Success Formula for the Brilliant Writing Team, Lawrence and Lee, Is Based on an Old Maxim Reiterated by Jerry Lawrence's Father:

1 + 1 = 3

week! Eight radio programs scripted by Lawrence and Lee. By May 1942, Variety had come out with a headline, "Lawrence and Lee Take Over Radio."

Bob and Jerry helped organize Armed Forces Radio Service. All the first AFRS programs were written by Lawrence and Lee; so were the official Army-Navy shows for D Day, V-E Day and V-J Day.

Their postwar collaborations have included "The Railroad Hour," "Hallmark Playhouse," "Favorite Story," and many, many more. As Bob tongue-in-cheeked, "We've been unhappy on almost all the shows in Hollywood." They wrote the Broadway play, "Look Ma, I'm Dancin'"; and now with a Ziv series, "The Unexpected," the duo has invaded television. On film, the TV shows feature names like Hans Conried, Jeanne Cagney, Craig Stevens and Billy Halop. Radio's "Railroad Hour," however, is one of their favorite assignments . . . they call it their "dream show."

"When you have a collaborator, it's wonderful," Jerry and Bob are agreed. They never write together but they adhere to their primary objective: Tell a story. Secondary aim is "death to cliches!"

"Communication is the essence," Bob Lee explained earnestly. He and Jerry sincerely want to reach people. "Every bus boy in Melody Lane has material for two novels in him if he could pick out the most dramatic things," Bob continued. Lawrence and Lee further agree that at present there is a great hunger for music, for the beautiful things in life. To them, writing is a religious experience. They are not so presumptuous as to believe they have "a mission," but honestly and humbly feel they are a medium to uncover the genuine and bring it to their audiences. "It must reach people," they insist,

"otherwise it is like an utterance in an empty room."

Lawrence and Lee's collaboration involves never revealing who has done which script. Often one has directed a show scripted by the other. They bat ideas about in the creative stage, but each goes his own way to write. In the critical aspect of their teamwork their complementary qualities are brought into full play. Jerry, asked to pass judgment on a Lee script, speaks freely; and if Bob does not go along with something his partner has written, he will argue out the point. "But I have so much respect for Jerry's opinion that if he feels violent about a point, I begin to doubt," Lee admitted while Lawrence nodded agreement.

"Many's the time we would have gone on the rocks," testified Bob, "without Jerry's sense of humor."

"Bob's got a fine sense of humor, too," insisted Jerry, "but by far his greatest contribution to our collaboration is his ability of total recall."

"We don't have time to fight," Lawrence and Lee answered to the question "How do you get along?" Jerry, a bachelor, lives in Malibu; Bob, married to Janet Waldo (radio's "Corliss Archer"), lives in Sherman Oaks. A long-time believer in early-morning writing, Jerry only recently converted Bob to this procedure. They now like to start at 6:00 a.m. "In a jam at 4:30," they admitted.

"At 2:00 p.m. we put on our ties and come into Hollywood as businessmen," Jerry continued. They devote the remainder of the afternoon to discussing their arrangements with studios and programs and to conferring on their TV activities. Backbone of their public relations is a telephone answering system, for seldom are they to be found in their offices in the Equitable Building.

Actually, their getting together in person is and always has been a much more difficult feat than their writing collaboration. They were both born in Northern Ohio—a few months and miles apart. Both attended central Ohio universities; Lawrence, Ohio State, Lee, Ohio Wesleyan. Both worked at the same radio stations at different times: WOSU in Columbus and KMPC in Beverly Hills. Today they live some twenty miles apart. Nowadays people who really know where to find Lawrence and Lee will tip you that the pair collaborate in the steam room at the Hollywood Athletic Club.

THE SUCCESSFUL writing partnership of the brilliant young team, Jerry Lawrence and Bob Lee, is based on the idea that one plus one equals three. Jerry Lawrence explained it like this: "Your idea, my idea . . . I give you mine, you give me yours, and we each have two ideas."

This formula has worked miraculously for Lawrence and Lee, who celebrated their tenth anniversary of collaboration on January 10, 1952.

For years before they met, Jerry Lawrence had been told, "You've gotta meet Bob Lee." Bob had been told "You've gotta meet Jerry Lawrence." Their near-epochal introduction finally happened in Colby's, described as "The New York Brittingham's." Practically the instant they spotted each other, they began plotting a collaboration. Bob still went on as a "March of Time" producer; Jerry continued with CBS and his movie writing; but Lawrence and Lee as a team decided to write and submit scripts, as many as possible and immediately. Soon "Columbia Workshop" received one; Kate Smith, one; "Manhattan at Midnight," "Stars Over Hollywood," "Lincoln Highway" and three other programs each received a Lawrence and Lee original.

