All Eyes Are on Owl Eyes As Hawthorne Does It Again



CBS's Delightful Screwball Is Starting a Zany New Project Guaranteed to Give You Laughs

HAWTHORNE, whose fantastic "projects" have become one of radio's most delightful interludes in recent years, launches a new one this week end. His latest, he predicts, will be his best yet.

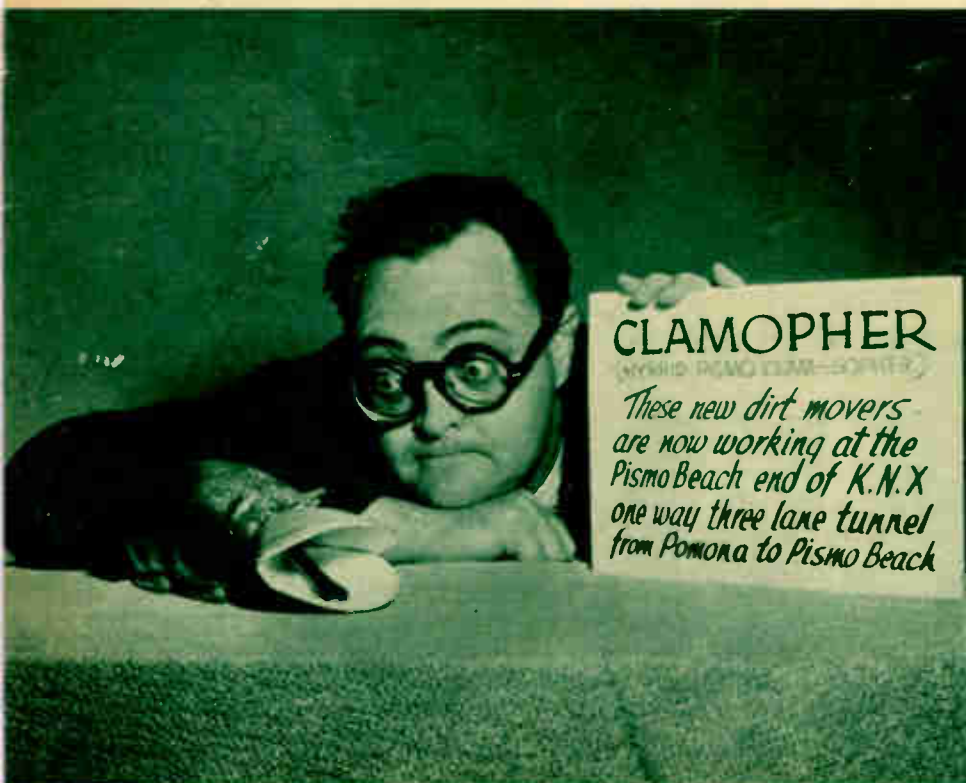
The CBS-KNX radio comedian, who last fall created national interest with his imaginary tunnel from Pomona to Pismo Beach, claims (with customary tongue in cheek) that his new project, which will be announced on his midnight KNX show this Saturday, January 17, will be so colossal in scope that it may change the entire course of history of this nation.

Hawthorne has established a new place, or land, or region, or whatever you wish to call it, that he calls "Shangri Owl," which is run entirely by owls because owls are wiser than people.

His project will be to move everybody in the rest of the United States to Shangri Owl, which apparently is located somewhere here in Southern California. He then plans to turn the other forty-seven states into a giant parking lot.

"If we move 148 million people here to Shangri Owl," Hawthorne told a TV-Radio Life reporter, "we certainly will need a large parking lot."

While it will be his aim to transport every man, woman and child from the rest of the country to Shangri Owl, Hawthorne nevertheless

will accomplish this gigantic mass migration with the use of official certificates of residence, without which no one can enter this new promised land.

It is not strange, of course, that in order to be accepted for residence in Shangri Owl everyone must first obtain the necessary certificate from Hawthorne. He has them all printed and ready for mailing.

How does Hawthorne propose to get everyone to Shangri Owl? That's easy. Hawthorne thinks of everything.

