#### Add Crosbyana

Bing Crosby's ad lib remarks in rehearsal of a Thursday at Kraft Music Hall are often so choice that they are incorporated into the script. All of them someday will make their way into somebody's choice volume of Crosbyana.

This was one we caught the other day when he tossed it at Lieut. Robert Buchan (pictured in June 28 Radio Life) who participated in the sinking of the Jap aircraft carrier, Ryukaku.

Invited Navy Cross Winner Lieutenant Buchan:

"Would you like to fly with me sometime?"

Replied the Groaner:

"Well, that's wonderful. But frankly, I get dizzy on half of a chorus of 'Skylark.'"

The only reason you heard it on the broadcast was that an "open" mike was on Crosby when he adlibbed the remark to his guest, Lieut. Buchan, during rehearsal. Producer Cal Kuhl, the Music Hall producing genius, heard Crosby's retort perfect quite by accident in the monitor booth and immediately ordered his script writer to incorporate the repartee in the program.

That'll give you a good idea of the informality that holds sway at Crosbytime of a Thursday at NBC. KFI, 6 p.m. Thursday at NBC.

#### Air Force's Radio

Although plans are not yet being made public in the general sense of the term, Radio Life learned last weekend that the West Coast Air Force Training Center at nearby Sanfa Ana is in the throes of completing one of the most complete broadcasting setups ever created by a branch of America's fighting arm.

Not only is a modern, well-equipped radio studio being built on the Santa Ana flying reservation, but many key radio personalities are being recruited for active duty as uniformed members of the Air Force Training Center radio staff. All of these men are being assigned to special duty as radio specialists in the public relations department.

Already in uniform at Santa Ana are such familiar radio names as Melville Ruick, long-time announcer of the Lux Theatre airshows; Eddie Dunstedter, famous CBS organist and composer; and Ben Gage, ex-announcer of the Ransom Sherman and Bob Hope programs. Slated to join this trio any day now is Hal Gibney of the NBC announcing staff.

Private Gage, who was transferred from Camp Haan several months ago, has already been heard in several special events broadcasts over the networks. Captain Ruick, who served in World War I as a flyer, recently performed a notable air stint on an Army Hour pickup from the Air Force Glider school at Indio where he interviewed cadets who are learning to operate Army gliders. Captain Dunstedter is responsible for the formation of a 35piece Army Air Force Band which will be heard on many future programs emanating from the Santa Ana base.

Tip-off to the calibre of broadcasts which one may expect to hear from Santa Ana in the days ahead was given July I when CBS aired an airshow titled "Soldiers With Wings" from the Air Force Center. Bing Crosby acted as master of ceremonies and all of the aforementioned men participated in the broadcast.

These Santa Ana-originating programs are to be part of a grand-scale recruiting campaign by which the Army Air Force expects to pay huge dividends in attracting young Americans to a career in the U. S. Army Air Force.

#### War-Inspired Music

Out of the globe-girdling conflict now raging there may come some of the greatest art contributions in the history of humankind, but probably none in the musical sphere will surpass the widely-heralded Seventh Symphony of Dmitri Shostakovitch, Russla's brilliant young composer, which will be given its first Western Hemisphere performance by the NBC Symphony Orchestra on July 19.

Only this last weekend did Niles Trammell, president of NBC, reveal to Radio Life the details surrounding the arrival in this country of the 36year-old Russian composer's sensational work.

Inspired by the Soviet repulse of Nazi hordes at the gates of Leningrad and rushed safely to the United States by airplane and motor car through enemy battlefronts, Shostakovich's Seventh Symphony is now being rehearsed by the NBC Symphony Or-

chestra, which, under the baton of Arturo Toscanini, will present the new work in its entirety from 1:15 to 3 p.m. on Sunday, July 19.

For several weeks now, Maestro Toscanini has been studying a preliminary copy of the score preparatory to the beginning of actual rehearsals. The four movements of the symphony, which has been given a subtitle— "The Music of Our Times"—cover 231 pages of music. However, including the separate instrumental parts, more than 3,000 different pages have been distributed to members of the NBC Symphony Orchestra.

The arrival of the Shostakovich score and parts in this country brought to light a thrilling story of how 35-millimeter microfilm prints were made of the Symphony before it was rushed via airplane from Kuibyshev to Teheran, Iran. An automobile whisked the valuable shipment to Cairo where the journey to U. S. soil was completed via Clipper.

According to NBC President Trammell, the acquisition of the Western Hemisphere premiere rights by the network was achieved through negotiations with Shostakovich and Voks (Society of Cultural Relations) immediately following the Moscow debut of the Seventh Symphony last March 29. Both the composer and the society readily agreed to grant the first radio performance to NBC "in order to cement closer cultural ties between the United States and Russia."

