A S. A. SCHOOLBOY in Naples, Italy, little Joe Milani saved the sweets he received from home to distribute to those Italian children who were not fortunate enough to have them. This early philosophy has remained with him through the years and is the basic theme in the Chef Milani show on KMPC. With a slogan of "A Dinner for Four, A Dollar, No More," the Chef advises housewives of the method by which to plan an economical as well as delectable menu for their families.

During his week-day broadcasts, Chef Milani outlines a complete dinner menu which may be procured at one of the super-markets in Southern California at the cost of \$1 for a family of four, submits his own personally tested recipes, offers free

copies of these to listeners, and conducts weekly contests in which prizes are merchandise orders at the various super-markets.

Mikeside with Chef Milani each broadcast is veteran radio actor-announcer Lou Marcelle, who has been in radio the past fifteen years and associated with the Chef for nine. Lou has had his own program on a local station for the past ten years and is featured in the narration of many Warner Brothers films.

With such a predominant interest in food, one wonders how the Chef turned to the culinary after his initial experience in jewelry. Like many European sons, Milani was interested in his father's profession, which was jewelry. However, after his father's death, the young lad attended college in Naples, followed by a tour of Continental Europe and climaxed with a trip to the United States when he was sixteen.

His purpose was to learn the American jewelry trade, but fate was aboard the ship in the form of a great European chef, Monsieur Bonnet. After his arrival in Chicago, Milani was apprenticed to a jeweler

who paid him the munificent sum of \$2.50 per week. Not caring for this situation, he contacted the newly appointed Parisian chef of the Palmer House, Monsieur Bonnet, and asked that he be allowed to work for him if it meant only peeling potatoes. It did, too!

Starts Business

However, just three years later, Milani boasted one of the finest restaurants in Chicago with none other than Chef Bonnet directing activities. The Chef remained in Chicago for seven years (until 1920) when he moved to California and opened a restaurant, catering to all classes and all nationalities, at the corner of Gower Street and Carleton Way. In addition, he operated a delicatessen which served as a catering organization for many private parties.

After becoming ill and being incapacitated for a long period, Chef turned up in Seattle. With very little capital by this time, he spied a delicatessen on one of Seattle's main thoroughfares which offered everything in food except enchiladas. With no credit and no cash, Chef

approached the owner and convinced him on the idea of selling enchiladas. Seven years after this sales talk, Chef Milani had created a million-dollar enterprise and had gone into the food-canning business as well.

Recognizing the terrific responsibility of this organization, Chef Milani sold out to another firm, meanwhile remaining with the company in an executive capacity. During his stay in the Northwest, Chef Milani faced his first microphone in 1928 under the sponsorship of Fisher Flouring Mills on KOMO. His initial broadcasts consisted of songs with his own mandolin accompaniment and the actual cooking of foods which he described over the air. After a business period in New York and an extensive trip through Europe, Chef moved to California and "retirement."

During all these years, the Chef had been heard on radio stations throughout the East and Middle West conducting fabulously successful cooking schools, and upon his return to California in 1939, he aired the "Chef Milani Kitchen Kollege" on a local outlet. The Chef joined KMPC in 1940 and has been heard since that time except for a period of several years during the war.

At that time he was approached by actress Bette Davis, who asked his assistance in providing food for the soldiers visiting Hollywood Canteen. The Chef organized this project and supervised activities until the conclusion of the war, when he claimed that 3,000,000 soldiers had enjoyed the best in food at the Canteen.

Then Chef Milani retired to his ten-acre farm in San Fernando Valley, raising the finest in quality poultry. However, the lure of radio recalled him and he resumed on

The "Crooner With Cream in His Voice" Is What the French Girls Thought of Young Johnny, Who Even Has Among His Fans Two Royal Devotees—England's Princesses

HEN "Cruising Crooner" Jack Owens left the popular ABC show, "Breakfast Club," a query popped into the

minds of many listeners as to what type singer the producers would pick to fill the bill. Dissolving all the skeptical comment was the choosing of buttery-baritoned Johnny Desmond, one-time vocalist with the "Bob-O-Links," and former singing star with Gene Krupa's hot-lick troupers.

If it were left to the younger enthusiasts, Johnny would no doubt become the whole show, for he possesses a quality that has endeared him to the young. Witness the bobby-soxers who frantically flock around him after "Breakfast Club" and Mutual's "Teentimer" show and even the more sedate members of the audience would react to his fetching personality.

Had Quartet

Pertinent facts reveal that he studied at Detroit's Conservatory of Music, went on to form his own quartet (the first of its kind in home town Detroit), who were discovered en masse by Bob Crosby and billed as the "Bob-O-Links." He still claims that it was his "lucky day" when the quartet lost their girl singer and hired a new thrush who, Johnny decided, would be just the girl to become his Mrs. Which is just what Ruth Keddington did.

After enlisting in the Army, Johnny was attached to the late Major Glenn Miller's AAF outfit and with them he toured the Continent. He saw Europe and Europe, likewise, took him in with an appreciative look and listen. The attention of statesiders was caught when he appeared on the coast-to-coast Air Force show, "I Sustain the Wings." When Johnny came marching home he was worried that his war-interrupted career might have been hurt by the absence. It wasn't. "They heard about me here from over there," he recalls.

In France and London, just as in America, the sub-deb set welcomed him with open arms. Dubbed "Le Cremer" by les petites de Paree, a title paying tribute to the creamy quality of his deep baritone, Johnny took it all in appreciatively . . . slightly embarrassed as to what the fellows in his outfit would think of a name *like that!* But the GI's liked his talents just as much . . . if not as vociferously.

The crowning glory came when even the most demure of demure English girls would utter cries of delight upon hearing his sweet tones. While he was being received by the royal family, Queen Elizabeth took Mr. Desmond aside and hastily whispered to the thrilled singer that among his most avid fans were—the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret Rose!

