Five Gals and

A Guy

ALL-GIRL orchestras and their accompanying TV shows (remember the heyday of Ada Leonard, Lorraine Cugat, and Ina Ray Hutton?) have come and gone, but Ina Ray lingers on.

One of the primary reasons for this has been the regular appearance of five lovely ladies of song, who add poise and dignity (to say nothing of sex appeal) to the popular KTLA offering.

By name, they are The Roguettes, and they have been with Ina Ray's show steadily for almost two years.

Because they have been featured mainly as a group rather than as individuals (although they do sing solos), TV viewers have had little chance to know these girls personally.

TV-Radio Life recently cornered these lassies for an interview, along with their capable and conscientious leader, Cecil Stewart.

One man usually has enough trouble talking to just one woman. Talking to five of them simultaneously is like trying to watch five tennis matches at one time, with a Gussie Moran or a reasonable facsimile on each court.

Here They Are

The oldest of the group (referring, of course, only to length of service with the Roguettes) is Betty Benee, the tall, very blonde lyric soprano. Betty has been singing with Cecil for over four years, is married, and has two children, Bari and Baron. The other blonde, who likewise is married, is a cute coloratura soprano, Olive Rice. Honey-blond Doris Kroman sings the mezzo-soprano part, and is also married in private life.

Kiddingly (and we'll get shot for December 19, 1952

printing this), Ricky Richesin refers to herself as "the raven-haired beauty" of the group. Come to think of it, and come to look at her, there's little doubt that she's right. She has been with Stewart for two years, sings contralto mezzo, and is single.

Last but not least is the diminutive contralto, Nancy Cameron, whose vivaciousness and charm match her brilliant red hair. She also is single.

All the girls' ages range from twenty-two to twenty-six.

The Leader

Talkative, energetic Cecil Stewart not only has to be a master musician at his job, but he serves as a master diplomat and guardian for his vocal family, especially on their long and regular trips making guest appearances throughout California.

As Cecil puts it: "I've almost killed myself writing new arrangements to keep up with the numerous shows we have. But they're a nice group of girls and I'm not sorry for all the weary nights I've had to work through in order to get their stuff ready on time."

Stewart also makes arrangements for two other male singing groups, "The Royal Rogues" and "The Vigilantes."

Officially, The Roguettes are billed as "The Five Sweethearts of Song." Even if they couldn't sing, the first three words would still apply to the two blondes, the honey-blond, the "dark-haired raven beauty," and the cute, little redhead—who are all easy to listen to, easy to look at, and very, very easy to talk to.

They have provided KTLA and the TV public with the sort of clean, refreshing, high-class entertainment which is a credit to themselves, to their leader, and to the entire industry.

ON A QUIETER corner of Hollywood, just two blocks from Sunset and Vine, juncture of show business and too much traffic, is a fairly inconspicuous restaurant. Every noon the place is packed. At five o'clock half the same people come back to carry on heated discussions of who has what job, who is in what TV show, who *should* have been in that show, and who is doing what when they aren't on any show at all! The patrons are principally TV and radio ad-agency men, artists, network personnel and executives, and press members. Exchanges are held sacrosanct. You don't share a fellow's lunch table and then blab his views.

One noon not too long ago we shared a table with a couple of personalities whose banter drew a wonderful picture of their relationship.

Hobbies and Homes

Cliffie Stone, rotund official putter-together and performer of KLAC-TV's "Hometown Jamboree," and his old friend and singing star, Tennessee Ernie, were arguing happily about homes, hobbies and clothes.

The latter announced, "I just bought me a new place. It's part of the old Murphy ranch, way out east in the Friendly Hills. Real nice out there. You're not all jammed in."

"Yeah, but look how far you have to drive to *get* in! You probably like it out there with the squirrels," replied Cliffie Stone. Then, aside, "You know, I took this guy golfing one day out at Hillcrest. He was calling the squirrels all the way around the course. They came, too."

Coons and Bears

Tennessee Ernie, who was born Ernest Ford in Bristol of the state that hung the nickname on him, defended himself easily. "One of the things you learn when you are young. Callin' squirrels was one of them. I can scream a coon out of a tree, too. And that was useful to know, where I came from. We used both the fur and the meat. Ever go on a coon hunt, Cliff?"

"Just once. I tramped around after the hounds till they got off, then I went to the car and went to sleep. Bear hunting is a lot more exciting."

