The Affairs of Ann Scotland

—And Arlene Francis, Whose Urbanity on the Air Combines with Helen Mack's Directorial Skill to Make This Comedy-Mystery Offering Worthwhile

OF course, there is hardly a dearth of "private eyes" on the airlines today, nor any scarcity of mystery-comedy fare, so that, when ABC's "The Affairs of Ann Scotland" debuted, it was only natural

for it to be regarded as "another one" and subjected to intensified critical scrutiny.

That it has emerged in a more than passable light is therefore all the more to its credit. For this, hats should be doffed particularly in the direction of its producer, Helen Mack, and its star, Arlene Francis, both of whom know how to get the most out of any script.

You, who automatically bristle interestedly at the thought of a feminine twosome at swordpoints over a script, will have to be disappointed. Observing Miss Mack at her directorial post in the control booth during an "Ann Scotland" airing, we watched her beam with genuine admiration at Miss Francis' interpretation of the flip-tongued female sleuth, and later, in conversation

with the show's star, we listened to Arlene volunteer obviously sincere comments concerning producer Mack's directorial diplomacy and conscientious concern over presenting a script to perfection.

"She's wonderful," the actress exclaimed. "She takes the script home and slaves over it before each rehearsal."

Free-Lance Writing

In its early stages of development, the "Scotland" series has experienced writer difficulties, with flaws to be found in the free-lanced scripting jobs turned in, but with the ability and experience of its star and producer, the show has suffered only to a minimum degree over this handicap.

Arlene Francis' ability at a microphone was formerly well demonstrated during the war years when she femceed the "Blind Date" show which cooked up a choice evening's entertainment for its servicemen participants. An expert ad-libber, the actress was continually called upon to prove her prowess in the impromptu banter that resulted when she met the assortment of uniformed men who came to the "Blind Date" microphone to bid for the companionship of some unseen beauty.

"Believe me," grinned Arlene, remembering, "I had my hands full." Once, she recalled for us, when one overwhelmed lad discovered that his evening's date was going to be the beauteous Carole Landis, he actually passed out!

As disconcerting as this was, however, a serviceman silenced by a dead faint was the lesser of her problems. The strain came when she found herself verbally entangled with a more loose-tongued member of the armed forces.

"Whew!" Arlene breathed at the recollection. "It was pretty wearing. It's a relief to be doing a script show

now, and I think I'll stick to scripts from now on."

At the same time, Miss Francis is nevertheless managing to retain the ether personality she established with her previous air assignments. As "Ann Scotland", she mouths bon mots with the same ease and charm as she did when femceeding the "Blind Date" series.

Denies Supremacy

Before "Blind Date", Arlene's microphone experience was garnered on a variety of programs, with the well-remembered "What's My Name?" possibly preeminent in the memory of most listeners. But in addition, she reminded us, she debuted as the feminine announcer for Phil Spitalny's All-Girl Hour of Charm orchestra, and found herself resultantly in print as having said that women announcers were better than men. "I hadn't said it," she explained, "and what's more, I certainly didn't—and don't—think it."

Discursing a bit about radio, Miss Francis expressed disapproval of the overabundance of audience participation shows unsuitable to the medium of sound—and stated her own preference for such ether offerings as Fred Allen, "Author Meets Critic" and other air forums, William Spier's "Suspense", and the outstanding radio performances of one Martin Gabel, who happens also to be her husband. Dialers will consider Mrs. Gabel's opinion of Mr. Gabel as nevertheless unprejudiced, however, when it is noted that it was he who did that most effective narrative of Norman Corwin's stirring "On a Note of Triumph."

Mr. and Mrs. Gabel first met when both were appearing in an Orson Welles production of "Danton's Death". "Orson being Orson," the actress pointed out, "the presentation had its unusual aspects, such as a stage whose middle moved up and down, to and from the basement,

where the scenery was changed while the action continued above. For my sequence in the play, I was privileged to ride up from the basement in the company of Mr. Gabel, who kiddingly kept muttering to me, in that magnificent voice of his, a line borrowed from Bart Marshall that went, 'Of course I love you, you know I love you, my darling what a question'. At that time, you understand," smiled Arlene, "I wasn't looking at Martin in a romantic light, but still, I found him to be a fairly exciting man!"

She also remembered that the usually excellent thespian talents of Mr. Gabel weren't at their peak during that particular Welles presentation because of his (Gabel's) preoccupation with that frightening gap in the center of the stage when the middle was down in the basement for a switch in setting. "Martin can't see worth a darn and he was sure he was going to fall in," Arlene related.

Split Line

Because she intends to continue appearing in the theater as well as radio ("Guess the stage is my favorite," she admitted, "but radio is wonderful and provides invaluable experience for any performer!"), and because New York is her town ("Any town is your town when you were born there, and grew up there, and your family and friends are there."), Arlene hopes that she and her husband will eventually be able to work out a plan whereby they can spend six months of each year in the east and the other six on the west coast.

