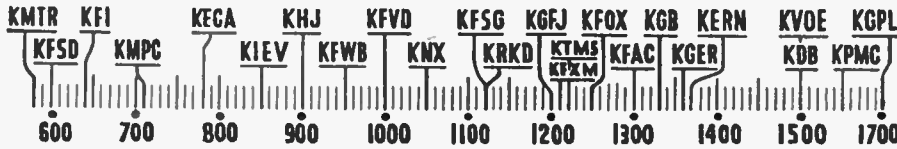

IN HER comparatively short life-time, Kathleen Wilson, who plays the part of Claudia Barbour in NBC's One Man's Family, has had enough experiences to fill a novel. They range all the way from a childhood in a Berkeley, California, household where she learned stagecraft and political economy and dancing and social science, to a year in the British Isles, traveling with Ramsay MacDonald's campaign party, and a winter in Florence, where she lived in an old Italian palace and studied painting and fencing. She learned the latter art so well that when she returned to California she held the University Women's fencing championship for two years. Her painting she regards as a hobby, one of the many mediums of art which she follows on the theory that acting is a combination of all the arts.

Kathleen Wilson was still a student at the University of California in Berkeley when she made her debut at NBC. The quality of her fresh young voice made her in instant demand for dramatic programs. Now, of course, she appears only as Claudia Barbour, being signed, as other members of the cast, for exclusive work in the NBC serial. She was selected for her role by Author Carlton E. Morse without an audition, so thoroughly did she realize the personality of the Barbour's younger daughter as he had pictured her.

Kathleen is the daughter of Ben F. Wilson, well known lecturer and writer who worked with Ramsay MacDonald and Philip Snowden in founding the British Labor Party. Her cousins, Irving Pichel and Violet Wilson of stage fame, gave Kathleen her early stage experience.

Married to Rawson S. Holmes, Kathleen Wilson is the proud mother of 18 months old Garrick Holmes. Dark-eyed, with curly dark hair, she is 5 feet 4 inches in height and weighs 110 pounds. She was born in Girard, Kansas.

A Responsible Industry Has An Answer to Air Schooling

Note: This is the Second and Concluding Article on the Radio "School" controversy. The article is a specific treatment of the so-called "radio schools," not one of which are recognized by major Radio Broadcasting Systems, and yet which mult thousands of dollars monthly from credulous and ambitious victims. This article will prove an eye-opener to thousands of mothers and fathers and their sons and daughters who have been paying out money for negligible results.

IN THE first place the Radio Life Reader must be made aware that there are two kinds of radio training schools.

In one class is the school long recognized for its educational standards, by the honesty and candor and efficiency of its teaching staff. This school makes it a definite policy to inform all radio-ambitious students that it has no working arrangements with Radio, that it does not prepare for radio, except incidentally in developing talent, the exercise of which later is squarely up to the student. This school holds out no promises, rarely, if ever, baits a student with the lure of appearing on air programs.

The second type of school is vicious, downright dishonest and shrewd enough to cover up its racket by keeping within the law.

Let us hear from a responsible advertising official, whose company handles many of the great air programs:

"Neither Radio nor responsible advertising or placement agencies endorse or recommend any school assertedly preparing students for radio. In the first place there is no demand for graduates from so-called radio schools. In Hollywood, for instance, scarcely more than 250 persons, including announcers, meet all the requirements and demands for talent. Back of them are thousands of actors and actresses who must fight for existence. These, naturally, being known to sponsors, agencies and placement bureaus, get the first "breaks" into radio and on programs. Best opportunities for newcomers of talent are to be had in New York, Chicago and Philadelphia. In Hollywood or the coast the opportunities are so negligible as to be virtually non-existent.

"There is, of course, some gain for the student. He does get a grasp of radio technic, but to what point when thousands of persons whose whole lives have been devoted to acting are up against competition in a field that can use but a small percentage of those qualified.

"Such schools, then, are phonies. They do guarantee radio appearances but, note, not radio careers that pay out in living incomes. The student pays part of his tuition for the air time bought by the school.

"The Radio industry disapproves of the insinuation made by these so-called 'training' schools, but, since they do air-time students on inconsequential stations they are within the law. What is grievous is that they leave with students and parents the impression that the student is definitely on the way to a

Radio career. More often than not the student's first and last connection with radio is to appear on the school's own program.

"No reliable director, unless he were desperately down and out, would affiliate with such a school. Pupils without ability are hardly ever told of their deficiencies.

"Let's assume a child or adult of talent is determined to get into radio. What is the best way? Well, it means constant calling on producers, agents, directors and agencies. It means meeting and getting to know those who can help one. It means being at a place at a time when being there and opportunity come together. It means struggle and sacrifice. In the long run it should mean that persons should follow other interests and make a living.

"Radio Life, in facing the school issue squarely, is doing something for which parents, students and the responsible big business of Radio should be grateful."

Radio Life, after weeks of investigation of metropolitan area schools, has finally divided questionable schools from responsible ones.

In preparation is a letter in answer to scores of letters that have been received asking for lists of authentic schools. This list will be mailed out within the coming fortnight.

(Editor's Note:—Radio Life readers will take seriously, we trust, Radio Life's statement that it is motivated in this article by nothing more than a desire to inform Readers to Readers' advantage. Radio Life has rejected hundreds of dollars worth of advertising from private schools. It will reject advertising of any school which cannot be endorsed by responsible community and civic leaders.

THE CRIME DOCTOR

A New Program Fights a Social Problem

"GUILTY of murder in the first degree!"

'Guilty of assault to commit great bodily harm.'

"Guilty of grand theft . . ."

