The Moment That Changed the Life of Sam Hayes



▲ KHJ's SAM HAYES is having a gay time at one of California's big fiestas at Santa Barbara. Back in 1929, however, during the depression, things looked pretty dark and grim for the now happy Hayes. That was the year that changed Sam Hayes' life, and this is the first time the story has ever been told.

THERE IS nothing too unusual about the moment that changed my life. It was the same moment that affected millions of people. It was the depression of 1929.

In 1929 I was playing stock in San Francisco. The "heavy" roles were my specialty. Like so many other persons, particularly actors, I found myself out of a job. I was in a tough spot. My wife was pregnant, and I just had to have work.

A friend of mine told me to try radio. So, one Saturday afternoon I took a trip to the NBC studios in the Hunter-Doolin building in Frisco.

Hayes Replaces Heyes

The officials there gave me a prepared script to read. I asked them if they would mind if I did a part from one of the plays I performed in pre-

viously. I shall never forget it. It was the opening speech by the attorney in the play, "The Trial of Mary Dugan."

By an odd coincidence, there was a man by the name of Herbert Heyes (he pronounced his last name the same as mine) at the station who was playing a role in the radio drama, "The Earl of Warwick." By an even odder coincidence, Heyes left that very same Saturday to take a job in Hollywood.

Since I was right there at the studio, and since I suppose they liked my work, they asked me to take over his role. It was a case of one Hayes taking over for another.

I have been in radio ever since. Up until 1930, I did mainly dramatic roles. Then, in April, 1931, I did my first steady, sponsored news show.

News reporting has been my business ever since. My present broad-

cast is heard twice daily, Monday through Friday, on over one-hundred and fifty stations for the Mutual-Don Lee and Inter-Mountain networks.

Plane Crash

Although it was a moment which did not appreciably change my life, there was one other day which I shall never forget. It was October 1, 1949.

At 9:15 on that memorable night, a plane in which I was a passenger with five other people, ran out of gas. It crashed on Beverly Blvd. Buddy Clark was killed in that crash.

I was the only person who was not knocked unconscious. They took me to the Georgia Street hospital. I had a news show to do that night. When I went on, I gave a first hand report of my own crash. It was a "scoop," but I hope I never have to go through it again.



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usual. But what makes this team outstanding is that not only do they produce their own pictures but they also have their own studio and, as part of United Television Programs, they have their own distribution set-up.

All this was accomplished in two years.

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"We had a nice dream but no money to back it up. It was about this time that the advertising agency handling the 'Big Town' live TV dramatic shows from New York was trying to convince the sponsors, Lever Bros., to do the series on film. Phil and I, among others, submitted a bid and were given the job. The plan was to experiment with twenty-six films. If, at the end of that time, the sponsor didn't like the idea of film, the series would revert to a 'live' production.

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This created a bit of a problem for Pat since he had to fly here to make a picture and then fly back to do a live show. Altogether, Pat has made 158 'Big Town' appearances.

"From the beginning, Phil and I looked forward to one thing—getting our own studio. We felt this was the best way to produce economically because we could, among other things, leave our sets standing and also have them already rigged—all lighting preparations made, in other words. We wanted every spare dollar to go on the screen.

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"I had never made a picture under a fifty day shooting schedule," Jack said, "but Phil had. We have no one in our organization now who hasn't been in the picture business—and every one of these people has been able to turn out quality product in the short time given for TV filming. Neither Phil nor I would be at all afraid now of putting out a quality motion picture in seven or eight days. In fact, we have plans to do that very thing now.

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just couldn't put our fingers on the trouble. We only know that it didn't feel right."

That was when Danny was doing stand-up comedy on a musical review program and was emulating the Danny Thomas of night clubs, theaters and hotels. And while the people who knew Danny from theaters, night clubs and hotels raved about his antics on the show and didn't miss a single hour-long program, those who were not familiar with the comedian didn't seem to get his message.

