholt has struggled with life. He has seen how rotten it can be at times, how terribly it can be reflected in the thousand and one sins of humanity, and how trying it can be at times. He decided early, he said, that there were but two choices of life for anybody. One was to kick out in the

struggle for survival and let the devil take the hindmost. The other was to be part of fellowship and to exert oneself in that part. He chose the latter.

His exertions today encompass presidencies of the Motion Picture Relief Fund, an old people's Home, Board memberships on AFRA (American Federation of Radio Artists) and the Screen Actors Guild. Besides he spends long hours in behalf of the profession's tubercular home at Lake Saranac, New York.

"Doctor" fits Hersholt. In "Dr. Christian" he plays the part of an old country Doctor who muddles through for his sometimes ungrateful patients. Hundreds listen to the program. They are sure that "Dr. Christian" can help them. So they write to Jean Hersholt. He cannot, and, of course, doesn't give medical advice. Nor does he give other advice begged for by unhappy persons who have listened to the charm of a soothing voice of a mythical "Doctor" going his rounds about a mythical countryside. "Doctor" Jean Hersholt is, a professional practitioner of service to life, with a creed of conduct that is as refreshing as dew-drenched clover on a rural morning.

**"Live in a way that gives good meaning to others besides yourself."**

Jean Hersholt believes in America. When I asked him to comment upon world conditions his voice came out on a strange note of commingled bitterness and joy.

"In Europe a fluid fire has choked out the lungs of decently organized life. It has burned to a crisp the civilization that life has tried to make.

**"In America we should realize we are custodians of world morality and spirituality. Every father and mother, son and daughter of America, must realize the responsibility they bear to civilization by being Americans."**

"Should we send men to fight overseas?"

"No," he said, slowly. "Being from Denmark I feel bad about what has happened there, but to send our youth to die on European battlefields—no, I do not like that. Better we come to realize that here we have much to defend. Let us prepare to defend it. Let us be strong in armaments and in strength to fight for that for which the people of the world now cry out, 'Democracy!' in time, the rest of the world will sober up, look to us and come to us for a design for life. This is our responsibility. Defend what we deem precious if we must, but defend it so that a sick world may, in its moment of disillusionment and waking, come to us to be made well again."

In Radio's mythical world Jean Hersholt may deal out imaginary pills and tablets, bring non-existent cures into non-existent surroundings; but, in the practical world of

## Kids Quiz Shows Up Adult Intelligence

A storm is brewing on the National scene. It may bring into clashing contest, more bitter than the most partisan political battle, proud parents of America's great cities.

In the threatened impending warfare between cities Los Angeles, with the finest school system in the land, may be called upon to defend its reputation against Chicago.

**And little children shall lead them; little children who pack more efficiency in their baby brains, than many an adult who prides himself on 'arning.'**

It may all come about as the result of the Radio program "Quiz Kids" (6:30 p.m., Fridays, KFI). Out-experting the experts the 'Kids', whose program originates in and is confined to Chicago, are challenging the as yet undetermined intelligence of 'kids' in other towns. At the same time they affront that very certain characteristic of American community life called "Pride of the Old Home Town." And, on the tempest this affront is blowing up will ride the legions of parents who will not take even implied insults calmly. We may yet hear in the comparative quiet of America, now only disturbed by the soft dulcet cooing of the Vote-Hunting Candidate, the anguished cries of proud men and women:

**"Our Kids must be given a chance."**

**"Our girls and boys have more sense to the ounce of gray matter than the kids of twenty Chicagos, Philadelphias, New Yorks and New Orleans wrapped into one."**

You may have always thought it was "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush." But, the truth of the old adage is: "A bird in the hand is worth two in the air." Imagine the red faces of indulgent adults who heard a Chicago youngster give this quotation. The adults smiled and smirked good naturedly at such childish 'ignorance.' A week later they 'burned' with embarrassment as the youngster came back with books to offer five hundred years of proof that his quotation was right and their idea of it wrong.

The 'Kids' taking part range in years from 6 to 17. And in the lower bracket there is displayed oftentimes a knowledge of current events and oddities of information that put their elders to shame.

For example:

"What policy in international affairs, linked to declining trade indexes, is generally credited with the present European crisis?"

Makes you blink, eh? Wrinkle the old brows, elders! If it stumps you just think of 7-year-old Gerard Darrow, the baby 'John Kieran' of the Show. Baby Gerard's face took on a hurt expression. He pouted and glared. He fidgeted around. He made a face at the grinning audience and then piped:

**"It was the appeasement policy of Mr. Chamberlain of England."**

Quiz Master is one Joe Kelly. Mr. Kelly has learned not to spare the intellectual rod. In fact he has grown to take an almost sadistic delight in flailing it across the sensitive and immature minds of his little rascals. He has learned not to take them casually.

