We think that NBC's new program "Dragnet" is one of the best shows of its type on the air and never miss listening to it. With a minimum of violence and a complete absence of the phony melodramatics usually associated with the "cops and robbers" type of program, "Dragnet" achieves a documentary authenticity to say nothing of the good publicity it creates for the Los Angeles Police Department. We would like to know why the writers are not given credit for their excellent scripts? This goes for the members of the cast, too. We think Jack Webb, Barton Yarborough and Raymond Burr (he does play "Chief Bachstrand," doesn't he?) are terrific in the leading roles.

# Plotted at Home

Much of the Script Material for a Bright New Show, "Father Knows Best," Is Enacted Before It Ever Takes On the Written Form

WHEN a handsome, dashing movie lead gets up his own radio package, does he build it around the adventures of a romantic hero? Or the breezy doings of a sophisticated man about town? No. At least not in the case of one of moviedom's most sophisticated, breezy, romantic man-about-town types—Robert Young.

Bob chose a format dear to his heart and familiar to his mind—a family. Actually one of Hollywood's most devoted fathers, he officially became the head of a second family when "Father Knows Best" bowed onto NBC this fall. The second, radio, family is referred to by Young as his "income family"; while his own brood of four is called his "outgo family." Bob terms himself a mere middleman.

## Keeping Up With Kids

The air family comprises the "Anderson" parents, two girls and a boy, but some of the script situations that arise during the hilarious

radio half hour are still so similar to actual experiences within the Young menage where four daughters (Carol Anne, sixteen; Barbara, twelve; Betty Lou, six; and Cathy, four) lead their film-famed daddy a merry chase through a maze of youthful feminine fancies that Young says: "The situations encountered by the headman in 'Father Knows Best' are so familiar to me that sometimes I think the show is a documentary."

One incident of real Young family life was lifted in its entirety by writer Ed James to serve as script fodder. Bob Young and his wife had been in New York visiting. Agencies there, always alert for guest stars, had lined up Bob for an interesting and remunerative series of guest shots. Then the transcontinental telephone wires started to hum.

Bob learned, at great reversed cost, that six-year-old Carol had a part in her school play, and mother and daddy just had to be there.

As Bob explains today, "Not enough time had elapsed since my own school days so that I had forgotten how important it is to a small

performer to have the family witness a debut of any sort, so we elected to forgo Eastern radio and return home for the big affair.

"That didn't quite finish it. For days after our arrival home, telephone operators were chasing me down at the studio, at lunch . . . or wherever. I would answer these 'emergency calls,' usually tolls, only to find Carol on the other end, bleating about mysterious things like squeaky shoes and more wool socks."

Came the night of the play, and there were mama and papa proudly in the back row of the school auditorium, searching for daughter Carol among the cast. The play chosen was Alfred Noyes's "The Highwayman."

"While the kids pantomimed the roles, a reader delivered the lines. It was pretty cute, too, but we couldn't seem to spot Carol. Of course it was perfectly possible that she was up there 'portraying' one of the trees on stage, so we didn't worry.

"When we picked her up later, there was much careful following of

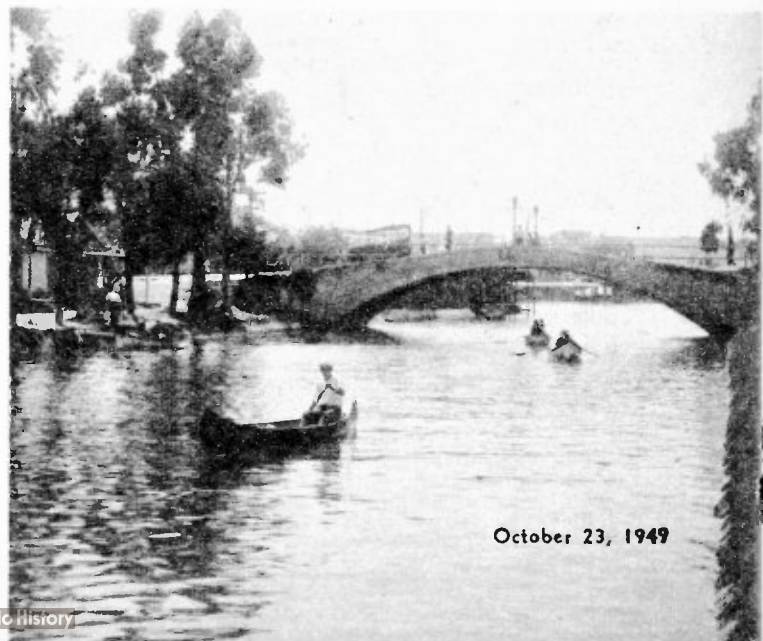
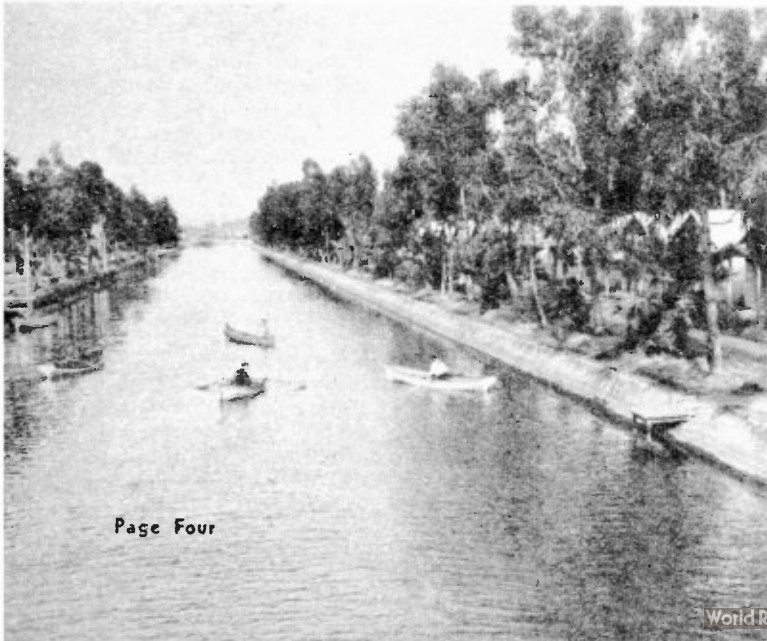

