Sirs: Have read "Contest Entry Treatment" by Frank Hemingway in your December 14 issue. Would like to know why all contest rules say "write" your entry and why they object to typing when it is so much neater. It is impossible to write with ink on some of the entry blanks.

People who know about contests say about half the entries are thrown out because they do not follow the rules. Maybe that's one reason why I never hear from mine. Would like to hear what Senior Judge Jonathan Amastae has to say about typing entries, though.

We have it straight from Senior Judge Jonathan Amastae that there is no discrimination at all against typewritten entries in any contest which the Reuben Donnelley Corporation takes; and that typed entries are always considered more readable. We would assume this to be true in all contest judgments, and wonder if you did not misunderstand the story, as we can find in it no such specific remarks against "pen and ink" entries as you mention.

They came to me immediately, for that very day.

Another way to get them is to go to the ticket window at CBS early in the day, and they will hand out whatever tickets they have for that day and evening, then on over to the NBC studios and do the same thing. You can spend a whole day going from one show to another that way, if you want to. But you have to be there early or all the good tickets will be gone. Of course, you can't get tickets to the very most sought-after shows that way, but some very good ones.

Then why doesn't she try going early and take her place in the no-ticket line and ask for extra tickets from the people in the ticket line? There are always some of them. I have tried that and have never failed to find the tickets I needed.

I hope she will get many tickets from now on, for I'd like to see that girl from India get to see some of these broadcasts . . . they are so much fun.

"The Girl Friend"

She's Cast As a Sweetie Pie on the Air; Off Mike, Too, Pretty Miss Eiler Is a Gal Any Fellow Would Be Happy to Squire

BARBARA EILER is perfectly pleased with her entertaining lot as radio girlfriend to Dennis Day and Danny Thomas; daughter to William Bendix on "The Life of Riley"; and co-ed "Susan McClain" on "The Guiding Light."

But she watches anyone write shorthand with tremendous admiration. And as for considering her life as an actress any more extraordinary than the professional careers of her many out-of-the-industry girlfriends, she exclaims "Golly, no! It's just like any other job."

Barbara is probably one of the most attractive and typical early-twentysters you could hope to locate. She went to John Burroughs Junior High and Los Angeles High School; and just before she graduated she started on KHJ's "Dramas of Youth,"

through a friend of the family who'd recommended her as an enthusiastic amateur.

The crowd of youngsters who appeared on this popular pre-war series included some of radio's best juveniles today. Louise Erickson and Rolland Morris were among them. Barbara herself found holding a script "such fun" that she completely abandoned her plans for college and listed herself with A.F.R.A.

Because she's such an obviously "nice" girl, her particular charm has been in enacting ingenues, and she's been talented enough to turn most of her roles into co-starring importance. Barbara is not in any sense prim, but she does have a vaguely Victorian ladylikeness in her manner which seems to inspire courtliness. During his first radio preview, Danny Thomas came to a line of dialogue about Barbara which wasn't particularly complimentary. He stood in troubled silence and finally shook his head. "I just can't say anything like that about such a pretty girl," he protested. The audience agreed with him by breaking into applause.

Busy Life

Barbara's own candor dispels the impression that being in radio is all glamour, money and renown. "I think you about break even," she calculates. "Most of my programs are audience shows and I have to spend a lot on my clothes. Taking things to the cleaner, getting pic-

tures, keeping lunch dates . . ." She pauses meditatively. "Know what I have for dinner Wednesday nights? A sandwich I've snatched in and cherished with me all day, so I won't starve while I'm doing the Danny Thomas preview show in between the two Dennis Day broadcasts. The hours are generally that involved . . . sometimes more so."

Barbara does her own hair, which is shiny, thick and dark brown. "Can't comb it any other way," she despairs, pointing to a simply-

The Indestructible Family

Carlton E. Morse Gives Us the Story Behind His Hardy Radio Show, "One Man's Family."

IN THE THIRD of a lifetime that author Carlton E. Morse has spent bringing "One Man's Family" to life on the air, he estimates that he's used up more than 8,000,000 words, 30,000 pages, 1150 actors. He's worn out three typewriters, two secretaries and the seats of twenty-seven pairs of pants. We wondered how many full-length books would equal the amount of narrative covered by "The Family." "I'm only on my sixty-fifth book!" Morse enlightened us.

Everyone knows that "One Man's Family" fans take their favorite show very much to heart. If they don't approve of a certain happening or a character, they waste no time in letting Mr. Morse know about it. "Sometimes I feel that I have no say about what's going on any more," he said resignedly. "For instance, we introduced 'Uncle Jediah' last November—I thought he was a very enjoyable character. The actor who played the part did a wonderful, beautiful job. He was very easy to write for—the highlight of the show to me. Well, the pressure against him was so great that I've gotten

rid of the character. 'Family' fans said that they could listen to comedy at night—they didn't want any on 'The Family.'"

