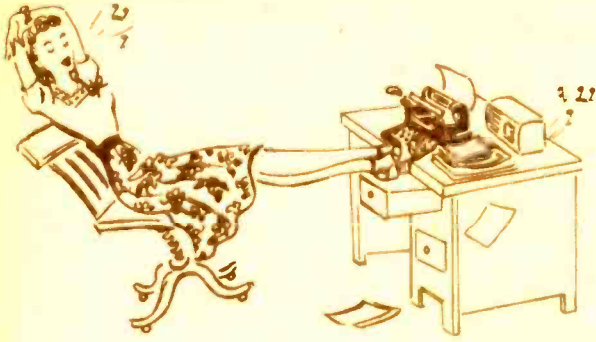

**This Smash Hit Hasn't "Come Back"—It's Never Been Away!**

clear, too. There is a vast difference between propaganda and art. In our eagerness to drive a significant point home, we try not to lose sight of the fact that "Abie" is primarily entertainment. We aim for the funny bone and the tear ducts in each episode. You can't top a combination of instruction and diversion. That, basically, is what we're trying to do.

Incidentally, I'd like to mention that "Abie" has not "come back" as an entertainment—it's never been away. I was informed only a few months ago that a company of traveling players in the English provinces is still performing the Murphy-Levy saga. Words are my business, but I just can't find enough of them to express the thrill that gave me.

For obvious reasons, Germany and Italy have put an emphatic ban on its theme. Matter of fact, Hitler, himself, mentions the play scathingly in "Mein Kampf." I treasure that sour notice more preciously than any fulsome critical praise I've ever collected. And here's a bit of irony: The play had its longest European run in Berlin, of all cities—six months.

While I'm at it, I'd like to register a small complaint, if I may. Don't think I could possibly resent anything about "Abie." How could I? But there's just one thing—it's obscured everything else I've ever done for Broadway. And that includes some dozen plays and musicals. A play of mine, called "Pre-Honey-moon" ran over a year. So did one called "Just Married." "Linger, Longer, Letty" was another.

But "Abie" always did have a faculty of obscuring all other chores. I've been radio-writing for the past half dozen years. But I guess that if I make any kind of significant mark in the medium at all, it will be for "Abie's Irish Rose" all over again.

Autheress Anne Nichols, whose "Abie's Irish Rose" netted \$400,000 on Broadway and who has a new four-year radio contract with her sponsor, Procter and Gamble.



I'VE been asked quite a good deal lately why I had "Abie's Irish Rose" brought back at this time. There's only one answer I have—if anybody can step up and tell me when, in history of this hectic world, the theme of love and tolerance has been more timely, I will step away from my typewriter for good. That's what all of us are fighting for today—to spread the democratic spirit around the globe and lift oppressed minorities from the unbelievable depths to which they've been forced.

Fundamentally, "Abie" reduces itself to this theme: That if any boy and girl are in love, nothing should militate against that feeling—neith-

er race, religion, or anything else under the sun. True love and respect stand against the world—they always have and they always will.

I'd like to forget about myself as author of "Abie's Irish Rose." What it's earned for me is theatrical history. It would be possible to coast on that. But what I'm proudest of is the fact that the radio industry and a significant part of the business world are willing—even anxious—to help rout bigotry and raise the banner of decent fellowship. And on a coast-to-coast hook-up, too.

If "Abie" does anything at all to spread sorely-needed tolerance around, I think it pretty well justifies itself. I'd like to make this point

## Editor's Comment:

**T**WENTY years ago, a struggling young actress got an idea for a Broadway play. She sat down at a typewriter and worked for exactly three days. At end of the third day, she was done and she called her opus "Abie's Irish Rose."

This saga of inter-faith marriage opened at the Fulton Theatre in New York on May 5th, 1922 and ran for five years and five months. Sixteen companies played it on the road, half a dozen troupes abroad. "Abie" was performed in German, French, and Spanish. It was acted in Portuguese, Russian, and Swedish. It got laughs and tears in Chinese and Dutch.

Today, it is still major entertainment in the radio field. Following an 11-week vacation from the air, "Abie," under the sponsorship of Procter and Gamble for Drene, returned to NBC early in October and now is heard every Saturday at 8 p. m.