Musical observers have hailed the Seventh Symphony as setting into music the fight of freedom-loving people against Axis barbarism. The work is hailed as a living history, an eloquent sermon and a belligerent challenge to threatening and invading hordes.

It was Shostakovich, himself, who recently attributed the Seventh Symphony to "the events of 1941—war!"

"This does not mean," he declared in a recent Russian broadcast, "that it gives a naturalistic imitation of the war.

"My seventh symphony is devoted to the ordinary Soviet citizens who have become heroes of this patriotic war. That is the fundamental theme."

In telling how he came to write his brilliant new work, the young composer had the following to say under his byline in a recent article carried by the official newspaper, Pravda:

"The bloody Hitlerite hordes were pressing toward my native city (Leningrad) and it was bombarded from the air and shelled by enemy artillery. All Leningrad residents rallied as one man and, together with the valiant Red Army, vowed to stop the arrogant foe. It was in such days that I worked on the symphony. I worked long hours, intensely and swiftly. I wanted to create the story of our days, our life, our people, who are becoming heroes and victors, who fight for the cause of triumph over the enemy."

Dedicated by its composer to "our common struggle against Fascism, to our future victory, to my native city,

Leningrad," the Seventh Symphony lasts approximately 90 minutes, and is in four movements: Allegretto, Moderato Allegretto, Adagio, and Allegro Non Troppo.

It is interesting that this sensational new composition will be enhanced by the direction of the world's greatest conductor, Toscanini, who also was a victim of Fascist oppression.

#### Honors to Hughes

A fortnight ago in a little alcove off New Rochelle, N. Y., the original Chinese junk Amoy lay at its moorings. Aboard ship a festive crowd sat at a long dinner table heaped high with oriental delicacles. Diplomats, radio personalities and noted Chinese artists were numbered a mong those present.

Honor guest at the banquet table was a distinguished-looking, chunky, moustached young man of the microphone by the name of John B. Hughes, from Hollywood.

Occasion for the festive event was the desire of the Chinese government to pay a sincere tribute to Hughes, the Mutual news analyst and authority on Far Eastern affairs, for his long-standing friendship for the cause of the courageous peoples of China in their fight against the evil forces of Japan.

Hughes, on a tour of the nation's war industries, was presented with a famous Chinese painting by Dr. Tsune-Chi Yu, China's consul general in New York, as well as a scroll for his aid to the United China Relief campaign. Miss Lee Ya-Ching, one of China's most famous women flyers, is shown elsewhere on this page as she presented the scroll to Hughes.

#### **Bradley Weds**

One of Radio Life's favorite people, the golden-voiced Truman Bradley, walked the middle aisle last week in a smart simple church wedding with Phyllis Ruth, the film actress, after a romance that began more than a year ago here in Hollywood.

Announcer of the Red Skelton, Dinah Shore and Freddy Martin programs, Bradley and the diminutive young blonde actress have been keeping "steady company" for many months without indulging in the usual Hollywood fanfare of publicity.

Radio Life's roving reporter had the pleasure of watching this romance blossom in the Radio City studios this past season. Miss Ruth always accompanied the Skelton announcer to the program on Tuesday evening and watched the show from the sponsor's booth above the studio stage.

#### Repeat by Whiteman

It may have been done before but we can't recall when a public performance such as the recent Gershwin concert at the Los Angeles Philharmonic was ever given a "repeat" performance on the airlanes.

But then this has been a season for tradition-shattering incidents on the ether waves, and perhaps you weren't even a little surprised to dial NBC on July 4 at 5 p.m. to find an hour-long musical show that had so much earcaressing music that you couldn't tear yourself away from the loudspeaker in the living room.

Conducted by Paul Whiteman, the rotund, rosy-cheeked maestro who first focused the spotlight of fame on the now immortal Gershwin, the "Homage to Gershwin" was by far the finest musical program aired out of Hollywood this year.

Whiteman can still take bows as the King of Jazz after batoning that star-studded show. The Great Gershwin never heard a greater performance from Paul Whiteman than the one Mr. W. staged for the nation's ether fans last Saturday evening.

It is an almost impossible task to review a program as moving, as inspirational, and as packed with good listening values as "Homage to Gershwin."

Bing Crosby and Dinah Shore, blending their vocal shadings in selections from "Porgy and Bess," were sensational as they sang together for the first time on the air. Edward Arnold's reading of "A Eulogy to George Gershwin" was a fitting prelude to the musical program itself, and the King's Men, Buddy Weed, Whiteman's piano stylist, and Harry James were at their best on their respective treatments of Gershwin tunes.

