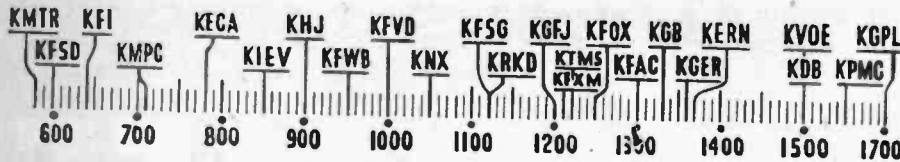

**MARCH OF SANTA:** For hundreds of thousands of Californians, the thousands of visitors who are in California's southland during Yule season, Hollywood's Santa Claus lane is one of nation's seasonal wonders.

Fortnight ago, for lane's first time, Radio took over job of opening lane with customary parade, in past a melange of stars, motion picture, radio, political, and civic. For more than a long hour the parade passed along Hollywood boulevard, its sinuous length scaled with persons of those familiar to all who radio-ear. Counter-parting situations with which they had made themselves household words throughout nation were stars Jack Benny, in a Maxwell driven by Rochester; Fibber McGee and Molly in shiny Cadillac in whose wake followed a Ford, mountain-boy-sheriff-manned and bearing legend "Wistful Vista Finance company"; Bob Hope with seromics Cobina and Brenda; Charles McCarthy and Edgar Bergen with a March Field honor guard, dozens of others.

Last week NBC officials who had borne brunt of parade responsibility conned police traffic figures, learned that the annual event record had been broken by some 175,000 additions to viewing thousands.

So great was crowd and after-parade traffic congestion that stars of all networks, due on air, were on tear-vedged nerves as they struggled to meet air deadlines. Al Pearce and Kate Smith of Columbia were forced to call on motor police to open path for them from La Brea avenue to Columbia Square. As it was

scores of persons who had prayed for and gotten tickets to Kate's opening broadcast found themselves blocked from hearing star, found they could not get within mile of studio.

**WILD STALLION:** For months a great wild stallion has been seen galloping with the winds that sweep down slopes and across the valley plaining out from Victorville, California's Luna Mountain district.

Last week to try and do what scores of professional cow men, lariat swinging hard riders, had failed to do, catch the stallion, an expedition set out from effete Hollywood. The expedition was two-man; in it Leith Stevens, Columbia musical director, Glenn Middleton, CBS producer. Grinning aides to Leith Stevens and Glenn Middleton were weatherbeaten, seamy faced cow punchers from Victorville's famed C-Bar-G ranch.

In early afternoon the expedition saw the stallion, flag-prouded in the wind on a minor peak of the Mount Luna lower heights. Using relays of horses Stevens and Middleton and enthusiastic cowboys raced off on a chase that was to take them 50 miles, was to leave them spent and weary, jolted and haken by unwanted upsydaisies through hill and vale. At afternoon's end the stallion turned, streaked across the Luna valley, climbed swiftly to an eminence. Down wind came defiant neighing.

Swore Leith Stevens and Glenn Middleton: "Next week we'll get him. We will use auto trailers to carry fresh horses from point to point, may have to ride 75 miles, but we'll get him."

"You'll never 'cotch' that they hoss," opined a grizzled puncher. "Not 'onless' you able to feed him out o' yo' han'," a

prospect which seemed last week discouraging to Stevens, to Middleton.

**NEWS REEL THEATER:** One of the toughest jobs air news reporters and commentators face is that of giving to cold type drama of news dispatches their full dramatic emphasis, color and pacing. This is problem that involves flair for histrionics confined to hearing, not seeing, on part of listeners. Yet, last week, contended radio experts, news-casters who can conjure from dramatic interpretation of cold type a "picture" for the Radio-tuned listener need not fret for assignments nor sponsors.

Last week news-casters Jimmy Mack and Ira Cook (KMPC, Monday through Friday, 4:30 p. m.) were well away in cracking this hearing-seeing problem with News Reel Theater of Air. Knowing full well that mere reportorial detail is not enough to hold attention against clamorous bidding of air's current crop of newsmen, Cook and Mack were digging deep into dramatic values of news, pairing these values with shrewd psychological analysis of listener emotions, found they had a news show of sparkling credit to themselves, interesting to others.

Sample introduction to a Cook-Mack treatment of news oddity: "The story of a man who knew a guy. This is the story of a man who claimed he knew the director of motor vehicles." There followed what most guessed, the tale of a traffic-smarty who railed at civvie-clad arresting officer, found that he was the

man he claimed to know, James M. Carter, state director of motor vehicles.

**PROVOCATIVE VAMP** is Violet Shane, current "complication" in NBC's "Dear John" series starring Irene Rich. Vamp Violet is Elaine Barrie, whose real-life career itself has presented a few complications.

Born in New York City on July 16, 1915, Miss Barrie's ambition had always been to act. In college she directed endeavors in field of theater, wrote, directed plays at Hunter, and produced mildly successful ventures. Thus encouraged, Barrie, still attending school, made up mind to do something professional. Hounding a booking agent for a stock company, she parked her backside on office doorstep daily until he, in self defense, granted a "walk-on" bit. After two days rehearsal, she won talking bit as a maid, and continued in the play while in college.

