RADIO SET DILEMMA: Last week, while a storm of protest against the FCC's network regulations was mounting on the national horizon, the manufacturing branch of the industry was experiencing gripping pains.

How to produce and sell more radio

sets has been a constant theme at meetings of the Radio Manufacturers' association. Last fortnight, some 5,000 of the nation's 7,500 set makers were called together to ponder a question:

Could they make as many sets this year as they knew they could sell?

Chief gripe born of this question was that National Defense had cut deeply into metal stocks and requirements of the set makers. Though many firms reported ample stocks of certain metals, all faced a shortage of aluminum. This shortage last week had burgeoned to a point where 50% of smaller manufacturers had curtailed production. Others were facing possible shutdowns.

Sore were the manufacturers whose industrial priorities had been classified by national defense authorities as "B-7," a classification that prompted James S. Knowlson, association head and Stewart-

ARRANGER'S DREAM: Paul Baron is the smooth, dark young man who directs the orchestra on Ilka Chase's "Penthouse Party" program. When he isn't directing an orchestra, he's busy making arrangements for orchestras other than his own and for various vocalists.

The dream of Baron's life is to have orchestrators get credit lines for their work. "Someday," he says, "maybe the radio announcer will say 'the song you just heard was arranged by so-and-so.'" As to the vital importance of good orchestration for vocalists, Baron says:

"The orchestration serves as subdued background but is an effective weapon, proclaiming the entrance of the human voice. It tells the story of the song in its own way while the vocalist is singing. When I arrange for a vocalist, I first study the singer's vocal capabilities, then select the songs best suited to his or her range and personality. After that I analyze the text and proceed accordingly."

Baron's vocal clientele includes Jane Frohman, Yvette, Bernice Parks, Elvira Rios and Nanette Fabares. He has also worked for Lupe Velez and Fifi Dorsay. In the popular band field, Benny Goodman is Baron's client and in the classical field, the Ballet Theatre often commissions him to do symphonic orchestrations for the ballets.

"Jitterbugs," Baron says, "understand and appreciate the artistic worth of the orchestrator and arranger. The general public does not. The conductor and the vocalist stand up for cheers—whether in radio, vaudeville or theatre—but the arranger slinks off to do another exacting job so that someone else can earn more cheers."

Baron hopes to change the picture. He is doing research for a book on arrangers which he hopes will achieve for arrangers and orchestrators their rightful place in the musical world.

Warner president to remark:

Most important task of makers, he said, was to convince the Administration that radio is an essential and effective method of communicating with the people.

A boom in radio repairing throughout the country was seen as a result of the metal deficiency, a result of fact that priorities for parts are more easily gotten than materials for making of complete sets.

Showmanly is Fidler, who is rated as one of Hollywood's "guttier" air columnists. Besides his bongs his program is sound-characterized by Morse code staccato spelling out "CQ" or "attention," followed

by a Morse tap-out of his name in letters.

Fidler will return to air over the Pacific network of the Columbia Broadcasting System, Friday, July 11, from 8:30 to 8:45 p.m. He is believed to be the best informed man about Hollywood. He knows every star, almost every extra, is well acquainted with executives, technicians and directors in studios.

His reputation as a man who knows Hollywood has been built up slowly with honest toil over twenty years as actor, writer, press agent, radio commentator and columnist. He has an intense personal interest in pictures, those who make them, is friendly with nearly everybody in Hollywood, except those who resent criticisms.

DEAR JOHN IDENTIFIED: "Dear John," the friend to whom Faith Chandler's weekly letters are addressed, last week was identified for the first time since the serial drama "Dear John," starring Irene Rich, went on the air 41 weeks ago.

Answering questions of listeners Faith Chandler told Brice that John is Dr. John Mathews, a missionary who returned from China with her when she was a child. Faith (Irene Rich) described John as "a hard-fisted, fighting sky-pilot . . . gentle as a lamb when you need him."

It was John who comforted Faith when she was alone in the world and he continued to be her friend as she grew up in the United States.

