The Listener: He thinks radio is doing a pretty good job. He thinks there are plenty of things about radio that could stand some improvement, but all in all, there isn't much to beef about. He and all his brothers are listening more today than ever before. He has more faith in radio than in any other medium of public expression, by and large, and because of that faith, he is taking radio's lead and is buying bonds, enlisting in the coast guard and the navy and the air corps, and he's supporting the Red Cross, the U. S. O., and the various other agencies which radio is supporting. He is leaning heavily on his loudspeaker for his news, for his entertainment, and for his relaxation.

The Sponsor: He realizes that listeners are staying home these days, listening to their radios. So he's buying more and more time. He's virtually bought out our major stations for the fall. In some cases, there's no more time for sale. It's a curious situation, too. Many of radio's largest time buyers this fall, have nothing to sell to their audiences but good-will. The gasoline companies, for example, have no gas to sell to their eastern listeners, and are losing money on the gas they do sell to their western listeners. In the main, they're selling only their good name. The soft drink manufacturers, the tire companies, and many others, are in the same boat. All in all, radio sales this fall are far above anything in the past, including the wildest dreams of sales managers.

The Station Owner: He's sitting on top of the world, so to speak, without his overcoat! Here he is with his best business in history, with his largest audiences in history, and with a war on his hands. He asks

for no sympathy. He's merely joining the rest of us in doing what he can to win the war. The station owner is doing plenty. He's giving unstintingly of his time to the government, for bond appeals, for propaganda, for recruiting, and for the many messages the government wants to get over to the public quickly. In addition, the station owner is watching his bright young men march off to war, the same bright young men whom he trained at his own expense. He's watching his high salaried executives go into propaganda jobs in Washington, New York, San Francisco, and Hollywood. He's watching his highly trained and well-paid announcers, bright young men all, as they enlist in the armed services. He's watching the front door, waiting for someone to come in and replace those bright young men . . . but he's watching in vain.

The Radio Star: He looks with interest on the growing audience. He sighs with longing at the number of sponsors now on the air and at the ease with which he can grab one of them. There's big money to be made without too much worry, these days. Except for the fact that there's the army waiting for him. He's in a spot. He's no good to a sponsor if he doesn't get the public eye. And if he does get the public eye and he's not in a uniform, he gets criticized. So he figures there's only one thing to do . . . join the army. Now if he finagles a commission, which is only natural for any man to try to accomplish, he comes in for more criticism. All he can do is enlist as a buck private or as a plain, everyday gob. It's the price he has to pay for his fame. But I wouldn't be surprised but what he likes it, in most cases. He doesn't have to worry about his sponsor or his public or his agent or his competition. All he has to worry about is the enemy.

9:00:00—(Lower left) The Chief arrives. Lewis Allen Weiss, vice-president and general manager of KHJ-Don Lee Broadcasting System, enters through the special side door to which only executives hold the key. He pauses unostentatiously in the lobby before the flag with its 25 blue stars and one gold star, and pays tribute to Don Lee men in the service.

9:26:42—(and on around the clock) "And that's the news from here." Newscasters Norman Nesbitt (left) and Glenn Hardy (center) confer with news writer, Bob Wagner, on the latest headline being received on one of the battery of newsprinters that are never silent. 10:01:00—"Happy Homemaker" Norma Young, one minute after she comes off the air. Replacing the microphone with a telephone, Norma continues, via phone, to mix cakes, mend stockings, curl hair, and make housework simpler. Abetted by her secretary, Grace Bonesteel, Norma here gives out the recipe for sugarless cake, going through the motions of stirring as she talks.



12:29:30—The announcer shift changes. Under the eye of Supervisor Dick Ross, (right rear) Norman Rogers (at control board) puts Studio 6 on the air. Gordon Burke, through with his stint, is donning his coat, as George Martin (extreme left) scans the cue sheet before taking over. These men are only four of KHJ's 18 staff announcers, scheduled for duty 24 hours out of 24.

From "Rise and Shine" to "Swing to Victory" We Meet and Photograph a Station at Work

Behind the control room, for every lilting melody, for every line of comedy, for every well-turned phrase, there's hard, gruelling work—the brow-sweating, shirt-sleeve kind.

There's not a department in the radio station that doesn't take part in the presentation of even the simplest 15-second station announcement. When one realizes that there are 86,400 seconds in each day of broadcast and that the average radio station has six and three quarters

such days each week, the immensity of the job is apparent.

In this pictorial tour on which Radio Life takes the reader through KHJ, the activities of a metropolitan radio station are shown, from "Rise and Shine," which begins at 6 o'clock in the morning, through "Swing to Victory," which signs off at 6 o'clock the following morning. For it's not a 40-hour shift that keeps radio people on the job,—it's a day after day routine that spans a whole week of broadcast with only six hours silent out of 168.

Without the labor of scores of conscientious employees, there would be no fascinating performance. Without the toil of wearisome rehearsal, there would be no polished presentation on the part of entertainers.

Though these pictures show only a few of the KHJ staff at work, they represent the cooperation of hundreds of executives and co-workers.