The exceptional arrangements you heard on the show were contributed by such great musical minds as Felix Mills, Victor Young, Ferde Grofe, Ralph Hallenbeck, James Mundy, Gordon Jenkins and Marlin Skiles.

Dave Elton, astute NBC producer who rarely gets a fanfare from the public, was responsible for the superb, evenly-matched tempos of the show. Oh, yes, and that Gilbert Allen Choir will be heard of more often, in our opinion, after the job it did with smart backgrounds to the vocal solos.

#### Re Janet Blair

NBC's Hollywood press department —usually a stickler for details tripped last week when it mailed out a publicity release concerning the appearance of the Edgar Bergen troupe on the "Victory Parade" broadcast of July 5.

The publicity release said in part: "It is rumored that Charlie McCarthy postponed his air vacation by this one broadcast (having ended his regular series the week previous for Chase & Sanborn) in order to meet for the first time the comely Janet Blair, she of the terrific build-up, contours and Columbia picture contract."

Radio Life's editor does not take exception to the phrase, "she of the terrific build-up, contours, etc." but the line about McCarthy postponing his vacation so that he might meet Miss Blair for the first time is most incorrect.

Incorrect because Radio Life's roving reporter was on hand the last week in January, 1942, when the same aforementioned Janet Blair accom-

panied Edgar Bergen and Charles Mc-Carthy and Company on an overnight jaunt by rail to Stockton Field for a special broadcast for the men of the Air Corps. Little-publicized then and yet to be seen in a major film, the vivacious Miss Blair from Altoona, Pa., not only sang the Army Air Corps song on the broadcast, but she became without benefit of plebiscite the sweetheart of Stockton Field.

In Radio Life's issue of February 1, 1942, the "Angel from Altoona" appeared in several photographs which Radio Life shot during the trial of Sgt. McCarthy at Stockton Field. And if McCarthy's a gentleman he'll recall that Miss Blair's beauty unnerved him so that he kept knocking his hat off every time he'd turn around to steal a glance at the young starlet during rehearsals for the broadcast in the Stockton Field hangar. We can still remember Charlie losing his Air Corps hat for the third time, and yelling out: "You'll have to either get me a sharp tack and a hammer, boys, or get that beautiful creature out of me sight!"

#### **Red Goes Boom**

Radio Life's staff, having observed from a Johnny-On-the-Spot vantage point for the past few months the activities of one Red Skelton, was shocked but not surprised last week when the carrot-thatched comedian collapsed on his movie set and was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital.

Skelton, whose meteoric rise to popularity heights via the Raleigh cigarette show last season was one of the most exciting chapters in radio history, was suffering from nervous exhaustion, doctors said after sending the "I Dood It" star through an exhaustive checkup.

And no wonder. We can remember that amazing schedule of Red's at the studio with a Sunday night preview each week, a regular broacast each week-both of which he followed with knock-down-drag-out after-show entertainment, two and three army camp appearances a day for weeks on end, with very little rest. Why, it's a miracle how Red ever got through his radio series on two legs.

Radio-yes, and movies, too-adds up a man-killing pace in wartime. And we hope Red eases up a little this summer between pictures. For his own good and for the benefit of millions of listeners who are looking forward to, his new series in the fall.

#### **Realistic Edna May**

If Edna May Oliver has anything to say about it—and she gives out with the impression that she is a woman who knows her own mind—there'll be a goodly hunk of realism in the "Pri-vate Life of Josephine Tuttle" on NBC airlanes this summer.

The famous dead-pan character actress who gave a swell account of herself on broadcast No. 1 July 5 is more than a realist. She's a superrealist.

Posing for a series of pictures for Radio Life last week, Miss Oliver flatly refused to take her eyes off the script in one of the photographs.

"But Miss Oliver," remonstrated our photographer, "the picture won't show your eyes."

Miss Oliver's retort was worthy of Josephine Tuttle.

"What's the difference," she said. "The picture wouldn't look real. How could I read the script and look at you?" KFI, 8:30 p.m. Sun.

#### Macs in the Hall


All through prep school and during two years at the University of Texas, Lew participated in campus dramas. And then he took a fling at crooning.



Bushman, Nan Grey, Richard Cromwell, Ann Todd, Virginia Sale, etc., go through their paces on the first "Those We Love" script-rehearsal, Woods was over in a corner of the studio with a batch of maps strewn out in front of him. He was entirely oblivious to all going on about him as the producer was not yet ready for him to read lines, and he was entirely oblivious to all that was going on about him in the studio, as he leaned over the maps making notations here and there and checking certain areas off with a list he had in front of him.