Disclosure of the identity of "John" answers the question posed in more than 75 per cent of the fan letters received by Miss Rich since she introduced the serial drama last year by reading the first of Faith Chandler's letters to "Dear John."

Go Get It Boys!

About Radio Reporters Who Wait on Neither The Times Nor Tides

LAST YEAR CBS "covered" more than 1,700 affairs of public interest. Covering a special event calls for technique. It isn't just a matter of setting up microphones at the scene and allowing whatever sounds are heard, human and otherwise, to filter in.

While technicians are getting broadcast equipment in order, Special Event reporters are giving the situation the works, determining which parts of what they see can be translated into air-worthy stuff. Descriptive powers and a racing tongue are essential to a good special events reporter. He must be able rapidly to establish with picture-making phrases, a "view" of the scene in the minds of the listeners.

In a conventional newspaper city-room this translation is called "editing," the striking out of material which does not, necessarily, add to or "make" the story. It is as a sort of managing editor that the director of the special events division is on the scene. His alert eyes and nimble mind are constantly ranging, selecting a bit here and there to be radio-covered, to take from the situation before him human and sound effects which, when started flowing through radio cables to stations, to listeners, actually become an auditory motion picture. Among the items his eyes will search out are:

- 1) Human reactions to whatever is happening or has happened,
- 2) the more dramatic features of the happening itself,
- 3) what is being done about the happening and by whom and to what end,
- 4) the significance of the happening and
- 5) the correlation of these in flashing instant decisions so that recording of the event proceeds with all the smooth continuity and finish of something carefully rehearsed.

Since special events cannot be rehearsed it is, as Mr. Fox Case opines, "fairly remarkable that so graphically accurate sound picturizations of important things are effected."

Mr. Case should know. He has had

years of experience giving events a vital air-iness. Most CBS events transmissions are educational in character, for the reason, perhaps, that while a fire could be interesting it would have to be a large fire to warrant its recording and its attendant aspects of human interest. In other words, so that the student of special event techniques may get off on the right sound track, whatever is to be recorded has to be of general interest. A bunch of fire-crackers being set off is a Coventry bombardment in miniature, but it's not Coventry and therefore of no recording consequence. But come whatever martial fate is store for America, you may be sure that the bombardment of an American city will find Fox Case present, among other network specialists in airing significant things as they occur.

Case and his crews concentrate on matters that have wide appeal. Many of these are known in advance of their occurrence. This fact, however, in no way minimizes the work of the crew. It was known, for example, that Governor Olson would pardon Tom Mooney, convicted of the Preparedness Day Bombing in 1916 in San Francisco. There have been other men pardoned of various crimes, but in California and for the nation Tom Mooney was news. Case set up a special

events broadcast of the pardoning ceremonies. It just wasn't one of those things where, in somewhat stilted official language, the state's chief executive makes a speech with response by a man who had spent much of his lifetime in prison. No, this was different. Here was a man who had been tried and convicted of a shocking crime. He had for years pleaded his innocence, had presented evidence in his own behalf that had split the nation into controversial camps on the subject of his guilt.

"The whole world was interested in the Mooney case outcome," Case averred. "It was only right that a special radio event should be made of the ceremony. For millions of persons had never heard the voice of Tom Mooney. Only radio could bring that voice to them. The history of the generation's most talked about man and case was compressed into a few minutes of dramatic air-reporting of that case's concluding chapter."

Of such stuff are special events made. Millions will read of a great power project, will later see motion pictures of the event. But long before motion pictures or press can translate into film

Miss Tedrow will portray the sophisticated, would-be youthful mother of Judy, pert lass of marriageable age whose days are consigned to a dress designing shop, whose evenings are complicated by Junior Sheldon, boy friend, played by Ben Alexander.

Only yesterday, when society still raised its eyebrows at young girls going on the stage, Miss Tedrow's mother engaged in the refined and accepted art of teaching "elocution." Her daughter started acting when she was a six-year-old with hair in curls. While other little Denver girls fretted over loose milk teeth and spatting over neighborhood dolls, Irene became a member of one of the famous Ellitch Gardens summer stock companies, now celebrating its 50th milestone.