He plans to have everybody here in Southern California send for all their relatives back East. That will do it, he thinks. So, you can get an official certificate from Hawthorne, send it to your Aunt Hepsy back East and she can start packing.

The small minority here who don't have relatives back East will be traded to Canada. "We can't have dead wood in this project," Hawthorne declared. "Our goal must be a relative in every pot."

More Details

There will even be official methods of transportation for this mammoth trek. "Only pogo sticks and tricycles will be recognized as the official means of conveyance," Hawthorne stated. "All other types of transportation will be banned."

Because of his facial expression, complete with owl eyes, Hawthorne is believed to be an ideal choice for the title of Chief Owl of this undertaking. He will have as his slogan, "We don't give a hoot."

He has many plans for his con-

stituents, once they are ensconced in Shangri Owl. The two official songs will be "Owl Be Seeing You" and "Who?"

Thousands of folks still are chuckling at the memory of Hawthorne's Pismo Beach project, which was climaxed with a big celebration in the clam community last fall when his imaginary underground passageway, appropriately named "What Tunnel," was dedicated.

The entire population of Pismo Beach turned out on November 9 to honor Hawthorne and the winner of his unique contest to find a name for his tunnel.

The contest winner, Mrs. W. A. Ruth, of 9510 Averstone, Los Angeles, submitted the winning title, "What Tunnel," and gave as her reason for it the fact that every time she asked one of her friends to suggest a name for the tunnel, they replied, "What tunnel?"

The reason Hawthorne gave for building a three-lane, one-way tunnel from Pomona to Pismo Beach was simply because there never had been one.

"Everybody talks about Pismo Beach," Hawthorne said at the time, "but nobody does anything about it."

His multitude of fans recall with delight and amusement many of his previous projects, some of which date back to his early disc-jockey days in radio on KXLA.

Probably no other comedian has created the number of fantastic bits of whimsey that Hawthorne has pulled out of his nimble mind and

developed into projects so real that many people believe in them. One such was his Drive-In Volcano in Griffith Park, where he sold hot bubble gum; or his five-lane canal to Omaha, which had two lanes coming, two lanes going and a middle lane filled with peroxide, for the bleachers.

Then there was Hawthorne's 84,000-seat space ship to the moon, developed back in 1947. Object of that unusual undertaking was to bring back from the moon 84,000 moon people to appear in a film called "Shine On Harvest Earth." The picture had no stars in it, he says.

Later he started an ox-cart trip to the sun, but had to give it up because the oxen were lazy and the cart moved so slowly that he couldn't catch up with the sun.

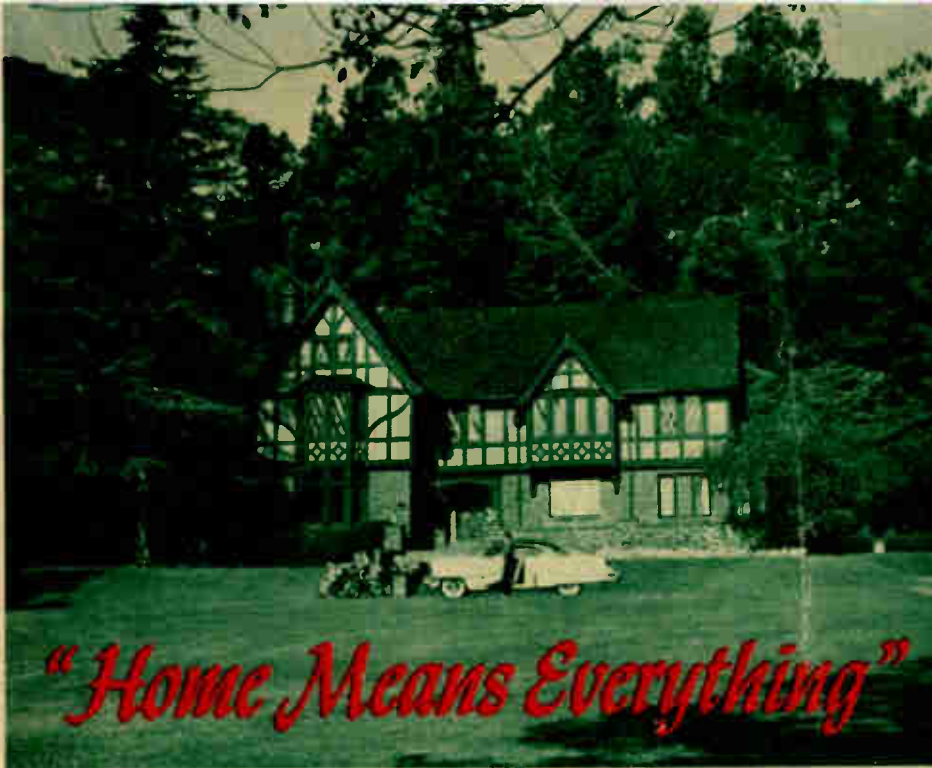
What Reason?