"Guilty of . . ."

"Guilty! Guilty! Guilty! Guilty!"

Like staccato clicks of a great shears' constant clicking over the land these words strip many a man and woman and child of America down to a figurative nakedness for society's measurement of his or her or their crimes.

Hundreds of penitentiaries are crowded with those who have sinned against ordinary customs of decency and honesty.

Prison gates clang shut on many a man who has coveted too eagerly another man's wife or property, and on many a person who in the heat of inflamed senses has sent early to last rewards many a victim of blinding hate.

At periods headlines silently thunder the distressing storms of parole imperfections, of graft and racket. Paroled prisoners are caught in the nets of police continually seining the backwash of organized life, the Skidrows, East-sides, tenement districts and the raw Tenderloins of great cities.

Prison populations increase with each passing hour. Wheels of juns groan with the load of those who have crimes to be heard. Prisons groan with the load of those who come, manacled and defiant, saddened and chastened, to make expiation for the wrongs they have done.

Well-meaning citizens ponder the meaning and implication of a civilization in which so much that is evil continues to flourish, in which crime is a slimy industry and its workmen and artisans those who choose to work in it rather than in normal pursuits.

What makes crime?

Contending that crime itself is only relatively important to the events, situations and conditions leading to crime comes a new program, "Crime Doctor" (KNX Sundays, 7 p.m.).

The first dramatic program in radio to give cash awards for listener participation, "Crime Doctor" features original dramatic stories by Max Marcin.

"Crime Doctor" will show the circumstances leading up to the crime instead of concentrating on the criminal act itself. Prisoners who have served their minimum terms will be brought before an examining committee typifying the listening audience to tell their life stories. Successive steps in their past will be revealed during the questioning by the committee.

The fictional examiners are headed by Dr. Benjamin Ordway, known in the penitentiary as the "Crime Doctor." His associates are D. A. Moller, a professional man, and Harold Sayers, a business man.

At the conclusion of the prisoner's

story, "Dr. Ordway" will ask his associates to determine whether they think the inmate should be released or sent back to serve full time.

The listening audience will also be asked whether the prisoner gets freedom or returns to a cell and if the latter, for how long.

Each week the sponsor (Philip Morris & Co., Ltd.), will give away \$200 in cash prizes for the 100-word best letters of opinion. The awards will be divided equally between those favoring freedom and those advocating a longer term. The two best letters, for and against, will win prizes of \$50 each. Ten dollars each will be given to the writers of the ten next best answers to the problem.

Max Marcin, author of the "Crime Doctor" stories, is one of the country's best known writers and had been equally successful in stage, screen and radio. A former police headquarters reporter in New York City, he has written such Broadway hits as "The Woman in Room 13," "Cheating Cheaters," "Three Live Ghosts," "Humbug," "The House of Glass," "The Eyes of Youth," and "See My Lawyer." Hollywood movies he wrote include "Scandal Sheet," "City Streets," "The Strange Case of Clara Deane," and "The Last Outpost."

Talking Over News

Two Commentators Stylize World Event Presentation

ONE night a year ago, KMPC news commentators Clete Roberts and Fred Henry, disturbed by sponsor and station demands for news presentation in the "impending doom" and "thunder gods of war" style, set out to once and for all get something off their respective chests. A broadcast to end all news broadcasts was outlined. At midnight, they sat down in front of a microphone, with no script or press bulletins. Said Commentator Roberts to Commentator Henry: "Let's talk over the news." For one illuminating hour they chatted back and forth informally to cover all current news with a strong injecting of background information.

Reaction to the program was immediate. Letters and telephone calls, telegrams cluttered station desks. Indication there was that a huge audience liked news in an "over the back fence" style. The one-night experiment turned into a regular program feature and, since,

the two commentators have been "talking over the news"—for 71 weeks, five nights a week, Monday through Friday.

Since that first night in April, 1939, the program has changed a great deal in format, but not in presentation. It was cut from an hour to thirty minutes and then to a quarter-hour. The time was moved forward into a more "listenable" evening time, 10:30 p.m. Late in July, it was moved to 8:00 p.m. on KMPC, the heart of the evening schedule. The style of news presentation remained the same. It is informal and remained the same. It is informal map discussions, and free expressions of opinions.

Fan mail comes from throughout the West. A miner listens faithfully in New Mexico, a lumber magnate in British Columbia, sorority lassies on a northern California campus. From far distant sea-bound Ball came a letter telling that people at a leading hotel crowd the radio to listen. Hollywood's acting colony are listeners.

One night, Roberts casually remarked that a straw vote on some important subject might be a good idea if listeners agreed. The next day some 650 letters agreed. Astonished, Henry and Roberts invited listeners to send in their votes. In less than a week more than 2500 letters and cards were stacked on their desks.

Betty Stulla, half of the team of "Word Hunters," heard on KECA, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 12:15 p. m., was discovered the other day very industriously studying a Latin grammar. "I am afraid I neglected my Latin in school, for then I found the French classes much more interesting," said diminutive Betty. "Now I find Latin a necessity in answering questions and defining words submitted by listeners to the 'Word Hunters' contest."

Bill and Betty Stulla are heard each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 12:15 p. m.

Program's appeal is greatest because of delivery through which news is presented in informal discussion. Background material gives the listeners a clearer picture of elements which combine to bring about the news under discussion.

Not "what has happened?" but "why," "what does it mean?" is the essence of the program, over the crack commentators.

So, born from a burning desire to present something different in news presentations has come one of Southern California's top commentaries, "Let's Talk Over the News." Radio Life readers would do well to tune in to escape from the run-of-the-mill news broadcasts.

