Top Entertainment

If two of the special broadcasts heard last week over U. S. radio lanes (both originating in Hollywood) are a fair criterion—and Radio Life believes they are—the kilocycle fan is in for the biggest helping of top entertainment ever seen or heard along ether avenue. And for the duration.

Two perfect examples of the trend toward all-star productions being created for definite purposes in connection with America's war effort were two star-studded shows aired out of the radio capital in the last fortnight.

One was a half-hour show produced by the Motion Picture Industry to inaugurate the sale of War Bonds and Stamps in U. S. motion picture theatres. Broadcast from KHJ's studios, and aired to the nation via Mutual airplanes, the program—"It's Box Office"—had Edward Arnold as emcee, Meredith Willson as the musical conductor, Red Skelton, Rise Stevens, Marjorie Main, Harriet Hilliard, Irene Manning, Lee Sweetland, Max Terr's Singing Ensemble and the voice of Carey Wilson.

Despite Mr. Arnold's repeated difficulty in reading his lines, the program, as produced by Bill Bacher, was a good show. It wasn't a great program, because it was pretty heavy with dialogue about how movie fans were going to pitch in at their favorite theatres to help swell Uncle Sam's drive for funds to whp the Axis, but it had almost sensational moments. Especially when Carey Wilson, the effective and familiar voice of many M-G-M short subjects, narrated a dynamic sketch written by Sam Moore and Phil Rapp called "Was It In Vain?" (In fairness to Edward Arnold, it must be said that this great American has been working night and day, doing far more than his share in the war effort, with the result that his work on the air in recent weeks has not been in line with his usual fine performances.)

The other special broadcast which gave listeners a taste of the excellent entertainment they can expect as these specially prepared broadcasts for the war effort become more and more frequent, was the hour-long salute on Saturday, May 30, to the U. S. O. from Hollywood's Radio City via NBC-KFI.

Highlight of this broadcast was the rare air appearance of Don Ameche

who acted as master of ceremonies over a cast of big names which included Mary Martin, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Bob Burns, Lana Turner, Fanny Brice and Hanley Stafford. Meredith Willson again directed his orchestra with special chorus numbers by Max Terr's group. And Spike Jones, the scintillating drummer-man in John Scott Trotter's orchestra, almost broke up the show with a novelty number by his City Slickers.

Treasury Shows

The summer months, which usually lag for rabid radio dialers due to the lack of entertainment fare, this year will be packed with all kinds of special shows. And responsible for many of them will be the Treasury Department which is now recording some 20 special quarter-hour programs for immediate release over the air.

In Hollywood every day now the greatest stars of radio, screen and stage are engaged in making these programs. Here are examples of the type of shows you can expect to hear soon:

● Lionel Barrymore in a modern version of "Scrooge," aided by Fredric March as narrator.

● Walter Pidgeon and Fredric March co-starred in a play called "A Lesson in Japanese."

● Modernized version of Joan of Arc, with Bette Davis in the starring role. Other air plays include, "Two Way Passage," "Return to Berchtesgaden," "Paris Incident," "Story of Johnny Castle," the boy who refused to fight; H. S. Kraft's "Letter From a Red Army Officer to His American Friend," and "Russian Children in the War."

● Other talent now being set for special programs in the Treasury Department series includes Fanny Brice, Amos 'n' Andy, Fibber McGee and Molly, Bob Burns, and Burns and Allen.

Two New Series

The first of a series of weekly half-hour programs to be heard through the summer in the time spot (4 p. m.) formerly occupied each Sunday by Jack Benny on NBC was heard last Sunday when the entire cast of Post Toasties Time (name of Maxwell

House Time during summer) premiered the new series of programs.

Each week, NBC will present a different top-program-rating show in the Jack Benny time spot, and will continue this series for 17 weeks under the title of "Victory Parade." Beginning July 20 CBS will clear a special half-hour for the same type of program setup under the tag, "Victory Theatre."

Directed by Nat Wolff, Pacific Coast representative of the Office of Facts and Figures in Washington, the programs will stress special war messages and advise the people of the progress of the war and steps necessary to ultimate Victory.

All stars, writers, directors and network time is being contributed to the Government.

Frank Morgan & Co., which teed off the NBC series last Sunday in brilliant fashion, will be followed on successive Sundays by the following shows: Mr. District Attorney, June 14; The Aldrich Family (June 21 or 28); Jack Benny, The Great Gildersleeve, Burns and Allen, Kay Kyser, Fibber McGee and Molly, Bob Hope, Rudy Vallee and others.

CBS is making available the Monday 6 p. m. spot usually occupied by the Lux Radio Theatre. Lux, Fred Allen, Screen Guild Theatre, The Hit Parade, and others will be heard in this special series.

Cinderella Girl

When you hear Arnold Maguire introduce a young singer, Mary Jane MacConnell, on the air over "Tune Out Time" Saturday night, June 20, have this story beside you at your radio loudspeaker. Knowing these things about Mary Jane will add to the pleasure you will get when you hear her voice.