Procter & Gamble bought "Abie" last January and by the first of April, the serial had broken all existing opening Crossley radio records for half-hour dramas, according to a

survey made and published by the Cooperative Analysis of Broadcasting.

This season, P&G tore up Author Nichols' old contract—wrote a new one for four years. Success of the radio series is bringing new offers to Miss Nichols, too. Major film companies are bidding for movie rights and a road company is being considered.

Rumor around Hollywood has it that the movie feelers were one reason for a change in the leading radio players. The idea was to select a photogenic radio actress and actor who might be able to carry on their parts in the cinema version as well. Hollywood wasn't surprised when Mercedes McCambridge, recently of its fold and now of New York City, was chosen for the radio role of "Rosemary." As the accompanying pictures suggest, Miss McCambridge would be able to hold her own before the critical camera. Richard Coogan was selected to play "Rosemary's" husband, "Abie."

Naturally if the movie plans jell, the radio show will be broadcast from the coast while the cameras are turning.

# A Dirty Laugh "Cleans Up"

How One Man Par-  
layed a Diabolical  
Guffaw Into a Four-  
Figured Salary

Peary personally answers all his fan mail, which rose to unprecedented proportions last season after he sang on his program. As a Spanish troubadour visiting Summerfield, he rendered "Rosita" with smashing success. Peary's sponsor, flooded with requests that he sing a complete song on the program, wired Hal: "For heaven's sake, do something!"

**H**ARROLD Jose Pereira de Faria finds that getting laughs out of a radio audience in America gives a man a better living than milking dairy cows in the Azores.

Harrold, whom a Sunday afternoon radio fan would know better as NBC's Harold Peary, or the "Great Gildersleeve," never lived in the Azores.

He was born in San Leandro, California.

But his father, a Portuguese im-

migrant, ran a dairy business in San Leandro when he wasn't dabbling in Oakland real estate on the side. For 300 years before that, the de Farias made a good and respectable living out of the dairy business near Fayal in the Azores. So milk meant a great deal more to young Harrold than a substance on which he was weaned. It was a family tradition.

Harrold's father left the Azores for America at the age of 16. In San Leandro he became a prosperous dairy man; he met and married

Donna D'Avilla, a pretty miss of Portuguese ancestry; and when they became parents of a son, the world of comedy gained its "Great Gildersleeve."

Harrold upset the apple cart (or milk cart, if you please) of family tradition at a very early age. He learned to mimic his neighbors. That he did without any assistance, and to this day he believes that the art of mimicry is something with which a man is born. It was his mother, however, who taught him to sing

"Great Gildersleeve" says he is building himself a doghouse. Actually, it's a 6x6 miniature on the back of his acreage in Encino. Peary plans to file his motion picture and radio scripts in the tiny structure.



and it was as a boy soprano that he first earned money as an entertainer until his voice changed and he turned to acting.

How Harrold struggled through those early days and finally won an amateurs' contest and started trouping with a bunch of juveniles is a matter of family history. All of that happened in Oakland and environs, where people still point to him with justifiable pride as a native product.

His real career, the one that brought him stardom with just one laugh, and a dirty laugh at that, dates back to the day he was hired by NBC in San Francisco as actor, singer, and dialect expert. Talent was short in those days and the hours were long. Harrold, his voice now a manly baritone and he himself rechristened Harold to befit his Americanization, dashed from one microphone where he had just finished singing "O Sole Mio," to another to play the conquering lover, and to a third to impersonate a Chinese servant.

It was hard for Harold to decide what he could do best. Like many Americans of European parents, he had a gift for languages, speaking not only English and Portuguese, but Spanish, Italian, French, and German. This knowledge, coupled with his gift of mimicry, gave him a command of dialects by the dozen. He still offers a standing bet that he can learn the dialect of any language on earth within 24 hours.

What finally sent Harold into comedy was a hidden desire that should make theater history. Most comedians yearn to be tragedians. Harold

was, in his more artistic roles, a radio tragedian who yearned to be a comedian. He finally got a chance on a broadcast called "The Spotlight Revue," which, Harold frankly admits, was inspired by a successful San Francisco run of "The Drunkard." The broadcast featured five minutes of hokum drama fashioned after "The Drunkard's" oHos. Harold played the villain and he invented a dirty laugh to match the villain's dirty soul. That was back in 1933. The show wasn't renewed and Peary's debut as a comedian didn't take. He went back to acting and did the next best thing to comedy for a frustrated comedian—playing straight man to other comedians.

