The "Blue Monday Jamboree" was on in those days. Harrison Holloway was emcee, and Meredith Willson was orchestra leader. Then there was "The Adventures of Frank Watanabe and the Honorable Archie" with Messrs. Hipplewater and Scudder.

"The Circle" was a very good program some time ago. It featured Basil Rathbone and Groucho Marx. I believe that "The Grouch Club" was on about this time, too. "The Goldbergs," not a comedy but good. "Abie's Irish Rose" was amusing in its first season, though it later developed into a sort of soap opera. And "Ma Perkins" and "One Man's Family" were on then.

Well, that about does it for the present. If this rambling brings back memories from some other folks, of the days when KNX was on the Western Broadcasting System and radio in general was more informal and perhaps funnier, I should like to see those recollections in print!

Sirs: Radio programs which sponsor contests requiring entrants to state "why we should do so and so" or "I like so and so because" always stress the point that the statement is the all-important thing in deciding winners. Yet at the conclusion of the contest the winning statement is never mentioned. Can you tell me why this is so?

The recent "Miss Hush" contest staged by Ralph Edwards of "Truth or Consequences" is a case in mind. I entered the contest along with some 900,000 other people and was, frankly, as I suspect most of the others were, motivated by the prizes offered.

However, since the winner was selected for the excellence of the statement submitted, it would seem to me that a reading of the statement at the end of the contest would have done much to remind everyone of the real purpose of the contest. Such a procedure in campaigns of this kind, those that are intended sincerely to help others, would surely go far toward diminishing the out-and-out commercial aspect that they present now, and would just as surely enhance the sponsor's position by causing the public to feel that he was interested in the campaign beyond the advertising value for his product.

Your contention is well based, Mr. Barnard. However, in all major contests of this kind, winning slogans are deliberately not announced for a purpose. Reason being that other contributors are likely to say "Is THAT the one they chose? Mine was equal to that or better." In other words, decision of the judges is final, and with law requiring that all entries be read thoroughly and impartially, this system is the fairest possible. "Truth or Consequences" and sponsor Dux, incidentally, were enough interested in the campaign beyond the advertising" to raise more than \$600,000 on behalf of The March of Dimes.

Two-Beat to Bloop Bleep

Are the Men Who Were Steeped in the Best Jazz Really Able to Get With Pop Tunes? KWKW's Andy Mansfield Knows the Answers

ANDY MANSFIELD is about as well qualified to speak on the relative merits of "then" and "now," musicwise, as any disc jockey in the field. Andy's first big boss was Paul Whiteman, yet today Andy spins Monica Lewis or Frankie Laine records and likes it. Andy was playing piano in the days when a fraternity dance was called a "hop"—but just a few weeks ago Nellie Lutcher herself called him "a real gone guy."

The link that has kept music-lovin' Mr. Mansfield in step with each new era is his record collection. When Andy finishes his daily session in the record room of Pasadena radio station KWKW, he usually goes home and takes up where he left off a half-hour and twenty miles back. The Mansfield record stack may hold fewer records than the bins at the broadcasting studio, but judge his personal collection by the number of years it covers, and it's hard to beat.

Started Early

Andy says he's been collecting rec-

ords ever since he can remember. "It started when I got an after-school job with the local music house in my home town. I played sheet music on the piano and records on a regular old Victrola for the customers. They had those thick old Brunswicks then, and my collection started with those," he laughs. Andy was only fourteen at the time.

A couple of years later the Mansfield boy set out from the home town for Cornell University with firm determination, and his eye on a law career. Before much could be done to make a barrister of Andy, he was magically attracted to the Glee Club, the Cornell orchestra, Cornell's "Masque" (a production paralleling Harvard's famous "Masque and Wig Club"), and the "Collegians," a jolly little band which played for the college and fraternity dances. These attractions left not too much time for law studies, so Andy wisely gave those up and concentrated on a musical career.

Away he went with the "Collegians" one night to play for a "hop" in upper New York state. Henry Busse, at the time a feature of Whiteman's old band, spotted the bunch

of kids and called them to the attention of "Pops." That was all Andy needed in the way of a break, or "Pops" in the way of a glimpse at some new talent. It wasn't many weeks before Andy Mansfield was happily thumping one of the two pianos Paul Whiteman always featured.

Band work with Blue Steel's and Ray Miller's orchestras, during which time Andy made all their arrangements, took up the next few years,

Kilocycle Clothes Horse

Does a Radio Actress Dress to Live or Does She Live to Dress? We Asked June Foray and Now, Herewith, Visual Proof

WELL-BRED children, according to the old-fashioned yardstick, were supposed to be seen but not heard. It's contrarywise with most radio actresses, who appear only before studio or television audiences. Yet busy thespians like June Foray don't take their fashion responsibilities lightly, for they realize how important it is to make good appearances before the live audience and other cast members. It reflects in their performances and subtly carries over the ether lanes.