Although Danny wanted to get out of TV right then and there, the network heads insisted that he remain. They changed formats, revamped the cast and did everything to try to give the show a lift, but to no avail.

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New York's famed Music Hall Theater booked it for the Christmas week, and it was held over six weeks. A record for that theater and unique that for the first time in ten years or more, the Music Hall theater booked a black and white film instead of Technicolor during Christmas.

And again the television people came to Danny and pointed out that he was wrong. The public loved him and showed him proof that in places where Danny Thomas had never be-

Won't Make Again

fore been heard of, his picture was drawing capacity crowds and raves. But this only proved more and more to the comedian that he should never try to be the stand-up entertainer in television. He turned a deaf ear to all the video offers. At length, the new executives of the refinanced and revitalized American Broadcasting Company talked to Danny and told him they would give him the highest budget a situation show ever had (\$42,500 per half-hour program). The entertainer said he would think it over, and then the wheels began to turn. His problem had been a format in which to project himself to an au-

dience via a television screen. He knew he could do it on a motion picture screen. There was little or no difference between watching a theater screen or a home TV screen, and the idea hit him. A show based on the character he had played so successfully in pictures! He called Lou Edelman, the producer of his Warner Bros. films, and Mel Shavelson, the writer and creator of the character. He asked their opinion, and they told him it would be the greatest thing on television. The character was to be a composite of an entertainer, a comedian, a tragedian and a family man. For their plot, they borrowed eighteen

years of pages from Danny's own life story. In its final state, it appears on the ABC television network each Tuesday night under the title: "Make Room For Daddy." The story is of an entertainer who is torn between his career and his family and is forever trying to get them together. "This time," Danny smiles, "the feeling's right!"

Do Daytime Shows Insult Women?

THE LADIES LOVE THE MOORE crew cut—and the guy himself. Garry doesn't believe in treating his women fans as morons. He believes in playing up to their intelligence.

HE DOESN'T like to be called a comic. And he doesn't feel MC is the proper term for him either. Rather, he's a friend of the housewife, this crew-cut Garry Moore with the ever-present bow-tie and the wide grin.

"I don't really try to be funny," Garry confesses disarmingly. "I could never compete with a man like Jimmy Durante, whom I consider among the funniest of them all. Or Red Skelton or Edgar Bergen. They are all masters of timing, of editing. Coming into your homes as often as I do (Garry is on CBS television every Monday through Friday afternoon and on 'I've Got a Secret' every Thursday night, CBS-TV), I can't be an hilarious comic. Audiences would get tired of it, and I'd probably fall on my face from sheer exhaustion too. Every day can't be like New Year's Eve when you do a daytime program.

"And about that daytime show," Garry's tone became indignant, "I get very out of patience with people who look down at daytime audiences. What's the matter with the housewife's intelligence before the sun goes down? Think she puts her brain in storage and takes it out to soften like the butter, before serving dinner? I'm doing *exactly* the type of program I have always desired, since I've been in show business, and if

the viewers want me, I want to do this format for the rest of my life!"

The position Garry occupies in the hearts of his fans is indeed an unique one. He recalls with fascination the lady in Montreal who wrote that "Gran'pere" watched his program every day. He didn't understand a word of English—only French—but he liked to look at Garry. And so, for "Gran'pere," Garry learned a few sentences in French, and spoke to him on the program one day. The resultant thank-you letter was and still is one of Garry's most prized possessions.

When you attend a Garry Moore telecast at the giant CBS studio in New York, you're surprised at first at the number of men in the audience. They almost equal the women attendees. But two minutes after the program is on the air, your surprise vanishes along with any degree of seriousness you may have brought into the theatre with you.

Garry Moore's appeal is for the men as well as the women. He doesn't talk down to his audiences, and therein lies the secret of his success.

"We don't expect every woman in America to drop everything the moment our show comes on the air," Garry says with the frankness that characterizes his entire life. "We know she has work to do, and she wants to listen to us even though she

can't plop down on the living room sofa for an entire hour. So, when something visual is coming up, we say so. Give her a couple of minutes' warning to dry her hands, switch off the vacuum or whatever."