In "Katy Did—So What," when the much-publicized romance with John Barrymore took place, she quit college to devote herself to the theater.

Her first radio appearance was in New York in a Rudy Vallee show "Twentieth Century." She played opposite John (The Profile) Barrymore.

She later appeared on NBC Shakespearean series, Camel Caravan, other net-

work shows, played stock in Gifford, Connecticut; Maplewood, New Jersey; at Harvey's Lake, Pennsylvania; Atlantic City, New Jersey, and in Brighton Theater, Brooklyn. Piling on the record, Barrie has seen action on "My Dear Children," "Katy Did—So What," and "What Every Woman Knows."

Miss Barrie's ambition at present is to continue in radio work, eventually have a commercial show of her own. She also plans to open a summer stock theater in Connecticut, "if everything works out all right."

## National

**MILLIONS FOR DIALS:** If you own one of the eight million push button radio receivers in this country, "moving day" for 777 United States radio stations on March 29, 1941, means that your set will have to be adjusted. On that date the shift will involve 19 Southern California stations. However, the adjustment will cost \$2 or less. If you own a dial set no expense will be involved, unless a new dial facing is required.

Reallocation of new frequency assignments stems from so-called North American Regional Broadcasting Agreement (Havana, Dec. 13, 1937) by joint action of the United States, Canada, Mexico, Cuba, and other nations of the continent.

Advantage of the treaty shift is that powerful border stations operating without consideration of other broadcasters' problems will be eliminated, as also will be certain "Cuban squatters" now usurping wave channels used by stations in the United States. The re-shuffle of frequency assignments will eliminate super-powered border stations which direct beams mainly to the United States.

Idea of far-reaching effect of shifts planned by Federal Communications Commission engineers is gained by study of KHJ, 900 kilocycles, in Los Angeles.

The 900 band KHJ has occupied for years will be allotted to Canada. After March 29 a push button receiver pressed to KHJ will make no sound unless set previously was adapted for the shift.

The new KHJ band is 930. Under FCC the station has exclusive right to this channel on the Pacific coast. Other stations may occupy the same band, but are situated far enough apart, geographically, so that none of the broadcasters will interfere with one another. This is nothing new, since now and up until March 29 KHJ shares, will continue to share, 900 channel with stations in Iowa, Alabama, and Virginia.

In Los Angeles three stations, in San Diego one station will maintain present wave channels. These are KMPC, KMTR, and KFI in Los Angeles, and KFSD in San Diego.

Some reason for Radio Life's far advanced publicity on the change may be seen when it is realized 777 of the 862

stations now operating on standard band in this country will be affected.

At the rate of \$1.50 to \$2 for readjusting the buttons on a radio, the public will have to pay from 12 million to 16 million dollars to maintain current listening diets.

**AIR-WAVE SLEUTHS:** It is illegal to possess, to operate unlicensed radio stations. With over-seas nations shell-and-bomb-worrying each other, the responsibility of protecting itself in etheric clinches has become acute for the United States. Out of the Dies three ring circus purview of so-far-undisclosed Fifth Columnists, saboteurs, and general obstructionists to national defense, has been sounded one understandable note: Danger to the U. S. lies often in illegal transmitters. The note has been amplified by the Federal Communications Commission. Last June FCC donned seven-megacycle boots, prepared to stride more vigorously in locating illegal stations, dilute the menace such stations could be to the nation if operated by foreign agents and provocateurs. Since June last, with a president-authorized \$1,600,000 fund for radio defense, FCC has developed a police-network of four major monitoring stations, these supplemented by a tight web of 72 secondaries, all these directed by president-created National Defense Operations section with a personnel of 500 experts.

Prime purpose of FCC's NDOS is to insure radio, wire, and cable facilities control in event Europe's war-pot over-boils and spills its death-grinning stirred stew to U. S.

In action NDOS functions this-wise: Monitor stations, located strategically throughout nation (the four majors referred to being in Texas, Alaska, Hawaii and Porto Rico) with sensitive equipment locate by triangulation approximate area from which are out-pouring radio beams of suspect character.

In ordinary appearing automobiles inspectors from one or more stations of the secondary station web set out for this area. The cars are equipped with recorders, direction finders, transmitters, and receivers. On scene, hours, sometimes days, in a few cases, weeks later, these NDOS ether police have narrowed down sending area of suspicious station, with help of local police conduct raids in enforcement of only law under which NDOS sleuths do business—the Communications act.

Publicizing only that which is reportorially harmless, NDOS has nevertheless turned over to FBI, army and navy intelligence much information that is of concrete value to national defense plans and operations. Most often turned up are small gambling stations flashing race track results. Overly zealous "hams," certain they have heard dark and dire transmittals, inspire many a resultless search for suspected stations.

George E. Sterling, pioneer in army radio intelligence, heads NDOS from a Washington office that has appearance of a radio dealer's stockroom, cluttered as it is with head-sets, receivers, senders, microphones, the olla podrida of radio.