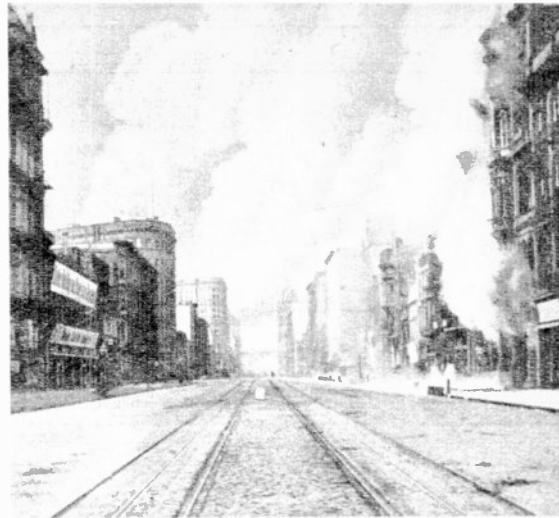

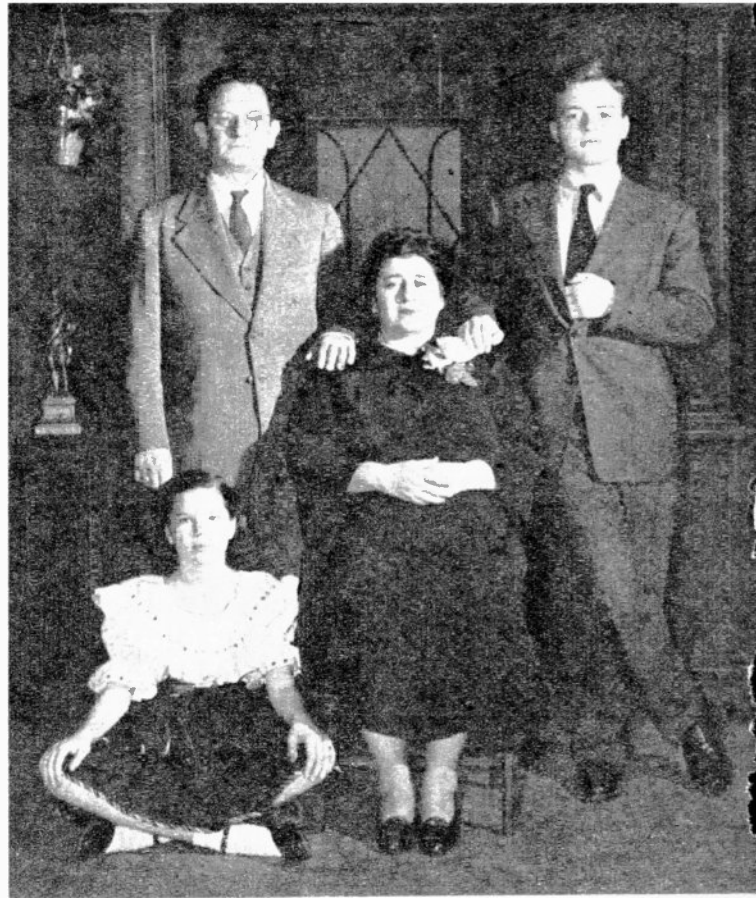

# Radio Was Fun-- Video Is Serious

*Says Mrs. Gertrude Berg, Creator and Leading Lady of the Long-Running Domestic Comedy "The Goldbergs," Now Successful in a Third Medium*

**A**N OLD FRIEND in a new dress." That's what Mrs. Gertrude Berg, creator of the famous serial, "The Goldbergs," calls her television version of the long-running show.

Twenty years ago the serial was heard for the first time on radio, then a very new medium. Talented Mrs. Berg is the first to admit that television is wonderful and exciting, but there are still some things she misses. "Perhaps what I miss most," she reveals, "in these early days of television is the careless, carefree atmosphere of early radio. . . . It was like acting in one's parlor, it was so

informal. The cast had fun. It was play. Television, on the other hand, is a serious business. . . . It was born yesterday and is adult today. It has been recognized as important from the start."

### Late Start

Mrs. Berg is one of the few women who has developed a successful writing (and acting) career after marrying and while mothering a family of two young children. During her college days she had written stories, poems and plays, but had been too timid to submit them for sale. "The Goldbergs" was her first and only major effort for radio.

The character of "Mrs. Goldberg" as played by the authoress is drawn heavily from her remembrance of her own beloved grandmother. Mrs. Berg, then a small child, remembers the surprises and presents from her grandmother and her kindness in bringing lonely strangers home to dinner.