Where do the ideas on the Garry Moore show come from? From you, and you, and you—if you've written to him recently. Garry prizes highly the letters he gets from viewers. He studies them carefully en route to and from work, and he's frank to admit that when he and his writers are seeking new "gimmicks" for the program, he only has to ask once on the air, and voila, suggestions galore!

He's an easy-going fella, Garry Moore, on the surface, that is. Actually, he works like a couple of horses from nine to five, regular business hours, and many evenings a week too, reading books, articles, anything he feels might be of interest to you and which he can share on the air.

"You know what got the greatest response of all the shows we have done? When I read portions of a book for an entire half-hour," he divulges. "I had re-read the book the evening before, liked it so much I wanted everyone else to enjoy it. Maybe it wasn't visual, but it proved my point:

"The housewife likes to think during the day too, and she likes good entertainment which respects her intelligence. I hope to keep her confidence this way forever."

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Around TV Row

Dennis Day has decided that there's more than one way to capture an audience. In addition to putting on the best show he possibly can, he's introduced a \$5000 weekly contest. You've just got to watch the show to be eligible to win any of the loot, because questions are asked pertaining to the actual words used on the show. The contest is appropriately titled "Be Alert."

Bride and Groom is being dropped by CBS in favor of "Valliant Lady," a new TV soap opera. . . . The long-awaited **U. S. Steel Hour** makes its TV debut on ABC, October 27. The premiere telecast, "Prisoner of War," is an authentic story about repatriated GI's from Korea. . . .

Dave Willock opens his "Willock's Work Shop" at the end of the month in North Hollywood. For those of you who haven't caught his "do it yourself" telecast it's **Channel 5**, Tuesdays at 10:30 p.m.

KLAC-TV has inked **Cliffie Stone** to an exclusive contract. They've also revamped their programming to include telefilm series starring top name talent. . . .

NBC-TV's Opera Theatre bows locally early in November. The popular opera "Carmen" launches the season with **Verna Byrner** in the title role. . . . **Jack McCoy**, emcee of "Glamour Girl," has given himself the glamour treatment. He's minus his mustache but plus a toupee. . . . **Lee Wood**, former **KNXT** newscaster, is now seen on **Channel 9**. . . .

It's official now, after procrastinating for several seasons **Bing Crosby's** initial telefilm starts to roll in November. **CBS-TV** has set **December 27** as the premiere date. M.R.

CBS-TV Color

About 200 members of the press crowded into a specially prepared room at **New York's Waldorf Astoria**. They were seeing TV history being made—**color TV history**.

It was 1 p.m., **Eastern Standard Time**. **Ed Sullivan** stepped before the **CBS-TV** camera several blocks from the hotel, and emceed a half-hour variety show. The entire program was seen from coast-to-coast in black and white on the regular TV sets. At the **Waldorf**, the press corps watched the first major **CBS-TV** color program under the **National Television System Committee**. The newsmen who watched the color pictures were able to contrast the pictures with adjacent black-and-white sets. **Dr. Frank Stanton**, president of **CBS**, explained, "We are presenting our latest developments in the four major field of color TV—pick-

up equipment, color tubes, color receivers, and network programming."

The demonstration used four Chromacoder cameras, the first single-tube color cameras ever developed for pick-up with the NTSC system.

The boys from the press went back to their typewriters. They wrote their honest opinions. In general, they were not too impressed with what they saw. **The CBS-TV color system took a verbal beating**. They praised **CBS-TV** for the great strides it had made, but they complained about the shades of color, the "streaks," and a few other odds and ends.

TV-RADIO LIFE was also present at the special telecast. We saw what the "critics" saw; we read what the "critics" wrote. And we disagree with the sourpusses.

It was not a perfect color picture. But it was, and is, a great stride toward the perfection of TV color on a sound and practical and commercially profitable basis.

