The Need for Laughter

Accordingly, he became chairman of and organized a committee of Big Names in Radio to do their bit to provide laughter for The Boys in Uniform.

Already members in good standing of Bob's committee are the likes of Bing Crosby, Fibber McGee and Molly, Jack Benny, and Kay Kyser.

The operation of the committee is to involve each star's earmarking a given number of tickets for each broadcast for the use of uniformed members of the nation's armed forces. Hope himself is so earmarking 50 tickets, or about one-sixth of his studio audience, each week. The others are following suit in greater or lesser degree.

"We," concluded comic—but patriotic and sincere—Hope, "may have to black out our lights, but never," he concluded with Hopian genius, "our sense of humor."

And with these sentiments will all good men and true nod in assent.

The Beep

Whether or not listeners are supposed to notice the short, bell-like "beep" which has been preceding a few transcontinental broadcasts lately—they have noticed it, and thus far no explanation of it has been made over the air. Therefore, the explanation, here and now:

Most of the hundreds of assorted clocks in a radio station operate on electricity. Because of the drain on power lines due to the enormous amount of electricity used in the defense program throughout the country, electric clocks have fluctuated according to the amount of the drainage.

Clocks in Radio City, New York, have been running about five seconds slow, while in Chicago and St. Louis they've been about five seconds fast.

NBC is soon to spend about \$30,000 installing clocks which won't operate on electricity.

Meanwhile, the "beep" system gives stations along the network the necessary warning signal that the transcontinental broadcast is coming on the air.

Who's Maddest

War or no war, censorship or no

censorship, Radio these last few weeks has managed to tend pretty closely to its knitting, sticking to its own traditional policy of "not fostering hate".

Strictly on its own, for example, CBS denied the Fred Allen program the right to use "The Wookey", the war-play Edmund Gwenn is smash-successing on Broadway, because the dramatic punch in its radio version depends almost wholly upon bombing sound-effects for realism.

Also self-inspired is NBC's edict that spies in fiction are to be clearly identified as past tense, which means spy-fiction is acceptable only if it is as of the last war.

So far backwards, in fact, has Radio leaned in attempting to do the right thing that from some national advertisers has come the sarcastic query:

"Don't they (the networks) know the nation is at war?"

Ironical, for a fact, is the already vast discrepancy between Radio's self-imposed calm and the tone of the Navy Department's own recruiting slogans being aired now in the East. A few samples:

'Men, the time has come to kill and

kill with no regrets. The little yellow men of Japan have bombed and blasted American lives and property. Just revenge will follow. Join the Navy and do YOUR part'.

'Japan has rained death on American citizens. Japan MUST be smashed. The Navy needs pilots determined to crack this treacherous Nipponese aggressor'.

'Listen, America, we've got a job on our hands—the job of smashing a resolute and depraved Axis. Hitler's world vandalism must be smashed. Help the Navy do the job. Enlist today'.

Dazed, amazed, astounded at this discrepancy between what Radio does to prevent hysteria and what the Navy Dept. does to put hysteria to constructive uses in building civilian morale into naval personnel, producers of commercial programs have clamored at network executives' doors to get some revised estimate of how much recognition Radio may indeed make of the fact that the nation is at war. Only reply they have been able thus far to elicit:

"Program schedules must be kept clean of anything that might cause hysteria among the listeners."