**GRAND CENTRAL STATION:** Through tunnels underground in New York electric locomotives pull trains into the metropolis' gigantic Central station. Sign of constantly progressing modernity,

the electric locomotive long ago supplanted the grimy, steam hissing mechanical monsters of an earlier era.

Backgrounded, and drawing its wealth of dramatic material from the station into which pass and depart millions of voyagers to the hinterlands annually, is NBC's "Grand Central Station" program (in California, KECA and KFSD, Tuesdays, at 8 p. m.).

To Director Ira Ashley last week program listeners began phoning and writing a familiar query:

"Why is Grand Central Station identified by the puffing of a steam locomotive when, as is known to all travelers, only electric engines are used?"

To settle listeners' agitation Director Ashley last week directed this answer:

"Psychology is the answer. When the program was started on NBC back in 1937 radio psychologists were employed to make an exhaustive study of reactions to sound effects. They found few other sounds so pleasing as that of a steam locomotive traveling at high speed. Tests also showed little romance in the hum of an electric, or the clatter of a diesel locomotive. And nothing has happened since to change the verdict for steam, even though a few purists continue to protest that it is an anachronism.

"In the case of Grand Central Station I can best explain why the steam engine theme is retained, by quoting from a very bad memory this verse which has stuck in my mind for years:

"The railroad track is miles away

But I hear the engines blowing.

And there isn't a train I wouldn't take,

No matter where it's going."

## International

**GERMAN BOMB PLANES:** German production of airplanes of all types fell from 3320 in September to 2510 in October, according to Wythe Williams, Mutual news analyst, in his recent monthly report on the plane production rate of the belligerent powers. Williams explained the drop with the suggestion Germany was moving her factories eastward both to escape British bombs and to have them nearer the new theater of war in the east.

Unfortunately, as Williams pointed out on his broadcast, British production figures fell from 1340 in September to 1060 during October. Furthermore, according to Williams, even though the British lost only 1420 ships to Germany's 2780 during August, September, and October, the Germans still are gaining in the number of planes being put in the field.

Wythe Williams is heard over KHJ and the Mutual Don Lee net Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7:30 p. m., PST, and Sundays at 7:45 p. m., PST.

**DEATH'S MINSTRELS:** Air- and earth-shocking bombs—may be England's reception of Christ's birthday, in 1940's nearing end, but American radio will do its audible best to lessen lethal tympani as the day dawns.

On Christmas morning some 75 British and American stars of NBC will mike-gather between 10 and 11:30 o'clock, will seek to cheer with comedy and music the island's millions who nowadays divide their hours between rabbit warren se-

Eff eet taks all day."

The little druggist went on singing as he busied himself wrapping up a box of headache powders for the lady. He brought it to her and chuckled:

"All de time sinkink."

Artie Auerbach could never quite get the little Swiss man out of mind. He went back several times to listen to him, singing his off-key, high pitched parodies on the time's popular tunes. Each time he went back the Fates, that conspire among themselves to change the course of men's lives, brought Auerbach nearer to the day when something he had said to the sweet slip of a girl he had married would have more meaning than a reckless newspaperman had given it when he said it. What he had said to Cleo Marion, a featured RKO player was:

"Listen, honey. I know newspapermen who don't make more than \$50 per week and they raise families on it." Cleo Marion just gave up. She was more than fond of this brusque, pungent vocabulary news-photographer. After all, as Mr. Kitzel might have said: "Vot you got to lose? Come on een. I'm waiting."

The Fates finally had things just about right. Cleo and Artie weren't having the easiest time on his reportorial salary—but, in love and young, they managed. Artie began collaborating in spare time with George Frame on a program called "Tompkins Corners Real Folks" for General Foods corporation. The Fates jogged Artie's memory a bit and he went back to the little Swiss drugstore. As he opened the door he heard:

"Gat hot and gat hunder.  
"You can't mek a blunder  
"Mit Carters leever peels."

to the tune of "Get Out and Get Under."

He spent most of the morning listening to the druggist—Mr. Kitzel. By noon a new character was ready for introduction to Tompkins Corners.

"Mr. Kitzel" became a leading citizen of the Corners from his first 'appearance,' Artie said the other day in the CBS foyer on Columbia Square. "General Foods insisted he be made a regular feature of the program."

When General Foods insisted "Mr. Kit-

zel" move in as a permanent resident of Tompkins Corners town Artie Auerbach and Cleo Marion moved to up-town New York. The fates had neatly woven together a news photographic assignment, a telephone in a corner drugstore, a weirdly singing 'Mr. Kitzel,' apothecary, and had struck a success total for Artie Auerbach.

To Artie Auerbach who brings Mr. Kitzel to life each Friday evening (Al Pearce-Camel program, 7:30 p. m., KNX) the little New York druggist is an adorable character whose heart has malice for none. Artie makes an annual visit to the little man who, in his funny way, perhaps is most responsible for the transition of a news photographer to one of the best liked comics on radio. On one visit Mr. Kitzel beamed at Artie, said:

"I am leesning to your program.  
By golly, you almos' got me in de  
voitce and de manneh."

