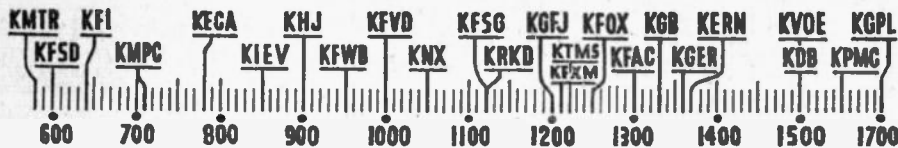

Editor's Note: Fountainhead of America's struggle for democracy wells out from America's many-millioned common man and woman, who do their work, live their lives and dream their dreams without benefit of publicity, honor or particular praise. Yet it is the many-millioned who have power of life or death over democracy's principles. Of these many-millioned, approximately 172 thousand are Radio Life readers. Following radio's war news, Radio Life's editor recently suggested readers, if they wished, express their opinions on whether or not America should follow its president on the road to slaughter by entering the European war, a possibility that daily grows more likely as the president strikes for "all out aid" to England. Scores of letters have been received. Radio Life's editor believes the issue of war is the most important American can face in this hour of American history, wonders whether there are not among the magazine's readers those who have war supporting opinions. Below is printed a letter that has been selected as typical of opinions gleaned from Readers Club the week.

Ruth Edwards, Monrovia, Calif.

I am a registered nurse of World War I, and it makes me ill to see Americans being led "by the nose" by artful foreign "nations" via propaganda, who really don't give a whoop for us—only what they can get out of us.

Your column regarding the opinion of W. R. Hearst, Verne Marshall and Miss Carlson is timely. In World War I we all followed so blindly; but this time I am sifting everything I hear and read for foreign propaganda. My grandfather fought in the Civil war, and a beloved brother died indirectly as a result of World War I. I can see no harm in wanting to see America arm in defense, but it makes me unhappy to see how foreigners milk us for this and that.

Following are some questions I submit to readers:

1) Isn't it a fact that Great Britain has caused us more trouble than any other nation? Records show how indifferent England has been regarding her debts to us incurred during the first world conflict. She has yet to pay for supplies sent during that war.

2) How many Americans know that America paid \$200,000,000 for defense basis and why?

3) Isn't our first line of defense our own immediate coasts and borders?

4) Why did not England, with its magnificent navy, capture the French ships instead of sinking them?

5) Why are not such momentous questions as aid to Britain put to a vote of Americans, not left to Mr. and Mrs. Roosevelt to decide?

6) If banks in the U. S. are filled with money as is generally conceded, what effect does this fact have on our national debt?

7) England acquired her vast empire by force; why, then, should we fight other nations for doing likewise?

8) The English colonize the world over, why not Germany?

9) As a "Melting Pot" for the world, have we a moral right to take "sides" when such sidetaking may weaken a world concept of us as a nation growing into democracy?

Sirs: Miss Carlson's strangely stirring sentence affected me, not a churchgoer, very deeply.

"Lay down your arms, everywhere, children. It is breaking God's law to murder."

We have the God-given opportunity to inspire every country by staying out of war and the armaments race. But what happens? An Anglophile president hypnotizes half the nation. While promising with one honeyed voice to keep us out of war, Janus-faced, with another mouth he antagonizes other peoples whose problems are not our affair, links us by promises he is not authorized to make, to a country whose colonial record smells to heaven.

That old hokum, "Help save democracy," has been pulled from the trash heap and is fooling 'em again. God help us if we do not charge our congressmen with saving democracy right here in America. It's badly in need of rescue.

Radio, newspaper and movies could do the world a monumental and never-to-be-forgotten service if they would band together to help the people of the nation to resist the war propaganda which buffets them on all sides.

Poor America! Worried, anxious to do right, abhorrent of war and militarism; and the only hope she had, the president's promise, proving daily to be more and more false.

On Easter, 1927, when I was 15, I heard a broadcast of "The Terrible Meek." How I should like to hear again its peaceful words. I should like to hear it broad-

cast as soon as possible on every network and station in the nation.

I agree with Mr. Menehan (Jan. 12 issue) that America is being sold short. It is time we awakened to the menace, not of Hitlerism in Europe, but of dictatorship in our own country. It was predicted before the election, and repeatedly denied, but how can the administration explain away all the practices which the president has sponsored which parallel exactly Mr. Hitler's methods?

My position places me in daily association with college boys, and there is not a one who doesn't hate war, the draft, and the feeling that they are not being given the chance to live their own lives or think their own thoughts. They are lovable, but they have met no test like this before, and do not yet have the moral courage to be the first to lay down their arms and assert what they know to be true—peace is the only way, no matter what the provocation.

A national honor which must be upheld by murder and bloodshed, politically termed war, is no honor at all. And the one thing that would make democracy invulnerable and immortal would be an America forever at peace, imposing on no nation because of her superior resources and strength, sharing the good things of life which we have in such abundance, with all nations.

Radio, movies, newspapers—help us to help ourselves in our determination to withstand the pressure of the minority which is trying to betray our trust.

DIRECTOR'S NIGHTMARE: If radio directors, editors and performers have a tendency toward psychoses it would be that of ubiquitous fear that 1) scripts would be lost just before airtime, 2) for editors—that copy deadlines have passed without sufficient material in type to meet publication schedules and 3) for performers: that they will sooner or late—be late.

Near, then, to raising a psychotic bump on his brain last week was CBS "Second Wife" program director, Robert Lee. Unaccountably lost was the current week's script of "Second Wife" four days before the program was to be aired. In desperation, Director Lee wired for script copy in New York, received assurance the copy would leave by plane that night.

On broadcast day no script had arrived. Checkup revealed the script-carrying plane had been bad-weather-grounded in Arizona. Near to collapsing was Director Lee. Nervous was Sharon Douglas, young program star. Telegrams raced New Yorkwards. At 10 Friday morning Lee, aided by stars Gale Gordon and Sharon Douglas, sat down to writing an alternative script. They were half way through when a wire came from New York.

"Hold everything. We're teletyping the entire script." As fast as a page came in over teletype it was rushed to the mimeograph room. At 3 o'clock the last page was completed. At 3:10 rehearsals started. At 4 p. m. the show was on the air.

West

GOD AND ASCAP: Busy as He must be with weighing relative merits of prayers for martial victories for belligerents in Europe's current war, God this week scored a minor triumph. Restricted on radio are some of all religions' favorite hymns as ASCAP principals continue their waning fight with BMI, National Association of Broadcasters' device to combat "monopolistic control" of radio music.

God's triumph: From Station KFSG, owned and operated by Angelus Temple, whose head is volatile, dynamic evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson, came this news:

"Through the grace of God, arrangements have been made whereby KFSG has received a license to broadcast ASCAP music, and has also obtained a BMI license. Thus KFSG can broadcast any and all music that was ever written—one of the very few stations in America which has that privilege at the present time."

TELEVISION GIRDLE: Radio City (Hollywood) gawpers this week had two speculations to engross them as workmen began erecting on top of Mount Lee in north Hollywood hills, a cloud-pricking steel tower, the antennae of the Don Lee-Mutual Broadcasting system's television station W6XAO.