There was the night smart-cracking Joe Kelly posed this one to Van Dyke Tiers, 13, the wide-mouthed intellectual of the group:

**"The aberrated assassin was a dumb-bell and resuscitated his victim. Spell it, Van Dyke."**

It was spelled. A minute later Mary Anderson, bored with Mr. Kelly and his naive questions, smartly whipped out in answer to a question in identification of Dorothy Lamour's publicity signature:

**"It's a sarong and it's Miss Lamour's mainstay."**

Believe it or not, the responses the kids make to some question-positors often have made the popular 'Information, Please' look as elementary as a Kay Kyser musical questionnaire.

Made up of children entirely, the program is not for kid's ears. In fact, there is some argument that it is not for adult ears, either. It has been held that adults are too limited in intelligence to really enjoy the show.

Maybe.

**"In addition to the apertyx what other living creature has aperient proclivities?"**

**"What's proclivities?"** sighed little Gerard, while the grownup audience pondered 'apertyx' and 'aperient.' Apparently those words were ducky for Gerard.

Joe Kelly flourished a bit.

**"Proclivities . . . ? Well, ahem . . . I'd say it meant 'disposition' or let us say 'habit,' or, perhaps . . ."**

Gerard looked disdainful. **"It's okay, Mr. Kelly. I got it. It could be a trap door spider. It makes and lives its life in a passageway or aperture . . ."**

Chicago started the "Kid's Quiz." It must remain for other cities to take Chicago to the juvenile 'cleaners.' And expert opinion has it that of all California places, Los Angeles, with a school child intelligence rating above the American average, must be the logical city to dust off arrogant Chicago.

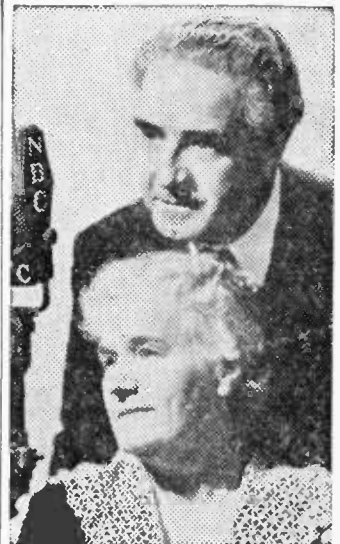

## Air Program Attacks Espionage Tricks

The United States is a German country and rightfully it belongs to Germany.

In proportion to other racial and national groups Germans are in majority in the United States. They have done more to create, preserve and upbuild America than any other people.

**The time is rapidly approaching when Germans must take over the United States as a rightful heritage.**

If you don't agree with the foregoing statements you are not in agreement with subtle Nazi propagandists who for years have been at work undermining the loyalty of a loosely related heterogeneous American population. Because these statements are not our own but are from the handbook of Nazi "Instruction for Our Friends Overseas."

**For years Nazis have prepared to exert a world-wide influence, first effects of which have become dramatically obvious in capitulation of Lowlands, small nations and large in lightning-warred Europe.**

For almost a decade Nazi practices of softening up populations to make conquests easier have been in force in the United States. Hundreds of thousands of pamphlets have been distributed to farmers, workers and lower middle-class Americans in an attempt to persuade them to believe they would be better off if certain features of their national life were eliminated.

Shrewd psychologists, the Nazi mind moulders have for years harped on harmless and innocent Jews. America is Jewish dominated, they have insisted. They control America's money. They own the Press. Revolt against their tyranny! Which means, in effect, revolt not so much against Jews as against the government of the country.

**Bulwark against Nazi inhumanity has been a Document. The Constitution of the United States has a peculiar property. It is like a protective mantle thrown about the shoulders of all classes and races in free America. Few Americans can recite the first line of the Preamble to the Document, but there is scarcely an American who does not feel the Constitution as an invisible monitor of all his comings and goings, and as a "Strong Knight" to protect him against onslaughts of forces inimical to democratic life. Yet, the American's confidence in the power and meaning for decency in life of the Constitution is, perhaps, his greatest weakness and open invitation to destruction of that for which, he often swears, he "will lay down his life."**

Realizing the hold the Constitution has on the American mind while, in many less fortunate lands, peoples have become habituated to changes in constitutional provisions, zealous Nazis recently have blared:

**"The fundamental aim must always be to discourage conditions in the United States. If Americans are to be free, they must destroy the Constitution which . . . is the chain that ties the whole misery of American politics."**

Lumped together are all such nefarious attempts to break down the average American's love of country, lumped under a phrase that has become common to the English language—"Fifth Column."

Certain that there is more to defend and safeguard in America than there is to give cause for disastrous thought or action, Mutual-Don Lee Broadcasting system this week called attention to:

**Program, "Wings for America."**

Mutual listeners who follow "Wings for America," new series exposing the activities of American fifth columnists, will receive elementary counter-espionage training, according to author and producer Blair Walliser and Col. Thos.