For seven summers she had child parts in the company, then later on, during summer vacations from Carnegie Tech, she played bits. Naturally she majored in drama at college.

Laying aside her gown and mortar board, Miss Tedrow joined the Cleveland Playhouse, where she enacted 87 roles during five seasons. Her radio introduction resulted from her Playhouse affiliation.

Club Matinee-ers Go to Work When Sun Is High

IT is a blessing of a radio-dominated world that nobody, at any time, at any place, on land or sea, prairie or mountain, need be lonely. For, at all hours and in all places, radio is doing something in its world of tubes, aerials, kilowatts, remotes, and short and long waves. One has only to swirl a knob or press a button and voices and music come. If you don't like what you hear you can keep twirling or stop, as you wish.

Not more than a generation ago, men of the West looked upon noon as a brief respite from whatever had occupied them during the morning. Some sat in the shade of factories exploring contents of lunch pails filled that morning by dutiful wives. Others lunched at swank cafes or at grab-it-on-the-fly luncheries. At home the ladies forked desultorily over cold scraps, thought of ironing, evening cooking—whatever occupies the minds of the distaffers.

Luncheon music and fun was a privilege of the wealthy, scarcely ever shared by the workers of the world. Today all is changed. There is—in a word or two—Club Matinee, the 12 noon airer from KECA and KFSD.

Club Matinee is as refreshing as violets in dewy dawn, as much fun as a harrel of kittens. For example, a recurrent side-splitter on the program is the band concert from Belch Auditorium at Stedgie Prep. If you've ever heard a slightly befuddled German corner band playing the William Tell overture you have a faint idea of what happened to sides of listeners on a recent program when Stedgie's band played it from Belch with many a gradual diminuendo and sudden crescendo.

Many an otherwise dull afternoon in plant and office has been illumined by chuckles and smiles of those who heard Ransom Sherman give his screwy book reviews. When Sherman reviews it's hardly a matter to talk about—the subject of the book we mean. He may start seriously on Valtin's "Out Of The Night" and wind up in topic-scrambled confusion out of which one may hilariously struggle with wisps of gardening notes, egg recipes

and political science tangled in a maze of mixed-up references to Valtin's efforts.

Sherman is no longer with Club Matinee since taking over the "Hap Hazard" characterization as a summer show for Fibber and Molly. In his place is Durward Kirby who can be depended upon to be just as healthily balmy.

As a Club Matinee artist, Kirby will not need to become acquainted with fans of the Monday-through-Saturday show. For some months he's been chief stooge for Comedian Sherman on Thursdays and Fridays. Sherman bestowed his mantle on his satellite for the Friday and Saturday Blue Network broadcast.

The humor of Club Matinee is blunt but hardly dull as Mrs. Nola Rooney of Wichita, Kansas, found out.

At any rate, this is what she got out of Garry Moore and his Club Matinee cohorts when she asked them for a broadcast devoted to advice on how to hang summer drapes:

Floyd Holm, of the Escorts and Betty, advised her to go to the library and read that best seller on how to get mad at curtains, "The Drapes of Wrath".

From Cliff Peterson, of the same song team, she got the suggestion that she "ought to make her drapes out of taffeta—because molasses taffeta will stick up by itself."

From Jose Bethancourt, Guatemalan marimbist on the show, she got some unintelligible advice in Spanish.

The new emcee Kirby and Garry Moore will, in all like'hood, continue the fun-feud started by Ransom Sherman with Moore.

These two m.c.'s of the NBC-Blue's Club Matinee have heaved brickbats at each other since April, 1939, when Moore became boss of the show for the first three days in each week. In the splitting up of that Club Matinee assignment lie the germs of the hilarious discord that has been an almost daily feature of that program since.

Prior to that fateful April, Sherman had carried the brunt of Club Matinee six days a week. Then, when Moore arrived at NBC Chicago, a "friendly" conference between Sherman and Moore was called to decide how the week should be split up between the two m. c.'s. Generously, on the face of things, Sherman "volunteered" to take the Thursday, Fri-

day and Saturday stints, which would leave Garry Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and a nice set of long week-ends.