Six years afterward, Harold was still playing straight man,—this time to Fibber McGee and Molly in Chicago. By this time he had even lost his ability to play a leading man. He had begun to take on weight, and nobody loves a fat hero. When Fibber McGee and Molly took their show on the road for personal appearances, straight man Peary went along. One night Peary was doing his bit with McGee at the Chicago Theater. Suddenly, some imp inspired him to cut loose with that old, villainous, San Francisco laugh. The

audience roared so hard that by next broadcast the laugh was in Fibber's radio script and Peary was born again as a comedian in the new character of "Gildersleeve." He became so popular in Fibber's show that last season he was grabbed off by a sponsor as a star in his own right on the series named "The Great Gildersleeve."

The trademark of the dirty laugh has served Harrold Jose Pereira de Faria beyond his wildest dreams. It has given him radio stardom and is also making him a star in pictures.

All of which fills Harrold, or Harrold, with an irresistible desire to drive by the Hollywood Bowl as fast as he can whenever he drives home from NBC. The Bowl, to him, is a place of memories that burn.

Some years ago a stock company in which he was the juvenile left him stranded in a cheap hotel on Hollywood boulevard. A pal who befriended him happened to be a newsboy making a good living selling papers. He talked Harold into trying it as a means of keeping body and soul together.

"Okay, I'll do it if you get me a corner where I won't bump into anybody who knows me," said Peary with resignation.

"You know me, pal" agreed the newsboy.

That night, covering the shame in his eyes with dark glasses, Peary was selling papers at the entrance to the Hollywood Bowl. It was the only "corner" his pal could get him.

"That," says Peary, "was the best job of acting I've ever done. A lot of my friends bought papers from me that night, and not a one recognized me!"

You hear him Sunday nights on Paul Carson's "Bridge to Dreamland," on "Hap Harrigan," and on "Fitch Bandwagon" when it originates locally.

## RADIO: West ★ National and International

### New Significance

For 24 years, America has been celebrating November 11 as the day which brought peace to the world.

Now at war again, the official Armistice Day exercises will have a special, deeper significance. From the amphitheater of the cemetery where lies the unknown soldier, prominent government officials will participate in an impressive program which will be brought to Americans over the NBC network from 7:57 to 8:30 a. m. We urge you to tune in. **KFI, 7:57 a.m., Wed.**

### Instructions by Radio

Radio entered a new field last week. There were so many new election officers this year that it was impossible to get them together in classes for their instruction.

So radio stepped in and filled the bill when the instruction was given via the mike to some 32,200 election judges and clerks in the duties they performed on election day.

### Soap Opera Listeners

Some startling revelations as to what daytime serial listeners are not were brought to light a couple of weeks ago with publication of data from a survey made by Dr. Herta Herzog, radio research, Columbia University. In her report, Dr. Herzog branded as untrue the many aspersions which have been cast on the mentality and emotional stability of daytime listeners. Where conclusions from previously accepted surveys were drawn from families with telephones, Dr. Herzog's survey took into consideration homes without telephones and she avers that her survey showed that there were more listeners in non-telephone homes.

She found practically no difference Intellectually, emotionally, or religiously between listeners and non-listeners. There appeared to be the same number of voters in both groups, both seemed to have similar contacts in church and social activities, both attended the movies about the same.

Chief difference was apparent in one regard: the daytime listeners did not seem to possess sophistication comparable to non-listeners and were more regular listeners of radio both during the day and night time. Most women who were questioned were listening to the soap operas for escape

from reality or to gain insight into living. Most of the women also admitted that they tuned in to one station and listened to the various soap operas as they came along, without switching back and forth from one network to another. But these same listeners, when asked about news programs, came out with definite selections which showed discrimination.

Thus, those of you Radio Life home-makers who have been "kidded" about fondness for "Lonely Women," "Valiant Lady," and the score or more of similar Monday-Friday serials may now listen in pleasure unconfined, knowing that a Columbia University faculty member has statistics to prove that you are perfectly normal, not an emotionally thwarted individual, or one who lives vicariously to the exclusion of real life interests.

### Tallest Announcer

Radio Life isn't relying on mere words to tell you about radio's tallest announcer. Elsewhere in this section you will find a picture of Carl Bailey, offered as visual and conclusive proof. Carl gives the yardstick a six foot 10 run-around.