R. Gowenlock, former assistant chief of the A.E.F. first division intelligence staff during the World War. Colonel Gowenlock is lending the benefits of his long experience in spy work to the program which is heard over KHJ and the Mutual-Don Lee net Fridays from 4 to 4:30 p.m. PST, throughout the summer.

**"Wings for America" producers will add to the program information on how the average citizen can recognize dangerous propaganda and do his bit in protecting the nation from Trojan Horse agents. Through the dramatic medium, they hope to be able to help listeners to distinguish between dangerous fifth column activity and the false fears that so frequently arise in national emergencies.**

**CHEF MILANI'S . . . . . Food Filosofy**

**H**ERE are some odds and ends of gastronomical information that may interest you; little bits of epicurean thought-stimulation that may whet your intellectual appetite.



They say that the French have over four-hundred ways of fixing a fillet of sole.

Truffles, which you must not confuse with trifles, are said to make women both tender and sympathetic.

A report has it that Paderewski's favorite American delicacy is scallops.

Foods can be digested chemically outside of the stomach—on a slab in a lab—but I'm pretty sure you all prefer the old-fashioned way!



Our recipe this week calls for Shrimp a la Creole—enough for six. In order to fix it, the following ingredients are necessary.

Two cups of cooked shrimps; one half of a small onion chopped very fine; one-half cup of mushrooms; four tablespoons of butter; two tablespoons of flour; one cup of mushroom broth; one cup of water; one-half teaspoon of salt; one-eighth teaspoon of pepper; a dash of cayenne; one-fourth teaspoon of thyme; one bay leaf; two pimientos chopped; three sprigs of parsley; and one cup of boiled or steamed rice.

When gathering the above items together, you might as well also consider what you need for the rest of the dinner, which, in addition to Shrimp a la

Creole, may consist of a pimeapple and grapefruit cocktail, some celery en branche, gherkins, French fried potatoes, buttered Brussels sprouts, frozen tomato salad, and cream pie and coffee.

The directions for frying shrimp a la Creole are as follows:

Saute the onions and mushrooms in butter for three minutes. Stir in the flour and cook for one minute. Add liquids gradually and cook until they thicken, stirring constantly. Add the seasonings, shrimps and pimientos, and cook for five minutes more; then serve on a rice ring, garnishing same with parsley.



So much for food.

Now for a word about something that has nothing to do with food.

It may seem a little strange for a chef to write about driving safely, but in view of the kind of driving that is being done all around us these days, I feel compelled to cooperate with the many safety campaigns in progress and do my bit to encourage cautiousness and prudence.

In this respect, I always like to say that it's better to wait for the green light than wait for an ambulance. After all, only a wild bull charges when he sees red. As I said on the air last week, take it easy or you may not take it at all.

"A word to the wise is sufficient."

Now let's return to the dining room with a little note on hospitality:

That famous and much quoted epilogue, de Savarin, once said that "To invite anyone implies that we charge ourselves with his or her happiness all the time that he or she is under our roof." This means that we must discharge our responsibility towards our guests by making things unusually pleasant for them. We must think of their tastes and interests instead of ours. We must go out of our way to make them feel perfectly content.

**'Machine-gun' Mike Is Sound Shooter**

"What is a 'Machine Gun' mike?"

Many a Radio Life Reader has asked this question. And to answer these many Readers, Radio Life sent a reporter to CBS engineers this week to get for them the following description:

"The 'machine gun' mike doesn't shoot bullets. It merely looks like the weapon from which its name was borrowed. 'Machine gun mike' is much easier to say than "acoustic impedance unit," which is the gadget's scientific name.

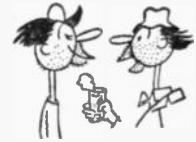
"The function of the 'machine gun' mike is to pick out the sounds—such as cheering—made by any section of a crowd, so those sounds can be put on the air. The mike is aimed at the action desired to be picked up, much as field glasses are trained at objects. As glasses magnify distant objects, the 'machine gun' mike catches and amplifies sounds in its tubes, transfer-

ring them to the dynamic microphone.

"The mike bears a striking resemblance to the deadly weapon from which it derives its name. Mounted on a tripod, it consists of almost a hundred tubes, varying in length from an inch-and-a-half to more than three-and-a-half feet, all spiraled into a telescopic effect. The telescope form is reversed, however, the large end facing the user. This end contains a dynamic microphone. The tubes taper away from it to serve as a hundred 'ears' to pick up the distant sounds of hoof-beats, cheering, bands or whatever other sound it is desired to catch.

# Citizens Are Born

*The Oppressed And Unhappy Of The World  
Come Here To Become Humans  
Again With Hope In Life*

"YOU wish to say something?" The Federal Court Judge smiled down at the young woman who up to then had been waving one hand above her head.

