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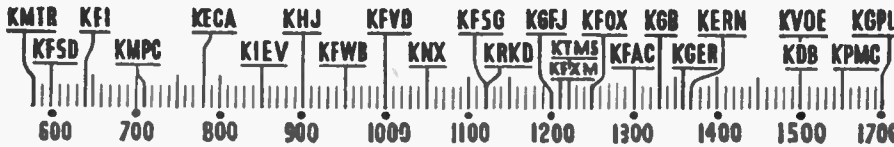

Most often played leader is Bing Crosby; of his music pieces in order of nickel-slotter's preference were these: "Please," "Silent Night," "Tumbling Tumbleweed," and "Trade Winds."

Tommy Dorsey was next with two numbers, "We Three," and "Marie," these played once each to each four of Crosby.

Trumpeting and saxing third was Kay Kyser whose two numbers to attract nickels were: "The Bad Humor Man," "Ferry Boat Serenade," at musical odds of 1 to 5 of Crosby and Dorsey playings.

"Comes Love" and "Begin the Beguine" by Artie Shaw were next in orchestra versions chosen by patrons of the places visited.

Once in every ten selections that are played the haunting strains of "Tales from the Vienna Woods" will be "nickel-ed" in hearing.

Puzzling fact gleaned from places in which juke poll was made: "God Bless America," capitalizing patriotic emotions into commercial success, has been relegated to background in choices by juke patrons. Kate Smith is still, as on air-planes, a favorite singer on the juke-box circuit, but for other songs.

COWHORN DILEMMA: "Are the horns of a cow above or below its ears?"

This profound query, brazenly posed on the quiz portion of the Columbia Pacific network program, "What's on Your

LIGHTING TOWN LAMPS: Ted Yerxa is a blue-eyed, nervous-paced habitue of night clubs who does not drink or smoke, rarely dances, and who sits with pretty wife Evelyn in night spots, blue eyes gimleted on floor shows, service, waitresses and waiters, making uncompromising appraisals of surroundings. Yerxa is also a columnist for Los Angeles' Manchester Boddy-owned, potent Daily News. His column is one of chit-chat about night clubs, their food, entertainment, people who are seen in them. He also airs KIJ program "The Lamplighter" Fridays at 4:45, gives away on program night club reservations, other prizes, brings to microphone prominent in sports, entertainment, science, and business for quickly air-painted portraits. For benefit of Night-Life-Fun-Seekers Yerxa's program and columns present salient facts of cafe services, prices, entertainment, make reservations, in general advise public on where best night out pleasures may be had at what cost the Night-Outers are disposed to pay.

Fortnight ago KHJ officials and Yerxa made test of program and column's pulling power, gave away ten prizes keyed to phone calls. At show's end the Telephone company reported, "A potential 28,000 persons tried to reach KHJ, 283 calls, five girls answering phones, jammed five KHJ trunk lines within first ten minutes. 103

tried to get a call through for each one of the 283 who made grade."

Last week Radio Life's staff took earned pride in this showing by Yerxa, hundreds of the magazine's readers being carded members of Lamplighter Club, did their part to jam up station switchboards.

BABY SPORTS-CASTER: Youngest of all air-sports-casters is Robert Cowan, 15-year-old KECA prodigy, who, on New Year's day from Pasadena's Rose Bowl, will air-cast annual roundup of sports events, emphasizing sports-historic Rose Bowl games of past. At 7:15 p. m. Dec. 30 and 31 will parade noted sports figures to his microphone, among them Grantland Rice, George Halas, Chicago Bears coach, and owner, Dick Hyland; will end parade with a broadcast at 1:45 p. m. on Game day, NBC's Bill Stern then taking over for NBC on its exclusive franchise to air-cast the nation's most watched and listened-to game.

JUKE BOX POLL: Juke boxes are those ubiquitous contraptions fastened to restaurant counters, to bars, standing in lobbies, purveying recorded music at 5 cents per selection. Juke boxes are entertainment devices heavily patronized by diners and dancers, mere coffee-with-cigarette consumers idling a few moments away, by jive-loving youngsters, oldsters and economic-depressants who must have entertainment cheaply.

Last week curious-minded Carl Hail-

Mind?" placed a CBS radio audience on horns of a dilemma that produced uproarious debate up and down the Pacific coast.