It looked good to Garry, a trusting newcomer, until he discovered that Sherman, through years of experience, had learned that Club Matinee would be canceled many many Saturdays because of football, track meets, horse races and opera broadcasts. He suddenly found himself hooked, with three solid hours of broadcasting a week to two—as a rule—for Sherman.

The feud was on. It's been on ever since. They've fought over announcers, talent, haircuts, age, bull fiddle players, blondes, horse feathers, politics, wash day, gum drops, parchesi and potted rump steak. The end may not be in sight.

ANN GILLIS, pretty titian-haired heroine of "A Date With Judy," new NBC comedy-drama series was "discovered" twice.

Rudy Vallee and Bob Hope can share the credit for bringing the talented youngster to radio, via the stage and screen.

Rudy met Ann when the NBC star was a nine-year-old singer and dancer in New York. He introduced her on one of his guest-star nights, in a spot that was scheduled for five minutes—and she held her audience for 43 minutes.

After Ann's success as an entertainer in New York brought her to the attention of Hollywood producers, her mother brought her to Hollywood. But the film studios were distinctly not interested in testing child actresses.

One producer, unable to get rid of the persistent child, said, "I don't want to test any more girls. Besides how do I know you are any good?"

"Rudy Vallee said so," Ann shot back—and the producer capitulated.

Ann's first role was in MGM's "The Great Ziegfeld." Then followed a string of successes, including hits in "Garden of Allah," "The Underpup," "All This and Heaven Too," "Little Men" and others. Recently Ann finished a featured role in "Nice Girl," starring Deanna Durbin.

Bob Hope's role in the "discovery" of the new NBC star began when he met her at Paramount, where she is playing in "Glamour Boy."

"Come over to NBC some time," he told her, "and I'll make you a radio star."

Ann took him up. She came to NBC, and Hope introduced her to the producer of his Pepsodent Show. When "A Date with Judy" was scheduled as the summer replacement for Hope's show during Bob's vacation, Ann auditioned and won the leading role.

Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, February 12, 1927, Ann was taken to South America by her parents. Not until she returned to the United States, however, did she begin her dramatic training. She appeared in nine plays with a New Rochelle, New York, dramatic group when she was nine years old. It was then that Rudy Vallee saw her, and introduced her in his stage show.

Ann made several appearances as a singer and dancer with Abe Lyman's orchestra at the Pavilion Royale on Long Island. There she was seen by a talent scout, who persuaded her mother to bring her to Hollywood. Then began the long job-hunting stage which ended when Rudy Vallee's name opened the way to her first screen test.

Behind the

SHOWS

They Watch Details That Make Or Break Promising Programs

THERE'S more to radio than actors and actresses, programs and broadcastings.

Behind the scenes is a business—big business dealing in multiple millions, competing intensely and healthily, planning and scheming in an empire in which the acting profession and the show business are only window-dressing that pays off.

But, there are the window dressers!

These are directors, account executives, agency men, writers and producers.

Now, take the producers!

If you've been interested in radio as a career you probably know by this time that there is a business side to radio in which has been won success as sterling as that won in the more glamorous entertainment side of radio.

In this article we give you Cecil Underwood, producer of *Fibber and Molly* program, and Tom McKnight, the producer of *Blondie*. They are two aspects of the same thing, Scylla and Charybdis, two sides of a medal.

You've probably thought of a producer as a person upon whom should be hung the blame if a show is bad, one to be praised if it is good. Well, here are two top-notchers in the producing field of radio. What is their estimate of their jobs? Cecil Underwood comes first. He forks his dessert at the Brown Derby and smiles wryly:

"A producer? Well, he's the business agent of the business that pays out the money for a show. He is a coordinator of show activities, his main job being to provide people for the cast, to arrange harmony between stations, casts, business and all concerned.

"He sits in on script sessions to protect the client and to suggest changes that he thinks might be a better break for the client who is footing the bill.