The voice of the Judge beat out the inevitable sound of a roomful of people. Quiet, attentive and profound, settled down.

In the Federal Court chamber a class of American citizenship candidates had been taking their last examination. A few moments ago they had raised their right hands and sworn to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States. The kindly-voiced Judge had enumerated advantages of American Citizenship. Individually in the souls of the class relief welled in. Inside of them, it may be said, went up a silent shout of Thanksgiving. They were American Citizens!

The attractive young woman to whom the Judge addressed his question, was set in a spotlight of four hundred eyes.

"You wished to say something?"

Her brown eyes lighted with glowing intensity, she squared her shoulders as though to control the trembling of full and sensitive lips. Her eyes dimmed momentarily. Those nearest her saw tears in them.

The Judge smiled.

"Perhaps," he said with tolerant wisdom, "perhaps you'd better keep those sentiments deep inside of you. As," his smile became broad, "as an armour of resolve for your future in the United States."

"No!" Her voice burst with sudden and full passion. "No, Judge. I must say what I feel." Her tones were flecked with the metallic throatiness of one who talks above emotion. She took a deep breath and faced the chamber full of new citizens.

"I only want to say—Thank God for America. Here there is room to breathe, room to live, room to dream and room to expand in one's life and to become true to oneself and to make life. This oath I have

taken—that we have taken—is more than that. It is consecration . . ." Her voice broke and recovered again . . . "consecration of ourselves to hope and to life in a land for which all right people in the world are longing."

To the average American, accustomed to taking life for granted in the Democracy of his forefather's building, there would be, perhaps, something slightly hysterical or theatrical about such a scene. But, to the people in that room the words were real and recalled much they came to America to forget.

Almost all of them came from lands in other parts of the world, lands in which the practice of human liberty and justice are, in the main, mere catch-words. Many of them, wiser than others still squirming and suffering beneath the cruel prod of dictatorships, had fled early native scenes. They guessed that in coming time those scenes would hear the anguish of innocents, would feel the iron ring of oppression and terrors by night. Guessing they turned sadly, yet hopefully, to a land upon whose gateway there is raised skyward a figure holding high a torch from which, symbolically, the light of Liberty shines strongly.

Sometime ago, one of these naturalized citizens, Jean Armand, asked himself: Wasn't here the germ of a radio program? Wouldn't life-stories of new Americans make interesting listening, and serve to remind natural-born citizens of their blessings? A talk with the Los Angeles offices of the Federal Bureau of Naturalization convinced Jean Armand that he had more than a germ of an idea. He had a program!

He set to work with cooperative Federal officials. He scouted the film and radio colony, believing that naturalized citizens who had made their 'mark' in the New World, would be, naturally, more of interest to listeners. At least until the program was established. Then it would be time for the pulsating life dramas of the butcher, the baker and candlestick maker.

"A Citizen is Born" made its radio debut on KMPC, "The Station of the Stars," June 7, and has been heard each Friday night since, from 9:00 to 9:30 p.m.

From Europe, Africa, and Asia come these radio autobiographers to present to fellow citizens a new concept of other countries and of Americanism. Re-enacting parts of their own lives, these adopted sons, with a supporting cast, recreate the experiences of a newcomer to the United States. They tell how they reached out in their native lands for those things which are truly American, of their migration, of their reception in the new world, and of hopes and opportunities realized in this country.

Juan de la Cruz, famous Danish baritone, was the first new American citizen to tell his story. Subsequent programs brought Reginald Denny, film star and model aeroplane manufacturer; Max Steiner, composer, and Joe Penner.



Producing The Program

**I**n a softly lighted KMPC studio on a recent Friday night there came before a microphone one of Europe's erstwhile simple citizens, one of the great mass of bakers and candlestick makers. He seemed frightened now that he was standing there, making ready to tell of his life to a vast group of American citizens assembled in modern comforts in their homes along the Pacific Coast.

So simple his story and yet so poignantly real. As he told it he lost his timidity and a defiance of the Old World came into his voice. He felt safe here in America, safe from the Thing which had forced him to uproot himself, flee through a dozen lands and across the Atlantic to win a breathing interval against the shadow-like terror that cast itself ever in his consciousness.

"So," he said, "my family that had given three doctors, an engineer, a philosopher and a writer to the good of humanity, was broken up. All of us were sent to concentration camps. Why? Because the authorities said that we were dangerous to the authoritarian state. We gave people ways to think for themselves. This was our crime—that we believed that the individual has a right to expect and to teach others that freedom proceeds from the masses of people, and not from the dictates of a few."