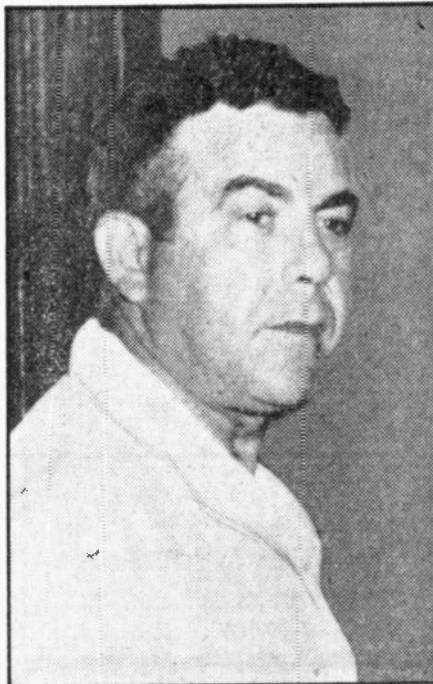
But It Can Stand

For weeks now, officials of the three networks, NBC, CBS, and MBS, have conferred, debated, harangued, postulated, weighed, reviewed, discussed, argued, considered, evaluated, analyzed,—and even talked over the designation of a weekly evening half-hour which the U. S. government might call its own on all three networks for the purpose of doing a regular, honest-to-goodness morale-building job. The inspiration that the networks pick out such a weekly period, convenient to all of them, came from the White House secretariat itself. The program, once settled, would be carried on all four networks, CBS, the Red, the Blue, and MBS—at just exactly the same time.

Out of all these miscellaneous palavers, there was forthcoming, indeed, the suggestion from CBS that the 9:30-10:00 p. m. Tuesday segment and the Saturday 10-10:30 p. m. spot be used for this patriotic purpose.

Curiously enough, the Tuesday suggestion didn't strike the NBC fancy for it is then that high-Crossley Fibber and Molly are aired (EST). Curiously, too, the Saturday night proposal failed to energize the Mutual Network into high glee because from 10:15 to 10:45 that night it airs its favored Spotlight Band series.

At week's end, it looked rather plainly like a Radio house divided

against itself, and from NBC's General Manager Frank Mullen came a proposition that the buck be passed directly back to the White House.

If the government would state, said the NBC executive-heavyweight, just what periods it "proposed to take over" and whether or not the "government proposed to underwrite that time," that is, pay for that time, a solution to the knotty problem might be much simpler.

Actually, it was a confession that since the commercial problems involved in such a simultaneous airing by all the networks were virtually insoluble, the Government ought, by all rights either to offer to reimburse the networks for any loss they might sustain, or to arbitrarily decide what period it wanted and arbitrarily decree, therefore, what network was to suffer the greatest loss.

Since no one can blame each network for looking out for its own commercial interests, and since the Government itself should judge just what air period it desires, it appeared at week's end that Manager Mullen's suggestion provided the only solution to an otherwise insoluble dilemma.

Actually, while Radio's house was pretty plainly divided against itself, it was divided only in protection of the good old American principle of private enterprise as opposed to Government control . . . for which Americans could hardly blame it. But all Radio wanted to know was what Government required. Once Government tells, the divided house will stand united again.

Television for Morale

The ways in which the nation's war-effort may speed or deter the growth of this or that branch of Radio are sometimes obscure and unpredictable. In some instances, shortages of vital materials is seen as an obstacle to, say, building of television receivers on a mass production basis.

On the other hand, if a plan proposed to high army officials this week is accepted, television will be used for building Army morale and in so doing will amass an invaluable backlog of broadcasting experience which can be put to excellent use at the end of the war.

The proposal is to purchase huge television receiving screens for each of the eight regular Army training camps within reach of television transmitters in the New York area. The total number of men thus to be reached is, of course, a military secret, but even a year ago that total was in excess of 100,000.

The television broadcasts would be used in two ways: as an entertainment vehicle, and to instruct trainees in the more intricate methods of military operations.

Strongest argument in favor of the project—of enormous value to all civilian listeners because of the added technical facility in television broadcasting which would ensue—is that, in terms of the number of men who could be thus simultaneously instructed and entertained, the plan

'Hams' Ban Off

First week of the War the government was forced absolutely to prohibit broadcasting by DX-ers, otherwise known as "hams"—the amateur radio craftsmen who have done so much for the growth of Radio and who habitually fill the air-waves with their scientific shop-talk. This week, however, hundreds of "hams" were being returned to the air—this time to perform specific services described by the FCC as "vital to national defense". Guess is that the "Hams" will be impressed into service for relaying of weather reports and other military and semi-military nature (in code, of course) for use of Army and Navy.