"He has to know radio in its creative phases, know a great deal about it technically, be a judge of programs and material for programs.

"He must be a thorough-going busi-

ness man who regards the particular show of which he is producer as a reflection of big business, must know entertainment, have a critical faculty about radio progress and its condition at any given period."

What, we asked, did he mean by that?

"There is, for instance, a lag in new ideas for radio," he replied. "There are too many quiz shows, too many depressing soap operas. The producer representing business, must be able to evaluate new ideas, suggest their logical use by a client, analyze pitfalls in broadcasting for listener attention, as, for example, the primary one of serial dramas following one another like so many sheep, all vociferously restating the same situations."

Reduced to lowest terms, a producer is a person who represents the time buyer, and who is possessed of sufficient savvy of his job to be able to make dependable suggestions, give advice and orders to everybody connected with a show, from professional entertainers to writers and musicians, besides, as it were, keeping the books on the enterprise.

Tom McKnight is, perhaps, radioland's most outspoken critic. As the producer of the *Blondie* show he does everything that Underwood does but has conversely, a low estimate of producers in general, including himself.

"They are only errand boys," he remarked sadly the other day.

His low estimate of his niche in radio is shared by no one but himself. For most people regard him as a cerebral and candid-tongued individual who knows what he is talking about. And he does.

McKnight believes that one trouble with radio is that there are too many people in it who are not show people, excluding, of course, the professional actor and actress.

Like Cecil Underwood he believes that

variety is the answer to the daytime radio structure, doesn't believe that because there are scores of separately titled dramas on the air during the day that all are different.

"Most fall into a monotony that is as far from good radio as it could be," he said.

Both agree that old time vaudeville provides a basic pattern for radio to work on. Both agree that being a producer is like being a foreman of a construction job. The producer is there with fairly sound knowledge of the show business, the business side of this business, and a sound psychological knowledge of people, all to be translated in best possible terms for the companies who foot America's radio time bills.

If you think "*Fibber and Molly*" is a good program, that "*Blondie*" is, you might guess that their presence on the air for so long a time may be due to the fact that somebody is headman and sees to it that whatever the job is, it is done on time, at lowest possible cost and is done well when it is done.

And there, briefly, you have a picture of a producer. He is, after all, a businessman in radio—a businessman who combines all the qualities and talents of those with whom he deals.

ONE GOOD laugh is worth a thousand speeches in building morale in military camps. Give us laughs!"

And that's the way the armed camps of the Pacific Coast are getting it, as they train themselves for national defense, from the Edgar Bergens and Charlie McCarthys, the Bob Hopes and the Jerry Colonnas, the Kay Kysers and the Ish Kabibbles, the Vera Vagues and the Jack Bennys, the Rochesters and the Abbotts and Costellos of radio.

Hollywood studios of NBC are almost deserted on many broadcast nights. One program after another moved to some

army camp to heed urgent requests of military leaders for entertainment that takes the minds of the soldiers, the sailors and the mariners off the drudgery of drills and the homesickness for loved ones at home.

The first to respond to the appeal and volunteer his services was the NBC ventriloquist, Edgar Bergen. As early as last October, he personally flew his sassy charge, Charlie McCarthy, to the Air Corps base at March Field, California.

There, as bugles blew and drums rolled, Charlie McCarthy was made an honorary master sergeant in the Army Air Corps on a coast-to-coast NBC broadcast, and the Air Corps enlisted a record number of Flying Cadets among boys whose attention was attracted to March Field by the dummy's appearance.

Just as quick to do their bit for national defense morale were the comedy team of Burns and Allen, then appearing on an NBC series. With cooperation of the Navy, they flew to San Diego with their entire cast, at their own expense, to stage a half-hour broadcast and show to which Navy men ashore and at sea listened in all parts of the world.

Then came a succession of big commercial shows trekking to the defense centers in a stream that gave the military men a better brand of entertainment than their own folks were getting at home.