How do you clear up a mystery like that without disturbing the subject? Well, usually there's somebody around who can tell you what's what. In this case the intelligent manabout-the-studio proved to be Carroll Nye, one-time screen idol and former radio newscaster. Now a one-man office of facts and figures on leading radio shows at the Young and Rubicam Agency in Hollywood, Nye explained that Woods is West Los Angeles' leading air raid warden. A young man who takes his responsibilities seriously, Actor Woods was charting out his area for the force of 750 men and 400 women volunteers he has working under him in the Westwood area.

"Step Down!"

"Crime Doctor," the CBS program that made the phrase, "Step down!" a national catch-line, set the tempo of its 100th program milestone last week to the "tramp, tramp, tramp, tramp" of criminals coming up for parole... and while a "jury" of 12 persons selected from the studio audience was acting as a parole board for the case of a prisoner whose career in crime was being dramatized, we thumbed through our little black book in search of some interesting statistics on the series.

These are a few facts and figures on the program which might prove interesting to Radio Life readers who have followed the series:

• Only six juries of the 200 who have handed down their decisions on the show have been unanimous in their decision. (Two juries are chosen each Sunday night as the program gives a repeat performance for the West Coast, which accounts for the 200 juries who have served.) 136 have voted for acquittal, while 64 have sent the culprits back to jail.

• On 22 occasions, the findings of those judging the early show's dramatization of the case of a criminal, have disagreed with those on the later session. Script and cast are identical at each broadcast.

• Women jurors invariably vote for the release of a handsome male prisoner, while men do the same when such pretty actresses as Barbara Weeks or Elspeth Eric tell their sordid stories.

• Max Marcin, author of the dramatizations, and Jack Johnstone, the program's director, recently decided to try an experiment in the interest of parole experimentation. They instructed Paul Stewart, who was acquitted 7-7 on the first show, to get really nasty during his second performance. He did, and wound up with an 8-4 verdict—for acquittal.



The Blue Network has sandwiched Brooks and his extremely clever vehicle into the 6:30 p.m. spot as a feature of its two-hour-long Tuesday night mystery extravaganza, and boy, the excitement Author-Actor Brooks poured into the airlanes from his first two scripts is enough to make this reporter predict that after listening to "Mr. Sand" nobody will care if Orson Welles never returns to the air.

 Keep wondering about Bert Silen, the NBC radio war reporter whom we reported as "missing" several columns ago. And thinking of Silen and the radio war correspondents reminds me of a story NBCommentator Alex Dreier tells of one of Hitler's lesser stooges who gave American correspondents a few bright moments one afternoon last year. Seems that Adolf's stooge's job was to leap to his feet at odd times during the dictator's speeches, scream "Thank God for our Fuehrer," and then sit down. He bobbed up so often, and in so many different places, that the Americans came to recognize him and took to calling him "Joe" among themselves. According to Dreier, the day of an important speech came and the correspondents filed into the press gallery where they were to take notes on the speech before broadcasting. HE MOST surprised person in Hollywood over the success of Dennis Day is Eugene D. McNulty.

Who is Eugene D. McNulty? Well, he's Dennis Day. And if that sounds confusing to you, my dear clients, relax while you peruse these paragraphs, for our young hero, Eugene D. Mc-Nulty-I mean Dennis Day-is not a confusing young man except for being continually surprised at the way you have taken him to your hearts.

This is somewhat of an open letter to the readers of Radio Life who from time to time have requested an article on the popular young Irish tenor who has been scoring a potent double for the past three seasons on Jack Benny's NBC sortie for Jell-O.

By a "potent double" we, of course, refer to Denny's (that's what his friends call him) singing and acting stint on the Benny sabbath Bronx cheer to Fred Allen.

Dennis Day, the Pride of the Mc-Nultys, is what is often called a Hollywood Phenomenon. An "H. P." is a rarity in the radio cap-ital. The tag stands for a young fellow under 30 summers who has trasted the fimits of terms who has tasted the fruits of fame and for-tune—yes, and all the adulation that goes with that fleeting thing called fame—without allowing his head to be turned.

The big feature of "San Quentin on the Air" program heard over KHJ is the San Quentin Orchestra, under the direction of Inmate Conductor Major John A. Hendricks, one time boy church organist and later in charge of the 4th Regimental Band of the Missouri National Guard, and several A. E. F. bands in France during World War No. 1.