Power of Fans

These same fans first demonstrated their power back in 1934 when the show annexed a cigarette sponsor. The minute the commercial was over, long-distance phone calls and wires began to pour in, protesting the use of such a product in connection with a wholesome family program. After nine weeks, the pressure was still so great that the sponsor asked to be relieved of the contract. Happily, the mass protest attracted such attention in agency and sponsor circles that the present sponsor was happy to secure a program with a large and very definite appeal.

Second biggest mail crisis was reached when the beloved character "Irene" was killed in an automobile accident. "If 'Irene' dies, I will never listen to the program again," wrote in the aggrieved listeners.

"In the case of 'Irene,'" explained author Morse, "I did what I wanted to do. 'The Family' is not always sweetness and light. Someone can get killed in the story just as easily

as people can—unfortunately—in real life. In real life, justice doesn't *always* prevail, happiness doesn't *always* triumph. The character of 'Clifford', for instance . . . he'll never be a completely happy person. And 'Claudia' . . . she's a good mother, but she gets strange ideas—like anyone else. Nobody's too noble. 'Family' characters must be *human*." Sometimes the objections of fans to a character or a situation are no more than personal prejudice, Morse feels, that has nothing to do with plot structure or basic ingredients. He doesn't pay too much attention to small objections of this sort, he admits, but senses if he is offending a really large audience, and corrects it.

In the load of fan mail that reaches the author and his players, there is always some addressed to the characters as such. "Mother

A PING—WELL, to you it may be just that—ping! But to someone like Wilbur Hatch, musical director of CBS' "Screen Guild," a ping is something which occupies half a second on the air but represents twenty minutes of meticulous and cumulative work on the part of Hatch, Sandy Courage (his arranger), two careful copyists and an eighteen-piece orchestra. If you're scouting a ping, best chances of spotting one are in a "Screen Guild" script, for adapter Harry Kronman employs them extensively to indicate to Hatch a certain kind of musical effect. But Kronman and Hatch are wary about using too many of them in any one script, for as Hatch remarks, "too many pings are like shouting 'wolf, wolf!'"

"A ping," Bill Hatch explains, "is just about the most delicate chord music that you can construct. It wants to have exactly what the word says—ping—impetus, attack, yet be feathery enough not to come down like a plunk."

A ping is born in Kronman's mind as he works out the air adaptation of the cinema vehicle to be used on a "Screen Guild" show. A week before the performance, Hatch receives the script and looks it over to acquire the mood of the program and to determine what will be required musically to carry out this mood.

Then, until the following Friday afternoon, when the cast assembles for first reading, Bill simply mulls his work. By waiting, he avoids upsets due to script changes, cuts or unusual interpretations actors may give their lines. "A line might look straight," Hatch explains, "and if I went ahead and wrote music for it, I might do the music straight, but maybe the actor then decides to read the line with tongue in cheek and my music consequently should be facetious." At the reading, Bill also times the narrative spots with a stop-watch to determine to a split second how long to write his background music.

Composition Details

Saturday morning, he starts composition. It takes from four to sixteen hours, depending entirely on what kind of a vehicle is being presented. Narrative programs usually require much music to background the speaker — maybe fifteen or sixteen minutes out of an actual twenty-four-minute performance will demand music. Whatever the requirements, Hatch slants in the direction of brevity—"Catch something of the mood and get the heck out," is his concept. "Too much music," he claims, "slows down the show." During the five years he has been directing "Screen Guild's" music, Hatch has inclined more and more toward brevity and now looks back on some of his earlier and lengthier scores with amazement and amusement.

Unless specifically asked to, Bill doesn't attend a special showing of the film to be adapted, and almost without exception he doesn't follow the movie music. He feels that it is too elaborate for a half-hour air show and furthermore that most people wouldn't take particular note whether or not celluloid or kilocycle scores were similar. Only in the case of a widely popular Academy Award winner like "The Yearling"

does Hatch concede musically—following the film's pattern, he used a lot of Delius for the air score. Or, as in the case of "Brief Encounter," which was playing currently with the broadcast, Bill employed the "Full Moon and Empty Arms" theme of the Rachmaninoff Concerto for the flashbacks.

When he attends movies in the ordinary course of entertainment, Bill often has to sit through the picture twice—once for the music and once for the actual picture. "The first time, I'm too aware of the music," he smiles. "Be it lousy or good," he adds.

As fast as Hatch completes his composition, Arranger Sandy Courage makes arrangements. As fast as Sandy completes arrangements, the two CBS copyists make orchestral scores. Usually, all the work is done by Monday noon of performance night.

Pretty Accurate

Hatch seldom has to change any of his music at the last moment. He thinks that in five years he hasn't done over more than fifteen or twenty bridges. Naturally, he studies the script carefully to insure his capturing the exact mood; and too, he and Kronman, through long association, have developed a mutual understanding of terms. Seldom is it, for instance, that Kronman indicates "ping" and doesn't get just the kind of a ping he expected. If in doubt, Bill asks Harry point-blank. Very

versions of familiar fairy tales, folk lore of ancient vintage, and highly imaginative stories which she originates for her young fans. Planned to appeal particularly to boys and girls from three to fourteen, Harriett's show has won the approval of parent groups and others interested in the cause of good radio for young ears.