Commentator-Inventor



Sam Hayes, NBC's Sperry News commentator, faced with the problem of timing a split-second, rapid-fire news broadcast, turned inventor to simplify the job of producing his show. His invention is an electrical clock that tells at a glance how much time has elapsed on the broadcast, and now many minutes and seconds are left. "It is difficult to tell time accurately by a stop-watch when a broadcast is in progress," Hayes said. "The timing clock—easier to watch and accurate to the split second—simplifies the task."

Calling Medico!

The Air Falls Silent As— This Signal Cracks Out

"XXX! Medico! XXX! Medico!"

THE leg-shattered seaman aboard the North Atlantic lumber schooner almost screamed as the ship's wild surging on the turbulent sea accentuated the pain.

"It will be necessary to remove the leg. Follow me closely, Captain. Draw a line about five inches above the knee. With a sterile scalpel start laying the flesh bare to the bone..."

Out of the reeling radio shack of the wallowing schooner staggered "Sparks," the ship's radioman. He carried a sheet of instructions.

Seven hundred miles away as a mere dot on the universal storm-caught waters was another ship, a crack liner pounding her way to Europe.

Across these seven hundred intervening miles Radio was performing another miracle of human salvage. The liner's physician sat in the ship's more spacious radio room and gave directions to the captain of the schooner on which the injured seaman tossed in agony.

The schooner's captain was about to perform a major operation. He was to do this operation guided solely by the stream of messages his unkempt "Sparks" brought to him as they came across the airways from the distant ocean greyhound.

A half hour before, the lumber schooner had swung head-on into a frightfully high roller. The vicious force of the aroused sea had cracked down on the little vessel. Tons of water had poured their stunning might across littered decks. In the path of the rushing water as it broke with a resounding roar across the bows was a lone seaman. A boom snapped its mooring and swung out, clipping the seaman on the side of his head. The uncontrolled boom, swinging free in the wind, sent him spinning over the deck. The water picked him up and flung him with crushing might against an iron bulkhead.

Now, a half hour later, he lay in the captain's cabin. His right leg was shattered. A wedge of bone showed pinkly white through a hole of torn muscle and flesh. Below the knee was a flattened mass of what once had been a sturdy underpinning. And the little ship more than two hundred miles from shore; seven hundred miles from the nearest ship—the sleek liner whose mighty engines pulsed in a sea-beating rhythm.

"Sparks! Send out the medical call! We can't let Larson die."

In a few seconds the chatter of ship's messages across the North Atlantic fell away before the crisp air lane clearance

"XXX XXX XXX Medico."

The international radio code's second ranking emergency call cracked into the headsets of a score of ships' operators, boomed out in radio amplifiers of ships coursing their way on the far ranging seas.

"SS Carl Olson. Latitude 43 degrees 20 minutes North. Longitude 48 degrees 2 minutes West . . . XXX . . . Medico! We have badly injured crew member. Need help . . ."

Hastily officers of ships in the Atlantic checked their positions. One, the SS Isle de France, came through with its answer.

"Calling SS Olson . . . Stand by. Isle de France preparing to render service. Ship's surgeon on way to radio-room . . . Stand by!"

In a few minutes, in the plunging cabin of the weather-beaten lumber ship, preparations were underway to attempt

the saving of the injured seaman's life.

The details may be spared. Suffice that with the directions of a cool-voiced ship's surgeon on the Isle de France a rough-handed captain, aided by sympathetic mates, carved off the leg of Seaman Larson. Larson lived and has taken his place among those for whom Radio, in its more dramatic but not so widely known function, has performed memorable service.

There have been other instances. Once, on a small vessel a thousand miles offshore, the wife of a crew member, eagerly expecting to bear her baby in the snug confines of a land hospital, discovered to her dismay that her child had chosen to come into the world a thousand miles from land and two months before time.

Once again the stirring "XXX Medico!" went snapping across the ocean wastes. Once again a troubled ship's captain, aided by competent advice from a United States Public Health Service station, did yeoman's medical work. A baby was born and tucked away in a lamp-warmed, cotton-lined incubator skillfully put together by the ship's carpenter after directions from a doctor on a shore station days of sea travel away.

Little known to the majority of citizens, the call letters "XXX" followed by the word "Medico" stands for a worldwide service to which all maritime nations subscribe. Linked with the service are such companies as MacKay Radio, Radio Marine, Globe Wireless, and United Fruit. With them in cooperation to face and meet emergencies to human life at sea is the United States Public Health Service and Coast Guard, and similar health services and coastal patrol units of other countries.

International regulations prescribe that when "XXX" is on the air all message transmission must cease that might affect clear reception of the matter that follows the call.

In the United States, our own Government maintains sea medical service-giving stations at New York's Marine Hospital, at Port Arthur and Galveston in Texas, at New Orleans, on the Great Lakes at Chicago and Cleveland, and on the West Coast at Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle. Farther west are stations in Hawaii and the Philippines.

When the call comes through, Coast Guard vessels stand in readiness in event the position of the calling ship is close enough to make possible person-to-person treatment. When, as is so often the case, the ship is beyond personal assistance, the nearest shore station goes on the air. A preliminary series of messages defining the injury, patient's condition, and kindred details are exchanged. When all is in readiness the drama of scalpel and repair of human bodies

Today it's more often a case of being caught off guard with a newspaper propped up against the sugar bowl.

Eating Among the Ancients—A blue glaze cup, a golden bowl, an ivory spoon; these are some of the things that might have been set before you in Ancient Egypt if Xerxes or Ahasuerus had asked you over to take pot luck. Xerxes ruined two cities for a single feast and Ahasuerus once gave a carnival that lasted half a year.

