For a long time I've been wondering if the naming of the network at the end of a network program was a requirement by the FCC as the station identification call letters are. However, recently I've found out that it wasn't. This naming of the network is called in radio "a system cue." It is intended to signal the stations on the network that the program is over so that the stations could properly be "broken" without the stations' announcers having to anticipate the program's end and worry about the timing of their stations' call letters. It also prevents a jittery announcer cutting into the program ahead of time and spoiling the effective finish. It applies to live as well as to transcribed shows.

However, it seems as if some announcers at our local network outlets don't give much value to this method of notifying of a program's finish, or perhaps they don't believe in it, or both. On KECA you will invariably hear at the end of a transcribed program for delayed broadcast: "Transcribed, this is ABC, the American . . . etc." This, as even a child can discern, is not from the original program. Often this becomes very ridiculous when the KECA announcer is late to cut in and the original system cue is partly heard and the announcer goes ahead with his clever method and butts in and the result is somehow like this: "This is ABC, the America . . . Transcribed, this is ABC, the American Broadcasting Company." It's really funny and perhaps even ironical when one knows that the original system cue is only to eliminate such similar occurrences. Moreover, when the original cue is cut off the conclusion of the program sounds pretty bad,

because the background music is suddenly cut off.

It's beyond me why the original program cannot be left alone and the transcription notices announced at the very end of the program as well as it is done before the beginning. This is often done on KFI whenever someone at NBC, where from the program is fed to the station, isn't anxious to have his voice on the air. I think "The preceding was transcribed" doesn't detract anything from the program the same way as "The following program is transcribed" doesn't either. At KECA this cutting-in habit has formed into second nature. The Louella Parsons show, which lately is completely recorded, even then does not escape this punishment. I'm sure that Marvin Miller announces at the end of the program that it was transcribed as he does at the beginning, but our good announcer at KECA wouldn't give him a chance. He wants also to be heard.

Sometimes, on KNX and KHJ, the word "transcribed" is superimposed over the original program before the end, and the original system cue is left. Although bad, it is the lesser of the two evils. For a reason which I haven't found yet this practice is followed consistently on certain programs whereas the cutting-in is also done consistently on others. This is specially true of KHJ. Can't the people responsible for it realize that unless the program is left alone from its very start to its very finish the continuity is spoiled?—the very same thing that these people may want to keep.

Could anyone explain to me why KHJ does also insert "Don Lee" in the system cue? Isn't the plug for Don Lee after the station break enough, that it has to be preceded by another one? I realize that there is a regional network Don Lee which is affiliated with the Mutual Broadcasting System, but why try to make the impression that Don Lee is a national network? Why fool the public? If a program is broadcast over the Don Lee regional network only, let them do as they please, but when the program is on a national scope why not give credit to whom credit is due? I know that the Mutual network is differently organized from the other networks but I can't see

any reason why it should take a beating for that. I'm sure you'll agree with me when you hear what KHJ does to the Mutual Newsreel, where it's mutilated beyond recognition. Once upon a time we used to know where the individual items in the Newsreel came from, but since the advent of "Radio's Greatest Hour" and its "Five-Star Feature" it isn't so any more. I wish I could listen to the New York network outlets where all this juggling isn't done, and could therefore enjoy a radio program.

This argument may sound silly to someone but were it not for its exactness, promptitude and care for the minutest detail American radio would not be what it is today. No, gentlemen, it isn't silly to be fool-proof, thorough and methodical.

To you, editors, please do not refer to a program when a writeup is done on it by its outlet station when the program is on a national scope. Although only few people may read your magazine outside the Los Angeles area they must often wonder to what network that writeup refers to. By making reference to the network a person anywhere could more easily understand what it's all about since the networks are nationally known whereas the Los Angeles stations are not. Whoever listens to the radio knows which station carries which network's programs. To us LA listeners it would make no difference but it would to others somewhere else, and thus enjoy more your magazine. Don't you think it's logical?

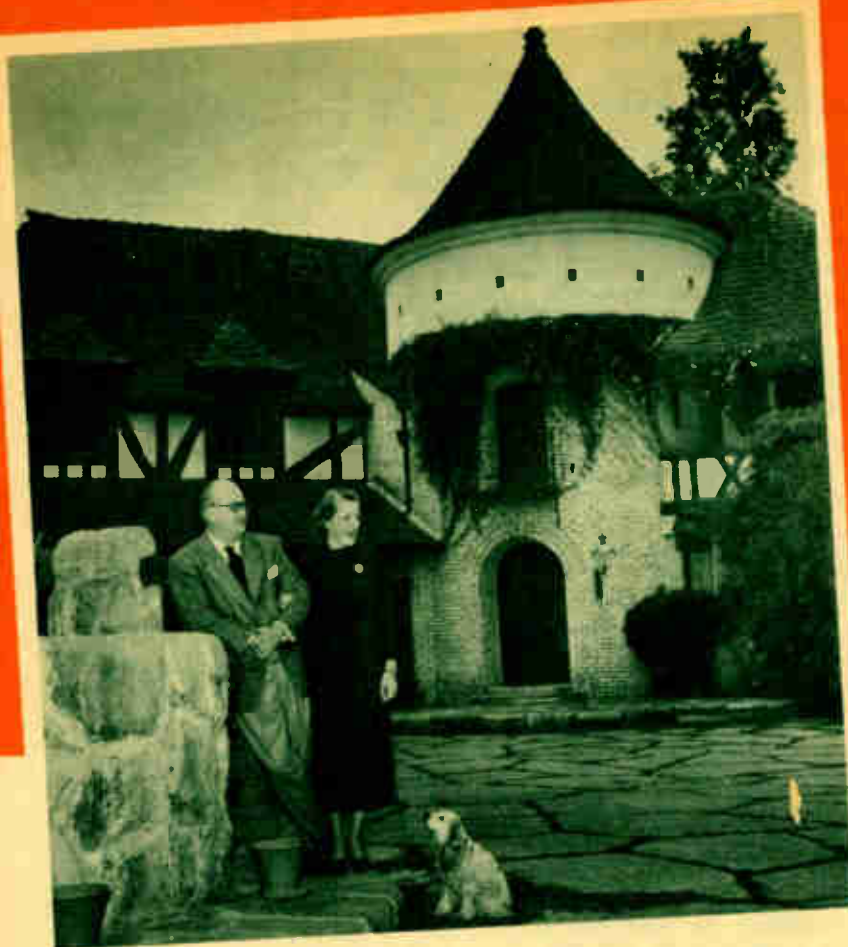

"Halls of Ivy" Are Decked With Laughter

Friday, 8:30 p.m.