They all hit the airwaves the same

Something New in Radio

TOM CORBETT," who usually is rocketing off to such unearthly places as Mars, Venus and sundry unexplored asteroids in his super-souped jet, just this year took to a medium that in the "Space Cadet" manual must have been referred to only as a bit of history. The space cadets came to radio.

For two years the exciting science-fiction feature based on a solid foundation of romantic adventure and education in science brought television audiences nation-wide the exploits of "Tom Corbett" and his buddies, "Astro and Roger Manning."

The space cadets bridge the void of outer space in the year 2352 A.D., in the television, by manning the rocket cruisers and braving the fearsome dangers of cosmic infinity.

Understandably this made great television fare. The Kellogg Company supplied the rocket cruisers, actors, scripts and interiors for this TV adventure series through the simple expedient of picking up the check that paid for the presentation.

It was probably an extensive compilation of box tops received or fan letters piled up in the halls that prompted the same company to introduce a twice-weekly radio counterpart of "Space Cadet." It was, appropriately enough, on the first day of this new year that Frankie Thomas debuted in his air role as "Tom Corbett." He has long been recognized as the television leader of the group

of stalwarts who have been so heartily accepted by the moppet crowd.

Now even the parents in non-TV-owning homes will be plagued by questions as to what would really happen if the law of gravity were suddenly suspended. Or by questions more important to both small listeners and the Kellogg Company, such

as: "How can I get a 'Space Cadet' flashlight, daddy?"

Such is the power of a 1952 medium. Think what it will be when 2352 actually rolls around and the youthful viewers and listeners have a crack at the whole universe from which to choose box-top premiums or buy with cold cash from "daddy's" pocket!

Murray Loves Red

THERE'S NO doubt about it in my mind: Red Skelton is the greatest comic on TV today."

No, it wasn't Red's press agent talking, or even a personal friend of the hilarious Redhead.

It was Ken Murray. The former head of the famed "Blackouts" show sat leisurely behind the large oak desk in his office, located on the fortieth floor of 515 Madison Avenue in mid-Manhattan. "Hollywood's Ambassador to New York" took a quick glance at the panoramic scene below, fondled his large, unlit cigar, and in all seriousness repeated his statement.

Never Met

"Look it. I'm not picking on Red to get anything out of it. Frankly, I've never met the guy. But I've seen them all. Berle and Caesar and lots of others are good, plenty good. But look out for this Skelton. This is the greatest. He's got jokes, and routines, and those falls—they're terrific. This is the way Chaplin started."

This was a strange thing for one comedian to be saying about a competitor—and on a different network, no less. After all, show business is like any other business—the individual himself is the product and he's got to sell that product.

In the office at the time of the interview were Anita Gordon and Art Lund, regular vocalists on Ken's CBS-TV show; comedienne Laurie Anders (who really has a lovely smile); and also a slightly nervous CBS press agent.

Murray continued: "I've been in

this racket since I was a kid. I've headlined at the Old Palace Theater. I've starred on Broadway and in motion pictures and on the radio. And my 'Blackouts' show at the El Capitan in Hollywood sold out for seven straight years, the longest-playing production in the legitimate theater.

"But I've never really been number-one man in show business. This has never bothered me. Right now I'm content that my TV show is ranked as one of the top ten in the nation. When I say that Red Skelton is the greatest comic on TV today, I'm expressing an honest emotion. The only thing I ask is that they don't ever put him on the same night and same time that I'm on."

Good Business

Murray hesitated for a moment. "Come to think of it, it's not even bad business. I plug Red; Red plugs me. And Red's got a higher rating than I have. So I come out ahead on the deal." (A sudden smile flashed across the face of the CBS man.)

Asked if he really smoked any of the cigars he is always carrying, Ken said. "Very, very seldom. I used to smoke, but not any more. Not for any particular reason, I just quit one day, and have never taken up the habit again. I just chew on three or four a day to keep me occupied."

We remarked that Skelton has the same habit, only he uses up from twelve to fifteen a day.

"See that," Ken replied, smiling. "The guy even beats me in the cigar department."

IN CASE you've ever doubted it, Peter Potter, disc jockey who has successfully kept one foot in radio and the other in television, does not lose his slow drawl or his easy friendliness when he is off camera.