So if you should see two tiny blonde children happily skipping rope in the corner of the studio, or an agile small boy shinnying up the leg of the studio table, you may be relatively sure they must be the greedy King Midas' little daughter and Goldilocks and Jack, of Jack and the Beanstalk fame, just waiting for the arrival of Harriett. Then you might, another day, find that miniature gentleman, Tom Thumb, or lovely Snow White with her faithful retinue of dwarfs. In fact, you shouldn't be a bit surprised at anything you may see around KECA's Studio 4 at five o'clockish.

Always a part of "Happy Theater" is "Happy" himself. Happy, as Harriett describes him, is the symbol of happiness. He speaks in a bright little voice, is a great favorite of the youngsters. They're always writing for his autograph... a picture... permission to have Happy attend a party... or just come over to play.

In other words, Miss Harris all but brings the storybook characters and Happy to life for the youngsters. To

them, they are actually living, breathing personalities who have the exciting adventures about which the stories tell.

Fine Experience

Harriett is a radio pioneer. She did her first radio broadcast when she was a small child—as young as the boys and girls who now make up the audience of "Happy Theater." She worked on WOW, KOIL and KFAB in Omaha, Nebraska, then came to Hollywood in 1936, joining the staff of KFVB. On the Warner Brothers station she did a children's program called "Fireside Fairytales," and was a member of the original cast of the "Grouch Club."

Miss Harris started the current series, "Happy Theater," for Thrifty Drug Stores on December 15, 1947, and since then the show has been piling up favorable reaction not only from the boys and girls but also from their mothers and fathers and from educational groups. With no contests and no free offers, mail received at KECA for "Happy Theater" tallies fifty or more letters and cards daily. The program's sponsor has also received many letters from PTA groups and civic leaders complimenting them on the presentation of the children's program.

Harriett has written and taken part in all types of radio shows—comedy, mystery, soap operas, and

For example, there's the Noontime News edition featuring ace newsmen, Sam Hayes, on KECA at 12 o'clock, Monday thru Friday . . . Hayes,

as most Southern Californians know, has long been one of the most popular newsmen of this area, having been on many network and local news and sports programs over a period of many years.

Other strategically placed news programs include the Breakfast News heard on KECA at 7 o'clock, voiced by George Irwin, and the popular 6:15 p.m. edition, with Hank Weaver as newsmen, which highlights news of Los Angeles and the state as well as worldwide events, to name but two of the day's important periods.

Six of Evelyn Knight's most popular songs, heard since "Texaco Star Theater" has been on ABC, have been pressed into a Decca album named for the best-liked number, "The Lass With the Delicate Air." . . . Don McNeill and the Breakfast Club crew made a quick trip this weekend to Birmingham, Alabama, to make a personal appearance at the Municipal Auditorium for the benefit of the Mercy Orphan home. . . . in New York. The show originates right here in Hollywood, under the auspices of the West Coast ABC News Department. Sam Zelman writes and edits the scripts, Larry Robertson produces, Hank Weaver (on whom we recently carried a story) conducts the interviews, and Paul Masterson (we will soon have a Mikeman story on Paul) tells the stories. That explains the complete authenticity of the show. . . . Now all this writer has to do is hope KECA's able staff will accept a heartfelt apology for misplaced credit.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"The Happy Gang"

Heralded as "Canada's most popular daytime program," "The Happy Gang" is now heard on KHJ, 12 noon, Monday through Friday. It's a half-hour of loose-knit melody and humor, reminiscent of the days in U. S. daytime radio before the afternoon air was hammered into a stiff pattern. Along with Paul Whiteman's record session and Arthur Godfrey's daytime show, this program seems to indicate that the pattern is rapidly changing.

The program doesn't compare with its American big-brother variety shows, and probably doesn't intend to. The slickness, pace and gagging are sacrificed in favor of a leisurely tempo. The all-over emphasis is on music, vocal and instrumental, rather than jokes. Robert Pearl serves as emcee. His humor is benevolent rather than sharp and serves to introduce vocalist Eddie Allen and the instrumentalists who make up the orchestra. These musicians get a heart-warming amount of name credit on the program, and deserve it. Cliff McKay, clarinet and saxophone; Jim Nemo, xylophone; Kathleen Stokes, organ, and Blain Mathe, violin, are the principal artists.

"Stop the Music"

Mark well the time on KECA, 6:00 p.m., Sundays—the program in that slot is "Stop the Music," destined to be the most talked-about participation show since Ralph Edwards thought up "Miss Hush" for "Truth or Consequences." The only similarity between the two shows is the nation-wide telephone calls by which the lucky listeners stand or fall.

As you might guess from the title, the hour-long show is built around the identification of tunes played by the orchestra in the studio. Most of the tunes are so simple that the listener at home without a phone is apt to go mad from frustration. Melodies of the current popularity of "Golden Earrings" and "I'm Looking Over a Four Leaf Clover" are about as difficult as the prize-winning queries get.