RONALD COLMAN has thirty years as a top star, Don Quinn has fifteen years as ace script writer of "Fibber and Molly," as they join forces in the happy new program, "Halls of Ivy." One hearing of this charming show is enough to convince one that this may well be the most exciting enterprise of both careers.

For many years Quinn has had "Ivy" on the brain, and to it he brings a gentle humor and a kindly philosophy which are unusual in radio comedy. Colman as "President Hall" is not so far from reality that he doesn't recall that a tap-dancing junior is also a veteran of Okinawa.

As the "Halls," Mr. and Mrs. Colman are ideally cast. We learn scriptwise that Benita Hume, as "Victoria Hall," is the former star of the British stage. Undistinguished as she was in "Lulu's Mad Moment" ("I spent the whole second act on a

ladder singing 'Oo'll 'old out an 'el-pin' 'and'"), "Victoria" was a reigning stage queen in "Give Them Tears" when "Professor Hall," on sabbatical, sat through twenty-five performances of the play. The opening broadcast of the program introduced them in their campus home and reprised the original romance. Gay "Victoria," who cuts her distinguished husband's name, "William Todhunter Hall," to "Toddy," is considered by "Ivy" students to be the ideal prexy's wife, particularly good when it comes to staging the campus musical and teaching the aforementioned junior to tap-dance. The board of regents is not so sure—it seems that one of them saw "Lulu's Mad

Moment." "You saw it on Wednesday night?" recalls "Victoria." "Then you saw us at our peak—we opened on Tuesday and closed on Thursday."

Happy Meeting

The romantic comedy is directed by Nat Wolff, who is also director of "Anacin Star Theater." Mr. Wolff is married to Edna Best, at present starring with Maurice Evans on Broadway. Miss Best, another excellent talent from the London stage, was heard as "Victoria" on the audition record of "Halls of Ivy." Previous commitments prevented her and co-star Gale Gordon from actually doing the show. Though it sounds tailored for the Colmans, it was not—until

director Wolff suddenly realized that as a friend and former agent of Ronald Colman, he was in a position to bring the two perfect elements together. Colman, too, had other commitments, but he and Benita liked the show so well that arrangements were made to go through with it.

Colman, a man who admits that his early youth was marked by an excessive shyness of young ladies and a passion for the works of Robert Louis Stevenson, remains one of the best-mannered men in show business. An astounded press agent watched the actor retrace his steps across the NBC parking lot and re-enter the building merely to walk up and shake his hand. It seems that Colman had forgotten to tell the press agent "goodbye" on a routine departure. The business of good manners is also an important one to writer Quinn and one of the lessons he teaches, subtly sandwiched in the romantic comedy situations of "Halls of Ivy."

The Colmans have been married since 1938 and live in the hills back of Beverly Hills—not really next door to Jack Benny. They have one daughter, Juliet Benita Colman, born in 1944. The star's next film, following his Academy Award-winning "A Double Life," will be "Champagne for Caesar," backgrounded on a radio giveaway.

A Banjoist!

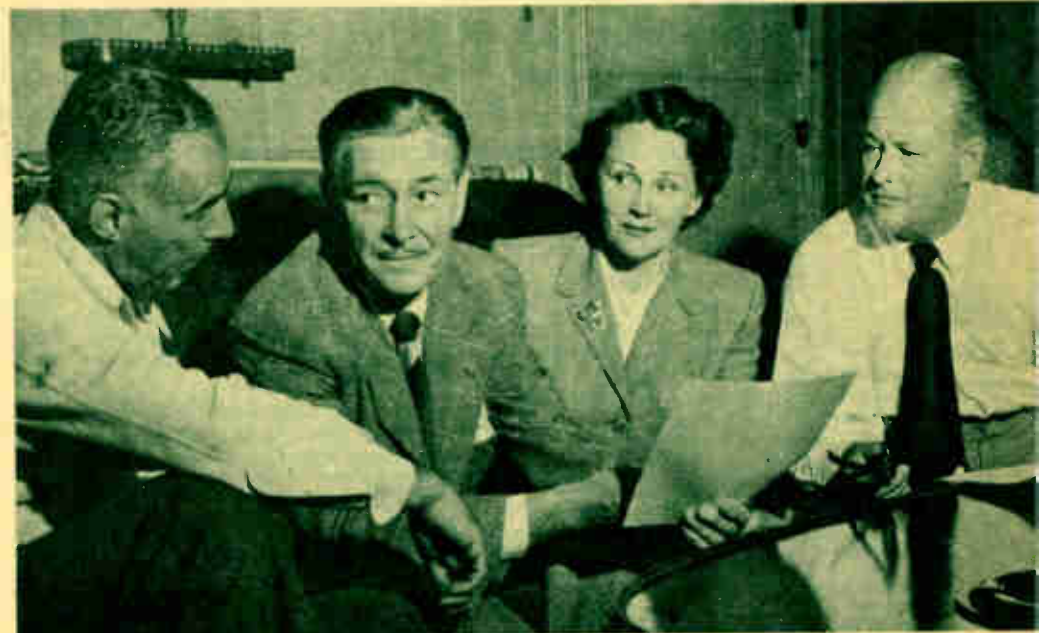
Born in Surrey, England, Colman is the first actor in his family since the eighteenth century . . . he made his professional debut as a banjo soloist at a Masonic smoker . . . served in the first World War as a member of Kitchener's "Contemptibles" and saw action at the battle of Ypres . . . wounded at Messines. First stage work was in a touring variety sketch . . . made screen debut in a two-reel comedy which, "thank heaven," he says, "was never released" . . . came to America in 1920 with three clean collars and fifty-seven dollars . . . made American debut in three walk-on parts in the same play, wearing for each a different size and color beard . . . discovered by screen director Henry King and played opposite Lillian Gish in "The White Sister" to great acclaim . . . switched to talking pictures with greater success than any other silent star . . . still considers "Beau Geste" his best film, "The Unholy Garden" his worst. He has long been in demand as a radio guest star and his guestings with Jack Benny are a radio legend. In "Halls of Ivy" he is equally as appealing, and in the words of writer Don Quinn, "The whole thing has turned out so well that it frightens me!"