4:08:18—Program producer clears his choral numbers with KHJ's musical librarian. Here is Walter White Jr. submitting to Librarian R. A. ("Shep") Shepherd (seated), a proposed list of numbers to be sung by the Robert Mitchell Boychoir on the "Nobody's Children" program. Onlookers are two members of the Boychoir and Patty Boyd, library assistant. "Shep" clears, for an average day at KHJ, a grand total of 101 numbers.



4:40:37—First rehearsal of a dramatic show. Fresh from the mimeograph machine come scripts for "Curtain, America," and around a long table cluster cast members with Director-Producer Eddie Robinson. He leans forward to okay re-reading of a tricky line.

"GET IT" BEFORE IT HAPPENS

"Or At Least a Second After", Says the Man Whose Exploits Make People Want to Listen

THE OTHER DAY, the bottom of Jimmie Vandiveer's stomach dropped out.

Jimmie, who is Director of Special Events for KFI-KECA, found himself in this dire physical predicament while he was riding high in the sky, flirting with the clouds in a Douglas A-20-B attack bomber.

That's the type of ship which was used on July 3, when the Yanks staged their extraordinary raid over France and Holland and bombed targets at such speed and low altitude that they were there and gone before the Nazis knew what was happening.

It was an English adaptation of the A-20-B which on that spectacular flight performed the incredible feat of flying back to England on one motor after the plane had bounced to the ground in Holland, riddled its tail surfaces, lost a prop, and crumpled a foot and a half of wing tip.

It is the self-same ship which is being used by the British in Egypt and is called a "Boston." So dependable in performance is it, that the air Tommies now speak of "bostonizing" an objective instead of bombing it.

Jimmie figured that the A-20-B was such a fine ship that ordinary people should know more about it. So he drove down to the Douglas black-out field, strapped on a parachute and throat mike and climbed into the bombardier's compartment, or what is popularly called "the greenhouse," to stage a demonstration for radio listeners.

"The take-off was like being fired out of a sling shot," Jimmy reported.

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Vandiveer's most recent special event was riding in a Douglas A-20-B attack bomber at a dizzy speed and appallingly low altitude. He is shown here perched in the bombardier's compartment.



Jimmie broadcast from blood-bank headquarters, while he was giving his quota of life-succoring fluid. As a result of this program, 15 staff members of KFI-KECA donated their blood.

KWKW Opens

At high noon on Saturday, Sept. 12, Pasadena's new radio station, KWKW, hit the airwaves with ceremonies befitting an ether debut. The latest outlet to establish itself in the Crown City went on the air with 1,000 watts at 1430 on the dial. It will operate as a daytime station only, coming on at sunrise and signing off at sundown. This will require variable hours according to the time of year, the earliest sign-off falling during December and January when 5:45 p.m. will constitute sundown.

Programs emanate from a luxuriously streamlined studio in the Pasadena Athletic Club, 425 East Green street. Dwight Hauser, program director, has aligned an interesting array of radio fare comprising classical and popular music, talks, drama, and news.

Utilizing the facilities of United Press radio service, the KWKW news room will supply a "continuous news-reel" every morning between 7:30 and 8:30 o'clock. There will be three 15-minute periods of late bulletins, broken by five minutes of music. News periods will be identical, save for insertion of late flashes. Thus, any listener tuning in KWKW for 15 minutes during the hour will receive a complete news-picture.

As long as 7 p.m. remains closing time, there will be a final news roundup daily at 6:15 p.m., followed by commentation analysis.

Between 1:15 and 2:15 daily there will be a program of classical and semi-classical numbers, followed at 3 o'clock by a half hour of popular selections. Bing Crosby records will be featured on two shows daily. "Croon a Little" is the title of a 4 p. m. daily "community sing" feature, different in that the audience members join in the song from their own homes.

Bob Garrett, chief announcer, will detail Hollywood news on his "Pitchur Patter," slated for Thursdays at 4:30 p. m.

KWKW is in a unique position as far as dramatic productions are concerned. The entire personnel of the program department is composed of actors, making dramatic programs easily available. There will be a Monday night "Psycho-Drama," a dramatization of the news on Sunday's "Tomorrow's History" (2 p. m.), and "Circumstance," a Friday and Saturday

production at 2:45 p.m. Two audience shows will come later—one catering to ladies and the other on the order of a detective puzzler.

Heading the new station is Marshall F. Neall, president and general manager, and former importer and exporter of laces and fine linens. Lee Ragan is vice-president, R. L. Rust is sales manager, and Paul Spargo is chief engineer.

"Digest" to Air

That pint-sized encyclopedia of literature's current cream—"Reader's Digest"—came to the ether lanes last week in a show. Not to confuse the

set-up, may it be said that the program airing Sundays at 6 p.m. over CBS-KNX is not a "Digest" sponsored broadcast, but one bankrolled by Campbell's Soups. Stories in the current issue of the magazine or in back numbers will form material for dramatizations on the show. Conrad Nagel, who automatically fell out of his emcee job when Silver Theater failed to return to the air, will serve as narrator for the news series.