Tom Breneman, "emcee" of "What's on Your Mind?" asked the question of a man in the studio audience. Badly confused, the man answered rapidly—"They're above . . . below . . . no, no . . . above, below, below, above. Yeah."

Breneman picked the wrong reply as correct, awarded the man a cash prize, then reversed himself by also awarding the writer of the query \$5 because it WASN'T answered correctly.

Then the uproar started. Distraught ranchers plunged into the night, lanterns in hand, to investigate their own cows. Tourists with tape measures invaded bovine herds in Washington, Oregon, and California. Startled "moos" rent the air from Tatoosh Island to Tia Juana.

And then came the flood. Breneman received letters, phone calls, telegrams, 316 photographs of cows, including 50 home portraits of the bovine movie star, "Elsie."

E. H. Jenanyan, Pacific coast head of the Planters Nut and Chocolate company, sponsors of "What's on Your Mind?" was sent bovine photos and telegrams, more than 1200 letters discussing all angles of the cow and place of horns.

Most agreed horns were above ears.

MARRIAGE CLUB: In a democracy where one of every five marriages is ended by pontifical legal decrees there is enthusiastic insistence that marriage, of all man's estates, is happiest and profitable.

Not one to deny this insistence is Haven MacQuarrie, graying middle-aged purveyor of marital interrogations to an increasing national audience through "Marriage Club," current CBS 8 p. m. Saturday feature.

At his hillside home overlooking Los Angeles, MacQuarrie keeps mail files, upon which six researchers work under Mrs. MacQuarrie's supervision. They were kept there until fire insurers made him store in a vault the bulk of letters, which pose 100,000 different problems in human relationship.

"Before I started the 'Marriage Club' broadcasts, I had worked out 17,000 problems for members of the audience to answer," MacQuarrie said. "I thought I had most of them. And how wrong I was!"

That's only one of the reasons MacQuarrie doesn't offer advice on his programs. He was wrong about that and he admits he is wrong about other things from time to time. He suspects, also, that no single person ever will be able to know enough about marriage to qualify as an advisor.

When his program first started MacQuarrie ribbed marriage, speedily discovered that, of man's many engrossments, it was one he regarded as potentially sacred. Married couples posed problems that had implications for couples everywhere, serious questions that demanded sober analysis. A few still persist in asking questions that are on border of downright disrespect or poke good natured fun at marriage. For example:

"What shall a husband do about a

wife who insists on putting her cold feet against his back?"

Only answer Haven MacQuarrie could make to this one at a recent gathering of press and businessmen at a CBS luncheon, was:

"Now, I ask you—what position would a person have to be in to have their feet in another's back?"

Latterday technic of MacQuarrie, who is a raspy voiced individual fond of such words as "particular," "psychological," and the phrase "emotional evaluation," is to select questions that carry their own answers. No examples did MacQuarrie give of such questions, leaving the curious to turn dial for answers.

Into radio's seething air ocean plunged luncheoning MacQuarrie with this prediction:

"Before another year has passed Marriage Club will be the greatest program on the air, have the highest Crosley of them all."

THE MOGS, USA: Last week over radio to California draftees, still waiting for their numbers to come up, somewhat mildly perturbed at prospects of Army life of which most knew little, if anything, a crisp military voice announced enlistments in Military Order of Guards, pointed out advantages for draftees, others not caught by draft, still others eager to participate in the United States' fast expanding program for defense, to enlist in MOG, and get edge on those who will go into army without benefit of prior instruction, in general to take an intelligent and constructive part in the land's future protection plans.

Wonderingly a Radio Life reporter over last week-end got behind the voice,

learned the voice was that of MOG's Brigadier-General Harry C. Lang, former army officer, in charge of western territorial training. Also learned was that MOG is Congressionally authorized under Section 125, National Defense Act, June 3, 1916, now numbers 25,000 officers and men.

Object of the Guards is to train civilians in army conduct, drill, and procedure to prepare them to take places in armed forces of nation.

By last week it was learned this ideal of service to the land had progressed to a point where military aviation ground school, foot-drill, cavalry, signal corps, artillery, radio, quarter-master, medical and dental, motor transport and aerial photography were being taught recruits in schools and colleges of Southern California.

Enlistment in MOG is for three years, with service terminable at any time as Civilian Soldier elects.

