| • No. 2 1/2 can solid-pack Tomatoes | 6 oz. sharp American Cheese |
| • 1 small can Hot Sauce | 2 cups Fisher's Biskit Mix |

Melt butter, add vegetables and lemon and cook covered 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, hot sauce, sugar, salt, seasoning and heat to boiling.

Blend 1/4 cup of the cheese with the Biskit Mix. Beat egg with milk. Mix into cheese mixture until barely blended. Divide into 8 spoonfuls. Drop into gently boiling tomato mixture and spread remaining grated cheese over the top. Cook 5 minutes uncovered. Cover tightly and cook 15 minutes longer.

A SMART-LOOKING convertible glided into the CBS parking lot and out stepped a nice-looking family: dad, mom, and the two boys. They could be taken for a typical well-to-do American group on their way to the Friday night movies. Yes, a very nice-looking family: Ozzie and Harriet Hilliard Nelson and their sons, David, twelve, and Ricky, eight, on their way, not to see a show but to present one: the weekly "Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet."

Trooping into Studio B, they settled down to work immediately. It was already 6:30 and they had to be ready to record the program by 9 o'clock. Much of the preparation was over, for a studio preview had been held two nights before, but Ozzie was allowing at least a couple of hours for final polishing. Accordingly, Ricky wasted no time shedding his long, light topcoat. His crew haircut slicked up jauntily, the youngster seated himself at a small table with its own microphone. David found his script; Harriet slid a perky fur cape off her shoulders and onto a chair back, stopping first, however,

With Sons David and Ricky Now Playing Themselves on the Nelsons' Airshow, the "Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet" Have Become an Adventure for the Whole Family

to let Ozzie supervise proper lighting and posing mikeside while the stage crew beamed various spots on her pretty face and figure.

"Let's start on Page 1," piped Ricky. Starting on Page 1 is a Nelson family gag. Ozzie smiled back at his younger son and rehearsal began. "Get up in there, baby," Harriet admonished David as he started to read his first lines a little too far back from the microphone. Smoothly as glass the reading progressed. When in doubt about proper rendition of their lines, Harriet and the boys turned to dad for interpretation. He would know, for Ozzie does a heavy share of the show's writing, working practically all week in his office in the Nelsons' Hollywood home. Every minute the family was rehearsing, however, not the slightest hint of tension was shown. Ozzie was on mike almost all the time for this particular show, but Harriet and the boys had off moments while Oz and "Thorny" tangled. Harriet spent hers examining some obviously new brown suede shoes and, finally, lifting the sole lining to tear out a small support. David picked up his mother's magazine and studied the pictures. Ricky, who had been sitting like a cherub, suddenly was everywhere: begging a piece of cake from the soundman, sitting on the bench of the Hammond organ and dangling his feet, eating his cake in the control room, and hauling the blankets off the orchestra drums. Suddenly David put down his magazine and did a low hurdle over some stage chairs. Ozzie was unperturbed.

Heavy Schedule

The Nelsons were ready to do a rehearsal "pre-cut" at 7:20. Then they polished their lines a little more,

adjourned to comb hair, and assembled onstage a few minutes before 9 o'clock in ample time for a small warm-up. In front of an audience, the boys played their parts as if they had always been on the program. In fact, many fans still don't realize that Tommy Bernard and Henry Blair, who were playing David and Ricky until last March, have been replaced by the real David and Ricky. The Nelson boys probably would not have assumed their show roles so soon had the networks clung to their recording bans. But once the bars were lowered and "taping" of programs was allowed, Ozzie and Harriet were eager to cast David and Ricky in their very own parts. David might have joined his parents on the air almost any time before now except that the Nelsons were averse to having him undergo the pressure attendant on a live broadcast. Ricky, who reads remarkably well, would have had to wait for three or four years before his parents would have countenanced his live radio venture. But with taping, there is a feeling of ease. A mistake is not irrevocable. The Nelsons cut each Sunday's show the previous Friday night. By using both pre-cut and audience taping, Ozzie can combine and edit to obtain a nearly perfect broadcast.

According to Harriet, the boys have



always wanted to participate on the Nelsons' program. Ever since Ozzie and Harriet started their adventures five years ago, David and Ricky have tried to follow scripts at home or have gone along to the studios to watch proceedings. Recently the Nelsons first tried them out on a couple of previews, and when they came through with flying colors, the boys acted as if they had gotten good report cards. When told they were to join the cast, both exclaimed, "Oh, boy!"

Wholesome Outlook

Because so many things in their

A Highly Specialized Group of Listeners to Whom More Than Five Men in a Musical Group Spells "Big Band," a Thing to Be Shunned, Perhaps Don't Know Whose Music They Are Hearing on Radio Shows

FOR THE past few years there has been a movement afoot among radioites to establish air credit for every cast member contributing to the excellence of the show. Unfortunately, thirty minutes will never allow for a rundown of the crew of worthies who work behind an orchestra leader's baton. The leaders themselves would be only too happy to have it known that men such as "Matty" Matlock and "Doc" Rando, graduates of one of the greatest aggregations in band history, were on hand.

