

Radio's Contribution to the Art of Acting By Les Mitchel

HE OTHER DAY a gentleman asked me what was apparently a simple question, "What has radio contributed to the art of acting?" Suddenly I was made to realize that consciously and sometimes sub-consciously a new technique of acting had been developed thru radio and that, apparently, many actors, directors and listeners have not realized that it is a technique and a distinct contribution to the art of acting.

Basically, acting was developed in the theater. There the audience was separated from the actors by various distances, depending on the size of the theater. Naturally their acting was developed to overcome that separation. Makeup was used t o project their features to the audience with as much reality as could be achieved—features were emphasized, colors were used to emphasize the features of the players and to point up their relation to the character being played.

Acting was directed to the last row of seats in the theater s in c e those sitting far removed from the stage must be entertained as well as those in the first row. Consequently the movements of the actors were exaggerated, characterization depended on the bodily movement of the players or pantomime. This, too, was much broader than an exact duplication of real life would have been. Again the actor had to conform to the limitations or should I say expansions of the medium in which he must try to create an illusion.

Therefore, to the observer who was too close to the performer, there was an exaggeration of illustration in the actors' work which was very broad or unnatural. This the onlooker was prone to accept because of his acceptance of theatrical conventions, i.e., the three-sided room, people shouting whispers, murder committed in front of hundreds of onlookers and all the other multitudinous incongruities of the theater.

Through the centuries, the theater underwent many changes. The methods of writing, staging and viewing plays gradually gave forth the development of the theater of today. Comparatively recently the trend

has been to so-called "underplaying." This seeming to mean an uninspired parrotting of learned lines and moods. In fact, one well known critic, a few years ago was impelled to say, "Actors today underplay to such an extent that they have ceased to. act.

Movies

However, this short manuscript Is not meant to be a discussion of acting so let us glance quickly at the technique of motion picture acting before we compare the three mediums of Theater, Motion Picture and Radio.

Actors long-trained in the technique of the theater soon discovered that when they appeared before the camera they had to change radically the methods of interpretation customarily used. The enlarged image of themselves that was flashed on the screen, in most cases, provided each newcomer with a startling shock. Little mannerisms never before realized were held up to the individual in all the impersonalness of the abstract.

Tricks of speech, faults in posture, idiosyncrasies of movement were spread before them and the world in all their nakedness. The custom-

It was shortly after that first meeting with the youthful Mr. Westrope that Nan, at the age of twelve, came to Hollywood with her mother and made her screen debut.


"I told everybody I was sixteen," related Nan, "and they believed me. I was as big then as I am now!"

"Groaner" Sinatra



Broadway Columnist Earl Wilson Adds Weekly to His Collection Of "Wilsonisms", Plays Host to Personally Insulted Celebrities

HEN I read that Earl Wilson, the "late knight of Broadway," the "midnight Earl," was going on the air in a regular weekly pro-

a regular weekly program series, my heart went out to the Mutual network's continuity acceptance editor. What a job—editing the script of the zany columnist who is famous for his coloratura copy, his analysis of the anatomy, and his frank (to the point of almost being fresh) references to the feminine contour, natural and applied. So you can be sure I marked my radio calendar for Sunday, January 7, 7:00 p.m., when Wilson began his new series on KHJ-Mutual Don Lee. I wanted to be sure to hear the first of the Earl Wilson broadcasts — I wanted to see how this negligee nighthawk would adapt himself to the code of the airwaves.

Well, Earl did all right—and so did the Mutual continuity acceptance editor, courageous critic that he is. The night-spot reporter and commentator has had ten years of Broadway as background for his air show.

trolled his tendency to refurbish the standard contemporary vocabulary with pithy coinages of his own, and the censor allowed enough innuendo to slip into the script to keep intact that inimitable zaniness and little boy smartiness that has brought Wilson fame as a columnist in the New York Post, the Los Angeles Daily News and a dozen other metropolitan papers.

As a matter of fact, Wilson's quarter-hour broadcasts pack in as much variety as he gets into a whole week of columns. With announcer Paul Douglas to volley insults with, Wilson has his weekly guests—first Tallulah Bankhead, then Fred Allen, to give the listener all idea of the invitation list he is setting up. Then, he has his more serious moments when he unveils important highlights about the celebrated in the news, and he has a line or two of gossip to share, despite the fact that he says he is not a gossip columnist. In between and fore and aft all these items are the Wilson quips and gags, the ones he originates and the ones he duplicates.

Who Is B. W.?

One of his most famous gag lines is woven around Broadway's most talked of non-professional, "B.W. the one woman Mrs. Wilson trusts." Now, Wilson's fans know "B.W." is his own "beautiful wife," his companion on most of his saloon tours because "people might talk—especially my B.W." Mrs. Wilson is also the foil for her husbands' daring quips and comments about the bright lights of Broadway and the personalities upon whom the gleam falls ard is, of course, a very necessary, though silent, partner in the broadcasts.