Probably Radio's Busiest Actor

The Boy From Melbourne Who in '34 Decided He Would "Try Radio" Today Has More Radio Calls Than the Ordinary Twenty-four-Hour Day Could Possibly Allow Him to Fulfill.

JOHN BROWN is a quiet kind of extrovert. He looks like anything but an actor. Even when you know that Brown is an actor, you wouldn't suspect him of being a "ham." But give the man a chance and an audience and he'll hold the fort for hours, loving every second of it.

If ever there was a man with a single purpose in professional life it is Brown. He wanted to be an actor from the time he first appeared in neighborhood theatricals on the streets of Melbourne, Australia, at the age of eight. Brown's family had migrated from Hull, England, to the British colony when John was four.

When he was eleven, the family again pulled anchor, this time for America, where they settled in New York. The lad spent weeks in the public library boning up on Americana so that he would know as much about this country as his playmates. He soon learned he knew infinitely more than his new friends about their native land.

Brown continued his interest in the theater, and when a stock company set out on its tour of the straw-hat

circuit the summer he was fifteen, John Brown was aboard. Starting as general factotum, Brown, by the time he was twenty, had been an actor, director, company manager and "social director," working summers in the borscht circuit (the Catskill Mountains summer resort about 100 miles out of New York City). He worked with Moss Hart and Allen Boretz, Danny Kaye, Nemo, Arthur Kober, Ben Lessy and others, all famous now.

Where "Digger" Was Born

The summer season was John's life. He spent the balance of the year (John's "other life") doing odd jobs. He ushered, sold tickets, mopped floors, shifted scenery; directed and was a publicity man at sundry and odd times. As a matter of fact, he once acted as secretary to Frank Campbell of Campbell Funeral Directors. Highlight of this position was to be on hand when Valentino lay in

state. Any resemblance to "Digger O'Dell" and color gathered during that employment is *not* purely coincidental. He also appeared in such shows as "Peace on Earth," "Milky Way," and "Black Tower."

Busiest Actor

In 1934, Brown decided to try radio. In that memorable first week, he worked on the following: Fred Allen's show, with Block and Sully, Eddie Cantor's and George Givot's. He has been in radio ever since. He worked for anything he could get. AFRA (American Federation of Radio Artists) had not been organized then, and Brown helped on this job in 1937 and 1938. By the time he left Manhattan, around 1943, Brown was radio's busiest actor, with twenty-five shows each week.

In nine years, John had appeared on almost 10,000 programs. Today his total is close to 15,000. He wants to settle down to no more than eight or nine shows a week. Highlight of his early days was the time he told the same joke on four different comedy shows in one week, each time using another dialect. It wasn't until he was thirty that he played a character *under* thirty. That came with his debut on the Allen show as

"John Doe," the irascible average man.

In 1943, Allen quit radio for a year on doctor's orders. Jack Benny signed John Brown and Minerva Pious, with the provision that they could go back with Allen whenever the latter returned to the air. Benny did it as a protective measure for Fred, on the grounds that the actors might have to sign contracts that would prevent them from going back for four weeks in New York, and then came to the Coast with the show. Miss Pious returned to Allen at the end of her contract, but Brown was in California to stay. He had a house, a car and the climate.

"Settling down" for Brown means that he plays "Al," an unscrupulous do-nothing, on CBS's "My Friend Irma." He does double duty on NBC's "Life of Riley" as "Jim Gillis," a friend of Riley, and as the extremely popular merry undertaker, "Digger O'Dell." He is "Broadway" on NBC's "Damon Runyon Theater"; "Mr. Foster" on CBS's former "Date with Judy" and "Beechwood Shag" on NBC's George O'Hanlon show. All these and a few dozen supporting roles.

Fourteen years ago, Brown married June White, an actress. They have a son, Jared, twelve years old, and a daughter, Julie, eight. The fetish of giving their children names beginning with the letter "J" as do their own, started as a gag. Brown explained that he wanted his chil-

KMPC in December, 1948, with his present show.

Personal Life

Chef's family is just as fabulous as himself. His older brother, a musical artist, acts as concert master and conductor for the ninety-eight-piece King Farouk orchestra in Cairo, where he has been attached to the king's court for many years. Two of his sisters are also with the king's entourage and the other resides in Naples.

The Chef met his wife, Rosina, in Salerno, Italy, many years ago and brought her to America after his arrival here. They are the parents of a son, John, who resides in Chicago, and the grandparents of a younger John.

Chef plans to remain in radio as long as his listeners want him, and his goal—television—has now been reached since he began his "Chef Milani Kitchen Kollege" on KTLA and will be seen and heard each Friday evening from 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. All of these years and all of his experience have developed in Chef Milani the theory that if you believe in people, people will believe in you.

# How Much Jack In a Jackpot?

How much jack is there in a radio jackpot?

When a listener wins \$10,000 in prizes, how much is clipped for taxes?

What does the winner do with the stuff he does not want?

These were some of the questions that had been hovering in our mind's recesses for some time, but it wasn't until May 17 of this year that an opportunity presented itself to follow through with a local jackpot winner. On the night of May 17, Mrs. Marie Spangler of Glendale, California, answered one of CBS's "Hit the Jackpot" calls, gave the correct answer to the evening's query, and was told she had won \$26,000 in prizes. Two days later, Radio-TV Life called at the Spangler home—a small furnished apartment on Maple Street in Glendale. Mrs. Spangler was still in a daze, her husband, Chet, had gone to work in a similar state, the house was in a turmoil of telephone calls, mail, picture-taking, and a baby boy who was fretting because all the excitement had thrown him off schedule. Two things, however, were evident: the Spanglers were a smart young couple and would not let a jackpot grasp them by the hair and whip them around; AND Mr. Spangler's father, being a tax expert, could be counted on to help the winner so that she would avoid any entanglements.

Chet and Marie Spangler were already calculating, two days after their windfall, that they would not accept any prizes they could not use or dispose of, could not afford, or did not want to pay income taxes on.