And many a member of the specialized group who trip the streets nightly in search of their favorite musicians would abandon their search to flip on their radios nightly should they realize that these two,

whose names are as reminiscent of the old Bob Crosby "Bob Cats" as a strain from "South Rampart Street Parade," lurked in the reed section of several radio show orchestras. Listeners might not single out the duo's instrumental work, but knowing they were there could well satisfy the numbers who for six years have moaned and groaned about the disbanding of the "Bob Cats."

J. Arthur Rando of New Orleans and Julian C. Matlock of Paducah, Kentucky, started twenty years ago on the roads that led them into a close friendship and onto the stages of such shows as NBC's "Duffy's Tavern," the Harris-Faye show, "Chesterfield Supper Club," the old Johnny Mercer, Pepsodent and Old Gold shows, and many, many more of recent years.

Basin Street to Broadcasting

"Doc," having grown up in New Orleans, can't remember his introduction to music. At one time or another he has heard all the greats that made New Orleans legendary, jazz-wise. When he was a child of six, his nurse once took him for a Sunday outing on a Fate Marable riverboat. These excursions were famous for the glimpses of scenic beauty they afforded the passengers, but more famous for the music of the jazz men who made their living playing aboard. Years later, young Rando, then not entitled to the "Doc," played side by side in the New Orleans Police Band with Yellow Nunez, a name almost forgotten by those who don't literally revere jazz.

Matty's musical education began when he put himself in hock for a

thirty-eight-dollar clarinet to play in the Boy Scout Band. It took him four years to pay for the instrument whose early possession led Matlock to become one of the country's outstanding arrangers and clarinetists. A natural musician, Matty experienced no formal education in music, a factor that didn't prevent him from "naturalizing" himself into such excellence on the licorice stick that his second band job, with Ben Polack's group during the early thirties, was as replacement for none less than Benny Goodman, even then a top man. Matty's first work had been Beasley Smith's Nashville hotel orchestra.

About the same time, "Doc" Rando joined Pollack in New York. Between sessions of turning out what are now

collector's items, in the company of the Teagarden brothers, the Dorseys, the Bauducs (one was drummer Ray), Gil Rodin and a dozen others who have since made their names as big-time leaders, "Doc" attended Columbia University and later interned at the New York Post Graduate Hospital and the Presbyterian Hospital.

When a share of the Pollack gang organized into the "Bob Cats," Matlock and Rando moved their chairs into the original group, Matty to pull great tones out of his clarinet, Doc from clarinet and tenor sax, on many choice discs.

During the late thirties, Doc dropped out of the band to practice medicine for several years, rejoining

ELMER PETERSON, NBC newscaster, broadcasts from San Francisco most of the time. Recently he journeyed to Hollywood for a brief visit and Radio-TV Life grabbed the opportunity to query him on his news background, reported to be one of the most adventurous in radio.

Peterson admits that he has traveled more than most newsmen, but says it's due to his unmarried state rather than to any inborn sense of adventure. Peterson was first sent abroad as foreign correspondent in 1930 by Kent Cooper, head of the As-

sociated Press. Cooper added the request that Peterson try to stay single. Seemed that every man the AP sent abroad had a habit of getting married almost on arrival and then objecting to being sent traveling around Europe in search of news. So for ten years Peterson moved around the continents. Most time he ever spent in one place was five months. "Every time I was debating whether or not to get married, they'd send me off some place else," he laughs. One of his "standing engagements" in Europe was to cover, each year, the payment of the war debt—World War I—by Finland to the U. S. He recalls as his most embarrassing moment the time he rushed to the palace of the president of Finland to cover the occasion and, while dashing up the long blue carpet that led across the impressive room, tripped and fell on his face at the height of the ceremony!

Glamorous Days

Before World War II, Peterson revealed, there were only seventy-five to one hundred foreign correspondents assigned in Europe—at the start of the war there were three hundred. At the peak of the conflict the number grew to 2600! In those halcyon days preceding the war the glamour of being a correspondent traveling about the ancient capitals of Europe must have been considerable, though Peterson persists in referring to him-

self as the "ugly duckling" of the news staff. He recalls that Budapest was to him the most exciting of all cities. The girls were the most beautiful and the flavor of the city was the most Old World of any, including Paris.

When things started happening in Europe, Peterson found himself not only in the thick of news but ahead of it. He covered not only most of the European trouble spots, but also the Sino-Japanese war in 1938. He was vacationing in San Sebastian, Spain, the day the Spanish war started. In covering assignments, he preceded the Germans into Warsaw and Copenhagen. When his next job took him to Sweden, he was referred to as "that unlucky buzzard—everywhere he goes, something happens!"

