"Tell It Again"

"The Bookshelf of the World" Is What Armed Forces Radio Service Calls This Program of Great and "Twice-Told Tales"

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Just as we go to press, we have been notified that "Tell It Again" would probably go off the air early in February. However, we feel that this story is of sufficient interest—and the program of such merit—that you readers will still be interested in it. If you're a listener to this excellent series and would like to protest its departure from CBS, write to the network with a request that the program be retained. If you've never heard the show, read our story and see if you don't agree that a program of such caliber is deserving of air time. We hope the rumor of "Tell It Again's" demise is a false alarm.)

Saturday, 2:00 p.m.
KNX

IF YOU would travel with King Arthur to win "Excalibur" . . . be enchanted in "Midsummer Night's Dream" under the great cloak of Oberon . . . weep with "Les Miserables" . . . thrill to the romance of "Ramona" . . . shudder inwardly at "Jekyll and Hyde" . . . there is a program for you. It is called "Tell It Again."

Dynamic little Ralph Rose, writer-director of these great dramatized classics, has three problems with his series: sound, acting and adaptation.

"Tell It Again's" stories require the creation of multitudinous unusual sounds . . . falling guillotines, sides

of mountains caving in, rockets taking off to the moon. Jack Dick and two assistants (no less than three soundmen can possibly work the show) achieve some startling results. For instance, the recorded growl of a tiger, played back at a speed faster than normal, once became the scream of the fabulous "roc," gigantic bird which carried stones large enough to wreck a sailing vessel and throw "Sinbad the Sailor" and his shipmates into the sea.

"Acting is a consideration," explains Ralph Rose, "because we are doing classics, and not modern things. All our characters need to be overplayed, and that type of drama is not too natural to our actors in Hollywood, who are trained in the 'throw-away' school."

And the problem of adaptation is a cutting one. Most of the books which Rose selects for "Tell It Again" are 400 to 600 pages long; plus the fact that "there are many things in those old stories that you just can't put on the radio." Except for a famous line or two that readers will undoubtedly listen for, the radio narration of each volume is Ralph's original writing. To pull off this rather tremendous scripting, Ralph tries to use out of a story what he

thinks will impress the average person most.

From Albums to Airtime

Does he read all those books himself? Ralph is familiar with many of them through his considerable literary education. His wife, Doris, and his fourteen-year-old brother, Neil, (of whom Ralph is legal guardian), help him with the rest. Ralph likes to try his scripts on Neil, because "he's just the right age for the program." Doris Rose recently sold her first script to "Stars Over Hollywood." "She has the woman's angle," smiles Ralph. "She always says I can't write domestic stories because I don't understand how women think."

Ralph and "Tell It Again" found their way into radio in an inevitable manner. As a former symphony conductor, Ralph last year wrote and directed nine Columbia albums for children (the first of which, featuring Basil Rathbone as "Long John Silver" in "Treasure Island," sold beyond wildest expectations). With the exception of "Hansel and Gretel" and "Alice in Wonderland," these albums became the first "Tell It Again" radio presentations. Now, with the recording ban off, the reverse will be true and the programs which have been most effective on the air will soon be available in album form.

Carmen Dragon's orchestra is featured on the albums, and Del Castillo's organ on the programs. One time only, Ralph handled a presentation from the podium, and that was unavoidable. He had to fly to New York for the recording date and it developed that for the time it would take to explain his orchestrations to somebody else, he could better conduct them himself. "I think it's a pretty good album," he reflects, "but the over-all acting tended to suffer, whereas the music was excellent."

Musically a Marvel

Now, strictly from the writer-pro-

ducer's view, Ralph is quite interested in the musical situation they have on "Tell It Again." A large orchestra was used to audition the program, but in order to hold it to a low-budget show Ralph cut his musical staff to Del Castillo and his Wurlitzer organ. It was later discovered that the addition of a single man to handle percussion instruments created the illusion of a full orchestra. Johnny Jacobs and his equipment (tympani, vibraharp, xylophone, field drum, snare drum, bass drum, temple blocks, gong, tam-tam, tambourine, bells, cymbals) take up so much room that the dramatic and production cast of each program are housed in an adjoining studio with contact established by headphones.

Recently, for the story of "King Arthur," Ralph insisted that he also

absolutely had to have a French horn. "And it sounded as if we'd added five or six *more* instruments!" he enthuses, "so we're featuring one horn from now on." The newest member of the "orchestra" sits in a chair on top of the grand piano, because a better effect is achieved with his horn blowing directly into the room rather than into the microphone.

"Now, believe me," Ralph stresses about this unorthodox setup, "I've had many, many musicians visit my home, listen to playbacks of 'Tell It Again,' and say: 'Your orchestra is great. Are you using ten or fifteen men?'"

Del Castillo, for whom Ralph has profound admiration, does an original score for each story, following script jottings in the inimitable Rose

It's Channel 4

In Nearly Every City From Which NBC Is Telecasting. But Only One Place Has the Letters KNBH. They Stand For Television — National — Broadcasting — Hollywood

NBH has no intention of starting operation with a flashy big clambake, then falling flat on its face through a period of weak programming."

That sound approach to public appeal, as expressed to Radio and Television Life by Hal Bock, Manager of Western NBC Network Television, reflects exactly the sort of sound business acumen that is bound to lead NBC into the front ranks of video entertainment.