The phone numbers called seem to cover the country very fairly. On the first broadcast, ten calls were made. Among the prizes offered for identification of titles were a Philco radio-

phonograph combo, complete Laundromat setup, etc. Listeners who were called but were unable to make the proper identification were gifted with a watch or electric oven. In case of the person called muffing the question, a studio audience member is allowed to make his guess and collect the prize. A mystery tune serves as the Jackpot question. In this case it's a haunting melody familiar to everyone—but not by title, evidently. Participants are given a chance to guess the title of this one too. So far, no one has, and the list of prizes has now soared into the fabulous.

Entertainers who keep this exciting participation idea rolling are emcee Bert Parks, orchestra leader Harry Salter and vocalists Kay Armen and Dick Brown.

We hear that the first broadcast had people calling up the station to volunteer their answers. This is *not* the purpose of the show, but it serves to indicate how exciting "Stop the Music" seems to be.

Rance Valentine

Another personality who seems destined to attract a large audience of early-bird listeners is Rance Valentine, KNX, 8:30 a.m., Monday through Friday. He could be called a homespun philosopher, 1948 style, or a radio comedian. Neither appellation fits him exactly, because he's really a combination of both—with his own particular style.

He fills his whole fifteen minutes with a leisurely stack of gags, one right after another. His method is a little like that of Bob Burns—minus the drawl and the timing. Here's a sample of some of the topics he covered in one morning and his comments on each:

Laziness—" . . . definition of a lazy man is, a guy who goes through a revolving door on *your* push."

Dish-washing. ". . . Men save themselves a lot of trouble by theorizing that washing dishes requires a special knack—a knack that only women possess."

Husbands and wives. ". . . Of course I wear the pants in our house—the only thing is, you usually can't tell it because my apron covers them up."

Advice. ". . . There ought to be some organization where people could go to exchange their problems, because everyone always knows how to solve the other fellow's."

We took these lines down as they came over the air and probably haven't gotten Valentine's careful phrasing exactly right. Anyway, it's a little indication of his whimsicality and good humor.

Incidentally, Valentine offers copies of part of his scripts for those who have been particularly intrigued by a certain topic. Requests go to Rance Valentine, KNX, Columbia Square, Hollywood.

Delightful musical comedy and light operetta selections seldom heard and happily remembered can be found on every broadcast. . . . To the good spirit and comedy generated on Groucho Marx's "You Bet Your Life." Groucho's St. Patrick's Day lineup included one of the most delightful contestants we've heard in many a day—an Irish bachelor who works as head of maintenance at a Wilshire synagogue. . . . To Dorothy Kirsten's charm on a "Twenty Questions" guest appearance. The soprano star of the Metropolitan Opera proves that divas do have senses of humor. . . . To Gabriel Heat-

ter's striking of a more hopeful note. Commenting on the President's recent speech to Congress, Heatter forsook his customary gloom and intimated that he thought things were looking up. . . . And speaking of the Irish, we'd like to point with pride to Dennis Day's rendition of "McNamara's Band"—with all stops out. . . . To Todd Russell, who emcees "Strike It Rich" with dignity and a sense of *listener* fair play. Recently he handled one of the most exciting spots we've ever heard on an audience participation show—a veteran whose trailer home had burned, leaving him and his wife and child with nothing. 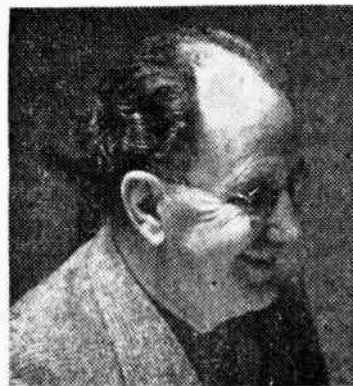
Radio-ite Passes

Barbour" is the favorite subject for these personal letters, and the show sees that they are answered in character. As the program goes along in its pattern, the letters average between sixty and seventy a week, then a crisis or an offer sends them soaring. One announcement of the "One Man's Family" record album brought 20,000 letter responses.

Family Beginnings

As the show is now in its seventeenth year, we were interested in Morse's recollections of its beginnings. "I remember the past story of 'The Family,' about as well as most people recall their own family history," he said. The actors who made up the original cast were recruited from another series which Morse was presenting over a San Francisco station, Minetta Ellen, the one exception, was appearing with the University of California players in the Greek Theater when she was tapped for the role of "Mother Barbour." At one time, Morse could claim to have used practically every Hollywood radio actor in the cast of the show. The influx of newcomers from Chicago and New York has made that claim impossible lately, but many Hollywoodians got their radio start with Morse. Rosemary De Camp made her first radio appearance as one of "Clifford's" girl friends. Barbara Jo Allen ("Vera Vague") played "Beth Holly," "Paul's" friend, at one time and Hal "Gildersleeve" Peary figured in an early Morse cast.