If you have ever turned the lights down low and tossed out the window any thoughts you might have about getting to bed early, and watched Peter's night-owl platter party, you know he was a natural to do "Search for a Song." On his TV "Search for a Song" he attempts to give every man, woman and child who has written a song the chance to present it to the viewers and, what's more, to a group of music publishers who are guesting on the telecast. Twice a week he invites three unknown song writers, with their own accompanist, to the show.

Boost Up the Ladder

From what he said we have an idea Peter has always been trying to help the underdog, the undiscovered talent. When asked why he created "Search for a Song," the platter spinner said, "I discovered a long time ago that the vast majority of talented amateur composers have little or no

opportunity to display their talents . . . and I wanted to give them that chance if I could." Song pluggers, he emphasized, "should realize that presentation is forty per cent of their song."

So far, more than one thousand songs have been introduced on Potter's telecast. And how many of them have made the hit parade? Only thirty-eight have been accepted by music publishers as being worthy of professional publication and public release. Twelve of these tunes were eventually recorded by one of the major record firms such as Victor, Columbia, Decca, etc. as being potential money makers. And only ONE song has risen from the lot to be accepted by the public as an outstanding tune.

Story Behind the Song

There is quite a story behind that ONE tune, "Bermuda." It started at an audition when Pete greeted an unpretentious song writer, Cynthia Strother, of Seal Beach, California,

He listened to the song, all about a sad lover who was lost in Bermuda, and told the young sixteen-year-old composer she had a wonderful tune, "But go home and rework the lyrics . . . they're too sad. Brighten them up." Pete's advice was taken seriously by the shy youngster, whose only reply was, "I'll come back with it."

A few weeks later she did come back and this time with her kid sister, Kay, aged eleven. Cynthia Strother explained her little sister this way: "I brought her along to sing. There are lots more girls at home, but I think this one sings the best." Pete said, "Okay, girls," and they sang on his telecast soon after.

An Immediate Hit

Artie Valando, a song man, was present at the video debut of "Bermuda" and snatched up the song

and the young singing duet on the spot. Within a week after the girls' appearance on "Search for a Song," RCA-Victor rushed a recording of them singing the song, backed by Henri Rene's orchestra, and it was on its way to becoming a hit almost immediately.

Why don't more songs hit the big time? Pete said, "They lack originality . . . and most song writers don't write about things they know anything about. You can't write about a broken heart if your heart has never been broken."


Getting Personal

Peter Potter is almost a native Californian, having first come to Hollywood in 1931, by way of Henrietta, Oklahoma, University of Oklahoma and University of New Mexico. He was all set for a pro baseball career when he switched fields and decided to head for Hollywood and show business. His climb in radio as master of ceremonies and disc jockey

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Benny's New Side-Kick

Jack Benny's plans are gradually emerging from a haze of rumors and shaping up into a TV-radio-next-season deal, with Bob Crosby joining Jack on his TV shows in place of Phil Harris.

Ever since Benny's first crack at the then "new medium," he has thought Bob Crosby was it, and that Crosby's Bob Cats doing the hillbilly routine was the greatest thing in which he, Benny, ever participated. Too, Harris is tied to NBC-TV by a large, lucrative contract, and in addition has not wanted to appear on TV with Jack, a factor that is said to have introduced a disappointed note into the relationship of the two men.

Of course Benny himself hasn't actually said to us, nor to anyone else, "This is what I will do"—so none of it is strictly from the feed box. But anyone wanta bet?

Television Comes to Mexico

Mexico City, with its population of almost three million, was introduced to television when publisher Romulo O'Farril, Jr., put XHTV on the air in the autumn of 1950. Recently Emilio Azcarraga, Mexico's most enterprising showman and owner of the two most important radio stations in that country, put XEW-TV on the air. Azcarraga's outlet has its offices and studios in the sumptuous Televiscentro or television center, architecturally one of the handsomest to be seen anywhere. Some television experts from the United States have been critical of the functional value of the design and the layout.

O'Farril's shows are poorly produced, the movies he shows are even older than those the American public has been subjected to, and the quality of his technical staff is questionable. While Azcarraga has as yet made no real contribution to the improvement of Mexican television, it seems fairly certain that his dynamic personality will sooner or later make itself felt. To what extent this will convert the amateurish techniques of even his own station remains to be seen. XEW-TV is, so far, little better than its senior competitor, XHTV.