Mary Jane is 21 years old, and lovely to look at. She is brunette in coloring, and as you can readily see by the photograph in the lower left hand column of this page, boasts twinkling, friendly eyes and a vivacious personality.

Radio Life's editor first met Mary Jane a week ago at one of the regular auditions Writer-Emcee-Producer Maguire stages each Tuesday night for those aspiring young performers who seek an opportunity to appear on "Tune Out Time." We sat in the studio monitor booth as Mary Jane's mother wheeled her out to a microphone beside Bob Mitchell's grand piano. With no signs of nervousness, despite the fact that hundreds of people sat in the studio theatre watching the auditions, Mary Jane leaned forward in her wheel chair and sang "Yours" into the microphone. Arnold Maguire needed to hear but one song from this young lady. She possessed genuine talent, and so we were invited backstage by the Blue Network publicity chief, Milton Samuel, to meet Mary Jane as she was informed of her selection as a performer on "Tune Out Time."

Mary Jane told us that she was thrilled to know she would get a

chance to sing on the radio for the first time on "Tune Out Time."

"You know, since Mary Jane was a little girl of nine and became afflicted with infantile paralysis she has prayed for two things," said Mary Jane's mother as we sat down beside her. "One was to walk like other girls and the other was to sing on the radio."

"Some 18 months ago when mother brought me to California from our Arizona home so that I might live at the Milton Berry Foundation and have a chance to correct my paralysis I saw the chance to attain one of those ambitions. And now I'm to get a chance to do the other," added Mary Jane.

Mary Jane told us that she had never taken vocal lessons, although she had studied piano for one year. "Who is your favorite orchestra leader?" we asked.

When she replied, "Cugat," we immediately headed for Studio G to fetch the famous Latin maestro who by happy coincidence was preparing to broadcast his "Rhumba Revue." Cugat arranged a front row seat for Mary Jane so that she might enjoy the broadcast, and later when he discovered that our young heroine was an aspiring singer he invited her to return to the studio the following week for an audition with his own orchestra!

That's Radio Life's Cinderella story of the week. And one that has our blessing for a happy ending.

Memory Lingers On

All that was earthly of John Barrymore had passed on last week, but the memories of the spectacular, world-acclaimed entertainment figure who had helped Rudy Vallee's Blue Network program attain a high nationwide rating among the top radio broadcasts still lingered on among the people who worked with him in Hollywood.

In the halls of Radio City last week the friends and associates of the late John Barrymore continued to recall the intimate little quips that so greatly enhanced the actor's reputation as a man of truly rapier wit.

Someone recalled during rehearsals for the Vallee show that a friend had asked Barrymore what he thought of radio recently. "What do I think of radio?" answered Barrymore. "What does a chorus girl think of a rich banker?"

Jester's cap aside, however, Barrymore really grew to love working at the microphone. He claimed it challenged his best efforts because it was always cold and unresponsive.

"It's like making love to an old maid," he would say. "You try all the harder when she doesn't respond."

The famous Barrymore wit, keen and sophisticated and biting as it was, covered a tolerant, generous and almost childlike nature. When the Blue Network asked an associate whether Barrymore would consider riding in a sleigh with Santa Claus

in the annual parade opening Santa Claus Lane on Hollywood boulevard during the 1940 Christmas season, the associate snickered. "Ask him yourself," he said. "I wouldn't dare."

Barrymore accepted the idea with glee. "Ride with Santa Claus?" he laughed. "Delighted. I always thought Santa Claus was a ham. Now I can find out."

To Barrymore, Shakespeare was a sort of Paul Bunyan of letters, but a very human Paul Bunyan with many faults and many virtues. Barrymore once held an audience of Shakespearean scholars spellbound as he dished up a lecture on Shakespeare after a streamlined Shakespeare series over NBC.

Barrymore talked to the scholars, gathered from colleges and universities all over the nation for a seminar at U. S. C., for more than an hour. When he finished, they demanded an encore. It was the first time, the scholars admitted, that they had ever felt Shakespeare alive and standing before them.

Dix Scores Again

Each year the cast of Edward G. Robinson's CBStarrer, "Big Town," takes a poll to determine the best "kid" actor who has appeared on the show during the season.

After the results had been tabulated for the 1942 winner last weekend, a young fellow by the name of Dix Davis had run away with top honors and the seat of honor at an ice cream party in Brittingham's restaurant at Columbia Square.

Dix won handily over such fine young actors as Tommy Cook, Dickey Meyer, Gloria McMillan and Judy Ford.

Dix was so busy bicycling from one studio to the other last week that he barely had time to sit down for his helping of ice cream. The likeable 13-year-old actor, who first won attention from the radio public with his "Belly Laugh Barton" characterizations on Jack Benny's program, appeared on the following shows last week: Ransom Sherman, Bob Burns, Maxwell House, Jack Benny, One Man's Family, and Secret Legion.

He will add another role to his credit this summer when he handles a part on "A Date With Judy" on NBC airlines.

Backstage Dialogue

If you are not in the habit of listening to conversation by radio stars and have often wondered what the broadcast performers talk about backstage in the studios, Radio Life's editor tunes you in on a little exclusive off-the-cuff dialogue at Columbia Square.