The speculations: That nearing completion of W6XAO and its tower may result in a national girdle of such stations and towers to result in a mountain-high chain of television transmitters, and 2)

disclosure by Tommy Lee, forthright young man with definite ideas of tossing sound pictures into national ether, that audio portions of his tele-programs soon may incorporate frequency modulation, new advance in sound engineering.

Tommy Lee's 12-ton galvanized steel antenna will rise 300 feet from its site, 1700-foot Mt. Lee, to give nearly a half-mile vertical clearance for transmission . . . without wires . . . of synchronized images and sound to 500 home teleceivers.

The huge tower measures 248 square inches at the base and 18 square inches at the top. Jewel-like, its 4,000,000 candle-power double-flashing beacon will occupy the pinnacle, a safe and sure guide for pilots to airplane bases in verdant San Fernando valley.

GREEK WAR RELIEF: Dully smarting for more than a fortnight under the caustic verbal lashing administered it by Senator Wheeler, who charged it with "propaganda activities" implied as inimical to best interests of the American people, the motion picture industry last week had recovered its aplomb sufficiently to project another in a series of foreign war nation relief programs.

Having no reason to admire Hitler, the industry's Permanent Charities Committee head, Samuel "include me out" Goldwyn, was busy assembling a cast of Hollywood star greats for a program in behalf of Greek war victims, the program to be air-cast from 8:15 to 9:45 p. m. February 8, from KECA-KFSD.

Among cast: Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Frank Morgan, Clark Gable, Carole Lombard, Shirley Temple, the Hardy

by Earl G. De Haven, the magazine's short wave editor.

It came, naturally, from Germany, which has resumed short wave casts to America following a six weeks silence period during which Editor De Haven confined his time to air-rovving in other parts of the world as reported in his "World on Your Dial" department.

The report revealed a peculiarity in German short wave propaganda technics, on a par with the British Broadcasting Corporation pickup charge that Germans were ravishing Polish girls and committing them to barracks service.

The peculiarity: That Germany should be warning both Great Britain and America that the one is out to throat-cut the other.

WELLES IN REVERSE: Before Sunday last and Edgar Bergen's NBC program, nobody had ever heard of "Lavinia," save one Richard Haydn, script-writer, and Bergen. Shortly after the program finished, "Lavinia" had started a telephone call barrage to NBC's Hollywood switchboards.

What those who called wanted to know: "Is 'Lavinia' a real fish and can it talk?"

What prompted the questions: Haydn introduced "Lavinia" to Bergen. There was a fish-bowl-watery gurgle-bubble and a strangely articulated: "Who?"

Admonished Haydn: "Say, how do you do to Mr. Bergen."

Water-bubbly came: "How do you do, Mr. Bergen?"

Last year one Orson Welles caused a minor stampede of terror with a broadcast suggesting a Martian visitation. Like Orson Welles' Martians, "Lavinia" was largely a composition of sound effects and somebody's artful vocal interpretation of what a goldfish in a bowl would sound like if it could talk.

National

FORMULA FOR KNOWLEDGE: A card table, an old "target" mike, three college professors and the prohibition report of the Wickersham commission were the raw materials for the first University of Chicago Round Table, which marks its 10th birthday with the February 2 broadcast over the NBC-Red network. The series began over a single Chicago station—WMAQ—on February 1, 1931.

The Round Table is a triangle now—with sponge rubber elbow rests and signal lights—and the program is broadcast over 90 stations of the NBC-Red network, the oldest non-musical educational program continuously on the air.

In the early days the program sometimes was cut short by an extra-inning baseball game; often speakers arrived late—or left early—unknown to listeners.

The Round Table of today is an extemporaneous program which requires more preparation than many programs which are written down and produced from script. The start is a full 10 days in advance of the Sunday broadcasts.

Ten days before radio and research staffs meet to consider appropriate topics. Final decision is based on timeliness and general interest. Questions—usually highly controversial—are chosen when they are making front page headlines in the country's newspapers.

Nine days before broadcast the prob-

lem of speakers comes up. They are drawn largely from the university faculty. But the parade of guests during the past year has included Eleanor Roosevelt, Norman Thomas, Clifton Fadiman, Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Bertrand Russell and Walter Wanger.

When speakers gather in the Mitchell Tower studios on the campus the day of broadcast, an informal run-through is recorded and played back so speakers can check faults before broadcast. Before broadcast, coffee (or milk) and sandwiches (usually turkey) are served to relax tension.

On the air Director Sherman uses cards to signal guests. Samples, decorated with whimsical drawings so guests won't ruffle, may include these: "Keep your elbows on the table (signed) Emily Post"; "Don't be polite, interrupt!"; "Do you know a joke? Use it!"; "That's a \$10 word!"; "Two minutes is a long time. Don't rush!"

With a 90-station network which blankets the nation and reaches into Canada, Mexico and the Caribbean countries, the Round Table enters its 11th year with an estimated audience of 6,000,000 listeners.

International

PAN-AMERICAN AMITY: Last week the president of the United States sat at his desk and with rapidly flourishing pen indited a telegram that pleased him to write:

"I feel sure it will help to inform better the American people regarding Brazil and their neighbors of South and Central America."

The "It" referred to "News for the Americas," a Sunday program series (KECA, 4:30-4:45 p. m.) sponsored by the

Brazilian government with Washington commentators Drew Pearson and Robert S. Allen.

President Getulio Vargas, of Brazil, likewise expressed his hope that "this program may be instrumental in bringing about, together with a better understanding, a closer cooperation between our two peoples."

The Brazilian government last fall sponsored a similar "good neighbor" series of programs featuring Pearson and Allen but at that time the broadcasts were scheduled for only eight stations and were carried only as far west as Chicago. The new series, a frank attempt to improve friendly relations between the nations; extend knowledge of Brazil, its people; its life; and its resources, will be heard in most of the larger cities of the United States as well as in Canada and Mexico.

In "News for the Americas" programs, Pearson and Allen will pattern their scripts upon their widely syndicated Washington column, together with news and comment upon Brazil and Brazilian activities. The broadcasts will originate in NBC studios in Washington.

15 MILLION HARD OF HEARING

SHE was an elderly woman in the Virginia mountains. That she accumulated a roomful of dime novels during the long years of her affliction and might have gained a fortune at fond collectors' prices if her nephew hadn't burned the "trash" is no part of this story. One morning a neighbor man on his way to town rested his team and exercised his tongue.

"Things is shore bad with Jim Bender," she told a friend that afternoon. "He allowed he's going to cut up a horse collar to make shoes for the kids."

Of course what Jim had said was: "I'm going to get a horse collar and some shoes for the kids."

And the only reason we mention this misunderstanding is because 15,000,000 Americans are hard of hearing to some extent. Southern California has more than its quota of the hard of hearing, because the usual or unusual climate attracts elderly people for the climax of their lives, and elderly ears have a tendency to retire, too.