Narrow Escape

He covered the fighting in Spain from a base in France. He'd take a taxi three hundred miles over the border, get his story and taxi back to file it in Paris. It's all been adventurous but not dangerous, Peterson insists. His closest call came during the beginning of the Japanese war. Along with a French and a British correspondent he was taken by the Japanese on a plane tour over the battle lines. The plane was a 1924 job. Peterson, who was sitting by the door, made the mistake of leaning against the door knob. The

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

Rumors Are Flying

Hartley Law, the Berlin airlift, or questions of international relations are examples), gives the factual background, and sums up what the American people generally think about each subject. This gives the listener an opportunity to see if he goes along with the majority of the American public in his opinion.

Statistics for this research result are obtained by the Roper Organization in New York. The staff there numbers forty persons, and is backed by a field force of about 250 in key locations all over the United States.

But if you quote Roper, do it correctly, for the quiet stranger in the dark suit you are talking to may be a Roper employee, and he knows!

Cancer Program

The stigma that has been attached for so many years to cancer and its causes is being lifted with the efforts of the American Cancer Society in Los Angeles and its public-interest program Saturdays (2:15 p.m.) on KRKD.

Conducted by Mr. Fred L. Johnson, executive secretary of the L. A. County Branch of the American Cancer Society, the information program endeavors to present typical problems that people are confronted with on the subject of cancer.

Weekly interviews are aired with authorities in the medical profession, and those who have been or want to be helped by the Society. Questions such as "Will I inherit cancer? Are injuries cancerous? Can the disease be cured?" are discussed forthrightly during the show, which has a three-fold purpose in mind; education, research and service.

If listeners have been bothered by the fear of cancer or have any questions in their minds on the subject, this program will be of benefit.

"Secret Mission"

Almost a year ago we cued as highly listenable KHJ's 6:00 p.m. Sunday show, "Secret Mission," a series of fast-paced, meaty radio dramas outlining measures of the Office of Naval Intelligence, and based on confidential files and reports.

For new readers, or for you who have been overlooking "Secret Mission" in the maze of other good programming at this hour, we would like to reprise the show.

All operations of both war and peace which are used to combat sabotage, espionage and other enemy tactics are dramatized. Rear Admiral Ellis M. Zacharias, USN (retired), wartime Deputy Chief of the Office of Naval Intelligence, backgrounds each dramatization with pertinent behind-the-scenes facts and generally adds color which in the original file reports was indicated by man number, formula, or combat theater designation.

One Sunday recently a Naval Intelligence officer recounted his misadventures at the hands of the Russian

government in Hungary and Vienna. This chapter was primarily an expose of the framed "confessions" we read about almost daily in our newspaper. The officer's story proved pretty conclusively that mere man is more prone to sign a confession to *anything* than he is to undergo hunger, fatigue, and some of the less refined tortures still in practice in beleaguered countries.

Another Sunday's episode dealt with pre-war West Coast Japanese intelligence at work. In this case the war worker who was picked as a pigeon for the enemy turned out to be one of our Intelligence officers, planted long beforehand in a maritime operation.

Not only are these documentary stanzas most capably enacted and scripted, a double play that insures lively listening, but the hearer has the added thrill of knowing that the episodes he chills to are the real McCoy.

Gabriel Heatter

If a pre-dinner lull finds you at loose ends any Monday through Friday, spend the fifteen minutes listening to KHJ's Gabriel Heatter for three nights. We suggest at least a three-day trial for purposes of getting used to the stentorian-toned Heatter's ponderous fashion. If you last it out, you're hooked.

"Gabe" has the facts, he has the background, and he has an almost fantastic memory for events long since forgotten that tie in with today's news events.

If news to you means bright chatter about what happened on the corner of Hollywood and Vine at high noon, Mr. Heatter isn't for you. National and international in scope, with the political inferences hung neatly onto the happenings, "Gabe's" fifteen minutes can send you in to that dinner full of either pessimism or fight. But you won't lack reaction to his chats.

Hank Penny

Fans of Western song may well perk an ear to the Hank Penny show, which originates from the Sherman Oaks station, KGIL, Monday through Friday (4:00 p.m.). For a solid hour and fifteen minutes daily, Alabama-reared Hank entertains listeners with cowboy and hillbilly records of Western favorites, Bob Wills, Spade Cooley, Ken Curtis and others. Just to be devilish, Hank even plays some of his own recordings preceded with comment that amuses the dialers. When the discs aren't spinning, he entertains with cracker-barrel chatter, singing and guitar strumming. The atmosphere is countryish and simplicity is the keynote. If you like homespun humor, Hank's philosophy of "helping the nation by sopping up your gravy" will lighten many dull hours.