A group of servicemen, as is customary at the conclusion of each Arkansas Traveler program at CBS-KNX, are chattering with Bob Burns. One young marine, shyer than the others in the group, attracts the eye of the Traveler star who himself served as a Marine in World War I.

James' Gesture

adium and in the recording and movie studios, decided that his musicians were entitled to a little extra dividend. So after the broadcast he presented each member of his orchestra with a \$25 War Bond for their participation in the special show.

On a recent broadcast of his well-prepared, crisply-read "Clete Roberts Reports", the Blue commentator said:

"I expect the Japanese to strike the first blow in the Far North. The Japanese will know what they are doing when they attack, and I think they will attack soon. Before our time for retribution comes, Dutch Harbor and the Alaska highway will have to play their part as weapons of defense."

● **Fan Letter of the Week: From an American soldier in Iceland last week to Boris (Bogey Man) Karloff, every-other-week-star of the Blue Network's "Inner Sanctum Mystery" series came these words: "Just heard your program. It gave me the shivers."**

● **Triple Threater of the Week: Arnold Maguire, writer and director of "Tune Out Time" since its inception on the Blue Network last February 14, is now also the master of ceremonies for the show, succeeding Willard (Doc) Hall. We watched the one-time star of such successes as the old "Blue Monday Jamboree" and "Hodge Podge Lodge" in San Francisco, stage his regular Tuesday night auditions in Studio B of Hollywood's Radio City the other night, and came away from three hours of continuous auditioning of amateur performers amazed at the diplomacy exercised from the control room by Maguire. From three years of age to 43 the would-be professional radio stars stepped to a mike in front of Bob Mitchell's piano to display their talents. We were impressed by the way Triple Threater Maguire handled his auditions. He gave everyone in the studio an opportunity to "sell" his or her wares. For each person he had a kind word. And never—no matter how bad the performance was—did Maguire ever lose his patience. And out of the maze of untried singers, dancers, actors and actresses who paraded by his microphone Tuesday night, this fellow Maguire will bob up on Saturday night with a sparkling, easy-to-listen-to "Tune Out Time."**

● **Composer of the Week: Meredith Willson. The likeable, 40-year-old maestro of the Maxwell House coffee show over NBC Tuesday nights, has turned himself into a one-man musical assembly line for patriotic war songs to inspire all America. Last week Meredith turned out a stirring melody titled "Song of Steel," which he wrote overnight at the request of the steel makers of the nation. This made it an even dozen war-effort songs which Meredith has composed since December 7th. Others are: "Remember Hawaii," "America Calling," "The Call of the Free," "Wings on High," "Liberty Bell," "Jervis Bay," "Keep 'em Rolling Over the Highway," "Gang Way" and "Bicycle Waltz," and "Three Blind Mice" (Hitler, Mussolini, Hirohito). This latter tune was used by Arch Oboler on his Plays for Americans last Sunday.**

When we asked Composer-Conductor Willson if he planned to write any songs in the romantic vein like his recent Hit Parade success, "You and I," he said that he didn't think so, at least for the duration. "I want to spend every free moment I have to ridicule the enemy and inspire the United Nations by words and music. The romantic songs will have to come after Victory has been won," were Willson's own words. Thus far "America Calling," which Meredith wrote in collaboration with Louis K. Sidney, appears to be the best bet for popular acclaim.

● **Song of the Week: "Sleepy Lagoon." Written by Eric Coates, young English composer, 10 years ago and published in the British Isles as a piano solo, tune recently had words written for it by Jack Lawrence, New York lyricist. Before Harry James, the orchestra sensation of the season, made a dance arrangement of the**

song, it was known only as a fine semi-classical recording played on wax by the London Philharmonic orchestra. On Vick Knight's most recent edition of "Command Performance, U. S. A.," (recorded at CBS last week and short-waved to U. S. fighting forces all over the world) James answered a request for the tune from an American soldier on a tiny Pacific isle.

● **Recommendation of the Week: Dear Mary Astor: We recommend for consideration on your swell "Hollywood Showcase" program the baritone talents of one Paul Neighbors who is scoring a spectacular success at Harry Arnheim's Hollywood Tropics. This fellow apparently is so close to the studios that he goes unnoticed except for the general public which is flocking to the Vine St. room in droves.**

● **Forecast of the Week: Bob Garred, KNX-CBS newscaster, stopped us midway through Columbia Square's lobby the other day to say that after reading some of the wild, extravagant Jap claims of victories on the war front in recent weeks he expects any day to hear an Oriental communique something like this: "An intrepid Japanese submarine commander, against great odds, unerringly sent a torpedo crashing into the United States Pacific Coast today, sinking three states west of the Rocky Mountains and damaging others farther inland."**

● **Sight of the Week: Mrs. Bergen's boy, Edgar, arrived at NBC's Radio City parking lot last Sunday in a bright yellow reconditioned Stanley Steamer complete with four nearly new tires. Clad in a sky-blue sports jacket and white linen slacks, Charlie McCarthy's mirth-mate had no offers for the Stanley Steamer (which everyone knows gets about four miles to a gallon of gas), but plenty of bidders on the tires.**

● **Traveler of the Week: Eileen McClain, daughter of Jimmy McClain, the famous I. Q. of the airwaves, who at the tender age of two years and six months has traveled just short of 18,000 miles with her rambling father and mother who skip from city to city across the country for each broadcast of the "mental banker."**

● **Discovery of the Week: Get a load of that fellow Jack Owens with refreshing songs and patter via the Blue Network and KECA. He has an audience of loyal fans that would buy almost any product Jack would want to sell them. Jack is the same chap who wrote "Hut Sut" and other hit songs last year.**

How Smart Are The Quiz Kids?