Former San Francisco Disc Jockey, Who Preemed First Commercial Video Stint in Bay Area, Came Southward Last Year, Was Picked for Bergen-McCarthy Stint for His Appealing Delivery, and Is Now Breaking Into Films

GHAT ANNOUNCERS don't come a dime a dozen was the discovery made by the Edgar Bergen-Charlie McCarthy board of directors last season when they dug deep into the list of top West Coast "pitch men" and found nothing. What the show needed, they felt, was not a "spieler" but someone who could just "talk friendly like" to listeners in a way that could keep Coca-Cola on their minds.

Even a desperate audition of some pretty astute actors failed to find just the right man, but then along

came Bill . . . bespectacled Mr. Baldwin, who was just what the sponsored, ordered.

A former San Franciscan, Bill had his own disc-jockey show from the Fairmont Hotel, besides the honor of having the first commercial video stint in the Bay Area. To the popular platter party, Bill brought a thorough knowledge of music, stemming from his youthful drummer days. No amateur, Bill, at a fairly gangly age, won over some hot competition in a national contest and walked off with

the prize of a baton . . . from John Philip Sousa himself.

Inspired by such honor, Bill got a job as drummer and singer in Pueblo, Colorado, tired of that and moved on to Omaha, Nebraska, instituting his first record program on the midnight-to-six-ayem shift. Right along here, Bill met his wife-to-be, Enid, who was one of the Epstrand Sisters, Omaha vocal trio.

They married and decided to give California a whirl. Subsequently, Bill became special-events director for ABC-KGO (formerly Blue Network). Not too much later, Baldwin went overseas as a war correspondent, attached to Admiral Halsey's carrier task forces. After reporting the first strikes on the Philippines, Okinawa and Formosa, Bill left the war theater with a Commendation Award by the Secretary of the Navy for reporting under fire.

Again San Francisco became his home and radio his world, freelancing this time. When Art Linkletter came to Hollywood, Bill took over Linkletter's Bay Area shows and started "Breakfast on Nob Hill" with Ruby Hunter, who also aided the able Mr. Baldwin with a Sunday show from the Hearst Ranch.

Likes Being a Character

Whether His Radio or Movie Role Calls For J. Carrol Naish to Be a Japanese General or a Wistful Little Immigrant, He Relishes That Portrayal "the Most"

JCARROL NAISH started seeing the world twenty years ago, and has never stopped. His actual travels have encompassed Russia, Egypt and India, as well as the European continent. It is through the medium of his multitudinous roles in movies and radio that Naish goes on broadening his horizons.

Each time the Award-winning Irish actor dons the make-up and dialect of a new role, he also adopts that role's character as his own, and looks out on familiar surroundings through new eyes. As his radio role of "Luigi" on CBS's popular "Life With Luigi," Naish finds a new world in Hollywood radio by seeing it through the eyes of a wistful, joyful little Italian immigrant. If he plays an Arabian slave dealer in a motion-picture role, the long-familiar back lot of a studio is turned into fresh territory by the not-so-simple trick the creative artist has of approaching it, not as technical actor Naish, but as the Arab.

Naish's love of character portrayal ties in directly with his complete enjoyment of radio. While J. Carrol himself terms radio so easy for actors because, and we quote directly, "The writers are the great creative people," the best dialogue on the air has more than once been made a travesty through frail reading. The right words, designed for and coming out as a real Italian immigrant, or a real Hindu, Mexican or South American would say them, are another thing. In that, Naish excels.

Back to Gus and Gaby

Young actors who would like nothing better than to portray character roles in the Naish manner can justifiably reason that the distinguished veteran has a few years and a few experiences behind him that lend immeasurably to innate ability. The number of years can be judged by the knowledge that Naish first ap-

peared with Gus Edwards's famous kiddie troupe; worked as part of a song-and-dance act abroad during the first World War (when he was enlisted in the American Flying Service); and made his theater debut in the late, famous Gaby Deslys "Madame Frou Frou" company. Experience like that you can't catch up on.

Then began the foreign tours. When Naish came back to America, he knew four languages and more than thirty dialects. In New York, the Irish-Catholic-born Joseph Patrick Carrol Naish persuaded a Yiddish theater group he was of Jewish parentage and joined them in order to learn their dramatic techniques.

He arrived in Hollywood by way of a Shanghai-bound oil tanker which encountered engine trouble and put back to San Diego with her crew and passenger Naish, who wandered up the coast to become a movie extra. However, he approximated a contact with the wondrous Oriental city when a film player engaged to play the Eastern Prince in "The Shanghai Gesture" fell ill and Naish stepped into the role. Stock, vaudeville and various road engagements followed, and finally the actor returned to the land of back-yard orange trees and an important film role as another Oriental in "The Hatchet Man." This satisfying old thriller, incidentally,

was recently reissued in Los Angeles theaters.

Distinguished Awards

Since that time, Naish played roles as characters and heavies of every nationality have given him ample opportunity to exercise his command of languages and dialects. He carried off the Loyola Award in 1944, the "Oscar" of the Foreign Correspondents of the World for the finest character acting of the year in 1945, and the Irish Catholic World Award as the best actor of the year in 1947.

Conversely, people meeting Naish—whether they see him at home busy with hobbies, in full regalia on some movie lot, or seated in the CBS auditorium between "Luigi" rehearsals—find him as un-actorish in person as he is actorish before camera or mike. He is charming, full of humor, and by the most demanding of standards, a handsome man. He loves talking about radio, and will hold forth on "Luigi," one of his favorite of favorite roles, by the hour. While he is delightfully articulate and loaded with both humorous and classical references concerning any subject about which he knows, he is also completely naive on some subjects most radio folk accept as common knowledge. Exemplary of his forthright innocence was his recent meeting with a Wrigley Company bigwig visiting our Coast at the time that company took over sponsorship of "Life With Luigi." The show's producer, writer and stars took the visitor to the Brown Derby and poured on the number-one treatment. Naish, whose grip on "Luigi" and all he represents is so wonderfully complete, harbors no knowledge of what goes on behind the microphone into which "Luigi" delivers. He listened to the talking group, and finally leaned toward the sponsor representative. "What is your job for Mr. Wrigley?" was his interested question.

Naish on Video

Naish's eyes light up at any mention of television. He regards it as a challenge to actors. "The camera puts every viewer in a front-row seat. Portrayals have to be as complete as for the stage, but modified for purposes of photography. That is something all television actors have to learn." His own eagerness to try the medium is qualified by a "but not just yet."