In interview Brigadier-General Lang said:

"The Military Order of Guards has nothing to sell. Its single purpose is to equip civilians with full knowledge of army procedure."

Unique as this idealism seemed by last week it was apparent that military and defense minded Americans, young and not too old, were through MOG forming themselves into a defense conscious and patriotic group, prepared to make sacrifices in time and effort to advance cause of National preparedness.

SAGA OF WATERTOWN: The "Watertowns" of America are many and distantly spaced along the face of the land. Out of them, as history has shown, have come the history makers; these small towns that nestle in their valleys, pile themselves up verdant hills or slumberingly lie by great rivers and placid creeks, meadow-bordered.

Out of Watertown, New York, recently there came a song and a boy. The song, "I Saw Your Face in a Cloud," the boy, 20-year-old Robert Fetters. Last summer Robert Fetters' heart skipped beats and eyes widened at sight of a lovely girl standing by a lake near New York's dismantling World's Fair Trylon. A high riding cloud, reflected in the lake, mirrored her face. Robert Fetters wrote a song.

Watertowns are homey, home-talent-backing towns. What New York's Watertown did for Robert Fetters by last week had taken on saga-like dimensions.

First, Robert wrote the song. The Watertown high school orchestra and Watertown's glee club made four recordings of it, sent these to Tommy Dorsey. Watertown went further, portable victrola accompanied the records.

Next, the Kiwanis club sent a wire, urged Dorsey to listen. Several thousand of 40,000 citizens sent similar letters. Tommy Dorsey Fame and Fortune club of Watertown, organized by Craig McCaul, Carl Goodspeed and Robert Murdoch, officially backed Fetters' effort with a four foot postal card petition, signed by hundreds of Watertown citizens. Postage for the card came to \$5.

News came that Robert's song has won. Wires and letters, postals and petitions

did not put Robert's song in first place in a Fame and Fortune contest. It was good enough to win on own merits. Fact remains however, that Robert got inspiration out of the faith of his friends.

"When a town of 40,000 takes time out to push a home boy, signs are good," commented Dorsey. "It couldn't happen anywhere else in the world but in America, where faith, inspiration, and loyalty are thriving emotions, unhandicapped by dictators or dogma."

AIR LANE TRIVIA: A bride and a sponsor are the Christmas treasures acquired by George Fisher, the Hollywood gossip, within one December week. Actress Nica Doret, Jock Whitney's protegee in the film "Dancing Pirates," already has become Mrs. Fisher in a Las Vegas, Nev., ceremony, but George must wait until January 2 to start his Mutual morning broadcast.

By then, of course, it will no longer be news that film notables of Encino are relying upon radio's Fibber McGee to get in there and win as chamber of commerce president. Nor that Penny Singleton chose Alice White to take her place on the "Blondie" broadcast that Monday Penny was ill because she liked Alice in "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes," in which Alice made her first screen hit.

And everybody, of course, had heard the novel and inspiring broadcast of Ronald Colman and Nelson Eddy on Screen Guild Theater the Sunday before Christmas, even if they haven't stopped talking about it.

Virginia Sale, the late Chick Sale's sister, ordered a new car to drive between Universal's "Back Street" film sets and rehearsals for the CBS "Those We Love" programs, but couldn't get delivery. She borrowed an older model from the distributor and rode while she waited. It was a sales error. Now she is going to keep the loaned machine she has grown to love. The salesman is stuck with his 1941 model.

Haven MacQuarrie brought his "Marriage Club" to town, and was surprised to find himself interviewing film producers as well as inatrimoniacs . . . There's talk, too, of George Burns' and Gracie Allen's making another film . . . Florence Lake has added radio laurels to those for her screen triumphs since she started her thrice-weekly morning serial, "Charlie and Jessie," over CBS with Donald Cook . . . Betty Moran is splitting her time between Paramount and the "Dear John" broadcast. She's Lois Moran's sister . . . Max Wylie selected for his book, "Best Broadcasts of 1939-40," the play by True Boardman which Clark Gable did for "Silver Theater" called "For Richer, For Richer" . . . Ed Wynn's son, Keenan, is funny too in "The Shadow" broadcasts . . . Burgess Meredith flew to New York especially for his Helen Hayes guest shot the Sunday before Christmas after finishing his new film, "Second Chorus."