A CHICAGO jurist was having trouble with his auto horn. He couldn't make it work. Neither could two attendants in the filling station where the legal servant had pulled in for aid. On the side-lines was a half-pint youngster, who, tired of watching the men struggle, stepped up and suggested a remedy. It worked.

"Youngsters these days are pretty bright," observed the appreciative jurist. "You're smart enough, son, to be a Quiz Kid!"

"Yup, I think so, too," chuckled the youngster as he strolled away.

One of the station attendants turned to the car owner. "You sure gave the right verdict that time, Judge. That bright young button is Jack Beckman—and he IS a 'Quiz Kid!'"

Since the "Quiz Kids" first went on the air June 28, 1940, they have become synonymous with shrewd brilliance. Each week a "board" of five amazing youngsters sits before Blue network microphones to answer unrehearsed questions on every conceivable subject. Three of the five appearing each week are declared winners on the basis of ability displayed and these are bidden to return the succeeding week to compete with two new contestants. The radio audience is invited to suggest names of likely children for the show, with stiff written and oral examinations determining which will take part.

Are the "Kids" smart? Well, they have given a mental trimming to none other than five faculty members of the University of Chicago, with a score of 275 to 140, and to an equal number of professors from the University of Michigan—score 420 to 390.

Ranging in age from eight to 15, the "Quiz Kids" unhorsed University of Chicago's Prof. James L. Cate, medieval history teacher and then a recipient of a \$1,000 award for excellence in teaching; Prof. Harry Everett, secretary of the math department and lecturer at Adler Planetarium; Mary B. Gilson, assistant professor of economics; Arthur Bovee, assistant professor in foreign languages; and Prof. Harvey B. Lemon of the psychology department.

Typical of the mental shellacking administered by the children was the spelling contest, in which Prof. Everett won 10 points for spelling "pteridophyte," but saw 20 points go to the "Kids" when Van Dyke Tiers spelled "eleemosynary" and "scopolamine."

Similarly at Ann Arbor, the "Quiz Kids" were victorious over three department heads, a sociology professor, and a visiting specialist. One of the department heads was Dr. Preston W. Slosson, expert in European history. The pay-off of the mental melee was the question on which all hands went down. It was to give the origin of the line: "The barber shop was

"Kids" and pros alike puzzled over this stickler and shook their heads dumbfoundedly. It seems that the line came from a book called "The Great Crusade and After"—authored by Dr. Slosson!

Richard was marking his 66th appearance on the program; Harve, his 22nd; Jack, his 50th; and Claude Brenner, 13, who was serving as emcee for the fourth time in the absence of Chief Quizzer Joe Kelly, was rounding out an even 100 times on the broadcast.

Gerard Darrow, who did not happen to rate the anniversary quiz, is the nine-year-old ornithology expert; Van Dyke Tiers, 14, is an outstanding authority on spelling, geography, and astronomy.

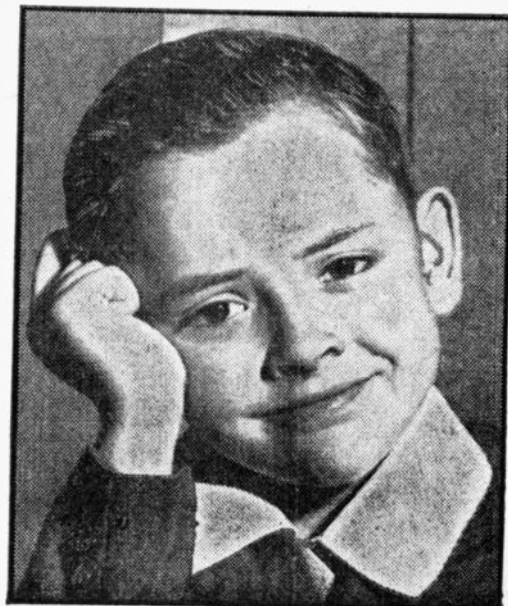
When Gerard was three years old, he could identify 300 birds. When he was four, he could tell the difference between a Parnassius and an Anosia plexippus. So it was a cinch for him the other day in school when the sound track for a stereopticon slide lecture broke down. Gerard proceeded to fill out the lecture in a manner

that his seventh and eighth grade compatriots voted was "better than the old sound track."

Friends of "Information Please" John Kieran kidded him mercilessly last year when Gerard reviewed Kieran's new book, "Nature Notes," in critical mood.