This is funny to Artie Auerbach who

once made a record of his impersonation of Kitzel, had Kitzel make one of himself. Kitzel heard what he thought was his own recording (it was Artie's) and exclaimed:

"I am tellink you, Meester Auerbach, making de voitce sound lak dees and you gat heem like me."

Key to Artie Auerbach's character is hunting, but hunting as few nimrods hunt. He goes into Canadian wilds (he has a lodge in the North woods he dreamed of as a newspaperman, but only realized as "Mr. Kitzel") armed with a camera rifle. He shoots wild life with this, takes more pride in displaying a rare picture of an animal than the most doughty animal killers can muster up with antlers on a wall.

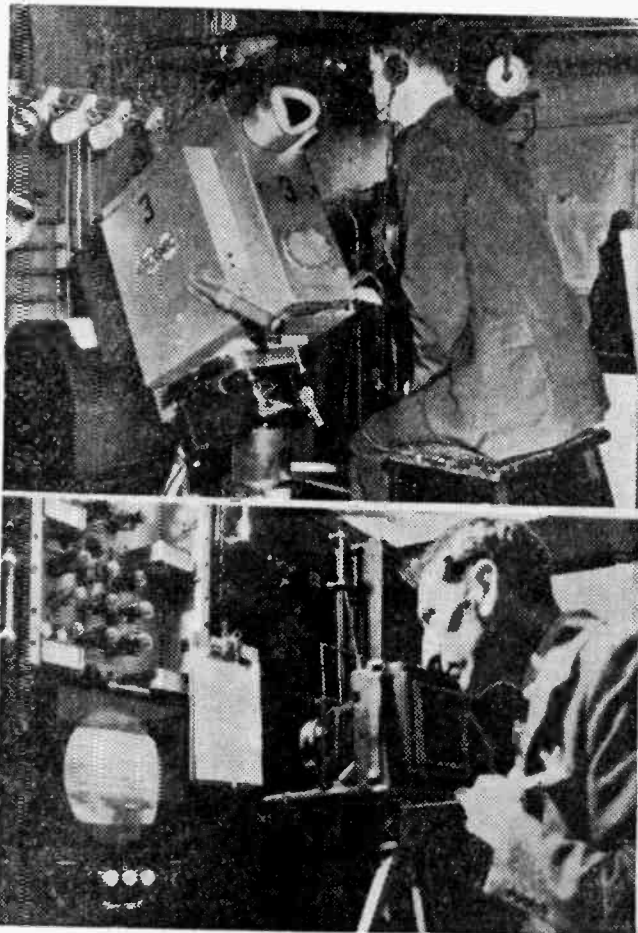

A month ago Sharon Douglas was just another eager and nervous Miss lined up with 100 others for a CBS "Second Wife" audition. Today she is Hollywood's latest Cinderella, star of "Second Wife," Mondays through Fridays (KNX, 4 to 4:15 p. m.).

For two years she struggled to niche herself in motion pictures or radio. No success attended her save a bit in "Forty Little Mothers."

Sharon was born in Oklahoma City on Oct. 16, 1920, which makes her 21 years old. She attended school in her home city, then in Phoenix, Arizona, Las Cruces, New Mexico, and finally, Hollywood.

Her career has been a family affair. Brothers Bill and Paul have worked hard to provide Sister Sharon with money to pay for dramatic tuition, for pictures, for talent scouts, for smart and expensive outfits a young actress must wear. Whenever times were slack with Brothers Bill and Paul, she pitched in herself, took a job as secretary to help pay expenses.

Sharon regards the winning of the Terry Robinson role in "Second Wife" as the turning-point in her career, and is now determined to become a successful radio actress before she again worries her pretty head about motion pictures.

She is five feet, four inches tall, weighs 118 pounds, has blonde hair, hazel eyes. Bette Davis is her favorite actress. Fredric March favored among actors. She dresses formally, wants to own a cocker spaniel, hopes someday to learn to play piano. She was chosen sweetheart of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity . . . she was May Queen of Arizona while in high school . . . New Mexico sent her to El Paso, Texas, to compete for title "Miss Southwest." She was Queen of the New Mexico State college water carnival in 1937.

Sharon's role in "Second Wife" is a far cry from her radio debut. That event took place when she was 8 years old. Station WKY in Oklahoma City invited her to appear on air, to read one of her own short stories. She's always had a flair for writing and continues it today as a restful sideline to her dramatic duties in "Second Wife."