Gene Autry's associates have more troubles than he has. Film delays have postponed Gene's eastern trip, but the story behind the delays was painful for Mary Lee, the 15-year-old who sings in his screen plays and also on his Sunday "Melody Ranch" show over CBS. Mary group of film villains and took her role

so seriously that the other actors had to grab her arms to defend themselves. They left bruises that showed. And, as if that weren't bad enough, the meanest thief reappeared at the home of Doris Gilbert, who writes Autry's broadcast, and stole all the Christmas presents she had bought to give away days before the final shopping whistle blew.

HUGH STUDEBAKER, the original "Dr. Bob" in KHJ-Mutual Don Lee's "Bachelor's Children" has returned to the popular daytime serial after being ill with a throat ailment since last May. When forced to retire Art Kohl carried on for him, but now the first Dr. Bob is back again, and his millions of radio listeners coast-to-coast are happy.

Hugh really wanted to start out on the stage when he was 10. (He was born in Ridgeville, Indiana, May 31, 1900). He trailed a theatrical troupe out of his Hoosier home town. When the elder Studebaker finally caught up with young Hugh, he had landed in the care of rail-

road hands and was having the time of his life.

Before he reached the greasepaint stage Studebaker got a part in a real life drama, the World war. He served in the navy and just missed a final curtain when an ammunition barge blew up. In 1921 Studebaker did stints in vaudeville, drama and concert. In 1929 he took to radio as pipe organist in Kansas City. Hugh was so scared of radio he lost nine pounds in five days and it was some time before he got them back, because he was so busy accompanying, writing, singing, announcing, and "commenting."

After he came to Chicago in 1933 he began to make a name as a character actor. His most famous role was that of Silly Watson with Fibber McGee.

Studebaker cherishes a desire to own a slice of forest land in the mountains. He hates back-slappers, tea room gossip and thinks political arguments waste time. He likes chicken in any form, collects Lincolniana, symphonic records, dotes on Beethoven, Dickens, and Lionel Barrymore. His prize treasure is a letter of thanks from a veterans' hospital for his portrayal of the Unknown Soldier in a dramatic program.

Hugh plays the part of Dr. Robert Graham, in the true-to-life "Bachelor's Children" series, heard Monday through Friday over KHJ and the Don Lee net, 10:45 a. m.

NEWS FROM THE AIR

While British forces cracked through the Italian-Libyan last week prime figures in air-news-casting made the following statements in a Radio Life "news-views of air" roundup on the international situation:

Raymond Gram Swing (KHJ-KGB, 7 p. m. Monday, Tuesday, and Friday: "The Italian communique reassuring Italians concerning changes in military high commands is most revealing evidence of trouble in Italy since the war."

Wythe Williams (KHJ-KGB-KVOE, 7:30 p. m. Tuesday and Thursday; 7:45 p. m., Sunday): Speaking of reported Italian riots: "According to reports reaching me, these riots were not touched off by a rebellious people, but were staged demonstrations, sponsored by young Fascists of Mussolini, demanding more vigorous war prosecution."

In a statement before he died, Lord

Lothian, British representative in America, made the following startling statement: "We have all cared too much about money, too much about ourselves, as a class, our own nation and our own personal wealth. (Lothian had guessed that after the end of war in Europe there would be few Englishmen who will have an income of more than \$15,000 yearly).

Further Commentations on the International Scene: Wythe Williams on removal of Mussolini's friend, French foreign minister Laval: "Laval's removal was a direct slap at Italy. However," Williams opined, "Vichy's new foreign minister, Flandin, is a pro-Nazi of the old school, a wealthy man with important connection in German industry."

Johannes Steel: "It is almost certain that Laval's ouster is connected with the fact that Mussolini's regime is tottering, for Laval is an old friend of the Duce."

Perhaps that's why Arch is regarded as the very best in his line.

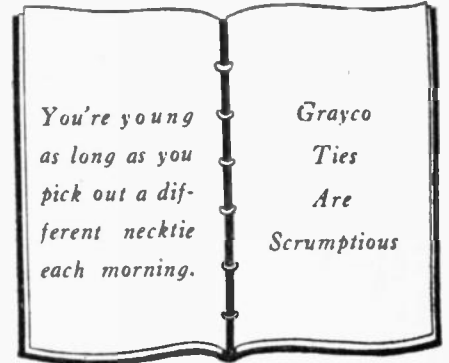

MINNIE OF RNR

A Slip of a Girl Solves a Broadcast Poser

THE slim hand of Minnie Lavine picked the receiver from its cradle.