There are plenty of Cadillacs to be seen all over Mexico but this is no indication that Mexicans of the upper

classes will buy television sets. They rarely listen to radio because of the unbelievably poor quality of Mexican radio. Except for the bullfights there is little in television to interest them. As a matter of fact, wealthy Mexicans are much more likely to buy television sets because of the ornate or de luxe cabinets that may be available to them than because of the program fare.

There are approximately twenty-five thousand sets in use in Mexico City. The poorer class, and this constitutes the majority, cannot afford to buy sets.

There is plenty of good talent in Mexico. If the Mexican station owners will allow that talent to develop and will make room for the young men with imagination and a desire to do worthwhile things, then Mexican

television will begin to interest the Mexicans. Recently Azcarraga sent eager young men to the United States to study methods and techniques of our best stations.

When Mexican bullfight fans don't like a matador they pick up the nearest available object and throw it at him. Let us hope that they will not react the same way to what they are being given in television, otherwise there will be loud shatterings of glass and earthy Spanish imprecations on the Paseo de la Reforma.

Strike for Us

Deserving people in Southern California will have a greater chance to "Strike It Rich" on the popular CBS-TV program as the result of organization of "The Helping Hand Club of Los Angeles," announced this week.

The club, composed of a local board of judges, will select each week, until further notice, a person most worthy of consideration for a chance to "Strike It Rich." The person selected will be flown by TWA round-trip to New York City to appear on the show with Emcee Warren Hull.

Selection will be based on letters from Southern Californians. These are to be sent to "Strike It Rich," Box 168, Hollywood, Calif. "Strike It Rich" is viewed here on KNXT (Channel 2) at 6 p.m. Wednesdays and at 11:30 a.m. Mondays through Fridays.

Through answering questions asked by Hull, deserving people are able to win as much as \$500 on the program, but win or lose, the program's "Heart Line" telephone calls from across the country constantly result not only in additional money for needy cases, but in fabulous gifts of clothing, furniture or whatever it is the person interviewed has requested.

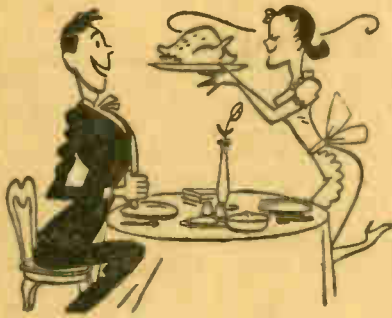
Second Glances (Critical Comment)

That's the sort of thing that often spices up the too-short "Washington Spotlight."—J. P.

A very fine dancer and attractive gentleman named Buddy Ebsen heads this half hour that rewards a few viewers with a ham. This they earn, not by watching (in that event everyone should have one!), but through sending in a joke or gag that Ebsen and his comedian pal, Sam Hearn, enact. If the studio audience laugh, the sender gets that piece of pork. If the audience sits mum, the sender gets a wee bag of corn and \$1 for his troubles.

It seemed to us that the jokes were rather old, that the flagging thread of things funny was faint, and that Mr. Ebsen was not at his dancingest. Sam "Schlepperman" Hearn supplied what was, for us, the fun of the entire show.

But for all that the first of Luer's Monday-nighters proved rather a disappointment to us, it is a matter of presentation, we think, rather than lack of talent. The show is loaded with talent! All the stars and production units have to do is parade that talent at its best, instead of its corny worst, and there will probably emerge an entertaining period that rewards everyone, ham winners or not!—J. First break a small hole at the pointed end of egg, and with a long needle pierce the egg yolk and allow all of the egg to drain from shell. Then rinse the shell and place it somewhere so it can dry. Then fill the egg shell with different flavors of Jello, place them in the refrigerator so that the contents can't spill out. When it's solid, simply break the shell and serve on shredded lettuce or in a nest of whipped cream.

PICK of the PIX

by Aubrey Dahl

Anyone who says good pictures don't appear on television will have to reverse his stand after looking over this week's lineup. And he should make particular note of the first two films commented on below... they're both excellent.

"Open City." When first released a few years ago, this fine film focused international attention on postwar Italy's struggling but effective movie industry, and, more specifically, on the considerable talents of Roberto Rossellini, who has since demonstrated his right to be included in the very front rank of creative screen directors. Done in the realistic style that stamped such subsequent Italian releases as "Shoeshine," "Paisan," and "To Live in Peace," "Open City" depicts in a powerful fashion the lives of the Italian people under the domination of their Nazi allies, and the attempts of some of them to harass and sabotage the Axis war effort. Anna Magnani became a star of magnitude with her emotional performance in this film, and with Aldo Fabrizi lending admirable support in the role of a priest, helps immeasurably to make this picture a moving and exciting experience.