Our modern floor shows, by the way, date back to the lutes and pipes and slow rhythm dancers that were always a feature of even a modest banquet on the Nile.

The Greeks of course, took their meals lying down—on luxurious couches; and they ate with perfumed fingers, a fragrant habit perhaps also common among the Romans who sometimes prided themselves on their good scents. Nero himself, they say, was one of those who liked the idea of perfumes blown into the air between courses.

And don't think for a moment that those Romans let themselves be outdone when it came to extravagance. Lucullus spent a thousand dollars per person for certain dinners. Acicius spent over five millions on banquets; and Julius Caesar himself went as far as twenty-five millions one summer just for suppers for his friends.

Back to the Present—A recipe for baked ham fixed with honey and coffee:

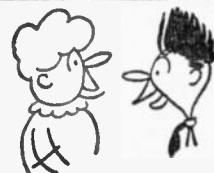

Lonely Money for You

Millions of Dollars Are Waiting for Missing Persons for Whom Search Goes On Throughout World

DEATH is a certainty, and while it may cause deepest agony in the loss of a beloved one there is, perhaps, hardly a comparison with the grief of bereavement and the more gnawing sorrow of longing for one who is loved and missing.

Strange are the ways of individuals. In a moment a person is a laughing, tolerant and apparently normal individual. In the next he may be a morose and harried character seeking an escape from the things most persons about him would swear he held most dear.

Many such persons disappear. They vanish, leaving no clue to their going or fate. Behind them are left saddened mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, and other affectionate kin. Where they go

and what they do and why they go at all is a mystery usually locked up in their troubled hearts. Those left behind can only guess, attribute to a thousand and one little problems and irritations the motive for their estrangements.

Newspapers from time to time play up the reunion of persons of blood kinship, brothers and sisters, wives and husbands, and friends who, parted through the years by some peradventure of life, meet again in dramatic coincidence.

Life goes on despite the tearing of family and friendly ties. Those left behind never forget the one who has gone away. The one who has disappeared and merged himself or herself with the stream of a many-millioned humanity perhaps never quite escapes the lash of the impulse that motivated him.

And as life flows on it dredges up its inevitable complications, sometimes made the more complicated in the fact that a missing person may be, unknowingly, holding up the disposition of valuable estates, besides re-opening the time-healing wounds of family sorrow.

LYING around the probate courts of the United States today is upward of \$162,000,000, waiting for heirs to claim them. These millions belong to thousands of people who know nothing of their good fortune. One of them may be you.

Perhaps you lost track of great-aunt Matilda who moved west around 1920. But Aunt Matilda may have saved her money and died without leaving a will. If Aunt Matilda had no close relatives, that means that you, and all her cousins and nieces and nephews are entitled to share in her estate.

Or perhaps you left town and just forgot to keep in touch with the folks back home. And a lawyer is now searching all over the country for you, with news of a bequest.

Roy Buckles, for example. Buckles was a dishwasher in a little restaurant in Fort Worth, Texas. He didn't make much money—some weeks less than \$10.

And Roy was getting old—56 already. It wasn't good for his health standing all day in the humid air of a restaurant kitchen. Sometimes he had rheumatism.

Buckles occasionally wondered if he shouldn't have taken his mother's advice and stayed home in the little town of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, where he'd spent his youth. But he was a rolling stone; he was restless. He hadn't even seen his mother since July, 1938.

It was a Tuesday night just a few weeks ago when Roy Buckles dipped his hands into the scalding greasy water for the last time. Polly Walsh, secretary of the local dishwashers' union, came running in to tell him. He was rich. She'd heard it over the radio. Buckles was heir to one quarter of his mother's estate.

A few excited phone calls to New York, a few cautious questions that only Buckles, and no imposter, could answer, and it was confirmed. He was heir to \$12,000.

The men to whom he had spoken on the telephone asked him to come to Chicago and appear on "The Court of Missing Heirs" program over a nationwide CBS network. Buckles hesitated. He had no new shoes. Paper carefully tucked in the soles was hiding the holes in his single pair.

A few hours later, smiling, head erect, Buckles was on the crack sleeper from Fort Worth to Chicago, eager to tell the whole country of his good fortune. Money for a new suit and shoes and a shiny new suitcase had been wired him.

Gee Jordan, newsboy, crippled since youth by infantile paralysis, was lying ill in his \$2.50-a-week furnished room in Pittsburgh. He had no radio, but Ed Smith, a newsboy friend, brought him the good news.

Gee had lost track years ago of his brother, Jim, who went to Canada to make his fortune. Jim had made a for-

tune, too—in mining stock. An old man, he returned to his home in Georgia to share his wealth with his three brothers. Then he died.

The other two brothers, Robert and Dan, were easy to locate. But no one knew about crippled Gee. A friend thought he had recognized him in 1937, peddling razor blades and shoelaces on the streets of New York.

Gee is in Florida now, enjoying the first vacation from poverty he's known since his youth. Reunited with his family, he's planning to buy a small farm and live out his life in the Florida sun.

Several weeks ago "The Court of Missing Heirs" broadcast the story of Frank Harmon, heir to \$5,000 left by an uncle in Bruning, Nebraska. Almost 500 Frank Harmon's wrote in.

To each of them "The Court of Missing Heirs" sent the same reply—a short questionnaire asking intimate details of family life. What was your mother's first name? Where did your first cousin live during your youth?

Only one answer was correct in all details—that of Frank Harmon, night-watchman in a woolen mill in Rockville, Connecticut.