"Yes."

"Hey, Minnie, listen. The whole Vultee Aircraft crowd's gone on strike! What a story, baby! What a story! Got a transcription truck available?"

Minnie Lavine's voice was in calm contradiction to any first impression one might have of her 110 pounds of 5 foot 5 inch slender good looks.

"Start shaking your torso down here as fast as you can, Pete. A truck will be waiting. This sounds like a good air-news beat for the 11 p. m. edition of the Reel."

The "Reel" Minnie Lavine referred to is Radio News Reel, pet venture, nay—heart throb, of Victor Dalton, KMTR station owner. The girl, Minnie, is womanhood's answer to the shoulder-shrug that the tough grind of Radio News gathering is not for frail distaff siders.

Dalton's idea of a nation-wide station hook-up, to feature spot recordings of interesting events within as few hours of happenings as mails could carry them to stations, was somewhat of a headache to start. The original idea was a word news reel patterned after the visual news reel. But, the power of pictures over mind ran him into difficulties. Fifteen minutes of picture reels can give you Mount Pelee blowing its top off, a trip through the Caribbean, the latest in the Battle of Britain, and women's fashions—a virtual soup-to-nuts ocular feast. Try and crowd this assortment of entertainment on a recording disc and you have what one critic called "circus-like weirdness." But Dalton is a persistent guy, a somewhat mercurial and unpredictable individual, given to addressing persons as "Sugar" when content and in more sulphurous terms when made unhappy by the stupidity of fate in putting unfortuitous circumstances in his way. He hired and fired R. N. R. news-editors and event reporters, hoping, perhaps, to find a miracle maker who could make a melange of sound, transcribed from a half dozen incidents and put on one record, sound like sense. There were no such miracle makers. After a little more than a year of this, during which time the idea of RNR was taking hold despite technical problems, a new RNR policy was adopted. Only one event on a record at a time. And it was here slender Minnie came on the scene, unschooled in the subtle art of newspaper making, but her busy mind jammed with psychological fact, gleaned from earlier work as Dalton's secretary and in his chain of loan offices. These facts were that people will run to fires, stop to watch traffic snarls and quarrels, will debate loudly and long, if not too intelligently, moot questions of policy, national and international, in short—take an interest in anything that is suddenly explosive, implying battle or love, grief or joy and out of all of which, at times, public spectacles are made.

To Minnie said Dalton: "Listen, Sugar, I'm depending on you."

With that statement by the modest and

retiring Dalton RNR began a "sound." Minnie started a whip-lashing-drive toward coherence, substance and factuality in RNR's discs. She made assignments specific, wrote down questions for the reporters to ask at ever changing scenes to which RNR trucks rolled for pick-ups. Out went the often irritating, sometimes laughable comebacks and interrogations of erstwhile reporters.

"What is your favorite dish, Mr. Smalch? Grapenuts? Well, that's fine. That's fine. Grapenuts? Now we're getting somewhere!"

Instead, after careful analysis of the events to be transcribed, Minnie Lavine sets down questions to be asked that are logically related to the event. As this is being written she has several complete platters on the World Institute held at Riverside, California. Here such top-flight academicians as Dr. Rufus Von KleinSmid, General Barrows and Assistant State Secretary Henry Grady, with others, have been debating momentous world problems. The records were heard nightly during the cutting process at 11 p. m. They will be replayed as conditions warrant. One thing, certainly, the records are the bald proceedings as they occurred. Listeners hear what was said, nothing is edited out to fit policies of anybody.

"RNR operates as a public service," Miss Lavine said. "We see ourselves as members of the public. We know from experience what interests us will interest the public."

Joan is always seeking a divorce as heroine of Mutual-Don Lee's "I Want a Divorce," sponsored by Tea Garden Products, whilst Dick on NBC sings his way into the hearts of those whom Maxwell House Coffee makers hope will soften their morning cinnamon toast in beakers of the brew that currently is adding to Dick's fame. Their home life is centered, like the Bennys', around a daughter, Ellen.