Bob Hope and his Pepsodent show, before leaving the air for a summer vacation, covered Camp San Luis Obispo, March Field, Camp Callan and the Naval Training Station at San Diego. Jack Benny took his cast to do a Jello show for the gobs at San Diego too, and then gave up most of his summer vacation to join a motion picture troupe making a circuit of all the camps.

Kay Kyser, not overlooking the boys at such nearby posts as the Navy and Marine bases at San Diego, also jumped with his "College of Musical Knowledge" cast to points as far removed as Camp Lewis, Washington, and Randolph Field, Texas.

The Signal Carnival took Vera Vague, Jack Carson, Kay St. Germain and maestro Gordon Jenkins to March Field, and is planning other camp appearances.

Bergen and McCarthy kept right on

doing their bit for "General Morale" with a repeat show at March Field and programs from both the San Diego Naval and Marine bases. Bergen was closing his season at the Marine base June 29, and

already planning an opening fall show from March Field in September. The marines made Charlie McCarthy a sergeant major, making Charlie the only "soldier" in America holding ranks in two branches of service.

Both the radio star and the sponsor played big roles in the military programs. Stars often gave up personal comfort to cover hundreds of miles by train, bus and even army jeeps over bumpy, dusty roads. Jack Benny travelled so much one week end to put on camp shows at two posts that he exhausted himself and came down with the flu. And it was the sponsor who gladly footed the extra bills for transportation of cast and musicians and special line charges.

Whatever happens in the days to come you can be sure, mothers and dads, sisters and sweethearts, wives and brothers, that your boys today, with radio's help, can answer the old army question:

"Are we downhearted?" with a vociferous "NO!"

8 filets of beef, portions about $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. each
 Salt and pepper
 8 pieces of toast
 2 lbs. green telephone peas

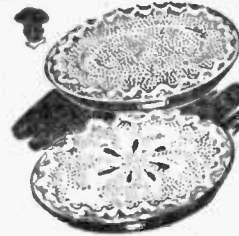

 She isn't strictly bookish in her letter of replies;
 But she's much at home, oh, very, when she takes the juicy berry
 And manipulates quite skillfully symposiums in pies."

LET US HAVE CAKE—The long and short of a shortening cake is that it should be light, tender, soft, moist, and delicate to the taste, and the secret of one rests largely in the way it is mixed. A dozen other things should be kept in mind, however, and these are: one, that soft wheat flours give the best results; two, that it is a good idea to sift the baking powder with the flour; three, that lard has a greater shortening power than other fats; four, that using fine granulated sugar will result in a cake that is more moist than one made with powdered sugar; five, that if you leave out an egg you should increase the baking powder by about half a teaspoon; six, that two whites or two yolks will sometimes take the place of one whole egg; seven, that you can use fruit juices in place of sweet milk; eight, that the shortening will usually cream better at room temperature; nine, that it will take ten to fifteen minutes more to bake the cake if you start it in a cold oven; ten, that the richer the cake, the more mixing it will require; eleven, that the pan should be filled from one-half to two-thirds full when you put in the batter; and twelve, that most cake recipes are created for altitudes up to three thousand feet. Above that the amount of sugar or shortening, or both, should be reduced.

* * * * *

THINGS TO REMEMBER—When an article of food is eliminated from the diet, it's a good idea to replace it with some others that give back some of the nutritive values deleted. When food is spilled in the refrigerator, no matter how little, it should be cleaned up at once to keep from affecting the freshness and odor of other foods. When storing fruits, like peaches, say, or pears, it is always better to spread them out instead of piling them up. Piling them up often causes them to collect moisture which results in decay. When making syrup for icing or fondant, it is always wise to cover the pan so that the steam can wash down what might stick to the sides.

- One cup of water

Take the flour and mix with water to make a smooth paste, but not too soft. Form into a square loaf and let it set for about 15 minutes. Roll out on floured board about one-half inch thick, and place in the center the butter well worked and flexible. Fold the edges of the paste over the butter and roll out about one quarter inch thick, taking care that the butter does not run out of the dough. Brush off the flour and fold in three. Roll out again to the same thickness as before and repeat the folding. Put in a cool place or icebox for about one half hour, then roll and fold as before. Again, rest for one half hour, and then roll and fold again. The paste will then have six turns in all, and after a little rest can be used.