His claim for distinction doesn't

necessarily begin and terminate with his loftiness. Carl has one of the cleverest late-at-night programs now airing in this neck of the woods. Every evening, save Wednesday, at 10:30 o'clock he whips out a brisk line of informal patter over station KPAS for the Zamboanga, a South sea cafe and night club on West Slauson Avenue.

We won't attempt to describe Carl's broadcast. You'll have to tune him in to get the idea. But how popular his appeal is may be summarized in a few cold business figures.

In August 1940, the Zamboanga's owner, Joe Chastek, decided to "take a crack at radio advertising." Incidentally, all of Joe's decorations are authentic, because he spent 12 years on the other side of the Pacific and seven of the 12 at Zamboanga, for which his place is named.

Carl, who has been in radio for 12 years and has kept a night program on the hop for five, is averse to long commercials, so he slips his Zamboanga plugs in "quick-like, when nobody is looking." Long-winded announcers might well take a tip from Carl. He seems to get results in his own way and his listeners write in to say: "This is the first program on which we've ever liked the commercials." **KPAS, 10:30 p.m. Thurs.-Tues.**

## Lutheran Hour Scores

In opening the tenth season of the Lutheran Hour over the Mutual network on October 25th, Dr. Walter A. Maier protested against what he termed "a growing wave of profanity and blasphemy." Recalling that George Washington appealed to American army officers to help check the growing evil of profanity by their own example, the radio evangelist criticized the increasing appearance of profanity in publications as well as in stage plays. It would have been doubly great because I doubt he ever dreamed that Toscanini one day would play a selection he wrote to demonstrate that there was real music in the dance halls of America."

## Telling Secrets

Service men little realize that when they step inside the CBS studio to hear a dress rehearsal of the Lux Radio Theater, they automatically become emotional guinea pigs for producer Cecil B. De Mille. De Mille says, "Their reactions to the play prove an infallible method of figuring out in advance how a play will go over with the Monday night radio audience."

For some months now the dress rehearsals have been open to members of the armed service and standing invitations are posted at the USO and other places where men in uniform are likely to see them. The usual turn-out at the "dress" is seven or eight hundred men.

Without being conspicuous, De Mille observes their reactions to the play, and the way their attention is held to the performers at the microphone. If a piece is not emotionally moving, the men fidget in their seats, watch the engineer, and are otherwise distracted.

Thus, besides providing an interesting recreational opportunity for service men, the scheme has been valuable to the program, as frequently faults are discovered and corrected before the broadcast. Comedians have used a rehearsal audience for years to test their shows, but this is the first instance of it being done with dramatic presentations.

In this corner, ladees and gennelmen, we have your new purveyor of platter patter who'll endeavor each week to keep you cognizant of what goes on in the recorded music dept. Also, chit and chat about the various disc and band personalities. So stick around and give us the once-over, and we hope you'll be back again each week.

To start off, we want to tell you a story which is very much Hollywood's own. It concerns the new Capitol Records, and how that company is growing to success with Hollywood radio talent.

Now, before Capitol came on the scene last spring, a lot of excellent radio talent went by the boards as far as the major record companies were concerned.

Astute Glenn Wallichs, who has been impresario at Hollywood's Music City for several years, realized this, and when he launched Capitol in partnership with Buddy DeSylva and Johnny Mercer, he was quick to sign up the best available talent among Hollywood's radio artists.

That's why Capitol's roster boasts such familiar names as Paul Whiteman, Martha Tilton, Gordon Jenkins, Bob Carroll, Johnnie Johnston, Connie Haines, Freddie Slack, Dennis Day. All, with the exception of Whiteman, are new as stellar disc artists.

So Capitol came along and gave Hollywood radio talent a break in the recording field, but don't think that this same Hollywood talent hasn't given Capitol a break!

Martha Tilton's waxing of "I'LL REMEMBER APRIL" (Capitol 105) has been hailed as her greatest work. Dennis Day's "JOHNNY DOUGHBOY" and "PHIL, THE FLUTER'S BALL" (Capitol 104) established that young tenor as a definite recording find.

"COW-COW BOOGIE," "HE'S MY GUY," and "MR. FIVE BY FIVE" are three records which have brought out and told the world about Freddie Slack's orchestra, with vocalist Ella Mae Morse.