"It's a happy life we lead," trilled Joan at rehearsal the other day," only occasionally marred by the fact that Dick insists on singing when he's not eating. His bathroom arias are productions to make bathmats rear up."

GAYEST and simplest of home folks are Jim and Marian Jordan (Fibber McGee and Molly). This precious pair have become so deep in character that it is not a bit unusual to hear wafted across the still and peaceful air of Encino Marian's reproving—"McGEE!" Audiences who have attended a Fibber and Molly broadcast, watched its soundman go through his routine like some suddenly gone berserk whirling dervish, heard Fibber tear half of the radio "house" down looking for his rubbers, usually go home with aching sides, individually uneasily thinking that, perhaps, those appendectomy stitches are loosening.

"He's not at all like that at home," Molly avers proudly. "He's really a carpenter with the best of 'thim'. There's hardly a chair or table in the house he hasn't made. And," she smiles with sweet malice, "at a cost, sartainly, not more than twice as much as they could be had for at Bullocks."

But, don't be misled by Gracie's husband-trying fumbblings on the air, nor by George's occasional lapses from an average IQ. At home they are gracious, poised and cultured persons who have a library for use and not for show. Both take a deep interest in current events, Gracie loving nothing more than to plunge into a stormy sea of discussion, waded out as far as she can (women can't know everything, you know) and then turn to George, saying with disarming testimony to her faith in his mental processes:

"Georgie, dear. Will you take up the argument from here. I feel I should make a pot of coffee for everybody." It puzzles her just a little bit to come back from the coffee-making to see her debate opponents and George slapping their sides and George roaring:

DALE NASH is the wife of Shafter Parker, who is Hal Berger of baseball re-creation when he is not Parker of Mutual's "Shafter Parker's Circus." She's the ingenue who gets kicked around a lot in shipwrecks, when the animals escape and other dramatic events take place.

"I never write screaming scenes for her," Parker (Berger) declares. "She thinks it too feminine to scream." Which must mean that Dale is a man's sort of girl, which she is. AND GOD WALKED IN:

Bill Howard Tells a Story and Introduces a New Radio Figure

THE door opened and God walked in, his little pig-eyes set back in the folds of his fat face, his nose mashed down against the face and a big black cigar rakishly slanted from between heavy lips wreathed in a grin of good-fellowship.

The little boy on the sick bed looked up, tossing in racking fever and his own eyes burned with a light that fever did not bring. And God leaned over:

"Listen son. This afternoon I'm going out there and I'm going to knock the longest home-run I ever knocked. And it'll be just for you, me lad."

The fever-racked boy looked past God and saw his father standing just behind God's big beefy shoulder. Father's eyes were dull with the pain he shared with his young one, and his face was strained with the battle of a fighting hope.

God turned around and the father whispered: "It was damn decent of you to come. I hardly know what to say."

The fleshy face of good humor turned to the boy again.

"And, now listen. Just so you can tell all the other kids I was here, I'm leaving this with you." God held up a baseball, white, hard and round with its blue and red sewings, perky and clean.

The boy's eyes widened with delight.

"Gosh, Mr. Ruth, it's got your name on it."

And Babe (God-to-a-little-boy) Ruth chuckled: "Sure, and why not. It's me who is giving it to you."

Thus was a miracle wrought on a late summer morning a few years ago. A harassed father, fearful that his beloved child was slipping out of the ken of mortals, had appealed to Babe Ruth, the Sultan of Swat, the idol of kids from Kennebunk to San Pedro, from Duluth to New Orleans and all way points between. Ruth was the boy's hero. But, he was sure, only a miracle could bring Babe Ruth to his sick bed. Well . . . the story is told except that:

Babe Ruth went out that afternoon, socked a ball farther that day than ever man had socked a ball with a bat before. And the miracle was done. The boy improved, got well, is alive and hard at life today.

This was the way I gathered the story after listening to its dramatization by William K. Howard, director of "The Power and the Glory," thought by many to be the screen's greatest picture. He has directed others, "Trans-Atlantic," Muni's "The Valiant," Vivien Leigh in "Fire Over England," others marked by directorial fire and brilliance of the Irish.

It was Paul Gallico's story in the main. It was but Bill Howard's job to help me get the right sort of an interview with him and of what he is doing, plans, somewhat uncertainly, now to do in radio.