"For myself I could not live without my work to do. Where I was they scorned me and my work, which was without racial, religious or political bias. I was a researchist, in embryology. I dreamed and still dream of making humanity better in body and mind and in spirit. Here, maybe, I can go on. There," his brown eyes were cast-down, "I was told: 'You are a dirty — We don't want you to meddle with people. We know best what is good for people.' I was struck across the face with a rifle butt, and fell beneath a sign that said, 'God Is With Us.' Eight months ago I knelt on a ship deck and looked out across the water to a statue that had no sign. It merely stood high in the air and seemed to tell me and the others: 'If you have work to do, come and do it. There are no tyrants here.'"

**O**UTSIDE KMPC a few members of a Citizenship class stand and exchange names and sharing gratefully with each other, their joy over becoming American citizens.

We single one out. We ask a question. He stares as though we were absurd.

"Why have I become an American citizen? Why? Why, indeed!" Because in Europe there is nothing for which a human being can stand." His tones are restrained and cultured. "I was a Pole. My family was one of the landed. We met our responsibilities by trying to make comfortable and happy our tenants. Communists came and provoked people to rebel against landlords. Continental politicians and commercial interests financed a counter revolution. We lost what we had. I saw totalitarianism coming up. I left before it arrived with Hitler. Hitler or anybody else." He shrugged. "It doesn't matter. Europe today is a place where there can be no survival of a will for a better life. Selfish interests are mak-

ing pawns of millions of lives. Life has become of no consequence. So much hope is gone from the old world that no one can stay and really live. That is why I am here. I know, perhaps, better than you who are so close to it, what a clean and shining place America is. I know what it means to me in being able to breathe without fear, to think and to speak without inviting prison or physical punishment. "He gestured helplessly. "I wish I could explain."

Perhaps it was hard for him to explain what America meant to him, to one who had taken for granted with easy familiarity institutions, services and extensive human liberties that had always been a part of his life. Perhaps it was hard for him to make one see that to him there was a warmth to

the sun, a good purpose possible for each day and a reason for dreams and effort in a land in contrast to lands and people grown mad. Perhaps. But, we were getting the idea.

A tiny bright-eyed French woman smiled at our question.

"Why 'ave I become an Americane? Eet is seemple. Because I weesh to leeve in a land where hu... man... it... eee—ees great."

A blonde giant of a man was next. His clipped Scandinavian accents were interesting.

"Aye vant tu be in a land were dere is freedom, vere dere is a chance tu be a man. Yu-rup is nutting but a slaughter haus of hu-men hopes."

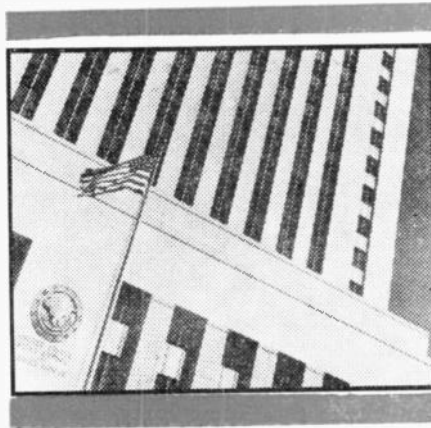
"I can say it for all of us." The interrupting voice was Oxfordian. "It's here that life must begin again for the world. That's why we've become Americans—to be a part of a job of world rebuilding."

Walking down brightly lighted Wilshire boulevard, looking in at cafes in which laughter rang gaily and infectiously, looking at the stream of motors, the imposing building facades, and observing the easy good nature of sidewalk crowds, we came upon a conviction. We stopped and looked back at the winking sign of KMPC. We thought of the program we had just heard and seen.

"Here," we said to ourselves, "is America, and I am an American in it. To these people America is a refuge and a hope. What is it to me? The answer came from within, soft as the challenge of love. "Home and work and fraternal liberty for all of good mind."

An American, stirring in a sweet pain of rebirth, went whistling homeward.

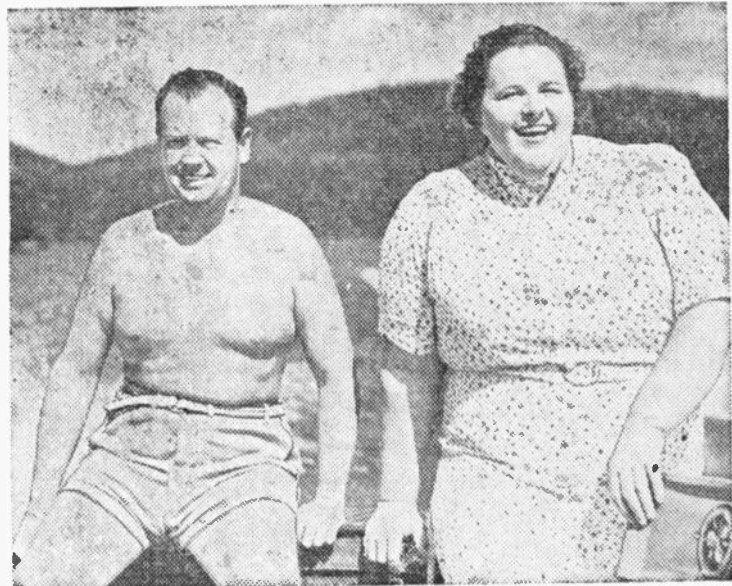

Music doesn't change essentially, but the variations on themes are different from generation to generation. Question? Will the 'Jive' fans of today be looked upon indulgently by the platter addicts of a new music fad tomorrow?