We had called on Mr. Bock, a few weeks before Channel 4 hit the air,

Free-Lance Talent Available

"In planning good entertainment it seemed advisable to augment our regular three-hour nightly program with a half-hour special treat, rather

than to cram all the cream into our first night on the Channel.

"For instance, our first couple of weeks' evening fare will also include a thirty-minute live spot with 'Fib-

ber and Molly, Garry Moore, Bob Hope, Ralph Edwards, Art Linkletter, and the rest of our stars who are cleared for televised appearances. Luckily, most of our artists are free-lance and can appear at any time."

Mr. Bock went on to explain that the programs surrounding these two weeks of special tidbits for viewers will be made up of kinescope and professional acts which KNBH has spent the preceding few months picking from the ten daily auditions held.

The live talent has been carefully screened from the applicants already once screened by established, recognized talent agencies.

"The percentage of non-professional talent is just too great for us to handle in a sensible way, right now," Mr. Bock explained. "General auditions entail lights, engineers and production crews, all of whom cost a good deal. We aren't trying to mix arithmetic and showmanship, but the fact still remains that outside of salaries and our kinescope equipment, \$1,200,000 will have been spent

by the day KNBH first telecasts. On top of that we don't figure to break even on our operation for several years.

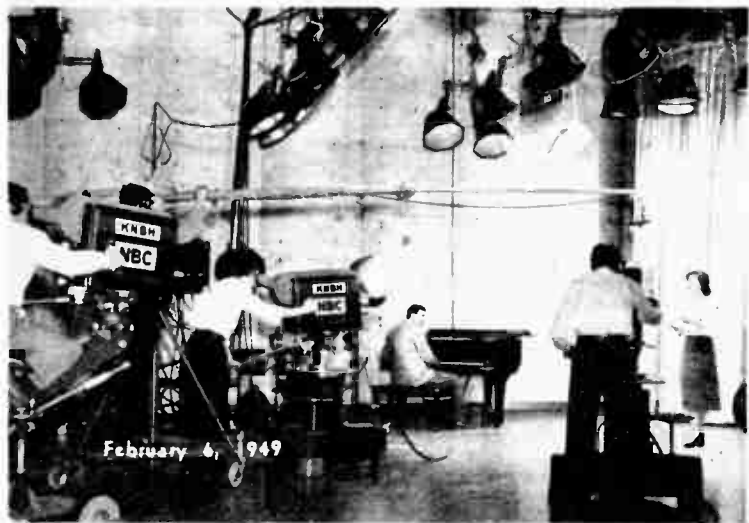
"It's true that the bulk of the television audience realizes there are tremendous expenses involved, and realizes, too, that it is watching the growth of a new industry. But that same television audience isn't going to be receptive to bad shows simply because the medium is novel.

"The fact that we are NBC and have had eighteen years of television experience in the East certainly doesn't mean we think we know everything about it. But we do know that you can't put video across successfully without proper preparation for production, lighting, rehearsal and good sets. Our concentration on

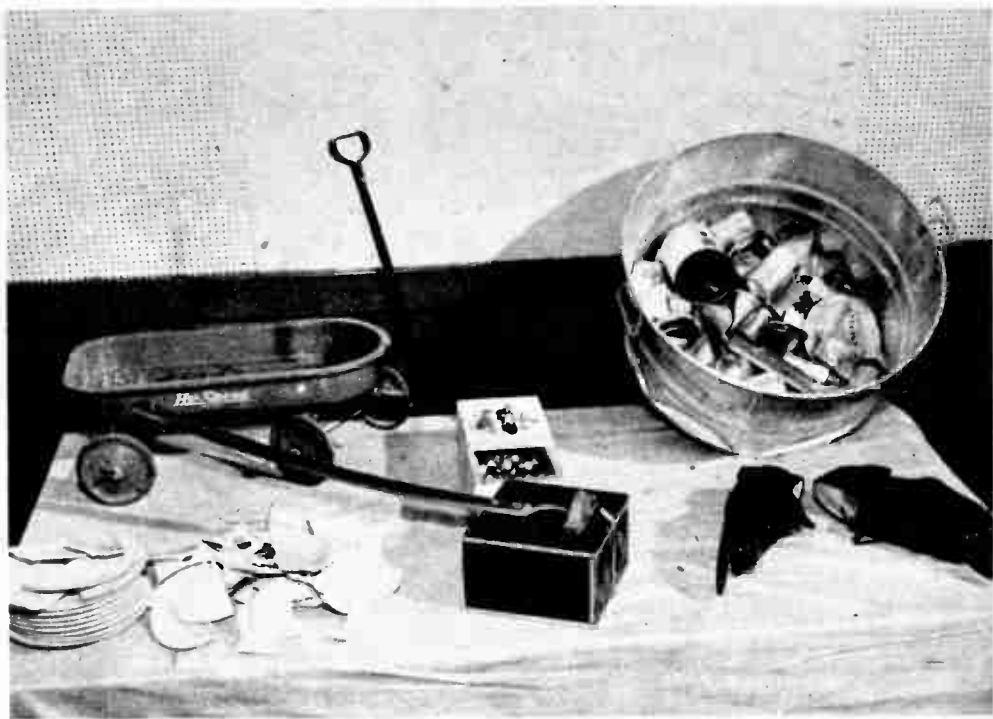

"Song Jury"

Of considerable interest to budding composers of either amateur or professional status should be KFWB's "Song Jury," 3:30 p.m. Sunday. The program judges the value of new unpublished songs submitted to a jury consisting of a singer, an orchestra leader, a composer and a disc jockey, and headed by KFWB's Bill Anson. The best song each week is held over for a second week's hearing and recommended for publication.