Many of the hard of hearing won't admit the fact. They accuse dearest friends and severest critics of mumbling. They will admit however, that the radio is a chief pleasure. Up to a percentage that practically approaches the "stone deaf" mark a person can bolster his ego tremendously by a turn of the dial.

For those who are so deaf that they have to admit it, there are headphones from two to nine dollars. The costlier ones are usually more suitable for the more deafened. There is no compulsion to listen politely to a radio announcer. The hard hearing do not smile or wear a wise-man, as though they were gulping down every word. If they do not hear the patter, there is always music.

Music soothes the breast that is savagely jammed up against the machine-gun announcer. Even a great many normally hearing people confess that they must

strain their attention in order to understand the rat-a-tat-tat of most announcers. They will strain to snatch a news broadcast, but they cheerfully sin by not "listening" to commercial patter. Maybe it goes in one ear and out the other; anyway it doesn't register. Since this is the case, just how many of the 15,000,000 hard of hearing understand the sponsor's message?

On the other hand, listeners with a severe handicap, will pay attention to a soft slow voice. Whether it proclaims pancakes or panaceas means nothing to them or the first few minutes. Often they haven't the least idea what the voice is talking about, but . . .

"I like the slow voice."

Few are the fortunate who can hold audiences by sound rather than sense. Hitler is one, if you happen to be his kind of German. Old-time orators could always command attention but not always because of the sense of their words. Walter Thomas Mills, who lives at Tujunga and whose melodious voice was often heard on California airmiles a few years ago, could talk as fast as Hitler any day. He had a hundred tricks of the trade. The radio, however, hasn't a trick an orator can cash in on. There is only the voice left.

If radio announcers want to be ignored by a large coterie of devoted listeners, there is always music.

Music helps to conserve the last remnants of hearing in the badly deafened. In some cases there is definite improvement with constant use of the radio. A very hard of hearing woman who married a deaf mute went to live with his relatives. Lonesome because of the difficulty of communication with the family, she began to listen to radio music, although she could not distinguish tunes at any volume. After several months her perception had sharpened until she could grab words and phrases here and there.

Her perception sharpened, please note.

Scads of people are "deaf" simply because 'ack of exercised ears has dulled their perception. They could hear better if they exercised their ears more purposefully than just wiggling them.

A smart salesman could sell extra radios every year by understanding and catering to this field. There are probably half a million hard hearers in Southern California. But nobody can sell the all too prevalent type of announcer.

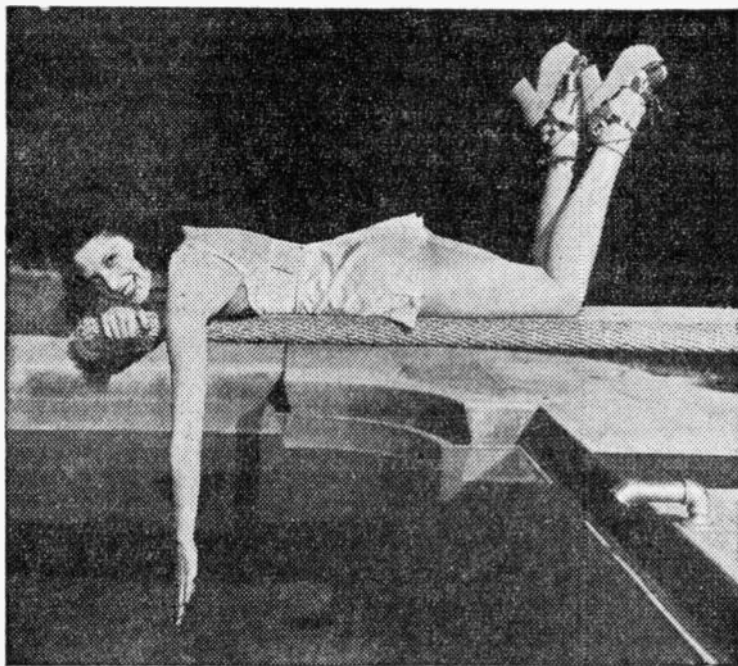

The rotund-faced roadside resort keeper smiled goodhumoredly at the slender slip of a girl who ran mostly to wide, dark eyes and a wilderness of midnight hair.

Fourteen-year-old Dinah Shore wouldn't lie for the world. Mother and Dad hadn't given her permission to sing at the resort. She had just crept out of the house that night. She had with her her sister's best gown and a makeup kit.

Now, the friendly nightclub owner had her in a spot. If she answered his question, she wouldn't sing. If she didn't sing, she wouldn't get the \$10 he had promised to pay before he had seen her. The engagement had been made by the simple expedient of singing to him over a telephone.

Then she remembered.

Once she had broken a vase, dear to mother. She hadn't lied about that. She'd just exercised a talent for diplomacy and unsnarling a situation in psychological yarn.

She said: "Mother, dear. Who possibly could have broken that beautiful vase you loved so?"

Mother wondered, too; but her wonderment did not carry to the leggy, black-eyed daughter, of whom people even then were beginning to predict, in and around Winchester, Tenn.: "That Dinah Shore is

going to be somebody with that voice some day." Which, if not strict grammar, was prediction that was to prove happily true for a great part of America within the unfolding decade from 1930.

Remembering, Dinah Shore widened her eyes in the best dramatic manner of Winchester's drama society hopefuls and said:

"I'll bet when ah's singing all ovah the country you'll be the proudest man—everybody knowing that it was right here Dinah Shore stahed her careeah."

The clubman gulped a couple of times, fanned his face with a pudgy hand, more to cool the glow from those warm-flaming eyes, than anything else.

"All right," he husked, "you go and sing."

She got through the first number and then came sudden end to her first professional appearance. Mother and dad and friends were in the ringside circle. Mother promptly gave a familiar parental sigh which, translated in terms of childhood apprehensions, simply meant:

"You're due for a paddywhacking, my dear little daughter."

But she collected the \$10.

That would be enough of this foolishness, Mama Shore summarized sternly. A daughter of the Old South a nightclub singer. Nonsense! Dinah would be a social service worker, the only dignified and fit career, if career she must have.

Skip grammar and high school, since the net end of these was to have her graduate as an A.B. in sociology from

Vanderbilt University. Mother and Dad were happy, but Dinah wasn't. She longed for the show world, had childishly determined to be a part of it ever since the day when, before the Winchester Ladies Aid society, she had brought an indulgent Winchester gathering to sustained applause with her singing, at 10, of "I Can't Give You Anything But Love, Baby."

It was a severe blow to the elder Shores when she turned to radio. But, they have come to conclude that, perhaps, daughter Dinah is doing more to palliate the nation's ills as a low-voiced, sultry-toned singer than anything she might have done as a social worker. As a matter of fact, there are a number of letters on file with the Tennessee Welfare Commission which give point to this belief. One of them reveals this interesting sidelight on little Miss Dark-Eyes from Tennessee:

"The young lady you sent to investigate us forgot to bring the emergency check and we need to get food. She made us kind of forget our troubles though with her singing. She's a good singer. She sang "Swanee River" like we never heard it sung before. But while it was nice, we are still hungry."

