The Moments That Changed My Life

IT WAS in 1941 that I met Foreman Phillips, who was a prominent disc jockey and also ran the old Venice Ballroom. This was to be the most important meeting in my life, career-wise.

Every time Foreman got a band in to play the ballroom he'd find a spot for me and my fiddle. This association continued for some time and then one day Foreman asked me how much I was making.

"For the three nights I play I've been taking home about \$33 take-home pay," I told him.

Without any hesitation he said, "I'll give you \$250 for the three nights if you'll lead the band."

I picked myself up a few minutes later. It was the most pleasant check I ever had.

New Career

That was the beginning of my career as a band leader. The transition from fiddle player to leader, though, wasn't without its trials. The idea at first scared me to death. I was an introvert and, as such, I had no desire to play center stage. It took me quite a while to get to the point where I could take over such

an important spot and feel easy about it.

To stress Western music more one of the first steps I took was to get a trio. I talked to Jack Williams, vocalist, and induced him to change his name to "Tex." (He's the same Tex Williams who is on TV now with his own show.) Then I contacted a fellow named Smokey Rogers and asked him to let me call him "Okey." Deuce Spriggins was the third of the trio—and he became "Arky." So Okey, Arky, and Tex and I joined forces.

Shortly after this I wrote a number called "Shame, Shame on You" and the boys and I recorded it for Columbia. It was our first record and was a smash hit. And so began an entirely new career for all of us.

TV and Fame

The second moment that changed my life was the day I met Klaus Landsberg of KTLA. This was in August, 1948.

TV was brand-new at this time. There were only about 300 sets in Los Angeles. My office contacted Klaus and arranged a meeting with him. We both decided after a lengthy conversation that it would

be a good idea to have a TV show using my band. I said I'd pay my talent if Klaus would pay for the time. This was quite an occasion since our show became the first band remote on television.

We worked on a sustaining basis until February 1949 when Hoffman took over sponsorship. To give you an idea how much TV has grown since then, the cost of our hour-long show in 1948 was \$250. I can't even get a good act for that now.

There have been other moments—and they all add up to this: I'm a humble and grateful guy for all the opportunities that have come my way.

Do you find you have much time to spend at home? What do you like to do at home?

MERLE: When Judy and I went on the daily KECA-TV show, I gave up an eight-piece Western dance band thinking I'd have more time to spend at home. I've found it has given me more time to answer the telephone. I've had a better chance to explain to Capitol Records why I haven't prepared my recording sessions. I've explained to American Music, Inc., why I haven't been writing more songs.

JUDY: Naturally not, when you consider the time spent at home just being a wife and mother. I would love to do all the things I didn't do when I was home all the time. Such as catching up on the housework, etc.

DUDE: Since most of the cast for my KTTV show and the members of my band live in the Valley, we do all of our rehearsing and show conferences at home—with the exception of show day on Wednesday. Actually, we have but one day a week to ourselves, which we generally spend at home. When I am home I like to work in the garden—and keep our several types of fruit trees in good shape. We also relax playing ping pong and canasta.

SUE: With the exception of Wednesdays and the nights we do personal appearances, I'm able to spend most of my time at home. When I'm not busy rehearsing, taking care of the house, or helping my small daughter on her latest project, I love to take a good book and stretch out in the sunshine. When Dude and I do play ping pong or

canasta, I find it's best to let him win.

Do you find that TV's demands place a strain on marriage? How do you combat the pressure of your work so it doesn't affect your home life?

MERLE: There is a certain strain on our marriage—we don't get to see the kids as much as we'd like. We get pretty sentimental when we see a young couple playing with their kids as we drive home from the studio.

JUDY: There have been times when I thought so, but there is a certain amount of strain on a marriage whether you work together or not. We both try to keep a sense of humor about things, although it's sometimes hard to do when you get too tired.

DUDE: No. We enjoy the business of creating a TV show each week so much that it is more of a game than a tension builder.

SUE: We both find genuine pleasure in building a TV show every week—hence, no pressure on the home life from that angle.

What is your candid opinion of the other's work on TV? Do you give constructive criticism to each other? What do you disagree about as far as work is concerned?

MERLE: On All-American Jubilee and a couple of other shows Judy was sort of a semi-comedienne. She made faces and jumped around quite

a bit. On our present show she's pretty much herself. I keep hoping our viewers will understand and not wish to see her cut too many didoes. I think she's a pretty cute little gal as is. Judy is too critical about her ballads. She sang nothing but ballads and semi-classics for years, but since singing the "let your hair down" songs she feels that she doesn't sing ballads as well as she should. I think she does. I see her lower lip tremble a little now and then while she's singing a sentimental song, but in my opinion she puts a lotta feeling in 'em. She's just scared.

JUDY: I think Merle is great but he's always complaining he can't do anything really good. We try to give each other constructive criticism but take it as easy as possible. At least, Merle does with me, for, as he puts it, I often react like a "sore-tailed cat." I have a tendency to keep going till it's all done but he's gradually teaching me that "all work and no play makes a real dull mama."

DUDE: In my opinion, my wife is the number-one personality and song stylist in TV today. As producer of my show, on many occasions I give my wife constructive criticism. We disagree mainly about my wife's inability to be ready on time. In other words, she's a typical woman—a slowpoke.