Many of the present cast members have in reality grown up on the show. Page Gilman, who plays "Jack," was just sixteen years old when the show started, has now spent half his lifetime enacting the part. Winifred Wolfe, "Paul's" step-daughter "Teddy," made many radio people feel suddenly old when she married two years ago. Winifred, now the mother of a daughter, was a bright eight-year-old when she hopped on the "Barbours" garden gate and won her place in listeners' hearts. Mary Lou Harrington, Dix Davis and Conrad Binyon emerged from childhood to adolescence in the story and in real life. Little Dawn Bender, a seven-year-old when she first appeared as "Margaret," is growing into a charming young girl.

Difficult Roles

Two of the most popular characterizations were those done by Kathleen Wilson as "Claudia" and Walter Patterson as her husband, "Nicky." Morse feels that Barbara Fuller, the present "Claudia," and Tom Collins, now "Nicky," have both done a difficult job extremely well in following the original two in their beloved roles. And people who had written in to tell Morse that they "wouldn't listen under any circumstances if another 'Claudia' came back," are

listening and still enjoying "The Family" and its two cast changes.

Keeping the long-lived show tops in popularity seventeen years after its introduction would be a full-time job for most writers, but Mr. Morse has found time to dash off several other top air shows. "I Love a Mystery" was perhaps one of the audience favorites and Morse is considering a revival of it on television. "Adventures by Morse" was another thriller series turned out by the versatile scripster. Barry Fitzgerald's whimsical comedy show, "His Honor, the Barber," came from the Morse typewriter. Every year he does a fifteen-minute transcribed series, "The Upper Room," for the Methodist Church. Currently he is writing an hour-long drama for the Ford Theater, "Fathers Are Important."

Morse writes easily and organizes his work with little apparent effort. A work-day goes like this—he gets up at 5:30 a.m. and is at work in his office at 6:30 a.m. He finishes a "Family" script in two 6:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. sessions — "If I'm hot," he smiles. "If I'm not, who knows?" He averages four and five pages of script an hour. He writes the show right off the cuff—without notes or outline. He doesn't do corrections or re-writing on the script until he sits down with the cast at the rehearsal reading. He makes changes as the cast read their parts for the first time. The only other time he sees the finished script before his cast does is "when the NBC censor has a squawk." He admits that his wife, Patricia, is adept at catching grammatical errors in his work. She also can offer valuable criticism on character lines. "That's not the 'Father Barbour' I know," is the way Morse quotes her on a particular objection.

Six-Week Wonder

"The Family," according to its creator, is not based on any real group, his own family or anybody else's. "The only similarity with my family is that it's conservative."

Seventeen years ago, did the author know that his show would run as long as this? "I thought it would last as long as I wanted it to," he smiles, "but Don Gilman, the program director, told me to write it so it could be concluded in six weeks if it didn't go over."

drama, but says none of them is as much fun as a program for children. The child audience is a critical one, but it is also a responsive one. When a child likes a show, he likes it wholeheartedly, and doesn't mind saying so . . . as the hundreds of letters which arrive for "Happy Theater" indicate. And those letters do not hesitate to ask to hear their favorite stories enacted. Hear them they do, as fast as the days roll around, in order of the number of requests received for a certain story.

rarely, Kronman will answer, "I expected something a little heavier." If Bill has constructed a ping using a harp chord and a celeste chord augmented with pizzicato strings, he may change it to a muted brass ping. "A ping," explains Bill, can be a minor ping, a major ping, or a disturbing or close dissonant. But whatever it is, it's usually high register."

Unless the musical portion of "Screen Guild" presents a really tough problem, Hatch seldom confers with Producer Bill Lawrence or Kronman. He appreciates the opportunity to use his own imagination, although he also turns an interested ear to suggestions which are timely. Bill laughingly recalls the minute directions one writer (not Kronman) gave him in the script. "Music"—the cue read. "A rather slow, lethargic main title that begins fairly high and full and then develops into a heavy bassoon theme punctuated by shimmering flute notes."

"You will write the music yourself if you do this again," Hatch threatened the exactingly fussy scripster.

"Next week," concludes Bill, "the same fellow turned in a script without a single musical suggestion. Where he wanted music, he had indicated it by writing 'music.'"

Competition Is No Cause for Complaint

Eddie Has a Regular Formula for His Twenty Years of Continued Mikedom.

WHEN youthful looking, silver-haired Eddie Chase returned to his old West Coast stamping grounds a few months ago, he left a city whose number of radio stations per capita didn't hold a candle to Los Angeles. But the competition of being one among many to spin records guaranteed to catch and hold the public ear held no terrors for Eddie.

In the first place, Eddie's beginnings in radio wised him up the hard way. He has not only sold air time, but he's seen to it that this time was filled with satisfactory entertainment. Secondly, he's a born showman. Once he literally braved lions to be "a little different."

Today his way of being "a little different" is to avoid killing himself in the frantic rush toward being first to play a record.

"Everybody's trying to outdo everybody else getting the new releases. What's the big hurry? People enjoy listening to the standard, popular records—or they wouldn't be standard or popular. I play the new ones when I know the public wants them.