"The Quiet One." Winner of the 1948 Academy Award as the best documentary feature, this comparatively short (one-hour) film deals in a true and sympathetic manner with a mal-adjusted little Negro boy and his problems, which include unconcerned parents, a slum home and the miseries and prejudices attendant upon such an environment. Sent, finally, to a school in the country for wayward youths, the boy receives the guidance and trust of a young instructor, and it is in this friendship that the solution to this child's difficulties, and those of many others like him, is indicated. This remarkable picture, absorbing and fascinating in its study of the little boy and his world, is also highly entertaining and deserving of the audience it will receive on television.

"Hill No. 1." This film about the Death and Resurrection of Christ was made especially for television and was widely shown last Easter season. Its subject, however, is timeless, and the picture will probably be played for many Easters to come. With a cast of Hollywood stalwarts, headed by Ruth Hussey, Joan Leslie and Leif Ericson.

"Topper Takes a Trip." Not as good as the original "Topper," but still very amusing. With Constance Bennett, Billie Burke and the very deft Roland Young.

"The Hideout." "Showboat" star Howard Keel made this a while back in England and it has just completed its run in the popcorn palaces. It's about gangsters.

BASEBALL a la HOLLYWOOD

Baseball, like the idea of God, means many different things to many different people.

Some folks take the nation's favorite pastime very seriously. Others, to use an expression, don't know second base from a hole in the head.

For reasons which I won't go into, the sport of baseball has always meant a great deal to me. As one gets older, though (I almost said "mature"), I suppose the ideal approach (as with most things in life) is to assume the Aristotelian attitude of "the golden mean."



At any rate, whether you be a shirt-sleeved bleacher fan or an average housewife who takes time out to watch a few innings, there are certain irrefutable facts about Doubleday's baby:

From the spectator's viewpoint, baseball always has appealed to the masses and always will. You can yell your bloody head off, any time, anywhere, at anyone you wish. A form of "catharsis," to borrow another Grecian term.

From the ball player's standpoint, it doesn't matter who you are or where you come from—if you don't produce right there on the field, day after day, you've had it, brother, and you might as well try something else for a living.

With these thoughts in mind, then, it was with a great deal of interest that I attended the opening night game last week here in "the land of the starlets, and the home of TV."

It was my first Pacific Coast League game. It was also the first time in my life I had ever been in a ball park where at least half of the people, if not more, sat in box seats.

Practically every box seat was occupied. The grandstands and the bleachers (where I have always been under

the impression the "real" fans sat), were obscure and almost barren.

Before continuing, please let me be emphatic that none of the following comments have any bearing on the management of the Hollywood team, nor, more important, on the players themselves or the brand of baseball.

However, because of the predominance of box-seat spectators, certain questions ran through my mind:

Could it be possible that this land of Hollywood, this land in which the "make-believe" seems so all-important, could also affect such a down-to-earth game as baseball?

Could it be possible that the habit of "putting up a front" has been so deeply ingrained in the everyday pattern of life out here that the people can't give it up even at a ball game? One must certainly be seen in the limelight, you know, despite the fact that many of the grandstand seats are far superior from a spectator's viewpoint.

Maybe it's possible that the people in Hollywood are really loaded with dough, and that not to buy anything but the best would hurt their pride?

Or maybe everyone was "freeloading" on passes?—as I was.

Whatever the answer or answers, a la Hollywood baseball on opening night is a unique and revealing experience.

Fight Broadcast

Fans who follow the fight will be able to hear the fifteen-round middleweight championship bout between titleholder Ray Robinson and challenger Rocky Graziano, April 16, KNX-CBS, 7:00 p.m. It promises to be a highlight of the pugilistic year, with Robinson generally considered by fistic experts as the greatest fighting machine in the ring today, having one of the truly great records in boxing history. In his many years in boxing he has been defeated only twice, by Jake LaMotta and Randy Turpin, and in each case avenged the defeat. He won the title from LaMotta, lost it in a stunning upset to Randy Turpin and then won it back from the Britisher with a spectacular knockout last summer.

In Graziano he will be meeting one of the most devastating punchers in the game today. Graziano, too, once held the middleweight title, but lost it to Tony Zale. Steve Ellis and Lester Bromberg will do the blow-by-blow and between-rounds analysis respectively for the broadcast.