# TROUPER TO AIR KING

## Niles Trammell Comes Up Hard Way

**A**LTHOUGH only forty-six years of age, Niles Trammell, newly-elected President of the National Broadcasting Company, is a brilliant "career man" in the radio and broadcasting fields. His experience covers the rise of the industry from an infant entertainment art to its present stature as a public service, a dominant advertising medium, and the most popular form of universal entertainment for the home. One of the pioneers of network broadcasting, Trammell has been associated with the National Broadcasting Company since 1928. His connection with radio, however, dates back to 1923. He began his business career with the Radio Corporation of America in the commercial field in San Francisco seventeen years ago.

Born in Marietta, Georgia, July 6, 1894, he attended school at Sewanee Military Academy and the University of the South. When the United States entered the World War he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the regular army at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He saw military service at Fort Snelling, Minn., Camp Devens, Mass., and at

the infantry school at Fort Benning. At the close of the war he was a first lieutenant in the 36th Infantry of the 12th Division.

Instead of entering civilian life immediately he remained in the army until 1923 as a member of the staff of Major General Charles G. Morton at the Presidio in San Francisco. During that year he was married to Miss Elizabeth Huff of Greensburg, Pa., the stepdaughter of General Morton. In March, 1923, Trammell resigned from the army to become commercial representative, Traffic Department, Radio Corporation of America. In the following year he was appointed District Manager of the Pacific Northwest for the Marine Division of Radio Corporation of America. By 1925 Trammell had risen to Assistant Sales Manager, Pacific Division, Radio Corporation of America.

Joining the National Broadcasting Company as a salesman in March, 1928, Trammell began a career that in twelve years brought him to the position of President of the largest radio broadcasting corporation in the world.

It is by working up that he now can look down with the satisfaction of knowing the effort was worth the rewards.

His story thereafter is one of rapid promotion. Two months after he joined NBC, Trammell was named Manager of the Central Division of NBC with headquarters in Chicago. In March, 1929, he was elected Vice-President in Charge of the Central Division. In January, 1939, he was transferred to New York and elected Executive Vice-President.

Network broadcasting is largely a co-operative achievement, and many factors must be satisfied to insure a happy broadcasting family. The tribute paid to Niles Trammell, therefore, just before he left Chicago is perhaps unprecedented in the history of radio. The managers of sixty NBC affiliated stations in nearly as many cities gathered and presented him with a fine watch and a scroll that read in part as follows:

"We station managers feel deep indebted to him for the part he has played in the development of radio broadcasting. Through his long service as Vice-President in Charge of the NBC Central District, he has formed friendships that far transcend any mere business relationship. They are built enduringly on his understanding of the problems of others, his sense of justice and his friendly spirit. . . ."

The tribute was deserved. In 1928 when he went to Chicago, the NBC Central Division headquarters consisted of one studio and two offices. In giving him the post it was hoped he could raise the income of that office to \$1,000,000 annually. But within the next year, a million dollars' worth of business was sold out of Chicago in one month, and when Trammell left, NBC-Chicago billings consistently average a million dollars a month. More than 1800 programs each month, including 1000 network programs were originating in those studios, including a majority of all daytime commercial programs.

## ★ ★ ★ Score 1 For Fullers, Poet Makes Good

Ted Malone, a soft voice reading of poetry, ("Between the Book Ends"), used to be a Fuller Brush man, he disclosed in an interview with Don Sabre, Radio Life's Roving Radioreporter.

Malone not only sold Fuller brushes, but he earned part of his way through college by doing it, Sabre learned. He broke into radio when he was still in school by announcing from Independence, Missouri, in 1924, the first high school football game to be aired.

When he first began to read, Malone said, he was so afraid of being called a "sissy" that he wouldn't let the manager use his real name, Frank Alden Russell, over the air but had it changed to Ted Malone. Today he has a different conception of poetry.

Malone thinks that the types of poems which bring the biggest response from listeners are verses of loneliness and heartbreak. He says elderly people like memory poems, youngsters in love, romantic cases; mothers with small children, baby poems; and mothers with older children, "Young Man Who Can Succeed" poems.

Between the Bookends is heard Monday through Friday, at 9:15 a.m., PST, over the NBC-Blue Network.