If you are a hopeful song writer, here's the information you're probably waiting for. Two lead sheets of your composition must be furnished to the program—one for the pianist and one for the vocalist. Send them to "Song Jury," Station KFWB, Hollywood 28, California.

From a non-song-writing listener's viewpoint, the show is equally entertaining. Vocalists Annette Warren and Clark Ross, assisted by composer-pianist Ted Mossman, do a good job of putting over the new and untried songs. Interesting guests of the music world are to be found on the weekly jury. Carl Brisson, Beryl Davis, composers Nacio Herb Brown, Jimmy McHugh and Harold Adamson; disc jockeys Steve Allen and Peter Potter, and band-leaders Freddy Martin and Dizzy Gillespie have been among those heard. We especially liked the opening conversation between Anson and Gillespie. "Hello," said Bill. "Be-Bop," replied Dizzy.

. . . To Steve Allen, who's still "Breaking All Records" in fine style over at KNX at midnight. In addition to his more obvious talents, Steve al-

ways manages to sound like "such a nice boy."

... To that charming Kenny Baker who appeared as "Baron Schober" on the "Railroad Hour's" "Blossom Time." Kenny's every song, every line got the sort of response from the audience that indicates his return to the air with his own show would be wonderfully welcome.

We View With Alarm

... Bob Elson's "On the Century" program giving up its fine old "choo-choo train" effect for a Diesel sound effect. We like our trains to sound like trains—not like carpet sweepers!

... The bad name that giant contests and giveaways seem to be acquiring these days.

... This mispronunciation of the names and titles of classical compositions and composers on the part of local disc jockeys. We fully expect to hear someone say "Ravell's Bowler oh" sooner or later.

... And speaking of disc jockeys, aren't they playing some dull discs lately? Time is nearing when they'll have to depend on their own taste and libraries and stop pressuring the public with new releases that are being pushed in the record stores. One good record comes along, and without benefit of pushing, it becomes popular enough to be "discovered" and "claimed" by four different discers on the same night. We're speaking of Vera Lynn's record of "Again." (We've been playing our copy since Christmas.)

ALBUM OF THE WEEK: Another in RCA-Victor's fine recorded series of operettas makes its appearance this week in the eight sides comprising Friml's "Vagabond King." ... With Earl Wrightson and Frances Greer as soloists, and the orchestra and Guild Choristers conducted by Al Goodman, here are some of the finest melodies composed by Friml, and, as presented, they insure some exceptional listening pleasure. ... **CONCERT ALBUM OF THE WEEK:** If you're in a mood for beautiful, restful yet sparkling music, don't miss the imported London six sides by Eric Coates conducting the New Symphony Orchestra in his own compositions. "By a Sleepy Lagoon" and "Bird Songs at Eventide" will be very familiar, but you've a treat in store when you listen to the full-range recording of "Knightsbridge March," "Wood Nymphs" "Television March," and "Song of Loyalty"—selections that reflect sentiment, buoyancy and optimism in a musical era of figurative and actual dissonances. ... **JAZZ VOCAL:** Starr (Kay, that is) shines brightly this week in a pair of contrasty sides for Capitol. ... "Second-Hand Love" in slow tempo is strictly on the torchy side, but Kay brightens it up with a solid kick on the reverse "You Broke Your Promise" to fine backing by the Dave Cavanaugh musicians, ... **MALE VOCAL** nod goes to Dick Haymes for a top waxing of Alec Wilder's unusual "Where Is the

One"—a tune that will take several listens before it registers. Too much credit cannot be given Gordon Jenkins for his fine instrumental arrangement and backing on both sides, the flip-over being the standard "My Silent Love" (Decca). ... **NOVELTY:** Maybe the title is a little long, but "I've Been Waitin' for Your Phone Call for Eighteen Years—Maybe You Don't Love Me Any More" is done to a turn by Columbia's Beatrice Kay in a south-of-the-tracks accent. Fully half the record is used in telling of Bea's love for procrastinatin' "Joey," while the latter half has some snatches of vocalizing strictly for chuckles. ... If you want to flip it over, you'll hear "How Come the Mortgage Got Paid," but you'll wear out "Phone Call" first.

DIALAGNOSIS

Program Views and Reviews from the Tenth District P.-T.A.

By JUNE D. PRAY

Today's column is for you—not your neighbors, not your friends—just you. It's about you and your radio and your programs. Yes, that's right, *your* programs. You put them on the air and you keep them there. Often you are to be complimented for your programming, often it leaves much to be desired—but you are responsible for it. "How so?" you say. "I had nothing to do with it—nobody asked me—if I don't like it, I turn it off." We repeat, *you* are responsible.

First of all, you have an investment in radio through your purchase of a

set. You have a capital outlay of more than \$3,000,000,000 in receivers—far more than the total capital outlay of all networks and stations in equipment. Thus you are paying for your entertainment just as truly as if you were buying a ticket at a box-office, and you have every right to protect that investment by seeing to it that it delivers the programs you want.

Second, the wave-lengths of the air belong to you—the people of America. With your taxes you maintain the Federal Communications Commission, which you have set up and empowered

to act for you in granting the right to use your air waves to over 2,000 radio stations—provided they operate in the public interest. The FCC is your servant—your voice—your court of appeals in that respect. All you have to do is keep it informed as to whether your tenants are living up to the terms of their lease.