"While a knowledge of radio seems to me the least essential characteristic for a television actor, I am grateful for all that I have learned from radio... the projection, and learning to sustain a role on mike without the freedom that broad acting allows."

As always at the mention of radio, Naish returns to mention of the writ-

mont (where he did his show) one day walked beautiful Rita Hayworth, and, to be quaint, Bill calls this the turning point of his career. Miss Hayworth, in the city with former husband Orson Welles, was filming "Lady From Shanghai." Asked she of Bill, "Would you like to be in the movie? Good... there's an available part of a policeman in Chinatown." Contradicted Bill, "But there are no policemen in Chinatown." Quipped back Rita, "With Orson Welles, there are policemen in Chinatown!" So Bill became one of which there are none (except when Welles is around) and merely walked through the scenes. After this came another "silent" role in "Walk a Crooked Mile." About then, Henry Morgan in "So This Is New York" hit San Francisco theaters and Bill got the film as a short-time sponsor. His panned comments on the flicker helped it run for eight weeks... and the producers (Stanley Kramer for one) said nice things to Bill, adding they wouldn't forget him. They didn't, either, for when "Champion" came along (also produced by these men) Bill was the fight announcer.

Since he's been in Hollywood, Baldwin has been making "The Iron Cage," in which he portrays a bail bondsman. (Realistically, when they were shooting the film at a local jail, one "character" took Bill for the real McCoy and actually tried to do business with him.) He's also the comedian-announcer (type casting) in Paramount's "My Blue Heaven" opus.

When the Baldwins left their home in "pneumonia gulch" (Twin Peaks district) and came southward, they moved, sight unseen, into a San Fernando Valley home that Buddy Cole had found for them. Buddy lives just across the road and has a swimming pool, so the Baldwins have no future building plans.

Pride of the Baldwins are the two children, Billy, five and a half, and Pammy, three and a half. Both model "brother and sister" swimming suits for Gantner. Billy has also been to college... he was the Drum Major for the University of San Francisco. And was he cute? Just ask his dad!

we like the backdrop of silence broken gently by soft music and low voices. Sometimes we resort to a record player but even a twelve-record changer eventually requires our attention. Therefore, we have been delighted of late with the discovery of a radio program designed for this singular need of ours. Its name is "Leisure Time," and it is frankly announced as a program to which you need not consciously listen. Its announcer, Bill Harpel—who fills his role well with no objectionable attempt to inflict his personality into the listener's quiet mood—presents the program with the words: "Here is a program prepared especially for you—fashioned for relaxation, for meditation, and as a pleasant accompaniment for reading or for conversation with your friends. . . ." The show's restful theme is "When Day Is Done."

Its fare is music in a popular-standard, light classical and light-operative vein, as waxed by artists expert in this musical scope. Their recorded performances are close enough to perfection not to pierce your thoughts in a jarring fashion, and if you do find yourself free really to listen, the menu of song presented is well worth the hearing.

So, if you're of a mind to spend a mid-evening hour in quiet contemplation, or with a good book or good friends, with a backdrop of sweet music to set the mood, fix your dial at KMPC, any Tuesday through Sunday, 10:00 p.m.

"Nona From Nowhere"

The new soap-opera heroine, "Nona," KNY, 1:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, absolutely doesn't want a screen test. The famous producer "Vincent" keeps insisting that she take one, but "Nona" says that it's the last thing in the world she wants. Feeling this way, she naturally comes to Hollywood to work in a movie studio. The reason "Vincent" wants her to take one is that he is in love with her. The reason "Nona" won't take the test is that she loves "Vincent." See?

Actually "Nona" doesn't want to break up the impending marriage between a famous screen star and "Vincent." All this has happened within one week of the initial broadcast, so you can see that things aren't standing still. "Vincent," the producer, incidentally, has an English accent. The only man in Hollywood at present who answers this description is Alfred Hitchcock. We imagine he'd be extremely entertained at hearing these escapades.

These fairy tales for grown-up women are fascinating from several standpoints. Anyone interested in mass psychology would be pleased to note in his case histories that the commercial following "Nona from Nowhere" starts, "Ladies, does your husband come home with grimy, rough hands. . . . ?"

The audience was with him before he sang a note; by the time he hit the variations on the second chorus, we (along with everyone else) were laughing with pleasure and joy. 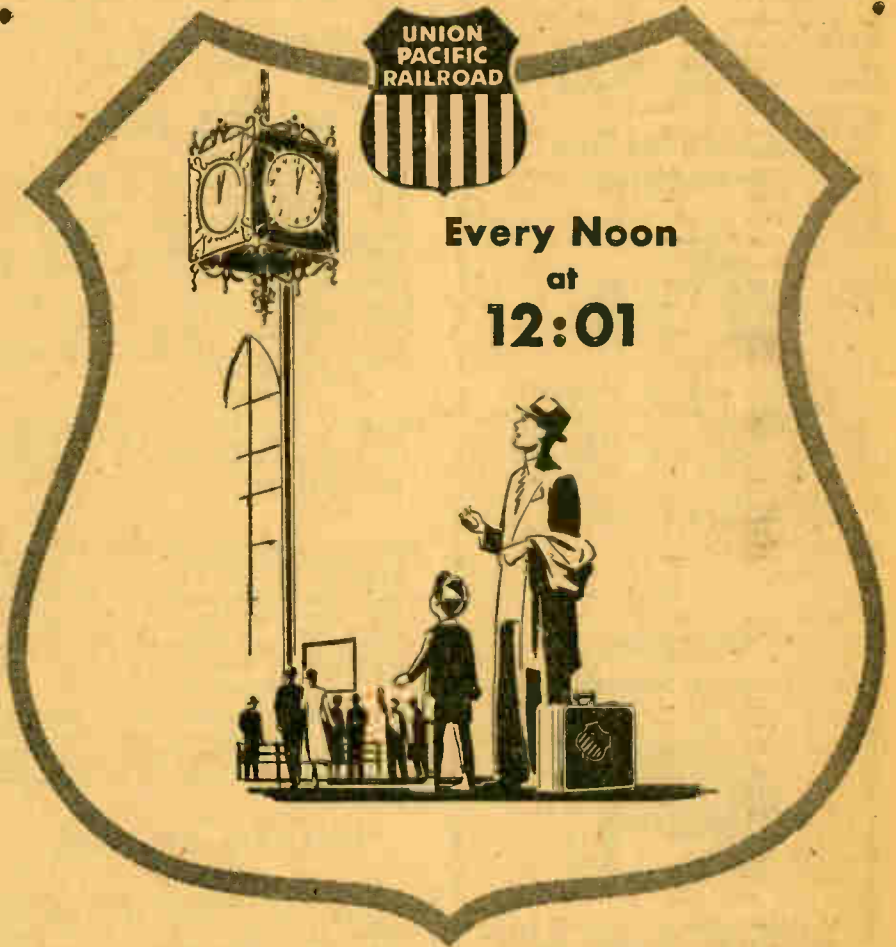