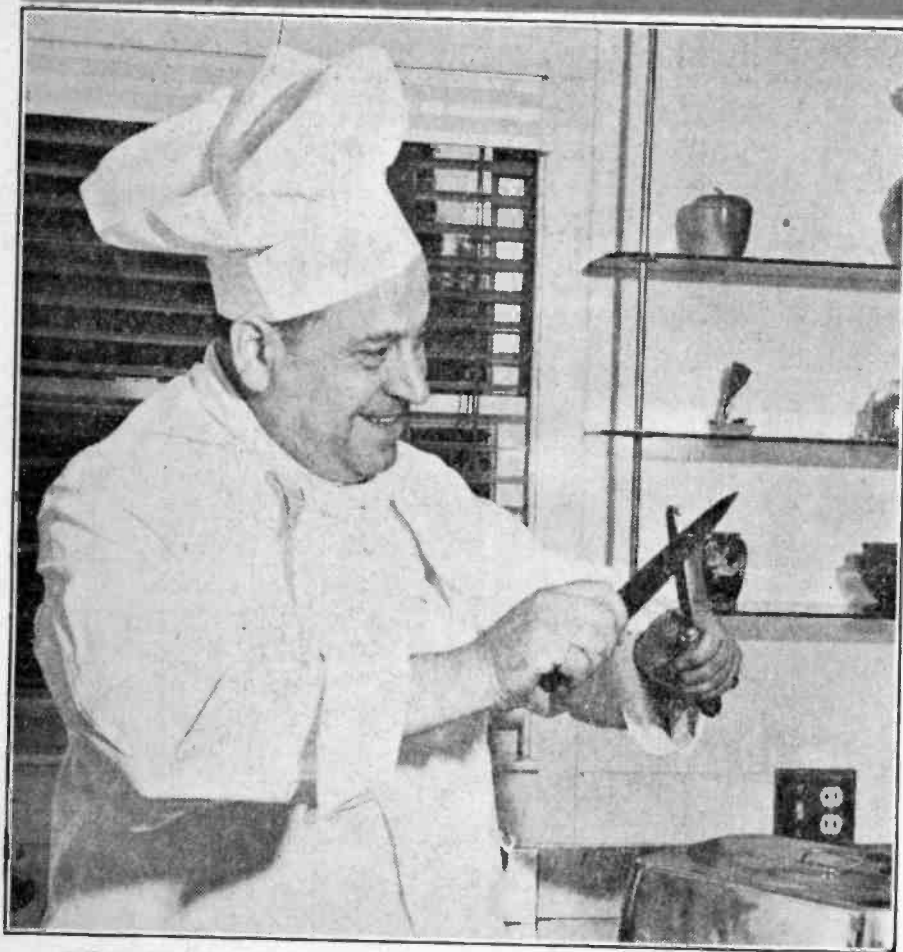

fame commensurate with its richly arty history, but in the direction of man's stomach and not his more precise spiritual and psychic virtues.

Further augmenting their service to Overseas listeners, the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan has added JZJ on 11.80 mc. to carry the 9 to 10:30 p. m. program in addition to JZJ on 9:53 mc. Still another "Overseas broadcast" for American listeners is now heard from 5 to 6 p. m. and carried by JZK on 15.16 mc. Program continuity is essentially the same on both of these broadcasts. JZJ continues to be the most outstanding (in signal strength) of these transmitters. JZJ is usually employed for the early morning (to us), programs released by the B. C. J. to its world-wide audience.

Reader-listeners who have tuned in vain for signals from "RADIO BRAZZAVILLE" the past few nights may be disappointed but should not be discouraged for the station is still on the air. When your columnist wrote the story on this sensational new station it was coming in "with volume to spare." Scarcely had the issue of RADIO LIFE carrying that story reached your favorite market when signals from the "Free French Colony" took a radio "nose-dive." Those of you who have not yet been able to add this station to your log of "catches" are urged to exercise patience and persistence and success will eventually crown your efforts. "RADIO BRAZZAVILLE," Brazzaville,

Middle Congo, French Equatorial Africa, operates on 11.97 mc.

Far, far, "south of the border" down Panama rather than Mexico way is a very popular shortwave station bearing the call HP5G. This station is located at the Pacific coast portal of the Panama Canal, Panama City, which, oddly enough is west of the Atlantic ocean canal entrance. Clever indeed is the slogan sometimes used by the station: "Where the land was divided that the world might be united." Station HP5G is best heard between 4 and 6 p. m. on the assigned frequency of 11.78 mc. One of the most popular features of this station is George Williams' English "Radio Newspaper" which may be heard daily at 4 p. m. Pacific time. Short, snappy "commercials" are given between the items of news and a single note on a chime is also sounded.

According to a late report from Herb Allen of Van Nuys, Calif., station HSP-5 at Bangkok, Thailand (Siam) is being played quite regularly now with good signals. The station may be heard in the mornings between 6 and 7 a. m., sign-off at 7. HSP-5 is on 11.72 mc. The Van Nuys DXer also reports TAP the Turkish shortwave station at Ankara to be showing strong, well modulated signals on early A. M. programs. Tune for TAP

at Ankara on 9.46 mc. A story on the Ankara station will be published shortly in this column. C U hr next wk!

# This Fellow, Lewis

## A Great Radio Commentator Speaks Out on a Problem America Faces!

**N**OW you take this chap Fulton Lewis Jr., for instance.

Mussolini and Hitler can bump off a few hundred thousand assorted Jews, Ethiopians, anti-Nazi perfervids and Catholics, let loose an uncompromising blitzkrieg, and the rest of the world will call them "dictators," mothers use them to scare kids and pea-rattling-brained patriots let go belly-born shouts that the Nazis are coming and cause a pell-mell rush of appropriations to Washington's head.