Opportunity Note

Skittering along in rather discouraged fashion the last few years, television has been one of science's most notoriously priorities-stricken, ailing offspring. This week, however, the American Television Society showed it knew a good opportunity for self-advancement when it saw one. In any case, opportunistic or not, the ATS' move definitely may have patriotic, that is defense-useful, possibilities:

Under sponsorship of the Society, a giant "television defense pool" of writing, acting and producing talent will be formed and will be made available gratis to television firms and war and defense programs for use as needed in developing defense programs on television stations. True, many are the lessons in civilian defense that could be taught much more aptly by virtue of a television picture. But true it is, too, that a major Act of Grace by the U. S. Government would be needed to increase the number of now extant television receivers (and transmitters) to such a volume as would make possible reaching a really big volume of listener-watchers with such programs.

At least, whether the prodigious Act of Grace is to be forthcoming or not, no one now can say that the ATS isn't willing and ready to do its bit—and to witness the miraculous hundred-fold enlargement of the

Lipton's Reverses Stand

Although due to go off the air as of the end of December, as announced in Radio Life last week, the "Helen Hayes Theater" will continue to be heard on CBS at least through January. Stunned, were motion picture big-names and listeners alike, to learn that Oboler's Radio demise had been occasioned by his undertaking script work for 20th Century-Fox Studios.

Hawk Left It, Baker Took It

... And Put Himself Into the Toughest Spot in His Career

of Emcees will not affect the pattern of the show, and the deep-dyed inside dope is that Phil Baker is certainly no amateur at audience-kidding.

He's been a leading figure in vaudeville, musical comedy, the fillums, and latterly Radio over the last 27 years. Once, in fact, he was exactly one-half of a pretty good vaudeville team entitled "Bernie and Baker." Bernie, who became the "Ol' Maestro," has done for himself not one whit better than has Phil.

In the last ten years, Baker has had three sponsors and has made everybody happy but himself. For throughout this decade Phil has always been associated with either his accordion or with his on and off-stage stooges, "Beetle" and "Bottle." Now for the first time Phil is getting to do what every showman most ardently craves—a "single."

Taking over the enormous following of the "Take It" embroglio—for which

to date Hawk is pretty generally given full credit—Phil now has the chance of a lifetime to win a secure place in Radio for the rest of his days.

On his opening broadcast, Dec. 28, Phil, albeit nervous and lacking his predecessor's flair for machine-gun tempo, at least demonstrated that he thoroughly understands the basic elements of audience appeal in the show enough to do an intelligent job of it.

The undercurrent of seriousness with which the contestant aspires for the sixty-four dollar reward must be minimized by the Emcee lest it carry over to the studio and at-home audiences, making a rather grim business out of the proceedings. By adding gaiety, quips, gags, puns to his efforts, the Emcee slackens the tension and wins approval on all sides.

To help the new Emcee make as many friends as possible, the questions asked on the first broadcast were far easier than they have been within memory of this correspondent, who has followed the show from its CBS inception. Invariably the sixty-four dollar (the last) question was of the dead give-away variety. Only one contestant failed to win the maximum largess, and before he left the field of battle he had Baker rather definitely on the spot.

Nervous as he was, Phil inadvertently allowed a slight note of what could be considered irony creep into his voice when he asked the customary question:

"Now, sir, do you want to keep the sixteen dollars or try for the thirty-two?"

The quizzee, a Mr. Tannenbaum of New York, a lawyer by profession,

FAME in Radio, apparently, is like Shicklegruber's boast that he'd have Christmas dinner in Moscow — it doesn't mean much, or last long.

At least a certified dozen radio-addicts in the last week, having heard Phil Baker's debut on "Take It Or Leave It," have stopped this correspondent to ask with baleful eyes, accusingly:

"And who's Phil Baker, anyway!?"

This, of course, poses for this correspondent a considerable problem. One simply cannot make reply to these disgruntled questioners that Phil Baker is the new Emcee of Eversharp's number one audience-participation show in the land—and leave it at that.

You know that your accusers' belligerent state is occasioned by their having heard the show and noticed that Bob Hawk is a part of it no more.

In most cases, however, we have noted that when mention is made of the accordion (which Phil no longer uses) and of "Beetle" and of "Bottle," a dim glimmer of recognition has softened the accusing gazes of our inquisitors. Thereafter they have seemed willing to go on their peaceful way, and let us go ours.