"Well, I've never gone bear hunting, so that doesn't sound exciting to me," was the laconic rejoinder.

From bear hunting the discussion switched to a happy argument on boats. Cliffie, an ardent sailor, thinks this is the only way to relax. Ernie,

who hadn't been on a boat until two years ago, couldn't care less.

Boats to "The Best"

Suddenly our ear was caught by the complete accord of the two friends. Words like "tremendous," "sensational" and "real great" started. Cliffie and Ernie were talking about the crew on "Hometown Jamboree." Mollie Bee might be interested in knowing that Ernie thinks she is "a great little trouper." Cliffie used the words "the best." A discussion of the band of ten, who also back Tennessee Ernie on his records, brought out the fact from Ernie that "they are the greatest. They can jam or fake or read." Cliffie echoed, "The greatest."

Mention of the records brought another aside from Cliffie. "Ernie, you know," he stated as proudly as though he himself were the artist under discussion, "is a real three-sided guy. He can sing blues, country stuff and pops. He'll leave a country-music show and go to the Copa in New York and knock 'em dead next night. He can even sing classical stuff, but," here Stone paused thoughtfully, "I don't think the friends and neighbors want it."

"Naw," agreed Ernie. "Just because we're a commercial show doesn't mean we gotta include the prologue to 'Pagliacci.' Cliffie knows. He's been in this business seventeen years. Knows his talent and what people like. After he put Mollie Bee on, John Wayne saw her one night on the show, told Curtiz, the director, about her, and Curtiz had her come out and read for him. And you know where he got Bucky Tibbs? Out of a Hollywood phone office."

Each man has a tremendous respect for the other. It was Stone who introduced Tennessee Ernie to radio and eminence. Each knows how hard the other works. Ernie has his regular daily ABC radio show, and Cliffie Stone puts "Hometown Jamboree" together for the Saturday night KLAC-TV hour as well as the daily morning KXLA hour-long show and holding regular Tuesday auditions for "Jamboree" talent. He times the tunes, runs the dress and camera rehearsals, and finally emcees

the big show from El Monte each Saturday night.

"I was up all night with the bottle bit for the baby," he yawned. "Don't pay any attention to what Cliff and I say to each other. By the way Cliffie, where did you get that tie?"

The white-shirted, Sy Devore-tied Stone stroked his black silk elegance and eyed Ernie's soft-collared shirt and string tie. "I at least got mine - it didn't just happen."

The show that goes on week after week, sponsored, popular and holding a high rating* has a rougher row to hoe in getting up something novel than does the dreary bit that viewers expect to be a dreary weekly bit.

One of the former is "You Asked for It," on which viewer requests for long-forgotten or never-before-seen stunts, personalities and events are recreated. We think the show surpassed itself in presenting Cilly Feindt and her amazing Lipizzaner Pasha. We'd best explain that jargon, in case you missed the treat. Cilly is a girl. Pasha is a horse. Lipizzaner is a breed of horse, and in this case Lipizzaner Pasha means a superb gelding, white, talented and trained to a T. He march-

es, waltzes, cakewalks, taps and performs the very difficult and seldom seen Passage, a natural air of Haute Ecole.

Cilly, one of the world's most accomplished equestriennes, slipped Pasha out of Austria at the end of World War II before you-know-who lowered the boom on that unfortunate country.

And blessings on the powers that produce "You Asked for It" for allowing plenty of time for Pasha and Cilly to entertain. The water boxers we were happy to see go in about a minute. Pasha we were sorry to see finish at the end of six or seven minutes.—J.P.

CORN PONE PIE

Serve this en casserole, or in individual ramekins.

- 4 medium onions, chopped shortening
- 1 teaspoon ac'cent
- 1 pound ground beef
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 5 or 6 dashes tabasco
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt, or to taste
- 1 (No. 2) can tomatoes (2½ cups)
- 1 (No. 2) can baked kidney beans, drained
- small package corn muffin mix (15-cent size)

Cook onions in shortening until a golden brown. Sprinkle Ac'cent on beef; push onions to side of skillet and brown meat. Let both beef and onions be good and brown. Add pepper, tabasco, chili powder, Worcestershire sauce, salt, tomatoes and kidney beans. Cover and let simmer while you stir the muffin-mix for the top. (Follow package directions.) Pre-heat oven to 425 degrees F. Pour meat mixture into 3-quart casserole, or into individual ramekins. Spread the corn-meat mixture over top, using wet spatula, getting it well into the edge. Bake about 20 minutes, or until top is golden brown. If baked in individual ramekins, turn upside down on plate to serve. Yield: 5 to 6 servings.