So for June, it's never a casual get-up—a fur coat tossed over slacks or house dress hidden by a sweater. She maintains a wardrobe of a dozen suits, ten or twelve dressy dresses, twenty-six pairs of shoes, about twenty hats, three fur coats, and handbags to accompany each change. Each month she averages purchase of two outfits on which she spends

about \$55 or \$60 if the items are dresses and proportionately more if suits.

She definitely has her visual audience in mind when she sets out to shop. For the Phil Harris or Jimmy Durante shows on which she makes frequent appearances, June chooses flashy sequins or other glittery garb.

"You can hear the reaction from the audience — ooing and ahing — when you wear something striking," pert size-nine June avers. However, for an early morning broadcast like NBC's "Smilin' Ed McConnell" show, the actress prefers simple suits. For comedy shows in general, she selects red, because it exudes cheerfulness.

June usually carries along her dressy outfit to rehearsal, taking a few moments to change just before air time. But often she's on a continuous run doing five shows a day. In these hectic situations, she wears an in-between outfit, suitable for

varied round-the-clock activities.

Difficult to Fit

Little Foray claims she "has an awful lot of trouble" shopping. Four-foot-eleven and weighing only 102 pounds, she finds most garments too long—"too long in the waist, too long in the sleeves and too long, period. I have enormous alterations," she wails. Recently she felt she had to discard some of her briefer-skirted clothes, as she is now wearing her hemlines about fourteen inches from the floor.

She carries a charge account at Harry Cooper's and Nancy's and has some things made at Mitzi Jordon's on Wilshire Boulevard. Her favorite colors are chartreuse and royal blue. "I would love to wear brown or tan," remarked the dark-haired, dark-eyed June, "but I can't." Whenever she shops, June has in mind exactly what she's looking for . . . seldom does she purchase in haste to regret at leisure.

Spending as much as she does on occupational clothes, Miss Foray could not be blamed were she inclined to yearn for a different type of wardrobe not tailored to her radio needs. But luckily, she would dress entirely in sophisticated apparel had she to make the choice. That is, she would up to a certain point.

Asked what she smuggled into when she got home from work every night, June shook her head at men-

tion of a negligee, a house coat, lounging pajamas, or bathrobe. The little lady who owns twelve suits, twelve dresses, twenty-six pairs of shoes, twenty hats and three fur coats said: "I live alone so I wear what I please around the house . . . my underwear, and that's all!"

Yet Jack Moyles is without peer among the Hollywood ranks when it comes to performing dialects or creating new characters. One of the black-haired, brown-eyed actor's special fortes is doing imita-

San Francisco radio during the pre-AFRA era. It was the birth of AFRA, in fact, which lost Jack his station job and proved a turning point in his life.

"You've heard stories about the old days of radio, during which the supposed 'actors' wrote, produced, acted, engineered and even sang their own songs? That's all true . . . and we worked practically for laughs, our salaries were so low.

"Then came AFRA, and I was made an officer—vice president, in fact. Consequently, I got my walking papers from the station. There was nothing to do but turn to free-lance acting for a living.

Free-Lancing Profitable

"During the first six months as a free-lance artist, I not only made twice as much money as I'd made in a year previous to that, but I made a lot more contacts, played a lot more roles, and broadened my radio horizons, so to speak, greatly."

During the war years the rejected Jack compensated by participating with a group which did 230 camp shows under the sponsorship of the Red Cross. One of the high points in Jack's career was the night when the servicemen and women of San Francisco did a turnabout and put on a show for the performers who had entertained them so long and faithfully.

Next to each of the regular professional actors or actresses in the audience that memorable night was seated a serviceman. After the comedy and acts, the general in command arose and called for these professional performers in the audience also to arise.

"We all got to our feet, thinking we were going to receive his thanks for having entertained his troops on

tions of the late President Roosevelt and of Winston Churchill. Preparation for these mimicking chores was to listen for two weeks to records of the two famous men's voices. Jack has performed as Roosevelt or Churchill on Cran Chamberlain's ABC show, "Don't You Believe It," and on CBS' old show "Destination Tomorrow."

Known As Jordon

The role with which Jack is probably most closely identified is that of "Rocky Jordon," from the CBS thriller, "A Man Named Jordon." Jack played this role from the days when the show was a five-times-a-week event, fifteen minutes in length, through its life as a half-hour Saturday-nighter. Other shows that have utilized his talents as a straight character actor or as a dialectician are "The Great Gildersleeve," on which he plays the part of "Charlie," the caretaker at the waterworks, "Real Story," and "The Whistler."