The primary concern of the TV public is simply this: How soon, and how much?

The answer: Mass production of the **CBS-TV** set is scheduled to begin in the **Fall of 1954**. By late **1955**, they should be available for the masses.

The cost: approximately thirty per cent higher than equivalent black-and-white sets.

The most gratifying thing about the whole question of color TV—finally,

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after years of haggling, some definite action is being taken. **CBS-TV** may, or may not, have the ultimate in color TV, but at least it has the initiative. T.H.

Hit or Miss?

Peter Potter has been playing his "hit" or "miss" game on **KNXT's "Juke Box Jury"** for quite some time now. Ever since its inception, Pete's show has been a definite "hit" on the local TV parade.

This fall Potter's "Jury" (called "**The Peter Potter Show**") appeared coast-to-coast on the **ABC-TV** network. It is still seen locally on **Channel 2**.

Although the **ABC-TV** production follows the old format pretty closely, some additions have been made in production and procedure to fulfill the desires of a nationwide audience. The local **KNXT** show is independently produced and is only seen in the **Los Angeles** area.

With a coast-to-coast audience, Pete was on the spot. Would his show be a "hit" or a "miss"? While in **New York** recently, a **TV-RADIO LIFE** reporter watched the **ABC-TV** show, read the reviews, and listened to what the public thought. The publicity buildup was tremendous.

It is our pleasure to report that **Potter's** show is a definite "hit" back **East**, just as it is out here. This week, we stopped by Pete's office on **Vine Street** and told him what we had heard.

In his usual, informal manner Pete remarked: "Be straight with me, man. I know we give the people out here what they want, we jumped from a 5 to a 24 rating in no time, but I'm wondering what the rest of the country, especially in **New York**, thinks about our show."

"Well, you know how your own program works, Pete," we replied. "The panel listens to a record for the very first time. Upon the basis of that first hearing they judge whether it will be a 'hit' or 'miss.' As you know, they are not right all the time, but for the most part their opinions have proven to be correct.

"Our first reports are that the **Peter Potter Show**, coast-to-coast has been sentenced to a 'hit.'"

As we left Pete's office, the platter parade man had that famous grin of his stretching from ear to ear. And well he should have. It looks like he finally has scored his first nationwide "hit."

Ear, Eye Inspire the Pen

Read your magazine faithfully every week and find it keeps me well informed—as a rule. What is the scoop on my favorite deejay Bill Anson of KFVB? He formerly had the Hollywood Bandstand program from 12:45 till 4:00 on that station; he also once had a TV show on KTTV called "Have a Heart."

Which he mentioned over the air recently as expecting to have again in the near future. However, not only has that failed to come up but now he seems to be off the radio. His last show was the Friday before Labor Day and no mention was made of him going on vacation or anything else yet he has never returned. Twice I called, for I liked his choice of music, his manner of presenting it, his kindness to new vocalists, etc. Both times the girl has said he is on vacation though once I spoke with a man at the station who said his contract had not been picked up, when it expired the 5th.

It seems to me an employee of such long standing (I personally have listened to his program for over two years) should be given the courtesy of some comment even if they won't say where he can be heard now. Why continue saying he is on vacation when he has obviously been replaced by Dave Ballard who has his own theme and calls the show the Dave Ballard show. Why be so hush, hush about something so normal; I think it stinks and I, for one, have switched to KMPC.

How far can bad taste and lack of consideration proceed on a program before the audience rebels?

No performer likes to have some one steal his show—much less a chimpanzee. Over the weeks we have watched guest performers attempt to do their act, only to be pawed and climbed over by the ape. Last Friday was the climax when sweet little Gail Moser was humiliated and embarrassed by the chimpanzee pulling at her skirt and playing discord notes on her accordion. Like a trouper she carried on to the end of her act.