Connie Haines made an auspicious debut with "HE WEARS A PAIR OF SILVER WINGS," and Gordon Jenkins' orchestra has shone brilliantly in a number of instrumental recordings.

The Hollywood Palladium's Jimmy Dorsey has a Decca hit in "BRAZIL," with vocals by Bob Eberly and Helen O'Connell. "DAYBREAK," on the reverse side, is based on the "Mardi Gras" theme from Ferde Grofe's "Mississippi Suite," with vocal by Eberly.

Freddy Martin fans will rally around his latest Victor recording, "A TOUCH OF TEXAS," a sprightly new novelty with vocals by Eddie Stone, Glenn Hughes, and the Martin Men. Flip it over and you'll hear Martin's new vocal find, Gene Ground, singing "SOFT HEARTED."

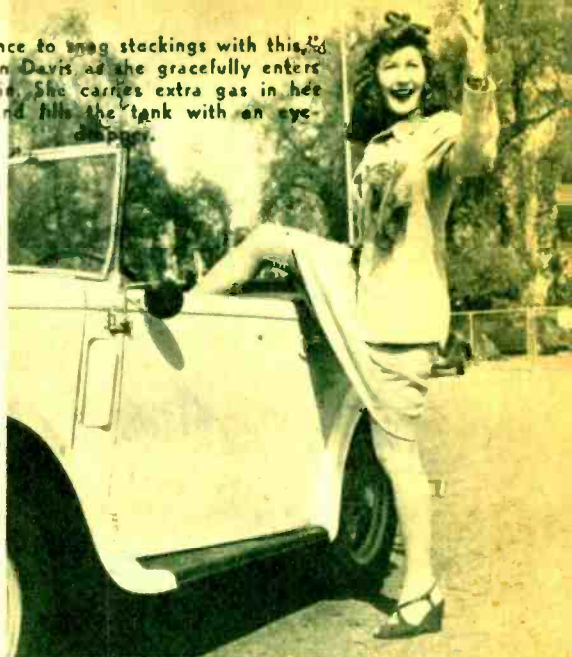

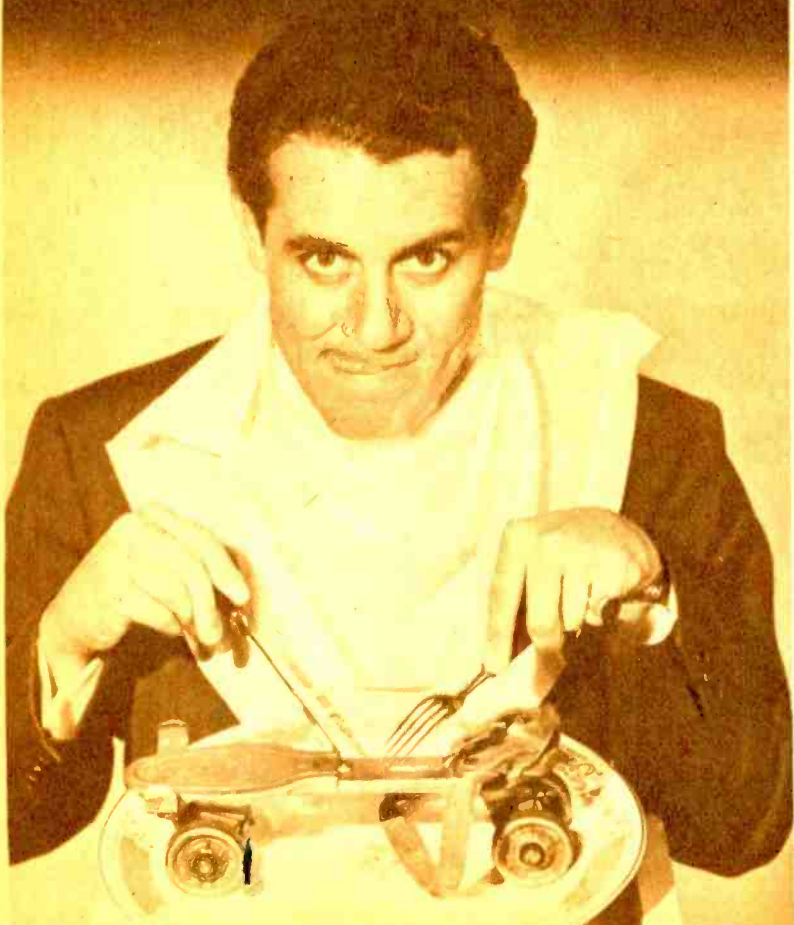

# Want To Crash Radio?

Read What Radio Life Has to Say About Voice Auditions

HERE she stood in the NBC studio, singing her heart out in front of the microphone.