Third, look on your pantry shelf. Do you have a brand of cereal there which sponsors a children's radio program of which you disapprove? If so, you have done your bit to keep that program on the air and to expose your own child to its harmful effects. Do you have a brand of soap there which pays the bills for one of the daytime serials you have so long and loudly protested? If so, you are contributing to its support. Do you buy the headache remedies or cosmetics or cigarettes that sponsor horror programs or boring audience-participations or second-rate whodunits? Or do you

Awards Made

"Emmy," that most desirable of ladies among the tele-world, made her debut before a full house at the first Academy of Television Arts and Sciences' splashy dinner Tuesday night, January 25.

KTSL telensed the entire proceedings, as presentations of "Emmys" were made at intervals during entertainment by Frank Veloz, Ben Beri and Maria and Miranda; Connie Haines, Clark Dennis, Bill Thompson, Frankie Laine; Herb Jeffries and Edie and Rack.

Station award for best all-over TV advancement during 1948 went to KTLA, with station director Klaus Landsberg accepting. Charles Mesak, of Don Lee's TV, won the Technical "Emmy" for outstanding advancement in the video field. Mesak, it seems, developed the "phase-fader," something much too technical for us to explain in a fast one hundred words or so.

Shirley Dinsdale's several years of making her puppet, "Judy Splinters," one of the most popular little misses to hit the air and television screens was rewarded when an "Emmy" was bestowed on Shirley as local tele's "outstanding personality of the year."

Marshall Grant-Realm Productions' "The Necklace" won an "Emmy" as the best film made for television.

The final glittering gold lady, for the most popular video program (voted on by the viewing audience, via the mails), went to Stokey-Ebert Enterprises for "Pantomime Quiz."

"Emmy" is undoubtedly inspired by the Motion Picture Academy's stalwart and cherished "Oscar," but her old-fashioned name is derived from as modern a device as the year that saw her born.

As Harry Lubcke, prexy of the TV Academy, explains, "Emmy" comes from 'Image Orthicon.' The Image Orthicon camera has been shortened to I.O., among technicians, and from this I.O. shortening the word 'immie' was derived. When the award came into being, 'immie' . . . hence, 'Emmy' was a natural."

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

Bozo the Clown

A couple of Sundays ago, "Bozo, the Clown," unveiled his "Barrel of Fun" feature on KTTV's Channel 11 at 7:00 p.m.

The show, designed especially for kid-appeal, features also "Josephine, the Monkey," Swami Sing Pu with his

bag of tricks, and Ringmaster Pokey, whose specialty is juggling. "Hector" and his dog troupe visit the show occasionally.

For our money, "Bozo," played by Pinto Colvig, is one of the best bets for video we have seen. Pinto brings to the TV screen with him some thirty-odd years of circus, silent movie, stage, vaudeville, and radio work, and manages to unleash the best of each experience straight into the camera lens. His clown costume is in the best tradition from the world of nonsense; the whimsical turn of mind that has made "Bozo" records top sellers is evident; and the sheer happiness of Colvig around children further adds to a top spot on KTTV.

Just occasionally direction and camera work slow the show down. You can scarcely expect a live monkey or a troupe of seven dressed-up pups to leave the stage with the alacrity of a trained thesp, but we rightfully expect the man-operated cameras to pan elsewhere during these taggly moments. Possibly the boys behind the lens get as carried away with the show as we viewers, and just don't realize they are supposed to be working, too. It would be so easy to do.

If the memory of anything from the sawdust world is a happy one, arrange to see "Bozo's Barrel of Fun" a Sunday night soon. A great act.

Second Glances (Critical Comment)

"Philco TV Playhouse"

Edmond Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac," with Jose Ferrer doing "Cyrano," was presented via kine-scope to Channel 4 (KNBH) viewers January 16 as part of the regular "Philco Television Playhouse" series, Sunday nights at 9:00.

The film would have been a treat on any terms, but the fact that direction and camera work combined artistry of filming with good technical direction made it superlative. The whole of "Cyrano's" sorrowful, swash-buckling existence stayed within the confines of a TV camera range, but the viewer didn't think of that until later.

Of course some of the best tricks of filming—focusing on an object near the camera without leaving the background figures mere fuzzy blurs, for one thing—are made possible by the wondrous television cameras and lenses.

The business of illusion was employed full force. It's obviously impossible for a television camera focused on a stage set to capture the patrolling of the Paris ramparts by a raggedy band of defenders. But the single flash of a silhouetted figure marching atop a wall can trick the mind's eye of each viewer into seeing just such a defense of Paris walls.

It would be plain presumptuous to comment on Jose Ferrer's performance. Frances Reid as "Roxanne," Robert Carroll as "George Le Bret" and Ernest Graves recreating his original role of "Christian" kept pace with Ferrer's fine dramatics.

manner. On "Gulliver's Travels," for instance, Ralph's margin notes indicated that he wanted "A ponderous, heavy, low theme with woodwind effects, to contrast difference between one big person and many little people." Ralph seldom hears the results of these script memos until actual rehearsal time, but always anticipates (and receives) a terrific surprise at Castillo ingenuity.

The large juvenile audience of "Tell It Again" prohibits horror or shock effects, so any such contrasts are achieved in music. For the transformation of "Jekyll and Hyde," Castillo sustained a forty-five-minute music cue, starting with a rumbling tam-tam and building up and out. A similar effect was developed for the scene in "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" when "Quasimodo" falls from the top of the cathedral.