If the producers want an animal show, let them devise one; otherwise take the chimp out of the act. A weak show might have to fall back on vulgarity of animal antics to hold its audience, but "Western Varities" has numerous highly entertaining elements which, without the disturbing factor of the chimp, would make a fine show. We are tuning off the show until the producers wake up and remove the objectionable feature.

Your article on "TV's Religious Racketeers" has a lot of merit, but you are treading on dangerous ground—religious liberty. Which church is authorized to sit in judgement on another church? "Let not the pot call the kettle black."

My biggest peeve is about the ex-

cessive amount of cigarette advertising on radio and TV. The other day I saw two boys, not over ten-years-old, on their way to school, smoking cigarettes "like a house afire." That, it seems to be, is a start of juvenile delinquency—and maybe the use of narcotics.

Youngsters, like older people, are influenced by what they see and hear on TV and radio, and this excessive cigarette business creates a terrible problem for many parents.

Adults can smoke their heads off, so far as I am concerned, but let them do it in private.

We never re-write a letter. However, when a letter is too long, and many of them are, we do take direct excerpts, trying at all times to capture the entire or essential meaning of our readers' comments. Thank you for your letter, and we hope this clarifies the situation.

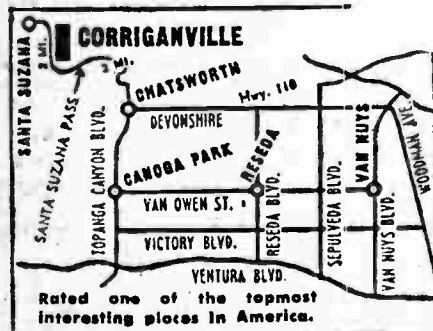

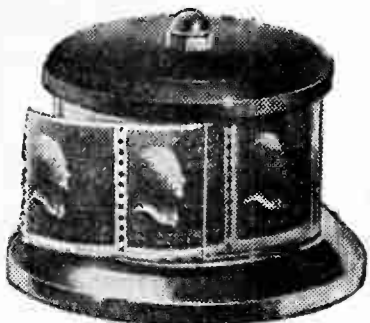

This movie is kind of interesting because it lifts its entire plot from Dostoyevsky's "Crime and Punishment," merely changing the setting to a modern American college town. Peter Cookson plays the brilliant student who kills for money, and Warren William is the inspector who finally traps him.

"Without Honor." (9) Oct. 25, 9:00. Laraine Day plays an errant wife in this somewhat sorry tale of infidelity, hate and suicide. The prominent cast includes Bruce Bennett, as the cuckold, Dane Clark, as the scheming brother, Franchot Tone, as the lover, and Agnes Moorhead as a wronged wife. Nothing but trouble here, when a little discretion would have worked wonders.

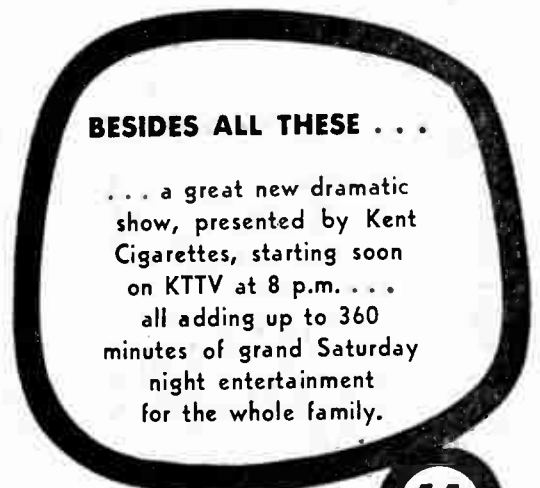

NEW YORK — News travels fast in New York as in Hollywood and the chatter is all about ABC's star-studded line-up of new shows. On our cover this week you have three of the network's "names"—**Danny Thomas, Ray Bolger, and George Jessel**. The three are certain to give the other networks some stiff competition.