"When I saw who the book was by," said Gerard, "I thought it would be for adults only. I guess it's for both adults and children. Children around six could enjoy this book. It's pretty elementary. The only thing I found out that

Dyke Tiers says: "Give a child's curiosity full play and answer all his questions completely and correctly and he will easily and naturally acquire a vast fund of knowledge." That's the way he brought up Van Dyke. For example, as Baby Van played with his spoon, Mr. Tiers told him of its origin, how the silver was mined, how it was heated and shaped, and about other uses of silver and its manufacture.

When Van Dyke was three, he knew the names of the planets in their order from the sun, the geography of every country in the world, the states and their capitals. When he was four he could spell such words as "psychology," "Czechoslovakia," and "Cincinnati."

On a recent "Quiz Kids" session, he spelled, without a hitch, the following words: inoculate, embarrass, desiccate, rarefy, supersede, vilify, plaguy, picnicking, innuendo, and harass.

Not all the questions depend upon the contestant's memory for correct answer. On one of the "Quiz Kids" programs, 12-year-old Betty Swanson displayed trigger imagination. When asked to name an occupation at which a person could start at the top and work down, she snapped: "Flagpole painting."

Last Christmas the "Kids" wrote letters to Santa. Their startling acumen might lead one to think they would be beneath such procedure. Rather than being naive, they probably decided to capitalize on a golden opportunity.

Gerard asked for a pair of ice skates, a cowboy shirt with big checks, a red satin jockey shirt and hat, and a subscription to "National Geographic." Richard asked for a box of personal stationery and a box of mushrooms which he could eat all by himself. Van Dyke requested chemicals—tabulating a list a yard long and even including a pound of radium; Ruth Duskin, baby of the bunch, expressed a desire for a baby doll and a sewing basket.

Harvey Fischman indicated he was still a city slicker by telling St. Nick he wanted an electric train and an accordion. It was Harvey who betrayed a colossal lack of farm-life and bovine knowledge on a previous program. Questioned about bulls, he fumbled, then finally faltered. "I'm not sure whether or not bulls give milk."

*The answer, which Richard delivered correctly in three minutes, was solved by using the distance of the route as the hypotenuse of a right angled triangle—because the wind would keep the plane from following a direct line. Applying the old geometric infallible, that the square of the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares of the other two sides, Richard announced that the plane would win by four minutes, giving its occupants plenty of time to sing the song.

I didn't know was about how to make a feeding station for humming-birds.

The well-wishers were met by Gerard's dad: "Yeah, yeah,—we know! But please don't bother us about that now! One of Gerard's turtles has broken loose and we're tearing the place apart trying to find it!"

Richard Williams, the math expert on the "board," has one of the highest I. Q.'s ever tested by the University of Chicago, and could probably do high school work easily. But he is in the seventh grade with other 12-year-olds.

"He would be with children five or six years older if he were in high school," his parents explain, "and he wouldn't have any friends."

Here is a sample of a problem Richard solved in less than three minutes: An auto averages 95 m. p. h. and a plane flies 102 m. p. h. The starting line is 190 miles west of the finish line. If there is a north wind of 20.09 m. p. h., which arrives first, the driver of the plane or the car? And would the winner have time to sing "Nearer My God To Thee" before the loser arrived?*

One night after Richard had missed a simple problem on the show because he gave it a complicated interpretation, he arrived home and bumped into brother Glen. With a deflating bang, Glen put Richard in his place as "kid brother." "You got your permutations mixed up with your common sense that time, didn't you?" commented Glen.

people

In last week's issue of Radio Life, we described some of the hair-raising face-reddening incidents which throw zest into an announcer's life. Among our stories was the one about Buddy Twiss, NBC's Chief Announcer, who was sent into the Hollywood hills to cover a fire. Using his glib tongue to persuade a reluctant watchman, Twiss received permission to use the house-phone for his release. The mikeman, leaving a technician in charge, then struck out for the canyon where the brush fire was blazing. Returning late that same evening, Twiss entered the living room, which was in wild disorder. Pacing the floor between wires and equipment was the master of the house, whose ill-humor was evident. Twiss delivered a tremendous pep talk—told him what a wonderful thing radio was, how it was scooping everyone on this story. Silently, grimly, the man waited until Twiss had finished. Then he drew a card from his pocket.

TOOK ONE LOOK," mourns Twiss, "and prayed for the proverbial hole to swallow me up. The guy was publisher of the Herald Express!"

Not all the jokes have been at Twiss' expense. When Walt Disney was to receive the New York Motion Picture Critics' award, he was very disturbed over having to make an acceptance speech. He wrote a page of copy before the night of the award affair, which was going on the air. Then Disney virtually died a thousand deaths contemplating delivery of his speech.

"He'd get nervous," recalls Twiss, "then he'd swallow hard and wish to 'all-get-out' that the ordeal was over. On the program was a skit from 'Wuthering Heights.' It ran overtime and infringed on the Disney speech time. As the minutes ticked off, I went over to excited Disney, and suggested he leave out his first paragraph. The skit dragged on and we had Disney cut his last paragraph. His copy began to look like a censored letter.