4th of July Cake a la Mrs. Kok

- 1 1/4 cups good flour
- 1 1/4 tsps. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 4 tsps. sweet butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, Lynden Brand
- 7 tsps. rich milk
- 1/2 tsp. Maraschino Liqueur

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt four times. Cream butter and 1/2 cup sugar until fluffy. Then separate the eggs and add only the yolks to the butter mixture, beating with a rotary egg beater very thoroughly. Then add flour and the milk and beat until very smooth, add the Maraschino Liqueur, pour into a greased cake pan. Then beat the egg whites until foamy, add the other 1/2 cup of sugar, a little at a time. Beat until the mixture stands thick, spread on top of the cake and bake in oven at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Cool until you can remove from pan, serve with Signet Brand Fruit.

Sponge Cake a la Mrs. Beerling

- 1 cup Lynden Brand egg yolks
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 1/2 cups good flour
- 3 tsps. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsps. butter
- 3/4 cup boiling Bireley's orangeade

Beat Lynden egg yolks until very thick, adding sugar gradually. Sift flour with baking powder and salt 4 times and fold 1/3 of the flour mixture with egg yolks and sugar. - 1 1/2 cups egg whites Lynden Eggs
- 1 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. cold water

Sift and measure flour, resift five times, then sift sugar and cocoa together 4 times; beat the egg whites until frothy; add cream of tartar, vanilla and cold water, and beat until foamy but not thick. Add the sugar-cocoa mixture, and beat with rotary beater until the mixture has a shiny appearance. Fold in the flour. Pour into an ungreased angel food pan and bake at 275 degrees for 30 minutes. Then increase the heat to 325 degrees and bake for 40 minutes longer.

HAMBLÉN'S STALLIONS: Last week a Sierra mountaineer came into the flatlands of San Fernando Valley, natural artery into Los Angeles, and told a tale of seeing a wild stallion, in boulder-dodging gallop high in the mountains. To many a San Fernando resident the tale had a root eight years long, a root that had flowered a comedy of errors for Stuart Hamblén, ex-Texas rangeman, now a KFVB director of one of radio's most liked cowboy entertainment units.

In 1934, to Los Angeles Du Brock's riding academy, Hamblén brought 28 wild horses, captured in Arizona. At Du Brock's Hamblén staged a rodeo, an event in which human riders came out second best as one after another were bucktumbled from heaving "hurricane decks." Second night of the rodeo Hamblén's stallions leaped corral fences, galloped away into the night, leaving behind them minor destruction, sired eight lawsuits against music and song-making Hamblén.

In following days came complaints from Valley settlers. Among complaints: The stallions had invaded domesticated corrals, there had rendered many a thoroughbred mare enceinte, had close-cropped truck gardens, broken fences, frightened natives, damaged lawns and flower beds. Armed with a court order harassed Hamblén tried to rope one of the wild horses in the yard of a woman who had called police. Roped, the animal straightened out in a vicious run, trailing the rope. The rope tightened as the animal sped past the woman. She was thrown, fell, sustained a broken hip. In succeeding weeks the animals fled to highlands, were heard from but once since, and that last week, as Hamblén prepared to sing on his program: "Horses! Horses! Horses!"

YOUTH AND THEIR DRAMAS: One of the mainstays of Mutual's Los Angeles key station, KHJ, has been a program called "Dramas of Youth." The dramas are what their title implies—air-enactments of stories we loved as youngsters. Last week KHJ officials made a decision about the program. The decision: to start a four weeks series on early chapters of Dickens' "David Copperfield," the first time air dramatizations have been so

undertaken. Usually shows are complete in one airing.

Peter Rankin is to be starred as David Copperfield. New members are Irvine Lee and Bernice Skoor.