To us, this presented a perfect set-up for a follow-through, so a date was made to call again ninety days after the jackpot had been won.

On the afternoon of August 18, 1949, the Spangler house, compared to its previous turmoil, was as quiet as a ghost town. The phone remained submissively silent, the baby was down for his afternoon nap and Mrs. Spangler talked without outside interruption.

Using the list of prizes printed with the original jackpot report (Radio-TV Life, July 3, 1949), Mrs. Spangler gave the following report:

"First thing that arrived was the ties," she began brightly. "They came unexpectedly about two weeks after I won. There were 100 of them, supposed to be worth \$5 each. We sold them all to a men's shop. Next came the diamond watch—a Benrus—and we still have that." (Mrs. Spangler wants to keep it.)

Next to arrive was the \$2000 diamond ring. The Spanglers had it appraised (\$1250) and sold it for \$750.

Then the ten \$100 apiece hats arrived unexpectedly at the post office. When she hurried down in answer to her notification to pick up "one large box," the winner did not know she

was receiving her bonnets. She was surprised when the postal clerk handed over a hat box. She hustled home, ripped open the container and found not ten, but twelve hats, some felt, some straw. Unfortunately, none of them "did anything" for her, so she summoned her mother-in-law in hopes they might become a more matronly person. After a few attempts to peddle the hats, the winner sold the

entire lot to a Glendale milliner for \$35.

The aluminum awnings (\$1000 worth) presented a special problem, for the Spanglers had no home of their own and were only trusting they could scrape together enough money from sale of all the loot to make the down payment on a house. When the question of the awnings arose, the couple used a "standard letter" which they had worked out. It began "Would you consider . . ." (keeping your merchandise and sending us a reasonable amount in cash?) They sent this form letter to the awning company and were pleasantly surprised when they received a check equal to the manufacturer's cost.

The car arrived on June 17. It was one prize the Spanglers really wanted. They were delighted with the metallic green, four-door De Soto sedan with clock, heater and several other extras. Mrs. Spangler sold the family's 1935 Ford to her nineteen-year-old brother.

The luggage arrived in due course of time. Actually it was two sets (fourteen pieces) beautifully done in white and blue lining. The Simpson suits also came. A professional man who wore nothing but Simpson suits bought them. As he and his wife were planning a trip to Europe, they also took the luggage. They are as good as set to buy the \$1000 worth of bedroom furniture. "This man," laughed Mrs. Spangler, "has been our No. One outlet."

One of the prizes was an air trip for two to Lima, Peru. They couple are still debating this. They don't

## Giveaways' Doom?

The FCC's edict to ban all giveaway radio programs after October 1 came as no great surprise to anyone. For the past year ever since ABC's "Stop the Music" cut a wide swath there have been rumblings pointing to such a move. These have persisted as CBS proceeded to put on its "Sing It Again" and as NBC finally broke down and programmed what was heralded as the biggest jackpot program of them all, "Hollywood Calling."

Networks have maintained all along that they would fight any such giveaway ban. The FCC crack-down on giveaways brought this response from ABC: "ABC proposes immediately to test the legality of the FCC regulations in the courts. . . . No changes will be made in ABC programs as a result of the FCC regulations. We feel certain that appropriate injunctive relief will be granted to the radio industry and to the many interested advertisers as a result of the litigation which ABC will begin immediately."

Other radioites have been heard to denounce bitterly the FCC action,

which they label interference with private enterprise and a prime example of bureaucratic government. On the other hand, others claim the effect of such a ban would be to radio's good for it would stop the snowballing fad of getting something for nothing and converting what should be a half hour or hour of solid entertainment into a series of phone calls and recital of lengthy lists of prizes.

This situation was largely responsible for Fred Allen's decision to leave the airways for awhile, although he is also said to have been suffering from high blood pressure (brought on by worry over knocking his brains out to put on a show which listeners deserted in droves in favor of "Stop the Music"?)

Allen was quoted in the newspapers as "chortling" over the FCC ruling. Next biggest chortler was probably Jack Benny, who was supposed to be quaking over prospects of competing with NBC's "Hollywood Calling," biggest yet jackpot show designed especially for The Fiddler's ruination.

want to leave the baby home, they don't want to take him along, and they would much rather drive somewhere in their new car. They are still negotiating to get releases on this prize so that it can be transferable (and saleable).

They are also pondering disposal of \$1000 worth of dancing lessons. The day after Mrs. Spangler won the jackpot someone called and wanted to buy the lessons "real cheap," but so far no deal has been set. (Any aspiring takers among Radio-TV Life readers?)

The Spanglers will definitely sell the living- and dining-room suites which were won. Also the \$1000 worth of lamps. So far this project has not developed past selection of what-will-sell merchandise.

Easily disposable were the nursery and outdoor playground. An expecting sister-in-law was eager for the crib and high chair and as both these pieces and remainder of the equipment were "adorable" (to quote Mrs. Spangler) and not too expensively priced, they were sold immediately. Men who work with Mr. Spangler at the C. F. Braun Company in Alhambra have also expressed interest in the year's supply of mother-daughter dresses, for which, for obvious reasons, Mrs. Spangler has no use. This prize is supposed to be delivered every month in pairs for a year, but the winner hopes she can get them all at once and dispose of them accordingly.

The cans of fruits and vegetables were sold as a lot to a small Glendale store. As part of the jackpot deal, Mrs. Spangler was supposed to make a charity donation of a fourth of the canned goods. She dispatched 1,000 cans to McKinley Home, 1,000 cans to the Children's Home Society, and 2,000 cans to the Children's Hospital (latter she thinks received the goods, but so far has not acknowledged the gift.)

Smartening up from their tie contact, the Spanglers sought advice from the haberdasher when the \$1000 worth of men's shirts loomed on the horizon. The couple asked which were the most popular sizes and ordered accordingly, in all white. Since all the men at the Braun Company seem to prefer white shirts, Mr. Spangler had no difficulty getting rid of this prize, first, however, receiving permission from the personnel director to peddle his wares.