Another popular Hawthorne project was his moving the La Brea tar pits to Shangri La, for some reason to be determined later.

He also moved the Empire State building to the Rose Bowl, because the latter didn't have any nice buildings in it.

And, finally, he built a thirty-eight-story building in San Francisco and knocked out all the floors so that he would have the world's tallest one-story hotel.

Hawthorne promises that all inhabitants of Shangri Owl will be furnished with identifying gismos of one sort or another, probably including glasses like his, lapel buttons and assorted owl feathers.

Nor did the miracle of "Margie" end there. The show scored another first when it became the first comedy show born on TV to go over to radio, where it is now heard Sunday nights.

As a final twist, it develops that Gordon Hughes, who once turned it down, is back in the producing saddle with Charlie and Gale playing the same roles on radio as they do on TV.

This Is the Story

Sunday, 5:30 p.m.

If we had a host of moppets at our house each Sunday at 5:30 we would plant them before a TV set and "suggest," with the aid of an Iron Mistress, a few yards of rope and whatever else it took, that they watch "This Is the Story."

A simple format finds narrator Ed Prentiss recounting little-known tales of legendary figures. It's a great way to inform yourself about such fellows as Voltaire, Pasteur and dozens of others who have been rendered pretty colorless, from time to time, by the academic approach. Prentiss and the pictures bring them all to life.

A child would be merely pleased by the visual addition. An adult is first puzzled by the nearly old-Ripley-in-style drawings, then pleased. The strange little drawings take on great life under Prentiss's excellent narration. You forget the stills are not animated.

A good example fell on Sunday, January 11, when Prentiss dramatized the true story of a man who became great to avenge his loved one's death, and the tale of a novel that made men laugh when it was supposed to make them fight. Try it and see.—J. P.

Lifelines

GEORGE S. KAUFMAN'S "THIS IS SHOW BUSINESS" remark about hoping the program would be one on which "Silent Night" wouldn't be sung is now in the ad-lib morgue and Kaufman has been reinstated on the program. Apparently the implications of his removal after considerable listener protest over his "irreligious" comment gave CBS-TV pause for second thought. That's that.

BUT THE INCIDENT SERVED TO BRING to my mind again the rather untenable position the networks face in the matter of censorship. In the good old days before tape and TV came along and when all shows were done "live," the continuity departments at the networks combed every line of a script to be certain that nothing risqué or offensive would go out over the air. In fact, they still do.

SEEING THE WORDS ON PAPER ISN'T enough for the censors. They have to imagine how the person is going to read the lines. When the well-known Mae West sally to Charlie McCarthy was made some ten or more years ago, it wasn't so much what buxom Mae said as how she said it, and I'll venture a guess that if Fibber and Molly had exchanged the same quips nothing much would have come of it.

WHAT HAS ALWAYS SEEMED SO INCONSISTENT, however, is that while scripts were being given the triple once-over, ad-lib shows rolled merrily

along. Most of them are now put on tape for radio, a convenience which has probably added ten years to the lives of emcees. But while audience-participation programs were still "live," some off-color off-the-cuff dillies were shot out over the airwaves. Walter O'Keefe seemed to have a special affinity for giddy participants, and some of their unprintable choicies have gone down in radio history.