Guest stars of stage and screen will fill leading roles and Lyn Murray, former Lucky Strike orchestra leader, will direct the musical background for the broadcasts.

Advent of this program proves that radio has been a sweeping power for education of the average man and woman. A few years ago, the appeal of "Digest" was limited. Today, radio with its news programs and round table discussions has created an appetite for serious consideration of such material as the newly-initiated series will present.

Bemis Makes History

Women announcers? For some time those two words have ended in a question mark. Now CBS puts an exclamation mark there with the name of Elizabeth Bemis! She is the new commentator for CBS-KNX—the first woman to be hired in her capacity by a major radio studio—as a woman, not

as a name. Dorothy Thompson reached the air via her newspaper reputation. But the Bemis assignment comes strictly on the strength of an excellent, brisk, businesslike, low-toned voice, and the sudden commentator vacancy due to men going into the service.

Miss Bemis earned a reputation as an excellent news commentator back in Cincinnati on WLW. Before that she was a newspaper reporter, following in the footsteps of her father, publisher of a paper in Littleton, Colorado, and her mother, a reporter. She is slim, young, green-eyed, with black hair worn in a knot on the back of her neck.

One of those fiction-sounding adventures which happen to interesting people in real life, happened to Elizabeth Bemis just before the outbreak of the present world conflict. Taking a holiday after studying in Paris, she went vacationing in North Africa. Tunis was tense with an undercurrent of premonition of the coming conflict. An American consul made a mistake on the passport of the future news-woman. Officials thought it looked forged. Miss Bemis was facing jail, but the man who would have had to be her policeman-jailer was a Frenchman who had earned a leave and was anxious to see his bride in France. By promising him that she would report in court early the next morning, Elizabeth escaped bars and the Frenchman caught his train. The passport difficulty was straightened out and she proceeded on her way the next day.

Miss Bemis is heard on CBS-KNX in a news commentation program Monday and Friday from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m.

The famed newspaper columnist is identified in a split second of recogni-

tion for his accuracy, reliability, and precasting of world events. But the 50-year-old Kansan has a colorful item in his history, too. He has travelled with every president of the United States since Wilson. He has also covered every political convention since the first World War.

Clapper has made it a point to be in on things as well as to be honest. He was in London when the enemy was 20 minutes across the channel. Recently in his effort to get first hand information, he went through Africa and visited Cairo, Egypt, and India, talking to the men who guide world affairs.

The columnist's honesty was best exemplified when, after sincerely advocating all policies of the New Deal, he later took it to task for its errors.

Courage

There are many kinds of courage. Men and women sitting before their radios listening to a young Wagnerian soprano on the recent Andre Kostelanetz "Pause That Refreshes" broadcast, heard one of the rarest kinds of courage. That soprano, Marjorie Lawrence, was singing in the face of disaster. Singing from a wheel chair!

With a triumphant career of singing behind her the Australian opera star suffered a sudden infection while touring Mexico in 1941. A paralysis of her legs followed. She has not walked since. For some time she did not make public appearances, merely lived in memory of her days with the Paris Grand Opera Company and the Metropolitan Opera, and the tour of her homeland where she was hailed as "Queen of Song."

But, as her health improved, she told her friends, "No matter what happens to you in life it is best not to give up. Have faith. Never be discouraged. So much can be done."

So the girl with courage came to the air to sing "Waltzing Matilda" for her courageous, fighting countrymen. KNX, 1:30 p.m. Sun.

That's Life

Laughter and tears make up human life and the test of greatness for any actress is to sway an audience with both. Lurene Tuttle, NBC actress, proved her mettle Sunday, Sept. 6, when she finished her role as Marjorie in "The Great Gildersleeve" and left the audience rocking with laughter. One minute later on the new Lionel Barrymore show, "Mayor of the Town," she was playing the tragic role of a young navy wife whose husband was killed in the Battle of Coral Sea. Handkerchiefs appearing frequently from handbags attested the delicacy of her portrayal.

Attention, Salesmen!

Three KFI-KECA announcers, Jimmy Vandiveer, Don McNamara and Bill Davidson argued so heatedly about which could sell the most Victory Bonds on the air that station executives decided to let the three settle it in the "air-ring," with voices instead

War, Baseball, Bing

If anyone is laboring under the delusion that a citizen of Brooklyn, U. S. A. forgets the "Bums" in the business of fighting a war, he is sadly mistaken, for a letter from West Africa recently arrived at Radio City, written by a Canadian who declared he represented "a group of Canadians and one American from Brooklyn." Two Men for One

Two star announcers have stepped into Knox Manning's shoes for top flight radio programs since Captain Manning entered the service in Florida.

John Kennedy, well-known Blue Network microphone personality, is now narrator on "Hero of the Week", broadcast Thursday evenings. Bob Garred, soon to don a naval uniform himself, will handle the former Manning assignment on the CBS-KNX war show, "I Was There", until he accepts his naval duties.