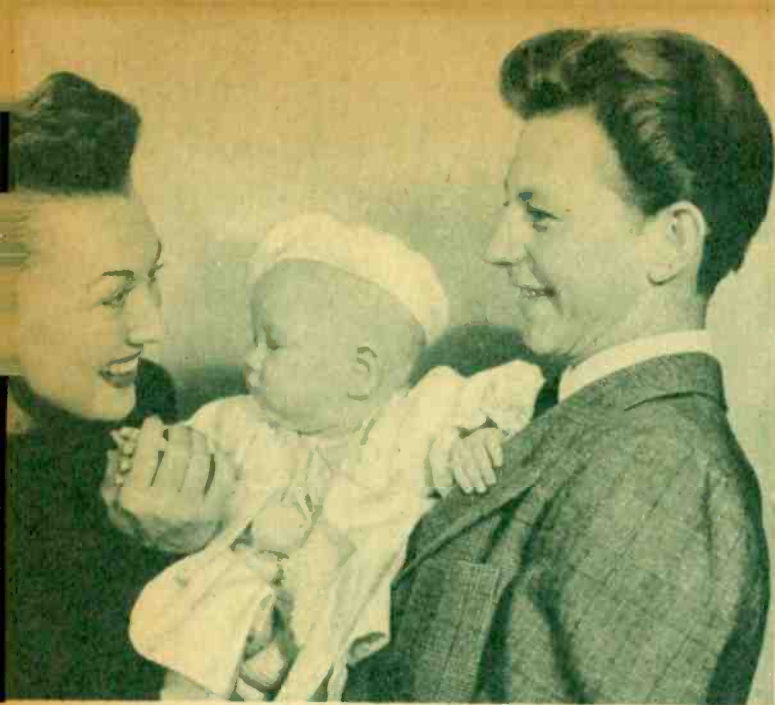
Currently, however, the Gabels are busily content in California, Martin directing a forthcoming film production entitled "Washington Flyer", and Arlene conducting "The Affairs of Ann Scotland"—and in the off-mike intervals, learning to cook and nursing the numerous finger burns sustained in the process. Extension Courses

We are often approached by persons desiring to find a place for themselves in radio. The best advice anyone can offer, of course, is to learn as much about the business as possible. A good step in this direction is the University Extension courses on radio which are regularly being conducted. Here is news of upcoming classes which might interest many of you!

Robert J. McAndrews, advertising and promotion manager of NBC, will conduct a specialized course in Radio Advertising for University of California Extension beginning Wednesday, February 19th at 7:00 p.m., at NBC Studios, Sunset and Vine. Its history, principles, effectiveness and utilization, and radio advertising from the standpoint of both buyer and seller, will be some of the topics covered during the eighteen consecutive weekly two-hour meetings which will make up the University course.

On February 27th, on the Los Angeles campus of U.C.L.A., University Extension will open a course in General Survey of Television with Don McNamara as the instructor. The course will include twelve weekly meetings at 7:00 p.m., in Room 132 of the University's Royce Hall. Other University Extension radio classes scheduled to open this spring include Radio Dramatics (March 4 and 5); and Radio Writing (January 29 and March 12).

The University's complete catalogue of adult education classes is available upon request to University Extension, Los Angeles 24.

Three Sparklers

Three guest stars walked into the comedy shows this past week and proved that what radio needs is a little more show business. These three brought what seemed like a new facet to radio comedy's dimming lustre.

First was the Lancashire lass, Gracie Fields, who hasn't been heard on the air in the past two years. Gracie guested with Fred Allen, and as Gracie is the type of star who really "gives" when she steps into the spotlight, she bolstered Fred through a difficult duet that had them sharing equal honors at the curtain. The duet, with Gracie singing the harmony, was so hilarious that we half expected them to be overcome by their own humor. We've gotten used to that on the radio and when Fred and Gracie finished as strongly as they started, we realized that real performers hardly ever do

permit themselves to be broken up. Proving that Fred doesn't necessarily laugh at his own jokes.

Bea Lillie, England's Lady Peel, did the same thing for the Bob Hope show. Her famous song, "Fairies in the Bottom of My Garden" was as funny as we'd remembered it. She, too, sparked the show for the rest of the cast, which is what a guest star should, and seldom does, do.

In the same vein was Al Jolson's guest appearance with Bing Crosby. Jolson is also a performer who "gives." And he gave Bing a lift that should last on the show for a long time to come. Ad libbing and intimate comedy is amusing in its own way, but for us, it will never take the place of a per-

former who knows his business and has taken the trouble to rehearse it well.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"Leave It to the Girls"

We'll "Leave It to the Girls" when it comes to bright spontaneity and bristling female wit. This fast tempo Mutual show supplies some of the most original witticisms on the air.

The girls that *It* is left to are actress Paula Stone, advertising executive Eloise McElhone, model agency operator Robin Chandler and Martha Rountree, who is the originator of the show. From time to time the line-up on the show varies—Jinx Falkenburg, Madge Evans, Ilka Chase and other beautiful but brainy gals show up to defend their sex.

In case you've missed this program, perhaps we'd better explain that the show is a round table discussion on which the aforementioned line-up answers letters from listeners concerning the trivia of male-female relations.

But don't feel too sorry for the male members of the forum! Emcee Ted Malone, who is a nice homey sort of a chap, is a wonderful foil for the sharp-witted females. Ted has a soothing, fatherly quality that keeps the show in line when the barbed darts start flying around the mike. Always on hand is one lone male who defends the masculine point of view. In point of numbers he is overwhelmed, so when he wants to interrupt he is allowed to blow a horn and the mike is his. The male guests are usually on the sharp side, too. Henry Morgan, for instance (and who wouldn't think twice before engaging in a battle of wits with him!) and Eddie Davis of "Leon and Eddie's" in New York have both covered themselves with glory in opposition to the ladies of the round table.