YET ALL THE TIME JOE AND JANE DOAKS were being allowed to trot up to the mike sans experience and judgment, the nets pored over the stars' scripts and said "Thou shalt not." Of course, we all realize that some of the "comedians" were often carried away, especially around rating time. It's the usual thing for gag writers to dream up a dozen jokes, hoping to get half of them past the censor. Trick is to make some of them so blue that the pale-blue ones, by contrast, look snowy white.

OFTEN THE CENSOR'S BLUE PENCIL doesn't x-out a naughty line but one ribbing the brass. If you can remember back five or six years ago you'll recall that it was over some very funny but very barbed comments about radio vice-presidents that Fred Allen was chopped off the air. Listeners took sides with Allen so overwhelmingly when they learned what the expurgated lines were that the network was made to appear rather ridiculous and as a result stopped fussing about such jests.

TAPING OF SHOWS CHANGED A LOT of radio's worries, but now TV has started the cycle all over again. What's worse, on television it's not only what they say and how they say it, but how they act and look when they say it. I can even cite cases of someone saying something of practically no consequence, but saying it to someone in a low-cut gown, and whammy! It was off-color. So to the list you may add to whom the remark is directed and how that person looks.

THE INTERESTING ANGLE TO the George S. Kaufman comment is how quickly and certainly the people who didn't like it registered their protest. I don't believe listeners and lookers as a whole realize their own strength. The Kaufman incident, though ending in a reversal to the original protest, and the recent "bring back Peepers" campaign are morsels to mull.

Elliott directs and produces as well as acts, and Cathy helps in the supervision of the script in addition to her acting chores.

Lud Gluskin is the musical director of the stanza. Ray Noble's ear-catching theme was especially written for Cathy and Elliott. Aside from the pleasant listening "On Stage" affords, the Lewises duly acknowledge cast credits with warmth and dignity, for which they are to be commended.—M. R.

ALBUM OF THE WEEK: "Curtain Call" (Volume 3): Here are eight all-time-great record hits by the artists who made them famous, from Decca's library of old masters. Jimmy Dorsey again plays "Contrasts" and "Green Eyes." . . . Glen Gray and The Casa Loma Orchestra play their familiar theme, "Smoke Rings," and "Sunrise Serenade." . . . Russ Morgan's trombone is again featured on the old instrumental version of "Wabash Blues" and his theme, "Does Your Heart Beat for Me?" . . . while Guy Lombardo spotlights his twin-pianos on "Humoresque" and his appropriate theme, "Auld Lang Syne." These were their best-known hits, many unavailable for years—but certainly milestones in Show Business. . . . Welcome back.



FOR THE TWO-BEATERS: To the wail of sirens, The Firehouse Five Plus Two kick off "Runnin' Wild" with all the zip of their LaFrance fire truck and Harper Goff's driving banjo. Flip features the calmer "Lonesome Railroad Blues," which chugs along with a steady beat. . . . Bob Scobey's Frisco Band really tees off with "Peoria," with a great Clancy Hayes vocal and a novel brass-band effect on the interlude. . . . Turk Murphy's Jazz Band revives the old "Cakewalkin' Babies" with some great blues shouting by Claire Austin that should sell this platter.

FOR THE GALS: Eddie Fisher (RCA-Victor) heads this department with a full-voiced styling of "Even Now," good melody, lyrics and material for this top song-salesman. . . . Johnny Ray (Columbia) turns in the best of his career with "The Touch of God's Hand," sung simply and sincerely in reverent mood. No, it isn't "commercial," but Bob Nolan's lyrics will make one stop and think. . . . Frankie Laine's "Tonight You Belong to Me" seemed much overdone, but the folksy "I'm Just a Poor Bachelor" (Columbia) on the flip could easily do the trick.