The idea for a dramatization of Dickens' book came when Marion Ward, originator of the Dramas, was alive. Peter wanted to do it then, before Marion passed on, asked 19-year-old Don Chapman to do something about it. Young Chapman has dramatized for radio the first seven chapters, which take David from his birth to where he enters Dr. Strong's school in Canterbury. All the famous characters are there in all their glory and no liberties have been taken with the text, except where it was literally necessary.

After Copperfield, the Dramas of Youth Company plans to start a series of Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island."

RADIO TO GOD: Those who passed by Hyperion boulevard and Tracy street in Los Angeles for the first time last week blinked their eyes, opened mouths and gaped at a strange but familiarly lined building that had come into being during past few months.

The structure, designed to represent the quarter-deck of an ocean liner, was a streamlined assembly featuring portholes, rails, decking, ship's bells and life preservers, extended 40 feet along the boulevard and back some 20 feet along Tracy street.

This was the house Paul Meyers built with income earned through years of piloting a Mutual program called "The Haven of Rest" into which at program scheduled times came to anchor a mythical vessel called "The Good Ship Grace."

Through those years the Good Ship Grace carried cargoes of spirituals, hymns, philosophies and oldtime religion dissertations by a self-confessed ex-drunkard—now widely known for reformed good deeds—Paul Meyers, to whom has come national recognition as "First Mate Bob" of the ship.

Land-placed, the Good Ship Grace is expressed in solid concrete, steel, wood-

work and accessories. More, it is also a broadcasting studio from which all future programs programmed by well-liked Meyers will come.



MASTERWORKS FOR MILLIONS: Tympanic jazz crashing through airplanes has discouraged many a Westerner from finding on his or her radio near-bedtime music to be a nightcap for the end of day.

Wise Westerners never have such trouble, have no such night despairs, for most of them tune to CBS' potent, far ranging KNX out of Hollywood at 10:30 p.m., from that station hear much that is familiar, always wanted, by music lovers.

Music In Wax

Symphony No. 2 in D Major by Jan Sibelius. Recorded by the Boston Symphony Orchestra, directed by Serge Koussevitzky.

WITHIN the scope of contemporary music there is perhaps no more eminent work than that of Jan Sibelius, a Finn whose efforts are universally accepted as being of the best of our time. Founded upon the folk melodies of Finland, Sibelius' work contains a wealth of technical detail and instrumentation coupled with unerring artistic taste.

Born in Tavastehus, Finland, December, 1865, young Sibelius was first intended for the study of law. In 1889 he went to Berlin to study composition as his musical leanings and accomplishments had come to the forefront. He studied as a pupil of Karl Goldmark in Vienna two years later. In 1893 he was appointed professor of composition at Helsingfors conservatory, where even his first works attracted general attention which resulted in his being voted, by the Helsingfors Senate, a liberal annuity allowing him to continue

his work. He came to the United States in 1914 to conduct some of his works at the twenty-eighth Norfolk Connecticut Festival. Subsequently he received the degree of Doctor of Music from Yale University.

Of Sibelius' work in general, it may be said that here is music not for the superficial hearer. Sibelius is profound, majestic. He is the exponent through music, of the culture and meaning of Finland. Jan Sibelius by his music, has united and made proud the people of his fatherland.

The D Major Symphony is called The Sibelius Pastoral. It was written in 1901-1902 and first played in Helsingfors (Helsinki).

The first movement, Allegretto, is the Finnish pastoral scene. The music is soft at first, a sudden crescendo creating a feeling of expectancy. Moving music, with full orchestra, which suddenly breaks, then moves on again.

The second movement, Tempo Andante, Ma Rubato, contains development of the patriotic. Here is the predominance of heavy chords, which is divided between the double-basses and 'cellos. Inclined to be melancholy, the tempo soon quickens building up to a resounding climax. Vivacissimo, in reality a scherzo, is the lighter side of Finland. Folkloreish in character, it contains vigorous, swift, free music. The fourth movement, Allegro Moderato, is triumphant. It is hope, the comfort of the nation. It is sweeping, overpowering music that is thrilling, exciting, and fascinating in every bar.