Even a four-shows-a-day schedule seems like a life of ease to the boy who acquired his apprenticeship in

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

New Low

What should have been a significant and impressive occasion, the airing of the Photoplay Magazine awards at the BevHills Hotel, Monday night, February 16, in our opinion hit a thudding new low in broadcasting.

To us, the Photoplay awards are important. Yet Jack Benny seemed to walk unwillingly through his job as toastmaster, wholly lacking in his usual suave brilliance. The stars, writers, directors, producers who accepted their "citations" acted bored with the whole proceeding. Al Jolson, in admiration of whose conspicuous talent we yield second place to no one, transgressed the bounds of propriety and taste. Presentations and acceptances, many by proxy, were stumbingly and blunderingly acknowledged. Sotto voce off-mike cracks, such as "Are we on the air?" or "Go on, get the so-and-so up here" were plainly heard. Ad-libbing was crude and unfunny.

This unfortunate broadcast points several morals. A radio broadcast must be produced for radio or it is a poor broadcast. Important events should be played up and staged in harmony with their importance. The brightest stars are lost without a competent script. A station should think twice before broadcasting an event painfully more social than professional.

Radio in Review

Johnny Mercer and Harry James could be expected to shine considerably, but even an enthusiast would have been surprised at the top-notch gaiety that exploded as Shore, Mercer, James and Company took their turns at the mike.

Opening with the threesome singing special (and hilarious) lyrics to the Dave Barbour-Peggy Lee hit, "Mafiana," the show got its first big laugh as Dinah tagged the tune with a nasty-nice verse pointing out that they had sung Peggy Lee's song without using a single word she wrote.

Musical novelties climaxed the climax as Johnny Mercer offered "Sugar Blues," while Harry James played an ultra-corny Clyde McCoy chorus behind him. Mercer's cracked voice yelling a swoony "Oh, Cl-ly-yde!" is with us yet. Humor and music, wedded in most of the numbers, were particularly adept in the demonstration of the evolution of "I'm Looking Over a Four Leaf Clover." The orchestra played it as it was originally performed back in 1927, Dinah gave it the smooth treatment with a practically perfect imitation of Morton Downey, James illustrated the hot school and the orchestra took over again in the 1948 hit rendition—a repetition of the 1927 original!

No review of the already admired Shore-Mercer-James talents is needed, but the fact that they were put together with such wit, tempo and taste calls for a special bow in the direction of Jerry Lawrence and Bob Lee. These youngsters have already rated a Radio Life Award for their "Favorite Story" productions. As producers-writers (including those special lyrics) of "Call for Music," a large measure of the overwhelming success of the show belongs to them.

Of Men and Books

When radio critic John Crosby recently stated that what radio needed was another personality like the late Alexander Woollcott, minus Woollcott's lace-like prose style, he voiced the opinion of a great many air fans. We're taking this opportunity, therefore, to announce that we have discovered the gentleman capable of filling the bill. He's Russell Maloney, writer-critic, perhaps best known for his "Talk of the Town" columns in The New Yorker Magazine.

If Maloney does become the next air Woollcott, we are not going to be able to take credit for discovering him, however. He's heard regularly on a late-hour CBS program, "Of Men and Books," KNX, 11:40 p.m. Thursdays. Like a great many intelligent and educational programs, this book-review session comes so late at night that a listener must be a true zealot or a confirmed night-owl in order to hear it. Our brief moments with Mr. Maloney have been few and far between, but distinctly rewarding.

When critic John Mason Brown left his post as regular reviewer on "Of Men and Books," the job was split three ways with our Mr. Maloney, the

New York Post's Sterling North and A. C. Spector's of the Chicago Sun alternating as tentative replacements. On the score of delivery, charm and humor, we'd say that Maloney wins hands down. His recent air review of Colton Waugh's fascinating book about American comic strips, "The Comics," managed to be a blend of information and comedy that hasn't been equaled since Alexander Woollcott stopped being Town Crier.

"Murder and Mr. Malone"

A radio show titled "Murder and . . . well, anything" could easily get lost in the passel that's currently floating out from just about every kilocycle in town. In the case of "Murder and Mr. Malone," that would be too bad. Many listeners who bypassed KECA's Saturday night at 9:30 Guild Wine-sponsored show because of its blood-and-thunder title would be missing an air presentation whose best claim to distinction is that it is as vivid as a stage presentation.