Marching On News

The smoothly-presented news stories coming out of American radios on "The March of Time" broadcasts give no hint of the confusion of war-muddled cities, sickening disappointments, quick thinking, and unbelievable patience which have been responsible for the program. The story of "The March of Time" is exciting and dramatic as the reports heard on it.

It's a never-ending offensive on all fronts for the program's correspondents who represent "Time" magazine. They're constantly on the alert to capture news for the NBC broadcast. And, once in their hands, the news faces fresh perils, for often the approval of several governments must be obtained for a single broadcast. Sometimes the weather becomes a menace, because unfavorable weather conditions threaten short wave pickups and writers and production men must rush to fill in the spot left vacant by their absence.

There is, for instance, the story of

Then, on the day of broadcasting, the Turkish government cancelled its permission for the Ankara interviews . . . and technical difficulties "washed out" the British pick-up. Overseas telephones rang madly as producers and writers called "Time" correspondents to get important personages to fill in the vacant spots. A few hours later a well-balanced, clean-cut news program was on the air.

The men behind the overseas microphones have a touch of the heroic, yet they do not realize it, for their unusual assignments have come to be just daily jobs to them. Steve Laird, in London, gropes his way through the blackout at 3:30 a.m. to be at the BBC studios when London is on the program on Fridays. Over in Cairo, Harry Zinder faces the microphone at 5:30 a.m. and Walter Graebner, in Moscow, gets up at reveille time to arrive at the studios at 6:30 a.m. KFI, 7:30 p.m. Thurs.

Games, races, community singing will feature the program which will be presented over the air. Prominent CBS stars will be guest entertainers, including Lud Gluskin's orchestra.

18 HOURS WITHOUT A COMMERCIAL

By Selling Bonds and Staging All-Day Salute to American War Heroes

AN 18-HOUR salute to American heroes wherever they are stationed . . . 18 hours of music, drama, news and variety for every type of American listener . . . from 6 a. m. to midnight every effort to help our government sell War Bonds and War Stamps . . . an entire 18-hour day of broadcasting without a single commercial announcement . . .

This was the plan behind the longest single program in radio history, a program arranged by KMPC, "the Station of the Stars," for Saturday, September 19. This was the day on which the popular Beverly Hills station pulled the power switch on a brand-new 10,000-watt transmitter and thus became the most powerful independent station west of Chicago.

Beginning at 6 a. m. and continuing until midnight without a break, the 18-hour show featured a veritable galaxy of radio and screen stars—a list of whom would read like "Who's Who in the Entertainment World"—as well as civic leaders, war workers, union heads and industrialists who joined together to make the broadcast a community effort.

The U. S. Treasury Department War Bond sales officials set as a minimum goal for the broadcast the sale of \$10,000 worth of bonds an hour and stated that the broadcast was a major contribution, in Southern California, to the "Salute to Our Heroes" month campaign by which one billion dollars worth of bonds is expected to be sold nationally in September.

Cooperating with KMPC were the "Station of the Stars" sister stations: WJR, "The Goodwill Station," Detroit, and WGAR, "The Friendly Station," Cleveland. Both made program contributions to KMPC in recognition of the long non-commercial broadcast and in salute to KMPC's newly authorized increase in power.

Each hour, from 6 a. m. until midnight, was dedicated to an American hero, Reynolds explained. Unique features were that the only identification made of each hero was by sound effects. His voice was not heard nor was his name spoken.

With its new power increase, KMPC becomes the most powerful clear channel station in the entire west and

moves KMPC into third place, behind only KFI and KNX, the two 50,000 watt network stations, in power and coverage in Los Angeles.

Under the direction of Lloyd Signon, KMPC Chief Engineer, complete new directional transmitting facilities have been set up embodying the most up-to-date equipment, including the only 10,000 watt transmitter of its type ever released by RCA. The directional feature will permit KMPC to beam 38,000 watts throughout Southern California.

"Extensive field tests show that, throughout the entire area comprising the Southern California market, KMPC's signal strength is comparable to the best," Reynolds said.

KMPC will retain its clear channel frequency of 710 kilocycles and its signals will be found at the same place on radio dials as heretofore. The station has been operating on 5000 watts day and 1000 watts night since 1940. Previous to that time, it operated on 500 watts limited time. The latest and most important power step-up was granted on Sept. 3.

RELIEF IN BRIEF

LOS ANGELES — (BR) — THE MAIN MISUNDERSTANDING INVOLVING THE "RELIEF ACT" IS THAT IT DOESN'T SUSPEND SOLDIERS' DEBTS IN ANY WAY AT ALL. IF A MAN ENLISTS OR IS DRAFTED, THE HOLDER OF AN OBLIGATION AGAINST HIM CAN STILL SUE JUST AS BEFORE IF PAYMENTS ON A CAR, HOUSE, OR ANY OTHER POSSESSION ARE NOT MET.

THE MEASURE TO PROTECT ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES IS OFFICIALLY CALLED THE "SOLDIERS AND SAILORS RELIEF ACT OF 1940" AND SO FAR DOES NOT APPLY TO ANY OBLIGATION UNLESS ENTERED INTO PRIOR TO OCTOBER 16, 1940. A SECOND STATUTE TO BRING THE LAW UP TO DATE IS NOW BEFORE CONGRESS, AND IT'S ABOUT TIME THE LAWMAKERS GOT BUSY.