Maybe, Addie and Bennie are dictators. Maybe they are a couple of sluggers with diplomatic and military brass knucks with which they are conking all who stand in their way.

Maybe.

But, this guy Fulton Lewis Jr., for instance. He's not kidding himself, not by a long shot, nor does he want his fellow countrymen to kid themselves or be kidded. Now this Lewis: He has a mind like a machine. It takes raw materials of historical evidence, chops them up into little pieces and tosses them out in neat logic, in pungent biting phrases that groove themselves into ignorance, that plow up prejudices like diesel tractors uprooting soft earth.

We are on the way to Grand Central airport. In the front seat is Mark Finley, KHJ publicity director. In rear are Lewis and I.

"Listen," Lewis says. "No country in the world ever had a dictator until its internal economy collapsed. A dictator appears on the scene only when the last vestiges of economic sanity and hope are going. People, beaten by circumstances, are ready for him. He's like a strong tree in the flood that is whipping you downstream. It's natural to grab and hang on.

"Now, what does a dictator do? He takes a look around. Who or what is responsible for the condition of people? He looks at historical evidence and says: 'There they are, the so and so's.' Then what? Then, a carefully organized subjugation of mass wills and emotions to a creed of redemption, of recovery, of future strength and well being. Scapegoats have to be had. Another look around and there are the goats. The ensuing terror-inspired bleating and baa-ing has its indubitable value for dictatorial progress and achievement. A dictator is just another leader with a spirit of retaliation, a disposition to make it tough for anyone who tries to block his plans for those for whom he has taken responsibility. Call him names if you like, but better, apply practically historical backgrounds for his being. Let's be sure that while we are enthusiastic about democracy, for instance, that we are not being morally and emotionally blitzkrieged into insensibility to awaken late and find democracy gone."

"Now," we said, squirming around to look him in the face, "now what are you leading up to?"

He looks right back. A grin wreathes sensitive features.

"What was the major issue in the last election?"

"Willkie and Roosevelt," we said glibly.

"Yeah? As a matter of fact the issue was: what are we going to do about recovery in America? What are we going to do about millions of unemployed, about a sure economic footing for our futures and futures of our children? Almost as many people believed in one man's plan to solve these things as they did in the other's. So many people thought Roosevelt had the right idea. So many thought Willkie had. But, you didn't hear much about the issue. The issue is still before us. As long as it is, and as long as nothing lastingly constructive is done to meet it, Democracy is being relinquished by those to whom it should be most precious.

"Right now we are engaged in spending of millions beyond the average man's comprehension. Let's not quibble about why these millions are being spent and have to be paid for in kind. The important thing to remember is that the main issue remains with us. Right now the mass mind has its attention turned from the issue to the menace of dictatorships. But, when the bill being piled up now has to be met in a forthcoming Then, will not these obscured issues of today be the more bitter and realistic in the Then? Failure of leadership to produce reasonably workable solutions for our internal economic problem is the stuff of which dictatorships are made. We can't lean on political props and financial legerdemain and survive. This, I think, is the lesson we have to learn. I hope, for the sake of our country, the learning will not be too bitter."

We rolled up to the airport portico. In the gathering dusk, light was caught on gleaming silver torsos of great sky ships. To the south, girdered skeletons of plane factory additions were etched lines against the west's last outpouring light. West and north was the chromatic neon shimmer of home-studded San Fernando valley. Far south Los Angeles, its millions hidden, thrust up its million-multiples of in-

candescents and neons against the down-slipping dark. A plane's motors flung their captive horses in roaring neighs into twilight somnolence. A plane caller shouted distantly: "San Francisco plane leaving in two minutes." We went on past the boarding gates. Fulton Lewis Jr. went aboard. A minute later he was snuggled within a meteor that charged across earth, tipped up its air gripping nose and left us behind, Mark Finley and I, two mortals with a weight of thought on our minds.

We drove back to the city and as we drove I caught in an illuminating flash the essence of Fulton Lewis Jr., radio newscaster-commentator with a mission. It was:

"Don't let tiny political Lilliputians blind you helpless against the future, Giant America."

## Chef Milani's Sunday Dinner

For Eight Persons

### The Menu:

- Puree Royal au croustons
- Radishes
- Boiled artichoke Hollandaise
- Smoked beef tongue and spinach
- Baked potatoes
- Bread
- Sorbet eclaire au Maraschino
- Assorted cakes
- Salted almonds
- Romaine salad
- Butter
- Coffee, tea or milk

### RECIPE FOR PUREE ROYAL AU CROUTONS

- 2 pounds of green peas
- 1 quart of chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons of whole allspice
- 1/4 pound of butter
- 1 cupful of croustons

Boil two pounds of green peas in one quart of chicken broth. Add whole allspice. When peas are soft strain the soup through a fine sieve. Put back in casserole, bring to a boil, season with salt and pepper, add one-eighth of a pound of butter, "sweet preferable," and stir until butter is melted. Serve with croustons.