The San Quentin Orchestra is no "village-band" style outfit composed of inmates who have been whiling away their "time" learning to toot away at battered instruments. It is a thoroughly up-to-date orchestra of the familiar radio ensemble type, composed largely of musicians who have, in happier days, held jobs in some of the country's biggest and best name outfits.

For instance, there is Don Short, of the sax section, well-remembered by Los Angeles musicians as a handsome kid whose end of the bandstand (he worked here on all the better jobs) was always cluttered with the girls. Don moved right into radio when radio moved into Hollywood. He played for Rudy Vallee, for Lanny Ross, and, to our recollection, with Lennie Hayton when Lennie had the Bing Crosby program.

#### REAVIS VALUABLE ADDITION

A valuable, and comparatively recent, addition to the San Quentin Orchestra, according to the San Quentin "News," is John Francis Reavis, the unhappy kid who made a name for himself in midwest orchestras but just couldn't connect with a good job here on the Coast. Things went haywire for him; he landed on "skidrow" (L. A.'s notorious E. Fifth street). The rest of that tragedy can be recalled from the lurid newspaper accounts. If not recalled, so much the better.

You think we are showing too much sentimental sympathy for a "killer"? Maybe—but we can't forget the state-

This couldn't have happened in a world where society was properly organized. The whole world is to blame—not just Jack!"

#### NOW PLAYING HARP

Jack got a really nice write-up in the Special Radio Edition of the San Quentin "News." One of the things that surprised us was the fact that although this writer knew him as a trombone player—and a darned good one—he is playing harp in the prison orchestra.

#### **TOP-NOTCH MUSICIANS**

We could, had we the space, give the interesting musical backgrounds of many more of the San Quentin bandsmen, almost all of whom played with name bands at one time or another. That particular unit that plays the broadcasts is composed almost entirely of young men—just kids as you see with most of the "outside" bands.

Many have standing offers of employment awaiting them in famous name bands when their present "Contract" expires.

To this writer the most interesting thing in music is the people who make it. That is why we are regular listeners to "San Quentin on the Air," to us one of radio's most interesting and dramatic (in the real-life sense) programs. Their theme song alone, which shows that these momentarily defeated but not discouraged boys have not lost their sense of humor, puts a real wallop in the show. It is one of our favorite old songs—Time On My Hands.

#### BITS ABOUT BANDSMEN

Benny Goodman returns to Hollywood in August for a picture date for Producer Charles R. Rogers. . . Art Whiting and his Swing Sixters doing a swell job as alternate band at the Palladium. Incidentally, that dignified looking but very hot tenor man with Art (the one the gals say looks like Basil Rathbone) has just completed his course at U.S. C. and will shortly become a civilian instructor in meteorology (Johnny — please check spelling) to our embryo aviators. . . That alternate band spot at the Palladium is really a tough one to fill. 


#### (Frayed and Broken, Our Columnist Returns)

If anybody mentions vacations to me, there's likely to be some bloodshed. I've just returned from mine and I think I set a new all-time low for vacations. In fact, to even term the past two weeks a "vacation" is to play fast and loose with the word.

Six days out of the 14 I squirmed in a dentist's chair. Six additional days I devoted to poking my tongue in three excavations where once wisdom teeth blossomed. I could just as easily have passec the time poking my whole arm in those excavations, clear up to the elbow. Brother, I may have lost three wisdom teeth, but I gained more wisdom than you could put in two piles. For instance, I'll know better than to have three of them extracted in the same year, from now on-let alone the same week!"

And the guy who draws "Dick Tracy" in the funny papers didn't add to my holiday, either. He made me so mad I could punch him in the eye. In the current Tracy adventure, the amazing detective runs across a gang of crooks who wreck trains, blow up buildings, mistreat dogs, and commit similar gruesome crimes, merely for the sake of recording the sounds for national use by radio stations.

When the series first started, I imagined the author was taking a not-so-subtle slap at radio. from a newspaper publisher's standpoint. And I saw red. Now, as the adventure progresses, I see that it is all a simple story and that Tracy bears no grudge against radio. The artist is merely



reaching a long way for his plot . . . a very long way.

If you follow the Tracy strip, and hundreds of thousands do, please be advised that radio uses no such tactics to obtain its recorded sound effects. You can make a better train crash in the studio with a handful of glass and a couple of tin cans, and you can blow up a building more effectively in the studio with a thunder-sheet, a couple of rocks and an actor or two to scream.

At any rate, Dick Tracy's adventures the past two weeks didn't make my vacation any more enjoyable.