Unprickly Genius

Ralph adds that he is "a very funny man when it comes to bridges." He can't stand two- or three-second music cues, and he'll have no truck with a bridge under ten seconds, usually more approving twenty!

He also feels that, with Norman Corwin, Lawrence and Lee, etc., he is a pioneer in trying to get agencies and stations to let writers direct their own scripts. "There is a theory," he admits, "that writers are too close to their material to part with lines or non-essentials." For that reason, Ralph is very conscious of "being objective," so he writes his scripts three weeks in advance. After making corrections from the standpoint of a writer, he puts his work away. A week later he retrieves it and reads it to Neil and Doris, this time assuming the attitude of a director holding a script which someone else has brought to him. No matter how much it hurts, he takes, and acts on, criticism.

Ralph varies "Tell It Again" from week to week, to include a thundering adventure story such as "The Corsican Brothers," a classic such as "Peer Gynt," a charming story such as "Black Beauty," in case listeners who have not been pleased by one production will be by the next.

All presentations are of writings at least fifty-six years old, and consequently out of copyright. Ralph is now waiting eagerly for the Conan Doyle volumes to become public domain, so that he can do "The Speckled Band" and "The Hound of the Baskervilles."

"Eager Beaver Rose, you know," he adds. "There is one question which is always asked of someone with a new program idea, and that is: 'Can you sustain it?'" When Ralph went on the air with "Tell It Again" January 18, 1948, he prompted many chuckles on the third floor of CBS by ambitiously supplying a list of the countless different stories he

would dramatize for the full year. He delivered exactly as he had promised, but with some sheepishness he showed up with a succeeding list of titles for the new year of 1949.

"Instead of laughing this time, though," he relates triumphantly, "all they wanted to know was, did I have a schedule for 1950!"

good preparation in all departments should result in good shows. By doing that, we think KNBH will have done something pretty fine for our television audience."

The kinescope to augment KNBH's live fare will bring mentalist Dunninger and ventriloquist Paul Winchell, with their "Floor Show," to Channel 4, as well as Lucky Strike's film series (which presents some of the best-known thespians from the stage and screen in stories that are standard classics); the NBC newsreels; and the Jerry Fairbanks-made films especially prepared for NBC. Latter are the "Public Prosecutor" and "This Is Our Land" series.

Questions All the Same

Mr. Bock, known throughout the big studio as "Hal," not only holds claim to being the Hollywood NBC employee of longest continuous service, but he may well some day be the KNBH employee of longest continuous service. Hal switched from West Coast Director of Network Publicity and Public Relations into television two years ago. He can still smile happily and state without qualification that "it keeps on being a pleasure to get up in the morning and come down here to work. I enjoy everything about television."

Queried about dealing with the hundreds and hundreds of applicants who would give their eye teeth to work for the big network's television operation, Hal laughed and admitted that he is sometimes puzzled by the various approaches.

"You know, the more than 1,000 applications from people in all jobs and all walks of life fall into three pretty general categories. Those in one group want to come in and work without pay, just for the privilege of learning. The second group are the normal, ambitious souls who are willing to trade their time and abilities for the fair salary they should receive. You probably know about that third class that show up in every profession. They are heaven's gift to every new medium, and blandly assume they should make a million dollars the minute they step through our door." Hal understandingly dismissed this latter bracket.

"The questions work about the same way. I'm always asked 'Tell me about television.' 'How can I get into television?' 'How can I make film that will sell to television?' or 'Do you want a great idea for a show?'" Hal ruefully continued. "That last usually turns out to be

Thirty-Minute Dinner

Individual Meat Loaves

1 lb. ground beef
2 slices bacon ground with beef
1 slice bread
4 T. catsup
1 1/2 c. milk
1 egg
1 T. minced parsley
Small onion, chopped fine
1/2 t. sage
Salt and pepper to taste
Cook onion until tender in a little fat.

Pour milk over bread, let stand for a few minutes, then mix all ingredients. Pack in well-greased muffin tins or small custard cups, and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

At the same time, put cold boiled potatoes, which have been cut into long strips 1/4 inch wide. Brush well with melted shortening, season, place in a small pie pan, bake with meat, turning occasionally.

Grate a bunch of carrots—arrange in layers in a greased baking dish, seasoning each layer with salt, pepper, butter or margarine, and a bit of sugar, or many times a bit of ginger is added.

Cover and bake at the same time as meat and potatoes are browning.

Stardom For Starr

There Were Two Kay Starrs — One Was a Success And One Wasn't, But Both of Them Are Wonderful!

Monday, 7:30 p.m.
ABC-KECA

KAY STARR is now a petite, vivacious songstress with her own show on ABC, rapidly en route to sitting on top of the world. But you should hear about the Kay who weighed 170 pounds, couldn't get anywhere because she was "only a jazz singer." That Kay experienced frustration on every side until Fate, in the person of a business manager with a taste for jazz and an eye for talent, saw her night-club act.

Part Indian, Part Hillbilly

"I've ruined more record companies," she laughs as she begins the story of her fight for recognition. Kay was born on an Indian Reservation in Oklahoma—like Will Rogers

she can say "My ancestors didn't come over on the Mayflower—they were there to meet the boat." Gifted with an unusual voice, she had her own local radio program when she was nine. "For six years I sang nothing but hillbilly songs," she confesses. Joe Venuti, the great jazz-fiddle man, discovered Kay and signed her as vocalist. She toured with the band, developing into a top jazz singer. Bob Crosby, Glenn Miller and Charlie Barnet were leaders of some of the bands with which she sang on tour. Illness and loss of her voice called a halt to her band-singing career. For a whole year she could not sing at all—could hardly speak. Kay finally recovered to find that her tones were huskier than ever.