SUE: I think Dude is the greatest salesman in the world. He also has

a tremendous knack for spotting talent and showing it off to the best advantage. He is one of the warmest, friendliest personalities on TV. We definitely exchange constructive criticism—and where I'm concerned, Dude pulls no punches. I like it that way. As for my being a slowpoke, men just don't seem to understand.

What do you disagree about at home? How do you settle arguments? And does having to do a TV show force you to be friendly towards one another even when you have a "peeve" on?

MERLE: I'm basically lazy. When I've spent twelve or thirteen hours calling guests, timing songs, clearing music for telecasts, driving to and from the studio, doing the show, memorizing lyrics, and other odds and ends I like to drop it all and draw cartoons or read magazines. But I'm apt at such times to find Judy knee-deep in phone calls or planning new programs. My gripe is, "Why don't you let that go for a while and relax?" Her comeback is always, "It's gotta be done." This is

the way we settle arguments—she works and I go to bed. So far we haven't had the pleasure of going on TV with a peeve on.

JUDY: We disagree about the usual things. I can always see a better and easier way for him to do his work and he can't see why keeping house and planning meals should be such a chore. We usually settle our spats by doing something else until we have calmed down and half the time we wind up laughing at one another for getting so upset over nothing. I doubt that we've actually ever done a show with a "peeve" on for neither one of us seems able to do anything at all if we're disagreeing about something. We either forget about it by show time or just plain ole kiss and make up.

DUDE: We disagree about nothing more exciting than "Who left the cap off the toothpaste?" We usually settle arguments by talking things out until some sort of an agreement is reached. Very often when we are having a minor tiff, we put it to one side during the rehearsal and per-

formance of the TV show, after which we find it difficult to recall what we were arguing about.

SUE: We argue about leaving doors open, hanging clothes on the floor, etc. We talk things over thoroughly and reach an agreement. As Dude has said we often forget after a show what we were upset about—And I doubt if it would mean anything even if we could remember.

Do you feel husbands and wives can work together and still have a happy home life or does being together too much cause friction?

MERLE: I can't see why a feller and his wife can't work together and not get into squabbles. Our little champin'-at-the-bit sessions don't come from being together too much. They're more apt to come about whether or not coffee addicts are first cousins to alcoholics. (Some of my best friends drink coffee.)

JUDY: I don't see why not. If a husband and wife can live through all the trials of marriage, they certainly ought to get along working together. Either one takes a lot of love and consideration.

DUDE: I can only speak for our marriage. On the day of our final show our relationship becomes one of producer and talent, rather than husband and wife, and since we are both absorbed in our show chores it's almost as though we had been away from each other for the day. After the show is out of the way we revert to our status of man and wife. The result is we are not conscious of being with each other constantly—therefore, no friction.

SUE: Like Dude, I can only speak for our marriage. When we're doing a show, Dude is my boss. It's as though we were two different people. Then after the show we are again man and wife—and it's nice to be together after a hard day's work. No friction.

"The Larry Storch Show"

KNXT, Saturday, 8 p.m.

Larry Storch took on the difficult chore of filling **Jackie Gleason's** shoes during the summer months—and he did all right by himself on the debut offering.

This man has his own individual comedy style that should augur well for his future. He is not brash or cocky, and he possesses a quality not always found in comedians—humility. That he has plenty of talent is undeniable.

The first show, however, was spotty. **Storch's** routines were standouts when he was doing them solo, but when he

got into skits he was slightly overcome by material that wasn't too brilliant. The little boy in the clothing store skit went on too long and the sailor routine just didn't come off. Here was a perfect example of completely uninspired writing. Each gag was telegraphed miles in advance and only **Storch's** personality kept one from switching to another channel. **Robert Merrill** was, however, a pleasant guest star.

The ending of the show really fell on its face. Not only did a chorine in the back line get all mixed up, resembling an out-and-out amateur, but somewhere along the line the timing went off, for the telecast ran about three minutes short. To fill in the time, the sign-off music was played over and over, **Larry** kept coming back for another "good night," and viewers were subjected to endless repeats of "The Larry Storch Show is a CBS Television Network Production." You almost believed it was after a while. Some heads must have rolled for this mess.

The **Larry Storch Show** is recommended simply because of its star. He can ring a few bells given some material.—J.H.

Your Play Time

CBS-TV, Sundays 10 p.m.

"Your Play Time" takes the place of "Bachelor's Haven," so anything would look good in comparison. However, if the first play, "Counter Plot," is an example of the kind of dramatic fare to be offered on this show, the future of the series looks very shaky.

John Hudson and **Mari Aldon** were involved in one of those Commie intrigue plots that should have been left on the counter. The plot was obvious from the beginning; it was played with all the subtlety of a two-ton truck hitting an MG; and the dialogue was full of all the melodramatic cliches.

Maybe the future shows will be an improvement. If not, don't dash to Channel 2 Sundays at 10. Read a book.—J.H.

The Carmen Cavallaro Show

KNXT, Fridays, 10 p.m.

Carmen Cavallaro is being billed as the "poet of the piano," and judging by the way he makes his melodic rhythms talk the billing isn't far wrong.