After graduation and a few desultory months as a social worker she was invited by her voice teacher to audition at WSM, in Nashville, just a squirrel gunshot from Winchester. It was in June, 1938, and never did the hills and valleys of Tennessee seem so warm and friendly as they did that late afternoon when she returned from the station with plaudits of hard-minded entertainment experts still sounding in her ears against cricket and frog chirps on the way back to Winchester.

A break came. A popular bandleader was preparing an audition for a big commercial program on the networks and needed a vocalist. Dinah and 50 others applied and she was selected. Elation was shortlived, however, for the commercial failed to materialize.

A friend who had confidence in her voice and ability arranged a network audition. The day arrived, and Dinah came to the studio and in a moment, overcome with terrifying fear of failure, she became speechless, ran from the studio in tears.

She reconciled herself to utter defeat but, unknown to Dinah, the good friend-in-need had a record made of one of her local broadcasts, arranged another audition—by proxy. NBC program officials listened. Dinah was called to the networks just as she was preparing to go back home.

FA TE may conspire for or against a person, but there are some persons for whom the Fates, kind of meanish at first, finally get to turning cartwheels. Dinah Shore is one of these persons.

Talking with her in NBC's artists' corridor the other day, watching the late afternoon light strike through the glass-brick walls and point up a piquant face, touch of embers of vital youth in somberly-serious eyes, listening to the enchanting southern accent—doing this, it was easy to see why Dinah Shore should emerge as a great person in her metier.

She is young—23, but oldish as experience goes, remembering she really started out as an entertainer when she

was 10 and the prodigy of sleepy Winchester, Tenn., which only recently attained the dignity of a town where trains stop.

She was christened Fanny Rose, but her singing of Dinah changed that, plus a resentment against childhood's punsters who sang:

**"Fanny sat on a tack. Fanny Rose.
Did Fanny rise? Shore."**

She is today's radio's outstanding mood singer, with one great ambition that wells up from an essential womanliness:

"I want to get married after a while and I'm going to have three children, two boys and a girl."

My guess is that when "after while" rolls around Dinah Shore will have no dearth of suitors.

She considers her greatest compliment that by W. C. Handy, 70-year-old composer of such famous "blues" songs as "St. Louis Blues," "Loveless Love," and "Memphis Blues."

Handy, a guest star on a program featuring Dinah, was misty-eyed when she finished singing "Memphis Blues."

"My dear," he told her, **"Memphis Blues" was never really sung before. You've turned the clock back 30 years for me."**

STYLE SLANTS

SHE "Shore" does look purty in slack suits. In fact, anybody would hop a couple of ocean liners to be with Dinah Shore, low-of-voice but high-of-looks blues singer on Eddie Cantor's "Time to Smile" show. Miss Shore, who recently came to our country of unusual weather and clothes, was captivated by California slack suits and is in them every possible moment. A picture of brunette loveliness, Dinah "Shore" is the object of all eyes in them, a fact which I will personally verify.

At rehearsal for the "Time to Smile" show last week, Miss Shore wore a green suit, with a long outside torso-fitted jacket. The collar, pocket flaps and cuffs were of beige and these were hand-stitched in green. The very smart slack pants had full legs with no cuffs. The pockets were the part that gave the garment "oomph." They were very full, and were semi-saddlebag fashion, sewed to the jacket only at the top and part way down the sides of the pocket. The bottom half hung loose.

When buying your own slack suits this year, plan the garment as much around the pants as the jacket. This year will be an exceptional year for combinations. The type you make yourself, out of a smart pants and an odd shirt or sweater, will be much in vogue as the season gets

under way. And as such combinations are apt to have a tuck-in shirt, your slack must have a smart waistline. So it behooves you to buy a suit whose pants have a good belt, either of the same material as the rest of the garment, or leather or novelty cloth. Look also for a pocket, which will be important this year. This should be of the side variety, not a hip pocket. Cuffs are not necessary on your slack pants, although you are just as fashion correct with them. I have always felt they were too bulky, detracting from attractive sandals.

The jacket choice boils down to two basic types this year: 1) the long torso-fitted outside jacket, and 2) the long, semi-loose or boxy outside jacket. Tuck-in tops of the same material as the pants are practically things of the past. Pockets will again this year be large and comfortable, and you should have more than one on each jacket. The casual, shirt-maker neckline will be best, but if you

LOWDOWN ON FM

Your Radio Is Going to Be More Fun When a New Idea Gets Going

WHAT is all this business about FM and AM?

What are they and how will they affect my radio?

You've probably asked this question of yourself and others. Radio Life here gives you the lowdown on FM. We won't bother much with AM, because that's what you're on now and have been for some time, without caring much one way or the other, just so long as you got your favorite station programs. AM is amplitude modulation.

But, FM—well, that's something else again.

Here it is:

FM (Frequency Modulation) is the result of a new mechanical and engineering principle in radio broadcasting. Simply expressed, it's like this: a regular AM station, such as KFVD, on the dial at 1000, stays permanently in that channel as an AM station. It makes sounds in your radio depending upon variations in intensity caused by what is flowing out from the broadcasting station, music, talk, singing, stuff like that. You also hear passing street cars, singing telephone wires, thunderstorms, electrical displays, the fire trucks passing through the streets. You hear them as static, interference with reception.

With FM, intensity is steady, all vibrating taking place in frequencies. Thus when you listen to FM, you hear no static. In fact, the maid could be beating the handle off an electric sweeper and you'd never know it. The fast-changing sign next door can flash on and off to its neon heart's content and you'd never hear it.

In a sense FM could also be called "Fidelity Modulation" for the good reason that it increases the range of tones you will hear from your radio. A symphony is being played, for instance. In AM reception, many fine notes of strings—the violins, cellos, basses and harps—are infrequently heard because of the changes in intensity during broadcasting, because of external set interferences and other irritating factors. With FM-adjusted sets, all music comes in with virtually exact reproduction of the tones and shades of tones produced by the orchestra. In the case of a symphony, you will hear with startlingly clear reception and faithfulness the high ranges of a violin, a voice, the lowest rumble of a bass, and the tripping notes that jump between the more audible AM ones in a cornet or saxophone "go-to-town."

Hasn't it been your experience that one station will crowd another, ghostly chatter and wail music creeping in on a program you have tuned in ever so smartly to a particular station. With FM, all that's out. There's no crowding or interference between stations. Each has a place on the dial and in that place each stays.

FM is nearly perfect radio, many engineers agreeing that it realizes their ideals of ultimate radio reception.

It will be some time yet before western-

ers will have to worry about FM, although this year some 50 applications are FCC-filed from networks broadcasting westerly who wish to undertake construction for FM. But sets will have to be adjusted if you are to get the best out of your radio. The dial positions of most stations will be changed and this will mean adjustment for ready station tuning. In addition, it will always be smart to keep directional antennae pointed toward the broadcasting station of your choice.

On January 1, FM passed completely out of the experimental stage, became a full-fledged operating fact. Twenty-five stations from New York to Los Angeles will be authorized by Federal Communications Commission to start broadcasting on a commercial basis. But it will be some little time before all stations to date authorized get down to the business of broadcasting on FM. Ahead of all stations lies a period of field tests, reconstruction of transmitters, and final installation improvements by the FCC.