That, friends, indicates the extent of Bob Hawk's influence on the quiz show which he fathered since its CBS debut, April 21, 1940, and through the year 1941. What happened a few weeks ago was

that Bob decided he no longer wanted to perceive the kind of money Eversharp wanted to pay, and Eversharp decided they no longer wanted to perceive the kind of guy who wanted the kind of money Bob wanted. With irresistible logic, therefore, Hawk got himself a new show and Eversharp got themselves a new Emcee, Phil Baker.

But don't get us wrong. The switch

As Ransom Sherman in real life, he abhors discord (threw a maid out because she upset an otherwise serene household) . . . doesn't blow up if Mrs. Snerman keeps him waiting half an hour on the street corner (what good does it do to get mad and say things you'll both be sorry for?) is able to receive terrifically bad news and immediately block it out of his mind.

When he says he's lazy, he's just being different again . . . don't be misled by that "Hap Hazard" name. For two nights before rehearsal he was up until one o'clock . . . doing what? Oh, writing and re-writing his script.

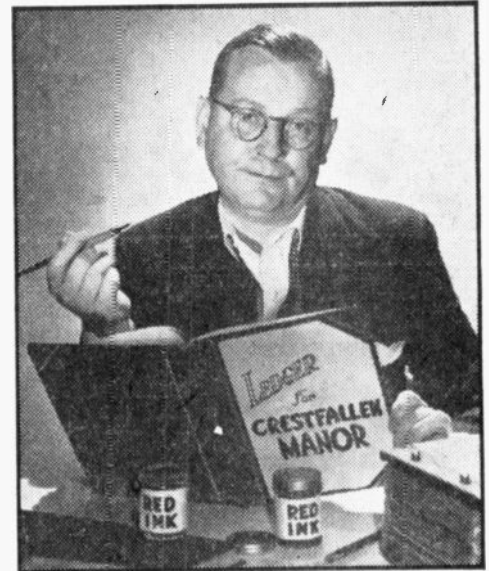

Whereupon, this palaver being accomplished, Phil opened the question, praying, not inaudibly, that the suspicious quizzee would come through and relieve the tension by answering it correctly:

"Who is the Speaker of the House of Representatives," asked Phil, and, after a moment of silence, added, "This will burn me up if you don't answer it." Sam Rayburn was the correct answer. . . .

But even after a much longer than customary period of grace the quizzee had to admit, sincerely, that he didn't know the correct answer.

Wherein Radio Writes A Fantastic Chapter In an Amazing Life

SELF-MADE, successful, perhaps a little cynical of the people and things that common folk still see through a gauze of glamor, Elsa Maxwell is phenomenally sincere in her new Radio chore for Ry-Krisp.

For a woman who is short and fat—and 58, she's done pretty well for herself . . . and means to prove to other women who are fat and over (or under) forty and not too gifted with good looks—that they too can make the world love them by the simple expedient of having themselves a good time.

The girl from Keokuk, Ia., has taken the world apart for herself and knows darned well what makes it tick. Radio listeners are to be the happy beneficiaries of her decision to re-live—strictly for their benefit—one of the most fantastic careers in this or any other generation.

Here today, in probably the last se-

quence, we have the Maxwell Story in its mellowest mood. Whether her program proves good Radio or not, only Elsa's as yet unproved adaptability to Radio technique will reveal. But for listeners who have the time for some between-the-lines listening, funny or not, Elsa's airings are recommended as a strictly Grade A study of life as Elsa Maxwell has lived it. And, remember, Elsa Maxwell knows how.

World's most famous party thrower, darling of erstwhile European royalty and of the socially "registered" today in America, super-protagonist of the universally acclaimed Maxwell tradition for perfection in food, music and floral decorations, Elsa these days of her genesis as a Big Name in Radio is now heard discussing these things—all these—and reducing, too.

Partnering her in this subtle Radio adaptation of her soiree-saga is Graham McNamee, glib tenor veteran of many a radio babble-bout—foil for Elsa's gags, stories, and, occasionally, guests.