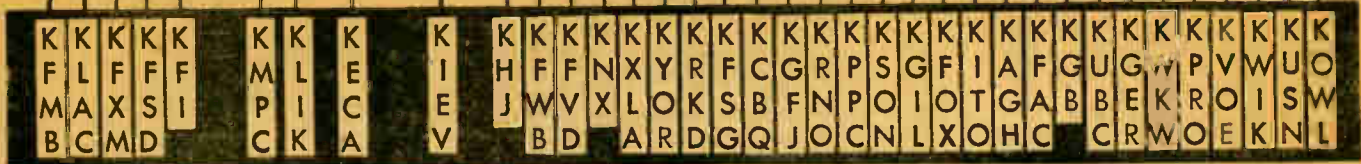

RECORD Notes to You

By ANDY MANSFIELD

With a very definite trend toward rhythm, this week's recordings start with the **STARLIGHTERS'** (Capitol) driving, bang-up waxing of "Rag-Mop," with great backing by Paul Weston. Tune is built around a familiar orchestral riff and harmony that builds in volume and arrangement to a great climax and the Record of the Week. On the calmer side, the velvet voice of **EDDY HOWARD** (Mercury) and his smooth music make a welcome appearance on a ten-inch LP Microgroove pressing of eight of the maestro's hits that include "To Each His Own," "Ricketty Rickshaw Man," "My Blue Heaven," "Paradise," "What'll I Do?" and others. . . . **TOMMY DORSEY** (RCA-Victor) should have another fine instrumental hit in "Puddle Wump," strictly for dancing with plenty of beat and nice trumpet work by C. Shavers. Reverse "Nice to Know You Care" is in the old Dorsey vernacular, with its slower beat, Tommy's solo horn and pleasing vocal by Johnny Amoroso. . . . **BING CROSBY** (Decca) with Vic Schoen's orchestra likewise is on a rhythm kick with "Chattanooga Shoe-Shine Boy," which comes equipped with Crosby patter and shoe-cloth rhythm. "Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo" on the flip seemed a little laggy, but "Shoe-Shine" more than pays off in rhythm plus. . . . **BENNY CARTER ORCH.** (Brunswick) reappears from the good old days of swing with a great pair of strictly instrumentals—"Night Hop" and "O. K. for Baby." This disc is one of the best examples of the Carter mode we've ever heard; fine ensembles and steady beat without blasting the ears. . . . **VAUGHN MONROE** (RCA-Victor) has an unusual tune in "Bamboo" with strong jungle drums and better-than-average vocal. You'll have to hear it more than once to like it, but that jungle beat could make it another "Riders." . . . **HARRY JAMES** (Columbia) shows some mighty good horn-work on "Truly"—a slow but lovely melody and the jump "Don'cha Go 'Way Mad"—both with vocals by the Skylarks, but not over-arranged and designed for dancing. . . . **JERRY GRAY ORCH.** (Decca), nudging closer than ever to Glenn Miller's instrumental style with "By the Waters of Minnetonka" and the maestro's own "Crew Cut," a tune that is very reminiscent of "String of Pearls" in both style and arrangement. . . . (P. S.: Perhaps the above discs are indicative of bigger and better things to come, with emphasis on rhythm and soft pedal on the over-arranged productions prevalent last year. A welcome change, eh?—A.M.)

On February 2 a great big surprise show, seen live here and on kinnie in the East, is to appear on KECA-TV.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

Kay Kyser's College

When we first heard that the "Old Professor," Kay Kyser, with his College aggregation was to replace "Kraft Television Theater" each Wednesday night at 8:00 on KNBH, our reaction wasn't pretty. That, however, was *before* we attended class.

For a decade we have been devotees of the "yess dance, chillun!" on radio. Video makes it an even 100 per cent better. Kay's personality is greatly enhanced by the visual, and his good humor is doubly infectious.

Format of the show remains practically the same, as do most of the faculty. The "Prof" and his corn-pone accent lead off; Ben Grauer is "Dean of Public Speaking," and Carl Hoff and his orchestra make with the tunes and musical clues. The Honey Dreamers, a group of really good young singers among groups of this sort of thing,

lend to the show; and Ish Kabibble has found another medium to mangle delightfully.

First pupil up tried to match sound effects against musical forecasts. For instance, "Singing in the Rain" and the sound man's tattoo-of-rain-drops effect matched. Yes or no? For ridiculousness, "The Breeze and I" was paired with a gale of typhoon proportions.

The show's inevitable success can't be laid to any one factor. Kyser himself contributes greatly, as do his cast. The pace of the show is great. No lagging between contestants. The "Prof" keeps them moving along at assembly-line speed, and no viewer's attention has a chance to stray. The camera work was exemplary. More cameramen, both Eastern and Western, should realize, as do Kyser's crew, that a magazine full of straight face shots would be pretty dull. The angle shots the normal eye enjoys are marvelous when utilized for video.

The choice of contestants was given a good deal of attention. Not only were they personable, but most of them lacked completely the deadly self-consciousness that tends to reduce both emcee and audience to yawning mightily.

One Southern belle's witless answers to Kyser must have supplied any watching teams of comedy writers with unlimited material. She added so greatly to the show that if that young lady were of a mind to, she should encounter no difficulty in finding a niche in life as a television-show "regular."

While we will miss "Kraft" during its absence, we will take care not to miss seeing the "Old Professor" and his gang each Wednesday night.

"Assignment Hollywood"

This happy Saturday afternoon video fare is a movie fan's "meat." Presented in the setting of a make-believe Hollywood magazine office, pretty and personable Gloria Grant smiles winningly at her viewers and delivers in an able manner an enthusiastic report on her personal coverage of the Hollywood scene—party goings-on, twosomes seen at eating spots, frag-

ments of exchanged conversation.