OF COURSE THE REASON WHY A SOLDIER'S DEBTS ARE NOT SUSPENDED BY THE ACT IS THAT SOME PEOPLE WOULD TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE OPPORTUNITY TO ESCAPE THEIR OBLIGATIONS. THE POINT OF THE ACT REVOLVES AROUND THE FACT THAT ALTHO A SOLDIER CAN STILL BE SUED, ONCE THE SUIT IS FILED THE MATTER IS FORCED INTO EQUITY. THINGS MUST BE SETTLED IN A FAIR, REASONABLE WAY.

THE LITTLE PEOPLE WHO WOULD NORMALLY BE CAUGHT IN THE SHUFFLE ARE PROTECTED AND IF THE JUDGE DECIDES THAT THE MAN CAN'T PAY, THEN THAT'S THE END OF IT UNTIL AFTER THE WAR. THE ACT MAKES IT IMPOSSIBLE TO GET A JUDGMENT AGAINST A SOLDIER UNLESS HE IS PRESENT OR ADEQUATELY REPRESENTED BY COUNSEL, AND DURING SUSPENSION OF AN OBLIGATION NO COMPOUND INTEREST MAY BE INVOLVED.

THE JUDGES ARE THE HUB OF THE WHOLE THING AND WILL HAVE TO TAKE ON THE WISDOM OF SOLOMON IN THEIR DECISIONS AS THE WORKINGS OF THIS ACT WILL BECOME TREMENDOUSLY MORE IMPORTANT NOW THAT LOCAL DRAFT BOARDS ARE REACHING INTO 3-A CLASSIFICATIONS.

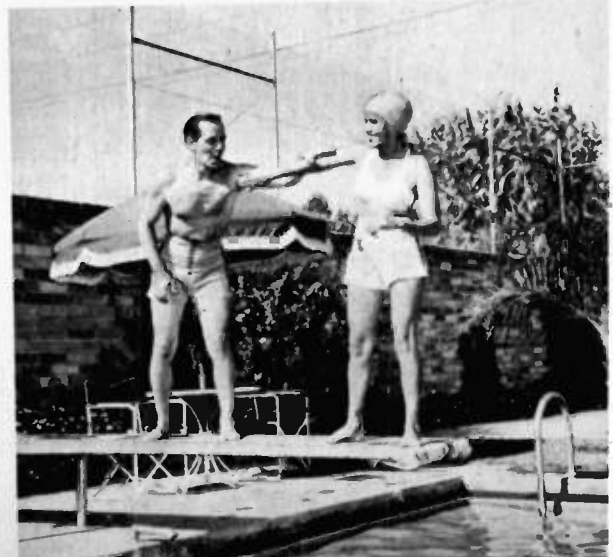

ARMY AIR CORPS TAKES TO THE AIR

Radio's Top Men Earn Wings Recruiting War's Future Aces at Santa Ana, Calif.

A WAR OF WINGS must be a War of Words, too! The world's most worthy sponsor sent out a plea for radio to do one of the biggest jobs of the war—recruit men of intelligence and ability for the air service! Answering Uncle Sam, radio's minute men, the famous of Hollywood, left big-paying jobs, took up their microphone arts, and went to Santa Ana, huge West Coast Army Air Force Training Center!

Like a titanic flood, talent overflowed the small broadcasting hall donated by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars! Writers! Technicians! Producers! Actors! Comics! Musicians! Enthusiastic with the possibilities before them, realizing the powerful influence of radio—for it belongs to the people, going alike into luxurious drawing rooms, modest kitchens, offices, factories)—these radio stars brought the magic of Hollywood's magnificent radio cities to a side street in the small orange-belt town of Santa Ana.

They knew that the great American tradition is for men to volunteer for the most needed jobs of warfare. Pilots and mechanics were badly wanted. So, the programs which went out from that studio in Santa

Ana over CBS, NBC, the Blue Network and Mutual-Don Lee Broadcasting Company accomplished the recruiting job by presentation of facts and salty, up-to-the-minute American humor. Every program was turned out as only top men of radio can produce a smoothly running, laugh-provoking broadcast with a message.

The men at Santa Ana worked day and night on the old-fashioned hall until today it is as complete, with control room, orchestration set-up, microphones, and sound-proof walls, as the most luxurious studios in Radio City or Columbia Square.

As for the success of their work under Uncle Sam's sponsorship take the experience of Captain Melville Ruick, former announcer on the Lux Radio Theater and an actor on the Irene Rich show. Captain Ruick told Radio Life: "I am no longer selling Lux, I am now really selling Uncle Sam, although Uncle Sam really doesn't need to be sold to the American people." He "sold" him, for instance, to Harry Gorman, private flier. Captain Ruick's appeal for glider pilots on "Uncle Sam Presents" had barely ended when Gorman wired from Billings, Montana, offering his services!