Harmon is in Nebraska now, collecting his money. He's planning to return to his job soon, and "just sit around until I can figure out how to spend it all."

These are a few of the fortunes turned up by "The Court of Missing Heirs" since it has been on CBS network.

A Rensselaer, N. Y., woman, who had been separated from her husband for several years and was unaware he had died, leaving her \$4,000, has been located by the "Court of Missing Heirs."

The woman is Mrs. Myrtle Garvey Juranics. The inheritance comes at an opportune time. The eldest of her three children is seriously ill in an Albany hospital. The legacy will come in handy to pay medical bills.

The "Court" set a new speed record in clearing up the Juranics case. CBS listeners heard later that heirs to the unclaimed estate of Michael Juranics were being sought. He had died intestate in Buffalo last April 24, leaving \$4,000 in cash. The broadcast mentioned Mrs. Juranics and her three children as probable heirs, but said their whereabouts was not known.

A friend heard the program, immediately informed Mrs. Juranics, and the widow sent a special delivery letter to "Court of Missing Heirs, Box 705, New York City," establishing her identity. The next morning an investigator checked her claims and verified them. The radio "Court" marked the case "closed" on its docket 16 hours after the broadcast.

On June 11 of this year the program broadcast an appeal by an ill mother, Mrs. Irma Richardson Adams of Inglewood, California, asking for the whereabouts of her son, Kenneth Richardson, formerly of Dayton, Ohio, and last seen at Cleveland, Ohio, where he attended a business convention, in the Fall of 1937. A program listener forwarded a mailing address for Richardson. An investigator waited around until Richardson appeared for some mail, and fin-

ally persuaded him to return to his family and his former life through the aid of his old boss, R. C. Iddings, president of the Fyr-Fyter Company of Dayton, Ohio. And his mother promises Kenneth his fare to California.

Another time the lucky man was Gee H. Jordan, 52-year-old crippled newsboy of Pittsburgh, left \$13,000 by his older brother.

Like David Barry of Long Beach, Calif., an heir to a \$45,000 fortune who was discovered as a result of the "court's" opening broadcast over Columbia, Jordan says he probably would never have heard of his brother's estate if it hadn't been for the program.

Also, like Barry, Jordan didn't hear the program which sought his whereabouts, but was told about it by a friend. He was sick in bed the night of the broadcast. Fortunately, however, a newsboy pal, Ed Smith, did hear the "Court's" broadcast.

Smith wrote to the "Court of Missing Heirs" in New York City. His letter was received the next morning, and the "Court's" investigators went to work on the case immediately. Working over the long-distance phone in collaboration with Robert Jordan, of Atlanta, Ga., Gee's brother, they were able to definitely establish Gee's identity.

On arriving in New York later, Gee told an interesting story. He hadn't seen James Jordan, the brother who left him the fortune, for more than 20 years. Until Ed Smith told him of the broadcast, he had no idea that James had amassed a fortune in British Columbia gold mines and had died in Atlanta last August, naming him one of his heirs.

"THE Court of Missing Heirs" is the brainchild of James E. Waters, lawyer, and Alfred Shebal, advertising man. Looking up some law in the dusty files of Chicago's probate courts several years ago, Waters came across several cases of unclaimed estates involving

large sums of money. He became fascinated, looked up more.

Many cases read like real adventure stories. The John Doe case, for example. A man suffering from amnesia was killed by a passing auto while thumbing a ride on a country road in Indiana. In his pocket was found \$10,000 in crisp \$100 bills, and the remains of a business card. But the business card had been cut cleanly in half by the accident. Only the first name remained.

With Shebal, he wrote a radio program based on these cases. Each of their broadcasts dramatizes the stories behind three estates. After each of them, hundreds of letters—sometimes 500 a day—pour in from people who believe themselves the heirs, or think they know the heirs.

Then the careful job of checking begins—checking descriptions, family backgrounds, in one case even fingerprints, before an heir is definitely established. Waters and Shebal work closely with administrators of the estates, present all proofs of identity to them.

Plastic surgery restored the face of the dead man, and his photograph was circulated throughout the Middle West. Six months later the picture was identified. The money was divided among "John Doe's" heirs.

Why people don't leave wills—and in 70% of the unclaimed estate cases they don't—is a mystery that goes with them. Perhaps it's because they have no close relatives to whom to leave their fortunes; perhaps because they don't realize the trouble and litigation caused before the true heirs receive their due—if ever.

They and the sons and daughters and cousins and grandchildren who leave home and lose track of their families—provide the confusion which results in \$162,000,000 lying unclaimed in probate courts throughout the country.

A slice of that \$162,000.00 may belong to you.

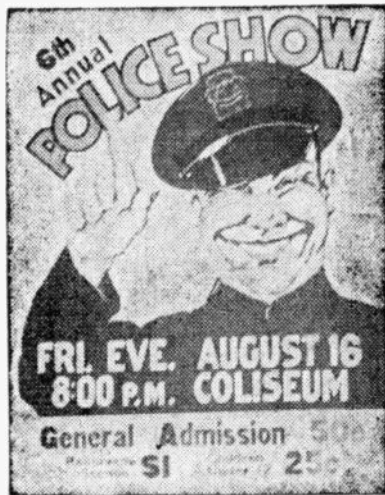

A NITE AT MILANI'S

A Famous Chef Entertains the Famous

ONE of the finest variety shows in town plays once a week in the patio of a trim stucco home on North Beechwood Drive, Hollywood.

The principal act is a Wilson Ham, supported by a score of candied yams, a giant bowl of salad, an aluminum trough of macaroni and several bottles of ruby-red liquefied whispers of grapes and their loves—good, lusty and "life is well with us" wine.