"It Pays to Be Ignorant"

Giant giveaways, gossipy columnists and a giant talent hunt have been instrumental for several weeks in causing us to overlook that jolly perennial, "It Pays to Be Ignorant." (KNX, Sunday, 7:30 p.m.)

Re-dialing this chaotic chain of irrelevancies was like coming home...

if your nerves can stand coming home to Tom Howard, Lulu McConnell, Harry McNaughton and George Shelton, four old comics of the best vaudeville tradition. Ours can . . . beautifully.

If you haven't heard the show, the sound of thirty minutes built around an exchange of funnies led by a "Duncemaster" sounds like nothing to seek out deliberately. If you have heard it, your mind's ear has picked up the timing that turns slapstick into entertainment. That comes from working in vaudeville, pictures, on the stage, and through years of radio.

Harry McNaughton's background reaches into the George M. Cohan-Winter Garden-Flo Ziegfeld days. Man-chasing Lulu McConnell's career saw her in vaudeville with such masters as Eddie Cantor, George Jessel, Lillian Russell, and theatrical greats such as Anna Held and Gertrude Niesen.

The comically erudite George Shelton was formerly dedicated to Shakespeare, getting into comedy about the time of the war—World War I, that is! Tom Howard is another New Yorker who learned via the Winter Garden and Broadway.

There is no show format we can tell you about as bait. A script of sorts is written, but once the four get on stage, ad-lib artistry takes it from there. If you like comedy, listen. If you like a single comic gatling-gunning out the cracks, tune to one of them and don't try to keep up with this great laughable quartet.

Bill Garr

Newest disc-jockey to hit Southern California is Bill Garr, who spins the platters Monday through Saturday at 1:00 p.m. on KWKW. Bill's theme is "the smoothest music in radio," and he sticks straight to the dreamy stuff with vocals by Shore, Como and Frankie Laine. For instrumental softies his choice is Freddie Martin and the just-before-jazz waxings by Harry James. For guest spots, Bill often trots over to Hollywood with his tape recorder and picks up chatter with stars, then goes back to the studio and plays the recording along with a musical number.

When records of the pops aren't available at the studio library, Garr makes use of his own collection, which has a treasure of new and old discs. Each day, along with the recent hits, there is a selection of the two- to ten-year-old recordings. All which add up to a seventy-five-minute show of soothing and pleasant entertainment.

Brothers of the fishing fraternity, relax! That is, if the little woman snipes at you because you angle. Gabriel Heatter is on your side. Witness "Gabe's" answer to this plaintive note penned to his week-day Mutual-Don Lee "Mailbag" program (KHJ, 3:45 p.m.) by an irate wife:

"My husband is driving me crazy.

All he does is talk fishing. Even at dinner he reads books on fishing. They tell me you are also a fisherman. Is this going to go on the rest of my life?"

Sighed Gabe: "If being a fisherman means catching fish, I can't qualify. I never get a bite. Let your husband be, lady. Of course he shouldn't overdo a good thing . . . but say, do me a favor, will you? Ask him how they are biting now—maybe he and I could get together some day and . . ."

Mystery Melody Center

In Davenport, Iowa, there lives a wise soul who has turned one of the radio puzzles into a come-on for his own enterprise. The gentleman is a barber, who has made the Mystery Melody on CBS's "Stop the Music" show his hobby. Each week he posts his guess as to its identity on his barbershop wall. Besides his own hunches, he weighs the tips of newspaper columnists and the conclusions of his pianist wife.

"You Are There" on Record

"You Are There," prize-winning CBS program whose newscast re-enactments have been acclaimed by listeners and critics as "living records of history," becomes a record in the more conventional sense this week with Columbia Records, Inc., releasing two of its outstanding performances, "The Signing of the Magna Charta" and "The Battle of Gettysburg."

They will be available in two forms: on regular shellac records, as two separate albums of three twelve-inch records each; and on a single two-sided twelve-inch Long-Playing Microgroove record.

The records feature, as did the original broadcasts, the voices of some of the Columbia Broadcasting System's top news analysts.

"Reporting" in newscast style "The Signing of the Magna Charta" are John Ealy, with the headquarters of the insurgent knights on the field at Runnymede; Don Hollenbeck, observing King John's forces; Ken Roberts and Quincy Howe sharing in the overall descriptions of the event. "The Battle of Gettysburg" is "reported" by Hollenbeck, Daly, Roberts, Ned Calmer and Richard C. Hottel.

On the air save for brief intervals since July 7, 1947, "You Are There" has been acclaimed by critics, educators and a mass of listeners who have come to regard it as thrilling entertainment. The series has been the recipient of a Peabody Award, a New York Newspaper Guild Page One Award, and the First Award for Cultural Broadcasts by Ohio State University.