"And I certainly don't pretend I can tell what will be a hit. If I were able, I'd go to the record companies and prognosticate the success of certain discs. They'd each happily put a million dollars in trust for me . . . because knowing a successful tune ahead of time would make two million for them!"

Early Disc Jockey

Mr. Chase's formula has proven successful for twenty years. He, in fact, rates among the first of the disc jockeys. Just after his graduation

from California's U.C.L.A., Eddie started selling time for KECA, then called KTM. In lining up talent for these air hours, Eddie decided much of the underpaid pre-AFRA talent available wasn't nearly as pleasant to hear as a good phonograph record. In 1927 he put record shows on the air.

But Eddie hankered to get into the performing end of radio. None of the local boys would take him seriously, so he packed up and left for Chicago. There he inaugurated the "Make Believe Ballroom" on Chicago's WCFL, where it remained a popular feature until he moved the mythical rhythm center to Detroit.

Eddie refuses to enter into the controversy of whose ballroom came first among the three that sprang up some steen years ago. He sounds sincerely curious about the dispute that arose in the past.

"Who cares what one came first, as long as each of us thought we were being original, didn't steal the idea from one another, and kept the listeners happy?"

In Detroit, Chase's "Make Believe Ballroom" is rated so highly that Eddie now continues to pipe a show east from here.

Sports Fan

It took Frank Burke, Jr., KFVD's astute general manager, to coax Eddie back to Los Angeles for his daily show. The lure on which he

THE MAN who is probably responsible for changing the food habits of more people in America than any other single individual is Mutual's soft-spoken food commentator, Victor H. Lindlahr.

Wise homemakers are learning many new tricks these days from the man who, for eighteen continuous years—a record in radio—has been proving that there's magic in foods.

"It isn't how much you spend for food that counts nearly as much as what you buy for your food dollar," says Lindlahr. "This is no time for either food fads or luxury spending unless you're a millionaire, and then, of course, it doesn't matter much."

Still, the expert continues, keeping yourself and your family well-fed needn't etch lines of worry on your face. It's perfectly possible to stay within your budget and within the bounds of excellent health at the same time, provided you take advantage of what nutritionists have been discovering about food.

The first thing to do, he advises, is to get acquainted with food values. You don't have to eat choice steaks and sirloins for nourishment. Actually, you'll get far more from cheaper cuts—delicious stews and meats like liver and kidneys. Even the lowly hot-dog has a fine share of energy-giving protein (provided it isn't full of cereal fillers).

Ancient Prejudice

You are far better off spending

part of your food dollar for a less expensive cut of meat and the rest for fruits and vegetables than you would be with a tenderloin steak. The disdain attached to stews is really a hangover from feudal times, declares Lindlahr. In the old days, the lord and lady of the manor dined on choice cuts of meat at one end of the table and left the rest for the lesser members of the household. But those eating "liver and lights" were actually better off, nutritionally. Meats like liver and kidneys are far richer in vitamins, minerals and high-grade proteins than are the costlier chops and steaks.

"Know-how" in buying vegetables is most important, too, adds the nutrition expert. The price of a vegetable is not an indication of its food value. What you should look for is freshness and ripeness. Don't buy expensive vegetables that have a lot of waste. And what's more, use all of the vegetables you buy. Beet greens, for example, which many women throw away, are literally powerhouses of vitamins and minerals. They're delicious, too, when quick-cooked and chopped up with a bit of onion for flavoring, or mixed with another leafy green like spinach. The lowly cabbage, provided it isn't cooked to death, is one of the most nutritionally valuable vegetables we have, according to Lindlahr. Shred it fine for coleslaw or quick-cook it so that it retains some of its crispness—and you have a dish fit for a king.

The nutritionally wise cook gets a bonus with her vegetables—the pot liquors. Water in which vegetables have been cooked is often far more effective than vitamin pills, because it provides vitamins and minerals

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A MEETING with Diana Bourbon inspires curiosity. For this remarkable and interesting woman is reserved almost to deprecative about herself as a person, even while she talks with chatty frankness about her life and career.

Miss Bourbon now heads the Hollywood offices of Ward Wheelock agency, which means that she coordinates and supervises production on all the CBS-Campbell Soup programs, "Club Fifteen," "Double or Nothing," Edward R. Murrow's news, and until recently "Meet Corliss Archer." She has been in radio for the past fourteen years (1943-44 of that spent with the O.W.I. in London and Paris).

This last overseas "visit" was a familiar but far from "old hat" experience to Miss Bourbon, who was a confirmed European until 1929, when she came to New York to write a syndicated column for Hearst. She

Just Like a Woman

Admirable Diana Bourbon Had Tidily Set About To Manage the Hollywood Branch of a National Agency, Plus Three Coast-to-Coast Radio Shows

has made many trips back and forth since, and still speaks so affectionately of London, in particular, that it would seem she misses that side of the Atlantic a great deal.