In Hollywood, she attracted atten-

tion in musicians' circles, but no further. She made several records with Wingy Manone, the local Dixieland king, for the Boris Morros company. It went broke and sold out to the ARA company—which went broke. Another venture with another company for which Kay made thirty sides, ended the same way, with Kay on the non-payment end of a salary check. Those records were sold to various companies—most of which went broke. Starr fans who've tried to unravel the puzzle of just what labels feature these past recordings are no more mystified than Kay herself. "I'm liable to turn up anywhere," she laughs.

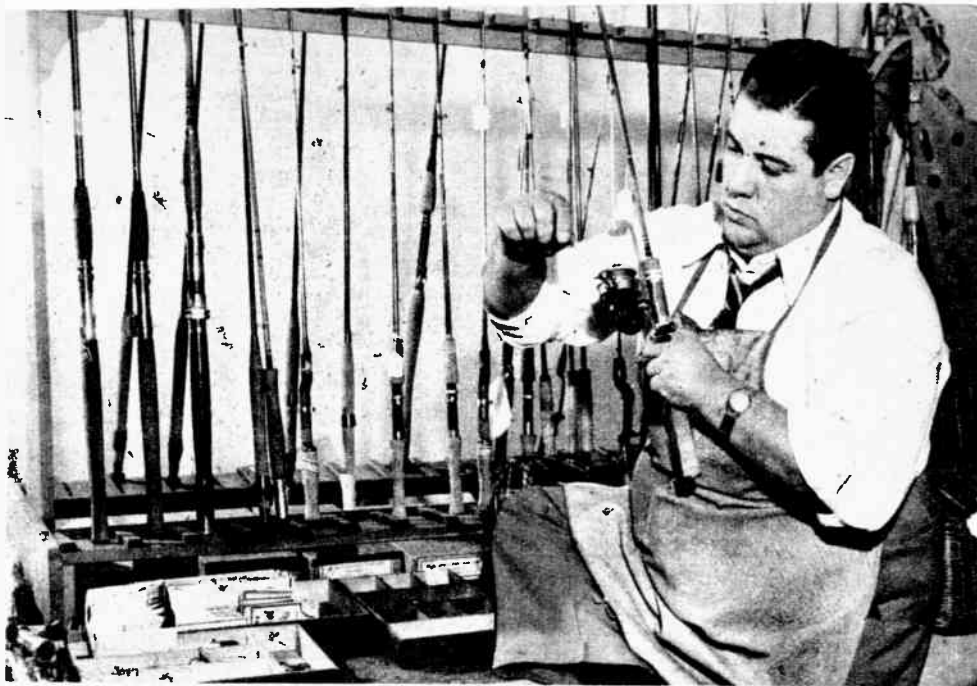

MARCH 1 will be a big day for a big guy in radio.

On that date, Jack McElroy, 245-pound emcee of ABC's "Breakfast in Hollywood" and singer-announcer of "Bride and Groom" over the same facilities, plans the grand formal opening of his spanking new and exclusive Rod and Gun Shop, at 5666 West Third Street (near La Brea) in Los Angeles.

It was inevitable that McElroy set himself up in this sideline business, which will get nearly every hour of his time not actually devoted to broadcasting chores. Inevitable because when jovial Jack gets wrapped up in an extra-curricular activity, he funnels all his excessive energies, of which he has ample quantities, into making it nothing short of a complete success.

Ventures into the business world are not new with McElroy. In the past few years he has done every-

thing from managing a commercial flying school at Tulsa, Oklahoma, to operating a ballroom at Santa Monica, California, and running his own photography shop in Los Angeles. Jack entered none of these businesses blindly, but rather became engrossed in each of them only after months and months of familiarizing himself with their many ramifications. Consequently, today the "orchid man" of "Breakfast in Hollywood" is an expert pilot, photographer, fisherman and hunter, and has a thorough working knowledge of music.

Forming a partnership with McElroy in the operation of the Rod and Gun Shop is Dick Harris, ex-Army Major of both wars with twenty-two years' service to his credit, outdoor editor of the Hollywood Citizen-News, contributor to such publications as Field and Stream, Outdoor Life, and the National Geographic Magazine, and long-time close friend of McElroy's.

JM WHEN Bob Oates was a youngster, his dad owned a 160-acre ranch in the Tehachapi Mountains. Up there, Bob learned to ride and acquired his first horse, "Ranger," a little white five-gaiter of no special breed but "with the most beautiful single-foot you ever saw. Just like riding in a cradle."

Bob has ridden in rodeos, as a showman and "Grand Marshal," most of his life. He has been able to double-tongue whistle and Swiss yodel since he was ten, knacks which he quite by accident discovered he possessed. He is also one-sixteenth Cherokee, and comes from Oklahoma City (although he grew up in Glendale and attended Hoover High School).

So it is novel that this personable young man (who placed first and second as a Western ballad singer on four straight broadcasts of the Horace Heidt show, who wowed them with his sagebrush voice at the Tex Williams Riverside Rancho, and who now has his own "Whistling Westerner" series over KIEV) concentrated on anything but Western music until just one year ago.