Sometimes the wit is so brittle you wind up sympathizing with neither side. But you do have a lot of fun!

"Willie Piper"

Along about 8:30 Sunday night, when you've been teetering all day on the high heels of fast comedy, tense drama, and earthy gossip, a show like "Willie Piper" is as comfortable as bedroom slippers.

The charm of this half-hour (ABC-KECA) is that nothing spectacular ever happens to "Willie Piper." It's just inconsequential things and they

It takes three spins of the wheel before that \$1,000 telephone number is picked and Happy Felton puts in the call. The first spin of the wheel selects the directory number among 300 telephone books on the broadcast stage, representing the 48 states and the District of Columbia. The second spin selects the page number of that book, and the third whirl, the number on the page.

So, make a date with your dial on Wednesday nights... and maybe you'll hear Happy call your number!

give the show a warm sincerity which is thoroughly relaxing:

Chief characters are "Willie," a lovable, vague character, played by Billy Redfield, a twenty-year-old who already has eleven years of radio and Broadway experience to his credit; his efficient wife, Martha, played by Jean Gillespie, and Martha's father, who, we think, is Stewart McIntosh. Samuel Taylor does the scripts.

Last week found Willie and his father-in-law, Mr. Gillespie, given the duty of meeting the train from New York and looking after an alighting passenger (niece of Mr. Bissell, a neighbor). Neighbor Bissell, who hadn't seen his niece for three or four years, instructed Willie to look for a "little girl with long blonde curls." When a pert Brooklynite hopped off the train, complications set in and it took the rest of the broadcast to straighten them all out.

About Thanksgiving time, we remember, all three—Martha, her father, and Willie—brought home a turkey (Mr. Gillespie won his in a raffle). Furtively, each of the three proceeded to give away his bird to someone not so flush with gobblers. Willie Piper almost didn't have any for his holiday dinner.

Another night, Martha had taken a job to earn some Christmas money and hadn't been able to bake any fancy dessert for the family. We remember how plaintively Willie inquired: "Are we going to have canned peaches every night?" And how, after Martha had gone to a meeting the two men tried to bake a cake, which finally ended up in a batter-blob in the middle of the kitchen floor. Their attempts to re-stock the larder almost got the would-be cooks in jail, but of course Mr. Taylor tacked a happy ending on the story.

Simple, you say. Well, maybe, but isn't life just about that way? Perhaps only one in five hundred human beings has the exciting things happen to him that happen daily and nightly to radio characters.

Later: Aw, shucks! Just when we had jogged down to a pat Sunday listening schedule, we are informed Willie is moving to Wednesday at 8:30. Now we'll have to toss whether we listen to "Gildy" or to "Willie Piper."

George Does It

If only for the fact that he is professionally something other than a private detective (even though at times he acts in the capacity of one), George Valentine, fictional hero of Mutual's entertaining little series, "Let George Do It," should be welcomed by dialers.

Not that we've anything against "private eyes" and the colorful material which their vocation provokes, but radio audiences are currently dieting pretty strongly on that particular

pattern of microphone hero. That's why "Let George Do It" (KHJ, Friday, 8:00 p.m.) is something of a pleasant novelty.

Above, we called the program a "little" series. We didn't mean this in a derogatory sense. It simply best expresses this show's comfortable unpretentiousness that allows the listener familiar to its pattern and people to sit back and just enjoy it. The action isn't too fast or complex, there are no raucous guffaws or off-color comedy, the dialogue isn't so brittle that you can't relax for fear of missing something. Yet the half-hour is happily filled with a digestible mild mixture of humor, sentiment and suspense.

The characters are likeably scripted (Owen and Pauline Vinson are producer-writers of the show) and are engagingly portrayed by Bob Bailey as "George," who guarantees to render any type of service for a fee—which he seldom collects, for one reason or another; Frances Robinson as "Claire," George's secretary, who employs more ladylike manners and unsophisticated talk than most of the private secretaries currently on the airlines; and Eddie Firestone Jr., as "Claire's" kid brother and "George's" youthful assistant. This threesome is a harmonious combination, even when they're scrapping, which they sometimes do but never seriously.

In fact, George and Claire's quarrels usually end up with Claire calling her boss (whom she customarily formally addresses as "Mr. Valentine") "darling." On occasion, even, she has picked up her office phone and greeted startled prospective customers with: "Hello—Let Darling Do It."