One bright spot, though, was Harry Flannery's book, "Assignment to Ber-Published by Alfred Knopf, the lin." book is an account of Flannery's adventures in the Nazi headquarters as Berlin correspondent for CBS, following the term spent by Bill Shirer there.

Flannery, now heard on KNX each weekday at 5:30, writes as though he were holding intimate personal conversation with you. He bends over backward to avoid using big and technical words. His style is breezy and interesting. And his choice of subject matter is perfect. It's just like being on the scene yourself.

Don't expect a military account of the war when you read this book, (and I hope you do). Instead, expect an interesting volume of description of the people, the food, the clothing, the entertainment, the psychology and life in general in Germany of 1940-41. It's something different!

genial gal whose real name is Margaret but who prefers the more informal Sandy in her job as a Jill-of-all-trades in the Hollywood ofice of the Harms Music Publishing Co.

"Talk about Denny?" she echoed our question as we walked into the office, "Why, that's a pleasure. There's nobody I'd rather talk about.'

We were familiar with Day's background . . . how he left a promising law career at Manhattan College in New York where he was the No. 2 honor man in his class to try his luck at the thing he loved best . . . how Mary Livingstone happened to hear a program of his on a New York radio station one night while she was vacationing in the east, and how she influenced Jack Benny to sign the "fresh young kid" from New York to a con-tract on the Jell-O series, a contract which has now run into its third suc-cessive stanza. So we immediately got down to family talk.

"In order to know Denny you have to know his family," con-tinued the young lady opposite me, "and it's quite a family."

"Denny is the third oldest in a family of five boys and a girl, and the only member of the family who has ever attempted to do anything professionally."

Dennis, it seems, has always been the wit of the McNulty family circle, although his mother and father, Molly and Patrick McNulty, are a typical, fun-loving Catholic Irish couple from old Erin.

Frank, next to the youngest of the McNulty clan, is, according to Miss Sandy, a promising young dental student who is regarded as the music critic of the family.

"Dennis calls Frank immediately after his broadcasts to get a frank criticism of his perform-ance," said Miss Oliver, "and even when he's out of the city he doesn't hesitate to dial Frank long distance after a program."

# The Man the Navy Didn't Want

Chet Huntley Is Grounded For the Duration Because His Uncle Sam Thinks He's Indispensable at CBS



CHET HUNTLEY, all rigged out for a dive in a navy bomber. Ace special events man for CBS, Chet resembles Leslie Howard, is 30-ish, six feet 2, 160 pounds, an excellent horseman, crack marksman (especially with a Colt 45 six-shooter), yachtsman, photographer, and an actor. Although he doesn't mention it, he turned down a leading man's contract at one of the major studios, preferring to concentrate on setting up and covering special event broadcasts.

IX YEARS AGO, the town of Coos Bay, Ore., was licked off the map by a forest fire's fierce flames; stores and homes were seared; 3500 in-

habitants fled to the ocean and nearby creeks to save their skins.

Among the first outsiders to make an entrance into the abandoned crisp which had been a thriving settlement was Chet Huntley, radio special events man. Driving through still unsubdued heat which blistered the paint from his car, Chet set up shop in the deserted town and arranged a half-hour broadcast.

Graphically he described the desolation of Coos Bay; sympathetically he interviewed the destitute stragglers who wandered back into town. At the end of a 30 minute broadcast, Chet and his engineers were applauding their enterprise when a discovery changed gratification to dismay—they learned that they had been on the air only seven minutes, that for the remaining 22 minutes, thanks to their wire being burned out, they had been throwing their vivid description to the wild winds.

"No need to get excited," comments Chet Huntley in telling the story. "That's just the life of a special events man!"

What is a special event?

A few years ago it was burying a man alive with a microphone and bringing his voice up through six feet of ground to put it on the air; it was raking a bed of hot coals and describing an Indian fakir skimming his way over them; it was planting a tiny microphone in a man's silk hat, equipping his cane with antennae, and waiting while he joined the Easter parade to inform a breathless world what was being worn and by whom.

Radio of yesterday called these special events. They were really stunts. Radio today stresses newsworthiness as the chief requirement of a special event.

"To put it understandably," explains Chet, "a special event to us

here at CBS.KNX is what a feature story is to a newspaper.'

This dictate dces not, by any means, bar excitement. One of Chet's most thrilling experiences was on Navy Day last October, when he swooped down in a bomber over a target boat lying off North Island in San Diego Bay. The dive was made to show lis-teners what a finished navy pilot can do at the stick of a dive bomber.

It took four rehearsals to locate the target boat close enough to shore and fly the bomber low enough, so that microphones set at the shore-line were able to pick up the sound.