In four days young Spangler took orders and sold all 260 of the lot at \$2 apiece.

Personal contact and word of mouth have been responsible for selling practically all the jackpot goods. After ninety days there are still many items to be cleaned up—the woman's wardrobe worth \$2000 has still to arrive, for one thing. The gold-plated lawn mower, touted at \$3000, is the one prize people still ask about. The next day after Mrs. Spangler hit the jackpot, someone offered her \$100 for it, but she turned down the offer. Her husband

has some scheme in the back of his head, but if he doesn't dispose of the mower this way, Mrs. Spangler's uncle, who has a surplus store, has promised to give her \$175 for it. He plans to draw customers into his place by putting it on exhibition.

Yes, the Spanglers have been pretty busy people since the night of May 17, 1949. The problem wasn't winning the jackpot. It was getting rid of it without getting stuck. The tumult and shouting abated, the fan mail having subsided, life is beginning to resume its normal stance in the house of the winner on Maple Street. She still listens to "Hit the Jackpot" whenever she can, but has entered no more contests. Often her phone rings on a Tuesday afternoon and a subdued but excited voice will ask her what time the program called her from New York.

So she won a \$26,000 jackpot! After three months of finagling, and with careful planning and disposal, the Spanglers hope that they will come out of the experience about \$5000 to the good (counting the car).

## Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

### "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn"

Another example of the new integrity in radio dramatic shows is found in NBC's current production of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn," KFI, 8:30 p.m. Friday. The series manages to preserve much of the seriousness and tragedy of the original, without resorting to soap-opera tricks of tear-jerking.

As in Betty Smith's novel, "Francie" remains imaginative and wise for her years; "Neely" is still the down-to-earth youngster who doesn't see why he should pretend he isn't hungry when he is. "Johnny Nolan" and "Katie" are still completely sympathetic in spite of their failures.

The efforts of the "Nolans" to bring up their two children on little more than songs and dreams is again the basis of the episodic plot. The "Nolan" clan fondly looks forward to the day when a great impresario will hear father "Johnny," a singing waiter, and make him a star. A grown-up "Francie" relates the stories in flashback to the pre-World War I era.

John Larkin gives a great performance as "Johnny." His interpolated singing is good enough to make the character's dreams of success valid. He is in turn whimsical, short-tempered, furious with himself for his failure and apologetic. Radio has not succeeded in emasculating the character to that of the lovable dreamer of the daily serial.

All the "Nolans" are understandable. Their tragedy is one of grinding poverty, but "Katie's" beauty, "Johnny's" talent, "Francie's" imagination and "Neely's" sturdiness add up to a study of much more than a depressing story of poor people.

Authoress Betty Smith aids James Hart in directing the series, and her gentle nurturing of her own story is undoubtedly the basis for the over-all excellence of the show.

### Joe Adams Show

Known as "The Mayor of Melody," Joe Adams conducts a daily session of fine jazz, sweet swing and even be-bop (that is acceptable to those who care for the flavor) for three solid hours Monday through Saturday, KOWL, 12 noon.

Listeners have long been acquainted with Adams and his fine showmanship and he is to be commended for producing and directing the Cavalcade of Negro Music for the Damon Runyon Cancer Foundation.

Besides being Los Angeles's first Negro disc jockey, he has set somewhat of a record for himself with his ability to combine recorded and live music, interviews with name artists and news about people in show biz into a platter show that is a delight to tune- and talk-weary ears.

### Kate Smith

KECA or somebody is doing very odd things to our Kate Smith these Monday nights. We recently heard her new "Kate Smith Calls" (6:30 p.m. Monday) and were only quietly aware of a rather suspended quality in the format. No wonder. The 6:30 p.m. period ends at 7:00. The show is resumed at 7:30 p.m. and continues till 8:00. At 8:00 p.m., Kate is interrupted momentarily by "The Railroad Hour," but she's back at 8:30 for a fifteen-minute sprint. At 9:15 she makes her final appearance and says good night at 9:45 p.m.

As far as we know, this is the first time that anything of this sort has been attempted. We don't know how successful it will be in getting and keeping listeners, but it's like broken-field running—fun to watch.

Kate and her partner Ted Collins spin records, Kate sings with a piano accompanist and indulges in a telephone giveaway with listeners. Her voice still holds much of the sincere quality that made her a singing sensation, though we missed many of her more zinging numbers.

We believe the show is done earlier in the East (from Miss Smith's Lake Placid home) and transcribed for local release, so we don't know at what time listeners are expected to hover over the phone, waiting to answer the questions asked about the music and records. However, the true Kate Smith fans shouldn't worry about this—their gal is offering more music and song than she has on her other shows recently and that has always been her greatest persuasion. (Kate Smith is still heard on KHJ, 9:00 a.m. Monday through Friday.)

Ethel Barrymore's fiftieth anniversary party on the part of ABC. With such sentimentality, so many big names and so many memories and tributes to be spoken and accepted, the broadcast might understandably have sagged under its own weight. It didn't, however, and will always stand as the grandest tribute any actress has ever received.

... To a pleasant hunk of CBS comedy—the Joan Davis show, followed by the Abe Burrows clambake. There's a gagman with an unorthodox and often extremely effective sense of humor behind the Davis show—and Burrows is still Burrows. We observe that since the resumption of Lux Theater the Davis-Burrows hour remains intact in its shift to Friday.

... To a summertime innovation that seems completely adequate during the comings and goings of the big shows—the simple announcement, made at the usual program time of an important fall show, saying that "My Friend Irma" or whatever the show may be is now on summer vacation and will again be heard in this time spot when it resumes on such-and-such a date.

... To the "Piano Playhouse" team of Cy Walters and Stan Freeman, who will soon have an album of their duopiano selections on the market.