When the FM change really gets going some years will have zoomed their way toward World War III and President Roosevelt will be retired for senility. In the meantime radio fans won't have as wide a choice of stations with FM as with AM, a condition that is, however, but temporary, with most receivers equipped for FM and also standard AM.

FM receivers are now being built, but in such small quantities as to keep their unit cost rather high. Despite impending mass production of them, it is still likely they will not be much reduced in price because of materials demand of the national defense program.

If you are contemplating purchase of an FM set, you would pay a minimum of \$70. You can pay a great deal more than that if you are a fancier of good cabinet works, if you want all the attachments that make a radio set a veritable entertainment enterprise—phonograph, television, record changers, short-wave, etc.

If you are thrifty, you can make over your present AM set for approximately \$50, a few dollars one way or another, by getting the advice of a recommended radio technician, who will furnish you with an FM adapter and make a neat and useful installation.

No special aerials are required, another good reason to enlist services of a recommended radio service. There will be those who will try to make an 'honest' (?) dollar or two by selling you a 'special' aerial. So far as has been learned today, no special aerial will be needed on the coast. In any event a recognized technician will give you good advice.

Really, with FM the old AM reception will become FM (fond memory). It's that good.

NOTE: KHJ, with the only FM license so far granted in Southern California, plans to start FM broadcasting some time this summer. KFI and KNX have applied for their licenses, are not yet certain of time

WORLD ON YOUR DIAL

By Earl G. De Haven

AN ERROR crept into this column two issues back in giving the schedules of the Iran (Persia) short wave stations. EQB at Teheran, Iran on 6.15 Mc. is heard from 5:45 a. m. to 8 a. m. rather than p. m. as originally given. Comes now a report from our good friend Herb Allen of Reseda, Calif., advising that EQB shows the strongest signals near 6:45 a. m., at which time Oriental-native music is usually played. Reader-listeners are urged to try for this station NOW as tomorrow may be too late.

Several excellent tips on Asiatic stations were included in Herb Allen's report and here they are: Chungking station XGOA on 9.72 Mc. reported good nearly every morning at 7:45. HSP-5 at Bangkok in Thailand (Siam) on 11.72 Mc. heard every morning between 5 and 7 a. m., but with only fair signal strength. Most interesting of these Asiatic station items concerns XYZ at Rangoon, Burma, on 6.007 Mc. whose quality and modulation is declared as excellent but which may be badly QRMed at times. XYZ's schedule is 3:30 to 7 a. m. DAILY, Pacific Time. Two other new India stations are reported on 7 Mc. but neither of these has been identified as yet.

Reader-listeners who own "extended band" receivers will be interested in news concerning a new Java station which operates on 19.46 Mc. PLA, "A for Aircraft" at Batavia, goes on the air at 4 a. m. and signs off at 5:15 a. m. This is an English broadcast with news in our language at 4:45 a. m. The station usually identifies itself thus: "This is the Netherlands calling, from the Netherlands East Indies over station PLA." To enable the listener to tune in PLA the station uses a repeated "music box tune" just prior to 4 a. m. while the Java short waver signs off with the national anthem of the Netherlands.

Although satisfactory reception of the following stations by Pacific Coast listeners is highly problematical, they would certainly constitute "fine catches" for the ardent DXers. First is "Radio Dakar," on 9.39 Mc. in Dakar, Senegal. Schedule is 12:15 to 1:15 p. m. and program begins with a march and concludes with the "Marseillaise" because "Radio Dakar" is loyal to the Vichy government of France. Senegal is in French West Africa. Try also for the French Morocco station, "Radio Maroc" at Rabat on 11.94 Mc. East coast listeners are playing this sta-

tion with excellent volume between 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. and from 4 to 5 a. m. In the past "Radio Maroc" has been heard on the West coast ONLY for a few weeks in the early spring. Finally, also French is TPZ-2 "Radio Alger," on 8.86 Mc., operating from 10:50 a. m. to 1 p. m. From 1 to 3 p. m. on 12.12 Mc. dial TPZ. 73's and good listenin'.

A Thousand Voices

With No Voice Save His Own, Frank
Graham Is a Thousand Men in
Gripping "Nightcap Yarns"

HE wavy-haired, blue-eyed young man in a Sunset boulevard-overlooking office on the third floor of the CBS building on Columbia Square, whirls about in the center of the birdseye maple-furnished room and mutters with startling intensity: "Dalton, you lie."

"Careful, mister, what you say," a villainous voice responds.

"Take it easy, Bill. He's got a gun on him," a third voice, contrasting with the others in its plaintive quality, admonishes.

"I'll have it out with you, Dalton, gun or no gun!"

One closes eyes and the illusion of a roomful of persons grows definitely. It's

hard to believe that the slender figure in the center of the room is responsible for this drama that seems to swirl up out of the emotions and purposes of a group of characters, all of whom come tumbling into life through changing tones. Transitions from voice to voice, character to character, are made with split-second rapidity, with an ease that betrays almost miraculous mastery of tone and range.

It is Frank Graham, CBS' "Man of a Thousand Voices," warming up for his 10:15 p. m. broadcast of "Night Cap Yarns" from KNX.

We listen to his warming-up technic. Keeping our eyes closed, we hear the

chop-chop sibilances of a Chinaman in argument with a Southern gentleman. A Negro chimes in and is answered by a rich and fruity-accented Italian. A new voice comes in, the soft and cultured tones of a suave continental, unmistakably Viennese. This voice utters a question. A crisp, matter-of-fact Englishman responds and is derided by a tough-mannered New York Eastsider.

Frank Graham falls silent, sinks into a chair and wipes his brow.

"I guess I've got them all in order," he says. "Doing nine characters on tonight's broadcast. It's adventure night for the Night Cap Yarner," he quips. "How'd they sound?"

We murmured that the illusion of a number of persons was perfect. And amazingly, it was.

"Listen in tonight, if you can. The illusion is better on the air than doing it this way—cold, you know."

And that night we listened. As should you, for a type of entertainment that is as resourceful an application to radio of American habit as any you can think of. And more. For here is dramatic entertainment that has popular appeal, rapidity of action and scenes and characters—in short, all the elements of good listening fare confined to one person from whom flows an amazing number of characters, so faithfully tonally reproduced that you would have to be a discerning person, indeed, to suspect you are listening to one man.

Frank Graham's career as a teller of tales by night is foundationed upon an American custom, that of reading pulp paper fiction. Last year nearly 21,000,000 persons bought cheaply-produced pulp paper magazines, between whose covers strange and interesting worlds are unfolded. For these millions of magazines, Americans paid out some \$3,000,000.

What Frank Graham does, with the help of three excellent writers, is to breathe life into type-imprisoned heroes and heroines, villains and samaritans who, week by week and month by month, share their thrilling adventures with a host of readers who become privy to romance, war, sea escapades, sorties at crime, and dramatic upflares on the mesquite-studded ranges of the West, for thin dimes.