"When Disney finally got to the microphone, there was only time left for him to say: 'Thank you very much! We had to run over to get that in'," chortles Buddy.

From a formal banquet to a bed in a swank San Francisco hotel is not such a leap that Twiss couldn't achieve it with facility. But if the bed is an interview spot and the person being interviewed is Leopold Stokowski, and if Twiss has to climb

bed with Stokowski to get his interview, that's something else again.

Very weary after a Philharmonic rehearsal, the famous conductor retreated to his suite at the St. Francis, where NBC was to put him on the air.

"I'm dreadfully tired," 'Stoky' told the radio men. "Do you mind if I slip between the covers and rest before we go on the air?"

Twiss and his engineers sat by sympathetically while the conductor climbed into bed. They lowered their voices to a whisper as Stokowski closed his eyes and drifted to sleep.

Broadcast time drew near.

"I couldn't go over to Stokowski, give him a shake, and say: 'Hey! Wake up! Get up! We gotta go on the air,'" shrugs Buddy as he tells the story.

"So I did the only thing there was to do. I climbed into bed with Stokowski, set the mike on his chest, and started the interview. He is such a wonderful ad-libber that the program went swell. I still have a record of that unusual interview."

Hank Weaver's most blood-sweating broadcast was when he interviewed a bunch of German diplomats leaving this country. The three Nazis sat sullenly in a back room of the local German consulate; their attorney stood guard at the door; and spread out for what ominous deductions Weaver cared to make from them, were maps of Norway, Denmark, and Sweden stuck full of little pins. (The following week-end Germany invaded Scandinavia). To complete the unlikely set-up for a satisfactory broadcast, the Germans wouldn't talk and when Hank, who couldn't speak German, threw out a leading question, the three took refuge in stolid smirks.

Hank is also the one who, in the heat of re-creating the Louis-Galento fight, became so agitated

that he said: "Galento charges, forcing Woowis to wetweat!"

Much like Bob Moss, who once announced: "We bwing you a twan-scription!"

Ken Carpenter's most difficult time to keep from laughing was when he signalled the studio attendant to bring him the hand chimes. That was in the day before the automatic bong. Approaching Carpenter, the boy tripped and fell flat. He had enough foresight, though, to protect the chimes as he went smack.

"There the kid lay on the floor," Ken relates, "with the chimes safely cradled in his arms. He looked up at me so foolishly, and yet so triumphantly, because not a sound had come out of the bells. I could hardly control my desire to howl."

Apparently a lot of monkey-shines transpires, while an announcer is doing his level best at the mike. In the old days, so they tell, free announcers used to gang up on a fellow giving the midnight resume before signing off the station. They'd whisper "You're a liar!" and "Taint so!" in his ear and sometimes went so far as to take off the poor guy's clothes. By the time he said "Goodnight" to his listening audience, he was standing stark naked in the studio.

A quaint custom which Sam Hayes, Engineer Art Brearley, and Announcer

MEETING Irene Rich the other day after many years. I said to her in a cracked voice, "I knew your mother a long, long time ago. You look very much like her."

To which Irene replied "I am her."
"You am her? is that grammar?" I had to stammer for lo and behold this Irene Rich was that Irene Rich. The passing years have apparently given her the by-pass, as we military men say nowadays; for she looked as young and beautiful as when I first met her.

Perhaps her last name should be witch, and she would certainly have been hanged for one if she had been living in Salem, Massachusetts in the seventeenth century. Maybe she was and has returned. Or she may have escaped from those who believed that after a girl has married once she should grow old promptly if not gracefully.

Irene believes that it is disgraceful to grow old and she seems to have some magic potion for keeping herself young, slender, and willowy.

I first met her in the days of the

silent pictures. She was a popular Hollywood screen star then, and continued in the pictures when they learned to talk. Next she talked herself into the radio and soon became one of its best known figures, as she still is. Her popularity is as perennial as her youthful beauty.

Her daughter, whom I knew as a child, has become a famous and brilliant sculptress and is now working in a defense industry. She is as old as her mother looks.

We had an exciting time trying to get photographed together with two other officers from the California State Guard, Major P. E. Warner and Lieutenant George H. Rhodine, for Irene had brought along her young police dog. He has all the temperament of a film juvenile and insisted on monopolizing the center of the picture.

The only thing that seemed to make him strike and hold a pose was to turn on a radio sound-effects machine with a record of a cat meowing that fascinated him so that he usually turned his back to the camera while he tried to solve the mystery of the hidden feline.

It is always difficult for me to hold a human expression long enough for a camera to catch it even with the quickest of exposures. A smile of mine wilts in the fifth of a second from pallid amusement to abject despair.

But serene Irene can hold a smile indefinitely, and why not? Life has been smiling at her ever since she was born. Whenever that was, I don't believe it.

BUNNY Berigan is dead. We don't know the details because we have only those few lines that were squeezed into back pages of the dailies. They called him a "swing band leader," a "jitterbug idol," etc. Few knew that he was one of the really great musicians of the day. Now that Bunny is gone and is on his way to becoming a legend we're not afraid to voice our opinion that he was the greatest of the white trumpet men of our day.