Strange Story

Every now and then radio is the setting for a strange story. Last week, NBC came up with the year's prize to date. Seems that on a recent "Noah Webster Says" program, a young contestant won his \$50. 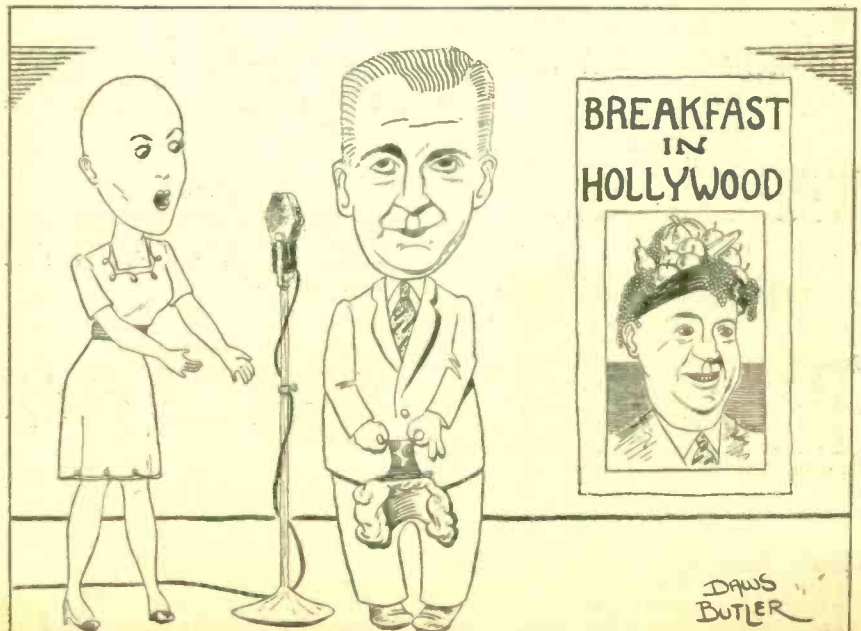



The Yuletide neighborly gesture turned into quite a Hollywood party. Little Donna fell in love with David's first-year Christmas tree—a miniature silver-blue model decorated with rattle, toy ducks, bells, and other accessories dear to the heart of an infant.

Hostess Ginny made a recording of Donna's cooing oohs and ahs for David's benefit when he gets old enough to begin bragging about his conquests. She gifted Donna with a doll to remember the party by, too.

Getting back to Don's pretensions to impending grandfatherhood. He figures that he can attain that venerable status while he's still in his thirties. Considering that he's a papa at 21 and that his child is a girl, maybe he's not too previous at that.

Don was born in Chicago on August 30, 1925, under the weighty name of Donald David Dixon Ronald O'Connor. He is one of seven children, only two of whom are still living.

Father With Circus

His father, John E. "Chuck" O'Connor, who died while on tour when Donald was only six months old, was one of the greatest acrobats in show business. He was Ringling Brothers' principal leaper, hurdling over elephants and high barriers.

After the death of the father, Donald's mother and older brother, Jack, carried on with the act. At thirteen months, Donald joined them, doing the "Black Bottom". When his little sister died, he took her place and for a few years wore—under protest—long hair and dresses on the stage. When he was three and a half, Donald started tap dancing and added singing to his repertoire.

Year in, year out, the O'Connor family tramped back and forth across the country. Donald was doing a charity act with his brother for a relief association in Hollywood when he was discovered by Director Wesley Ruggles, who signed him up for the role of Bing Crosby's kid brother in "Sing You Sinners!" That was in 1938.

Given a contract, young O'Connor made eleven Paramount pictures in one year, including "Men with Wings", "Sons of the Legion", "Death of a Champion", "Million Dollar Legs" and "Beau Geste". Following that he went to Warner Brothers for a role in "On Your Toes".

The family remained idle while Don worked. When they got bookings for four weeks in the East, Don chucked Hollywood and went along. It seemed that his family couldn't do their vaudeville act without the personality kid and he remained with them on the road for two years.

Returning to Hollywood, Donald was next cast in Universal's "What's

Cookin'." At Universal he made six more pictures concerned with music, dancing or the comic doings of lively adolescents, and then he stepped into stardom in the main role of "Mister Big". Other important pictures followed, including "This Is the Life", "Top Man", "The Merry Monahans", "Bowery to Broadway", "Follow the Boys", "Chip Off the Old Block", and "Patrick the Great".

Schooling Irregular

Don never attended regular school until his Hollywood days. He learned the 3 R's on the road during his younger years.

Shortly after he turned eighteen, Donald was inducted into the Army Air Corps. That was in early 1944, and soon after, he and his seventeen-year-old sweetheart, Gwen Carter, eloped.

After graduating from high school, his young bride followed him to various stations around the country whenever she possibly could.

Don likes all sports, especially football. He swims, skates, rides horseback, handles a bull whip with good control and is a sharp shot with the bow and arrow.

He once won a prize of twenty-four quarts of oil at a Bing Crosby golf tournament.

Don wants to keep on acting, and hopes to become a good motion picture director some day. He has written a few songs, none of them published, and plays the piano and drums.

Donald and Gwen, with their infant daughter, Donna, live in a little house on an acre of ground in the San Fernando Valley. Don's mother lives nearby in another house the comic bought for her before he went into the service.

Mother sometimes comes over and sits with the baby while Donald and Gwen attend radio rehearsal in Columbia Square.

Cue-ing McHugh

Frank McHugh of CBS' "That's Finnegan" Is As Whimsical as His Screen and Radio Roles

FOR MANY years of his screen career Frank McHugh was under the influence of liquor! Frank, who is in reality a teetotaler, was the screen's number one inebriate. If a picture called for an intoxicated character, Frank got the job. Once you're typed on the screen, it's a long, arduous process convincing the powers that be that you should be given a chance in something different.

Recalling that in recent pictures we'd seen Frank in more respectable parts (in "Going My Way" he was a priest), we asked him how he accomplished the character transformation. "Every time they asked me to play a drunk, I'd say 'Okay, as long as I get a different type of role in another picture'. And I didn't leave it up to chance, I had them put it down in black and white in the contract," he told us. By trading one sober part for each drunk role, Frank finally managed to get out from under the influence. In his newest screen role in "Carnegie Hall" in which Frank is featured with the greatest names on the concert stage, he plays the role of the long time

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stage doorman at that famous establishment.