### RECIPE FOR SMOKED BEEF TONGUE WITH SPINACH

- 1 quart of apple juice
- 1 smoked beef tongue
- 4 pounds of spinach

Put a smoked beef tongue in a casserole. Cover with apple juice. Bring to a boil, lower the fire and simmer until tongue is tender. Cook spinach and place on a platter. Slice tongue and place in a bed of spinach.

### RECIPE FOR SORBET ECLAIRE AU MARASCHINO

- 1 pound of sugar
- 3 pints of water
- The juice of two lemons
- The juice of one orange
- Whites of two eggs
- 1 gill of Maraschino
- 1 bottle of Maraschino cherries

Mix one pound of sugar, three pints of water, the juice of two lemons, one orange and the white of two eggs, heat with one gill of Maraschino. Freeze and serve in sherbet glasses and bead the rim of each glass with Maraschino cherries.

### CHEF MILANI'S DOLLAR DINNER NO. 1

The Menu:

- Wilson's, certified Mor and fried apple rings
- Radishes
- Baked potatoes
- Bread
- Milk
- Green onions
- Cooked carrot salad
- Butter
- Preserved peaches

#### RECIPE FOR MOR AND FRIED APPLE RINGS

- 1 can of Mor
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons of milk
- 2 pounds of apples, sliced in rings
- 4 tablespoons of flour
- Shortening

Beat eggs with two teaspoons of milk. Open can of Mor and slice meat in 8 equal slices. Flour the slices for Mor and apple ring and dip rings and slices of Mor in beaten eggs and milk. Fry slices of Mor and apple rings in shortening.

### CHEF MILANI'S DOLLAR DINNER NO. 2

The Menu:

- Oxtail and egg noodle casserole
- Celery
- Heart of lettuce with Italian dressing
- Milk
- Radishes
- Sunfreetzel ice cream

#### RECIPE FOR OXTAIL AND NOODLE CASSEROLE

- 2 pounds of oxtail meat
- 1 can size 2 1/2 tomatoes
- 1 package of egg noodles
- 1/2 pound of sharp American cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste

Bratize oxtail in a thick skillet. When brown add tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste, and let cook for three hours in a sauce pan on a slow fire. When done boil noodles in a boiling pot with 3 quarts of salted water. When noodles are tender drain them. Put in a casserole, pour tomato sauce and mix. Shred cheese and cover the top of the noodles with it. Cover casserole and let bake for 30 minutes at 400 degrees. Serve with oxtail.

### CHEF MILANI'S DOLLAR DINNER NO. 3

The Menu:

- Salmon steaks with tomatoes and rice
- Fruit salad
- Milk
- Rolls and butter
- Gelatine dessert

#### RECIPE FOR SALMON STEAKS WITH TOMATOES AND RICE

- 2 pounds of fresh Puget Sound pink salmon steak
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1/2 dash of sage
- 2 cans of tomato sauce

Place salmon steaks in baking pan. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and sage. Pour the two cans of tomato sauce over the fish. Bake in 350 degree oven for one hour. Wash rice twice in cold water, put in small boiling pot. Cover rice with water and let come to a boil. Lower the fire and cover the pot. Then let cook on a slow fire until done. Serve with salmon steaks.

The Menu:

- Ragout of beef with stringless string beans
- Baked potatoes
- Bread

- Butter

- Cauliflower salad

#### RECIPE FOR RAGOUT OF BEEF WITH STRINGLESS STRING BEANS

- 2 pounds of chuck beef
- 1/2 pound of bacon, "Old Fashioned Brand"
- 1 pound of stringless string beans
- 1 can of size 2 1/2 tomatoes
- 1 onion, 1 clove of garlic, "minced"

Saute beef and chopped bacon in thick frying pan. When meat is well browned add minced onion and minced garlic, and let cook until onion becomes nice and golden. Put the stringless string beans on the bottom of the casserole, sprinkle with seasonings and then put the meat mixture on top of the string beans. Open the can of tomatoes, and pass thru a colander, and then pour on top of meat. Cover the meat and let bake in an oven of 325 degrees for 3 hours.

- Shoulder of pork squares garniture
- Mashed potatoes
- Sliced tomatoes

- 2 pounds of shoulder pork
- 1 bunch of green onions
- 1/2 of a pound of butter
- 1 No. 2 can of peas and carrots

Cut shoulder pork in inch squares. Mince green onions, wash and drain. Place 4 tablespoons of butter in a thick fry the pan. When butter is melted braize pork squares and minced onion until brown. Open can of peas and carrots and pour into mixture of meat and onions. Stirrer on low fire until cooked, then cover and let cook until meat is nice and tender. Serve garnished with mashed potatoes, celery and tomatoes.