Sure, Harry James is good. In fact he's marvelous. He plays a fine hot style—when he feels like it—and he can play his version of the *Bee* so fast it's unbelievable. He plays sentimental trifles in a pleasing and highly marketable manner. He is the greatest showman in the music business and has sold himself and his band 100%.

But we are talking about important music. And we never heard Bunny put his horn to his lips that some important music didn't come out of it. He couldn't have played the *Bee* like Harry James does—and he wouldn't have been caught trying.

RADIO BACKGROUND

Bunny was a CBS staff musician in New York by the time Benny Goodman got around to "inventing" swing. Benny persuaded him to join his first band—the one that flopped all the way across the country to end up in an amazing and totally unexpected success at the old Palomar here in Los Angeles—remember?

But Bunny, like most of the really great ones, couldn't "stay put" in any band. He quit Benny at the end of that summer tour and went back to CBS in New York. We remember him well on those *Saturday Afternoon Swing Sessions* directed by Leith Stevens. It was on one of those programs that we first heard him do "I Can't Get Started."

Your reporter saw Bunny only a few months ago when he was brought here by Leith Stevens to record the trumpet solo passages for *Syncopation*, RKO's "great jazz epic." He looked thin and worn, but said he didn't "feel sick" when we queried him about it.

Many of you will see *Syncopation* and will notice that it advertises the "World's Greatest Jam Session"—the finale in which you see and hear Benny Goodman, Harry James, Jack Jenney, and a number of other widely known swingsters.

Bunny Berigan, who is heard—but not seen—all the way through the picture, didn't even get screen credit. Bunny recorded those solo passages that appear to be played by Jackie Cooper, Tod Duncan ("Reggie Tearbone") and Rex Stewart ("King Jef-

fers"). Especially interesting is the fact that when Bunny "dubbed" in the solos for Rex Stewart he was "dubbing" music for one of the greatest Negro cornet players.

When Stewart was engaged to enact the role of "King Jeffers" in *Syncopation* it was also planned to have him record the music for his own role. But by the time they got around to making the final sound-tracks for the picture Stewart was in the East with Ellington. So Bunny, who had been signed to do the music for Jackie Cooper and Tod Duncan, also drew the job of recording the music for the "King Jeffers" role that Stewart had played as an actor.

As few people who see *Syncopation* will know they are hearing Bunny Berigan we are pleased to pass along this information as our last tribute to a truly great musician.

BITS ABOUT BANDSMEN

Watch for a new Lucky Strike show to originate here on the Coast soon. Musical auditions were made last week by orchestras under Georgie Stoll, Lud Gluskin and Lyn Murray. Here's to the winner! . . . Whoever picks the songs for Lucky Strike's *Hit Parade* is in a hot spot. Latest beef came from the publishers of *Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree* because it was not included in the "10 leaders" on the May 5 show. Our private beef with this show is that they keep oldies on top too long instead of dropping them in favor of new, but bonafide, hits . . . Down Beat, the music mag, is editorially incensed because radio comedians make stooges and "dim-wits" out of band leaders, pointing the accusing finger specifically at Eddie Cantor, Jack Benny, Fred Allen, Burns & Allen and Red Skelton. Having known many bandleaders personally this department declines to comment.

AIR RAID Information

For the Benefit of Radio Life Readers

TREATMENT OF SHOCK

Authorities state that the largest percentage of casualties from Air Raids is due not to physical injuries but to shock. Bombs are equipped with special whistles to increase the demoralizing effect on nerves. Following is the recommended First Aid treatment for shock which can easily be administered by anyone:

1. Make the victim lie down.
2. Keep him warm. (Extra blankets should be available as part of household First Aid supplies.)
3. Give diluted aromatic spirits of ammonia, or hot tea or coffee. (Do not give alcoholic stimulants.)
4. Endeavor to calm and encourage the victim.

HANDLING OF BOMBS

1. Be equipped with shovel, bucket, and dry sand.
2. At sound of air raid warning, fill tubs with water (in case of broken mains.)
3. Keep hose attached to water outlet, coiled and ready for instant use.
4. If bombs are of high explosive type, LIE DOWN, preferably under table or heavy furniture. Stay AWAY from windows.
5. If gassed, wash thoroughly, bathe eyes and nose with baking soda solution.