In 1947, the actress-writer developed her cast of characters into a stage play, "Me and Molly." It became the first radio-nurtured play to achieve success on Broadway, and

critics succumbed to its simplicity and warmth. After years of being a radio actress, Mrs. Berg faced a live audience for the first time in her life at the Philadelphia opening of her play. She was thrilled to hear the audience reaction and laughs after years in a no-audience studio.

#### Difference in Mediums

Great astuteness in adapting "The Goldbergs" from one medium to another has been demonstrated by the actress-writer. In the sixteen years the program was heard at night, she relied almost entirely on the development of her characters, using only a slight plot. When the show became a daytime serial, she fulfilled the demands of plot convolution and complication expected by daytime listeners. For her Broadway play version, she returned to character development and didn't strive for gag lines or melodramatic twists. "The stage play was sort of a pre-television tryout," reveals its creator. "In television, too, I am writing about real people I know without the high-tension plot involvements of radio."

During her radio days, Mrs. Berg not only wrote and acted her show, she directed it, too. Television is much too complicated for this three-way application, she finds, and Worthington Miner is the director of the present series. The cast spends eighteen hours of rehearsal for the broadcast, not including the Monday-long camera rehearsal.

#### Warm Tributes

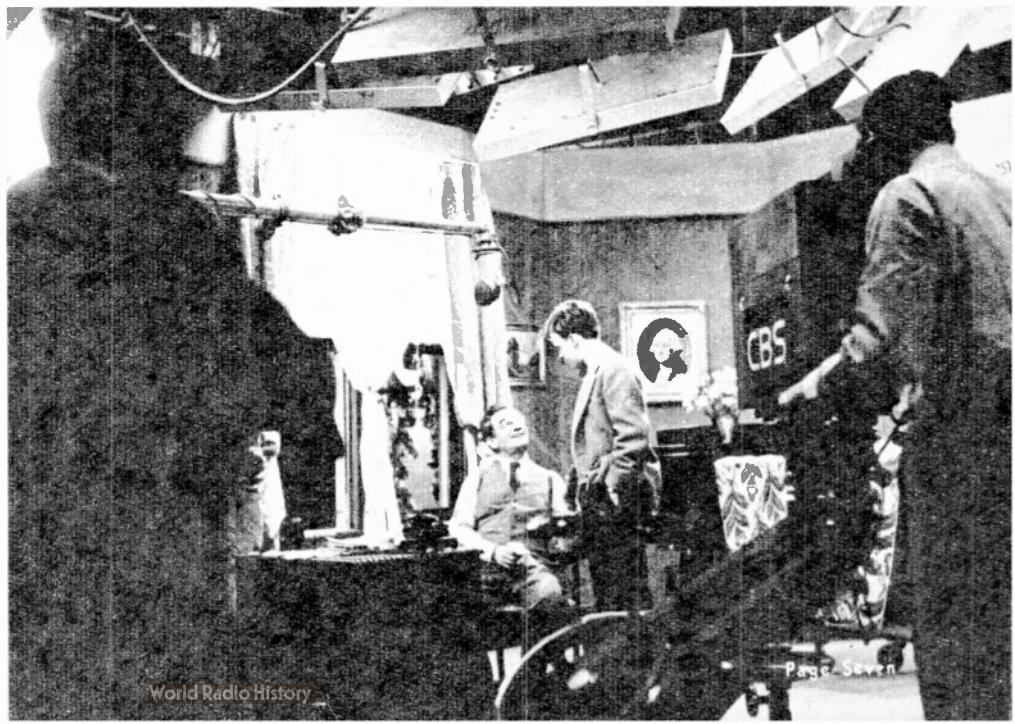
Though Mrs. Berg believes that television requires more work than she has encountered in her twenty years of radio and the theater, the reaction has made it more than worth-

while. She had a sponsor after but three telecasts; the public and press gave her fine reviews and word-of-mouth recommendations; psychiatrists, pathologists, judges and ministers have written her letters of praise and requested scripts.

Saluting the program, Everett R. Clincy, president of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, wrote this tribute: "By telling the

story of the 'Goldberg' family as an ordinary American and human family, you have made an important contribution to the good will of our nation. Irrespective of whether we are Protestant or Catholic or Jewish, our hopes and our dreams, our problems and our troubles, our triumphs and our joys are very much the same. They are the token of our common humanity. You have helped all of us to see that."

stant fare of giveaways, ridiculously simple questions, fabulous prizes given, not for merit or worth, but simply for answering a question already answered in the radio section of the paper; children's shows of blood and thunder with unwholesome themes, tearful soap operas throughout the day; constant drumming of silly commercials!! Is it any wonder that people are looking with relief to television?

Secondly, let's take up No Name's criticism of the programs. Before TV we were definitely not a sports-minded family. As a consequence, our son either went out alone to sporting events, or discussed them with friends elsewhere. Now, we all enjoy sports. I do not class myself necessarily as a "splendid woman," but I do consider baseball mentally healthful and fit for home consumption. In fact, I heartily endorse it! My younger daughter is enraptured with the children's programs. I think that the adult audience to "Beany," "Bozo the Clown," "Mr. I. Magination," Judy Splinters and others too numerous to mention proves that grown-ups, too, enjoy the wholesome entertainment these shows provide.


As for worthwhile programs, has Mr. No Name watched Freeman Lusk with his splendid "TeleForum"? Here we have the opportunity of hearing and seeing men of authority discussing the current problems of the day. Has he heard the Great Books Discussion? Has his wife enjoyed the fine women's programs aimed to help women improve themselves in appearance and in personality? Has he watched television bring opera and ballet into the home that never before knew them? Has he thrilled at openings he could never attend in person, at premieres and shows at which he has the ringside seat? Hasn't he enjoyed seeing some of his favorite screen personalities in informal chats or doing pantomimes?