Craig Rice originated the series "The Adventures of John J. Malone, Attorney at Law." Gene Lang collaborates on adapting these for the half-hour weekly. Frank Lovejoy stars as "John Malone." After successive hearings, the listener feels that Frank Lovejoy and the mythical "John J. Malone" become so closely identified that hearing Lovejoy on a different show always comes as a surprise. He's endowed "John J." with a distinct personality that's five tenths charm, two-tenths nice voice, two-tenths brains and nerve, and two-tenths plain old sex appeal. Let's see . . . that's eleven tenths. Just about right!

The story lines are full of angles and counter-plots that preclude any episode examples, but you can rely on the denouement holding a "Malone" baiting of one or more beautiful but black-hearted girls into admissions of guilt. Sound trite? To find out just how "un-trite" the half hour is, listen some Saturday p.m. It's a pleasant test.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Twelve Players"

It can be sort of a game, like a crossword puzzle, trying to match the names of ABC's "Twelve Players" (Mondays, 8:30 p.m.) against the different voices and characterizations on the show.

We had some simple entertainment in this way, just the other evening (February 16) during an "original play" called "Checkerboard" written by Cathy and Elliott Lewis. Sadly, that's about all that kept us interested enough to stick by. For, while the "Players," (Lurene Tuttle, John Brown, Bea Benaderet, Jay Novello, Mary Jane Croft, Jack Moyles, Cathy Lewis, Edmund MacDonald, Howard McNear, David Ellis, Herbert Rawlinson and John Lake) were excellent in their roles, production was too slow and too drab to make the showcasing seem worthwhile to us.

It's surprising then, to find that Ray Buffum is the man throwing the cues. Ray wrote the slick, rapid dialogue first read by actor Dick Powell on the original "Rogue's Gallery" show, and his remarkable timing and tension made those scripts really something to hear.

Charitably speaking, the story which we heard left plenty to be desired. Cathy and Elliott evidently banged this one out while awaiting inspiration for greater things to come, and their vignette views of various families along a city block seemed rambling, incoherent and signifying nothing.

We understand that the dozen radio stars to whom this program belongs audition every week against one another to win the different casting parts. This alone should be a fine cooperative basis for a versatile tribute-to-talent series. Buzz Adlam's always delightful musical backgrounds should likewise not be wasted on lackadaisical, aimless staging.

As the program airs now, it is hardly worth missing "Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts" to hear.

Off Mike (Personalities)

We Second the Motion

Jimmy Durante, often described as "the man who has never turned down a benefit," was awarded a "Heart of Gold" at a testimonial dinner given last Wednesday (February 25) at the Biltmore Bowl in Los Angeles. Sponsoring the event was the Mount Sinai Men's Club, a philanthropic group associated with the Mount Sinai-Duarte National Medical Center. Durante was the first recipient of the newly inaugurated award, which will hereafter be presented annually to the individual who has made "the most outstanding personal contribution to the needy." Garry Moore was master of ceremonies, and in attendance were a host of fellow showmen who have worked with Da Schnozz through the years.

S-s-s-lightly N-n-n-ervous

Cathy Lewis is certainly accustomed to getting up in front of folks and talking, but she admits she's scared to death of her forthcoming appearance before the Executive Secretaries Club, Tuesday, March 11. At that time, Cathy will receive the title "Ideal Secretary of 1948," honor due her role as "Jane Stacy" on CBS's "My Friend Irma."

As Marion Peters, president of the Los Angeles chapter of the national organization says: "Instead of burlesquing our jobs, Cathy plays her role straight, giving secretarial work the importance it deserves and carrying off each situation with an intelligent command of comedy as well as pathos."

In spite of such very kind words, Cathy remains jittery. Her shorthand, she says, is terrible, second only to her typing.

TELEVISION TIPS

BY JANE PELGRAM

All Hollywood agrees that only a low-cost television set is needed to spark a boom in video owners. Tele-Tone may have the answer in its announcement of a \$150 set to hit the market between March 1 and April 1. What better disposition to make of a possible income tax refund?

Prospective owners needn't fear lack of fare. Film is being lined up left and right to keep the existent channels full of entertainment. Jerry Fairbanks Productions recently pacted veteran director Lew Landers to guide new issues in the "Public Prosecutor," video series to be finished for presentation this month.

Robert L. Redd, pioneer among radio producers, is readying "Point Sublime" for television. Sponsor John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance even acquired long-time television rights to the show.

Paramount Pictures, with an overall picture in mind of the newsreels to be presented for home television, told exhibitors that newsreel theaters cannot survive. Fox-Movietone made the entry into video when they inked with Camel and NBC. Now with Old Golds, Chesterfields and General Motors making pitches to newsreel outfits, Warner-Pathe and Universal are hopping into line.

It doesn't look now as though major studios ever plan wholesale rental of old feature-length pictures to video stations. The reason is twofold; no station can afford rental of such pix, but more important, feature-length pictures will be ruled out of video programs eventually.