Here, is an unpretentious but delightful musical half hour with **Cavallaro's** expert keyboard work a real delight. He may over-arrange a few numbers, particularly the occasional classics he does, but he is definitely a personality to watch. He makes no pretense to be a charm boy. Instead, he just plays the music almost everyone loves and does it in a thoroughly acceptable manner.

The comparisons between **Liberace** and **Cavallaro** are, of course, inevitable, and this review is not going to go into any discussion of the comparative musical talents of the two. Both are delivering shows the public likes. As to personalities, the choice is between **Liberace's** emphasis on personality and **Cavallaro's** more restrained style. On this basis, **Liberace** may emerge as the better showman.

If it's good music you want, catch this show. It's apt to wind up a real winner.

A bow is due to the lighting on the program too. It does much to create effective moods for **Carmen's** often moody numbers.—J.H.

"Follow the Leader"

Tuesday (Alternate), 9:00 p.m.

"Follow the Leader" brings **Vera Vague** back into the limelight and into TV for the first time. It's a shame this very amusing and talented lady couldn't have been given something better than this show.

The gimmick used here, that of having a contestant imitate all the actions **Vera** makes in a skit and presenting obstacles to the contestant, is somewhat novel—at least for TV. But once the first skit has been done the surprise element is gone. From then on the rest of the show seems interminably long and repetitious.

It's difficult to see how this one can last—simply because it has so little in it to sustain continued interest. Even in its present alternate Tuesdays time slot, it's going to have rough going. There's just not enough here for a full-bodied show. This baby needs a lot of changing.

Too bad, **Vera Vague**. You're a clever gal. And you'll find your TV show. We're just afraid "Follow the Leader" isn't it.—J.H.

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

Have you caught **Julius La Rosa's** frantic antics on the **Arthur Godfrey Show** recently during **Arthur's** absence? Who is he trying to impress with his crazy, nervous, zorch, hep talk? This may be fine for his teenage following, but what about the older folks who are probably viewing the shenanigans with something akin to disgust. You have to play to all your audience, **Mr. La Rosa**.

Good news: **Leland Hayward**, who did such a sensational job of producing the **Ford 50th Anniversary Show**, has been signed by **NBC-TV** to produce shows for the network. This is a move most of us fondly hoped would happen.

From the Mail Bag: to **Mrs. Martha G. Raymond**—your views on entertainment on TV are heartily shared and your difficulty in getting your scripts to the right sources is an unfortunate thing. Maybe some day producers will honestly and conscientiously pay attention to new talent and not slough it off; to **Mrs. Eda Speckman:** Panel shows indeed are becoming a great, big, fat bore. But instead of decreasing in number, stations are adding more—and all are pale carbon copies of the few top-ranking originals; to **Mrs. James Marshall:** the report on the **American Research Bureau** you received sounds interesting and a copy would be welcome. It's good to know that some of these surveys are really trying to do a job; to **Jack Murphy:** We're a **Joan Leslie** fan too.

There's been something bothering us—and it's simply that we can't help wondering if there aren't getting to be too many "glamorizing" shows. There's nothing wrong with making over a rather dowdy woman but why so much emphasis on the subject? Isn't glamour basically something

that must come from the heart first? Is glamour nothing but cosmetics and reducing? There have been many women who were certainly no raving beauties and whose figures didn't resemble **Lana Turner's** but they had glamour. TV is accentuating the superficial too much. And in a way it's making women look just a little ridiculous. **Rita LaRoy** has been doing okay with her show because she does more than a rejuvenation job. Wouldn't it be good to combine these glamour shows with a little constructive advice to women on how to lead a more purposeful life?

Mary Field turned in a nice job on **Chevron Theatre's** "Death of a Smart Aleck" last week. And this in spite of a script that had enough holes in it through which to drive a two-ton truck. Her underplaying in the face of some corny scenes was something other performers should learn.

It's just a hunch but don't be surprised if two of the hottest TV shows come fall are **Joan Caulfield's** "My Favorite Husband" and **Ray Milland's** "Meet Mr. McNutley." Both have had good advance notices and they're two fine performers.

KNBH's "It's Up to You" show, designed to help handicapped people, is a very worthwhile venture. Here is an expert example of what TV can do to be of real public service.

Thought for the future: Why don't TV stars and directors take one promising person each and help him, as their proteges, to get a start in this business? What a treasure house of good talent for tomorrow could be formed in this way. There's too much being said about the medium's wanting new talent and too little being done to go out and find it and develop it. Get off your words, boys, and get into some action.



Lifelines

HER REAL NAME IS EMMA HELEN, but they call her "Bunny" Bode. It seems to fit. Bunny, who co-produces NBC's "Breakfast in Hollywood" with Ralph Hunter, derives so much pleasure from her work that she actually hates to have week ends roll around. Her boss, Chet Mittendorf, says Bunny is a perfect example of the woman who can do a man's job and do it better in many instances. He thinks a woman is better than many a man at evaluating participants and that the feminine approach to children and the elderly is often more effective.