Certainly, this new medium can be improved. There are many defects, many unexplored possibilities, but radio has all these faults and look how long it has been going on. Let's leave television alone to work out its own problems. And let's criticize constructively!

The Jack Smith-Dinah Shore show may move to New York for a while so Dinah can accept an engagement at the Waldorf... Raymond Burr is the hero in "Tag Taggart," new adventure series planned for the air... Doris Day and Bob Hope have had such success with their air duets that there are plans afoot for Doris to be lent to Decca so the two can repeat on shellac... A top femme vocalist replaces Jeff Clark and Betty Harris on the Henry Morgan show... "Vera Vague" has a sponsor interested in her very cute new show... Jim Hawthorne to be one of the leads in the new musical revue planned for the El Capitan—hope he does better than the last radioite to play there (and we don't mean Greenwood)... If Gene Raymond has his way, he'll use thespians from the cast of "Amazing Mr. Malone" in one of his planned movie productions.

### Looks Like

Sponsor has canceled out on the long-lived "Dr. L. Q."... That charming Dorothy Kirsten makes her film debut with Crosby in "Mr. Music"... "NBC University Theater" changed its name to plain "NBC Theater" because that classy word "university" was scaring off the listeners!... Standard Oil of New Jersey is another big sponsor that has pulled out of radio this season... Fanny Brice's return show for NBC will be budgeted at \$6,000 a week. Just a few years ago, the price was \$13,000... Dick Powell has sold his plane—after all these years he's giving up flying... October 13 was the thirteenth anniversary for "Mr. Keen," that lovable old "Tracer of Lost Persons"... Joel Davis is the new "Randolph" on ABC's "A Date With Judy," replacing Dix Davis, who has spent eight years in the role. Dix is leaving to spend a year in Europe... Red Skelton will be the star of the November 3 "Suspense"... Joe Howard, octogenarian star of radio's former "Gay Nineties" show, will play the Orpheus November 8. He's com-

poser of "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now"... Now the luxury spots are adding disc jockeys—Johnny Grant spins 'em in the Ciroette Room at Ciro's... The title role on ABC's "Blondie" will be portrayed by Patricia Lake, Arthur's wife and Marion Davies's niece, chosen after extensive auditions. Penny Singleton was mentioned earlier as possibly returning to the role.

### "Tello-Test" Case

The Chicago radio-telephone quiz, "Tello-Test," recent recipient of nationwide publicity because of its service as a test case for the FCC ban, is now heard on KHJ, 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The original program format had people called in order to answer a jackpot question which was carried

over an indeterminate number of broadcasts until the correct answer was given. The FCC felt that a give-away program would be considered illegal if aid to answering the question was given on a broadcast, and that broadcasting of the question on a previous program was considered such aid. "Tello-Test" was given an injunction against the FCC and remains on the air in the East, however.

Locally, the format has been changed to comply with FCC regulations. The carry-over question is eliminated and a different jackpot question is used on each broadcast, in accordance with changes made by Don Lee Vice-President Don Tatum and president of Radio Features, Inc., Walter Schwimmer. Says Tatum, "We have made these revisions so that the Don Lee airings of 'Tello-Test' will be conducted just as if the recent enactments of the Commission had become law."

### Original "Family" to Return

is delightful. The musical and choral backgrounds as supplied by Carmen Dragon and Norman Luboff's groups are excellent. **Judy Canova**, KFI, 7:00 p.m. Saturday, is now a situation comedienne, but her radio cast remains intact. Mel Blanc, Ruby Dantridge, Verna Felton, Hans Conried, Bud Dant's orchestra, the Sportsmen and announcer Howard Petrie are heard. Judy's songs remain the highlight of the program.

**Red Skelton**, KNX, 9:00 p.m. Sunday, is on another network, too, and his opening show like that of many another comedian dealt with the move. "Grandma" Verna Felton is out of the cast and character actress Martha Wentworth has been added as "Mrs. Fussy" to take up the slack. She does a fine job. **Rod O'Connor**, Pat McGeehan and **Lurene Tuttle** are all present on this chapter and **David Rose** and the Four Knights supply the melodies.

We'd forgotten how funny **Edgar Bergen** and **Charlie McCarthy** could be—that's why it's so nice to have them back, KNX, 5:00 p.m. Sunday. **Ray Noble**, "Ercil Twing," **Mortimer Snerd** are also back, but it's still **Edgar** and **Charlie** who are the show.

On the opening spot, **Bergen** fluffed, and it was difficult to realize that one man was voicing the snappy ad-lib argument that followed: **Charlie** accusing **Bergen** of ventriloquial incompetence; suggesting that **Bergen** get dressed up in white tie and tails and sit on his, **Charlie's**, lap!

"Mortimer's" corny jokes are still delightful and **Pat Patrick** as "Ercil" and **Ray Noble** are in the same tradition. The latter two, it seems to us, are a lot more subtle comics than their material would lead one to believe. No carping, however, because **Bergen's** back—and back under **Charlie's** thumb.

### Playbacks (Critical Comment)

#### We Point With Pride

. . . To two of our favorite radio characters—**Hal March** as the deadbeat "Mr. Purvis" and **Howard McNear** as the gentle idiot "Uncle John" on the **Burns** and **Allen** show.