## We View With Alarm

... That actor on the "Helen Trent" soap opera who is industriously imitating the style, inflections and voice of stage star Lee J. Cobb. (Great Scott—maybe it is Lee J. Cobb!)

... The really sick-making commercials about upset stomachs that we've been hearing more of recently. They also color the body of the program to some extent. For instance, the other day we heard a biologically graphic description of a queasy stomach, followed by a drama in which someone had just been poisoned. The victim complained feelingly of the process taking place in his tummy, and with the commercial echoing in our ears, we mentally resolved the plot by assuming he'd taken too much of the sponsor's product!

... And speaking of commercials, we think it's high time the medical profession started listening to some of the spot announcements, many of which have the mystical appeal of Congo witch doctors' chants. One of them has two querulous ladies complaining of "nagging backache" as if it were a recognized ailment like pneumonia or hoof-and-mouth disease instead of a symptom. Then a reference is made to "so-called rheumatic pains," the implication being that rheumatic pains are rather haphazard indications that "nagging backache" has done its work. Naturally, the sponsor's product is touted as dealing strongly with the "nagging backache," while the "so-called rheumatic pains" are lost in the shuffle of minor com-

# VIDEO In Review

## In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

### Rumors Are Flying

Unhappily we repeat the rumor that Shirley Dinsdale and "Judy Splinters" will not be heard and seen out here come fall. An Eastern sponsor, whose product is not shopped here on the Coast, saw and liked the duo, signed them up for NBC-TV in the East only. . . . American Tobacco is rumored about to pick up the tab on Ken Murray's "Blackouts" for CBS-TV. . . . Leo Guild's "Wizard of Odds" with Jay Stewart or Phil Baker as emcee is about to be signed for video. . . . Eve Arden is in New York talk-talking with one Mr. Paley (head of CBS) about putting "Our Miss Brooks" before the video cameras. . . . Motorola will soon announce, at a press meeting, a combination home TV set and radio, all for \$59.50! . . . Gene Mann has received a tremendous offer from CBS to permit them to televise his Greek Theatre productions. Mann is interested in this season's shows, but is talking to the network officials about the possibility of televising the productions next season.

### Looks Like

Radio-tube manufacture and sale is off 20% over last year, a state attributed directly to TV's growth. . . . Jimmy Scribner moves his "Sleepy Joe" from KTSL to KECA-TV, with a ten-times-over-the-old salary boost. The show goes from a fifteen-minute daily to a half-hour weekly, will be played live locally and kinescoped for ABC-TV. . . . ABC-TV's local outlet, KECA-TV, will use motion-picture lighting at television center, a move following KLAC-TV's use of the big bulbs. . . . Station KNBH, NBC television in Hollywood, will extend its operating schedule from five to seven nights a week effective October 2. The new schedule (twenty-seven hours of TV per week) will include some New York telecasts presented on the Coast for the first time: "Life of Riley," "The Original Amateur Hour," "Private Eye" and "Bonny Maid Floor Show." . . . The expanding sale of television sets has cut into home movie projection and reel rental badly, especially in the metropolitan areas where transmission is a regular thing. . . . The new figures released by the Southern California Electrical Appliance Dealers' Association put set sales, locally and as of July 31, at 168,589, or a total of approximately 850,000 viewers, and ups the expenditures for sets to \$50,576,700. . . . Effective with its debut September 16 on Channel 7, KECA-TV will schedule an approximate seventeen hours of programming. In addition to the UCLA-

USC home games, "Crusade in Europe," "Kieran's Kaleidoscope," "Pal Headliner," "Sleepy Joe" and as yet unannounced programs will be seen.

## Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

### "Wesley"

"Wesley," KTTV's Channel 11, Tuesday night at 9:00, opened in a way that hardened our hearts agin "Wesley." A boy's head peeked out from some sort of stage set, announced that "I, Wesley," was going to tell the story of what had happened to his sister on the evening of a big dance, and rather coyly retreated. Shades of early copies of the Woman's Home Companion!

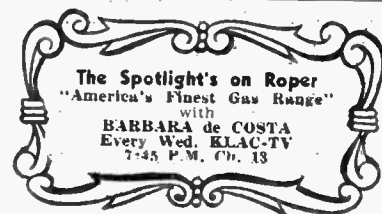
Three minutes later we were blissfully following the small, amusing adventures of one of the nicest families you'll meet on video. Some deft touches of writing, production, and just plain fine acting lent the half hour the same magic that Eugene O'Neill's "Ah, Wilderness" possesses, and reminded us strongly of "Richard," the principal of that play.

It is impossible to assume that the mind of every viewer didn't return to some warm summer evening of his own childhood, when family blunders ran riot and pretty sisters were embarrassed.

The story was simple. Sister "Elizabeth's" boy friend left town for school or a job or some such enterprise. A big dance was scheduled for that night, and "Wesley" and father set out to find sister a date.

Johnny Stewart played "Wesley," with no hamming. His portrayal was that of a good little kid whose bumbblings were in the best tradition of pre-teen-aged eagerness to please.

The parents, as played by Frank and Mona Thomas, immediately canceled out the myriad mental pictures of all middle-aged do-gooders resembling the buttinsky, Mary Worth-"Ma Perkins" type who deserves, but never gets, a kick in the back as she leaves the room in which she has just wreaked emotional havoc. Their concern over their pretty daughter's plight and their honest attempts at hands off were as real as life, and were suitably rewarded by an equally

fine performance on the part of Joy Reese, who played "Elizabeth."

Our only possible criticism arises from the announcement by "Wesley" that the entire cast was to rejoin viewers the following week. His script lines unfortunately call for him to use the New York dates, and inasmuch as we West Coasters receive the show one week later, the announced date had come and gone. Not confusing, just unnecessary, when a simple "next Tuesday" would have done as well.