Recently completed, "Carnegie Hall" was shot in New York at, that's right, Carnegie Hall. Frank, who was doing his air show "That's Finnegan" each week in addition to his screen role, was a pretty busy guy. "We had a couple of narrow squeaks", he smiled. "Several times I showed up for "Finnegan" wearing the old man's make-up I wear in the picture. In order to save time I lived next door to Carnegie Hall, and if I didn't show up for the five o'clock rehearsal for the radio show, they'd shoot over a car to rush me back to the station."

Known primarily as a comic, Frank in the earlier stages of his career played a variety of roles. "Why before I got my chins and stomachs," he smiled, "I played leads. In the Ziegfeld production of 'Show Girl' I played opposite Ruby Keeler."

"Did you sing and dance and win the heroine at the finale?" we asked.

Never Say "No"

"Sure!" Frank assured us. "However, I don't sing and dance any longer. In fact, I wouldn't even try. Never say 'no', used to be my policy. When I was doing stock company

work and they'd ask me if I could do a certain thing, I'd always say yes, and worry about it afterward."

Asked what he considered the high and low points of his career, Frank said, "The low point is always when you haven't got a job, isn't it? And I hope I haven't come to the high point yet."

One of Frank's most thrilling experiences was overseas entertaining in Germany and Holland during 1944. "We were in Germany during the Battle of the Bulge," he recalled. "Now that it's in the past, it was the best possible time that we could have been where we were, but at the time it was pretty rough." Frank was featured in a U.S.O. troupe with four girls. "They were so sweet," said Frank. "I was a lot older than they, of course, and sometimes I'd get so tired and blue that I'd feel pretty low. The girls would get together and decide that poor Frank needed cheering up and one of them would take me under her wing and try to make me feel better. It was pretty sweet of them. They didn't know that I knew that it was a plan that they took turns doing."

Last summer Frank went back to the summer stock company in Skowhegan and took his seventeen-year-old son, Peter, with him. Peter has stage ambitions and Frank wanted to see him get started out on the right foot.

Names Parts

"He's not going on the stage until he finishes college, though," exclaimed Frank warmly. Frank and son appeared in "Ah, Wilderness" and "George Washington Slept Here", and Frank starred in "Charley's Aunt".

"What part did you play?" we wanted to know.

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If anyone has ever bothered counting the number of quarter-hours of recorded music that go out over the air every day, he'll probably be the first to think there's nothing to planning one of these programs beyond grabbing a disc out of a folder, planting it on the turntable, inserting a few words about its contents and letting it go. There's a morning quarter-hour called "Music with a Smile," aired over KHJ Monday through Friday, that defies all such notions. In fact, Announcer Bob Freed, who handles the show, claims it as one of his favorite jobs in the working day. "It's a high class quarter-hour of music," says Bob, "without being too 'long-haired.' I always look forward to doing it."

Featuring musical comedy and light opera selections, "Music With a Smile" is the product of a lot more thought and preparation than the casual observer (or listener) might guess. In addition to Bob Freed, two other men are involved in "Music With a Smile's" preparation, and one of these is Robert A. ("Shep") Shepherd, dean of the music library at KHJ. It's "Shep" who selects from his library of 15,000 musical recordings the records that will be right for Bob's program each day.

One of the distinctive qualities of "Music With a Smile" in comparison with other record shows is its use of a theme each day around which the music is chosen. Often the show is built simply around one composer or artist—one day you'll hear all Gershwin tunes; another, all Jerome Kern, or perhaps a series of Nelson Eddy numbers. But often, too, it is built around such themes as just "weather" or "four moods" or perhaps "women composers". These are the kinds "Shep"—and Bob, too—have the most fun with.

How Themes Work

For the program built around "moods", for example, the records played included "Pomp and Circumstance" — for the cocky, strutting mood; "Passepied", a dancing mood piece; "Vision Fugitive"—for a dream mood; and "Aragonaise"—the playful mood. In a program devoted to

music by women composers, "Shep" chose works from Chaminade and d'Hardelot, both French women composers. There is one show, however, which is among the favorites of both "Shep" and Bob. It was one about birds, featuring an assortment of music whose one common quality was "having to do with birds", and it included such classics as the "Balletta" from "Pagliacci," "The Swan" by Saint-Saens, and Galli-Curci singing "Lo, How The Gentle Lark." All, of course, are songs about birds.

"Shep" reports that he bases his selections on a little private philosophy of his own—though he admits it's based on an idea once expressed by screen actor Will Rogers.

"I just say to myself," explains Shep, "Now, if I were a guest in someone's home and wanted to play some records for them, which ones would I choose?" That's the kind of music we play on the show."

Picking the records doesn't involve

just finding the right selections, either. There are usually five or six platters of the same record on hand in the library and each one is tested before the most perfect cut is sent over for release on the air. With the records, bound next for Larry Hayes, the show's writer and producer, "Shep" also sends program notes on each piece to be played. Often they include some interesting sidelights on the composition or its composer, and from indications, these mean as much to listeners as the music itself.

Good Response

"Sometimes we get six or seven calls after we've played an unusual piece of music or one with an unusual story," says Bob Freed, and he adds, "For a morning musical, I think that's pretty exceptional."