. . . To **Lucille Ball**, who preserves the exterior of the sharp, wise-cracking gal in public—and whose kindness in private life is manifest in many warm, charitable acts. She'd probably yelp at this, but we know someone who calls her **Big Sister Ball**.

. . . To the most exciting listening in years—the last half of the ninth inning of the third World Series game when the **Dodgers** hit those two consecutive homers. No wonder everyone loves that team. (Incidentally, we haven't met one **Yankee** rooter on radio row.)

#### We View With Alarm

. . . That after sixteen years at NBC,

**Haven MacQuarrie** was not bid good-bye nor wished good luck on his departure by a single soul. We know that it's merely the thoughtlessness of big cities and big organizations—but wouldn't it be wonderful if **Hollywood** and its glamorous industries could keep the original warmth that made this such a happy town in which to work?

. . . That announcer on "The Croupier" who pronounces the title as if it were spelled "croo-PEE-ay" instead of the correct "croop-yay." And how come we have such high-class knowledge? We remember them pronouncing it that way on "Lux Theater's" production of "Casablanca." Like we say, we got our education from radio.

. . . In the same vein, the boys who call **Caliente** "Cal-ee-en-tay" are way off the beam, too. It's "Cal-YEN-tay"—and how long have you lived in California?

. . . The change in radio comedy during the past years that has resulted in the comedian's private personality being merged with his public one. Radio comedians do programs about being radio comedians. Their routines are more and more concerned with adventures in the station, trouble with writers, etc. Once the comedian was almost a universal figure, satirizing the foibles of life itself; now he is requiring his audience to learn the trade news of radio in order to understand him. The opening of the fall season had almost every major comic doing a routine about moving into CBS—there must be more material than that left in the world!

### On Mike (About Studio Happenings)

#### "Sun" Is Not So "Lucky"

The four programs sponsored by **Camel** cigarettes are no longer permitted to use the currently popular tune "Lucky Old Sun" as one of their offerings. You see, the word "lucky" is one-fourth the title of the song, but zounds! it's one-half the title of a rival cigarette, **Lucky S**—s.

Oddly enough, **Camel** star **Vaughn Monroe** has recorded the number rather successfully and before the ban would have logically included it as top number of the week on his show. Any more words we should strike (oh-oh) out of the language?

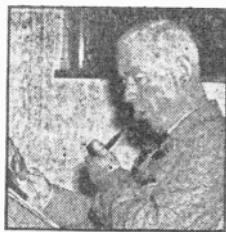

# Pit and Podium

Apropos of what we said last week about the classics not bringing in the clackers is the news from the Toscanini concert in Italy. Scalpers were getting as high as fifty dollars for a single ticket—"South Pacific" prices. Maybe in last week's statement we should have excepted Toscanini or Italy.

Though the Metropolitan Opera will not visit Los Angeles during its spring tour, the usual Saturday matinee broadcast will be starting on ABC toward the end of November. The San

Francisco Opera is reported to have said it would withdraw its fall season in L. A. if the Met played here. Radio listeners to the excellent Met broadcasts will still have the benefit of the finest opera in the country without the nine-dollar top price that goes with the best seats.

That hardy perennial of popular music, "Stardust," celebrates its twentieth anniversary this season. Did you know that the Hoagy Carmichael-Mitchell Parrish tune was introduced by Guy Lombardo during his Hotel Roosevelt engagement in New York in 1929? It was first recorded in 1931 by Isham Jones, and to date approximately 300 recordings of it have been made in every style from bop to symphony.

At last one of our favorite musical people, Sigmund Spaeth, formerly famed as radio's "Tune Detective," is scheduled to return to the air with his own program. The show, "At Home With Music," is not as yet set as to time, but it will be heard on the ABC network and KECA on Saturdays. We've always liked Sigmund's attitude on music—he is a foremost authority on the classics and an anthologizer of the popular. One of the best musical tricks of all time is his routine of singing "Yes, We Have No Bananas" by taking the lines of the "Hallelujah" chorus, "I Dreamt That I Dwelt in Marble Halls" and "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean" from which the novelty song was derived.

We're still tracking down radio themes for listeners when and where we can. Sylvia Ann Lynn of Los Angeles requests the name of the theme music on Mutual-Don Lee's "Count of Monte Cristo." It's an excerpt from "March and Procession of Bacchus" from the ballet suite "Sylvia" by Leo Delibes.

The first eight months of the year saw 1,178,308 video sets manufactured, bringing the estimate of sets in the country up to six million. Only a half year ago the radio-happy were still exhorting their followers to "chin up—it'll be five years before there are even four million sets in operation." . . . Of 6,000,000 video sets, 213,273 television receivers had been installed in the Los Angeles area as of September 30. On a computation of five viewers per set, that brings our local lookers and listeners to 1,066,365. . . . CBS has a video answer to NBC's "Hollywood Calling." The CBS show is called "Let's Call Hollywood." Idea finds film stars and featured players, not under studio contract, participating. Their pay lies in a cut of the program sale receipts. Gene Lester idea'd the show and sold it to CBS; his end of the deal calls for film footage taken in homes of players. . . . The George Jessel variety TV show and CBS moved closer to a deal this week, with CBS promising Jessel the best in production and talent, and their assurance that several sponsors are already interested in just such a show. . . . SC and UCLA basketball games are being considered for televising. . . . If the Coast League doesn't put the kibosh on the deal, Pabst Beer will again televise the Hollywood and Los Angeles baseball games next year. . . . KNBH is auditioning the excellent drama built around the show folk who live with "Mama Rosa in Hollywood." . . . Kay Kyser's "College of Musical Knowledge" has been bought by Ford Dealers of America for televising on the NBC network. . . . ABC is building their Thursday night telecasts into a solid block of mystery, with "Starring Boris Karloff," "Photocrime" and probably "Your Witness" on tap. Good idea.

## Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

### Nuremberg Trials

On Wednesday, October 12, KTSL added another operator to its telephone switchboard for the evening, then at 9:15 started rolling for televiewers the Army Signal Corps film, "Nuremberg Trials." The extra oper-

ator was to take care of protest calls from the lily-fingered to whom documentary horror was "shocking." No such calls came in, but KTSL was literally flooded with congratulatory messages. So many, in fact, that a repeat showing of "Nuremberg Trials" goes on Wednesday, October 26, at approximately 9:30 p.m., Channel 2, KTSL. If you haven't seen it, be sure to watch! Those who saw the film need no recommendation.

It is impossible to more than briefly outline this excellent ninety-minute film in review space. Film followed the trial, by the four mighty nations and the fifteen more, through the prosecution and defense of the Nazi wartime regime in all branches. The very film used by the Nazis to terrify the threatened countries was run for the criminals, and thus for the television audience. While the court listened with headphones to translators of each language, an English-speaking commentator followed all speeches for film viewers.

This outstanding film showed the books and records of both prosecution and defense; followed the defendants through the trials. Their conduct and voices were as revealing as the film-recorded events in the course of the German conspiracy.

From the street brawling in Munich in the 20's, documented evidence took viewers through the last move in wresting Germany away from a policy of peace; through the 1936 spreading of Nazi troops through first the Rhineland, then Austria, Czechoslovakia, Moravia, Poland, and Denmark. Invasions of Norway, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg and the attending brutalities were pictured.

The Axis pact signing was pictured. Barbaric doctrines of total war were read for the court and incidentally for the viewers. The slave camps, gas chambers, atrocity camps and forced marches of thousands upon thousands of starving prisoners were all on film, shown in court.

Last half hour of the film dealt with each war criminal's attempt at defense under cross examination, the summation by justices of each of the four powers, and the reading of the sentences for the tried German war leaders.

At the end of the film, ten war leaders were shown en route to the gallows. Seven began prison sentences very little worse than the average bad-check artist in the United States gets for his pains, and three of the offenders went scot-free.

While that alone seemed pretty alarming, the worst scare of the whole film lay in the parallel that seems apparent between the Germany of yesterday—its ruthless conquering of small nations and suppression by any

brutal means of those who object to a life of servitude—and a huge nation which today is up to the same tricks that once plunged the whole world into war, plunged into war too late to save ten million Europeans from hideous deaths.

This film should also be shown in theaters—for free, if necessary—and certainly anyone with a television set should not miss the second showing.

### "Life of Riley"

Some eastern spines should straighten with a snap as eastern execs view the West Coast-made (Filmtone Studios) first few chapters of the televised "Life of Riley." If this film is indicative of the sort of production, acting, scripting and low costs the Coast can arrive at in video film, any bland dream of New York being the big TV center will fade perceptibly. The show, Pabst-sponsored, will be seen on twenty-one NBC television stations interconnected by coaxial cable and individually by sixteen additional stations, among them, of course, KNBH.

First credit goes to Irving Brecher, producer-director who doubled on script, for his choice of cast. Jackie Gleason is "Riley," Rosemary DeCamp plays "Mrs. Riley," children are Gloria Winters and Lanny Rees, John Brown re-creates "Digger O'Dell, the friendly undertaker," and Sid Tomack plays "Riley's" sidekick, "Gillis."

Opening show plot carried "Riley" through the torments of an anticipated tonsillectomy. Some of the oldest gags in entertainment business were dressed up with delightful dialogue and really great comedy on the part of the cast.

Undertaking to create a new "Riley" for radio listeners and film-goers accustomed to Bendix could have been a frightening proposition for Jackie Gleason. His triumph must have pleased Pabst, NBC, producer Brecher and everyone else connected with the show. Whereas Bendix has appeared in motion pictures as a comical dullard, as a vicious, sadistic cop, and as a variety of other things besides "Riley," Gleason has stuck to comedy, and emerged in the TV role as a warmly humorous, purely sympathetic character.

We learned that each chapter of the "Riley" series was produced on an eight-hour budget, at around \$2,500. The results make that peanuts.

KNBH will present the series Tuesday nights at 9:30 . . . and we know where we'll be then. Home, watching.

He also operates "Herkimer," the good-deeded goat puppet which brings out the game of the day for children to play. Each week there is a drawing out of the wishing bowls containing names from fan mail, and the two children whose names are drawn are invited to be on the following week's show.

While the use of various voices, and the breath of life instilled into story characters by the use of hats, masks, glasses, and miscellaneous props from riding whips to magic flowers are pretty novel in themselves, it is the music that is a highlight feature of the show. Howard does all of the original background piano music which heightens the effects of storms, steps, wind, bells and general mood of the action.