If you have heretofore pushed the unprepossessing title "Wesley" aside for the lure of a mystery title or sports event, stick with this nice bunch of people some Tuesday.

## Second Glances (Critical Comment)

### Irwin Allen Show

Each Sunday night on KLAC-TV's Channel 13, movie commentator and columnist Irwin Allen gathers a panel of four or five friends from the picture business and presents them as a panel of "experts" during the half-hour games and guesses "Irwin Allen Show."

Actresses Jane Nigh and Jeff Donnell, producer Merian Cooper and long-time comedian and ex-Keystone Kop Chester Conklin, recently took turns naming a series of caricatures, doing a charade each, guessing the identity of some old still pictures (Tim McCoy, Glenda Farrell, Dorothy Gish and Sylvia Sidney among them), and finally identified some sound tracks from current movies. Finale of the show was their identification, by means of her "yes" and "no" answers, of a hidden mystery star. In this case it was Rosemary DeCamp, and tipoff on her was the fact that she did a good deal of radio work and in pictures had played numerous mother parts.

Premise of the show is good. The stunts are entertaining and picture names are almost invariably good drawing cards. What Mr. Allen could do well to remember, however, is that video viewers are used to seeing movie people under skillful direction in the flickers. Left entirely to their own devices and encouraged in a lot of unexpert ad-libbing and loud laughter by Allen's own carefree approach to emceeing, guests become a little relaxed in their antics.

Stars Rosemary DeCamp and Chester Conklin and producer Merian Cooper, possibly more used to both performance and public appearance, maintained their dignity, a contrast that made the profusion of curls, low-cut dresses and girlish laughter of the other participants seem even more profuse, low-cut and girlish. Almost overpoweringly so.

If Allen makes the guests secondary to the game, he will have a session that is interesting to everyone, rather than just a star and starlet showcasing, eagerly heralded only by fans.

## On Lens (About Studio Happenings)

### Quiet, Fido!

A recent press release announced that third-dimension pictures for both video and the movies have been developed to such a point that by next spring the project will be ready for mass audiences.

A Hollywood producer, Jack Moss, and his associate, Irving Yergen, have been working for two years getting the development past the experimental stage and into the realm of the practical. Moss says it will be more revolutionary than sound.

He's so right. Can you imagine the effect of a third-dimensional "Hoppy" on the moppets? (They would never leave the TV set side!) Or can you imagine the reaction of children who stayed up late enough to see a "Lights Out" take body? They couldn't get away from a set side . . . too weak with fear.

Another interesting speculation. How will the four-legged members of a household react? Three-dimensional pictures have been used widely in laboratories as stimuli for animals. Apparently they get with it as we human beings do with a two-dimensional picture. If the family settles down for a pre-dinner Rin Tin Tin serial, will a neat, small chair be pulled up for Fido to get his kicks? (If Fido happens to be a large, angry dog . . . woops! no screen!)

## Off Lens (Personalities)

### Pulchritude Plus

One day recently we had occasion to wander over to CBS's deep marble foyer, take an elevator and be hied heavenward to a friend's office.

But on this particular day the usually impenetrable clique of performers had joined the ranks of tourists and oglers, and were turned out en masse to watch open-mouthedly the bevy of beauties which descended upon the lucky network.

It seems that Ed "The Perfect Fool" Wynn was casting for his upcoming television show, and the call was out for chorines. Tall, short, blonde or brunette, all of them were lovely. In they streamed. Elevator after elevator full of long eyelashes, rare scents and five-inch heels were borne up to the lounge, where the aspirants gathered before being ushered into Wynn's presence.

We left feeling glad that the Ed Wynn show will be sent east, too. Now New Yorkers, long proud of their traditional chorus lines, can see why West Coasters, most of whom turn out to the beach weekends and thereby expose themselves to more real pulchritude than probably exists in any other portion of the country, have been relatively unimpressed by gals of other climes and builds.

## Television Tips

It became impossible this week not to borrow from our own "Radio in Review" section the heading "We View With Alarm!" It is the only phrase we can employ (and still pass the mail regulations) in describing our reaction to the crowd of reactionaries who pound loudly away at the premise that "video will never take the place of radio" with the same fervor they might have once accorded "Curfew shall not ring tonight!"

One point in the biased outlook of these die-hards whose berth is radio, and who naturally enough will hang onto any perspective that banishes for them the bogey of an entertainment they haven't entered as yet (or couldn't), is their failure to remember that from here on out video will have nothing but new audiences . . . loving new audiences, to whom video is the greatest thing yet. The maze of ineptitudes, inexperience, incompetence and lack of income from which television shows are emerging certainly isn't going to bother the new millions who are enjoying having two senses, rather than one, appealed to.

A big trade article by a fairly big radio writer-producer mentioned that "a curtain of confusion must be ripped aside by proper expenditures." He also mentioned that people won't continue to look unless this happens. But they do. Half of them go so far as to continue to watch on their own set, rather than on the neighbors' set.

Joe and Jane You-Know-Who aren't exactly flinging their cash around in wild abandon, but television-set manufacture and sales continue to soar. Someone is buying them, lots of them.

And almost each day new methods are being devised to bring video to the hinterlands. One man in the remote remotes some place or other dreamed up a transmission method all his own, and it got FCC approval!

No one is forcing the less populated areas to have television. They seem to want this new phenomenon that will bring them nothing but inadequate, stupid, inept performances and dull viewing for the next several years.

As for the smart money going into video before there is a huge nationwide circuit of sets and transmitting . . . what about Ford, Kraft, Philco, Dodge, Buick and a few of the others who have been just smart enough to build up pretty fair businesses? A year ago the talk was that television "won't be a big thing until 1955." Today the same operators talk 1952. The obvious conclusion is that things are moving right along.