Mark Woods, president of ABC network, made the statement that ABC plans to have its television station in Los Angeles on the air next December. Arrangements have been concluded for the construction of a building to house ABC's transmitter on Mt. Wilson. Negotiations are also under way for obtaining temporary and permanent studio sites.

and it wasn't until an Eastern station made him part of the team of "Mansfield and Lee," prototype of the breakfast chat shows, that he gave up bands.

Today he's still part of the team. Andy and Virginia Lee were married in the early thirties, and headed for West Coast radio. They tell some hilarious stories of lugging records cross country. Andy has clung to his collection through thick and thin, and today can proudly pull from the

files records made when "jazz" was spelled "jass" on the labels.

Avid Collector

On days when Virginia loses sight of her husband entirely, he's bound to show up around dinner time with a gratified smile and from one to half a dozen select platter items he unearthed during the day. Andy has a magic font of precious records, the source of which he still refuses to disclose.

Once when he was in the East on business, Virginia received a huge box from snowbound New York, where Andy was staying. Upon opening it, she found it full of his heavy clothes. When the chilled Mansfield reached sunny California, she discovered his heavy suitcases to be empty of clothes—but full of records he hadn't trusted anyone other than himself to bring to the Coast.

Saturday night is record night at their home in North Hollywood. From six o'clock until near Sunday a.m., when everyone sleepily departs, Andy and his friends spin records and discuss them. Andy plays the old ones for kicks. Then he plays the new ones for kicks. Then he plays the ones made in the years between—just for kicks. At this time he reviews new issues for his record show and record column, combining work and fun.

Andy explains the reason he can go the length of his record cases, ranging in content from Nick La Rocca and his Original Dixieland Band, or the Memphis Five, through the Armstrongs, old and new Goodmans, Dorseys and Millers, to the current Harry Jameses or Eddy Howards—and enjoy it all!

"Primarily, I like anything *melodic*. The old bands had it, the current ones have it. The boys who are going beyond that, trying to develop something different in music, are to be admired for what they are doing—but I haven't any of their records in my collection."

The last referred to are the Gillespies and the Kentons. Andy plays their records for his air listeners, but at home he satisfies his own full orchestra tastes with Gould or Kostelanetz.

"I guess my favorites are still the Whiteman records I have, and my Crosbys," Andy admits. Andy has just about every record made by either. His Whitemans date way back, and the unbroken series of Bing's records starts with the blue seal Deccas. Aside from these Deccas of Bing's, Andy says "I really don't know what my first Crosby records are . . . they begin when Bing was singing with Whiteman too."

Andy recently compiled a discography of Crosby records, covering all the commercial releases, as far as he knows, made by Bing, either as soloist or as a member of the Rhythm Boys.

Only the man who got this together would be able to do it descriptive justice, so in a forthcoming issue of Radio Life Mr. Mansfield will tell you all about the Bing Crosby discography.

Howard Duff. They'll make a star out of that boy if he appreciates them. Duff was almost overcome by it all. And don't think a lot of other stars don't get scared when they have to face that same scrutiny. We had a complete refusal on one second appearance. He just didn't want to come. Now, why do I tell the kids when they've been turned down like that? Because they deserve to know. There are too many nice individuals who realize and appreciate what their admiration means, and are willing to live up to it."

Hard Promoters

"They work so furiously for somebody they like! If you hired a press club to do the same amount of publicizing the bobby-soxers have given Van Johnson, Frankie and the rest of their favorites, you'd really have yourself a bill at the end of the month.

"And still it's these same nice eager youngsters who are held in such horror as the problem of the nation.

"Now let me really tell you one place where I think the grown-ups are at fault. This Youth Center business is an outstanding example. A little boy and girl from East Los Angeles called me up not so long ago. They wanted to start a Center in that tough part of the city, and they'd been turned down everywhere. I told them just one thing . . . to find a wealthy person in their community without too many family connections and outside interests, and ask him to see them through. They had to do some looking, I guess, but I got an invitation to come for their opening night not too long later! A few people said to me, 'Mauri, are you crazy? East Los Angeles? Why those Pachuco kids would just as soon knife you in the back as look at you.' Well I went anyway, and 'those Pachuco kids' were tickled to death with their new place and nicer to me than anybody else. I almost got sick from all the hot dogs and cokes they shoved down me. They coddled the dickens out of me, and I loved it.

"But getting those places started is an uphill pull. I myself would like to be so set up that when a call came in from a community saying 'We want a Youth Center' I'd be able to take a big troop of stars in there and really help them launch one. We could do it once. But how many stars would come through twice?