Danny Thomas has come up with just the right kind of show in "Make Room for Daddy." It gives him every opportunity to combine pathos with his own brand of warm comedy. It is especially welcome news that "Make Room for Daddy" is as big a hit here as it is in Hollywood and that it looks as though **Danny Thomas** will soon be on top of the heap across the nation.

As for **Ray Bolger**, his "Where's Raymond?" is undoubtedly one of the most original, one of the freshest and happiest comedies to hit TV in a long time. This particular show follows no definite format. It lets its characters roam at will. It has an abandon about it, a carefree feeling that warms you inside. There are chuckles and there are guffaws—and there are off-beat characterizations. **Ray Bolger** is a solid click in this new TV'er. Already established as a great star in movies and on the stage, TV seems to make him look even better. His own brand of magic, his delightful humor, and his remarkable dancing are com-

RECORD Notes to You

TOPS IN ALBUMS: Finally coming into its own on records, the music of Spain is featured this week on an LP item by MGM. Four great Spanish composers are represented for "Iberia Suite," "Procession del Rocia," Intermezzo from "Goyescas," and Interlude and Danza from "La Vida Breve." These excellent performances, full of rhythmic dash and life, are played by the brilliant London Symphony conducted by Gaston Poulet. . . . **Woody Herman At Carnegie Hall** (MGM LP) is an on-the-spot recording of this 1946 jazz event that featured the No. 1 band of the nation at that time. With its fabulous personnel, the band jumps without a let-up throughout both sides to the unbridled elation of the crowd who watched and listened and marveled on that memorable night in 1946 when **Woody Herman** and his Orchestra played the greatest big band jazz of the last decade.

BEST IN SINGLES: Easily the week's best disc is the twelve-minute **Ethel Merman-Mary Martin** duet from the Ford 50th Anniversary TV Show (Decca). Singing the songs they introduced, along with the big hits of past years, Merman and Martin held their audience from one tune to another as only these Broadway favorites can do, as they sang all or snatches of twenty-eight songs. Actually recorded off the air, it's different and great record fare. . . . **Don Cornell** (Coral) sings two fine ones in "You're On Trial" and "I'm Yearning," with the former getting the nod for its melody and lyrics, plus Cornell's full-voiced interpretation. . . . **Nat "King" Cole** (Capitol) continues to rate high with a brisk samba-tempo'd version of "Lover, Come Back To Me," and the calmer ballad "That's All," with "Lover" being the choice side because of its great **Billy May** accompaniment. . . . **Frankie Laine** (Columbia) could have another "High Noon" with "Blowing Wild," a Tiomkin picture theme melody which **Frankie** sings through the film of the same title, and Tiomkin to "Wild" to Laine is a play that can't miss. . . . **Kid Ory's Creole Jazz Band** (Good Time Jazz) pull out all stops for a fine quartet of Dixieland favorites—"Maple Leaf Rag," . . . "Weary Blues" . . . "Original Dixieland One Step" . . . and "Ory's Creole Trombone" fairly ooze the old New Orleans flavor. . . . **Peggy Lee** (Decca) sings one of her rare ballads, "The Night Holds No Fear," to good whispy effect that just might click, but it's the novelty "Apples, Peaches and Cherries" on the reverse that gets our vote.

Comic Writer's Dilemma

The problem of turning out a weekly radio show of some thirty pages, week in and week out, forty weeks a year is one guaranteed to supply any normal healthy writer with ulcers and gray hairs. A writer who remains in the industry is forced to find some way of adjusting to this insatiable demand on his brain. In this day of situation comedy, the "file" of old jokes can't be depended upon. The writer has to come up every week with reasonably original material. **Bill Manhoff**, who writes "Meet Millie" has finally arrived at a solution.

He forgets about the script until twelve hours before it is due. Then, locked in his room, dead to the world except for food which is left outside the door, he gathers his talents for the big push and twelve concentrated hours of typewriter pounding. (Along about the ninth hour, it begins to feel like the typewriter is pounding him.) He finds that by concentrating the writing problem into this tight package and giving himself a full week of rest between sessions, he can easily maintain the perspective that is so precious to a writer who wants to keep his show fresh-sounding.