"We didn't have enough gas left to try a fifth time," relates Chet, "but my pillot, Lieut. J. B. Bowen, Jr., promised he'd make the dive heard.

"We started diving from 14,000 feet, zooming down at 475 miles. an hour. Customarily, the pilots level off at 1500 feet, but Lieut. Bowen kept right on going, and didn't pull the stick back until we were a scant 800 feet from the target boat. Suffice it to say, we were heard!"

Chet didn't black-out as many do, but he admits things were dark grey for about 20 seconds. "When I raised my head from between my knees, where it went automatically when we finished the dive, I caught my reflec-tion in the windsh eld. With my helmet, goggles, and wobbly noggin, I looked like a bewildered seal."

Three years ago when three Russian flyers headed out over the North Pole, every radio man as far east as Denver was praying that the Soviet birdmen would land in his back vard.

"You pray," says Chet, "but you really don't see how, with half a continent for them to land on, they will come down near you!'

But that's precisely what the Rus-sians obliged with, for Mr. Huntley. He was camping cut, day and night, near Portland, when the Russian plane was set down half a mile away. Let Chet tell the story.

"We grabbed our portable equipment and raced to the landing spot. The pilots were just crawling out when we arrived. Within half an hour, we had located a house from which we could get a line, dragged the Russians to it, produced the Rus-sian consul, and put all four on a transcontinental hook-up."

Describing the premiere take-off of the B19 as a special event. Huntley was equally as interested in watching Donald Douglas.

"Douglas is rather an impassive fellow," states Chet, "but he betrayed his nervousness when he mis-read his stop-watch. It took the ship 18 seconds to leave the ground, but Douglas looked at his watch and exclaimed:

'Eight seconds to take off!' "

At North American, when the army took over during the strike, Chet broadcast from the top of a truck broadcast from the top of a while he dodged tear gas. At Vultee, he escorted the British visitor, Lord Halifax, who christened the Vultee Vengeance. During a course of in-specting the plant, Huntley observed that Halifax was a very religious man. who abstained from swearing. So it delighted Chet immeasurably when Halifax spoke: "When this Vultee Vengeance meets a German aircraft somewhere in the channel for the first time, it will-ahem-ahem-"

#### "Give 'em hell!" supplied an enthusiastic workman.

Lord Halifax recovered: "My friend has said more in one word than I can say." Then His Lordship promptly sat down.

Huntley's most recent radio scoop was putting Brigadier General James H. Doolittle on the air from his Shangri-La, the North American plant. "Doolittle's grin is worth a million dollars," avers Chet.

Huntley also interviewed Captain Steadman, Commander of the S. S. America, when the 35,000-ton ship docked in Los Angeles harbor. "The vessel was interesting because it was heralded as the largest ever built in the Western hemisphere," states Huntley, "but Captain Steadman was newsworthy also, as he has figured in three of the most heroic maritime rescues of modern times."

The war has increased special events activities three fold. Huntley is kept on the constant go with trips to Japanese detention camps, visits to flying fields, with rubber drive programs, with war relief events.

Recently Huntley was ready to enter the navy. He was to have a commission as lieutenant. Then came this word from the navy itself: "We'd like to have a mart like you with us. But you are much more valuable to the war effort if you stay right on where you are, handling special events for Columbia Broadcasting System!"

INTERVIEW WITH A HERO: Last Monday it was my privilege to meet one of this war's heroes, Aviation Chief Machinist's Mate Harold F. Dixon. Our introduction took place at Columbia Square, where he was appearing that morning on Nelson Pringle's program and that same evening on "I Was There."

It was Dixon and his two companions, Radioman Gene Aldrich and Ordnanceman Anthony Pastula, who stayed alive for 34 days on a rubber life-raft in the south Pacific, after their bomber was forced down. To the wisdom and courage of Dixon, Aldrich and Pastula owe their lives, their ultimate landing on one of the Cook Islands, and their return to civilization and the service.

I had been told that Dixon was a shy, soft-spoken sort of fellow who might be difficult to interview, so it was a delightful surprise when he smiled and said: "I consider myself public doniain now. I think what we did should be made known, as the story of such an experience is a big morale-builder."

Although Dixon's story has been publicized nationally, your Gal Friday had a few questions to ask for Radio Life readers. One concerned the men's physical condition when they landed on the island after their month-long struggle with the sea.

"Breaking your exclusive diet of raw fish, albatross, and shark's liver with blood must have been a problem," I suggested.