Both Bob and "Shep" are well suited to the show as far as backgrounds and interests are concerned. Combining it with a fondness for dogs (he recently raised a litter of handsome collie pups) and for his young son—age two—Bob, who likes music anyway, claims his favorite kind to be light opera and semi-classical. And "Shep" boasts a background of thirty-five years in theatre work and twenty years with symphony orchestras. He has conducted for symphonies and ballets (including Hollywood Bowl performances!), and he not only knows his music well, but also carries a wealth of interesting facts in his head about musical people and musical history.

We Bring You

Fleetwood Lawton--

*Noted Culinary Analyst and
Authority on Food Affairs*

➤ **FLEETWOOD LAWTON AND HIS PRETTY MISSUS** start preparations for one of his unusual dishes—avocado sherbet in peach halves, a recipe from Chile. Lawton actually taught Mrs. Lawton how to cook—these dishes, that is!

MUCH to our surprise, Radio Life discovered the eminent news analyst, Fleetwood Lawton, to be as keen with affairs of the colander as matters Congressional. He knows that a spatula isn't an island off the Guiana coast and Empanadas isn't the main boulevard of Buenos Aires—it's wonderful little creations of pastry, succulently stuffed with your favorite filling and often sold on the street corners in Argentina like our hot dogs or hamburgers. Lawton learned all about empanadas, first as a small boy when his family lived in Buenos Aires and again after he'd finished Oxford and returned to the scenes of his boyhood.

When Lawton recently consented to give an exhibition of his cooking

artistry, five of the six dishes he selected were of Latin American origin. The Lancashire Hot Pot, obviously, comes from the country where Lawton, obviously, was schooled.

And now we give you the recipes—here's once we take it away from South America!

EMPANADAS (Argentina)

Roll medium-rich pastry dough very thin; cut into 3-inch circles. Place a teaspoonful of following mixture on one half of pastry circle. Fold pastry over and seal edges well with fingers or fork tines.

FILLING:

1 large onion chopped finely
2 cloves garlic chopped finely
1 lb. lean beef, ground
½ cup raisins which have been soaked in warm water
1 hard cooked egg cut in small pieces.

Fry onion, garlic and meat in a small amount of drippings or salad oil. When almost done add 1 tsp. paprika, 1 tsp. ground cloves, 1 tsp.

salt, ½ tsp. cayenne pepper and 1 tsp. sugar. Cook 5 minutes longer. Remove from fire and add drained raisins. Place on pastry circles, topping mixture with piece of hard cooked egg. Fry in deep, hot fat until puffy and golden brown, turning once. Drain on paper towels and serve hot.

Empanadas can be made very small and make wonderful canapes or made quite large, pricked with a fork and baked in a hot oven (450) for 15 minutes. When serving empanadas as an entree we accompany them with fried beans.

METHOD:

1 large can kidney beans
½ lb. sharp cheese
1 small can pimientos

Place undrained kidney beans in skillet, add grated cheese and chopped pimiento. Salt and pepper to taste. Cook slowly until cheese is melted, liquid reduced and beans very hot (do not allow to become too dry). Top with chopped spring onions and serve.

AVOCADO SHERBET IN PEACH HALVES (Chile)

Mix together 1½ cups orange juice, 4 tbsp. water and ½ cup sugar and cook in saucepan five minutes (from time of boiling). Take from fire and add 1 tsp. plain gelatin which has been softened in a little cold water—stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool this mixture and when cool add 1½ cups of the pulp of ripe avocado which has been peeled and forced through a sieve. (Mix avocado pulp with the juice of 1 lemon to prevent darkening). Place in refrigerator tray and freeze to mushy consistency. Remove and scrape into a chilled bowl. Beat up quickly and add a meringue made of 2 egg whites beaten stiff with 2 tbsp. sugar. Put back in refrigerator tray and freeze, stirring twice while freezing to prevent crystals.

Serve in unpeeled fresh peach halves (when in season) which have been soaked about 4 hours in brandy. (This is also very good in canned peach halves.)

FISH GUIZO (Chile)

1½ lbs. sea bass or good white fish
1 cup vinegar
3 medium potatoes—1 No. 2 can tomatoes
1 large onion cut fine—2 whole cloves
2 cloves garlic minced—1 bay leaf
3 tbsp. drippings or salad oil—salt and pepper to taste.

Put oil in saucepan, add onion, garlic, bay leaf and cloves. Salt and pepper to taste. Cover and cook about 30 minutes. Peel and quarter potatoes and add with tomatoes, to onion. Cook about 10 minutes to blend flavors. Now add fish cut in two-inch pieces and baste frequently with sauce (if necessary add ½ cup boiling water). 10 minutes before potatoes and fish are tender add 1 tbsp. vinegar and simmer uncovered for remaining 10 minutes. Serve from a large tureen accompanied by mixed green salad and hot french bread.

CAZUELA (All of Latin America)

1 large stewing hen

THE EMPANADAS EMERGE a golden brown and are placed on absorbent paper to drain. Often, instead of a meat filling, a sweet stuffing is used and empanadas are then served as dessert.

Assorted vegetables: celery, carrots, onions, yellow and green squash, peas, green pepper, green beans, eggplant, brussels sprouts, potatoes

Multiple seasonings.