Seagoing Cowboy

Bob first sang professionally as a soloist in the Eleventh Church of Christ Scientist, Los Angeles. While he was in the Navy, he had his own band aboard ship. He'll tell you frankly too, after several years of it, that if there is anything which leaves him cold it is standing four or five hours on a bandstand singing popular and love songs for a dance crowd.

Western music is another thing. After four weeks on the Heidt show (where he emerged victorious twice and obtained second place twice) Bob appeared on the Heidt floor show at the Trianon Ballroom for six weeks, was in San Diego for three days performing before 10,000 people and sang in the Heidt Quarter-Finals

in the Hollywood Bowl before 18,000 people.

His record of "Doggone It, Darlin'" has already been released by both Princess and Crystal, and most of his other specialties will be available with the lifted ban. After winning four times on the Tex Williams show, Bob was asked to join in organizing "Country Carnival," the West Coast's answer to "Grand Ole Opry," featuring Cottonseed Clark, Carolina Cotton, T. Texas Tyler, Monte Hale, and infinitum Western entertainers. He did some energetic publicity for the project, and was instrumental in bringing it to the Glendale Civic Auditorium for its few weeks on the air. When the "Carnival" returns, as any brainstorm of that caliber would have to, Bob will again be part of its "center stage" talent.

Quite a Promoter

It occurred to him recently too that

there is no feminine counterpart to the Sons of the Pioneers; and with five pretty youngsters from the 97th Street Corral he is now building an All-Girl Western band and choral group. He also had what he describes as "a very nice audition" at Paramount.

He thinks the field is wide open for Western entertainment in video, radio or the movies. "When we first came out here," he says, "you couldn't find a Western program on the air, except for the Beverly Hillbillies. Now it's the trend."

And he has a real preference of his own for ballads. "They have such a wonderful feel to them. I can put myself right out in the prairie or into the mountains, singing any one of them.

"In fact," he smiles emphatically, "I love Western music. And I'll be singing it now for the rest of my life."

Radio Warm-ups

No. 5 of a Series

Our Roving Reporter Continues Unearthing the Pre-Show Antics That Warm Up Studio Audience And the Performers to the Broadcast Sharpness

BELIEVE it or not, people aren't the only ones who have warm-ups on their radio shows—dogs have 'em too. Or one dog does. "Lassie," just like other radio stars, has a routine with which she enter-

tains her radio audience before show time. And there's not another star in radio who can duplicate it.

The dog star even brings her own stage props, a heavy rug for the studio floor (to keep her from slipping) and a box to perch on. Announcer Charles Lyon starts the "Lassie Show" warm-up by introducing the trainer, Rudd Weatherwax. At Weatherwax's signals, Lassie plays dead, rolls over, leaps, prays—goes through all the tricks that have made her famous. A lucky child is chosen from the audience to take part in a scene Lassie has enacted in her movie roles. The child walks away, supposedly toward danger—Lassie goes after him, takes his wrist in her mouth and gently but firmly leads him back. The child usually gets a big kiss from Lassie, too.

Don't Hurt Lassie!

Calculated to drive the kids wild with excitement is the next stunt. Lyon tells the children that Weatherwax has a new and extremely fierce dog which has been sadly mistreated and is very dangerous. Off-stage come frightening growls. Would the children like to see this monster? Yes, of course they would! Rudd, over Lyon's protest, sends Lassie off-stage to bring the tough dog on. Howls and growling come from behind the curtain. OO-oooh, Lassie might get hurt! But no, suddenly Lassie appears with the end of a leash in her mouth, and on the other end is the smallest, mildest miniature French poodle you ever saw!

The One and Only

Also over NBC way, that fabulous entertainer, Red Skelton, goes through a bag of tricks that has a grown-up audience screaming as loudly as the small fry do at the Lassie stunts. Red reserves most of his knock-about comedy for his famed after-shows, but this season he is prefacing both his preview on

Wednesday nights and his broadcast on Fridays with a short warm-up. It starts in typical Skelton manner with Red sticking his head through the curtain and screaming at the audience. (We don't know *why* this should be funny, but it is!) Big, handsome Rod O'Connor comes on stage and glares back into the wings, "Hey, Skelton, you forgot to introduce me." Skelton sticks his head out and says, "Ladies and gentlemen, Rod O'Connor." O'Connor introduces Red, who asks the people to applaud sideways instead of up and down, so it makes more noise. "And hey, if you laugh real hard during the show, we'll have an after-show. Is it a bargain?" Red has so many routines that he does some on preview night and a different set on show night. There's the "Irish Tenor" act with Skelton posturing at the grand piano, fighting with the

hard-luck career, Kay got married and became the mother of Kathy (now two) who has been described by impartial observers as "the cutest baby in the world." The marriage didn't last and Kay was left with one very young baby daughter and one career that looked distinctly unpromising. "For a whole year, I averaged between three and four hours sleep a night. I'd take care of the baby during the day and work in night clubs at night. Don't let anyone ever tell you that something you want isn't worth working for! I would come home from work so tired I could hardly stand up. Then I'd take a look at Kathy sleeping and I could do anything!" she smiles fondly.