Producer-director Robert Lewis Shayon explains his consistent endeavor to give contemporary meaning to the long-past events:

"There is no such thing as an abstract past," says Shayon. "People

Baby Beef Mold

(Ring around the rosy)

1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin
1 T. lemon juice or 1 t. vinegar
Mayonnaise, whipped cream, horseradish
1 c. baby beets
1 c. boiling water
1 c. liquid from beets

Drain beets from liquid, reserve this, and if not quite a cup add enough water to make one cup.

Dissolve lemon gelatin in cup of boiling water to which lemon juice or vinegar has been added, then add cold liquid.

Pour half of the gelatin mixture into a 9-inch ring mold and when just about ready to set, add drained baby beets, one next to the other, in as perfect a formation as is possible.

When this is set, then spoon the remaining liquid in. Place in refrigerator to chill and set.

Unmold on a chop plate, fill center with dressing made out of half mayonnaise, half whipped cream and 1 T. grated horseradish.

Garnish plate with celery curls and radish roses.

are the same, human relations are the same, in any era."

The two subjects released in the albums were chosen because the Magna Charta still is the point from which modern constitutional government started its world-wide development, and as such has ever-fresh dramatic values, Mr. Shayon explained. "The Battle of Gettysburg" was pressed on discs because Shayon regards it as the most emotionally loaded incident in our American past.

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Hollywood ABC-TV

The largest sum ever invested anywhere for television—\$3,500,000—will be spent by the American Broadcasting Company for its over-all TV investment in the Los Angeles area, it was disclosed by Robert E. Kintner, Executive Vice-President of the AM-TV network, at a press conference held in Hollywood last week.

The L.A. station is to be on the air about mid-August, beaming ten hours a day, five days a week, primarily live shows. Tentative schedule is from 2:00 p.m. to midnight.

Hollywood, within nine months to one year, will be the *world* center of video, Kintner opined, with New York in second position. He said he believed this would be the trend because of the tremendous wealth of talent and studio properties accessible in Hollywood.

Mr. Kintner further revealed that ABC hopes soon to close a deal with 20th Century-Fox Film Corporation for the television rights to the studio's Movietone newsreel; that ABC is not interested in theater television; and that while ABC television will be "mostly live," the company plans to make many films of radio shows, one of which will be "Bride and Groom," now aired.

ABC is also considering a daytime TV show built around Bert Parks, and Mr. Kintner went on to say that ABC "believed in" giveaway shows and would concentrate on them for TV as it has for AM radio.

He added that his company thought it wiser to invest more heavily in television rather than to compete in bidding for high-priced AM talent, and would develop its own stars for TV.

ABC will have Channel 7 in this city, just as it has Channel 7 in every other city in which its video is transmitted.

Looks Like

Van Des Autels is set to announce the five-night-a-week "On the Spot Newsreel" presented by KNBH over their Channel 4. This brings the narrator's video and radio chores up to twenty-seven each week. . . . Tex Ritter, star of radio's Tex Ritter show, is prepping his own all-star Western video program. . . . Star Doye O'Dell and producer-director Toby Anguish have just completed the eighth of a series of sixteen-millimeter half-hour television pictures, all based on the exciting adventures of a United States marshal. . . . According to Hollywood talk, Chet Lauck and Norris Goff will be doing one "Lum and Abner" video show per month, starting in the fall.

These are in addition to their Sunday radio series. . . . Capitol Records, Inc., is getting into the television production field by establishment of Capitol Television Division. Cap, with its big roster of top talent, is the first record company to make the plunge. . . . Looks for sure as though video were having a big influence on other markets. Harry Conover has changed the name of his famous beauty mart to Conover TV and Cover Girl Agency. . . . "Howdy Doody" and Morton Downey, both NBC-TV headliners, may soon invade the West Coast via kinescope. . . . "Who Said That?" is creeping up, Hooperwise, on some of the biggest of the big-time Eastern TV shows. KNBH shows it here Sunday p.m. . . . Video has really come of age. Two of the 1949 George Foster Peabody awards went to television shows. One was ABC-TV's "Actor's Studio," the other NBC-TV's "Howdy Doody." . . . Maurice Chevalier's "This Is Paris," now being aired on radio as a co-op show, is being packaged for television. The video film is being shot in France, featuring Chevalier and other Continental talent. One film is completed and in New York to be looked over by buyers. . . . Herb Allen's kid show, "Hail the Champ," snared Powerhouse candy bar as sponsor. . . . No summer "hiatus," such as radio adopts for the summer, is being planned by West Coast video stations. KNBH, KTTV, and KFI-TV, KTLA and KLAC-TV all plan to build during the summer. KTSN may relax a little. . . . Film footage of all those great Notre Dame games of past and present times is being packaged into a series of thirteen thirty-minute "Leahy's Football Thrills" for video consumption. . . . The movie studios about town are tagging their commercial stills "Not to Be Used on Television." . . . Camel Cigarettes will sponsor the weekly Legion boxing matches over KTSN every Friday. . . . The Television Academy of Arts and Sciences is planning national expansion to include admitting members throughout the country, and with national television awards to be inaugurated next year. . . . The Buick "Olsen and Johnson" TV show, which has been flying around trying to pick up a good spot for the past couple of months, finally came to roost in the Tuesday-at-8:00 NBC-TV slot, where it replaces "Texaco Star Theater" for the summer. . . . Television advertisers are spending \$12,000,000 per year on video advertising, a figure miles ahead of radio's expenditures during its early days. . . . Based on the average cost of \$235 per set, the Southern California Radio and Electrical Appliance Association estimates that \$36,000,000 has been spent on video sets in the Los Angeles area. . . . Looks like NBC-TV has sold eighty-five of 170 affiliates on video. Thirty-one stations are