She was only 17, petite, wistful; but her rich, throaty tones gave one a warm feeling and her crystalline enunciated words fell like smart rain drops on a dusty sidewalk.

To the audition experts inside the booth, she had been just another girl until she parted her lips and started to croon "My Devotion." The moment she sidled up to the microphone and half-hummed, half-sang the first phrase of the song, the experts knew that she was a "find."

She kept the fingers of both hands crossed until the final note died away, then she looked up to the control room with hope and eagerness for approbation lurking in every soft curve of her face.

"That's fine, Bevy Lou," said Charles Dant, musical director of NBC and one of the men listening in the booth. "Will you stay to see me after the auditions are over?"

That invitation marked the first chapter in the story of an ambitious, talented girl who acquitted herself favorably on one of NBC's weekly auditions and thereby placed her foot on the bottom rung of a ladder which may, some day, take her to tread with the stars.

Of course it must be admitted that Bevy Lou's success with her audition was unusual. Out of the weekly crop

of aspirants trying out at the routine, Wednesday sessions, it is common to discover only one good singer out of approximately 50.

But Bevy Lou's access to the audition was by no means difficult. She had sung over the air at a smaller station on the same program with Rex Koury, audition accompanist. Rex had asked Charles Dant to hear Bevy Lou at the next accessible date.

If she had not known the audition director or the pianist, Bevy Lou might still have showcased her voice by filling out one of the application blanks available in the NBC foyer. Then, she would have awaited her summons to appear.

To watch an audition in the control room with Charles Dant is an emotional strain if one is at all sympathetic. The yearning behind every note, the ill-concealed nervousness of the amateur, are difficult to witness.

The men listening in the control room can tell with the first phrase of a song whether the auditioner "has what it takes." Sometimes the candidate's stance before the microphone denotes experience and poise.

"This girl walks like a professional," one of the experts said as he noted an auditioner enter the studio.

As a singer carries on with his or her chosen number, the committee members with Dant sitting in review mark down "good," "fair," or

## *It Is to War-Time Morale What the Leafy Vegetable Is to Popeye's Muscles*

**G**HE lean, deeply etched face of Henry Svedrofsky broke into a smile. His love of Strauss waltzes and the deep throated roar and purr of a full symphony orchestra were engraved on his kind, lined face.

We asked for an explanation. He had our interest.

"What spinach is to the muscles of Popeye," he explains, "music is to the spirit of American boys and girls."

No military victory can be won without soldier and civilian morale. The noted conductor declared as he made arrangements at Hollywood Radio City for his "Standard Symphony" program over NBC, Sunday, at 9 p. m.

Radio's place in the national musical scheme is of top ranking import, bringing the world's finest music into millions of homes and developing an appreciation of the best that is offered.

Now, with the world aflame with war, radio has enlisted in the fray for the duration, performing its vital service of morale building at home and abroad, its enlightening beams flashing a stirring message of cheer to our fighting men on every blood-soaked battlefield.

It is good, and very necessary, during these troublesome times when minds are flooded with horrors of the conflict and hearts are bursting with grief and loneliness, to turn occasionally to cultural music.

The whole story of mankind is told

in the rich, romantic tone paintings which the great masters have created. Let the rainbow lights of tone, the colors of harmony, the jewels of melody bring peace and comfort to your aching heart.

But if, perchance, you have never been vitally awakened to the despairing cry of the conquered nations, or the war cry of your own America, one of the martial rhythms should set your zeal aglow. Human nature is strongly stirred by music, a universal force so powerful it evokes emotional responses of sufficient magnitude to sway an entire nation.

Building an American national musical culture is an urgent need today. Teaching American youth to love and understand music must be the primary platform on which such a cultural program is based. Love of music, like any other emotion, cannot be forced. It must be a natural growth, stimulated by complete understanding and familiarity with the best the world has to offer.