The very finest program on television, barring none, has been taken away from us—Korla Pandit. Wants buy a TV set—but cheap?

This is the third letter that I have written to you regarding the poor use of good program hours by television network outlets in Southern California.

I realize that it would be impossible to include in your column all portions of the preceding letters I have sent to you regarding this subject, but it would appear from the portions that you did print in your Eye and Ear column that you miss my entire purpose in writing these letters to you.

Certainly there is nothing more irritating to a viewer than to find that at prime viewing hours there is not a really good program on the air, or—even worse—to find two or more good programs on at the same time.

We here in Southern California have become little more than television's stepchildren. We see more kinescopes than does any other part of the nation; we see no more than two or three good Sunday afternoon programs; we could go on and on.

But the strange part of it is that nothing is being done to alleviate this situation. As I wrote to you in my first letter, there is not one nighttime network television show, originating in Hollywood, that we see here "live." Not one. There is no reason—so far as I can see—why this has to be. On Wednesday nights, I certainly would much rather see the This Is Your Life show "live" at 7:00 than see it kinescoped at ten. NBC serves us a not-very-good sustaining show called Dear Old Moola U in the seven to seven-thirty time slot—a show whose format is just as ridiculous as its title. Yet the cosmetic firm which sponsors the This Is Your Life show has to pay an extra amount of money for us to be able to see a "quick kinie" at ten o'clock. I understand these "quick kinies" are very expensive. But as I said, I certainly would much rather see the show live at seven o'clock than see the show kinescoped at ten.

This is only one example. In the East, Sunday afternoons are filled with top-flight television fare. Even on radio here we hear some of the best programs on the radio-air during these hours. Why not on television too? To me there is no logical answer.

Maybe there is. That is the point of my writing these letters to you. Your magazine could be of great service to the Southern California viewers by confronting programming managers with this problem and reporting the reasons—if there are any—for this situation to the public.

It would appear that individual producers can not do anything to alleviate the situation. In answer to a letter which I recently sent to him, Fred W. Friendly, producer of the See It Now program, sums up the position of the producer by saying that he "regrets the situation . . . and hopes that . . . we will be able to go back to our original time in the near future. . ."

I have done about as much writing as anyone can do in protest to the actions of programming personnel in the offices of Hollywood network outlets. I am handing the case over to you.

The Greatest Year

As Told by Bob Hope

IN 1952, Bob Hope began his second indefatigable decade of entertaining GI's. And he loves it.

Last October the President of the United States, Harry Truman, presented Bob with a special scroll signed by thousands of GIs and the generals of all commands of the U. S. Armed Forces. It was in appreciation of Hope's unparalleled record.

The word "unparalleled" is not used loosely.

First Across

On the very day Secretary of War Stimson drew the first draft number from a hat, Bob Hope played a benefit for soldiers. But the real Hope saga began with an Alaskan trip in 1942. After long transcontinental swings all over the United States, Hope left for England in 1943. From there he flew to North Africa, Sicily, and Italy, for a month. There the troupe experienced their first bombing raids at Bizerte and Palermo. Early in 1944 he hit the Caribbean. That summer he went to Guadalcanal, Bougainville and many other

historic battlefields, as well as Australia and New Guinea. In 1945 he was in Europe once more. After the postwar demobilization, Hope went to Berlin via the Airlift for Christmas of 1948, and the following Christmas he spent in Alaska and the Aleutians, entertaining the men of what had become an almost forgotten outpost. Mrs. Hope and two of their children went on this last icy junket, as well as Jimmy Wakely.

Ready Again

The outbreak of war in Korea found Hope ready once more. Early in the fall of 1950 he set out for a month of shows in Hawaii, Japan, and Korea itself.

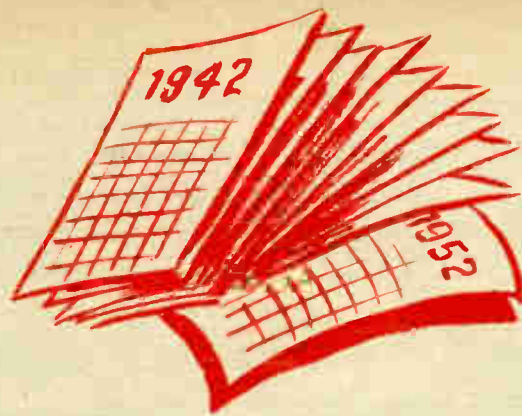
"These have been the greatest ten years of my life," he recalls. "A lot of kids came up and thanked me for entertaining them. Isn't that ridiculous. I was the one who had the fun!"