That is an experience which has been multiplied, and for evidence, consider some of the men who gave up their desks in large, swanky stu-

dios for work in the sound-conditioned auditorium in Santa Ana! There's Corporal Ben Gage, former announcer for Bob Hope and Ransom Sherman shows, singer with Anson Weeks' orchestra, once star of his own transcontinental strip out of Chicago, "The Singing Orchestra Leader." There's Private Hal Gibney, once of NBC and the Blue Network, whose voice was heard on "Captain Flagg and Sergeant Quirt," "Speaking of Glamour," "Standard Symphony," Walter Winchell and "Hawthorne House!"

Ripley might be interested in Captain Eddie Dunstedter's orchestra at Santa Ana! Most people would say it is impossible to turn out pure harmony with an orchestra made up of musicians recruited from symphony orchestras and swing bands! However, magnificent music comes out from any one of the Santa Ana programs, "Men With Wings," KNX-CBS, Saturdays at 5 o'clock; "Wings Over the West Coast," KHJ-Don Lee System, Sundays at 7 p. m.; "Uncle Sam Presents," NBC, Tuesdays at 9:30 p. m. and on the one-time show, "Passing the Buck," from the Blue Network.

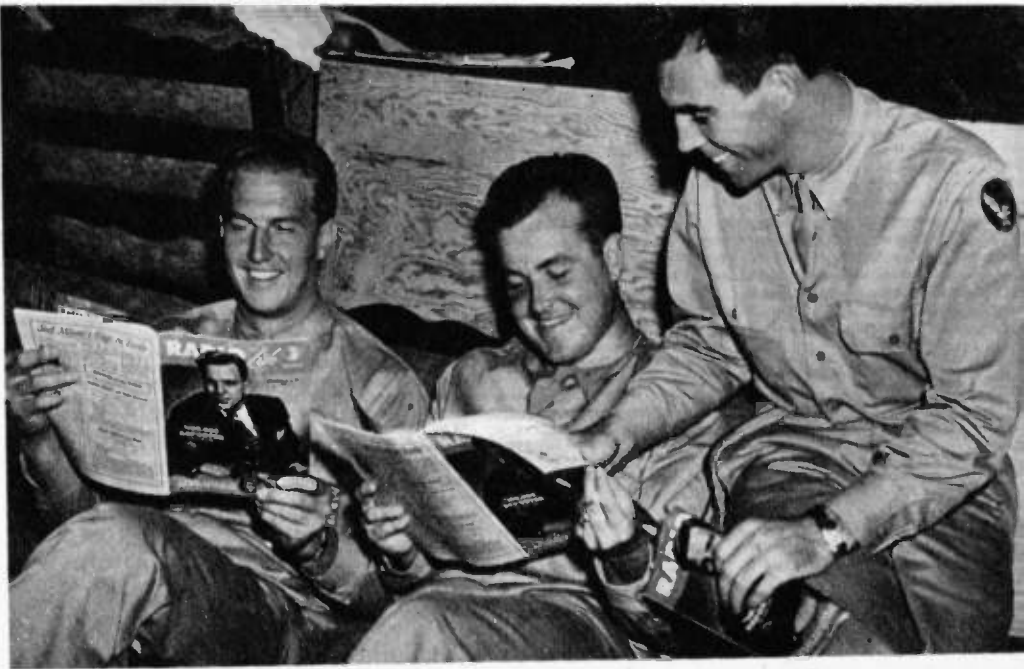
Yet the instrumentalists represent the Cleveland Symphony orchestra; Benny Goodman; the Philadelphia Symphony; Artie Shaw; the Los Angeles and Stokowski's All-American Youth orchestras; Rudy Vallee; Gus Arn-

heim; Tommy Dorsey; Andre Kostelanetz; Les Brown; Ray Noble; Jimmy Grier. Co-conductor Technical Sergeant Harry Glostein was former director of Paramount Studios' recording orchestra. Private Hal Borne, once RKO's arranger, is another orchestra member.

Captain Frederick Hazlitt Brennan is perhaps the most famous writer at the air headquarters—with stories in The Saturday Evening Post and other magazines. But also regard this imposing array of writers who see that radio scripts read smoothly: Sergeant Tom D'Andrea, once responsible for Richfield's "Olsen and Johnson" show; Private First Class George Hope, who thought up gags for his famous brother, Bob; Private Bill Erwin, on Edgar Bergen's writing staff and the Turnabout Theater, also seen in 70 plays of the Pasadena Playhouse; Captain Richard Macauley, former Hollywood scenarist.