"Before American boys and girls really learn to love music they must regard it as entertainment, rather than as education. Any educative program that deviates from this fundamental truth will fall short of the mark," says Edwin McArthur, brilliant conductor who led the "Standard Symphony" for its first five broadcasts this season. American schools, he said, have already made outstanding advances in teaching music to our youth. Patriotic music, he believes should become an in-

tegral part of our national educational system—a feature of every public gathering, no matter what its size. This he regards as a vital stimulus to a strong, national spirit rooted in pride of country.

Inspiring music is presented each week by the Standard Symphony under the direction of the world's finest conductors. Listen to this program, for only by familiarity with the classics, can we grow to love and profit by them.

Do you hide a bored yawn at the mention of listening to Paganini? Paganini was the pet of the lovely women of the French aristocratic salons. Practically every "frail" of the 18th century swooned at the magic of his magnetic personality. His music has captured much of that charm. See if you can detect it.

Or how about a little sinister ghost music? One of the most romantic incidents of Mozart's life was in connection with a dinner party. He was a guest at a princely house in Prague. Leaving the table where the champagne was bubbling in crystal glasses in the candle light, he stole into a dark, quiet, adjoining room, where the piano stood, and drew out of his soul such powerful, sinister music that his fellow guests set their glasses down untasted, feeling themselves in the presence of some supernatural menace. That ghostly music became the entrance of the "Stone Statue" in his "Don Giovanni." Listen for it! Request it if you like. These symphonies are yours to command.

# Johnny ON THE SPOT

Dear Friends:

This is a letter I've had on my mind for many weeks. I have not posted it before in the hope that the thoughts contained herein might be tied together in a single package when the time was right.

The time appears to be right. So here goes yours truly—with some special thoughts from me to you . . . thoughts which are an outgrowth of a few months' training in one of Uncle Sam's uniforms.

First, there's a word called attitude. To me it proved to be the most important word in the "boot camp" dictionary at the Marine Corps Base. The fellow with the "right attitude" was the Marine who profited by those initial weeks of basic training. He was the Marine who never questioned orders given by his superior; the Marine who pitched hard and true every minute of every working day; the Marine who never flinched when the going got tough. . . . And I was just thinking since my return from San Diego that the "right attitude" is the all-important factor in our drive for Victory in this war. It's up to all of us—civilians and soldiers alike—to "get that attitude," the attitude that allows no time for griping, no time for negative thoughts and a complete surrender of any desire for personal profit through the circumstances that find us involved in the conflict.

My own personal conviction is this—that we are all "in uniform" if our attitude is right. America's uniform is our attitude—and there's no doubt that this uniform, or attitude, can prove the difference between a Victory for the All-American Way of Life or utter defeat of the principles of freedom throughout the world.

We've all had the word "teamwork" drummed into our ears since the day we first tried to win a place on the school team, but I never knew the full meaning, the all-embracing value of teamwork until I saw the miracles Corporal E. K. Stone, the Missouri-born platoon leader of 576, performed during those weeks of "boot camp" with 63 green recruits who hailed from Fort Wayne to Fresno. When each private reached the point where he had the "right attitude" Platoon 576 achieved that attribute known as "teamwork" and as a result several non-commissioned officers admitted when our unit scattered that last week of September that "this outfit reminds us of a good football team because of its teamwork."

Yes, it's just like a superior radio show. Broadcasts don't just happen onto a high Hooper or Crossley rating, you know. It's no stroke of luck. It's a case of teamwork among the members of a cast and the ability of those persons to accept the proper direction from the men who formulate the program. Just one single person can retard the progress of many. One member of a radio cast through a lack of the "right attitude" can keep an entire group of talented people from attaining their rightful place in the radio sun. And it's the same idea with our Fight For Freedom. Just a few of us, among millions, can weaken and impede the drive our United Nations have launched to rid the world of those tyrants who would destroy the things which Americans have always fought to defend and preserve.

Until you join one of the armed forces and get away from familiar haunts and the love that surrounds your home you are often guilty of taking things for granted. I know that through the years nobody was more guilty of this than the writer. Many of us at San Diego pledged ourselves to a new set of ideals—among them the promise that we would never again take things for granted. . . . that we would never be guilty of careless, wishful thinking; that we take a down-to-earth, practical approach to the job at hand. . . . no matter what that job might be. Many of us talked in "boot camp" of our past, present and future. We were unanimous in our conviction that never again would

we allow ourselves to endanger the American Way of Life and that with our own house in order it would be possible for the world to come to order.