When "Night Cap Yarns" was brought into being by CBS as a program it was found, it first, that it did not sound as good as a reading of a pulp magazine. Quickly Graham lifted the program onto the level of the "slick" paper magazine, etched plots to appeal to the more cerebral lover of mystery and adventure and romance tales, yet retain a simplicity acceptable to all pulp readers.

The plots are simple but lucidly and logically developed in interest-sustaining action. Recently, for instance, there was the story, "A Pair of Champions," a tale of conflict between a wild roan and a champion rider whose first and only fear of horseflesh was visited upon him by the white-eyed symbol of hate and potential death the man-hating animal was. In smooth interflow of characterizations, Graham revealed the struggle of the young champion to best the fear within him. The denouement came on the day of a championship rodeo. The hero, under the impression that the vicious roan had been sold, confidently entered the bucking stall to confront his enemy. Back of this de-

velopment was the hand of the rider's uncle. The uncle, fearful that his nephew's failure to meet the challenge of the horse would be fatal to his reputation as a man and a rider, had secretly arranged to have the horse repurchased and entered for riding by his now thoroughly challenged young relative. What followed, as the man fought with the hurricane anger of the beast, ultimately to emerge triumphant, made radio drama that held one in set-gripping enthrallment.

There is hardly a classification of human interest that Graham does not touch upon. Monday nights are set aside for request stories that have come in from an increasing number of listeners. On Tuesdays the hardened criminals stalk their prey through the grim paths of the underworld, and in turn are stalked by their nemesis, the stern and courageous men of law and order. Wednesday nights from 10:15 to 10:30 p. m. time is thrust backward and the air roars with the blaze of six-guns, the beat of hooves across the plains in some smoothly-played saga of the developing West. Adventure in general rips down the airways from KNX on Thursdays; tales of the sea, of smuggling, of espionage, of strikes and sabotage, or romance that fires the hearts of the twain that never meet—East and West. The clash of spirited competitors in sports is heard Friday nights, highlights of contests that have made history in the prize ring, the gridiron, on tennis courts, on hockey fields, in air and on sea.

Talking with him we learn his background includes everything from writing plays and organizing dramatic clubs in grammar and high schools, to a two-year period as leading man for Seattle Repertory Playhouse.

"I come by talent naturally," he informed us. "My first smell of greasepaint was at two, when I was carried backstage nightly at theaters throughout the Midwest by my mother, Ethel Briggs Graham, an operatic soprano star of the Midwest show circuits."

He tells us he was born in Detroit, November 22, 1911, and revealed interest in dramatics from the time he first entered school. His scholastic career followed travels of his family from Seattle to Escanaba, Mich., to Bedford, Ore., to Chico, Calif., and, eventually, back to Seattle, where he finished high school.

"For a while I was enrolled at the University of California at Berkeley, but left college in favor of a career. I wound up in Los Angeles and purchased makeup kit, joined the Los Angeles Theatre Guild, earned just enough for the down payment on the kit before the venture folded completely.

"Back in Seattle, I was sadder but wiser. I joined the Seattle Repertory Theatre and in two years time, worked up from general handyman to leading man."

During this time he said he took advantage of an offer from a local station in Seattle. Network executives quickly recognized his ability, and in August of 1937, he was brought to Hollywood to join the CBS staff at KNX. Since that time he has been heard coast-to-coast on many broadcasts.

Married, he lives in a home once occupied by Lily Pons.

"YOU'LL be sure to listen tonight," he says as we get up to go. "And, oh,

by the way, will you mention that Jerry Schwartz, Joe Malone and Rich Hall are the writers who should have the credit for the stuff I do?"

We assure him we will. We open the door and as we close it behind us we hear:

"Ahooy. What ship is that?"

"The Lancashire Lass from Queens-town," roars back from the bridge of a ship young Frank Graham has with quick

imagery brought into CBS' conventional maple-furnished office.

"Stand by for examination, captain," a reedy, English voice shouts back. "This is His Majesty's ship 'Corsair.' We are sending a party to board you."

We half run down the corridor in fear that the ship may not be the Lancashire Lass at all, but a disguised raider ready to cut loose with its starboard guns.

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Chef Milani's Sunday Dinner

For Eight Persons

An All-California Dinner

Santa Clara apple juice cocktail
Los Angeles fresh cream vegetable soup
Tulare county Queen olives
Imperial Valley celery Glendale radishes
San Fernando green onions
San Diego lobster a la Delmonico
Sacramento asparagus in butter
Burbank shoestring potatoes
San Francisco crab salad Louis
San Jose peaches in cream
California grape juice (If it's fermented don't blame me)

Recipe for Cream Vegetable Soup

4 leeks	$\frac{1}{4}$ pound of butter
2 carrots	2 quarts of broth—chicken or beef
2 turnips	4 egg yolks
1 branch of celery	1 cup of cream
4 green onions	$1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons of salt

Mince leeks, carrots, turnips, celery and green onions very fine. Place 4 ounces of butter in a saucepan on the fire, when butter is hot add the minced vegetables and cook for 2 minutes. Then add the 2 quarts of broth and salt, and let boil until vegetables are well done. Then drain them and pound in a mortar, diluting the puree with some of the broth. Strain through a sieve. Beat egg yolks, add cream and beat well. Broil broth, and when it reaches the boiling point take from fire, and add the egg cream mixture, and stir well, then put on a fire again, stirring constantly until thickness desired is reached, then add 4 ounces of butter. When butter is melted serve with croutons.

Recipe for Lobster a la Delmonico

4 lobsters, 2 pounds each
$\frac{1}{4}$ pound of butter
1 pint and 4 tablespoons of cream
6 tablespoons of sherry wine
4 egg yolks
One-eighth of a teaspoon of cayenne
1 teaspoon of salt

Cook lobsters in plenty of boiling water, when cooled detach bodies from the tails and cut into slices. Put them in a thick sautoir pan, with each piece lying flat, and add $\frac{1}{4}$ pound of melted butter on top, season with salt, and fry lightly on both sides. Moisten with 1 pint of cream. When cream is half done cooking, quickly add the sherry wine, boil the liquid once more and then remove from the fire. Mix well the yolk of one egg with 4 tablespoons of cream and add to the lobster mixture and stir. Put on a slow fire and let cook without boiling. Sprinkle the cayenne and toss the lobsters lightly, arrange on a hot service platter, pour sauce on top and serve.

Recipe for San Francisco Crab Salad Louie

1 large head of lettuce	1 cup of French dressing
4 large crabs	$\frac{1}{4}$ cup of chilli sauce
2 eggs, hard boiled	$\frac{1}{4}$ tablespoons of mayonnaise
2 chives	Salt and pepper to taste
1 tablespoon of Worcestershire sauce	

Place leaves of lettuce that have been washed around the salad bowl, chop a few leaves to cover the bottom. Boil crabs and cool them, get all the meat and slice very thin, and place in the middle of the bowl. Slice the eggs and place all around the crabs. Mix in a bowl French dressing, chilli sauce, mayonnaise, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of salt and a pinch of pepper, and 1 teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce, when well mixed pour on top of crab meat. Chop chives and sprinkle on top of salad.