Additional variety cast members could be, and usually are, any one of a half hundred of screen, radio and musical notables who weekly gather about the ham and . . .

Chef Milani!

The show wouldn't go on without Joseph Leopoldo Milani!

Nor would it go on if Rose Milani were not there. Rose is Joseph Leopoldo's bright brown-eyed wife, and has the charm of a Neapolitan melody.

But, Chef Milani, who sums up all life in a pungent paragraph:

"She's da stomach whatta eses-a mak' da man ceevilige. Da right kind eat and eesa man grow mucha more kind, mucha more toleran'. Eesa man t'rough da stom' reacha da good spireet."

Chef Milani, who writes English like a master literateur, but who speaks the language with an accent that dynamites it almost out of understanding.

It is Friday night. About 7 o'clock. Already the spacious patio is gay with laughter and conversational titbits. Animated groups are by themselves. Over in a corner a bevy of famous motion picture beauties laugh at sallies of a well known radio comic. Over here a professional looking person is deep in a discussion on a theory only vaguely understood by his bewildered auditors. Over there a socialite self-consciously preening herself in the admiration of her followers.

Producers, directors, actresses, actors, men of large and small business, artists and bakers and candle-stick makers, Radio Life Reader's to whom invitations have gone, beauty and brains! And all gathered round a mammoth ham, the pivot of fun for an evening at Milani's.

DINNER is over. Flushed with good wine and good food the guests center attention on Joseph Leopoldo.

"Turna da light out. Chef Milan' eesa goin'-a show da moom pitch from da olda Eetalle!"

The lights go out in the patio. Joseph Leopoldo Milani, the one-man variety show, gets underway. First, there is the inevitable affectionate row with Rose Milani. Joe fusses with his picture projector. Being a chef and not a technician (something he has yet to learn, Rose says) Joseph Leopoldo has trouble framing the picture, adjusting its intensity and, more often than not, getting it on the screen set back against the garden wall.

"A' Joe. Pleesa letta soma-buddy else a' mak' da pitch," complains little Rose. "Rosa!" Chef Milani's voice is desperate. He has just got the machine going and picked up his guitar to make his own musical accompaniment to his travelog. The picture is half on the screen and half on the patio floor.

"Rosa! Pleesa leeva me alon'. Howsa man a' gonna mak' da pitch when-na ees so mucha talk? Pleesa, Rosa! For a' da sixteena year you have-a mak' da criteceesm on-na ny run a' da pitch. Pleesa, Rosa!"

At length the picture is adjusted. Joseph Leopoldo picks up his guitar. And then . . . well, we can only describe it in terms of Bonny and Jimmy Stewart, two Radio Life Readers from Santa Barbara:

"It's the most fascinating thing I've ever listened to."

Chef Milani, with a lusty voice in which there is the certainty of early opera training, sings songs native to the sections of Italy being shown in miniature in the patio. At intervals familiar bits are picked up by a woman's voice. Soon, through the Beechwood hills, a chorus of blended voices brings residents to their windows to sit and listen.

The singing ends. An illustrious motion picture actress re-enacts a bit from one of her noted pictures. A radio luminary delivers a convulsing comic monolog

A well known violinist strikes up a Strauss waltz and, after a hilarious moment of indecision, a group of young beauties stage an impromptu fashion parade.

Wine glasses are refilled and conversation is resumed. The once proud ham is a mass of luscious shreds on the great platter on which it has rested. Guests get up and fork up remnants. One slim beauty groans.

"Ah, Chef Milani. I'll add a dozen pounds because of this!"

Joseph Leopoldo jumps up.

"Not-ta da ounce eesa gain! Lak I say—food-a eesa for mak a' strong and he'll. Not-ta for fat. Not-ta from-a Chef Milan'."

Thus appeased, the slim beauty reaches for a fork.

A strong voice climbs above the hum of talk. Talking stops but for this voice, and all listen. A man who has travelled much in this world is describing conditions in Europe of today. He was earlier introduced as one holding a chair of political science in a western university. The guests listen and learn.

"Eesa too much-a unhappiness! Come on-a dance."

From apparently out of nowhere strains of a string ensemble glide into the night. A few of the guests at Joseph Leopoldo's request have crept into foliage with their instruments. Now they are playing with romantic softness haunting bits of old-world dance melodies.

The patio lights are dimmed and beauty, fragrant with expensive scents, rubs shoulders with tweeds and satin-lapelled evening clothes. In the midst of it all four chess enthusiasts brood over moves on a corner table.

More wine is passed. Chef Milani asks his guests their various nationalities. One by one they respond. At length he has them all. He strums a mandolin and is off for another half hour, singing the native songs of a score of lands. From time to time a man or woman comes to his side and sings out with him verses from songs they had been taught in other lands in a remote-seeming childhood.

The evening ends. Joseph Leopoldo and Rosa stand at the wire gate and bid their guests good night. He apologizes for not being in good voice and mettle. He explains he has a broadcast the next day and he was up late the night before. Somewhat dazed with the full rush of the evening's events the guests, themselves full of gastronomic memories, murmur contented thank you's and depart.

They do not take Chef Milani's protestations of being off mood too seriously. They know that the next Friday night, with, perhaps, a few nights interspersed, Joseph Leopoldo Milani, chef of the airways, the town's celebrities and the Beechwood variety salon will go musically on to another memorable end.