"I like to look back. Alaska and the Aleutians, where the weather got so cold the guys wished they were in Africa. Africa, where they wished they were in Alaska. Italy and Sicily, probably the hottest places of all . . .

for another reason. The Pacific, where they knew a guy was getting Island-happy when he started to look at the men's fashion pages in Esquire. England, where you saw the cities and landmarks devastated; and Germany, where you saw the same thing, but felt it served them right.

"Remember the pictures of the American and Russian soldiers shaking hands at the Elbe River? If they tried it now they'd break their knuckles on the Iron Curtain.

"Of course that Iron Curtain isn't a Russian invention. It's something I thought of in vaudeville. I didn't use it much, though, because sometimes the vegetables came in handy.

"I didn't need so much protection on my GI tours; when I have Marilyn Maxwell along, nobody even notices me. Jack Benny has been getting laughs with a Maxwell for years. But mine has better lines."

No Joke

The NBC radio and television star has a serious side to his memories.

"It's easy to make jokes about the

GIs, and how they love 'em. But I have seen boys sweating it out in a lot of strange places in the last ten years, and I hope I have given them a few laughs they need when they are thousands of miles from home with the ever-present thought that they may never get to that home again. I don't get serious often, because laughs are my living. But I sure do when I think of what I have seen, and am seeing even now.

"The GIs of World War II were fighting for something that didn't quite come off. A lot of them, plus a lot of young fellows who were just kids when the fighting was going on at Wake Island and Bizerte and Salerno, are trying to finish the job. I hope none of us will ever forget them nor what they are doing.

"I know I won't."

STILL Like Girls

"After ten years on the GI circuit. I can tell you one thing. These boys haven't changed a bit. Last summer, when the word went out that Bob Hope was going abroad, a pfc in Germany wired . . . "Tell Hope to stay home. Send us a broad."