## Two Men, No Script, Thirty Thousand Props

*Is the Formula Two Comics Followed for Thirty-Five Successful Years of Stage and Picture Work. Today Olsen and Johnson Convulse Millions of Video Fans.*

**J**OHAN SIGVARD OLSEN and Harold Ogden Johnson were each born about fifty-five years ago. True, none but their families would recognize them by these names. Olsen, known to millions as Ole, was born in Peru, Indiana, and is a graduate of Northwestern University, where he majored in music.

Johnson, who answers most readily to Chic, was born in Englewood, Illinois. They are probably the oldest continuous team in show business,

having worked together for thirty-five years, during which time they have never laid off for more than two weeks at a stretch. That was voluntary.

### Avoided the Big Time

In 1914, when Ole was playing with a group known as the "College Four" in Chicago, he went downtown to a music publisher to pick up some tunes. While there he heard someone playing what he still describes as "the most powerful right hand I have ever heard." It turned out to be Chic. The music publisher introduced them, and they made a deal to work together on the spot.

For years the duo stayed west of Chicago, playing the Keith circuit. Taking the offers to come east would have meant a cut in salary until the new act had established itself on the eastern circuit. This they preferred not to do.

A few times the boys did come to New York, however, to play the Palace for prestige, giving New York a taste of one of the Midwest's most outstandingly successful acts.

Back in 1938 they had finally gone east as far as Philadelphia, where one evening Ole went out for a steak sandwich and met Nils T. Granlund, who became quite enthusiastic and

called Lee Shubert to come down from New York and see Olsen and Johnson's crazy show. After a doubtful evening, Shubert offered to back them in a show in New York—mainly because he had several empty theaters.

#### Critics in Accord

All the drama critics were in complete agreement on opening night—they agreed that it was the worst show they had ever seen. The only exception was Walter Winchell, who said again and again in his column that "Hellz-a-poppin" was the belly-laughingest show he had seen in a long time. To this day Olsen and Johnson credit Winchell with having helped boost them into the big time. The show ran for 1,125 performances.

They have, at various times, played all over the world from Australia to England. Only two summers ago, Ole, while riding along in Paris, noticed that one of the movie houses was showing their "Hellz-a-poppin" film. He stopped off to ask the manager how business was. The manager replied that it had been very good for the last eighteen months.

#### Copyrighting Nothing

For both stage and television, Olsen and Johnson work with only the sketchiest of scripts. In fact, when "Hellz-a-poppin" opened in New York, their lawyer asked for a script to be sent to Washington for copyright purposes and, to his horror, discovered that they had none.

More recently, the video-show producer thought sponsor Buick might like to know what its two stars were up to. The show prospectus handed him comprised only a series of scribbles on envelope backs. More horror.

The Olsen and Johnson "Ball Of Fire" fun show on TV is a big expensive show that each week utilizes about thirty thousand props ranging from toilet seats to live, squealing pigs. Midgets skip the stage; one-legged men dance; costumes, bearded ladies, South Africans, and anything else that has the Barnum and Bailey smack, abound. And, of course, Mr. Olsen and Mr. Johnson come on for a spiel or two, a dip into good old

## Visitor From Indonesia

*Rudy Gontha Is Visiting Different Countries To Study the Techniques of Radio Operation. Observing Many, He Is Most Enthusiastic Over The United States and Our Dynamic Announcers*

**I** CERTAINLY never thought that they would send me abroad to study the techniques of radio broadcasting," exclaimed Rudy Gontha, assistant chief of the English Department of Radio Indonesia.

This was the explanation given by a very handsome young man of twenty-eight who, dropping in for a chat at Radio-TV Life, told of his purposeful visit in the United States.

Rudy, who was born in Siao, Sanger Islands, off the north coast of the Celebes, is an announcer, news editor and producer of Radio Indonesia. Before assuming his present position he had a Hawaiian dance band which aired over YDC throughout Indonesia. When the territory was broadened to cover the Pacific Coast, namely Australia, Malaya and New Zealand, Rudy requested that he be allowed to deliver the announcements in English. Previously all speech had been in the native tongue. His request was granted and the program grew to great popularity.

But there was one drawback. "Many listeners asked us to play request numbers," he explained in beautiful English, "you know, for birthdays and special friends. We would if we had the music, but many times we didn't, and to buy it would be quite expensive . . . about \$15 per score." He told his radio audi-

Spanish musical. He so impressed the local dignitaries that upon the opening night, the secretary-general sought him out and after congratulations asked what he thought of radio.

Knowing that Radio Indonesia was building a new transmitter with 100-kilowatt power (it previously had an output of five kilowatts) he answered that it was his opinion there should be, in keeping with the new transmitter, better methods of radio production. Queried as to how this could be done, Rudy suggested that someone be sent abroad to study the technique in different countries. The secretary-general agreed, shook hands and left.

Deciding that nothing would evolve from the conversation, Rudy dismissed it and returned to the English department. About the time when the idea was farthest from his mind, he received a summons from the palace.

#### Sudden Surprise

At his arrival, the secretary-general revealed that they had been seriously considering his idea of sending someone to observe radio. The secretary-general startled the young man by asking him suddenly, "Are you married?" "No," Rudy replied rather puzzled. "Well, are you engaged?" Again the answer was negative. By now his curiosity was brimming over, and remembering the climax of the meeting he chuckled, "Was I surprised when they told me

that I was the one they had chosen to go abroad! No wonder all the strange questions!"

In July of last year Rudy left Indonesia to observe activities of PJC in Holland. He served as adviser to the Netherlands delegation to the third general assembly of the United Nations in Paris. (He is a member of the Indonesian Federalist Group.) While in Paris he observed the radio conference of UNESCO and in England he worked at the BBC compiling data on how the Britons operate radio.

Rudy arrived in the United States via New York. When in the Eastern city he was the Federalist representative to the Netherlands Delegation of the Security Council.

Of broadcasting in the United States he has developed the typical American habit of expressing enthusiasm with superlatives like "Oh, your announcers are *very great!* They are so *dynamic*, so *attacking* . . . they seem to *draw* the listeners' attention!" While opining, Rudy gestured with quick motions, as if through his fingers he could best describe how he felt.