already on the air, nineteen have construction permits, and thirty-four have applications on file. Nine TV stations with no companion AM radio operation also take shows from the NBC-TV web.

Plastic TV Sets

Admiral Corporation has come out with what they call an innovation in television, a full-length twenty-four-tube plastic console with a ten-inch picture screen. The cost is \$249.95, or \$100 under any comparable set in the field.

The cabinet of the set, which weighs thirty-five pounds, is the largest single piece of plastic ever molded commercially, and represents a year of heartbreak, hope, and gambling.

Admiral reached the thirty-five-pound cabinet by stages over a period of years. First came a nine-and-a-half-pound radio-phonograph cabinet; then a ten-and-a-half-pound television cabinet for a seven-inch picture tube.

A year ago Admiral set aside a quarter of a million dollars to experiment on the project many considered impossible. When the TV specifications were worked out, Dom Siragusa (brother of Ross D. Siragusa, president of Admiral Corporation) purchased from an Akron, Ohio, machinery dealer a 2,000-ton press built by Bethlehem Steel for the Russian government for drawing huge shell casings. The Russians never got around to picking up their ponderous gadget, so the United States Government sent it to Blairsville, Pennsylvania, where for two years it turned out shell casings night and day.

Today, the giant press which last year stood rusting in an Akron warehouse is stamping out hundreds of Admiral cabinets a day. Instead of dozens of men assembling wooden cabinets on a slowly moving line, the two men who operate the press turn out a cabinet every six minutes.

Institute Includes Vid

"Introduction to Television" will be one of the ten accredited summer classes offered when the National Broadcasting Company and the University Extension, University of California, cooperate this year in offering a Radio Institute from June 20 to July 30.

Classrooms will be located at NBC headquarters in Hollywood. Advance enrollment will be accepted at UCLA after May 15 through University Extension, and is limited to persons having four years of college training or one year of commercial experience or educational experience in a radio station.

It will be a course designed to give the student a complete survey and over-all appreciation of the many important factors that constitute this newest of communicative arts. Course content will include programming, production, engineering, and the economics of television. Cameras, lighting, projectors, kinescope recordings, as well as many production techniques will be demonstrated.

the "Bob Cats" in time to play the sensational Chicago stand and to travel to the Coast with the band in 1940.

By the time this group, which turned out more prized records and lent greater spirit to "band music" than any orchestra outside of Duke Ellington's, disbanded, both "Doc" and Matty had firmly established themselves in radio work, a really quite lucrative vocation for musicians as much in demand as the two who for so many years sat alongside each other in feed sections from New York on west.

Busy Lives

Each has made the San Fernando Valley his home. When they are away from the radio show stage, Matty turns his attention to the much-in-demand Matlock arrangements. At the time Red Nichols and his famous Five Pennies moved into Hollywood's Hangover, Matty and his clarinet were in the group. It turned out that while it was great fun, it was expensive. The arrangements Matty wasn't executing for bands around town would have paid him more than his salary from Nichols, so out he dropped. When Angelenos were treated to their first Dixieland Jubilee, an affair that drew the cream of the jazz world from all over the country, it fell Matty's able lot to organize a grand finale for the more than fifty men on stage who let fly on "South Rampart Street Parade" and "Muskrat Ramble."

The "Doc" tagged onto Rando's name by school chums at Holy Cross and Columbia reads "Dr." in the telephone directory. Rando is a full-fledged practicing gynecologist who instructs at the local colleges each fall, and who each day puts in a session at the Los Angeles County Hospital.

In addition to doctoring and radio work, the inexhaustible Rando is on hand each night at the Club 47, a quiet-looking spot in the heart of Studio City. For all its austere facade, the place houses more good loud music per square foot than just about any place in town.

Doc, with two other "Bob Cat" alums, owns the place. He, Nappy Lamare and Noni Bernardi seldom let a night pass without joining forces in their spot for some music. The kicks aren't hard to find, for nearly every jazz man who arrives on the Coast makes his way to the Club 47. One night this spring Louis Armstrong, Jack Teagarden, Earl Hines, Kid Ory and his whole combo, and Benny Goodman converged upon the place simultaneously, to make music to the beat of that greatest of all drummers of any time, any place, Zutty Singleton, who holds down a regular chair at the Club.