FOR THE FELLAS: Helen O'Connell's "I Just Can't Remember the Words" (Capitol) has just the right bounce and simple melody to click with the Teensters. . . . Toni Arden (Columbia) uses full voice to good advantage with Percy Faith's Orchestra for the very melodic "Kiss." . . . Patti Andrews (Decca) does one of her best vocals for "You Blew Me a Kiss," but material is too close to "I Went to Your Wedding" to hit the Big Time.

STRICTLY FOR LAUGHS: Spike Jones's new laughing song, "I Went to Your Wedding" (RCA-Victor), should more than do the job, with Yogi Yorgesson's "The Object of My Affections" a close second on Capitol. . . . A.M.

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Wrestling Is My Business

For some time now, man-to-man combat, or individual competition, has occupied the local mat spotlight. Now it begins to look as if the action-packed tag-team matches are moving up again. This means that television and arena wrestling fans are in for some hectic nights.

Interest in tag-team matches lagged for some time but then the Ocean Park Arena started the tournament to determine the Pacific Coast tag-team champions. This is attracting some terrific combinations, which means a big treat in store for fans.

Now leading the Santa Monica tag-team race is the unholy team of Krippler Karl Davis and the roly-poly Zebra Kid—a hard duo to beat—as teams for the past four weeks have found. KECA is risking lens and lines to bring this excitement to video spectators on Friday nights.

When the great big Western States hook-up began last Wednesday night over the American Broadcasting Company's KECA-TV, last week brought the fabulous Sharpe brothers to Southern California wrestling fans as well as to fans in the Seattle, Salt Lake City, Denver and other points. The Sharpe boys were here two or three years ago, and since leaving here for the Bay Area have nabbed and claimed the world's tag-team championship.

Between the two of them, there is a lot of beef on the hoof. Mike is six foot seven, weighs 270; Ben, the younger half of the steamrolling Canadians, tips the Fairbanks at 260 and stands six feet six inches. Now, there is over a quarter ton of dynamite that will be causing a lot of trouble among the tag-team hotshots.

The fastest growing, most popular tag team to form is the uncle-nephew combination of Vic and Jerry Christy. Promoter Hugh Nichols of the Hollywood Legion Stadium saw their possibilities and signed them for their debut, which was telecast over KTTV.

Vic, who began professional wrestling a year before Jerry was born, must have found the fountain of youth, because they look more like identical twins than anything. They are fast, clean, scientific matsters destined to go far in the tag-team circuit. Dyed-in-the-wool fans are nothing short of amazed and dumbfounded

at the similarity of style of this new team. Combine Jerry's vim and vigor with Vic's ring know-how and you have a power to be reckoned with.

Tag-team matches are relatively new to the sport which began thousands of years ago. In fact, the tag-team matches which you see today are Australian importations. In 1940 the multiple-man matches you saw were team matches in which four men were in the ring at one time. Team matches were all the rage but they were so dangerous. In fact, early in the 1940's, the State Athletic Commission outlawed them because of the injuries which might occur. So many of the wrestlers were injured or crippled badly that the Commission forbade that team matches continue.

This is not idle chatter, because the two men who held the Pacific Coast tag-team championship were Rudy La Ditz and Jules StrongBow. Rudy, who died some time ago, and I won the title in 1940 and we were never defeated as a team. After coming through some of those wars, I can't say that I am sorry they were banned by the Commission.

It was in 1943 or 1944 that tag-team matches first became popular on this Continent and about the first men to take them up were George and Bobby Becker.

Since that time there have been lots of thrills and spills, and right now there are more things to look forward to, from a tag-team standpoint, than at any other time in the history of wrestling.

Lady IN MINK

Former Miss America Bess Myerson
From Bathing Suits to TV Mink . . .

IN 1945 a comely brunette named Bess Myerson was dubbed "Miss America." Seven years and six queens later, Queen Bess hadn't slipped into oblivion. Instead she's riding the crest of the video lanes on NBC-TV's "Big Payoff."