In addition, come the middle of the program, the door to Gloria's "office" opens and a real live "moom pitcher" personality walks in. These have included Roddy McDowall, Cathy Downs, Gene Reynolds, Barbara Whiting, Jane Nigh. Their appearances have been informal and informative, with quickie interviews being conducted by a couple of visiting teen-age high-school and college reporters aided and abetted by the more experienced, but just about as young, Gloria.

tle and there will be a continual flow as there has been in radio," is how he put it.

He added that for the time being kinescope and film will be the transmission media. Later the coaxial cable will come into its own, "although cost will be an important factor." (That last says nothing at all, but then all the remarks pertaining to the cable are the vaguest sort of generalities . . . all of them we have heard, at any rate, have been the same tired oil about how great, but how expensive, the cable will be.) "Quality of the kine is improving, and soon we may be carrying the recordings on our eastern skein. Like any other medium, tele will have to go where the talent is, and that bulges big in Hollywood's favor."

Mr. Trammell is reported to have admitted that his trip here was partly to talk to the NBC stars ("The McGees," Bob Hope, Ralph Edwards, Dennis Day, Judy Canova, Eddie Cantor, Phil Harris and Art Linkletter) about making the teevee plunge.

Mr. Trammell added some radio prognostications to his video comment by citing that he believes radio has a good many useful years left. He also cited that radio families have increased by 5,000,000 in the past three years, and that this year there will be 11,000,000 sets sold.

We saw no quotes any place from the chairman of the NBC board about television's growth. Nor did he mention that people (probably some of the 5,000,000 buyers of radio he mentioned) often have both radio and television sets in their homes, and may have bought both. At any rate, we are glad we got our bets re video, its expansion and improvement, down early; and gladder still to hear about activity designed to get some of our NBC favorites before the image orthicons.

Robert Montgomery, noted screen actor, director and producer who will produce, narrate and act in the new one-hour dramatic show to be sponsored on NBC television by the American Tobacco Company, has joined the NBC television network as executive producer, it has been announced by Pat Weaver, v.p. in charge of television.

Title of the series will be "Robert Montgomery Presents Your Lucky Strike Theatre." It will be a bi-weekly presentation, featuring Montgomery and other film and stage stars in the leading roles of stories made famous by the movies. The date that the series will be seen on this Coast has not been announced.

Salesman, Manager and Executive SELL Religion

HAVE you ever had a wishful dream turn into a miracle of reality? Well, that's what happened when a salesman, a bakery personnel manager, and a public-utility executive were contrasting the offerings and the potentialities of radio religious broadcasting. They dreamed of a religious program which would serve Southern California much as other types of broadcasts do, one which the average listener could turn to with interest. Through hard work they have turned their dream into reality.

After two years of unbroken Saturday night broadcasts, the Warrar Bros. station KFWB still boasts the original "Layman's Hour." It is still a program devoted to the best in choral singing and brings a gospel message to people of all faiths. The broadcast is sponsored by the Baptist Men's Council of Southern California and is endorsed and approved by the Northern Baptist Convention. Although the sponsorship is by a Christian group, the program is non-sectarian in its appeal. Perhaps the conclusion of each broadcast is one of the chief reasons for the program's success when announcer Robert Brink asks each listener to attend the church of his choice, adding "If you have no particular preference, you are invited to attend the friendly Baptist Church."

The originators, Waldo Tucker, Roy Madsen, and Gilbert Brink, seldom absent themselves from their vocal responsibility in the chorus, the personnel of which comes from varied walks of life. A policeman, a mailman, salesmen, teachers, students, radio artists all blend their voices in the songs, spirituals, and old-fashioned hymns to give warmth and quality to twenty of the thirty minutes of the program. The vocal group, hailed as one of the finest of its type in the nation, is composed of top-flight musicians. Six actually direct their own choirs, some are soloists in their home churches, one is a well-known arranger and composer, while several are members of quartets and choral groups on network broadcasts. The instrumentalists, Ruth Flatley and Paul Michelson, are organists in two of the largest Southland churches. As for the narrator and announcer, Robert Brink, who incidentally is not related to Gilbert Brink, he has been awarded first place in the Metropolitan Auditions. The choral director is James Burt, instructor of music at Dorsey High School in Los Angeles.

Less than three months after its inception, the "Layman's Hour" received national recognition by the University of Chicago Radio Workshop for its content and format. The Watchman Examiner minutes of the Northern Baptist Convention in San Francisco has also hailed the program in the following terms: "It is

of high quality, packed with the gospel message, and full of harmonious and stirring singing." Extravagant praise to be sure, but none the less deserved.

Today the "Layman's Hour" is heard on many stations all over the country. The choral group receives so many requests for public appearances it is impossible to fill all engagements. The choir has traveled to San Francisco and over most of Southern California. Letters have been received from West Virginia and Idaho, from Arizona north to the Canadian border, from a traveling salesman driving across the great American desert, from a shepherd tending his flock in the high Sierras, all commending the message of the speaker, Dr. Frank M. Kepner. Dr. Kepner is Executive Secretary of the Southern California Baptist Convention. He is a comparatively young man yet has a background of many years' pastoral experience. He has an exceptionally pleasing voice and a talent for brevity. Indeed, Dr. Kepner often appears capable of "saying volumes in a few words," to quote one listener. In his executive capacity, he oversees 225 churches and coordinates the activities of a large staff of church workers. With all of his many duties, Dr. Kepner finds time to fill scores of speaking engagements.

The "Layman's Hour" is looking forward to increasing success. Its audience is growing weekly (broadcasts by the Armed Forces radio station have greatly widened its range of listeners), and the originators and participants believe that the program has fulfilled their dream and meets an apparent need in the nation's radio life.

cameras, lights, switching controls, levels, projectors and kinescope. The second and equally important phase is that of maintenance, involving the technical quality of operation, analysis of the condition of the camera, signal, telephone circuit, Mount Wilson transmitter and checking of the projection equipment.

Seven to One

There's no similarity between radio and TV from an engineering-manpower standpoint. Unlike radio, where a lone expert presides over the control-booth panel, one television show requires the services of many engineers. Pierce gives the ratio of seven to one in a comparison of TV and radio engineers required. Three men alone may be concerned with the sound on a television program.

On a remote show there is an average of two hours of camera adjustment, with six or eight men at work. Pierce estimates that 400 man-hours a week are spent on the maintenance phase alone.

Film operation is included in TV engineering as a matter of course.

eral sets; TV recording a live show; a sports-event crew setting up a portable station in Ocean Park to pick up the wrestling matches.