From time to time, if I may, I would like to post a letter to you people whose enthusiasm and personal interest in the things Radio Life Magazine has been trying to accomplish for the past few years have made our jobs on the editorial staff a real inspiration.

leave a blank on their outspread pieces of paper. If the applicant has a good voice, the control room remains respectfully quiet. If the auditioner is not the type needed by the studio, the conversation inside the booth may range from the weather to the Russian front.

Sometimes an auditioner lacks only maturity or poise and the expert tells him so, asking him to return when he can qualify.

If a singer is good enough to pass an audition, what then?

Generally, he or she is spotted on one of the NBC sustaining shows. At present there are about eight such programs a week using singers. If the vocalist performs commendably on the assignments, bigger opportunities may be made available.

An example of a candidate who made good is Bob Carroll, who came into NBC via the audition route and ended up this past summer as featured singer on the Meredith Willson-John Nesbitt show. Kitty Kallen entered NBC's singing ranks similarly.

If you, Radio Life reader, have had someone tell you, "You have a nice voice. You ought to be in radio", think carefully before exposing your ego to the audition test.

Ask yourself: Have I had sufficient study of music? Even if I have had professional experience, am I ready for radio? Have I a sufficiently large repertoire to sustain my work if I do win an audition? If I am placed on a show, am I adaptable and do I catch on to new things quickly?

Only if you answer "yes" to all of these queries should you take your courage in tow and apply.

## Good Idea



# H. V. Kaltenborn

DEAN OF THEM ALL

WHEN H. V. Kaltenborn speaks on the air, he does so with authority . . . authority that can only come from actual contact with those about whom he is speaking. Few columnists today have his background,—20 years of news experience. It is from this fount that he draws his keen, logical perception. During his career as a news analyst he has broadcast interviews with Mussolini, Gandhi, Hitler, and Chiang Kai-shek; has been one of the few foreigners to speak over a Moscow station, has been captured and held for ransom by Chinese bandits; and was the first to cover, with a microphone, a battle—the attack upon Irun, Spain.

Seems as though Kaltenborn has always been afflicted with an incurable wanderlust. In the past 27 years he has made 25 trips to Europe—the first by cattle boat, the latest by clipper.

On one of these European trips, Kaltenborn met romance in the form of a German ambassador's daughter, the Baroness Olga von Nordenvlycht. The Baroness always acts as his secretary when he goes abroad, and together they have

won enough cups at lawn tennis to serve a cocktail party of 24 persons. They have two children, now both married, and live in a typical brownstone house in Brooklyn Heights.

Despairing parents whose offspring hold a distinct aversion to school may find some comfort in Hans Kaltenborn's career. "For some reason," H. V. reports, "I didn't like school, and the feeling was mutual." At 14 he ran away from home to see the world and seek his fortune. At 28 the appalling need for an education struck home and he became a Harvard freshman. Working his own way he graduated cum laude, won the coveted Phi Beta Kappa key, the Boylston prize for public speaking, and the Coolidge prize for debating. He also tutored young Vincent Astor, and prepared him for Harvard.

While he is speaking to his nationwide NBC audience at 5 p. m. Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays he invariably plays with a small piece of metal. He has a large collection of these "pocket pieces" selected from all over the world. His favorite is a piece of amber, in which three flies and a moth have been crystallized.

## IN THE SOUP:

This is the history of canned foods in general and canned soup in particular. Any of you who like to cook with the twist of a can opener take heed.

The man who deserves your gratitude is Louis Pasteur, the famous scientist who made the theory of pasteurization a practical thing.

Almost a hundred years ago, sometime around the beginning of the Civil War, he became interested in canning soup. He sterilized some flasks of bouillon and beef broth by heating them and then sealing them hermetically. You do pretty much the same thing when you can fruit.

Well, Pasteur proved that in this way the germs that cause food to spoil were sealed out—excluded. Thus we would be able to keep food for an indefinite period.

One of the 78-year-old flasks of soup that Pasteur canned for his experiment is still in existence. It is owned by Doctor La Place of Philadelphia, and it was given to him by his father who was an assistant to Pasteur. In spite of being handed down from father to son for nearly a century, the soup is still in perfect condition.