"You walk into the Club Gunga Din in Hawthorne if you want the thrill of your life. The kids built it themselves from the foundation up. And it's my idea of a Youth Center . . . not just a place that's open Friday nights for dancing, but a functioning around-the-clock organization like a travelers' aid.

"Why are all these places like the

old Hollywood Canteen standing around empty? I don't know how many lodges and halls there are around here, which are closed except for one day in the week, but I'll venture to say plenty."

Neglect and Indifference

"Yet the youngsters in Gardena went from door to door to collect help and money for their center, and it fell through. For a long time, the only place in Van Nuys where the high school set could wander in and meet away from campus was a bowling alley. One community even turned down its youngsters' requests for the use of the high school building!

"It doesn't take money so much as enthusiasm. And the kids are worth it. We've had thousands of them come through those doors for our 'Studio Parties' on Friday, and we've never had to eject one of them. They've gotten excited maybe, but never vicious. Every sort of youngster has been there . . . rich, poor, shy, grandstander . . . a perfect cross-section. And I still want you to tell me, if you can after really watching them . . . where are the delinquents?"

★ ★ CONGRATS

Rosemary DeCamp, who plays "Judy Price" on Columbia's "Dr. Christian" broadcasts, has a nice sense of humor. Her fellow cast-members were counting on it, when she made her return to the show following birth of her third baby daughter.

Usually reserved Jean Hersholt was not in evidence as Rosemary entered the studio for rehearsal. Then, after everyone had greeted the new mother, the good "Doctor" strolled in, puffing contentedly on his pipe, and wearing a baby bonnet.

other nights," Jack relates. "Then the general called for the service people to perform their duties."

The duties were to turn and pin to the lapel of each actor and actress in the crowd a Red Cross citation stating that more than 200 hours of service had been rendered.

Comes to Hollywood

It was almost the end of 1944 before Jack followed the footsteps of his radio buddies southward from San Francisco. Arriving in Hollywood on a Sunday, he made a purely social telephone call, just to let an old friend know he'd arrived. By noon of the next day, the old friend had hustled Jack into a radio part. He's been here in Hollywood radio ever since.

Jack commutes to the local mikes from an attractive postwar cottage in the San Fernando Valley. His household now consists of one very lovely wife, the former Nida Vanderbilt, whom Jack discovered behind a receptionist desk at CBS. The rest of the Moyles household started out with "Rocky" arriving as a wedding gift almost two years ago. "Rocky" is a coal-black cat who stares out of windows and who keeps "Major" and "Misty" in line as Jack and Nida would never have the heart to do. "Major" and "Misty" are the collie playmates the Moyles first lamented getting, and now wouldn't part with for all that proverbial rice.

Instead, Jack proudly tells of their clever deeds, and makes "Major's" enjoyment of a pen pal sound like the most natural thing in the world for a collie. Inquiry about "Major's" "pen pal" brings out the fact that it is "Summer Hooper"; that he belongs to Helen Morgan, writer-producer of the show "This Woman's Secret"; and that he and "Major" have never met.

As all good radio listeners know, a "summer Hooper rating," by comparison with the winter ratings, is said to "smell." "Summer Hooper" doesn't mind at all the play on words for a name. The bushy-tailed little black and white skunk is as cherished a pet as anyone's kitten, and as harmless.

The pen pal routine started as strictly gag material between Helen Morgan and the Moyles, so these good friends could exchange messages, but today none of the three ever refer other than solemnly to the correspondence as the work of pen pals "Major" and "Summer Hooper."

It's a wonder this easy-going, casual young man, who talks less about acting than he does about fishing and the beach, came to be an actor and a respected dialectician in a town where actors and dialecticians abound. Jack says it started in an effort to get through school.

"The professor in English class would give a passing grade to anyone who made the senior play. I tried out so hard for it—I got the lead!"

WHENEVER groups of servicemen at parties or entertainments clustered around Will Wright, well-known character actor of radio and screen, the familiar stentorian tones could be heard issuing advice, instead of the usual anecdotes.

"You boys, upon demobilizing, are going to have a second crack at getting started in something you want to do. As long as most of us

have to work all our lives, remember to make the most of this second opportunity, and find something you really want to do!"

Many years ago this lean, gray-haired man practiced what he now preaches when he shocked his family by leaving a good job for the elusive possibility of making good at the arts.

Steel Worker

Raised in Vallejo, California, during the era when boys were expected to go into a trade upon high school graduation, Will Wright went into the shops to pound steel all day and dream of an operatic career all night. Just as his family's awareness of Will's really fine basso-profundo voice had led to vocal instruction, World War I ended both his hopes and the steel shop job.