Editorials for Harper's Bazaar and frequent stories in Cosmopolitan and Liberty gave Miss Bourbon's byline high journalistic repute in the early 1930's. She did many important scenarios for Columbia Pictures in Hollywood and for Warner Brothers in England. But about her fine literary background she makes the comment: "I always hated writing. It used to terrify me. To counter-balance, I tried to antagonize people. I'll admit I was disgracefully delighted when I managed to get Liberty magazine banned in Canada!"

Miss Bourbon's own reading tastes are extensive (on her desk at our interview lay a thick French classic and two or three intelligent biographies and novels). She expresses dislike for magazine stories (probably her familiarity with the mechanics of them). "They're all so stereotyped. Read the first paragraph and you know what's to come. And that's deadly!"

Obviously, Miss Bourbon is allergic

to being bored. She demonstrates a keen, absorbent mind in her business activities and probably has the same zest for keeping herself interested away from the job.

Personal Life

She drives a car for relaxation, and she likes to be out in the sun. She has just bought a house in Pasadena — "a very strange little hidden-away place. The address is on California Street, but I defy anybody to find it on California Street" — and she is looking forward most of all to having "a large garden." Miss Bourbon's office in Hollywood is attractively crowded with unusual plants and ivy, and at her soon-to-be-left apartment up the hill she has been furiously trying out her green thumb on "the window boxes on the porch."

Miss Bourbon used to enjoy directing, and often finds herself fidgeting in her now more executive capacity. She joined Ward Wheelock in 1934, control-boothing "Hollywood Hotel" and the George Burns-Gracie Allen programs (Gracie Allen still counts prominently among her good friends) and she also remembers gratefully her past production of the old Ken Murray show. "We had some good

times," she confesses. "I'm afraid I have many more headaches now."

What she means is not too difficult to understand. The responsibilities alone in managing an agency (without the added burden of network shows) are colossal. There are clients to placate, ideas to "baby along," artistic employees to encourage, until the overall picture becomes one seething mass challenge to tact above and beyond the call of duty.

Miss Bourbon is one of the few women in radio, we think, who could swing the job. Her dignity and ability are respected to the "nth"; her sense for technicalities matches with that of the best of them in the business; she can accost touchy situations and people with control and humor; and she certainly has a realism seldom found in the feminine species!

Miss Bourbon was on stage in England and Paris; and in New York she played the lead in Galsworthy's "Loyalties." "I was thinking of 'Loyalties' the other day," she reflects. "That play could not be done now, because of bigotry. It's frightening that we have reached the pussyfooting stage, isn't it?"

Her own experience in the theater has given her some marked ideas about good radio. "I've always had the theory that radio people should be recruited from show people," she says. "With agencies so prominently concerned in air programming, someone who was a wow as a file clerk is handed a stop-watch and made a producer. You'll find that the *fine* things in radio come from theatrical experts!"

She Doesn't Fit a Pattern

Pretty Frances Robinson Has Appeared in the Big Time of Both the Airways and the Stage, but What Do You Suppose She Calls "The Time of Her Life"?

OLD IS THE story of starry-eyed girls heading hopefully for the East Coast with its myriad, and generally legendary, stage opportunities, or for the West Coast, where film and radio glamour are supposedly an inevitable end.

But the story of a girl who since the age of four has had so many opportunities that she's been kept shuttling back and forth between New York and Los Angeles is a switch.

So it was with Frances Robinson, tall, golden blonde beauty, who started in show business when she played Lillian Gish as a child in "Orphans of the Storm." That began the cross-country shuffle.

Early Innocence

Frances moved to California at the age of nine, daughter of parents who knew everyone in show business. For several years she enacted a variety of juvenile roles at Universal Studios. Then, eight years ago, a family friend called her on the phone and

practically apologized for asking her to audition for a radio role. As Herbert Marshall explained to her that day, "I know, Francie, that you can do the role—that's why I want you in the part, but let's face it—the director is handling the show, and he's the one to be satisfied."

Today Frances shudders at her innocence. "My only memory is of reading the role, then blandly announcing to the director that it simply had to be read with a slight Cockney accent. The director, poor man, paled visibly at the thought and refused to hear of it. I went ahead and read it the way I thought it should be done anyway . . . Fortunately I did know Cockney well. But I can see myself pulling a trick like that today," she laughs.

Her first radio role thus became a co-starring part on "Silver Theater," and made the young actress eager for more of this medium. But relative unknowns who burst on the air horizon in so spectacular a fashion don't get called for the variety of smaller roles that are so remunerative and satisfying. Frances had her reputation blocking her progress.

Happily, an opportunity arose to appear with Allan Jones in the Broadway musical, "Jackpot," and Frances packed to leave for the East once more. Her determination to establish herself in radio there drove Frances on and on until one day she found herself a tired girl with ten New York shows a week on her hands, among them "Perry Mason," "Ellery Queen," "Inner Sanctum," and "The Aldrich Family."

Among actors, one of the men Frances particularly admires is Jose Ferrer. She tells a funny tale of going to work opposite Ferrer in "Philo Vance," when that worthy was a summer replacement for the Bob Burns show.