Rising Starr

After this rugged year, the formerly robust Kay no longer weighed 170 pounds. She became ill and took her baby to live with her parents in Memphis. Back in Hollywood, Kay was so lonely she called her mother to say she was coming home to stay. "If you really want to sing, stay where you are," her mother replied. Kay went back to a night-club job. One night while she was on the stand at the now defunct Morocco Club on Vine Street, her singing attracted the attention of Berle Adams, an artist's manager who had helped other singers and musicians up the ladder. "Are you open-minded about singing?" he asked her. "Open-minded!" she exclaimed. "I sang hillbilly for years." Adams was certain that Kay Starr was a girl capable of capturing critical publicity, so the two made an artist-manager deal. "You're only as good as your manager," Kay smiles now. "When you're starting out, you can have all the talent in the world, but nobody seems to have time for you." And, suddenly, the "new" Kay Starr emerged. Her dark hair, which she had worn long and straight, was cut into a saucy bob that matched her piquant face and wonderful smile. Her figure regained the trimness that goes with a small-boned, five-foot-two frame. Her flair for clothes and a husky speaking voice that makes her simplest sentence sound like a treasured secret top off the shining Starr personality.

Bright Starr

She began making records for Capitol—and this company stayed intact. She made one guest appearance with the Steve Allen show on CBS and got invited back so many times she became co-star. She bargained for a fifteen-minute show on ABC and they gave her thirty minutes, "Starring Kay Starr," and Buzz Adlam's orchestra with announcer Owen James. She was invited to take Peggy Lee's spot on a Crosby broadcast—then she got pneumonia. She emerged from the hospital on Satur-

day and did the Bing show on Sunday. Realizing that Kay was not too strong, Bing split up her vocals, gave her one on the first show and promised to call her back another week for the second. She's returning now for six commitments.

Her own show is doing fine, thank you. Recently she added a talent hunt to the program. "It took me sixteen years to get my big break," she says sympathetically. "I want to make it easier for others."

Last Christmas Kay married Harold Stanley, a local night-club owner. "Now," she sighs luxuriously, "I'm the owner's wife—I can watch the other people work!"

pianist, firing guns, screaming and carrying on. There's a routine about a man eating popcorn in the movies, chewing in time to the action on the screen. There's another movie-bit, with Red enacting a man trying to find a seat in a crowded theater. (He squirms across an aisle in the audience to put this across.)

He's Got a Million

Other Skelton-isms are a pantomimed tennis match, various vaudeville routines he performs with his business manager, Edna Skelton Borzage, a drug-store soda-jerk skit and his famous Guzzler's Gin act. Skelton usually winds up his show with his shirt drenched—partly from the bottle of water he throws around during the Guzzler's Gin routine (he's a television announcer, sampling the sponsor's product) and partly from working up a good, honest sweat. He thanks the audience for coming and laughing and giving him so much pleasure. It's no wonder that after a recent show, a member of the audience stood up at this and shouted "We think you're wonderful!"

Canova Capers

Another NBC-ite, Judy Canova, does a unique spot. The Canova warm-up starts with genial Howard Petrie introducing the cast members one by one. The sound man accompanies these introductions with appropriate effects—as Verna Felton sits down, the orchestra plays a loud boom! as Hans Conried bows, the sound-effects man rips a cloth. Mel Blanc, who plays "Pedro," reels off some of his famous impersonations: Jack Benny's Maxwell, "Bugs Bunny," a Hammond organ playing "Beer Barrel Polka!" Judy herself

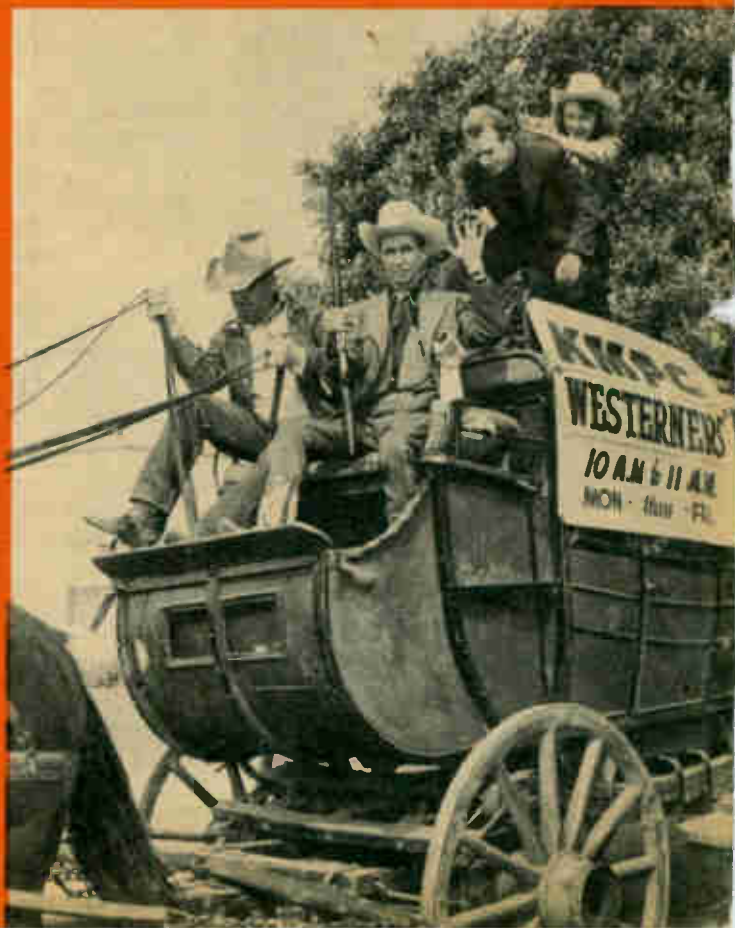