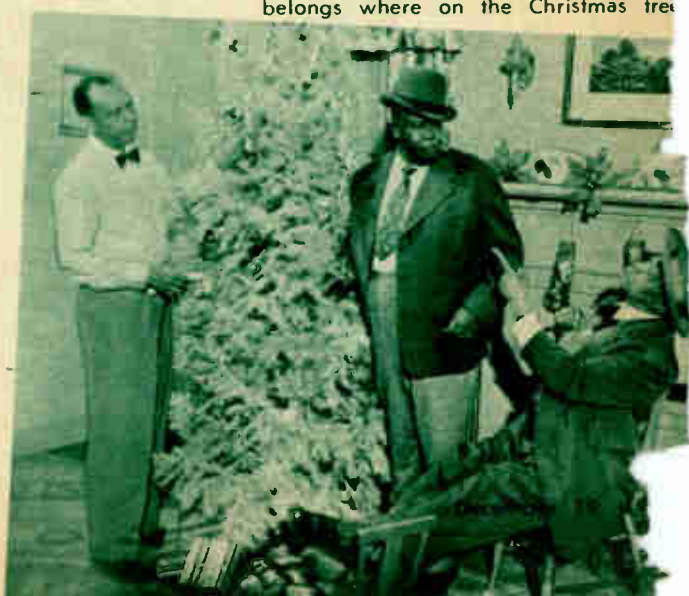

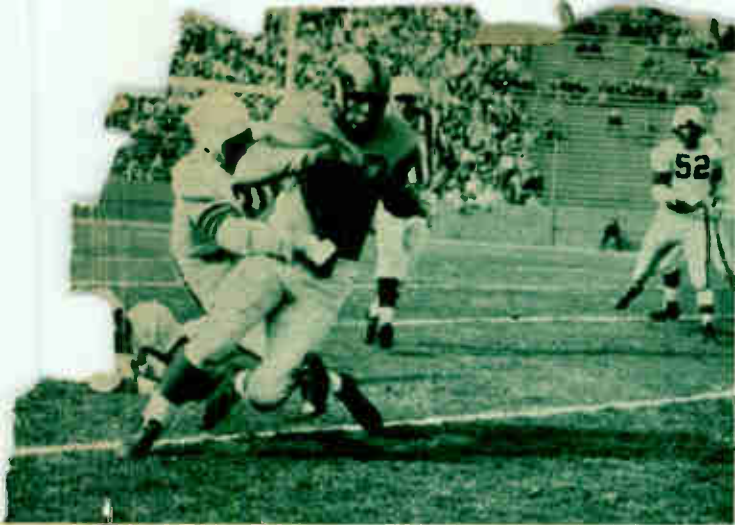

HUNTER HANCOCK

TEXAS-BORN Hunter Hancock can't lose his drawl. But it doesn't matter. He has more friends than you can shake a stick at. The former drummer-singer-emcee started spinning records in 1943 at KFVD. That's when good fortune smiled at him. One of his sponsors catered to the Central Avenue trade and wanted H. H. to pitch his records and spiels to the Negro population. Hancock hit upon the right format, and he has been the only white d. j. in our city to have a loyal following among this specialized audience.

Followers of his rhythm and blues programs have designated their favorites to be Johnny Otis and his orchestra, vocalist Earl Bostic, Mel Walker, Percy Mayfield, Lloyd Price and the Dominoes and Clover vocal groups. Johnny Ray and Patti Page are tops in the pop field. Hunter says that the term "race" music is obsolete. It has been replaced by rhythm and blues music.

In addition to his KFVD stint, Hunter has an evening show on KGFJ, thus enabling him to reach different portions of his audiences. He emcees a weekly amateur show at the Lincoln Theatre in Los Angeles, and broadcasts a show from a downtown night spot.

Hunter plugs Central Avenue benefits, community projects and is in general an ambassador of good will. He received a plaque from the Colored Business and Professional Men's Association for his contributions as a radio entertainer. Hancock was the only white man honored on this occasion.

The Hancocks live in Hollywood. Michael, eleven, is the extrovert of the family. "He can out-mimic Jerry Lewis," says Hunter. David, fourteen, is a more serious lad who is pre-occupied with his pets. Wife Ruth joins Hunter on bear and deer hunts. He admits that she's a good shot, for a woman, that is.

The Hancocks are churchgoers, non-drinkers and non-smokers.

TV's Past and Future in

The Pigskin Parade

EXCEPT FOR the big post-season bowl games and a few odd tilts, the football season of 1952 is now a thing of the past.

All the facts and figures are in the record books for the Monday-morning quarterbacks to squabble over. Strictly from the TV-radio angle, it also gives us a chance to look over the season and see what was done and what might be done in the future to make the grid season more enjoyable for the listening and viewing public.

Even before the season began, TV fans were thrown for a loss when the NCAA ruled that only one college game a week could be televised on Saturday. Despite this setback, the major networks did as good a job as could be expected under the circumstances.

ABC's Part

For instance, let us examine what the ABC network, ABC, did for its fans. Radiowise, there were no restrictions whatsoever, and each station and almost every independent station in Southern California catered to the gridiron appetites of the game and pro fans alike.

Starting on Tuesday of each week, ABC filmed the outstanding PCC game of the week at 9:00 p.m. and broadcast it with Red Sanders's Pigskin Clinic.

On Wednesday nights Channel 7 viewers saw half-hour film clips of all the previous week's pro games. Then on Thursday, we saw one full hour

of the All-American game of the week and a top Big Ten contest.

Sunday provided the biggest thrill of all as the ABC-TV network broke all precedents and microwaved six "away" games of the L.A. Rams and the San Francisco '49ers from all parts of the country.

TV Future

These telecasts—films of the PCC, Big Ten, All-American, and professional games, plus the "live" pro tilts—gave viewers as complete a round-up of the gridiron doings as one station could possibly be asked to do.

Other stations, particularly the live shows of KNBH and KHJ-TV and the films of KTTV and KNXT, also added to our enjoyment.

Of course there are many obstacles to complete TV coverage. Televising of local games undoubtedly hurts gate receipts. Maybe "pay-as-you-go" TV will be the answer. Maybe theater TV will lick the problem. Maybe sponsors will be able to afford the individual games for home reception.

Eventually, we believe, the "freeze" on football telecasts, at least the "away" games, will have to be lifted. The demand for top sporting events on TV has become too important for the restriction to last too many years.

Whatever the solution, and judging from this year's past performance, the American sporting public can be assured that the TV industry will be on hand for each and every play.