THE EAR INSPIRES THE PEN—

The Week's Best Letters from Our Readers

S. J. Hayden, 1823 North Garfield Place, Hollywood, California.

Sirs: First of all may I say that although I am very youthfully acquainted with American broadcasting I have had fourteen years active association with radio in New Zealand and Australia so that at least I have a comparison standard both from the broadcasters' and listeners' angle.

To commit myself: I say that your American radio listener is spoiled!

My reasons? In the first place your programs are undoubtedly of the highest standard in the world. Your artists, our script writers, producers, transmitters, coverage and presentation are of the highest order. No, I am not saying that perfection has been reached because I do have some criticism to voice, but I do say that on all these points U. S. radio will stand comparison with any. With all this admitted entertainment of the highest order what is the cost to the listener?

What do I mean—"Cost?" What does your listener pay for all this? Precisely nothing, unless you consider the price of his radio receiver. Where else in the world can a radio listener have artists like Benny, Allen, Winchell, Gram Swing, Kostelanetz, free gratis simply for the turning of a knob? I don't know. New Zealand charges each listener \$6 per year, Australia \$3, South Africa \$2 and England \$2. None of these countries offers the standard of entertainment which your listener enjoys. Moreover in no other nation may the listener hear both sides of every story so clearly put as it is here with your Listener Forums and open discussions of all important national and international questions.

I notice that on the score of news broadcasts some comment of an adverse nature has recently been coming. Reiteration, I agree, is apt to become monotonous and annoying but surely this is simply a matter of detail and routine. The all-important question to me would be, "Am I getting the news, free of restraint and local censorship?" Imagine what is involved in Columbia's European News Round-up. That, alone, is a service which would leave a Britisher listener breathless.

After all it is the fundamentals of a broadcasting organization which should count with the listener. True, he is justly entitled to voice his approval or disapproval of the details but if the guiding policy is sound then surely the superstructure of method and procedure will align itself accordingly.

First of all in criticism why is it necessary for so many sponsors to plug their product to the extent they do on a given broadcast? A few advertisers are content to interpolate their wares into the program with subtlety and cleverness. Others simply fling their

goods at the listener. I have still to meet the man, be he American or foreign, who bought goods or a service because he was forced to. You can persuade a buyer, entice a buyer, attract a buyer but you certainly cannot bludgeon a buyer. Coming as we did from a country where commercial broadcasting is in its infancy, my wife and I found your sponsored programs very difficult to assimilate to begin with, but gradually we found a great deal of interest in waiting for and wondering in what form the sponsor acknowledgment in each program would come. Such methods as are employed by Camel cigarettes and Jello appealed to us immensely as really first class salesmanship. The results are evident in our own home.

Fletcher Wiley is another case in point. He never indulges in hammering or plugging. One gains the impression that he is convinced that each product he discusses is absolutely good and fully up to standard and a few words said in such convincing fashion are much more effective than endless repetition. I don't know Fletcher Wiley, but I would describe him as a relatively poor announcer but an exceedingly good salesman.

Another example is the KFI announcement "See the 1940 Packard." No embellishments. No urging to try the car; no invitation to come and get a big trade-in allowance; nothing but the one remark: "See the 1940 Packard." Such an announcement indicates the quiet confidence the seller must have in his product. If more advertisers could see the wisdom of the methods of Camel, Jell-O, Fletcher Wiley and Packard I am sure more results would be achieved and programs would be more entertaining.

To me the worst feature of Radio is the high pressure and "aggressive" angle which so many advertisers bring to bear on otherwise excellent shows. Maybe they know better. Results may have shown the wisdom of their course. But personally I had rather be wooed than wrestled and so would, I believe, your average Mr. and Mrs. America.

Then too, a great development of material broadcast during the day is not polished and perfected as is usual with most evening presentations. I refer particularly to some of the shows which might be termed "Personal Advice or Problem" types. These programs are usually excellent in conception but not so good in execution. The same comment might apply to readings and poems. Sure it is not sufficient simply to fade in an organ background and then just go on reading poetry for fifteen minutes. Why not let a different voice take an occasional excerpt, vary the background now and again, or in brief, why not produce the show?

A case in point is the gentleman who broadcasts from KHJ at 9:45 a. m. daily. By no stretch of the imagination could I be classed as a physical culture enthusiast but strangely enough I am quite a fan of this man's. The fact is that his fifteen minutes is so well thought out and constructed that he commands attention and gets it. The same comment might be made of the KMPC "A Citizen Is Born" and the CBS "I Was There." This latter show has been done by the BBC, by the New Zealand NBS and by the Australian Commission but never as well done, with so much attention to detail and accuracy as by CBS.

Recommendations? Well, since you ask:

To the Broadcaster: 1. Unremitting attention to the three P's—Preparation, Presentation and Production. 2. Weed out some of those "Fill in" shows between morning and mid-afternoon and substitute with carefully groomed presentations which will command listener interest.

To the Listener: 1. Choose your Radio entertainment with the same discrimination as you do your movie program. 2. Don't indulge in a surfeit of Radio, else that which is good will taste bad.

To the Advertiser: 1. Cultivate a subtle approach to your sponsor announcements. Study your listener psychology as you do your "live" customer psychology. See that your announcements have a confident ring in the listener's ear. By this I mean that you should make the listener feel that you have confidence in the ability of your product to almost market itself. Have the announcements made with a little less verve, a little less blatantly, but with more sincerity, more charm and less often. Get rid of the aggressive element in your announcements with their oft repeated claims and substitute with brief sincere statements of quality and performance. The listener is ready and willing to take you at your word, as evidence the mere fact that he is listening to your program. With the listener receptive why turn round and talk yourself out of a sale? About 70% of you advertisers do just that very thing.