Clean, cut up chicken and place in boiling salted water to cover. While chicken is cooking clean and cut vegetables in quite large pieces. When chicken is tender remove from fire, strain broth and add 1 or 2 cups boiling water (depending on richness of broth). Put vegetables in broth and simmer gently. Meanwhile remove meat from chicken bones and reserve choice bits of breast. Put remaining chicken in with vegetables and add seasoning. In this dish the seasoning is the thing and we use everything—seasoned salt, bay leaf, cayenne, cloves, peppercorns, chili peppers, basil, thyme, cinnamon, rosemary, cardamon et al. Cook slowly until all vegetables are done and flavors blended. To serve sprinkle shredded breast of chicken on each serving.

To make a festive dish of cazuela, the Latin Americans serve it in a pumpkin shell instead of a tureen. Hollow a large pumpkin but leave a wall about 1½ to 2 inches thick. Brush with salad oil inside and out and put in a slow oven until hot and slightly soft. Reserve top of pumpkin to serve as top of pumpkin bowl. Take to the table on a large platter garnished with green glossy leaves. (The pumpkin taken from inside the shell is added to the cazuela in place of the potato).

We always use the last of our Thanksgiving and Christmas turkeys to make cazuela. The dish is richer than soup and should be accom-

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OUR CULINARY AUTHORITY snitches a bit of the celery he's cutting up for Cazuela. The Lawtons like to use up their left-overs from holiday turkey to make this recipe. In this dish, seasoning is "the thing" and everything imaginable is employed.

LANCASHIRE HOT POT. It's the traditional dish of English cotton workers, who go to work about 4 a. m. ("Almost as bad as a news commentator", observed Fleetwood) and leave the Hot Pot to cook until they return at 6 p. m. (The longer it cooks the better it is.)

JUST PLAIN OLD PUREED CARROTS, not any of daddy's cookery, is what Peter Lawton, aged five months December 25th, is here disdaining. Just give him a few years and we can see Peter devouring Empanadas faster than either Mom or Pop can make 'em.

ANOTHER young man-about-music in Hollywood is KECA's baritone Norwood Smith, whose quarter-hour song sessions, with organ accompaniment of Karl Bonawitz, are going up and up in the popularity polls among daytime listeners.

Resuming a career interrupted at its very beginning back in '41 when he was called for active duty as a Reserve Officer in the U. S. Army, Woody is now registering an immediate hit with fans. He specializes in "show tunes" and favorite ballads of yesterday, as well as current hit parade toppers. He puts character into every song. When he sings, you feel that you are actually witnessing a stellar performance of your favorite

musical comedy, or living again a musical highlight of some famous operetta.

Unique in the fact that he didn't begin life with the ambition of becoming a singer, young Smith entered U.C.L.A. to study geology, because of his family's interest in the oil business. But when his father died very suddenly, it became necessary for Woody to work during the remainder of his college career. He soon found he could no longer take the time for long field trips required in the geology courses. With a natural leaning towards things musical, and with a fine baritone voice, young Smith changed his major and took up speech and diction courses, along with voice lessons and languages including French, Italian and German.

Entertained in War

Between 1936 and 1940, Smith won acclaim in many leading roles in

operatic concerts in Los Angeles and Pasadena, but then came the war. He was among the first contingent sent to England in 1942, and while stationed there, he was in constant demand by the British service organizations to entertain. During the invasion of Africa, Woody found himself in demand in that sector for participation in variety shows, in addition to his regular army duties.

Discharged in February, 1946, with the rank of major, Woody, with his wife, the former Gloria Wolff and their infant daughter, Suzan Lee, returned to make their home in Los Angeles.

He picked up his singing career as guest soloist with Al Pearce and his Gang, then on ABC-KECA. Later he landed his own quarter-hour show, under sponsorship of Partmar Corporation.

One popular feature of Woody's daytime song session is his memory song of the day . . . which he picks each day from requests received from listeners. Some lucky person gets two tickets to one of the Paramount theaters as reward . . . besides hearing Woody sing the song of their choice.

Favorites

Woody lists in the order named "Always," "Begin the Beguine", "One Alone", "To Each His Own" and "Lover" as the five songs most often requested by his fans. So when you hear those selections popping up again and again on the show, it's because that's the way the fans like it. Woody's version of the rhythmic current hit, "On the Board Walk in Atlantic City", registered an immediate hit. "Nola" and "Tico Tico" are the most frequently requested numbers requiring organist Karl Bonawitz's talents.

Bonawitz, who presides at the keyboard of the Hammond during Woody's broadcasts, is not only a top-flight musician, but a man who loves his work! Walk into the studio to ask Woody or Felice Greene, writer-

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singer herself. "No hairdresser," she affirmed.

Her Wardrobe

About her clothes, Peggy described a "basic black" dress which she has had made, a couple of "sporty" suits and two more "dressier" ones, as the chief items in her wardrobe, and as a satisfactorily complete basis for any woman's wardrobe. (Around the house, she wears "old slacks—or old anything.") As for shopping, "I like to," she insisted, "but I can never spend more than a few minutes in a store without getting a headache and sick to my stomach. I don't know why."

The singer expressed an avid liking for all types of music from jazz to the classics ("Yes, music puts me in a mood!"), poetry, and the writings of Thomas Wolfe ("Even before he became *the thing!*"), and the ether offerings of Bill Leyden, Al Jarvis' "Can You Tie That?", "Suspense", "The Whistler"—and one Bing Crosby.