When the Matlock-Rando duo aren't radio-ing, doctoring, arrang-

ing or availing themselves of the brief sleep their musicians' lives afford, they can be found on the local golf courses. Unlike most golf enthusiasts, both Matty and "Doc" cheerfully admit to the highest scores ever heard of for eighteen holes.

real life and air life are the same (David and Ricky have unknowingly contributed to the script for years), the boys do not view their radio activities in any but a businesslike light. Ozzie and Harriet have tried to promote a feeling for good workmanship and have instilled in the youngsters the idea that when they get big laughs they can thank the script, not themselves. "The boys really want to do a good job," explains Harriet. "After each show, both of them are very critical—not of each other but each of himself."

Neither do David's and Ricky's school friends view their air activities unusually. At the Marian Colbert School of Individual Instruction David and Ricky go along with the crowd, except on Wednesdays. Harriet has arranged with the teachers to let the Nelson boys skip homework that day so that they can have time for play before going to CBS for the preview. So the boys get half of their Wednesday homework on Tuesday and the other half with Thursday's assignments.

As soon as the Friday night show is over, David and Ricky are taken home, where their beds are already turned down and their pajamas laid out. "I want them to be in bed by 10 o'clock," insists Harriet.

The addition of David and Ricky to "Adventures of Harriet and Ozzie" has given the program a still more indefinable something. Probably actor John Brown, who plays "Thorny," summed it up when he said: "More charm to the square inch than any other program on the air!"

CAPITOL offers its first twelve-inch album, a six-sided "PORTRAIT OF COLE PORTER," and not since the days of a Paul Whiteman concert have we heard such lavish production on the hits of a great song-writer. . . . Fifty musicians under the baton of Guy Luybaerts transport you to the aisle seats of the theater and you listen to the overture of top Porter tunes, a la popular concert, with familiar themes woven together in a pattern of listening delight. . . . COLUMBIA's topper this week, called "Tributes in Tempo," features that great vocal group, the Modernaires, singing hits of yesterday made famous by the late Glenn Miller, Jack Jenney, Ben Bernie, Jimmie Lunceford, Hal Kemp, Chick Webb, Russ Columbo and Fats Waller. 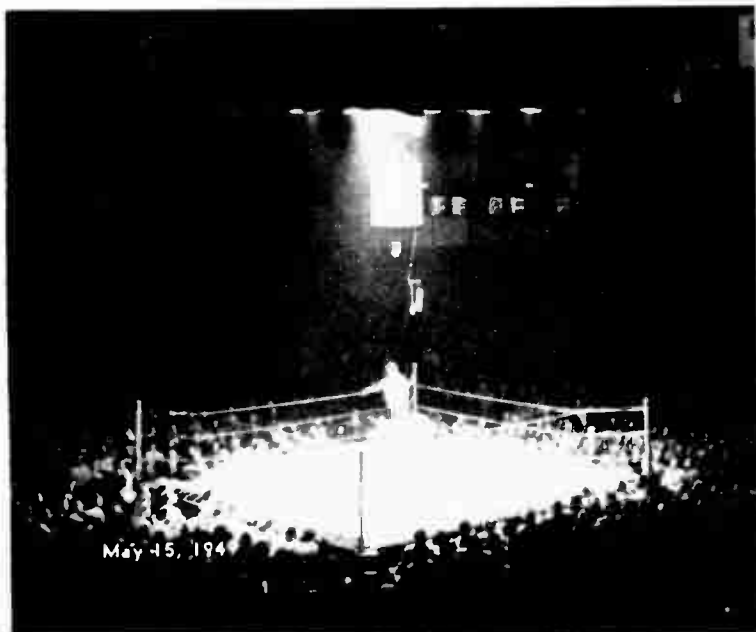