I realize that as a newcomer I may have expressed thoughts which are not apposite to American conditions. Nevertheless my wife and I are sincere admirers of almost everything American and that comment applies particularly to American Radio.

thing from those dandy "Bull sessions" of student opinion to the historical party conventions. These speeches contrasted the typical Tennessee, the nasal Vermont, the broad Texan, the soft-spoken South Carolinian, the oratorical Nebraskan, the fiery Missourian, and the inimitable New York political delegates. I was impressed with the unmatched opportunity for putting on the air the contrasting personalities we have in this glorious country where we all one way or another work together for the progress of our democratic nation.

I would like to make this suggestion. During the convulsive times in the affairs of men and nations we need as many quieting, wholesome influences as we can provide. The radio can do much toward this end. It would be highly desirable if the listening public all over America could, say from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m., be able to tune in on some classical, folk and country, organ, opera, light opera, symphony concert, or "sweet and smooth" popular band music during the day.

By agreement one or more studios every hour of the day could broadcast restful music. Radio Life could provide the schedule for this continuous "lovely music" program that would be available all during the broadcasting schedule—by having all the local studios participate in it during the day. A reasonable "commercial" would be acceptable and it is my opinion that this continuous music schedule would be followed by a tremendous number of valuable listeners. This "continuous music schedule" could in time develop into a choice scheme for commercial radio salesmanship but only if the material were kept as wholesome and restrained as the music it featured.

You may enter this in the letter contest or send my suggestions to the local broadcast studio officials. I know that one of your ability, one like you who has his finger on the pulse of radio programming will put my suggestion if it is feasible (and I think it is) in the hands of the proper parties for consideration.

Sirs: Since the days of the crystal detector, when we had nothing but the time signals at noon, there has been a lot of sense and nonsense flowed out over the ether. There has also been an effort to make radio a thing of mystery. I recall the city electrical dealer in a small town who was asked to deliver a talk on "Radio" before the businessmen's club. He had a blackboard, and speaking of condensers, potentiometers, couplers and gadgets, drew the wildest assortment of figures any one could imagine. After the dinner I said to this

"electrical wizard," "Say, you don't know anything about radio."

He answered: "Well, the audience didn't either and they thought I did."

Some of our current programs seem to carry the same idea. The listener doesn't know but thinks the announcer does know.

I am of the opinion that many sponsors have found that the listeners have progressed just as fast as the radio set and industry. He no longer thinks with a crystal or one tube mind or listens with a tin ear. His thinking is as dynamic as the best speaker.

Radio can and should be sent and received with "EES," enlightening, entertaining and educational. Some programs are all of that. Others are mediocre and still others should be deleted. Abe Lincoln said: "You can't fool all of them all the time." Some broadcasters still think they can. But the days of applause signs and cellophane applause has gone with the wind and the static. That also includes the programs that play to the seeing audience. Some do and some do not. Perhaps fifty fifty. Something causes screams of laughter from the theatre audience while we, the listening audience, sit back and wonder.

Another cause of "radio nerves" is to hear a commercial screamed at us in such a tone as to insinuate that if we don't rush out and buy the product then we should have our head examined. You know the type and I'll venture the results for the sponsor are not worth a new contract.

In conclusion, we need radio criticism publicity. The newspapers seem to have dispensed with the radio critics. Many good programs have been brought to our attention by these critics that would have been missed otherwise. Radio Life is filling that need even better. It fills a long felt want, and from it we pick our selections for the day and patronize the sponsors of our favorites.

We need radio for defense, let us not make it offense.

The BUDGET DECORATOR...

Question & Answer Box For Home Beautification

QUESTION: Could you please give me a little advice on a suitable decorative treatment for my library?

ANSWER: The library should be a retreat and a study. It should be furnished and decorated to express your own tastes. Its colors should be mellow, which would give the walls a receding quality, which, in turn, induces a feeling of relaxation and thought. Stay away from "smart color schemes"—and let the book bindings, which are colorful in themselves, give you the accents required.

QUESTION: I am planning to rehang my curtains and drapes in my master bedroom. There are three windows in the room—one on my south wall, a single, and two singles on my east wall—should I treat them in a criss cross manner?

ANSWER: Because the middle sash presents an opposing line to the curve of the looped-back draperies, single double-hung sash windows are best treated with straight hung draperies. When there are groups of windows, it is best to hang a panel on each side and treat them as a group. I am referring to the two windows on the east wall. You will find many suggestions for hanging the curtains in our handy handbook which we talk about on our morning broadcasts.

QUESTION: Could you settle an argument between my neighbor and myself. I say that Duncan Phyfe is French furniture, and she says it is English. Which one of us is correct?

ANSWER: Well, I'm sorry to say that you're both wrong. Duncan Phyfe was the outstanding American cabinet maker of his time. He was a New Yorker of Scotch descent. His first work tends to follow the Sheraton style, and later he adapted his designs to meet the popular demand for Empire fashions. The typical Duncan Phyfe characteristic is the concave curve of the legs of tables and sofas—with scroll, reeding, and lyre motifs the principal decorations.

QUESTION: I would like to know if you could give me some pointers on lighting my garden.

ANSWER: We'd be very happy to. The best results can be had by spotlighting certain features of the garden, instead of flooding it with light, or hanging lanterns about the place. You might try hiding a spotlight in the grass at the foot of a flowering hedge. The light would shine up through the foliage, and reflect the branches in a still pool nearby. An arbor or a gateway might be illuminated in a manner that will make it the dominating feature of the garden, yet the lighting need not be obvious. Always remember that the most subtle effects are the most effective.