Financing her is Ry-Krisp, makers of a food product useful to reducing devotees, according to Elsa, and there-

in lies, not too much submerged, the point.

For Elsa, darling of the world's most loose-pocketed epicures, is now declared as being fed up with looking like a Dall surrealist creation and will, therefore, check on her fight for a trimmer torso during each program, the beam-tipping to be accomplished on an official scale especially manufactured on order of NBC and operated by McNamee. Weighing in for her first hike to the mike last Friday, Jan. 2, at 190 pounds (gross), Elsa's subsequent mike meanderings under Ry-Krisp aegis are cannily calculated to make her an international (reducing) incident without benefit of convoy.

How long Elsa will be able to keep her faery figure while radio-remiscing over the less arduous days of her epicurean fame will, of course, remain a mystery until the very end. Ry-Krisp, for a sum, has challenged her to keep her figure slimmer. If Elsa can do it—and she certainly means to try—she'll bring much solace to many of her listeners—much joy to her sponsor, and insure the success of her program. If she fails, you can just write it down that the wraiths of sumptuous fetes of yore which she'll be re-living by radio simply proved too much for her.



Believe it or not, the mess sergeants of the entire Second Corps had to hail as the King of the Doughnut Makers, Private Earl L. Miller, a member of the Fort Hamilton Station Hospital Detachment.

According to Private Miller it's just a matter of getting the dough the right consistency, and then turning them over in the hot fat at the exact moment they have reached a crusty brown about half way through the hole.

DIABETIC DIETS

All of you have probably heard of specialized dietetics and considered it an interesting and very necessary realm of food study. But have any of you ever thought of it in connection with juvenile diabetes? As you know, diabetes is caused by an over abundance of sugar in the blood stream. It is a comparatively well known disease of adulthood, but among children it is of rarer occurrence.

Under such care these children respond exceptionally well. They lead happy lives, develop beautiful bodies, and their intelligence ratings show them to be mentally superior.

AN ODE TO COFFEE

In favor of that all-important item of every meal—the coffee—let us offer an explanation if not an apology. Too long has it been neglected! We all drink coffee. Some of it is strong enough to corrode the cup. Some of it is definitely on the anaemic side. But every now and again you find someone who can make the perfect cup of coffee. We found such a genius in a camp cook for a rancher. His recipe was simple enough and we pass it on

to you. It takes a handful of coffee for every man and one for the cook.

FROM THE MAIL BAG

Mrs. Virginia Shelley sends in this suggestion. We think it will be a very useful one. She tells us that when the budget is getting a bit strained around the end of the month she serves her family a special hamburger stew. And it sounds delicious:

Cut a small onion up fine. Also cut two or three potatoes in quarters. Cook the onion and potatoes until almost done. Then add the hamburger rolled in small balls and cook until done. Now thicken it with flour. The number of onions and potatoes to be used is dependent on the amount of hamburger.

Recipe for Leg Mutton, Caper Sauce

Put an 8 lb. leg of mutton in a pot. Cover with boiling water. Add 2 carrots, 2 leeks, 1 onion, 2 branches of celery and 2 tsps. of Gravy Master. Season with 2 tbsps. of salt and a dash of pepper, and boil for 1 hour or until the meat is nice and tender.

Caper Sauce: Melt 4 oz. of butter in a pan. Add 4 ozs. of flour and let blend together. Add 2 qts. of the stock from the lamb strained. Boil for 15 minutes, season with salt to taste. Bind with 1 egg yolk and a piece of butter. Strain and add ½ cup of capers.

Pork Sausage Cakes with Gravy and Green Peas

First, soak 4 slices of bread in water and squeeze well. Mix bread with 1 lb. of pork sausage meat, 1 egg, 1 small onion minced very fine. When all is well mixed, form into cakes and fry in four slices of Wilton's Oil Fashund bacon chopped very fine. Now when cakes are well brown, and done, take them from the pan. Blend 2 tsps. of flour in the drippings, and as soon as the flour and the fat is well blended, add 1 cup of hot water and stir. Then add 2 tsps. of Gravy Master, ½ tsp. of salt, ¼ tsp. of pepper, and stir all well until the gravy is nice and creamy. Sirs: To an acquaintance, we presented a pair of tickets to Art Baker's "All Aboard." Here is his reaction:

"Baker is a resourceful ad libber and makes an excellent MC for a program of this sort. When you hear the show on your loudspeaker it is good but after seeing the performance in the CBS studio it left a slightly sour taste.