Atom-Bomb Test Broadcast

Late this month the government will supervise another atom-bomb test. Robert Trout, famous on-the-scene newscaster, has been assigned by CBS Radio Network

to cover the atomic-explosion test in Nevada. This will be the first time an on-site test report by news correspondents has been permitted. All the networks will probably assign their top-notch newsmen to the event. Special preparations are being made to provide facilities for broadcasting from a location where the detonation will be visible to the newsmen. Access to the test site and movement of observers and equipment will be regulated and controlled by the Atomic Energy Commission.

large city. The owner of the service station reluctantly left his radio and came out to the car. "Well," he said, in answer to the driver's question, "I don't know the exact mileage but just put your speedometer on fifty miles per hour and just after the news broadcast you'll reach a cross road. Turn left and keep going until you're almost through the Fibber McGee program and then watch for a road to the right. Follow that to the second commercial on the Bob Hope program and there you are."

Kentucky Derby

All radio set-siders can be assured that they will be able to hear the running account of America's classic Kentucky Derby. CBS Radio will air the great horse-racing event from Churchill Downs on Saturday, May 3. Radio coverage of the seventy-eighth running of the classic will be broadcast over a CBS Radio Network of 207 stations, including outlets in the Hawaiian Islands and a coast-to-coast Canadian Network. Nominations of 169 horses, the second-largest entry in the history of the Derby, have been made for participation in this year's event. If as many as eighteen horses go to the post, this will be the richest Derby purse in history, \$126,350, with the winner's purse estimated at \$98,300. The CBS coverage of the Kentucky Derby started in 1935 and has been a network feature ever since, except in 1937, when it was broadcast over another network.

"Escape With Me"

This recent addition to the line-up of radio dramas is under the guiding hand of Kathi Norris, as hostess-narrator. "Escape With Me" strives to offer listeners a dramatic series with more realism, when it tells stories about many ill-fated people who somehow manage to find happiness before the broadcast ends.

Kathi Norris introduces the radio stories which are presented in cooperation with the magazine "True Experiences." As you might expect, these plots are similar to the so-called "true confession" story, but are always in good taste. You can count on each airshow having its share of romance, intrigue and excitement.

A recent script concerned the meeting of two hard-boiled, cynical people in a low-down joint in a large South American city. The fellow was a fine jazz player who had been down on his luck and not too friendly to any offers. The girl owned and operated the night spot, and wouldn't trust any man very far. As the story developed they both went soft and almost sacrificed life and limb for each other, as a result of plotting by the dishonest landlord of the cafe. All ended happily as the couple married and traveled back to the states to make everything "right."

"Escape With Me" offers listeners a slightly different plot situation enacted by better than average performers. Although many cliches appear in the scripts, they are in general solidly presented. If you are looking for nighttime air drama with a "true confession" flavor this one may prove to be just what you want.—A. G.

his radio news experience he made some interesting comments.

"For thirty years, three full decades, it has been my privilege to analyze and interpret the news over the air. As I look back over the many dramatic events I have covered since 1922, I realize how far America has traveled in those historic years. From the isolation to which we retired after the First World War, America has come to its new position of world leadership.

"A thirty-year anniversary has a sobering effect. As I look over the notes of early broadcasts and play back recordings of some of my countless talks, I like to take refuge in the old truth that to err is human - to forgive, divine. Over the years I must have helped many listeners to approach divinity. Those of us who try to analyze the tangled skein of news events as fast as they come from the ticker could be wrong almost as often as we could be right . . .

"Now I no longer worry. Actually, I'm pleased about the unpredictability of human conduct. I fear the day when men's actions can be subject to infallible logical analysis. For, if and when that sad day ever comes, it can only mean that we are living in a completely totalitarian, regimented slave world. It would be a world where man's free will, his choice among diverse courses, and, above all, his spontaneity of action would be destroyed.

"I know that in my next thirty years of news analysis I will often be happily surprised by man's spontaneous bravery, his innate decency, and his moral sense. The past thirty years have given me great hopes for the next thirty."

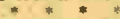

Give Your Child a Chance

YOU'VE HEARD it a hundred times. I mean the old cliché—'give the kid a chance.' Everyone says it, but how many people actually do it?

"It can never be better applied than when it comes to music and your child. By giving him or her a chance, you can open a whole new world of appreciation of lovely music to your child, and that's a pretty nice thing to do."

No Baby Talk

"Both my husband and I have always felt that the child mind is capable of much more adult understanding than we give it credit for. When providing entertainment and instruction for your child, avoid the 'babykins' approach whenever possible.