Sound effects are managed by Private Clark Casey who back in civil-

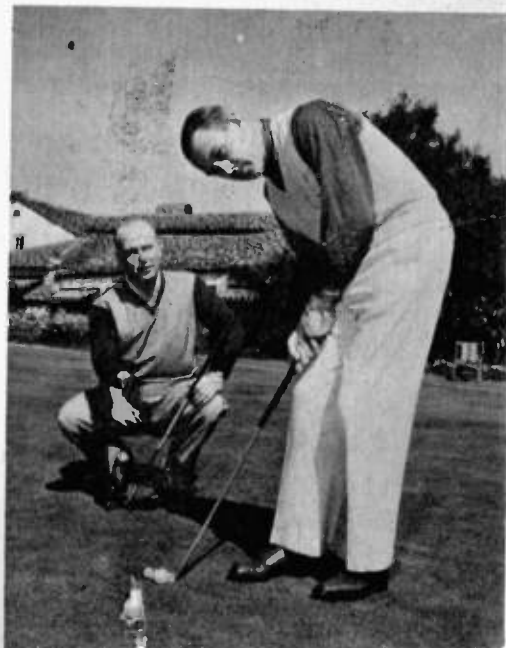

His voice was still breathless four hours later.

"The boys at Douglas put it still better. They say the ship gets off the ground 'like a scalded cat'."

"In 15 seconds we climbed to 3,000 feet. Then we leveled off before coming down to dive on the mike, which was placed on the field as our objective.

"Military restrictions keep me from telling too much about the A-20-B, but I can say that we came on our objective at a speed approaching 400 miles an hour," Jimmie related. "We were probably less than 100 feet off the ground.

"The earth went by like a streak. After we whizzed past the objective, we zoomed up. That's when the bottom dropped out of my stomach!"

Jimmie's description of his ride was detailed into the microphone on his person and relayed to a truck on the field, where a recording of the exploit was cut. When he returned to KFI, the recording was edited and put on the air, as a KFI special event, at the earliest possible opening.

There is no set time logged for such broadcasts. The station seizes every opportunity to obtain a special event, and as the chances come rather unexpectedly and are in the nature of news happenings, the occurrences are transcribed or put on "live" whenever it is opportune. The theory is "stay tuned to KFI" and you'll not miss such broadcasts.

In radio for 10 years, young Vandiveer has been at KFI for five and has won three first prizes and a special citation in the demonstration division of the Institute of Education by Radio at Ohio State University.

His first prize and special citation was for his blood bank broadcast, during which he visited the blood-giving headquarters and gave his quota, meanwhile broadcasting running comment on the phlebotomy. As the result of this demonstration, 15 of the staff from KFI-KECA donated their hemoglobin. Comedy relief on the program was Jimmie's search for Skinnay Ennis and the latter's "one corpuscle."

In 1939, Jimmie arranged a special series of pre-natal broadcasts which attracted widespread comment. Using medical terms which expectant mothers should understand, he interviewed obstetricians, made visits to the maternity ward of the California Hospital, and dealt out other vital information. Hundreds of copies of the scripts were requested by women, institutions, and other radio stations.

Two years ago, Jimmie decided to

provoke interest in the Palomar Observatory. He was the first to broadcast from the building.

"'Make them listen' is my motto," explained Vandiveer.

"So I didn't go down there and stand around in one spot gazing into a microphone and making stuffy remarks. I made it interesting for the customers—and difficult for Vandiveer, by climbing to the top of the dome. I had to toil up a flock of narrow steps about 100 feet. Then, when I had hauled myself and the 'pack mike' up there, what happened? The needle stuck in the record, so I had to scale those hundred feet again! And that's high!"

Jimmie believes that it's worth while to dress up an educational broadcast if by so doing he secures listeners. He will freeze himself stiff in the cold chamber at Douglas, just to let people know what it's like. When men fly planes at 40,000 feet, it gets pretty shivery . . . about 45 degrees below zero—and consequently it is necessary for plane manufacturers to maintain testing rooms to gauge reactions of various materials.

To get his data, Jimmie donned a metal helmet, heavy gloves, and a fleece-lined suit. The

chamber was 85 degrees below zero. Ordinary rubber broke into bits and an orange, dropped to the floor, splintered. As for Jimmie, his joints got so cold he creaked when he walked outside again in 25 minutes.

The majority of Vandiveer's broadcasts are now flavored by the war. Even before Dec. 7 he was pointing his events toward the martial, and a few days previous to the Pearl Harbor attack, had taken a trip on a mine sweeper, had inspected the big guns at Fort MacArthur, and had cleared arrangements to describe a mock aerial raid on Los Angeles. All these would have become special event broadcasts if the war had not become so sudden a reality.

For the duration, Jimmie will more or less forget the fanciful special events which he used to stage in peacetime. No more riding through the zoo on the back of Annie, the jumbo elephant and no taking an eight-foot spill when the elephant flicks her ears! No more interviewing Gargantua, or the circus hyena, the sword-swallower, or the night-flying pigeons! No more getting lost in the Catalina sea-gardens, 25 feet under water.

"It's just as well," shrugs Jimmie. I was barefoot that day and a bleary-eyed halibut persisted in nibbling at my big toe!"

ian days handled, among other CBS shows, "Screen Guild Theater." Organizer of the set-up is Lieutenant Colonel James Higgs, former St. Louis radio station owner and advertising executive, now director of public relations and special services for the West Coast Army Air Forces Training Center.