Bill Howard, in any person's language and opinion, is conceded to stand head and shoulders above most motion picture

directors. By this token it is safe to predict that his interest in radio will redound to radio's profit and to the listeners' added enjoyment.

For years a top-flight director of motion pictures, Howard has an illusion of American life not shared by less competent craftsmen. The illusion is that America is not bounded by Santa Barbara on the north, race tracks to the south and at Hollywood district limits

by the farthest cocktail bar out Hollywood boulevard. The illusion carries a bit farther, for it includes a conception of a middle-western family life where it is a dumb stretch of imagination to put the Oomph Girl in the same category with simple family prayers at night meals preliminary to getting into the family car and bumping down the road to the town movie house. This conception briefed is somewhat like this: The dumbest person has intelligence of a sort and can understand—would prefer to understand—entertainment that serves a double purpose, sound moralization with all the elements of good entertainment tossed in.

A few weeks ago Bill Howard, bemused with this Wonder he had been listening to for years, decided to try his hand. "This radio business is as close to a perfect expression and interpretation of life as any medium has ever been," he told himself.

Hal Burger, the baseball commentator who recreates important baseball games of KMPC, invited Howard to be a guest on a ball game broadcast. The guest appearance started Howard off.

In a few fast rushing moments he had alone re-fashioned the superb drama of Alice Marble fighting her historical tennis battle in 1936 at Wimbledon against Hedwig Sperling, the German queen. Applying motion picture technics of "verbal" cutbacks, the introduction of seemingly unrelated characters to his highly dramatized recital, Howard introduced a radio story telling technique that was as amazing to listen to as it was enthralling. Only a genius of story telling, of directorial skills, psychological understandings and knowledge of the biting elements of human drama could have done what Howard did with this story. That is, as he did it, one man alone before a microphone recreating a sports saga that even today causes a tingling remembrance thrill to course spines of hard-bitten and realistic minded sports writers.

Somewhat shy about his singular radio ability, Howard has the eagerness of a builder about him as he contemplates the possibilities of radio for his hard earned, widely known, talent as a director of superlatively fine pictures.

Interviewing him the other day in the study of his Beverly Hills home, the feeling grew that Howard and radio ought to get together for the good of the service, as we used to say in the Army. Certainly, something is being kept back from the listening public as long as the Howard type of ability is not expressed through radio. A radio that has seen the inclusion

RECIPE FOR POTAGE ARLEQUIN

2 carrots
2 beets
2 turnips
1 pound of shelled peas
3 teaspoons of salt
3 pounds of cut veal bones
4 ounces of butter

Croutons, made from bread of half inch squares fried in butter. Cut carrots, beets and turnips in 2-inch squares. Be sure to wash vegetables. Then put in a casserole with peas, cover with 3 quarts of water and the veal bones. Bring to a boil and skim. After skimming cover and cook until vegetables are soft. Remove the veal bones, and strain the contents through a fine sieve. Then return to casserole, bring to a boil, season with salt and pepper to taste. Add the 4 ounces of butter and stir. Serve with croutons.

RECIPE FOR FILLET MIGNON A'LA ROBINSON

8 small fillets of beef
8 slices of buttered toast
8 slices of ham, 1 inch wide and 5 inches long
1 cup of sherry wine
1 cup of brown gravy
½ a cup bread crumbs
2 ounces of butter
A sprig of parsley chopped very fine
Pinch of cayenne
Salt and pepper
1 large can of petite peas.

FOR THE SAUCE

Mix sherry wine with brown gravy and bring to a boil for 2 minutes. Then add the 2 ounces of butter, the chopped parsley, salt and pepper, and the pinch of cayenne.

FOR THE FILLET

Season the 8 fillets with salt and pepper, broil or saute them to taste desired. Serve on slices of toast. Broil slices of ham and put a slice over each fillet. Cover with sauce and garnish with buttered peas.

RECIPE FOR POTATOES AU GRATIN

8 potatoes
2 cups of cream
¾ pound of butter
1 cup of grated parmesan cheese
Salt and white pepper.

Boil potatoes and peel them. Chop them as if you were making hash potatoes. Fill a buttered casserole with hashed potatoes, season with salt and pepper to suit taste. Pour in cream and mix well. Sprinkle parmesan cheese and pour melted butter on top. Bake in oven at 350 degrees until the top is brown.