Will's hours in the trenches overseas brought realization that life is

actual participation in ether drama drew him to writing and playing the part of "Cheerily" on the comical, popular "Yahbut and Cheerily" spot in "Blue Monday Jamboree," big time variety show on the West Coast airways. The part of "Cheerily" that Will played was that of a travelogue narrator, continually harried by a sad character who started every sentence by saying "Yeah, but . . ." and wound up being called "Yahbut." The "Jamboree" also graduated "Eb and Zeb," wizened cronies who dealt in a highly gagged-up "Lum and Abner" type of humor. "Eb and Zeb" were played by Al Pearce and Will.

When the comedy team of oldsters was moved by sponsor Golden State Milk to Hollywood, Will and Mrs. Wright made this their

permanent residence. Mr. Wright deserted the Coast for a New York sojourn in the late '30's where he wrote, emceed and played "Bill Wright, Vice-President," a humorously slanted commentary show on which he was vice-president in charge of any whimsy that might arise.

Today Will says "any place on the Coast is home." The Wrights still live in a neat stucco bungalow near radio row, a strategic point for the man who hops from one studio to another to appear on practically every well-known show, including Benny, Phil Harris, Dennis Day, and Fanny Brice.

When Radio Life stopped at the Wright home to renew acquaintance with the veteran actor, we literally ran across a new and highly favored member of the household. "Hebe B.

THIS MONTH Kay Kyser celebrated a full decade of broadcasting as dean of the dear old "College of Musical Knowledge." The curriculum has changed and students have come and gone . . . but the campus has remained the same great institution to its staff and alumni . . . the same happy source of listening to all its radio friends.

▶ **"BILL FONTAINE (LEFT) IS PROBABLY ONE** of the most talented arrangers in the business," observed Kay when we showed him this picture. "He knows the value of marriage between words and music in a song. His handling of the musical arrangements on our show has made outstanding examples of modern-day music. Jerry Feldman (right), who worked with Bill on our show last year, conducted his own orchestra on the Jack Paar show under his new name of Fielding, and is arranging for some of our best-known orchestras."

Jane recorded several sides with the Kyser orchestra on Columbia, and sang with the show for many weeks. Other "hidden" talents revealed by Kayser: Alan Ladd's ability at singing; Director Leo McCarey's aptitude for composing; Commentator Bill Stern's capacity for playing the saxophone!

As Radio Life reviews the honor roll of talent coached and graduated in those years, it also seems "fitten" to ask two of the faculty about their long and loyal associations with the Ole Professor.

Says Ish Kabibble (who joined Kay playing trumpet as far back as 1930):

"Without a doubt Kay is one of our great showmen. I guess the thing I most admire about him is his uncanny sense of timing. He never skips a beat . . . on music, people, laughs—even on ad-libs."

Says Harry Babbitt: "I can say this after *my* ten years with Kay.

He's one of the hardest people in the world to understand, but once you get to know him, he's one of the easiest people in the world to work for." Harry reflects deeply, when he's pressed to add how long it took *him* to "get to know" the Ole Professor. "Ohhhhhh," he scratches his chin. "about ten years."

Milton Charles

CBS Organist Milton Charles Is the Possessor Of a Fascinating Musical and Radio Background

MILTON CHARLES, well-known organist featured on CBS with his own programs as well as such shows as "Meet the Missus" (two days a week), "Dr. Christian," "Tapestries of Life" and ABC's "California Caravan," doesn't look like someone who was once a child prodigy. Hearty, handsome and humorous Charles, whose career as an organist has encompassed the theater, radio and the concert stage, started professionally at the age of twelve by playing the organ for a twenty-voiced church choir.

A native of San Jose, California,

AS MUSICAL DIRECTOR of a Chicago station, Charles had one Caesar Petrillo as assistant! The organist calls conducting the Chicago Symphony his biggest musical thrill.



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Charles had been a promising piano student selected for pipe organ instruction by a San Francisco teacher. After six months of study the young musician landed his post. "My teacher wanted me to develop the serious side," Charles recalled, "but somebody told me that you could make money by playing in a movie theater."