From the standpoint of art, individual molds always enhance a pudding. Puddings take pride in their shape as well as their ingredients. They are also happiest with some kind of sauce, and you can fix one with apple juice as well as brandy.

Remember that you can vary your custards, too. A bit of chocolate, some caramelized sugar and even coffee can serve to modify one.

The proof of the pudding is in the eating, all right, but the proof of the proof is still in the ingenuity you use when making one.

Chef Milani's Suggestions for Puddings

Recipe for Banana Pudding a la Charlie McCarthy

3 bananas, sliced thin 1 cup of milk
 1 cup of sugar 3 tablespoons of lemon juice
 4 eggs 2 teaspoons of lemon rind, grated
 1/2 cup of macaroon crumbs 1/2 teaspoon of salt

Sprinkle half the sugar over bananas. Beat 2 whole eggs, and the yolks of 2 other eggs with macaroon crumbs and the milk for 2 minutes. Add lemon rind and juice, stir in the bananas. Grease a baking pan and then pour in the mixture. Bake in hot oven at 450 degrees for 15 minutes. Make a meringue with the 2 chilled egg whites left, and the rest of the sugar, by whipping the egg whites very stiff and then add the sugar. Cover the pudding and let brown in a very slow oven at 250 degrees until brown desired. Be sure to keep the oven at a low temperature or the meringue will get tough.

Recipe for Plum Pudding a la George Burns

1/4 pound of beef kidney suet, chopped very fine and free from fiber 1/4 pound of seeded raisins
 1/4 pound of currants, cleaned and washed well
 1/4 pound of macaroons, crushed very fine and sifted thru a sieve
 1 ounce of candied lemon peel, chopped very fine
 1/4 pound of powdered sugar 1 tablespoon of flour
 1 good pinch of cinnamon
 1 good pinch of nutmeg and all-spice
 1/2 cup of brandy
 2 eggs 1/4 pound of butter

First mix all ingredients but flour and butter. Then dip a strong cloth in cold water and wring out well. Spread it open on a table and butter it to the consistency of cream. Dredge over the flour sifted, and shake the cloth to remove the excess flour. Put mixture in the center of floured cloth in the shape of a ball, raise edges of cloth, bringing the four ends together, and all around to enclose preparation well. Then tighten and tie firmly. Plunge pudding into pan, three-quarters filled with boiling water, and let cook for 1 hour and 30 minutes. Then remove from the water. After 5 minutes cut the string, and place pudding in the center of a hot dessert dish. Sprinkle with powdered sugar, pour over some rum or brandy, and serve it sitting on a fire.

Recipe for the Sauce

8 ounces of beef marrow 4 ounces of vanilla sugar
 4 ounces of butter 1/2 cup of rum

Chop beef marrow very fine, melt in a double boiler, then strain through a napkin into a bowl and whip until it begins to froth, then add the butter melted, the sugar and the rum, beat well and serve with the pudding.

Recipe for Rice Pudding a la Gracie Allen

1/2 pound of rice 2 ounces of butter
 1 1/2 quarts of milk A pinch of salt
 1 stick of vanilla 10 eggs
 7 ounces of sugar 1/2 ounce of starch
 6 ounces of candied fruits—pears, pineapple and cherries

Wash rice and blanch in plenty of water. Drain and put into a saucepan with 1 quart of milk, and a half a stick of vanilla. Let it cook for 40 minutes in an oven at 325 degrees. Then withdraw and suppress the vanilla, add three ounces of sugar to it, 2 ounces of butter and a pinch of salt. Separate 6 eggs and use the yolks only, and 1 whole egg, and mix all together, well. Stir in the 6 ounces of mixed candied fruits, diced into quarter inch pieces. Then add 3 well beaten egg whites. Butter and sugar a mold of cylindrical shape, fill it four-fifths full of the mixture and lay it in a pan with water to half of its height. Place on fire until the water begins to boil, then place in an oven at 400 degrees and let bake for 45 minutes. Remove from the oven and let stand for 5 minutes. Then un mold on a dish and cover with cream sauce a la Gracie Allen

Recipe for Cream Sauce

Place in bowl 4 egg yolks, 4 ounces of sugar and the starch. Beat until mixture is smooth, then put a pint of milk and 1/2 a stick of vanilla in a saucepan and let come to a boil. As soon as the milk comes to a boil pour in the egg yolks, mix very gently and stir all well together. Pour all of it back into the saucepan, place on a low fire and thicken the sauce without letting it come to a boil. Be sure to stir constantly with a wire whip. Strain through a fine sieve and serve with the pudding.

Recipe for Sirloin Tips a la Jack Benny

- 1 pound of sirloin tip steak
- 4 slices of Ol' Fashund bacon
- 1 onion
- A sprig of rosemary herb
- 2 pounds of peeled potatoes
- 1 No. 2 can peas
- 1 No. 2 1/2 can of tomatoes
- Salt and pepper to taste

Cut 1 sirloin tip steak in inch squares and fry in 4 slices of Ol' Fashund bacon, chopped very fine. When meat is half done, fry 1 onion cut in rings of 4 parts, add a sprig of rosemary herb. Cook until onion comes to a golden color. Place meat in a large casserole, then add 2 pounds of peeled potatoes cut in 2 inch pieces, cover meat with potatoes, then open can of peas, drain, and pour peas on top of potatoes, then top mixture with the can of tomatoes, season with salt and pepper, cover casserole, and bake at 400 degrees for 1 hour and 25 minutes.

CHEF MILANI'S DOLLAR (FOR 4) DINNER No. 2

- Chicken and egg noodle casserole
- Celery Heart of lettuce with mayonnaise
- Bread and butter Coffee
- Preserved pears

Recipe for Chicken and Egg Noodle Casserole

- 1 jar of Lynden chicken and noodles
- 1 No. 2 can peas
- 2 eggs
- 2 slices of Ol' Fashund bacon
- 1/2 cup of bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons of butter
- Salt and pepper to taste

Open can of peas and drain juice from it. Measure 1 cup of juice and mix well with 2 eggs. Chop 2 slices of bacon and fry in skillet, when bacon is brown add peas and let cook for 5 minutes. Open jar of chicken and noodles, pour into a bowl, add egg mixture and peas, season with salt and pepper, and place into a casserole, sprinkle with bread crumbs over the top, pour 2 tablespoons of butter on chicken, and bake in a preheated oven at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

CHEF MILANI'S DOLLAR (FOR 4) DINNER No. 3

- Pork Spareribs a la Mr. Babson
- Green peppers Hominy
- Lettuce Salad with Mayonnaise
- Coffee Preserved Peaches

Recipe for Pork Spareribs a la Mr. Babson

- 2 pounds of pork spareribs
- 2 teaspoons of salt
- A dash of pepper
- 2 tablespoons of dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons of brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons of melted butter

Boil 2 quarts of water, and drop in 2 pounds of spareribs cut in pieces 6 inches long, for 5 minutes. Drain ribs and put them in a baking pan, salt and pepper them to taste, and bake in oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Make a mixture of 2 tablespoons of dry mustard, 2 tablespoons of brown sugar and 2 tablespoons of melted butter. When well mixed spread on spareribs and put to bake again for 15 minutes longer.