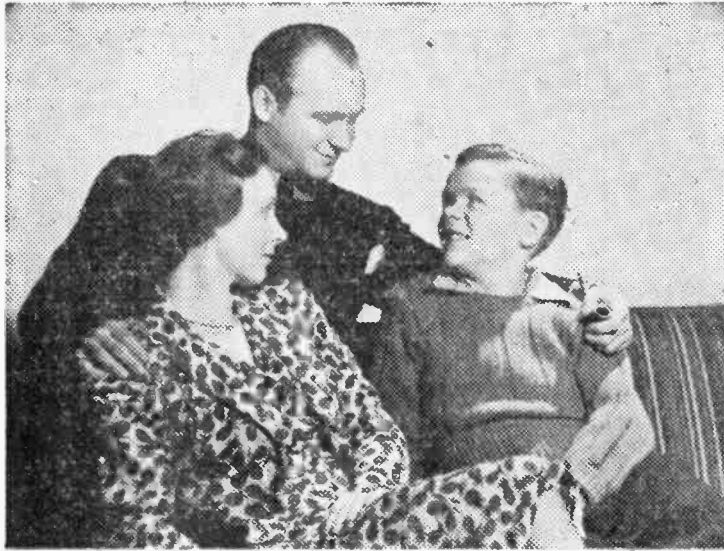

# The Editor and the Readers

HAVE you been following the story of Will by Betty Blake Rogers in "Saturday Evening Post?" 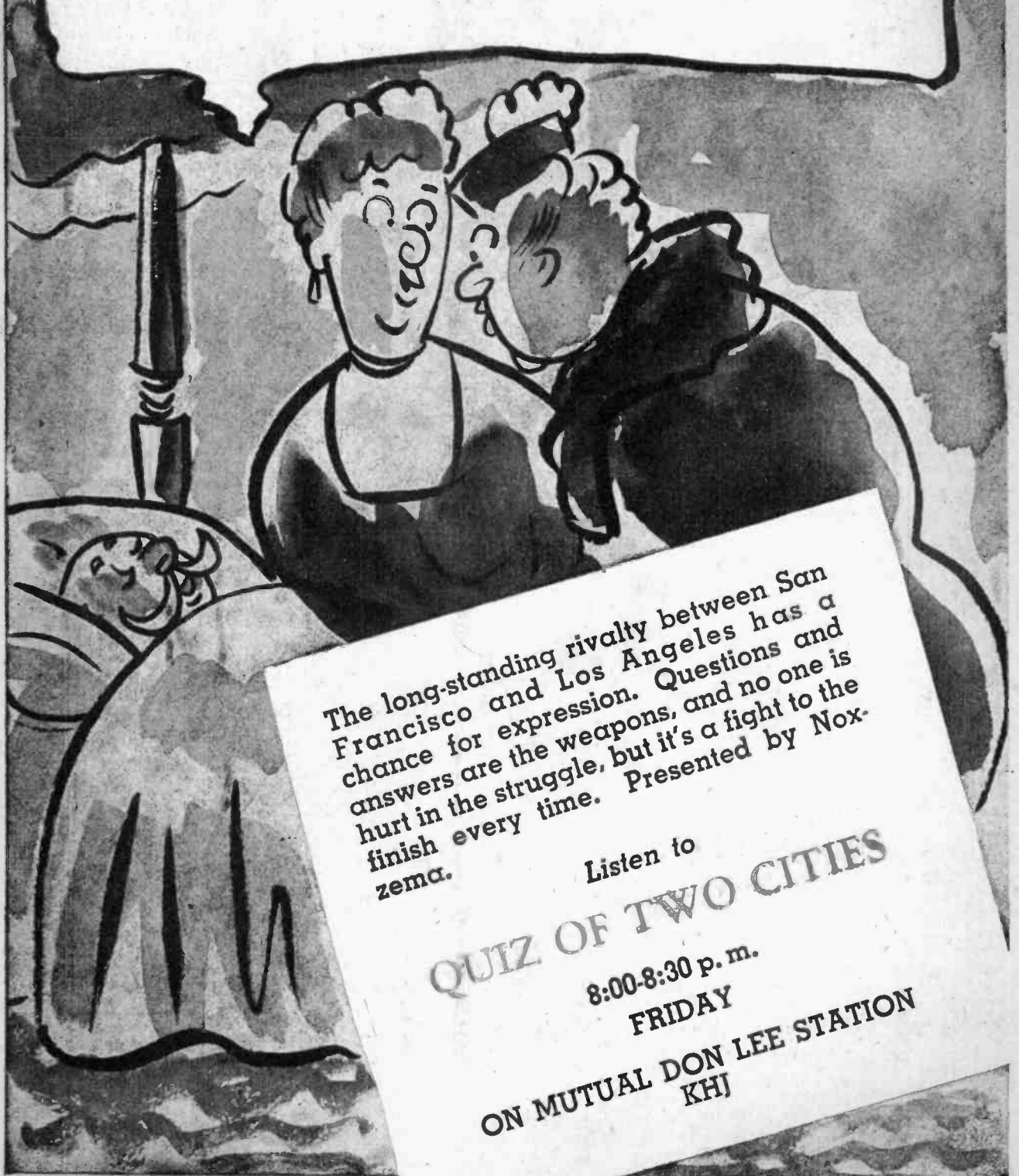