Another point well made on the broadcasts is a bit of biography on Wilson—the admission that he is a yokel boy who made good in the large city. Like so many of the other writers who have risen to fame commenting on the ways and the waywardness of celebrities, Wilson was a small town product. He was born on a small farm near Brockford, Ohio, where about 1000 townsfolk watched him peddle papers before and after school, and heard him yow that he was going to be a real newspaper man some day.

Joins Fourth Estate

He was, in the real sense of the word, too, for a few years on the Washington Post and on the Akron Beacon-Journal, where he made a small bit of newspaper history on one occasion by talking some officers of the law out of arresting the late Heywood Broun.

T'S A well-known fact that Harry James would rather talk baseball than music. The other day we found out that he'd rather talk about anything than him-

Lounging his slim six feet one in the den of his Coldwater Canyon home, "The Horn" made the amazing pronouncement that even he and his shapely wife, Betty Grable, do not discuss one another's careers at home.

"Never discuss your work?", Radio Life asked incredulously.

"Why should we?", countered James phlegmatically, "She doesn't, know much about my work and I don't know much about hers. If I said anything about her work it would embarrass her and I know the same would be true of me."

We'd heard that the Jameses weren't what one would call "publicity hounds" . . . that they recognize publicity as part of fame's obligations, as something important for a star to do in line of careerduty. Harry made no pretense about it when we asked him how he and Betty spent their leisure time.

It seems they stay home a lot because they can't go out like any normal young couple without having their clothes torn and a mob of people demanding autographs. That's why you'll sometimes stumble o n Mr. and Mrs. James eating dinner in some out-of-the-way restaurant where the steaks are good a n d thick, but the fans are few and far between. As far as his lines in both movies and on the radio are concerned James made one point clear. "I've been working as an orchestra leader for six years and whatever I do, I want to be myself!"

He did just that on the opening Danny Kaye show, where "Mr. Pabst," the sponsor, was written into the script as meeting members of the cast.

KAYE: And you know our orchestra leader, Harry James?

PABST: Yes, of course. That's my blow-ribbon boy.

the Kickoff Luncheon, traditional pre-Rose Bowl Game banquet. Samuelsen is KFI's Saturday sportscaster, whose sports views reflect the human side of events.

Play

Samuelsen has never had "mike fright," but he claims he c a m e mighty close to it when he had to interview a top coach before a prewar Rose Bowl Game. All during the Kickoff Luncheon the coach looked half-frightened to death and was beset with the most terrible case of "mike fright" Samuelsen had ever seen.

"I finally convinced him to pretend he was talking to me and to ignore the fifteen hundred people filling the banquet half. After the broadcast was finished, I think I was more nervous than the coach, who swore he was cured of 'mike fright,' thanks to me," grinned Samuelsen.

In addition to keeping abreast with present sports news, Samuelsen believes that what G. I. Joe is doing and thinking is the biggest news in the world. And this is what he keeps in mind when he relays to the radio public descriptive, philosophical, and humorous happenings and opinions from the overseas mail, which is a featurette of his program.

"It behooves us to know of what they're thinking," Samuelsen says. "We're going to have a lot of postwar problems which will closely tie in and become one with the problems of G. I. Joe. By learning what's going on on their side of the fence, we can work on their problems right down the line and better understand just what others we're going to have to meet in the future."

Is Newsman

Samuelsen is a newspaperman from way back—he's sports editor

of the Pasadena Star-News and Post —and attempts to bring into his program those "human" things the newspapers are forced to overlook because of space limitations.

He's a big, heavy-set man, topped by an iron-gray thatch, and he possesses an attention-holding manner and a radiogenic voice. Fairness and squareness seem to be as much a part of him as breathing.

For the last four years, in addition to his duties as an editor, he has been sportscasting on the airlanes. Before he started his current NBC show, he did several broadcasts devoted to "Letters From Servicemen" which was in content exactly the reverse of his "A Letter To The Service." He has always specialized in messages from former athletes and regularly conducts a roll-call of ex-gridiron favorites.

Like all good newspapermen, Samuelsen likes people, and has tremendous faith in human nature. "People want to know the funny and interesting things about other people and what happens to them," he says. "But a sportscaster has 'the important responsibility of being doubly sure of what he says and only presenting fact, not fiction."

Gag Backfired

Returning to the subject of the Kickoff Luncheon, Samuelsen recalled a gag that boomeranged.

In the excitement of the game, Samuelsen forgot to retract the statement—in fact, he forgot all about it. The rumor got around and the Associated Press sent the false story out over the wire before anyone had a chance to deny it. Samuelsen laughed and said that the payoff came when he flew home only to find the hoax headlined in his own paper.

From buck privates and admirals, famous names and comparative nonentities—Samuelsen receives letters from the high and low in the military hierarchy. He recently featured a personal letter from General Patton to his sister. This was the first direct word from Patton since his historic drive into France.

"Sports With Rube Samuelsen" is a half-hour show dedicated to reporting current sports news. Samuelsen specializes in bringing h is listeners the story behind the story. He has not deviated from the style of presenting humorous backstage happenings or letters from prominent athletes.