"And fortunately, today we all live in a world that allows us to expose our children, free of charge, to the best in music, literature and art. The

heard the best music, too, and saw the finest art objects during their entire childhood. As a result, all became regular little books of knowledge.

"Basic to a child's development is instruction in piano. On the piano he learns the theory and interpretation of music that is so important to any phase of music he may wish to enter later.

"But if you give your child lessons, don't expect a miracle overnight. Not if he's an average child. All they have to do is practice, regularly. You've heard and read this before, too, and it's true. No art is developed without work. Consistent and hard work."

Ballet, Preferably

"In addition to piano, try and introduce your child to some form of dancing at an early age. It develops grace of body, muscular coordination and self-confidence.

"But 'give the kid a chance.' If he doesn't play the piano, sing or dance well, don't discourage him. So long as he enjoys it, encourage participation. Pitch and rhythm are attributes which can be developed.

Why on Monday nights alone, before bedtime, your children can hear Mario Lanza, Donald Voorhees and the Bell Symphonic Orchestra, the Firestone Symphony, and Gordon MacRae and America's top singers in operettas on NBC's 'Railroad Hour.'"

Start Early

"I remember one family of ten children. The mother began reading the best literature to each of them before they could read. She mixed it up with the brown-bear stuff and regular children's fare. She made certain they

an outstanding talent, it is not wise to make a spectacle of him at every opportunity. I went through this painful parental mistake, as a child, and know it may result in either an overly self-conscious child or the other extreme—a showoff. Whether your youngster's talent is good or bad, it is better not to compare his abilities with those of other children in front of him.

"I suggest above all that you never poke fun at your child's efforts, even if he sounds like the wailer in a Japanese Kabuki play. I sing professionally today—and that's the way I sounded as a child!"

EXCEPT FOR one thing, Bill Welsh has always led a pretty normal life. Like most men, he was born. The place happened to be a small town called Greeley, Colorado, where Bill remained for many years, and where he also attended the Colorado State College of Education.

At the age of twenty-five he got his first radio job. Four years later the spectacled, smooth-talking announcer was appointed director of news, sports and special events for KFEL, Denver.

When World War II broke out, the special-events man for KTTV served as regional radio director for OWI, operating out of Denver. After the war he worked several months for an advertising agency and also did some free-lance radio work.

TV Bug

Up till now Bill's life had followed a fairly normal course. Then one day he got the TV bug. His life has never been the same since.

Starting with ice hockey in December, 1945, Bill went on to telecast football, basketball, baseball, track, boxing, golf and tennis.

In April of 1948 he made TV history with a twenty-seven-and-a-half-hour on-the-spot coverage of the vain effort to save little Kathy Fiscus.

As if all this wasn't enough to keep a man busy, someone came up with the bright idea that wrestling matches should be televised. Naturally it wasn't long before Welsh was at ringside with a mike in his hands.

Interview

During lunch one day Bill explained the situation:

"Fortunately I had wrestled a little in school and was familiar with most of the holds. But I never dreamed it would turn out the way it has. Honestly, I love it, but I don't have a chance these days to . . ."

"Pardon me, Mr. Welsh," a stranger interrupted. "But I'd like to tell you what I think about wrestling."

Bill listened patiently, and when the man left he tried to start his story again. No luck.

"Hi, Bill," a man said. He was also a stranger. "Could you stop at my table before you leave? There are a few things I have to say about your TV shows."

"Certainly, I'll be glad to," Bill replied cordially.

Before leaving the restaurant the KTTV announcer had to stop at several tables to discuss TV, and particularly wrestling, with his fans.

The front door and freedom were finally in sight. However, before he could get his first good whiff of fresh

Who Are "The Mellomen"?

The Popular Foursome Shot Into Top Popularity Through TV, But You Can Hear Them in Almost All the Mediums

ONE DAY in the corridor of NBC, a group from the network's press department, a member of TV-Radio Life's staff and an actress stood chatting. Everyone could hear the banging that went on at a door at the far end of the corridor.

When some weary soul finally opened it to the enthusiastic group which seemed like eight as all four of them poured down the hall, one of the publicists identified them.

"Oh, that's 'The Merry-men!'"

"'Merry-men!' Are there those, too? I have pictures of 'The Melodiers,' got story material on 'The Mellow-larks,' and now I have to go through 'The Merry-men!' before I can get to 'The Mellomen!'" was our lament.