"Quite the contrary," the hero said, "The only foods used on the island are cocoanuts, fish, bananas, and taro, which resembles the stuff poi is made from. The natives keep a few chickens, too. The big hurricane, that was breaking when we finally made shore, frightened the fish out to sea and sent the chickens squawking into the hills. While the islanders went looking for a couple of fowl to make us broth, when we first meal on the pulp of cocoanut trees." we made our first meal on the pulp of cocoanut trees."

Mrs. Dixon, who stood by at CBS while her husband chatted, said he came home a "vitamin-conscious man." Maybe that's why he looks so well now and has brought his weight back up to 175 pounds. His skin, which was burned almost to a crisp when he landed on the island, is still very brown. He said the natives did their best to relieve the three men by rubbing them with cocoanut oil, but that, too, was an excruciating routine, almost as bad as suffering without attention.

One of the queerest quirks of the whole story is Mrs. Dixon's. She and her daughter were first apprised of something being wrong by a friend's wire: "Too bad about Harry." Shortly after, the navy reported Dixon was missing. Then later, the navy sent Mrs. D. the clothes of "Harold F. Dixon, deceased." Just about the time she received them, her stark naked husband was dragging himself up the beach at Cook Islands!

Much has been written of Dixon's religious experiences with his two companions on the raft. "It was the only lift of each day," he commented in referring to their 'prayer-meetings.' The other two al-ways asked me to tell them Bible stories. I was pretty rusty on some of mu data and L guess my unsigns of Massa David and the woman of my data, and I guess my versions of Moses, David, and the woman who turned to salt were strictly original and really fantastic," Dixon confessed. "But I can say this. I came out of that experience a Christian!"

Our hero was allotted an extremely dramatic spot on the "I Was There" show, in which highlights of the 34 days were re-created and special emphasis was placed on the very thing Dixon pointed out dur-ing his Radio Life interview: "We didn't cry when we saw the plight

we were in after our plane sank. We didn't have time or energy to cry. We needed everything we had to lick our situation, and we set about deliberately to run our four by eight rubber raft just like a regular boat."

Yes, indeed, it was a privilege to talk to Chief Dixon. But for you un-able to meet him, he vivified his thrilling story on the air. Fronting the CBS-KNX microphone, his trim uniform bearing the decoration of the Navy Cross for extraordinary heroism. Chief Dixon concluded his radio por-tion: "We experienced the worst the sea can offer, but with the help of the Supreme Being, came through alive. I know what that means. I was there!"





The head was called Baron and the members were Leigmen. That is until the Declaration of Independence. After that the titles were changed to Governor and Citizens.

All members took turns at being chef for the rest. Their skill in the culinary art was judged by their ability to flip a special frying pan

with a five-foot handle. This pan was used to fry the day's catch. A dozen fish were placed in it with their tails toward the center. The trick was to flop them over without losing' one.

On meeting day, or Fishing Day, as they called it, the member who was appointed chef had to prepare and serve a meal for the whole club. And any member who failed to give notice that he would attend was fined a beef steak and a bottle of wine.

#### SUGAR SAVERS:

Sugar seems to be an all-important question these days and one that's constantly coming up. We've already offered a few suggestions on how to conserve sugar in canning, but now it seems that unsweetened desserts are causing trouble.

Whenever you can, serve the dessert hot. You'll be surprised how much sweeter hot food tastes than cold. If you're doubtful, try a dish of cooked fruit that has been thoroughly chilled. Follow that up with a dish of the same fruit that is hot. We think you will be surprised with the results.

Salt is an ingredient that will emphasize the sweetness of a dessert. You see, salt brings out flavor as well as sweetness. And of course, that helps. So just add a tiny pinch of salt to the dessert, not enough to taste but enough to bring out the sweetness of the food.


Make desserts that don't need much sugar. Oh yes, there are lots of them. What about that good old stand-by, shortcake? You can make it with biscuit dough and sweeten it with any kind of fruit that's in season. Or if you like, try a fruit cobbler. You can make that with biscuit dough, too. Now add bread crumb puddings and custard to the list, and you have a good variety to start with.

#### MUGWUMP IN A HOLE:

Mugwump in a Hole is something you eat! We can prove it. It's an old Virginia dish that has been handed down from generation to generation. And to make the whole thing more confusing, it is the direct result of a political campaign.

Perhaps we'd better explain. In the campaign of 1884, many members of the Republican Party decided to change their politics. So they ceased to be Republicans—but they didn't become anything else. Theirs was the state of being "neither one thing nor another," like the mugwump that isn't a tadpole and hasn't become a frog.

So the Virginia recipe for using up leftovers of beef, mutton, veal, fowl, and the like, was christened Mugwump in a Hole in honor of the confused partisans of the Mugwump Party!