"I'm a Bing Crosby fan from 'way back," Peggy told us. She added that she had never met The Groaner in person until just recently, however. "Ordinarily, I don't concentrate in advance on a meeting I'm about to have with anyone," she related, "but on the day I knew I was going to meet Bing, I kept going over in my mind what it was going to be like. I wondered what he'd say. Of course," she laughed, "being Bing, he said just what you'd expect him to—without waiting for an introduction, he just walked up to me and said, 'Hiyah, Peggy!'"

"It's funny," she pondered, "I can remember so vividly listening to Crosby a long time ago back home, and of course never dreaming that some day I'd find myself singing with him! And I can remember pouring nickels into juke-boxes to play Benny Goodman records, with never a thought that some day I'd be vocalist with his band! And there'd be hours back home when I'd sit in my room and play recordings featuring Dave Barbour's guitar, little knowing that some day he'd be my husband!"

Peggy, who started her singing career at the age of fourteen, singing through a megaphone at college dances, declared that she has always been more appreciative of instrumentals than vocals and she credits her singing style to this, and also to the things she has learned from the musicians with whom she has worked—especially husband David, of course!

Asked about those songs which she and her spouse compose with such obvious skill and seeming ease, Peggy Lee told us that some of them ("It's a Good Day", for instance) are whipped up in about a half-hour's

time, while others ("Everything's Movin' Too Fast" for one) are worked over for months before they're ready.

Questioned about what initially inspired some of the Barbour compositions, Peggy supplied us with the background data on a few.

"You Was Right, Baby" is a phrase she once heard a Negro parking attendant use. To her, it sounded just right for a song title. "Good Day" was written "to give a lift—and it's made me awfully glad to have so many people tell me that hearing the song makes them feel good," Peggy related with charming sincerity.

"How about 'What More Can a Woman Do?'" we questioned next.

"Well," smiled Peggy, focusing her eyes dreamily on some distant point, "that's the way I feel about David."

LANCASHIRE HOT POT (England)

1½ lbs. lamb kidney (beef kidney can be used but lamb has more delicate flavor)

1½ lbs. top round steak

3 large potatoes

2 large onions

Flour, salt and pepper

Line a greased casserole with sliced potato cut medium thickness. Cut round steak in 1-inch cubes, roll in flour till well coated and place in casserole on top of potato. Salt and pepper well and cover steak with sliced onion. Remove all skin and membrane from kidneys, cut in 1-inch cubes, coat well with flour and place on top of onion. Continue layers until casserole is filled: salt and pepper all generously. Top with sliced potatoes overlapped and fill dish to level of potato topping with COLD water. Cover and place in 350 oven. Bake 4 hours removing cover last 20 minutes so potatoes on top will brown. Serve from casserole accompanied by mixed green salad and crusty rolls.

SHRIMP SOUP (Colombia)

1 lb. large fresh shrimp

Milk

Eggs

Seasoning

Remove shells and tails from shrimp. Place in boiling water to cover, to which has been added 1 or 2 peppercorns, half a bay leaf, 1 stalk and leaves of celery and salt and pepper. Simmer shrimp gently till tender; remove from water and drain. Heat, but do not boil, about 1 cup of whole milk for each person to be served and thicken with flour paste VERY SLIGHTLY (this is not a cream soup.) Place shrimp in milk and heat just to boiling point.

To serve, place 1 raw egg, unbroken, in each warmed soup plate, add 3 or 4 whole shrimps and pour hot, slightly thickened, seasoned milk over all. Serve at once.

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producer of the show, any kind of question which mentions a song . . . past, present (and we almost believe, future) . . . and "Bonnie" (as he is affectionately called by the cast) immediately breaks into his own improvisation of the melody! In other words, one whispers the titles of songs if one doesn't want to be treated to an impromptu concert.

Learning to play the organ at an early age from his father, who was organist for St. Boniface Church in Philadelphia, young Karl claims some sort of a record for the distance he travelled to continue his musical training. He went three thousand five hundred miles . . . from Philadelphia to London . . . to study with his uncle, Jan Henri Bonawitz, then on the faculty of the Crystal Palace Music School.

Returning to Philadelphia, Bonawitz soon learned that a man cannot live by Bach alone, so he got a job as organist in the Germantown Theater. His theater concerts were soon broadcast over the then practically new medium of radio, and in Radio Age's first annual popularity contest (1924-25) Bonawitz pulled 21,000 votes to Roxy, 19,000, and Ben Bernie 16,000.

Cue-ing McHugh

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Frank drew himself up, "Lord Fan-court Babberley. You know, the guy who gets dressed up in the long black dress and smokes the cigars. . . You know the part." That's putting it mildly—everybody knows it. It would be worth a trip to Skowhegan to see Frank doing it.

Frank's hobby is one of the most interesting ones we've uncovered. He is particularly fascinated by the history of the Civil War, and is a mine of information on the subject. He owns ten volumes of pictures and texts on the War Between the States, including many of the pictures made by Matthew Brady, who drove a cart full of photographic equipment up to the front lines and obtained some of the most amazing photographs ever published.

Another McHugh project is the painting and papering of son Michael's room. The McHughes live two doors from the Sinatras—"but we never see him," says Frank. Yes, daughter Susan's a fan.

Frank enjoys his work as "Finnegan" on the CBS air show and was particularly pleased that his actor brother, Matt, joined him for a broadcast, portraying "Finnegan's" brother. "Matt and I have been actors since we were kids, and this is the first time in twenty-two years that we've appeared together," exclaimed Frank.