"How come?" Well, when I arrived in the studio, the ushers shooed me into the balcony. Maybe they were balcony seats you gave me; I don't know. Anyhow, I saw the show from the front row upstairs, feeling all the time like the Little Man Who Wasn't There. For Baker is one of those actors who finds difficulty in seeing above the level of the orchestra chairs.

"I believe he did pick one candidate from the balcony for the twenty or more he tried out for the amateur cast he uses in the Quiz contest. But when he did, it was with some patronizing remark—'Oh yes, we mustn't forget the balcony.' So far as the show was concerned, all of Baker's clowning and all of his bids for applause—when he wasn't talking into the mike—were directed toward the downstairs audience. You got definitely the feeling of caste in the house. There were the white collar folks down in the orchestra seats—and you up there in Nigger Heaven.

"The way the CBS studios are arranged, anyone on the stage has to look up to address the balcony, whereas he can look down in speaking to the audience in the orchestra chairs. It takes a really broad gauge individual to look up when speaking—remember how Chaplin brings this out in the 'Great Dictator' in the scene where as Dictator Heinkel he maneuvers to get Napolini Oakie seated so he can talk down at him?

"Small time actors usually prefer to look down at the audience. The great men and women of the stage—when they do look or speak directly toward the audience—have a way of sweeping the whole house with their eyes so as to include everyone from orchestra, right up to the top row in the gallery."

Since the outbreak of the war, when Station KNX inaugurated a 24-hour schedule, the finest in classical and popular music has been broadcast for KNX listeners during the early morning hours.

From 1:00 to 3:00 a. m. each morning classical music is featured. Such orchestras as the London Philharmonic, Columbia Broadcasting Symphony, New York Philharmonic, and Chicago Symphony Orchestra are heard during this period.

"The Grave Yard Jamboree" program is staged each morning from 3:00 to 4:30 a. m. This broadcast is in direct contrast to the preceding program with such orchestras as Benny Goodman, Gene Krupa, Xavier Cugat, Claude Thornhill, and Eddy Duchin being featured.

The programs are written and produced by Donald Sanford, head of the KNX Transcription Department.

is utterly undaunted by her inexperience with radio technique. Most of her blase, wading-right-in attitude toward life stems from advice given her on his deathbed by her father.

He had, before passing on to his reward, explained to Elsa his rule for living—and told her what her rule must be. She had neither money, nor name nor beauty, he told her, and therefore she had to invent her own ways and means of finding her assets and making her way in this uncaring world.

Her whole life's history is colorful proof of how vividly and directly she followed his advice.

Her first attempt at making her own way as of Maxwell pere's doctrines was by bluffing a Shakespeare repertory company into yielding her the part of the nurse in "Romeo and Juliet" by claiming financial bulk no less formidable than her personal considerableness—and offering to finance the company. Her true fiscal condition established, Elsa was ousted without a trace, and managed to reach New York with \$3.00 in cash.

Being something of a piano player by the standards of the 1906 era, Elsa promptly got a job pounding the ivories in a nickelodeon and therewith embarked upon her song-writing career. Her first, "The Sum of Life," brought the sum of ten dollars from an unusually generous publisher of the pre-Big-Music-Business days.

It was Marie Doro, then a stage notable and later one of the first great heart-throbs of the silent pictures, who was to provide the turning point in Elsa's life. She yanked Elsa out of the Nickelodeon and on tour with her play, "The Richest Girl," and later, from London, summoned Elsa for her first trip to Europe to do a part in another Doro play.

Arriving in London full of shiny, newly-burgeoning hopes for a theatrical career, Elsa found that Miss Doro had departed London, without explanation, and address unknown. Whereupon Elsa proceeded to starve as gracefully and in the very best manner possible.