The Channel Is Still the English Channel

EDITOR'S NOTE: From England comes this thrilling literary slice of drama by a staff writer for British Broadcasting Company. The fact-story is a dramatized version of short-wave news of English Channel events reported occasionally by Radio Life's Earl G. DeHaven, the listening posts of major networks, and transmitted to the press.

ON the starboard side, the embattled cliffs of Dover . . . on the port, the long-nosed guns of Cap Gris Nez. Down the gutter, entering that narrow shipping lane bounded on one side by the Dover breakers and on the other by the Goodwin Sands, the Channel Convoy.

Aboard the ships of the convoy the silence is stirred only by the rhythmic swell and fall of engines and the slow salt swish of the wash as the bow-waves kiss the deck and slide hissing through the scuppers. The darkness is so dense that the ships around look like shadows: ghosts haunting ghosts.

"Where are we now?"

The skipper, who had been standing, immovable and silent, on the bridge beside me, shifted his stance and spat neatly over the side of his vessel. I thought I could hear the spit hit the water.

"We're coming into the Downs." "The Downs? Where's that?"

"Four miles off Dover. Less than 20 miles, I reckon, off the coast of France."

"Off Cap Gris Nez? That's where the long-range guns are mounted, isn't it?"

The skipper grunted; then, fixing his gaze into the darkness, he froze into immobility again.

I screwed my eyes to see what he was looking at; but there was nothing to see. I tried to think of a funny story to start the conversation again; but somehow, funny stories wouldn't come into my head. I began to count my heartbeats. One . . . two . . . three . . .

At one hundred and twenty-two precisely, a gloved hand shoved me in the ribs. Poking out of a woollen balaclava was a red nose with a friendly voice behind it. It was the naval signaller, put aboard to see us through the Channel. "Keep your mince pies open. If you see a gun-flash on the port side, you'll know that they know we're 'ere."

"What's it like?" I asked.

"Being shelled?" The signaller considered the question. "It's better than E-boats," he said thoughtfully. "And, in some ways, it's better than being dive-bombed. Dive-bombing's hell; but you can have a crack back at them."

German Guns Open Fire

As he spoke, a flash rose on the horizon, fluttered into a gale and vanished. "That's them," said the signaller. Seconds passed. Then the boom of the gun reached us. Without moving, the skipper addressed the sea: "Last time I came down the Channel they dive-bombed us. They got my ship after three minutes. She went down in six minutes. They broke her back, the swine. Nice ship she was, too. Not much to look at, but well-behaved. But we didn't lose any lives and the Germans lost 87 bombers that day, so perhaps it was worth it. I got three months' leave because of that. This is my first trip on this ship. She's a dandy, isn't she?"

I said yes; but I didn't mean it. A coaster smoking like a sooty chimney and groaning along is not a romantic sight. The signaller, who was trained in destroyers, guessed my thoughts and shared them. He tapped his red nose at me.

"That salvo must have gone wide," I said. "Gone wide?" said the skipper, "it hasn't got here yet."

"How long do we wait?"

"About a minute from the time you see the flash."

"How long will the shelling last?" "Will they keep it up?" "Last time down, they did . . ." "Look out, here she comes."

Something whizzed out of the sky, plumped in the sea and sent a pillar of water rearing out of the swell. "Wide," said the skipper, and spat over the rail. "They'll go on shelling the area," said the red-nosed signaller, "until they think we've passed. This ruddy convoy may be slow, but we're 20 cables in front of where Hitler thinks we are already."

THE port of loading is in England. The port of unloading is in England, too. In peace time, coal is carried from the east coast to the southwest by the sea route, because coasters are a cheaper form of transport than railways. In war, coasters carry the coal to keep the rails free for more important traffic; but they carry it, too, because, whoever holds the French coast, the Channel is still the English Channel. The coasters, plodding slowly through the Straits of Dover, are a symbol that the sea is ours. Call it swank, if you like, but under the very eyes of the Germans—under the nose of long-range guns, in the teeth of the E-boats, in the shadow of the dive-bombers—the most lowly ships in the Merchant Navy are tocking a snook at the would-be invader, who paddles on the other beach, frustrated by a 22-mile ditch.

Between them—long-range guns, E-boats and dive-bombers (prowling U-boats are usually persuaded to keep out of the Channel by our mine fields)—there has been brought into being the most highly-organized and heavily-armed convoy afloat.

The coasters, arriving from the loading port, are marshalled at a rendezvous by the Royal Navy. Lloyds tell the navy the names of the ships which are expected to arrive. On the morning the convoy is to sail, a conference is called of all skippers. They are addressed by the Naval Control Officer, the Commanding Officer of the escort vessels, and the Commodore of the Convoy. They are given their route, the formation in which they will sail, and special contingencies they must be ready to meet on the voyage. The speed of the convoy is determined by the slowest ship.

At the conference you can spot the skippers of the coasters because, while they're ashore, most of them are in civilian clothes. The Commodore, who takes command of the fleet of coasters during the voyage, is a Captain in the Royal Naval Reserve, which means that he has four crisscross stripes on his sleeve. The Naval Control Officer and the Commander of the escort vessels wear the straight gold stripes of the regular naval officer. The junior naval officers, who are in command of the gun crews on the coasters, have the wavy stripe of the volunteer reserve.

As soon as the conference is over, launches take the officers aboard the ships anchored in the bay.

As soon as the skipper comes aboard, the ships up anchor and steam slowly into position in line ahead behind the Commodore and Vice-Commodore, whose vessels lead the convoy.

As the array of ships sail, their skippers open their sealed orders for the voyage. Spitfires whine out of the clouds and circle overhead. The floating balloon barrage goes up. On port and starboard, flotillas of motor launches race, roaring and spitting, up and down the line of ships. Out of the blue slide the sleek grey shapes of the escorting warships. In the Channel, the minesweepers are clearing the passage. The Channel Convoy is under way.—DOUGLAS M. HASTINGS.

Photo, as well as radio-genic is Beverly Younger, whom this week the editors in a state of catalepsy induced by over-exposure to blue-grey eyes and fancies entangled in a shimmering topknot of blonde hair, the color of honey produced at Pear Blossom, California . . . (Ed. Note:—Out of the trance, Chum) whom the editors have nominated for a Radio Life career of still forthcoming consequential proportions.

When her '5' 5" editorial commotion had subsided we learned she was almost literally born with a makeup pencil in her baby hands. "Your radio has enough wire in it to stretch from two to five miles. Now, your loose connection may be at any point within the five-mile limit, depending upon the model radio you have. Your serviceman looks for this break with his test equipment, and sometimes it's harder to find than the well-known needle in the well-known haystack. The loose connection may intermittently open and close."

When your radio is "sick," call a radio service shop listed on this page. They have the know-how and the modern test equipment to repair.