# EDUCATION BY AIR

## Thirty-Two Mutuals Furnish Lessons

By BEATRICE HENSHAW

IN an exclusive interview this week with Van C. Newkirk, Program Director at KHJ, I learned that the Don Lee School of the Air will present an unusually fine series of programs for the fall and winter term. The only air school designed especially for the west coast, the broadcasts are heard on all the thirty-two stations of the Don Lee web, largest regional network in the United States. The entire year's work was planned with aid of and cooperation with western school authorities to give the Don Lee execs an outstanding opportunity to slant each day's program to fit in the regular curriculum. Unfortunately many splendid educational shows are lost to student audiences because they do not tie in with what is being studied and so cannot use it to enrich the public or private school program.

Los Angeles County is the largest user of educational radio programs in the nation. This is due largely to untiring efforts of Elizabeth Goudy, general radio director in the county schools system. Mrs. Goudy has made a national reputation among educators, and under her direction Los Angeles County schools are part of a huge survey being conducted to determine the value of radio in the modern curriculum. With the help of a far-reaching program like the Don Lee Air School much progress should be made this coming year.

The broadcasts will be made up of two fifteen-minute programs from 11:15 to 11:45 each week day morning beginning the first week in October. Included are: Classics of Literature (drama); Senior Odyssey; Travels to Central and South America; "Lest We Forget" (historical dramas), Science and Industry and "Young America Presents," the school's own program, created and produced by the youngsters themselves. These are all more or less continuations of similar efforts of last year but there will be several innovations which promise to be particularly interesting. An entirely new type of School Newscasts will present current events geared to juvenile minds. Added too is a glossary of foreign terms and pronunciations which should be most valuable to the student.

A course in Art Appreciation is to be guided by the Huntington Gallery, the Southland's finest art center, and a new series of Junior Stories will be produced by the Junior League in collaboration with the public library.

Undoubtedly the "feather" in the Don Lee Radio cap, however, is the Standard School broadcasts which are to move over from NBC on October 3rd, and to be heard each Thursday morning for the next three years in this area on KHJ, KGB, KDB, KFXM, KMPC, and KVOE. The program will begin its thirteenth year on the air

this fall, and will be affiliated as usual with the Standard Symphony Hour heard Thursday evenings from 8 to 9 p.m. Through this arrangement a complete course in music appreciation is available to children and adults alike.

From a mere handful of seventy-two schools in 1928, the Standard School Broadcast has increased to a point where it is now heard in nearly five thousand schools with a combined

attendance of half a million children. temporary job answering phones at KHJ when it was located in the tower of the old Times building at First and Broadway. Since that time he has done everything but lead orchestras around the place. Back in those days when a radio station wanted some talent the program director just telephoned some place like the Orpheum Theater and invited the actors to do a turn after their last show. This was always fun, and the actors entered into the spirit of the thing with no one dreaming of asking pay for services! Even the hotel and cafe orchestras lugged their instruments up to the tower to do their bit. Those were the days!

## 'Dr. Christian' Visits Nursery



Youngsters at New York's East Side Settlement House recently received a surprise visit from Jean Hersholt, known to radio and movie fans as "Dr. Christian," the kindly doctor of River's End. The famous Danish star told the children stories of the Dionne Quintuplets, with whom he made "The Country Doctor" film. They are about the same age as the children with whom he was photographed at the Winifred Wheeler Day Nursery. 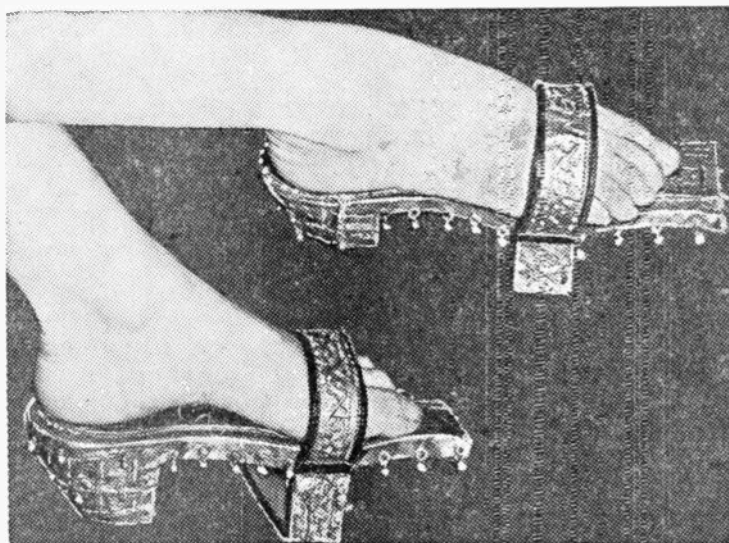

# The BUDGET DECORATOR...

## Question & Answer Box For Home Beautification

**QUESTION:** The fireplace of my living room is placed across one corner. Can you suggest some sort of treatment for this awkward arrangement?