Unique Set-Up

A well coordinated staff makes all this activity possible at the same time. A key engineer is responsible for the operation in each spot. A senior engineer (technical director) is responsible for each show. He sits next to the director of the show, takes cues from him. The show goes through the control-booth panels at the speed of 186,000 miles a second—the speed of light. In order to cut any of this, the engineer must move ahead of the action; he can't be too early or too late.

The ABC set-up is unique in TV. On each sound stage there is a separate control room for sound and pictures. The room overlooks the studio; the front portion contains a complete set of monitors, one for each camera and one to show the picture going out to viewers. There is also a dupe set for the director and his assistants. The rear, upper level of the control room is a closed room within a room and is the province of the audio engineers. As in a radio control booth, there are the mixers, loudspeakers and turntables, and the engineer is concerned with true reproduction and control. He is in direct communication with the mike boom operator in the studio and is generally uninvolved with any of the picture operation.

In master control a supervising engineer is in communication with all phases of operating television, pictures, film room, studio floor, kinescope and actual airing. He is also in communication with the phone company, owner of the cables. He is ready to coordinate any one or all of the program sources the moment a difficulty arises.

The most elaborate shows from an engineering standpoint have been the KECA-TV football remotes. A complete control room was assembled for the press box at the stadium. Twenty-two engineers were used in the operation; twelve engineers and four cameras were on the field.

Though TV has been a commercial medium for but three years, the average experience of the thirty-two top engineers at KECA-TV is five years in either television or allied engineering fields of movies and radar. Some were radio engineers, all are electronic engineers. Camera-men have all had previous experience as news photographers, news-reel cameramen, TV cameramen, or movie-still photographers. Some are also experienced electronic engineers. The audio men are from motion-picture-studio and broadcasting sound departments, mixers and sound recorders.

Off the Ground Floor

Two years ago, few stations could make any claim to experience. The free-for-all, with everyone trying to

Behind the Scenes in Video

Engineers

Supervisor of Operations for KECA-TV, Cameron Pierce, Screened 1600 Applicants to Find the 32 Top Engineers to Staff Television Station

THE BIG PROBLEM in a television operation is not the terrific complexity of any one item, but rather the great number of pieces of equipment that all add together to make the complexity. The trick, if you can call it that, is to think in terms of each unit separately.

The above explanation is that of Cameron G. Pierce, young technical-operations supervisor for KECA-TV. He interviewed the 1600 applicants for the thirty-two engineering posts at ABC's Television Center in Hollywood and seemed the logical person to tap for a simplified explanation of the duties of the TV engineers.

He details the subject by breaking it into two phases. One involves the actual use of all the TV equipment,

KECA-TV has ten projectors showing video recordings, slides, time signals, titles and movie films that the viewer sees. In addition to the film operation there is also the TV recording plant which takes motion pictures of local live shows for Eastern viewing.

Pierce admits that he feels like the player of a huge chess game when it comes to placing the right engineers and specialists on the right jobs at the right time. Some nights, all phases of the engineering operation are going. Pierce will have a man at Mount Wilson controlling the pictures and sound; two men on separate radio relay equipment, one unit receiving pictures from other than studio points; two crews running three-camera live shows using sev-

Mikeman Spends Off-Mike Time Narrating Previews, Teaching College Students the Know-how of Radio, And Heading a Business of Diathermy Correction

LET'S make the daily rounds with Art Gilmore—if you have the stamina, that is. So set the alarm clock for a ridiculous morning chiming, for there is a lot of work to do.

You'll really get a chance to see the film stars without their make-up on this tour with Art. For just as the sun is winning a photo finish from the moon, our entrepreneur is entering a movie lot. It's here that he serves as the voice behind those "Previews of Coming Attractions" that tease you to visit the neighborhood cinema for next week's "super," superb, sensational picture — "freshly wrapped so that it . . ." No, Arthur, that comes later in the day with the radio commercial, remember?

Teacher, Too

From the land of glare and glitter, sports shirts and slacks, don the academic frock and speed to the University of Southern California campus, where Art has a date with his radio announcing class. He's been teaching at the Trojan institution for more than three years and his pupils swear by him. So many students attempt to enroll in the class that it has become necessary to audition all the hopefuls to keep the size of the group within teaching distance. A microphone is actually a magnet and its radiations have no bounds, extending to those who have no talent at all for the field. Hence the auditions. . . . "It's better to tell the kids straight," says Art. "A pulled punch is apt to mean a misguided career.

"To qualify for a career in radio—especially in Hollywood—you have to

be ready to meet the stiffest kind of competition. That's why we trim the class in order to concentrate on those students who show the most aptness for radio work." Incidentally, Gilmore places a lot of faith in the textbook he uses in teaching the course. He ought to—he co-authored it along with producer "Doc" Middleton! The text is also utilized by many other leading universities throughout the country.

Hence the Gilmore organization adjusts these machines so as to prevent any interference. Then, too, they'll build your TV set into your wall, convert your ten-inch screen into the larger sixteen-inch model, or fix the plumbing if need be.

Now it's time to jump to the Mutual-Don Lee studios for the "Red Ryder" show. Art's been selling Langendorf bread with this Western every Tuesday and Thursday for so long that the show just wouldn't seem right without him. And as for that

Juilliard Graduate School. While there Lampkin met Victor Seroff, eminent pianist, coach and biographer of Shostakovich. With Seroff he studied piano, also on a scholarship, until 1945, when he left New York as Music Director of a U. S. O. hospital unit.

Since then Charles Lampkin's life and experiences have been wide and most interesting. He has been assistant director of radio production for schools; director of music in the drama department of Western Reserve University in Cleveland (first of his race to hold such a position in a Midwestern university); he was assistant director of coordinating music and drama at Union Settlement House in New York City, third largest institution of its kind in the United States; and constantly on call for the American Theater wing. Lampkin traveled more than 30,000 miles with the U.S.O. hospital unit.

As a lecture-recitalist, Lampkin utilized the piano and his voice in both singing and reading poetry set to music by himself in unfolding the moving story of his people and their contributions to the eternal heritage

THE FIRST few times Leopold Stokowski was seen ducking into a Greenwich Village basement to dig some of the jazz so indigenous to these small, smoky bistros, or the first time Jose Iturbi cut loose a la boogie on the piano, great cries of surprise went up from the American public who completely divorce jazz and the "classics."

Yet, few real musicians themselves go along with this popular categorizing of only the symphonic, operatic or traditional as the "classics."