BUNNY HAS BEEN IN RADIO SINCE 1949, can be her own secretary if she has to, acquits herself neatly as a public-relations contact and is extremely clever at lining up "loot" for the show. It's not unusual for her to get a rebuff from some hard-crusted guy unwilling to part with a prize or two, but often as not when Bunny Bode finishes talking with him, the fellow is apologizing to her and promising all sorts of stuff. "She's a bulldog when there's something to fight for," according to Mittendorf. Bunny carries the same enthusiasm into the actual broadcast. Recently she got so carried away onstage that she almost fell into the audience's laps.

BUNNY WAS "BULLDOGGISH" about breaking the program with community singing and wanted Heidt winner Johnny Mungall to lead it. Her judgment proved sound, and what's

more, Mungall is now auditioning his own NBC radio show, "That's My Song." Bunny's motto is "The difficult we do with ease; the impossible takes a little longer."

HEADLINES STATED LAST WEEK THAT CBS had "yielded in fight over color TV system." This means that a "compatible" system (one which you can receive in black and white on your present set without any gadget added) will be the one. You'll have to add a converter to your present set to receive in color. Already CBS has announced that beginning September 15 it will be telecasting in color on the network, using selected unsponsored shows for color experimentation. However, it'll be about a year before any appreciable color will spark viewers' eyes. I'll bet one of the most colorful stars will be Lucy Arnaz.

MARVIN BRYAN, AN AWFULLY GOOD LOOKING young actor with six feet two to make him more impressive, told me the other day that radio acting is much more difficult than TV acting because so much more is required of one in radio, while in TV, "if you look the part and can remember your lines, you're in." Marvin is unusual because he has managed to crack radio and TV since February of 1952, but before that he had stashed away lots of know-how in legitimate-

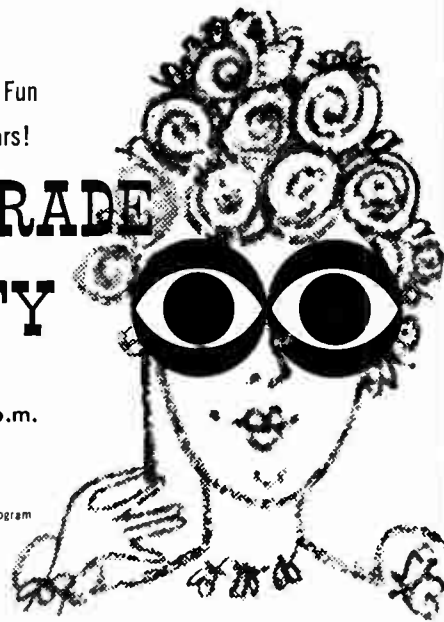

stage appearances and in many movies. This Wednesday night on CBS's "Dr. Christian" he's got his teeth into a succulent role—that of a young, intolerant minister—and Marvin's part is nice and thick because there are only four in the cast.

TO GIVE YOU AN IDEA OF WHAT RADIO requires of an actor, Marvin does character parts, leads, juveniles and authentic dialects. He can't say too much for NBC producer **Andy Love**, who gave him his first big break. (The part called for Polish dialect, which Marvin didn't know, but upon discovering this fact at rehearsal time, he resourcefully faked with Russian, which he did know, and came through okay.) "Lux" producer **Earl Ebi** is another for whom Marvin has praise because Ebi let Bryan tackle a one-hour role.

Wednesday's broadcast will be Marvin's first "Dr. Christian," so add Producer **Neil Reagan's** name to those of Love and Ebi.

I THINK THAT IF ANYONE BELIEVES someone is Commie-biased, he

shouldn't sound off in print without naming names. He should take the matter up with the F.B.I. BEST IN ALBUMS: MGM sound-track recordings grab the spotlight on a pair of long-playing items this week. For the drama lover, there's almost a full-length version of William Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar," starring Marlon Brando, James Mason, John Gielgud, Louis Calhern, Edmond O'Brien, Greer Garson and Deborah Kerr. Making this album doubly enjoyable is the fact that every star heard in this presentation is a Shakespearean actor first, and a motion-picture star second—and the dialogue is no re-write, but Shakespeare's exact wordage. In contrast to heavy drama, there's a great musical treat in "The Band Wagon," featuring the voices of Fred Astaire, Nanette Fabray, Jack Buchanan and India Adams (voice double for Cyd Charisse). New and old Schwartz-Dietz songs have a freshness and interest that are as listenable to hear as they are to watch on the screen. Get on board "The Band Wagon"—you'll enjoy every minute of Broadway brought to your home in its sparkling music.



TOPS IN SINGLES: Jane Wyman (Decca) does fair enough on the torchy "It Was Great While It Lasted," but the rhythmic "I'm Takin' a Slow Burn" gets the nod on these tunes from her latest flicker.

Sauter-Finegan Orchestra (RCA-Victor) comes up with a smooth pair of dance-discs in "The Moon Is Blue," with its sweet Sally Sweetland vocal, and the usual SF unusual treatment given an old-timer briskly titled just plain "O."

Nat "King" Cole (Capitol) has a pair of fine discings in "A Fool Was I" and "If Love Is Good to Me." Either could be a top hit as ably backed with lush arrangements by Nelson Riddle.

Hottest thing on Coral this week is "The Glad Song," a happy, up-tempo'd ditty by **Don Cornell** and **Teresa Brewer** that's mighty contagious listening with plenty of hit potential.