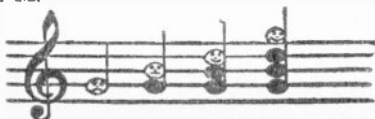

Music chores are well handled by Billy May's Orchestra and the Starlighters. . . . **BUDDY CLARK's** last Columbia release combines the unusual "Envy" and the whimsical "Dreamer's Holiday," and it's hard to believe that his voice is no longer with us in reality. However, "Envy" and "Holiday" are another pair of fine recordings and excellent examples of Buddy's many waxings you'll continue to hear. . . . **CINCINNATI SUMMER OPERA ORCHESTRA**, conducted by Fausto Cleve, makes its initial appearance on Decca's LP-Microgroove, and a very unique recording in that it includes six great waltzes from favorite operas together with five lighter encores—all by some of the world's greatest composers—Verdi, Gounod, Offenbach, Debussy, Liszt and Kimsky-Korsakov. . . . **JO STAFFORD** and the Starlighters should be heard plenty on the traditional "Red River Valley." . . . Paul Weston's arrangement for voices and background is quite unusual—and Jo's warmth of tone is showcased beautifully. . . . Reverse, "If I Ever Love Again" is another of the slower ballads,—well done, but not in "Valley's" class. . . . **ARTHUR LEE SIMPKINS** (he of the high-toned voice) has a pair of contrasty sides in "Diane" and the western-flavored "Over the Mountain," both with organ backing—a decided improvement, by the way, over previous Crystalette discs where full orchestra was used. . . . **FRAN WARREN's** latest for RCA-Victor, "Envy" and "You're in Love With Someone," are more colorful than any she has done to date, and Fran's change-of-pace styling in the sliding manner might be just what's needed to make this her best disc. . . . **TEX BENEKE** (RCA-Victor) is featured in four novelties from Disney's "Ichabod and Mister Toad." . . . All have the strong Beneke beat and decidedly the best dance versions available to date. . . . # Hawthorne's Better Half

*Reveals Why She Thinks Her Husband Is Funny, Doesn't Admit Her Own Sharp Sense of Humor*

**L**ADY, does your husband wish you knew how to can radishes? When the salesman wedges his big toe in the door and you are all set to sign on the dotted line, does your fond protector creep up and whisper confidentially to the salesman, "Oh, I wouldn't accept her signature . . . she's not responsible . . . harmless, but still . . ."

Or does that ever-lovin' spouse threaten crying babies with "Quiet, or I'll stick you in the refrigerator until you're eleven years old!"? No? Then lady, you don't know what it's like to be married to a comedian. Especially to one like "That Hawthorne Thing."

Defending her husband's humor with a wit equally as sharp is Lee

Hawthorne, who was a member of the Loyal Order of Hoganites long before she met Jim. A delightfully pert blonde, she laughs as spontaneously at his clowning around home as at his weekly KTTV television stint.

Aside from a little matter of forgetting to turn off the shower spigot, a careless habit that throws the master of Hawthorne House into a frenzy, Lee reveals that their home life is a jolly ball, and as Lee laughs, "I never know what 'Hartorne' will do or who he'll pretend to be next." In their newly-wed days, it was a bit surprising to find notes around the house informing her that he had "gone to China . . . be back in thirty days." At first it was startling to receive a long-distance telephone call with the party on the other end saying, "Sorry, dear, I had to go to New York on business."

### Four-Leaf Clover

To show they weren't superstitious, Lee and Jim married June 13, 1948, in Las Vegas. Their love song was "Four-Leaf Clover," and when they were going steady Hawthorne had

**I**'M A JUVENILE in name only," sighs Ezra Stone, radio's "Henry Aldrich." Not that Stone is fretting about his lost youth. He's only thirty-one and his youth was and is far from lost.

This unlost youth has spent twenty-five years in show business, beginning with the time he "elocuted" on a children's hour in Philadelphia. His teens were spent playing bits on

Broadway and on the road and as producer George Abbott's assistant. He made a big hit as the eternally paddled plebe in "Brother Rat," and then a bigger one as "Henry Aldrich" in the Broadway play "What a Life," the forerunner of his many years on the air as "Henry." While a star on Broadway, Stone still found time to understudy the comedy leads, Teddy Hart and Jimmy Savo, in "The Boys from Syracuse." "If I had gotten sick at a strategic moment, I could have closed both shows."

### Fast Trip

Stone paused long enough to visit with 235 friends in the four days he recently spent in Hollywood, en route back to New York from the convention of the American Federation of Radio Artists in San Francisco. He had just quit as director of the Olsen and Johnson television show and was returning to resume as "Henry" and to look over the play he had directed for Broadway, "At War With the Army." From which you may gather that Ezra is not very "Aldrichish."

Stone's reason for quitting the Olsen and Johnson show after nine

weeks of "television enslavement" is that "life is too short." Chick and Ole, according to the ex-director, are "two great big, wonderful kids." Officially also a writer on the O. and J. show, Stone laughs, "Writing for those two goes something like this: 'One elephant falls out of the flies.' It takes a great command of language!" He's thankful for the experience to add to his amazing background. "It was the quick way to find out what television is about," he says rather gloomily.

### "Henry" to End

The fact that Stone claims that his days as "Henry Aldrich" are numbered does not mean that a career is ending—it's just going into high gear. He's not only an actor but a director and writer, too. He directed his first Broadway show, "See My Lawyer," starring Milton Berle, the same year that he voted for the first time. Other shows Stone piloted on the Main Stem include "Reunion in New York," "This Is the Army," "January Thaw" and "Me and Mollie." During his time in the army, he

**S**ATURDAY night, August 13, Lady Luck was in our camp. We were busy recording at our usual stand. We had gotten a big laugh from an announcement over the P.A. system that went something like this: "Your attention, please. Woody Eugene Victor War-Horse Jr. is wanted at the main gate." I was standing at the photographers' ramp when a thin, pleasant-looking man came up to me and introduced himself as Odd Halseth, city archaeologist for Phoenix, Arizona. He was a Norwegian and he had read an article in the Gallup newspaper about our research. He was interested in our efforts. Odd had lived with the Indians for many years. He loved them and understood them. He invited us to his hotel room after the performance to hear his wire recordings of Indian songs and chants, many of which have never been heard by white men.