Exemplary of this musicianly school of thought is Charles Lampkin, pianist and musical dramatist recently seen on KNBH's "Rehearsal Time." Lampkin, who can tear off "Little Rock Getaway" in a fashion that would have delighted the late Bob Zurke himself, is on equal terms with the works of Chopin, Shostakovich and the rest of the standard renowned.

Lived the Background

The nationally known pianist, composer, lecturer and authority on folk lore was born in Alabama. His great grandmother, a former slave, befriended the great educator Booker

T. Washington and aided him in founding Tuskegee Institute. From her, Charles Lampkin learned much of the authentic history and legends which make up our great American Negro folk music. Years later Lampkin wove this knowledge into a series of moving lecture-recitals on the saga of his people.

His boyhood was spent in Cleveland, Ohio, where Charles attended the public school, John Carroll University, and the Cleveland Institute of Music.

In 1942 he went to New York, where he was awarded a scholarship in composition by Bernard Wagenaar himself. Wagenaar is head of the Department of Composition in the

of folk lore which is America's. He has performed his "From the Bosom of the Congo" in dozens of colleges about the country. This series won him many recognitions for having done much toward promoting racial understanding through an artistic program.

Priceless Schooling Off Campus

All during the years that the performer who started as a grammar-school "Lohengrin" was studying in studios and classrooms, he was augmenting his abilities by sessions spent watching and accompanying the greats of another school. IT GOES without saying that when it comes to building one's own home, problems pile upon problems until the prospective home owner feels that any minute he will be dragged away in a butterfly net and garbed in a strait jacket.

That comes with normal planning of a home. What Mary and Harry Hickox had to contend with shouldn't happen to a four-legged animal commonly referred to as "man's best friend."

KFI's "two busy people"—(their

They owned a lot where, some day, they were going to build. The thought was nice and cozy but still in the distant future.

specifications, they needed that lot.

So, they rushed up to their hill-top lot and, after much persuasion, talked the owner into selling his uncompleted house. At which point, problems began for the Hickoxes. They had two lots with a partially built home on one consisting of a bedroom, living room, kitchen and bath built on the side of a hill which makes the back yard fifteen feet lower than the front.

Adding the second lot made their property pie-shaped, with 120 feet facing on the street and extending 100 feet down the side of the mountain where it narrows to forty-eight feet. The architectural problems are many with a normal, flat lot, but on their terrain the Hickoxes knew it would take considerable figuring to arrive at a satisfactory floor plan.

There elapsed much time spent in conferring with architects and build-

ers and drawing their own plans while sprawled out on the living-room floor of their apartment. There was a time, too, when Mary and Harry wondered if it was all worth it. Plan after plan was discarded until, finally, they hit upon the idea which they carried through to completion, but only after many heart-aches and doubts as to whether they ever would finish their hilltop home.

To utilize the four-room house partially built by the former owner, the Hickoxes decided it would be a guest apartment and then built their own home on top of it!

Rooms With Views

The result is a unique two-level home, done in modern redwood style, and with an unsurpassed view of the surrounding Hollywood foothills. In addition to the guest apartment, the Hickoxes have a beautiful living room which faces onto a sun deck,

giving them a view of an entire mountain range from their comfortable chairs in front of the living-room fireplace. They have a tastefully appointed bedroom, a den which they refer to as their "script room," a dining room, and a spacious kitchen and breakfast nook where, again, they have a beautiful view of the surrounding hills.

Harry points to the calluses on his hands with pride because, like the typical home owner, he has done considerable work on the home himself. He tried his hand at papering and, by adopting the trial-and-error formula, came off with a good job. He built a combination television, radio and recording cabinet which is their pride and joy and a distinct asset to the living room.

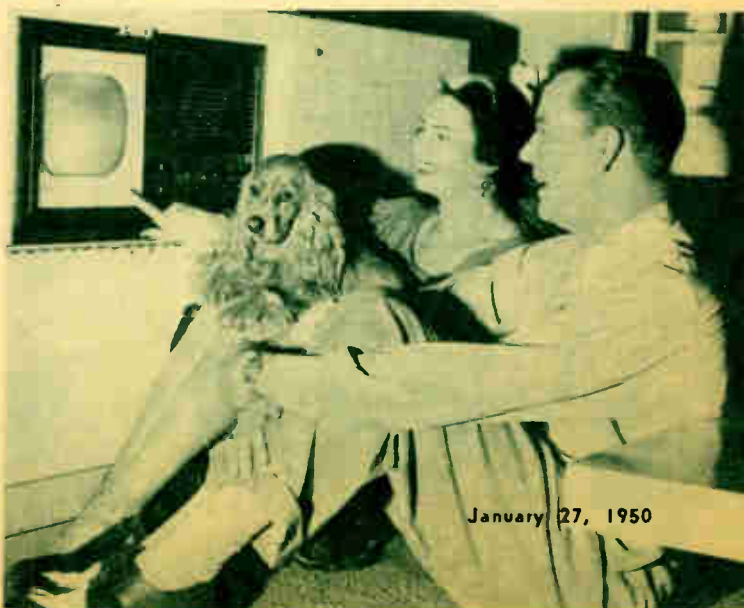

get in on the ground floor, has since been organized, and inexperienced people don't stand much of a chance cracking the engineering field. Those who are ambitious to try, according to Pierce, are advised to go to college and take a four-year course or more in electrical engineering with the emphasis on electronics. It means an opportunity to work directly with the TV engineers if it's a good school. A knowledge of broadcasting will give the student the experience of working under pressure and against time as contrasted with the research emphasized in education.

Cameron Pierce has a brilliant record in electronics. He was a top engineer with G.E. for seven years and worked on several radar developments for the company. He designed the first radar set used by American troops on the Normandy beachhead. He taught TV engineering at UCLA extension for four years while also serving as L. A. representative for the TV Broadcasting Equipment department of G.E. During his graduate course in electronic engineering at Stanford, he worked on building the famous cyclotron atom smasher, one of the first in the U. S.

He is ABC's charter employee on the site of Television Center. For ten months he spent a lone construction watch on the twenty-three-acre lot and more than anyone else in Hollywood has seen a TV empire arise out of an abandoned movie lot.

man Hawkins are but a few among his illustrious friends and off-campus instructors.

Lampkin moved to the West Coast and then into television by means of the big Packard-Bell Talent Hunt staged more than a year ago. Oboler saw him perform and solicited Charles to work musically on Oboler's forthcoming picture, the footage of which was shot in Africa.