That is *not* the story, in a few simple sentences, of the life of "The Mellomen." The fans who write, phone and stop by to request stories on "The Mellomen" confuse them with no other group on earth. These same fans can identify their favorites whether the foursome are merely heard singing a Gillette commercial or appearing with "a cast of thousands" on television. (Talking to them made *that* understandable!)

When Is a Commercial Not?

And fans have had plenty of opportunity to soak up Mellomen fare. The foursome have done a capella background with half the name stars who make Capitol records; they have sung more commercials for radio and TV than most of us can remember;

they have done picture background and they have lent voice to some of Disney's favorite characters. But what wore an extra little memory groove in the minds of followers and nicked an extra little corner in the hearts of fans was the group's long-running appearance on KTLA's "Bandstand Revue." Presumably hired to do the commercial, the group were such a success that the spot grew into a feature running many times twelve and fourteen minutes in length.

Who Are They?

And who are the quartet who book themselves into more work than they can handle under the single word that describes both their singing and their gender?

Thurl Ravenscroft, the tall, dark member of the group, and the wearer of the mustache, is one of the original "Sportsmen Quartet." He and Max Smith organized "The Mellomen" about 1948. For the book, Thurl sings bass. He lives in Burbank; is married to a former TWA hostess named June whom he met when he joined TWA after supervisory work with the Air Transport; and is, by avocation, the builder of beautiful Early American furniture. Thurl would also be a golfer and a tennis player had not furnishing his own home with Ravenscroft-built pieces occupied him thoroughly whenever an hour or two between songs occurred. His eyes and hair are brown, and any fan who doesn't know this

from following the group about the TV dial is not literally a fan.

Max Smith, also a former member of "The Sportsmen," is one of the tenors of the group and a fellow Valleyite. Max and his wife live in North Hollywood, and it is he who launched the group on Edgar Bergen's NBC air show back in 1948.

Bob Hamlin, the other tenor, is a Van Nuys dweller with a wife and one child. Like Thurl, his hobby is Early American cabinet making, but Bob allows fishing to interrupt whenever he has a chance. Hamlin is a former vocalist with Harry Owens's Royal Hawaiians.

Bill Lea, a former Navy man with two children, lives in Tarzana, another Valley spot. His wife is the lone professional of the Mellomen wives, and works under the name Ada Beth Lea, singing in pictures and for radio. Bill splits his few spare moments between golf and listening to music of a strictly classical bent.

Sound Different

And why do those four choose to call themselves "The Mellomen" at a time when a confusion of similar titles exists? Simply because that's the way they want to sound.

"We try to have a different sound. A quartet is normally composed of a first and second tenor, a baritone and a bass. We are two basses and two top tenors. We think it makes a mellower sound."

An amazingly large number of fans think so too.

She Might Be the Girl Next Door

Dorothy Collins Started Singing Commercials, Now Sings Nation's "Hit Paraders" on Video

IF YOU doubt that a singer of commercials can almost overnight become a featured vocalist on one of television's outstanding musical shows, "Your Hit Parade," you had better have a word or two on the subject with Dorothy Collins.

When "Your Hit Parade," NBC-KNBH, was in the planning stage and Raymond Scott made some recordings of the sponsor's singing jingles he asked pert, blonde Dorothy Collins to do the singing. The sponsor not only went for the jingle idea in song, but enthusiastically endorsed the vocalist. He liked her voice and appearance, which reminded him of the girl next door.

Unsophisticated

It was not long after she started singing the commercials that another featured vocalist was needed to interpret the "pop" songs of the week, to join Eileen Wilson and Snooky Lanson on radio and TV. Naturally, it was not hard to convince anyone on the set that the dimpled, unsophisticated Dorothy Collins was just what the show needed.

April 11, 1952

Dorothy was born November 28, 1926, in Windsor, Ontario, Canada, as the daughter of Nellie and Sydney Collins. One day her parents entered their youngster in a local amateur singing contest and Dorothy was launched on her career, after winning first place.

Her school days were filled with appearances on children's broadcasts from Detroit. In 1942 she met popular band leader Raymond Scott, and the meeting changed her entire life. When Scott heard the blonde belle sing he was impressed and advised her to study for a year.

After studying for a year, she went on the air with the Raymond Scott Show and toured for years with the band leader's orchestra. In 1948 she became the singing star on the Herb Shriner Time radio series. A year or so later she was again with the Raymond Scott group, until he became director of the air show "Your Hit Parade."

Getting Personal

After that came more vocal lessons