Hal Gibney's words on a recent "Soldiers With Wings" program told the whole Santa Ana broadcasting story at the close of a song by the Enlisted Men's Glee Club. The chorus is led by Sergeant Edgar Hauser, former voice director of the Los Angeles City Schools, and Sergeant Milton Young who, as a Redlands University undergraduate, won the Fred Waring national glee club soloist contest.

Gibney said: "Those singing voices you're hearing belong to some of Uncle Sam's soldiers with wings, being trained for you by the flying command on the West Coast, the Gulf Coast and the Southeast. When they get through their course they'll be your bombardiers, your navigators, your pilots and your gunners—and you can depend on this—they'll be the best in the world."

As well as serious messages, the gags come in rapid fire on the programs. Here's a sample:

Gage: (To D'Andrea) "Pardon me, Tom, but the Colonel wants to see you."

D'Andrea: "Is it official?"

Gage: "Yeah, it's something about K. P."

D'Andrea: "Yeah, K. P. It's a secret code, sort of a signal the Colonel and I have between ourselves. Did he send the staff car for me?"

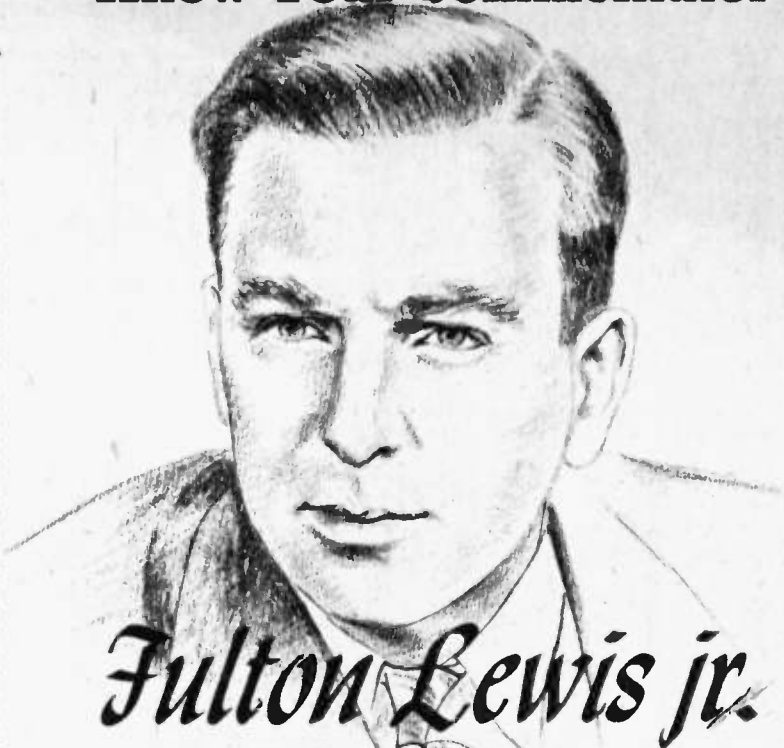
Gage: "No. But there's a mop outside the door. He said to ride that over!"

Santa Ana is a great air training center. It teaches young men to fly and care for plane engines, to attack the enemy, to protect themselves! It teaches them all the elements of courtesy and discipline. It teaches them the spirit of comradeship. Hear them come out of a broadcast singing, "Marching Along Together," and that will be fully realized.

But the spirit of home, the thing they're going to fight for,—is kept alive despite the life of discipline, by the radio center—it is the boys' center. He Pulls No Punches

FULTON LEWIS Jr., Mutual's ace reporter on national affairs, is a terse, affable person with a reputation for impartiality and for winning his fights. When Lewis gets on the trail of a story, neither time nor spending money (even his own) can stop him. As you probably remember, it was Lewis who fought for press privileges for radio commentators in the galleries of Congress; he it was, who picked up the first clues of irregularities in air mail contracts, which led to their cancellation; he was the one who scooped the Farnsworth espionage case in 1936.

Most recent example of the commentator's zeal is one which every car owner followed with interest. Said Lewis: "If full use is made of all synthetic rubber processes, the nation can be kept on wheels." Lewis conducted a one-man campaign which resulted in victory when Donald M. Nelson admitted we should have a much larger percentage of plants using alcohol for

production of rubber substitutes.

A native Washingtonian and resident of the District of Columbia, Lewis is automatically a non-voter who can exercise his political flair by turning prophet. Tenderoni in Beef Broth

Boiled Beef with Spinach Braized in Bacon

Sliced Tomatoes

Bread and Butter

Peaches

Coffee

Recipe for Tenderoni in Beef Broth

Put to cook in a pot 3 lbs. boiling beef covered with water one inch above the meat. As soon as the boiling point is reached, skim the broth well. Reduce the fire to simmer and cover the pot. Let simmer for two hours, or until the beef is tender. Remove beef from pot, strain, and season with 1 tsp. of Seasonettes, 1 tsp. of salt, and dash of pepper. Next, put to boil two quarts of water with two tps. of salt in a pot on top the stove. When the water boils rapidly, put to cook two packages of Tenderoni and let cook for seven minutes.