This Week—Fish Dishes

FISH FACTS—Salt-water fish differs from fresh water fish by being an important source of iodine. When one speaks of a "white fish," we mean a fish that has less than two percent of fat. If you buy your fish with head, bones and tail, figure at least one-half a pound per person; if you buy it trimmed, figure about one-third of a pound per person. For freshness, smell the backbone of a fish—that's where it spoils first. When you wash a fish, wash it in cold water, then wipe it inside and out with a damp cloth, and dry it. Salt fish can be freshened by soaking for several hours in cold fresh water which is changed from time to time.

TUNA FISH A LA SAINT GODDARD (For 4)

- | | |
|---|---|
| 1 pound of tuna fish in oil | 2 cloves of garlic, minced very fine |
| 2 onions minced very fine | ½ a cup of apple juice or white wine. |
| 2 carrots | 6 tablespoons of oil "suggest peanut oil" |
| 2 stalks of celery, "sliced jardiniere" | Salt and pepper to taste. |

Cook vegetables in oil until tender. Then add tuna fish cut in inch squares. Then add apple juice or white wine and simmer for a ½ hour longer. Serve on toasted bread.

COD FISH MARSELEISE (For 4)

- | | |
|----------------------|---|
| 2 pounds of cod fish | 4 tablespoons of oil "suggest peanut oil" |
| 6 large onions | 4 tablespoons of butter. |
| 1 sprig of parsley | 1 cup of hot milk. |
| 4 cloves of garlic | One eighth of a teaspoon of cinnamon. |
| 6 anchovies | Salt and papper to taste. |

Chop onion, garlic parsley and anchovies very fine. Put them in a saucepan where you have melted the oil and butter, and let cook on a slow fire for 10 minutes. Place cod fish in and season with salt and pepper and cinnamon and let cook for 20 minutes. Then pour in a cup of hot milk and let simmer for 1½ hours or until cod fish is nice and tender.

FILLET OF SOLE WITH APPLE JUICE SAUCE (For 4)

- | | |
|----------------------------|--------------------------------------|
| 2 pounds of fillet of sole | One eighth of a tablespoon of pepper |
| 1 cup of apple juice | Salt to taste |
| 2 tablespoons of flour | 3 green onions |
| 2 tablespoons of butter | 1 tablespoon of chopped parsley. |

Put fillets in a baking dish, season with salt and pepper. Mince green onion and sprinkle on top of fish. Pour 1 cup of apple juice over fish and onion. Bake in a moderate oven at 325 degrees for 20 minutes or until fillets are tender. When done pour apple juice in a sauce pan. Melt butter in a frying pan and make a roux with flour. When flour is nice and mixed well with butter, then add the apple juice. Stir well and let cook, until sauce thickens slightly and is perfectly smooth. Add chopped parsley, pour over fish and serve.

| 2 tablespoons of kidney suet | 1 pinch ground cummin seed |
| 1 very small onion | 1½ cups of cornmeal |

Soak in water 2 Spanish peppers and grind them, open a can of tomatoes and mix with ground peppers. Melt 1 tablespoon of kidney suet in a saucepan, and pan fry 1 minced onion, with one pound of chuck beef cut in ½ inch squares. Season with level tablespoon of salt, 1 pinch of ground cummin seeds and let par. fry for 5 minutes. Then pour tomato and pepper mixture on the meat and let come to a boil. Then let simmer for 1 hour. While simmering take 1½ cups of cornmeal and boil it in 5 cups of boiling water, put in 1 tablespoon of melted suet and 1 tablespoon of salt. When corn meal is all mixed in the boiling water, lower the fire and cook very slowly for 30 minutes. Place a layer of cornmeal mush in a casserole, strain the meat from the sauce and make a layer of meat on top of cornmeal and then cover with the rest of cornmeal. Pour the tomato and pepper sauce on top and bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

Boil rice until done; then wash and drain. Wash cabbage leaves well, separate them and pour boiling water over them and let stand for 5 minutes. Have sausage meat ready mixed with rice, egg, salt and pepper. Place 2 tablespoons of mixture in each leaf and roll. Slice and pan fry 1 onion in 2 tablespoons of butter in a good deep sauce pan. Lay rolled cabbage leaves on the onion with folded edges down. Cover contents with can of tomatoes, cook on a slow fire for 2½ hours. Do not move while cooking.