Al "Jazzbo" Collins (Brunswick) tells the stories of "Little Red Riding Hood" and the "Three Little Pigs" in real cool fashion, but the most credit should go to **Steve Allen** for writing these Grimm fairy tales for hip kids; they're clever and strictly for laughs as told against a meandering piano background.

Mindy Carson (Columbia) has a top rhythmic novelty in "Honey Darlin'"—and if you want to pick up some loose change, the featured instrument is NOT a flute (it's an orkon, says Weston).

Ames Brothers debut on RCA-Victor with a pair of goodies tailored to order for this vocal foursome, "You, You, You" and the tap-tempo'd "Once Upon a Tune."

(P.S. Watch for a new RCA-Victor album by the Sexsational Ertha Kitt in multi-lingo—and a new Decca collection by Bing Crosby with rhythm that'll be tops. . . A.M.)

TV REPAIR FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Television repairs can be expensive. We interviewed E. Clinard, President of Television Industries, 4031 Wilshire Blvd., whose experience and reputation place him in the position of offering reliable advice our readers can depend upon. These are tips direct from Mr. Clinard.

1. Most customers fail to understand that only the parts provided and specific work performed on set are guaranteed.

2. The average TV set owner, based on statistics now available, will require three to four service calls yearly, with at least one major breakdown, including such failures as power transformer, picture tube, tuner, etc.

3. Small tubes can and do go out at any time, are usually responsible for either sound or picture or both going out about 80% of the time. The service man cannot anticipate a small tube failure and often the set is working perfectly while he is there and an hour later another tube may go, requiring another service call to the home, and an additional home charge to the customer.

4. The service technician is routed, and usually he cannot pinpoint the exact time he can be at the customer's home, inasmuch as he has no idea how much time he must spend on the sets prior to his arrival.

5. One other problem that is not generally understood by the public—and this applies especially to shop repairs—is the difficulty in giving an accurate estimate of the cost, for curiously enough, most of the bench time is spent on diagnosing the trouble. For example, a 59c resistor may require only two minutes to solder in and replace BUT require three or four hours to run down that particular resistor which may have lost some of its value.

6. There is a problem known in the trade called **INTERMITTENT TROUBLE.** This usually means that the set may perform perfectly, but go off or act up after it has been playing for an hour or two. While the set is working perfectly it is impossible to locate the trouble even with the best of instruments. Hence, the repairman, in order to diagnose this intermittent trouble, must actually see the set acting up. In many cases the set is OK while the man is there BUT, as he has other calls to make he, of course, cannot relax for two or three hours waiting for this particular intermittent trouble to develop. His only alternative is to bring the set into the shop so that it may be cooked and watched. This is only an example of one of the granddaddies of all headaches, which all service companies find hard to explain to set owners.

It is regrettable that the public has been abused and overcharged due to their lack of knowledge regarding the technical end of TV. However, the majority of TV companies are honest and are striving to better the relationship and understanding between the Service Company and the Customer.

Radio in Review

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

News of KBIG's News

Arguments as to whether radio or television presents the best in newscasts are as varied as they are long. However, when an independent station achieves an award for the best radio news reporting in a local area, arguments stop and interest is aroused as to how an "indie" met network competition.

KBIG was judged as having the best radio news reporting of any non-network station by the Radio-TV News Club of Southern California, a group of professional newscasters. Program director and newscaster Alan Lisser and his staff are responsible for the year-old station winning this award. Their news format is not a matter of chance, it's the result of a careful survey.

Because no other station in this locality presented news twenty-five minutes after the hour, KBIG decided that this would be a good time slot for their reporting. It also coincides with the working habits of a great many people, who have to be on their jobs at eight or nine in the morning. Usually they are driving to their destinations at twenty-five minutes past the hour and it is more than likely that they are listening to their car radios. So much for their preferred time slot.

Even though the duration of the newscasts is but 300 seconds, all of the news is rewritten and edited before going on the air. Larry Berrill and Margee Phillips are responsible for making that ticker news sound different. And just to make sure the listener is keeping up with the latest news developments, brief news items are interspersed with KBIG's sweet music every fifteen minutes.

After delving into the station's news format we can readily understand why they received their just award.

Don't get me wrong. I love baseball. But I think even Ford Frick himself would have to admit that there are times when things get pretty dull on the diamond.

There's them lazy chuckers who take forever and a day between pitches. Those in-between-inning lulls.



And a thousand-and-one items that slow up the game. On radio, these lags become pretty irritating at times.

Unless it's a World Series contest, or a "croocial" game, I think even the most ardent of baseball fans has a pretty tough time of it staying glued

to his set and following every pitch.

For this particular reason, I have always enjoyed listening to KHJ's "Game of the Day" on radio. True, they come pretty late at night (starting at 11:10 p.m.), and you usually know the outcome, but for lots of action, and few annoying commercials, these Mutual-Don Lee broadcasts are tough to beat.

The average baseball broadcast lasts from two to three hours. These games are done in exactly one hour and thirty minutes. Having wondered how they are actually done, I dropped by the KHJ studios last week and watched the boys work.

These games are not re-creations, such as are heard on KMPC, and when the Angels and Stars are playing away from home. They are the real McCoy.