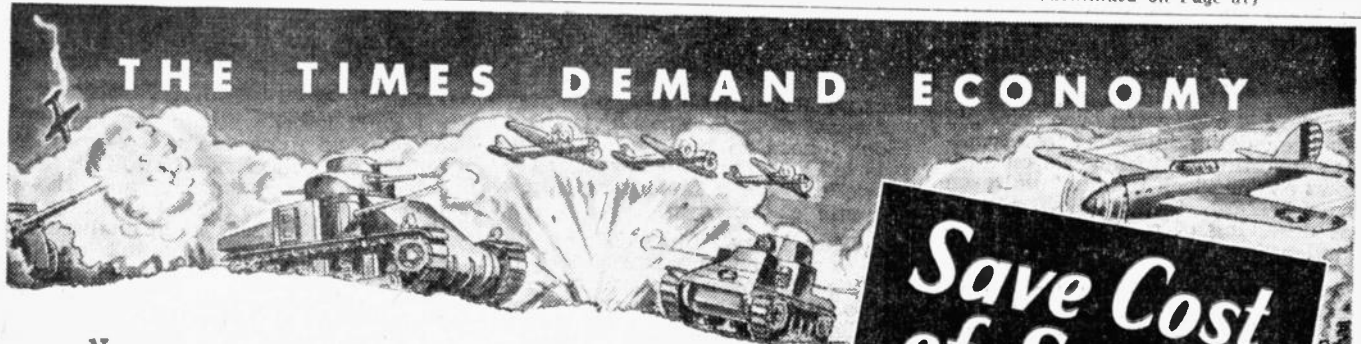

ONION-ITIS

Who doesn't like onions? They add that tangy flavor to so many of our foods or just eaten by themselves, they're very good. Of course most of us feel faintly apologetic about eating them, but to the rugged individualists who will eat onions and defiantly enjoy them, here are a few facts about their favorite vegetable.

Be sure you get firm onions with dry stems. If the stem is moist, it may be a sign of decay inside. Once you have tenderly carried your onions home, treat them with continued care. Put them in a dry, cool, dark place. Beware of using either the window sill or the cellar as a place of storage. Heat, moisture, or light makes onions sprout and start to decay.

As for the rest, just remember onions are a grand seasoning for stews, soups, stuffings, sauces, and salads. They are the making of many a dish, when used with respect.

BREAK-FAST

Breakfast literally means to break one's fast, and down in the blue grass country they do it charmingly by entertaining at breakfast. It's a custom that harks back to the days of the great plantations.

Company breakfast usually comes at a late hour. And by that time appetites are as keen as any cook could desire. Consequently there are so many good things to eat the dishes fairly overlap. The Southern idea of hospitality for the breakfast table states that none of the table cloth is supposed to show.

There is no service by courses, but

there seems to be a never ending stream of piping hot dishes arriving from the kitchen every other second.

A Northern guest who, counting for lapses of memory, jotted down this menu of a Southern breakfast he had enjoyed. Mind you, this is only a partial list. "Pork chops and fried apple rings, pan fried country cured ham, eggs from the nest any fashion ordered, home made light bread, 'quick-raisin' baking powder biscuits, home-churned butter, fresh apple-sauce, home made apple butter, fresh stewed cherries, currant, wild grape, and wild plum jelly, fresh damson plum jelly and cold fresh buttermilk. The tea and coffee were served in heirloom silver pots with monograms

out of American history that would sanctify and brew."

Recipe for Tenderoni al Pomodoro

| 3 lbs. tomatoes, peeled and chopped | 5 tablespoons oil |
| 2 sprigs sweet Basilico herb, chopped. | 3 packages Tenderoni |
| 1 large onion, chopped coarsely | 2 cups Parmesan cheese |
| ¼ pound butter | Salt and pepper |

Put to boil in a large pot, 4 quarts of water with 4 teaspoons of salt. When water is boiling rapidly put to cook the contents of 3 packages Tenderoni. Let cook until tender, 7 minutes. When done drain thoroughly in a colander. Mix the following sauce: Put 5 tablespoons oil in a saucpan with ¼ pound of butter; when hot, add the chopped onion, cook to a golden brown. Remove the onion from the pan and add the tomatoes, which have been peeled and chopped, the sweet Basilico herb and season with 1½ teaspoons salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until tomatoes are reduced to a pulp. Then rub through a sieve, replace in the saucpan, and when quite hot, pour it over the cooked Tenderoni with the rest of the melted butter and the Parmesan cheese. Bake in casserole at 300 degrees for 30 minutes.

- Baked White Sea Bass a la San Diego

Baked White Sea Bass a la San Diego With Rice

- 2 pounds sliced white sea bass
- 1 pound 12 ounce can solid pack tomatoes
- 3 cloves garlic
- 8 tablespoons oil
- ¼ teaspoon oregano or sage
- Salt and pepper

Wash sea bass slices in salted water, drain and place them in a shallow baking pan. Mash the tomatoes thoroughly. Cover the fish with the tomatoes, sprinkle the oregano or sage on top and the minced garlic. Pour the oil over the top and sprinkle with one teaspoon salt and one fourth teaspoon pepper. Put to bake in oven at 325 degrees for one hour, or until the fish is done. Serve with Budget pack Blue Rose Rice, boiled. Wash the rice three times and boil in 2 quarts of water with 2 teaspoons of salt in a large pot. When water boils put the washed and drained rice and cook until the rice is tender. Drain the rice well. Put it in a double boiler and keep rice hot until the fish is served.

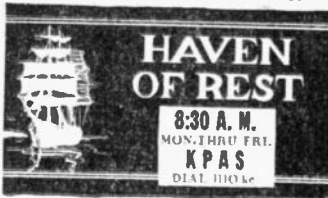