Contest

Miss Myerson's gracious handling of her fencée chores proves that she carries her former title nobly. She exemplifies all requirements for being chosen a Miss America . . . personality and charm, talent, beauty and grace in an evening gown and curves in a bathing suit . . . to perfection. Bess Myerson takes a strong stand on the "bathing beauty" stigma. "Some people tend to type me as a 'bathing beauty.' This hasn't applied to Miss America winners for nearly ten years. Contests are judged not only on physical attractiveness, but also on artistic talents. When I was chosen Miss America, I was obligated to demonstrate more than the average ability and talent as a pianist, and I like to think that this played a great part in my selection."

There were two events that thrilled Bess Myerson the most during her reign. Her guest-solo appearance with the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra at Carnegie Hall was one; the other was her introduction from the floor of the United States Senate by Vice-President Barkley.

Family

Of a more personal consequence was the thrill of meeting her husband during the Atlantic City finals. Captain Alan Wayne was on terminal leave in the city of contests when he met the fair contender. Bess puts it this way: "I could say I won two titles in 1945: Miss America and Mrs. Alan Wayne."

Mrs. Wayne combines homemaking and motherhood with her career. Her five-year-old, Barbara Carol, hasn't shown any indications of musical talent, but she is a naturally graceful child and has been taking dance

lessons for nearly a year. Hubby Alan is a toy manufacturer. By adhering to a strict schedule, Bess is able to maintain some semblance of a normal family life: "I try to keep my sense of proportion and realize that aside from rehearsal and camera time, my day is pretty much my own. Naturally, it goes to the things that mean the most to me—my family. I love to cook for Alan and Barbara, and frequently have the opportunity."

Off-camera Bess and her family enjoy going upstate in New York to a farm where they can get all the rest and exercise they want. The trio enjoys bicycling and horseback riding. Aside from her music, Bess likes to water-color, but admits that as a painter she's a very good pianist.

Bess still studies the piano regularly and plays for her own pleasure: "It's a wonderful way to relax after a particularly intense day. I enjoy Bach most of all, and listen to his music as frequently as I play it."

The limelight of success hasn't gone to her pretty head. She greatly appreciates her parents . . . their sacrifices and encouragement . . . and all they did to further her musical career. If it hadn't been for the Miss America title, Bess admits that she might not have gone into show business at all, but probably would have worked toward being a concert pianist.

TV and Mink

Through the Miss America contest she was introduced to television, which she loves. Thanks to television the former Miss America's charms are not concealed. The screen depicts her beauty and gracious personality for millions of viewers. Her physical attractiveness is the same today as it was in 1945 . . . 36-26-36. Bess is billed as the "Lady in Mink" on the "Big Payoff." When queried about the mink, the gal who fills a bathing suit so well said: "I own exactly one mink coat, and consider myself pretty fortunate at that."

1. Of the three media you are now actively engaged in (radio, press, TV) which do you prefer?

The newspaper. You can't file a program the way you can a column for one reason, and they haven't yet invented a TV or radio that excites the nostrils the way printer's ink does.

2. Do you think TV will eventually surpass the press and radio as the main means of disseminating news to the American public?

I don't think so. The printed word will outlive them all. The Bible, for instance. Actors and other showfolks can live without food for a week if they can read a good notice about themselves. Plugs on the air evaporate like air bubbles.

3. What is your opinion of the various magazine and newspaper articles which recently supposedly "exposed" Walter Winchell?

I don't suppose anyone will believe this but I didn't read them. I knew they could offer nothing that hadn't been printed about me for thirty-two years.

4. In view of the Congressional hearing on the subject, do you think TV and radio need "cleaning up"?

No soap. I never heard or saw anything dirty.

5. There have been many stories recently about "communistic infiltration" in the radio and TV world, particularly in Hollywood. Do you feel this is a serious situation in which some legal action should be taken, or is this just a "red herring"?

The situation is not exaggerated, but the proper authorities are working quietly.

6. What influence do you think Harry S. Truman will have now that he will no longer be President of the United States?

None whatever. Period End Quote!

January 16, 1953