When you hear the voices of Dizzy Dean, Gene Kirby and Al Helfer from ball parks all over the nation, you are hearing them exactly as it happened earlier that afternoon.

Here in the Los Angeles studios at 1313 North Vine Street, the entire broadcast is recorded on tape. That's easily done. The big job is to cut a three-hour show in half—without losing any of the essential details.

This is the painstaking job of Chuck Benedict and the other men who help him out—Bill Mouzis, Johnny Phillips, Bill Lambeth, Wynn Stewart, and Carl Bonawitz.

As Chuck said: "To go into all the details of just how we do it would take me three weeks to explain." So I won't even attempt it.

This alone should be enough to convince you of the great effort put into this operation: Chuck and the boys, both on tape and on paper, have to keep track of each and every pitch of the game. Almost each and every word, in fact, so that they don't miss any of the cues from ole Diz or Helfer or Kirby.

Incidentally, Chuck and his co-workers are unanimous in their opinion of Page Thirty-eight

Ray was with Stu Hamblen's musical aggregation for seven years. He also appeared on the Al Pearce radio show. He was seen on Broadway in the smash hit "Winged Victory." Ray has been Cliffie's vocal arranger since 1935. He coaches Molly Bee and does all the arrangements for both the radio and TV versions of "Hometown."

George Bruns

The band's trombonist is George Bruns, who doubles on the piano, bass, tuba, vibes and trumpet. George was musical director at KEX-ABC in Portland. He had his own twenty-two-piece band for five years. He has scored and directed the orchestra on six UPA shorts. George started to study engineering but switched to music. His wife is Jeannie Gayle the singer.

Billy Strange

Guitarist Billy Strange starred with his father, George, when he was five years old on the latter's "Memory Ranch" program over KGER, Long Beach. Billy has appeared with Hank

Penny and Spade Cooley, and is also a Capitol recording artist.

Harold Hensley

Fiddle player Harold Hensley studied at the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music. He has been staff musician on at least a half-dozen radio stations throughout the south including WSM, the "Grand Ole Opry" station in Nashville, Tennessee.

Roy Harie

Roy is a drummer from way back. He studied the tom-toms at the Juillard School of Music in New York. He has played with such bands as Les Brown, Bobby Sherwood, Frank DeVol, Muggsy Spanier and Jerry Wald, to name but a few. He is a free-lance recording artist and owns a drum shop, school and factory on Santa Monica Boulevard, which is appropriately dubbed "Drum City."

Billy Liebert

Billy is the musical director and conductor of the "Hometown Jamboree" band. He learned how to play the accordion when he was nine and went on a vaudeville tour at sixteen. He played at Billy Berg's when it was the town's hot spot. Billy graduated from the Alhambra School of Music in Detroit and is currently studying at the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music.

Jimmy Bryant

In addition to being a top guitarist, Jimmy is also hep on the violin and bass. He took lessons from Rubinoff. He played the Chicago World's Fair; toured with Major Bowes; traveled with his father on vaudeville circuit for seven years. He was associated with Roy Rogers and played the "Grand Ole Opry."

Larry Tice

Larry, the clarinetist, studied under the concert master of the St. Louis Symphony. He has played with Vincent Lopez and Paul Whiteman. He was one of the original members in the Red Nichols and Five Pennies aggregation. Larry has added the clear note of his horn to many of the top radio shows during the past ten years. He's a free-lance recording artist and in addition to the clarinet he also plays the flute and violin.

Speedy West

Speedy is just what his name implies. He is self-taught and has been playing for only seven years. Yet he has backed more than ninety-seven vocalists on all various labels. Oh yes, he plays the steel guitar and does it so well that he's under contract to Capitol.

Al Williams

Bass player Al Williams has been plucking those strings for many years. He studied at the Chicago Conservatory of Music and currently is a member of the Burbank Symphony Orchestra. Al was with CBS for four years and in addition has played with many name pop bands.

Les Taylor

Les has been tickling the ivories for seventeen years. He holds a masters degree in music and teaches at his alma mater, the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music.

There you have "Hometown Jamboree's" staunch eleven. All good musicians and enough of them for Cliffie to organize a football team if people ever grow tired of music, which doesn't seem a likely possibility.

WHAT Faith MEANS TO ME

Jimmy Wakely, CBS radio's popular star, has found where his strength comes from. What he learned others can find if they only will look for it

WITHOUT THE FAITH that has guided him throughout his life, Jimmy Wakely, CBS's popular star, might never have attained such success.

CHRIST SET the greatest example of faith the world has ever known. His faith through the sojourn of death so completely overshadows anything we mortals can do that we feel insignificant in comparison. All we can hope to do is to try to live as Christlike a life as possible.

I have tried to live by faith. It has been the guide in my life. It hasn't been a thing I have turned on and off to suit my convenience, but rather it has been my deepest influence. That's why I was so happy to receive so many letters when I went off TV recently from fans who said they had found a real spiritual message in my program. Since I have never tried to commercialize religion on my show, I was glad to know that in some ways we had managed to bring an honest religious feeling.

My heart is in my faith—and that is why I am so violently opposed to hypocrisy and commercialization of religion. The only thing that has kept me from singling out at least mentally those who are making a racket out of God's word is the Bible quotation which reads: "Judge not, lest ye be judged." But it still makes me burn when I see anyone tie up anything as serious as God with a dollar sign. To help promote a truly religious movement I recently became interested in and have done work for the Conference of Christians and Jews.