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The Man Behind YOUR Grand Slam



Robert Lee Johnson Makes a Career and Hobby by Teaching Bridge Duffers to Improve Their Games And Their Tempers, Holding Contests for Experts

IN THE more than twenty years that Robert Lee Johnson has played bridge, he has compiled some interesting statistics and observations about the game and the people who play it. His broadcast of the "Bridge Club" on KMPC for the Signal Oil Company has given him the largest "club" in the world.

He admits, however, that his broadcast of the "Bridge Club" was the idea of another. He was conducting bridge classes for the "Jolly Jonathan Club" in downtown Los Angeles back in 1934 when he was asked to substitute for Spencer Kapp, the Coast's outstanding bridge authority, at the Jonathan Club. Several sessions later he was approached by someone who asked whether he would put a bridge program on the air if he had a sponsor. Radio was a new medium but seeming to Johnson an ideal one for bridge, the instructor was willing to take the chance. He was airing his program on a local station for the City Dye Works, his first sponsor, practically before he could reconsider.

Here he learned the potentialities of a bridge radio program—the hard way! Since his contract was for a thirteen-week period, Johnson figured he could teach a complete bridge course in thirty-nine lessons. Consequently, at the end of his contract he not only completed his course but also lost his sponsor!

Since that initiation in broadcasting, he has conducted his program so that it can continue endlessly. The fact that there are over five billion bridge hands which can be played and about which the expert can inform his listeners makes this desirable.

Robert Lee Johnson has been heard without interruption, except for one year with the Army Air Forces, for the past thirteen years on four Los Angeles stations. For the past four years he has broadcast from KMPC.

Presents Features

His "Bridge Club" program, which, he claims, gives a complete course in the bidding and playing of bridge during a year's listening, is divided into nightly features. On Monday's broadcast, the bridge problem of the

week is given and listeners compete for the weekly prizes. Friday evenings the winners of the previous week's contest are announced and any mail or other bridge material of general interest is discussed. Tuesday and Thursday nights are devoted to bridge lessons. Wednesday evenings a bridge quiz is given and the instructor answers listeners' questions.

Winners of his weekly bridge contests are given a copy of one of the three bridge books which Johnson wrote in 1936. Over 100,000 copies of these, "Last Word in Contract Bridge," "Leads, Signals and Discards," and "Cue Bidding," have been sold.

In January, 1948, the emcee-host of the "Bridge Club" began a new feature, the Signal Contest Honor Roll, in which KMPC listeners who are three-time winners of his contests are made members. Expert Johnson verbally deals the hands and poses the questions as to the best manipulation of the clubs, diamonds, hearts and spades. Three correct answers out of a possible four constitute a "win." At the conclusion of the year's program, Johnson plans a bridge contest in which all honor-roll members may compete for the grand prizes of the year.

During the time that the "Bridge Club" has been aired, the expert has discovered that his principal listeners include business and professional men, with a great proportion in the legal and medical sects. Women listeners represent the business as well as domestic fields. Johnson observes that the percentage of men who enter his weekly bridge contest is seventy per cent to thirty per cent women.

Enjoys Game

"I don't claim to be an expert bridge player," Robert Lee Johnson insists. "Bridge is just like any other game—to be expert you must stick to it, and I am afraid that I am only able to devote one night a week to it—that night is spent with my wife and my friends who enjoy the game. When you play with congenial people

who consider the game a partnership affair, you can't help but enjoy it. All you need for an entertaining evening is a card table, a deck of cards and a scrap of paper." Regarding the proverbial bridge-table argument, Johnson advises that "All bridge arguments occur only from errors in judgment, not from knowledge, and, after all, we all make errors in judgment."

In addition to his bridge vocation and hobby, instructor Johnson has a consuming interest in dogs. His favorites are English and Irish setters. Currently he is the owner of an English setter boasting six blue ribbons. Happily, Mrs. Johnson is as avid a bridge fan as her husband, and many of their spare hours are devoted to improving their game.

When not conducting his "Bridge Club" program on KMPC or playing the game with his friends, Johnson can usually be found imparting his knowledge of bridge to hospitalized veterans at Sawtelle.

He avers that he has never gotten tired of the game. "And I probably never will," he concludes enthusiastically.

Lindlahr's effect upon his listeners is in a class by itself. Twelve years ago, when he casually announced that he was going to broadcast a seven-day reducing diet and asked how many listeners were interested, he was flooded with 26,000 responses in three days! The work for one such show, CBS's "Double or Nothing," rests on a brisk young woman who bears the title "Category Girl"—and who works almost all her waking hours.

Emily Vetter is her name, and she has a wealth of experience in radio through her association with various advertising agencies in New York and Hollywood. Emily is a worker with plenty of "tools" to keep her liberally supplied with material for the eighteen various categories, plus the "grand slam" and "sweepstakes" questions for each of the five days a week. Among these "tools" are the daily paper, periodicals, Webster's dictionary, World Almanac, Information Please Almanac, the encyclopedia, Roget's Thesaurus, quiz books, biographical dictionaries — and conversations with other people.