With Silent Films

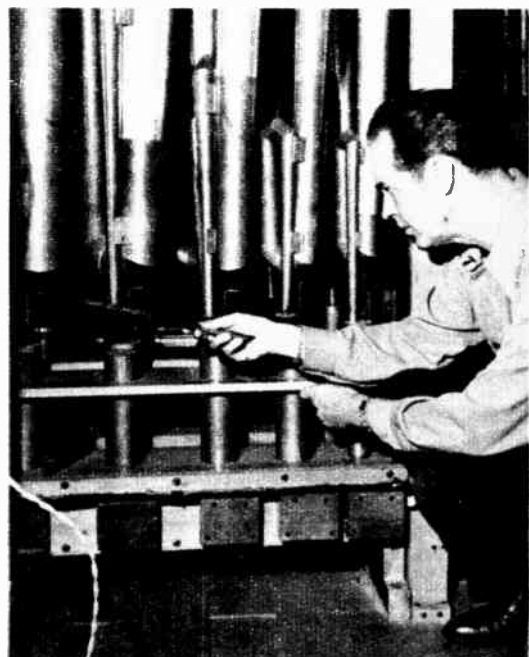
The young organist got in on the final days of the great silent movies and subsequently became a well-known theater organist until that last bit of live entertainment too was eliminated. It may be enlightening to some of you who attended silent films and were impressed by the virtuosity of the theater organist whose music changed mood with the moving figures on the screen, to learn how the musician did it. "As head organist, I seldom played the features," Charles explained. "I did the overture before the films started and usually the cartoon or novelty. Two assistants covered the rest of the program. The organists had the feature run off for them beforehand while they made notes on the action. Some organists just improvised at what they saw on the screen. I remember one fellow who was interested in classical music—he was

studying 'La Boheme' at the time. He brought the score down to the theater and played the whole opera on the organ—regardless of the action on the screen. Guys would be shooting at each other and the organist would be playing a romantic aria. Theater managers knew nothing about music in those days—so he got away with it." Sole exception among movie-makers to recognize the importance of fitting music to films, according to Charles, was D. W. Griffith, who sent his films out completely scored.

at the Paramount Theater in downtown Los Angeles. The musician recalls his long engagement at the Mastbaum Theater in Philadelphia with much enjoyment. His best friend in the city was the famed English novelist, Eric Knight, author of such best sellers as "Lassie Come Home," "The Flying Yorkshireman" and "This Above All."

In Philadelphia, Knight was employed as music and theater critic on a local paper. "He always covered our opening show. We usually had a bill of big-name vaudeville stars, but Knight's review always read something like, 'Milton Charles scored another success with his opening organ selections at yesterday's show. Among the well-received numbers were . . .' And down at the bottom of the column he would finish, 'Also on the bill this week are Sophie Tucker, Ray Bolger, Buddy Rogers and his orchestra and Armida.'" Another favor tendered the organist by the writer-critic took place when Charles wrote and performed on short notice a composition for the Philadelphia Symphony. The musician hadn't had time even to decide upon a title before the performance. Knight's review of the program gave him the news that "Milton Charles played his original composition, 'Noonday Interlude.'" "

"Vic and Sade" Organist

Another firm friendship made in the East was that between Charles and the cast of "Vic and Sade," together with their writer, Paul Rhymer. At the time, Milton was organist for six Chicago soap operas, including the famous day-time comedy show. "Vic and Sade" remains his favorite radio program of all time. "There was never a show like it before — and there will never be another again," he sighs nostalgically. (At this point your Radio Life reporter, who also happens to be an old "Vic and Sade," and Mr. Charles went off in a noisy reminiscence, filling the air with such names as "Bluetooth Johnson," "Mr. Gumpots and his horse, Howard" and other references, incomprehensible to non-fans.) "The hardest thing I ever did was to play their last broadcast and say goodbye," he added. One of the organist's proudest possessions is a recorded "Vic and Sade" show on which the characters talked about "Milty Charles, who made a pipe organ out of a rain barrel, and charged twenty-five cents a concert."

Biggest Musical Thrill

Charles calls conducting the Chi-

cago Symphony his biggest musical moment. "There's no thrill like conducting a symphony orchestra — nothing like it!" he enthused. His most popular concert was an all-American program which had come dangerously close to disaster before performance. The soloist chosen to play the McDowell piano concerto had spent weeks rehearsing a different concerto than that which Charles and the symphony had been rehearsing. The day before the concert, the two factions rehearsed together and discovered the awful truth! Charles and the Chicago Symphony switched concertos and gave a smash concert with less than a day's preparation.

Personal Life and Tastes

Charles has been back in the Los Angeles area since 1941, when he left Chicago. He lives in the Valley in a house with a swimming pool — and no organ! "I have a nice new Steinway, though," he adds. He has been married for two years and his wife, Bev, was formerly a publicity gal at Universal. As for hobbies, he says a little ruefully, "I *did* like to play golf."

Charles claims that his taste encompasses all types of music, "except over-played and short-lived novelties. I like anything with a melody. In classical music I enjoy the moderns and the romantics." He calls writing popular songs a tough racket — he has two serious compositions to his credit and plans to write more. He loves playing the organ, but admits that it can be trying and taxing. "The instrument looks complicated, but it isn't difficult in that way," he told us while trying to explain to a non-musician a medium that only musicians could understand. "It presents great technical difficulties but it's worth it. Funny instrument," he smiled. "everybody loves it — but *nobody* wants to buy it!"