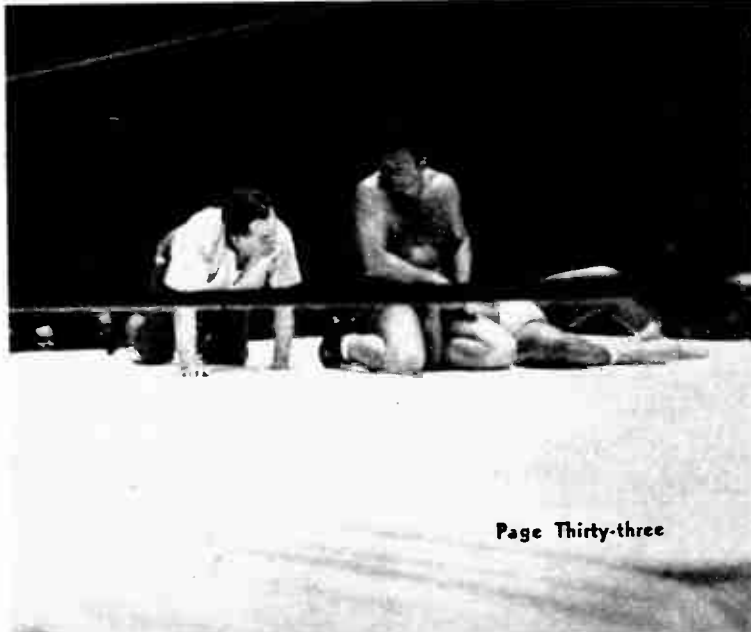

TICKET

How Is That Tiny Ducat That Entitles the Bearer to Many Moments of Pleasure Born, Passed Into the Hands of the Attendance, And Finally, After the Show, Disposed of?

THE postman rings far more often than twice—at least insofar as the Mutual-Don Lee ticket department is concerned. Every day he brings thousands of letters into the studios, the contents of which bear a striking similarity. Just tear any one of the letters open and you'll read something like this . . . "Dear

▲ **THE STYLE, COLOR AND NUMBER** of tickets to be printed is determined, then an order is placed with a professional printing establishment. Richard Mower, who holds the tot and the tickets, just completed the order. Little Colleen Finley pouts over the fact that children under twelve are not admitted to broadcasts.

Sirs, I am visiting Hollywood for a few days and would like to see 'Queen for a Day,' 'Ladies First,' 'Mayor of the Town' or any other audience shows you have."

The network makes every effort to fill all these requests; but seldom are there nearly enough tickets to meet the great demand. The "Queen for a Day" show alone receives some 5,000 ticket requests weekly. The studios can accommodate only 1,700 people in that period of time. It becomes a simple problem in arithmetic. Five thousand into 1700 just doesn't go. Hence the little radio ticket becomes an important part of network operation. Its life story in-

trigued us. We traced it and here is what we found.

Step One

The program director picks up his telephone and calls the Guest-Relations Department. Says he, "The 'Yours for a Song' program is moving out from New York on March 4. Broadcast time is from 5:30 to 5:55 p.m. We'll do the show from Studio 1. Doors close at 5:15 p.m. Let's get those tickets out!"

Guest Relations then meets with the Station-Relations Department. Here it is decided how many tickets will be printed. Usually there are more tickets distributed than there are seats in the studio. For new

WHEN Eileen Simone, caricaturist for the American Broadcasting Company in Hollywood, was called upon to caricature four radio stars, the job became more than one of just putting features down in black and white. The four people, Anna Roosevelt, Art Linkletter, Jack Webb, and Jack McElroy, found themselves the subjects of a sharply pointed pencil.

The Ear Inspires The Caricature

*A Commentator, a "Private Eye"
And Two Masters of Ceremonies
Find Their Facial Expressions
Captured by a Charcoal Artist*

To capture the expression by which they are best known Miss Simone viewed the stars in action on their programs. With portraits and the contour expressions mentally tucked away, she set to work caricaturing her conceptions of the personalities.

Anna Roosevelt's striking smile and strong jaw were played up with bold lines, and her eyes were caught in a study of retrospect. The use of the lines in the caricature of Art Linkletter indicates his blond fairness highlighted by the brilliant

smile and alert eyes. Basing her conception on how Linkletter appears in his ad-libbing moments, Miss Simone took it from there.

Jack Webb, in his detective role of "Pat Novak," often imagined by listeners as having the typical appearance of a "private eye," was pictured with his intense, burning black eyes, highlighted by the heavy beetle brows. The well-known twinkle in the brown eyes of Jack McElroy was caught by the pencil and his always upturned smile of geniality was traced with deep laughter lines.

The caricatures are hybrid and up to this time Miss Simone has completed a dozen. One, which is of Frank Samuels, West Coast general manager of ABC, is on view in the Vine Street Brown Derby.

shows, often the ratio of tickets to seats is five to one. As the show becomes established, fewer and fewer ducats are ordered.

Ticket Born

Then follows a discussion between network and advertising agency officials. They determine the style, color and shape of the ticket and also who is to receive star billing on the face of the Annie Oakley. A schematic drawing is made and sent to the printer. Thus a ticket is born.

Now the publicity and promotion departments go to work. Publicity releases are sent to all available press contacts proclaiming the origination of a new Hollywood show. Promotion arranges for spot announcements to be aired telling how listeners may obtain tickets for the program.

The ticket requests pour in; the answers whiz out. The show goes on before the required studio audience. It's a smash hit! Certainly the radio ticket has done its part in the over-all success picture.

And what is the fate of the heroic ticket? Well, its serial number is checked to determine the amount for the next printing order. Then it meets an ignoble ending in the trash furnace. And nary a mention of martyrdom either!