This organization has done fine things—and one of its finest accomplishments is its fight against discrimination. To discriminate against anyone is definitely un-Christian. Those who set themselves up as better than others should again read the words of Christ. In them they will find real tolerance.

Golden Rule

My favorite guide in life is little else than the Golden Rule. To learn to think not of self but of others is humanly difficult but very worthwhile. Selfishness never leads to happiness. There is also a real thrill in discovering the joy that comes from learning to do unto others as you would like them to do unto you.

When you cast your bread upon the waters it comes back to you in several forms. The good you create goes far. I have had many experiences to prove this.

Some time ago I was going to New York. I asked an agent I knew to go with me, but he said he couldn't leave until a check he was waiting for arrived. I knew he wasn't expecting any check, so I told him I needed his help on the trip and that I'd pay all his expenses.

When we got to New York we went to Hutton's Restaurant one night. A disc jockey at the place came over and interviewed us. After the show we were amazed to see Milton Berle come in and introduce himself to us. I say amazed because for weeks my agents had been trying to get me on Milton's show. To be on a Berle program was the most important break that could happen to a performer then. But nobody could get anywhere near him. And now here he was at our table.

He told us he had heard the show and wanted to know when I could appear on his program. I quickly answered, "Any time!" And I did the show a few weeks later.

That wasn't all. From the New York trip my friend got a good position and is now a producer in the East for a big company's TV and radio productions.

Career

I got into show business through

my religious work. I was just a young kid in Oklahoma when I first made contact with what was known as "singing schools." These were church choral groups that went to various towns to sing. The teacher of one of these groups hired me to go along with him to play the piano and later I became a teacher myself. I was both choir leader and instructor of several choirs.

From my work here I got into radio. And from my first appearance on the air until now I have almost always closed every show with a hymn—because I felt this was important.

I think show people, because of their great influence on others, can do much towards bringing a deep spiritual feeling to the world. If they would put just a little emphasis on faith in whatever they do, think of the effect it would have on everyone!

Faith Needed

These are days when we all need a strong faith. And yet, there comes a time in everyone's life when problems come up for which we as human beings have no answer. Then we turn to the only help possible—God. It is His will that we be blessed and not punished, but we can do nothing without realizing our weaknesses and without admitting that we must rely on His strength. To gain all God intended us to gain, we must hold on to faith. It has helped me, at least, many a time when I was about to fall. And it can help you if you'll give it a try.

Do Singers Resent Their Cowboy Clothes ?

"No," Says Tex Williams

WHEN YOU see a "Western" character walk down the street of a modern city, what do you do? You stare, don't you?

You can't help noticing the big boots, the crazy-colored shirts and ties, the fancy pants, and the wide-brimmed hats. Sometimes you might even smile and point at him.

Have you ever thought what goes through the minds of these Western performers when you do that?

Tex Williams knows.

"I should. I've been one of those fellows myself for many years. And I can tell you quite truthfully that some of the boys in the Western field (and I'm not talking about the great majority) are a little bit ashamed of the way they look and dress. They feel inferior, especially in such a place as Hollywood."

An Example

"I know of one cowboy entertainer—one of the very best and most popular—who has felt this way for years. As a matter of fact, at one time he tried to break away from the Western style. He decided to

switch completely to the 'pop' field. Well, it only took about six months for him to go back to his old routine. He just couldn't draw the crowds as he did with his cowboy style. And a guy has to eat.

"As for myself, I don't mind dressing up. After all, this field of entertainment has been very good to me. I owe it everything I have.

"There's other things to consider, too. As a whole, and I'm speaking generally now, I think you'll find that the man who is in the Western field of entertainment is by and large a much more natural and sincere person than some of the phonies in show business.

"For the most part, we come from small towns in the Midwest and Southwest. We know what it means to be a good neighbor.

"Also, in our business, and particularly for the friendly type of audience who like our music, we have a great deal of personal contact with the people. You can't act in front of them. If you are not yourself, they will sense it right away."

Tex Williams should know what he's talking about. He's been one of

the top men in his field for many years. He made his professional debut on a Decatur, Illinois, radio station at the age of thirteen. He later played with Spade Cooley. In 1947, his "Smoke, Smoke, Smoke" (nearly two million copies sold) was the greatest single record he ever made.

Tex Today

Today his TV and radio shows, personal appearances, movies, and recording dates keep him plenty busy. His TV show, which started September 8, 1952, and originates from Knott's Perry Farm each Sunday, is one of KNBH's top programs. Smokey Rogers, Terrea Lea, Nancy Wible and Candy, Jimmy Widener, and the Colwell Brothers make up the rest of Tex's cast. In addition they can also be heard on NBC radio on Saturday night.

"Now that I think of it," continued Tex, "I've been dressing up too much like a city-man myself, lately.

"I'm proud of the work I do and the field of entertainment I represent. Let the people stare at me. When they stop staring, and stop pointing, that's when I'll really start worrying."

DISHEARTENINGLY, you've heard and read a great deal about juvenile delinquency. But what have you done about it? Just shrugged your shoulders?