"England has announcers who are more stilted and not as overwhelming as they are here. What impressed me the most is that American radio has so much opportunity and talent, so many resources, such marvelous technical methods!"

#### Indonesian Radio

"Indonesian radio has no commercials," he revealed, "the dramatic shows are presented by the amateurs. (The latter work merely because they like to act and not for money.)

"But," he continued earnestly, "they put their whole soul into their work and are as good as they can be."

"Yes, we too have quiz shows, but there are no prizes. We have annual musical polls for the listeners' favorites." In 1940 Rudy remembered that top honors went to Duke Ellington and runner-up Count Basie. "The man we call still the king of swing is Benny Goodman." He related, "I can remember when I first saw Goodman in 'Hollywood Hotel.' Of course it is an awfully old picture, but I know the time as if it were yesterday . . . it was September 6, 1936 . . . and I saw the picture six times! He's so great!"

There wasn't enough time for Rudy to tell of his personal life. (He left for San Francisco immediately and at this printing will again be back home in Indonesia.) He did tell of his schooling in Batavia, Java, where the education received is equal to our junior colleges. He didn't give any details about how his education had been interrupted by the Japanese. During the occupation he spent forty-one days in prison, subject to daily beatings, just because he had been found listening to for-

## *A Venture With Voodoo*

**S**HELDON LEONARD, radio actor, really broke a curse when he came to Hollywood. During recent months he has become a much-talked-about radio thespian, for fans have liked his "Orville Sharp" on the Parkyakarkus show, his boy friend on Judy Canova's program, the fellow who always growls at Jack Benny and the amusing diamond-in-the-rough characterization of "George" on Alan Young's half hour.

The curse started back in 1930, right in the pit of the depression.

Leonard, a recent graduate of Syracuse University, was doing a variety of work in New York City . . . from managing a theater to being a customer's man on Wall Street.

"I walked into a club one afternoon," he recalls as the start, "and a man came up to my table, looked at me and queried, 'Say, didn't I see you in some plays up at Syracuse?'"

Sheldon agreed that he had. Then the man offered him a job . . . acting in a British film that was to be shot in the tropics through Jamaica, Haiti and Trinidad. It was being made in pursuit of acquiring information about the customs and mystic beliefs of the aboriginal natives. Sheldon accepted, partly for the adventure, mostly for the money.

### Port-au-Prince

When the crew docked at Port-au-Prince the prop manager set out to secure at the village certain items that were needed for the validity of the picture—such objects as the sacred drums, stuffed snakes and ceremonial headgear used by the people as means of worship. To the Port-au-Prince inhabitants, what the prop man was doing was an act of desecration, for, as in many beliefs, such accoutrements are to be used only for spiritual purposes and any other use is sacrilegious.

With acrid tongues the natives warned the film crew of many dangers that they would encounter and of the curse played upon them.

Oddly, after the ship had once more put to sea, many strange and incomprehensible events took place. The whole crew fell sick with trichinosis and malaria, one man lost his leg—a shark chewed it off, the mishap occurring in shallow water which sharks had never been known to enter before.

Finally the picture, "Drums in the Night," was completed and the crew returned home with many circumstances never to be explained. Shortly before the homeward voyage another weird incident took place.

In Trinidad, Leonard was invited to a party. "Once inside the home, there were many people celebrating what appeared to be a gala occasion," he recalls. "The fellow who invited me led me toward a long food-laden banquet table where, at the head, sat a man . . . a very still man. After the introductions I finally realized that the host was not moving because he was dead. This was a wake. I later learned that once the subject is removed to the

burial grounds he is guarded for twenty-four hours by men who patrol the grave in a vigil which is believed to ward off the dreaded evil spirits."

### Contrasts

All of these experiences were quite in contrast to Sheldon's early life.

"I was raised in New York, went through college with an athletic scholarship, married a girl whom I knew since high-school days (Frances is a research biologist) and now have two children, Andrea and Steven," he accounted.

"On Broadway I played comedy roles in 'Kiss the Boys Goodbye' and 'Having a Wonderful Time.' Coming to California, by the way, was something I did with much reluctance at first.

"That was the way I felt on my first trip here." He explained that life in New York is as different from California as the living and the dead. "In the East, especially if you are in the theater, you live late hours, a social and fast-paced life. Here, things seem to black out around midnight. So I went back to New York. Suddenly everything was different. I didn't like it any more. The gay atmosphere, the frenzied pace, the bright lights, they weren't for me. I turned around, and with my family, headed again for the West."

Sighted by motion-picture people, he soon was in films, playing heavy roles in movies like "Take One False Step," "My Dream Is Yours," "Tortilla Flats" and "Tall, Dark and Handsome." The only complaint he utters against his film characterizations is "I always play a heavy . . . I can't convince Hollywood that I can do comedy."

Maybe, Sheldon, this reminder to Hollywood movie producers may blitz the voodoo on your screen comedy career. Maybe they will suddenly realize that you are a man with a very great voice and facial expression to match, able to convulse flicker fans the way you amuse radio listeners.

The audience shrieks with hilarity.

A few minutes later, one of the comics went into a skit about the world's greatest escape artist. He disappeared, manacled, into a cabinet. The cabinet shook and rocked with his efforts to extricate himself. Suddenly there was an explosion, and out walked Olsen—with one arm blown off. More happy audience noise.

Should Olsen and Johnson ever be deprived of a stage on which to perform, they could handle the show just as easily from the aisles between groups of attending spectators. A good part of their TV show is carried off in this area, anyway. The audience may be showered with beans and pin feathers, a covey of dead quail or a stuffed cow may fall from the ceiling, but ducats to a performance will always be at a premium.

Two nights after Olsen and Johnson opened the gigantic fun fest on video, they opened at Madison Square Garden in something called "Funzapoppin." That's in addition to