"I believe there is a lot of big news in this war that radio and press war correspondents cannot give to the people because of time and space and censorship—human things that are every bit as significant as terse war communiques and a lot more understandable to the folks back home." These are some of the things he likes to bring listeners in his report of sports.

ary stage reaction suddenly assumed the magnitude of distortion. An eyebrow raised a half inch in the manner of the stage suddenly jumped a foot on the screen . eyes that could be opened and closed at will on the stage suddenly appeared to be possessed of St. Vitus when batted before the camera.

In fact, all movement had to be adjusted to the preemptory demands of the all-seeing eye of the camera and the magnification of that all-seeing eye of the camera and the magnification of the movie screen. Consequently, the actor had to acquire a method of pantomimic expression reduced to a great extent from that formerly used. Inasmuch as the enlarged screen focused attention on the picture there has appeared to develop a casual treatment of expression in the use of dialogue to such an extent that when one closes one's eyes while viewing a motion picture, the dialogue is, in most cases, unintelligible.

This leads to a direct comparison with Radio where the actor must have everything in his voice in order to portray a character convincingly.

Medium of Radio

Radio has bound the dramatic actor in the narrowest limits of any of the dramatic mediums ever used. The radio actor has no scenery except music and the small descriptive help of a narrator or announcer. From there on the meaning of situation and dialogue depends on the skill of the actor in using his voice and to characterize and dramatize with his voice and his knowledge.

If the feeling that is inspired by the dialogue is not manifest in the tone and inflection, pacing and general deportment, the radio actor cannot hope to convince.

Another deciding factor in determining the difference in technique for radio, theater and screen, is particularly true in the matter of perspective. As I have remarked earlier in this discussion, the physical limitations of where the acting is performed must of necessity follow the technique with which the actor portrays.

For some strange reason the average actor, and it may be said many directors, has not come to realize the physical quality that determines accurate repression of the air. By this I mean, an actor, while he apparently is doing his acting in a studio, is heard and realised under entirely different circumstances.

As Clarence Menser, a network program head, pointed out in an article a couple of years ago, "The radio actor isn't, as many seem to think, addressing himself to an audience of a million or twenty million, but in actuality is addressing a million audiences of one or two people." This is not an exact quotation, but it is an accurate re-statement of his ideas and if it is not, I do hereby apologize to him. However, the fact which should be all too apparent is constantly ignored.

The radio audience is just as close to the actor as they are to their loud speaker. The actor is in exactly the same position when emoting on the airways as he would be were he declaiming in the living room or the kitchen of his listener's home. I wonder how many actors would consider sitting or standing in a small apartment of twelve or fifteen feet, and ranting and shouting to their audience which is seated four or five feet away.

Yet, virtually every radio program that is heard, allows the actor to indulge himself and his psuedo-emotions to the limit.

Daytime Acting

Much has been said pro and con concerning daytime radio and the inevitable stories which run for years. However, I would like to point out that the majority of daytime radio shows offer performances far truer and in much better taste than most of the big shows starring leading figures of stage and screen. These people, much at home in their own medium, for the most part do not adapt themself to the limitations of radio.

In the main they read in stiff declamatory style and since in their medium acute attention is not paid to dialogue interpretation, they do not give the fineness of performance in handling their radio dialogue.

Now we come to the question originally asked by my friend—what has radio contributed to dramatic art. I am completely convinced that radio and fine radio actors have brought to the art of dramatic interpretation the finest interpretation of dialogue that the theater has ever known. They have given a new meaning to the art of repression by incorporating in their voices all the explanatory inflections necessary to make an unseen audience completely understand and sympathize with whatever characterization they are doing.

A new technique which can be characterized as the finest example of creating tone and word pictures. In my opinion this is not an art that is fully developed as yet, but it is one which holds great promise for the future and offers a distinct challenge to the serious and artistic actor.

About 1936 Wilson went to New York and combined his inspection of the Great White Way with earning a living—he became night club editor of the New York Post. When Post readers expressed their delight in the amusing and quotable Wilsonisms he developed, he was given a by-line and began the famous "I t Happened Last Night" column now syndicated throughout the nation.

A devotee of gags, Wilson packs his broadcasts as well as his column with them. One of his favorite routines is the expression that his interviews, all conducted on a very personal basis, by the way, are by request. His own request. Accused of being a snoop with two stomachs, three chins, and a poisonous personality, Wilson counters that his is a compelling personality — "when I compel them, they stay."

Wilson thinks repetition is merely a sure way of giving a good gag plenty of opportunities to be appreciated, and points out that any similarity between his quips and those of other funny men can be accounted for by the fact that great minds often "sink to a common low level."

Again like so many other columnists, Wilson's private life is combed for material with which to entertain his fans, and probably to save the wear and tear on his arches. The classic Wilsonism en famille is being used as the dedication to his new book, "It Happened Last Night." On the frontispiece is this note "To the woman who cooks my meals, mends my sox and minds my son — my mother-in-law."