Not so for Hazel and Homer Garrett . . . they've substituted action for words. They became interested in square dancing because of their daughter Jeanette, who loved to do-si-do but could never find enough teen-agers to make up a round. Thereupon the Garretts organized their own group of square dancers with mom and pop on the teaching end.

Homer Garrett, a former cabinet maker, is the manager and caller for the Y-Knot Twirlers, as they call their group. His wife, Hazel, is the "den mother." She makes all of the costumes for the group. Because she has made interchangeable yokes for the boys' shirts the "kids" affectionately dubbed her "quick-change Hazel."

The Y-Knots caught on like the proverbial prairie fire. Teen-agers throughout the city were eager to join the Garrett family. Jeanette, nineteen, Ralph, sixteen, and Sharon, thirteen, in the fun. Not only was the dancing fun, but it helped develop character and polished up the social graces.

The Y-Knots represent a group of twenty happy, active, wholesome youngsters. They are between thirteen and nineteen and no smoking or drinking is permitted by any member of the group. They are learning good citizenship through dancing and are a credit to their community.

Combat Delinquency

When the Garretts embarked upon their square dancing they hadn't the vaguest notion that they were going to cause such a stir. The popularity of their "Western Varieties" show is one thing but when the City Fathers take them under their

wing that's quite another story. The City's Department of Parks is so enthused with the interest the Y-Knots have created among teen-agers that they have offered park facilities to the Garretts so that they can teach new groups how to allemand left and allemand right. It is a generally accepted theory that well planned recreation helps prevent juvenile delinquency. Aware of this fact are the playground directors, who flourish a welcome sign for the Garretts and their square dancing.

"Because," as one director summed it up: "It can sure keep a pack of kids out of a peck of trouble."

HAPPY, WHOLESOME TEEN-AGERS are the Y-Knot Twirlers, stars of KTLA's "Western Varieties." No matter where they entertain, they urge teen-agers of that community to form their own square-dance groups and see for themselves how much fun it can be.

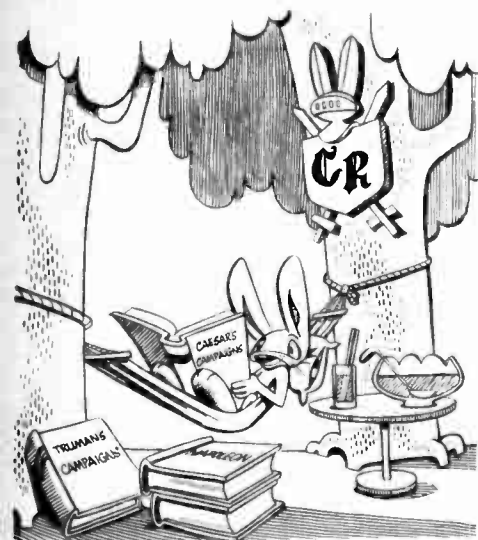

PICK of the PIX

I'd like to dedicate this column to Miss Nancy McClure, who has the onerous task of finding out for me each week just which movies are to be shown on television. She does a wonderful job . . . I can't thank her enough . . . and any mistakes found in this space are all her fault.

"Rocket Ship XM." (5) Aug. 2, 7:30. Produced only a few years ago, this was the first in the current cycle of science-fiction movies and is one of the best as far as theme is concerned. Four men and a woman take off for the moon and have all kinds of trouble with meteors, gravity, loose steroid stabilizers and what not before they finally make it. On the moon they encounter some savages who are all that's left of an advanced civilization destroyed by atomic warfare . . . an idea which generates quite a lot of impact, I think. With Lloyd Bridges, John Emery and Osa Massen.

"The Iron Duke." (7) Aug. 6, 9:00. Napoleon finally came a cropper at Waterloo and the British general who croppered him was Wellington, "The Iron Duke," played here by the late, peerless George Arliss. This is the story of that military triumph and debacle and is a good picture even if it was made in 1935.



"My Brother's Keeper." (7) Aug. 7, 11:00. This is a picture with a message, as indicated by its title, and I heartily endorse it. Jack Warner is an ex-convict who tries to go straight but has an impossible time of it and returns to a life of crime. Most of the action of the film is concerned with a great manhunt, and the denouement, which shows Warner striding into a mine field in an effort to escape, is very potent indeed.

"Dishonored Lady." (11) Aug. 4, 9:00. Hedy Lamarr falls in love with Dennis O'Keefe, an honorable research scientist, but it seems she has a rather sleazy past and it all comes out when she has to stand trial for the murder of John Loder. Is Hedy acquitted? Does Dennis stick by her? Is Loder really dead? Is this picture a masterpiece? The answer to all these questions except the last is in the affirmative.

"The Housekeeper's Daughter." (7) Aug. 3, 10:45. Here is a pretty funny Hal Roach comedy made not more than ten or twelve years ago about a fellow who goes about poisoning people because they're not nice people. Before the menace is finally captured amid a welter of dead bodies, romance has blossomed between Joan Bennett and John Hubbard. Victor Mature has made his first hit in pictures, and Adolphe Menjou and William Gargan have had a pyrotechnic duel with roman candles.

"Left Over Ladies." (7) Aug. 5, 10:45. Have to take pot luck, I guess.