**ANSWER:** Well since the fireplace is not on the axis of a wall you should not make it the center of interest. Its effect can be offset by completely facing the wall space surrounding the opening with mirrored glass. Place a pair of low comfortable chairs opposite each other by the fireplace to form a simple grouping; another more important furniture grouping of sofa, tables and chairs should create a balancing interest on the axis of the long wall at the other end of the room.

**QUESTION:** The veneer on the top of my table has checked. What causes this and how can it be corrected?

**ANSWER:** Straight grained veneer very seldom checks, but this is a common complaint with crotch and burl veneers. It is caused by the moisture eventually penetrating the finish on a piece which, when it reaches the veneer, causes the grain of the wood to contract and raise. This checking would not occur if one could keep a perfect finish on the top. When it does occur, the only way of correcting is to have the top rubbed down with pumice, then properly filled, and polished. Refinishing the entire top is of course necessary. Collectors of antiques feel that a 'checked' top on a piece of furniture in no way affects its value.

**QUESTION:** There have been times during your broadcasts when you refer to the basic principles of interior decoration; for example you refer to a knowledge of line and form. What do you mean by form?

**ANSWER:** A fair enough question. Well, form means to give something a particular shape or to mold something into a particular shape. Applying it to interior decoration we mean that a room is well formed if there is balance and good organization. It's an inherent talent in most of us to apply form to our planning. Not everyone has an eye for color and there are many other points on which knowledge must be acquired but most persons have a fairly good eye for form. We think this talent is more inherent than most others for even the child, when it begins to draw a face, invariably ignores the masses of light and shadow which indicate the most noticeable characteristics and seeks for outline. In furnishing, many mistakes are made relating to matters of form, but almost always because of lack of experience in knowing what to look for; as soon as the error is pointed out it's easy to see and the person wonders why he hadn't noticed it himself. We don't think there is another department in home-furnishing where common sense of the individual is better expressed as a guide, as in the matter of FORM.

**QUESTION:** I visited a friend's home the other day, and noticed that her living room had several small Chinese rugs used the way Orientals are usually placed. Is this correct and in good taste?

**ANSWER:** Yes, Chinese rugs may be used in place of Orientals but as a general rule these do not lend themselves so well to average rooms because of their distinctly Chinese character and strong colors. However, modern Chinese rugs are now being made in two-tone effects which adapt themselves

agreeably to various color schemes and are not prohibitive in price. In using Oriental or Chinese rugs it is permissible to use a smaller rug than you would ordinarily use, especially if you have attractive floors of a dark hue or a parquet pattern.

## The World on Your Dial

One of ours as well as F. D. R.'s "good neighbor" republics of South America is Venezuela. This prosperous, peace-loving democracy whose shores are caressed by the peaceful swells of the blue Caribbean Sea, has likewise been a pioneer in short wave broadcasting. While boasting comparatively few "high or super-powered" stations, Venezuela is noted for the remarkable efficiency of its many low-powered but "mighty voiced" transmitters.

Best known and most popular of Venezuela's radio voices is old reliable YV5RN, located in Caracas, capital city of the republic. Known by the familiar slogan: "Broadcasting Caracas," shouted into the microphone frequently and with much fervor and enthusiasm each

time the station call is given, identification is made easy for even the casual short wave listener.

"Radio Caracas" operates on intermediate and broadcast channels as well as short wave, so in reality there are three outlets for every broadcast feature of YV5RN. In its program continuity, diversity is the rule, and YV5RN is a "live talent" station for the most part. The conventional news broadcasts and market reports bespeak utility in broadcast service, while "Venezuela's best" talent is assembled to contribute the musical and entertainment features. High in favor with the radio audience, too, is YV5RN's "Amateur Hour."

Every year so far, YV5RN in common with most other stations operating in

America del Sur is "out of service" so far as we are concerned, because of "Summer static" on the lower frequencies of the short wave spectrum. This season, however, "Radio Caracas" still qualifies easily for a place in our Short Wave "Best Bets" in spite of the fact that YV5RN is now in the "WINTER ONLY" 5 Mc. band. Visit another part of "The World on Your Dial" by tuning to 5.04 Mc. any evening from 5 to 7 p.m.

I wonder if you've been listening to the baseball broadcasts from Tokyo's Meiji Shrine Stadium? You have to know your stations to follow the games this season, as the feature is not heard from the same station every night. Some of the games are heard after 10 p.m. thru JVV-3 on 11.72 Mc., while at other times JZJ on 11.80 Mc. is utilized. Station JZK on 15.16 Mc. is also being used for the release of the games, too (but always AFTER the 9 to 10:30 p.m. "Overseas Broadcast" is concluded). And remember, if you hear the shriek of a siren and an excited "Homee, homee, homee!"—it's a home run in Tokyo and pandemonium reigns.