Bless Odd Halseth. He became our encyclopedia of Indians and Indian culture. There was nothing he didn't seem to know—no question he couldn't answer. His recordings were remarkable and he cheerfully allowed us to re-record from his wire recorder to our Mini-Tape. He is sending us a bibliography of the finest books written on the various tribes. He is sending us a great deal of his own research material. He stands ready to help us in any way. He has invited us to the city of Phoenix near the end of October to record the chants of several groups of Indians who are gathering there under his auspices. It will be a real pleasure to see Odd again.

We left Gallup with a heavy feeling in our hearts. As we traveled the long road home, my mind was full of the wonderful things I had seen: the exhibit hall with its remarkable display of Indian jewelry,

his picture processed in a plastic case with a four-leaf clover on the back. It stays in Lee's wallet.

The gal that's got Hawthorne's heart also claims he's quite sentimental. Her opinion almost reversed one birthday when no remembrance appeared. "I was sure he had forgotten," Lee sighs, "but several days later I found strange letters around the house saying that I had only so much time left until *the hour*. This went on for a week and I finally found my present in the back of the car—it had been hidden for a week.

"Another time he brought a mysterious box to me and asked me if I would wrap it up nicely." This was Lee's chance to show what artistic talent she had, and for long minutes she worked on the package, covering it with silver foil and painstakingly curling the ribbons into a beautiful effect. When she proudly returned it to him, he just as proudly handed it back. "For you," was his bashful statement. Lee was speechless.

Typical of the gags both of them enjoy playing is to stop at a drive-in and confuse the car-hop by speaking in a language that no scholar could translate. "But it's fun," insists Mrs. H. Their very dearest of friends have often been caught unawares with this playful little gem: "Jim will be walking down the street with his buddy when my husband suddenly spurts ahead shouting, 'Get away from me, you bum. I'll not lend you another penny.'" Poor friend is stunned, yet keeps up the farce by running after Hawthorne and pleading his forgiveness. Obviously, the bystanders are contemptuous of this so-called bum who is trying a mooch. "It's a great act," laughs the noble Hawthorne . . . and Lee shakes her head understandingly.

### Pride and Joy

When their baby Darr Christopher was born, Lee had prepared herself for more antics. She still hasn't gotten over the time she and Darr arrived home from the hospital to find pop all ready to teach the alphabet to their infant son. "Gunkley," as he is fondly called, is as cute as a button and looks the spitting image of his dad . . . especially when his folks prop a pair of thick-rimmed glasses on his nose. Baby then pretends to read the comics.

Close chums of the couple are still laughing about the afternoon bridegroom Hawthorne met them at the airport with a tiny four-year-old girl clutched in his arms. Thrusting the little child forward Jim announced, "Hi folks, meet my wife!" When the people finally met Lee, they could see in her eyes what a great guy she's got.

To show how thoughtful her husband is, Lee describes the day he

gifted her with a cute little baseball cap. "I was so thrilled, and it had a nice big H on the bill . . . it was so sweet of 'Hartorne' to go to all the bother of having my initial embroidered on the bill. Then we went to a Hollywood Stars game and when I looked at the bleachers I was amazed at the number of people who had the same exact initial as I!" A second later the shocking realization hit her. *H . . . Hollywood!*

No matter how Hawthorne clowns, Lee's always ready with a hearty chuckle, for whatever he does she knows it's just plain Hogan.

rugs, copper-ware, paintings, tableware, leather goods—the beauty of these crafts is almost beyond belief. I thought of the wonderful dances, most of which have not changed in hundreds of years. I thought of the haunting, strange chants, music that was foreign to our ears, but with a beauty that could not be dismissed. I thought of the noble Indian people with their great dignity, their fine sense of humor, their gentle tolerance for the tourists, such as myself, who plied them with silly questions and constantly clicked cameras in their faces.

So these were the bloodthirsty savages! So these were the descendants of the uncivilized barbarians who inhabited our great country long before the white man arrived! Bloodthirsty? Uncivilized? How could they be, with such traditions of beauty and such a cultural history? We have a lot to learn, I thought to myself—and then I thought of the opening night of the Inter-Tribal Ceremonial, and I thought of the stirring message with which the Indians had greeted their visitors:

"Know us and understand us—in

directed many service shows and wrote a book, "Coming, Major." He still directs plays to be sent out on the hospital circuits each season.

The Stone family lives on a farm outside Philadelphia from which Ezra and his actress wife Sara commute to New York. Ezra rises at 5:30 a.m. to milk his cows before he catches the train into the city. His children, Josef, six, and Francine, four, keep pleading with him to "stay home and work." They listen to their father on the "Aldrich" program, but cannot realize that he is "Henry." "They like the musical bridges very much, however," their father smiles.

"If 'Henry Aldrich' lasted long enough," Stone muses, "my son could take over for me." And how long will 'Henry' and Ezra continue as one? The actor hasn't yet decided—"Another year . . . or two . . . or three . . ."