On the Ball

New York is thousands of miles away and the final results of the World Series of 1953 constitute just another page in the record books. But the memories linger on.



New York stood still for six exciting days. The Yanks wanted their fifth straight championship, and the Dodgers were looking for the first championship in 50 years of World Series play.

Play began. The Yanks won two. The Bums won two.

The Yanks won one. Then the clincher, on that windy, misty day when mighty Martin, in front of 70,000 fans and 25 million TV sets, singled home the winning run in the last of the ninth. The Yanks were Champs again, and the Bums were Bums again. There were victory chants in the Yankee locker rooms, and only gloom in the faces of the Dodger players and in the hearts of the Flatbush Faithful.

My father was one of the disappointed millions. He told me how he stood on a hilltop overlooking right field at Ebbets Field, and how he watched a Brooklyn team lose its first World Series. That was in 1916. Now, 37 years later, he was doing it again, only this time in front of a TV set in his own home. Science had changed the environment; but the results were just the same.

From the TV-radio angle, there was another disappointing aspect to the World Series. Red Barber, who has been calling the play-by-play of the Brooklyn Dodger games for over 14 years, and who is generally recognized as one of the best baseball announcers in the business, was not on hand.

They offered Red \$250 per game. Red said no. Not enough dough. He wanted more. They wouldn't pay it. So Red didn't call the World Series.

Red Barber was right—and wrong. He is a shrewd businessman. He knows the value of a buck. And he was 100 per cent right in demanding more money. The "Ole Redhead," along with regular Yankee announcer Mel Allen, was as much a part of the World Series drama as the players themselves.

Gillette paid \$3,000,000 for the telecast. It was seen by approximately 75 million people. The biggest TV show of the year, over two hours long, for six complete days! What would they have paid a Milton Berle, a Red Skelton, or an Arthur Godfrey for that length of time for that sort of audience. A mere \$250 per show? Don't be silly.

Yet, Red Barber was 100 per cent wrong in not doing the job. Even if he did the blasted thing for nothing! He

▲ **AL GANNAWAY** and his lovely wife, Dana, have one of the most beautiful love stories we've ever heard. They work together quite often, with Dana singing some of the many songs Al composes.

A COURT-martial seems a dubious springboard for a love as deep and lasting as the one the Al Gannaways enjoy—but it sufficed. This is the story.

There were a few youngsters in the group who, while doing a good job of entertaining troops, were also doing a good job of forgetting Army regulations. The authorities were frowning heavily upon their choice of hours at which to retire—hence the court-martial proceedings. Lieutenant Gannaway was to hear the case.

One of the group was lovely Dana Gibson who has the voice and appearance of a charming pixie. The Lieutenant found the group innocent of the charges. He then proceeded to fall very much in love with little Miss Gibson, and suggested a life sentence at the earliest possible moment.

Four weeks and three proposals later, Dana happily agreed and they started plans for their wedding. Everything had to be done in seventy-two hours, and one problem that confronted them could have delayed things for the next seventy-two years.

Al is a gentile. Dana is Jewish. This made not one whit of difference to Al nor to Dana nor to the 365 matchmakers who were rooting for the marriage, but they had to cable for approval from both their families (more regulations). Their families vigorously opposed the marriage. The Rabbi refused to marry them, the Chaplain followed suit. Such objections have been prevalent since Neanderthal Mothers belonging to tribes wearing lion skins prophesied dire consequences for sons contemplating union with females wearing leopard skins. But some three thousand years ago a girl named Ruth set the precedent for Al and Dana, when she vowed, "Whither thou goest, I will go. Thy people will be my people—"

They were married in a Paris Court by the French Government—then back to Chateau where a second ceremony was performed. Bobby Breen was soloist and Mickey Rooney and Red Buttons were "best men" at this ceremony. Each of the 365 entertainers attended the wedding and presented them with handsome gifts. It was a wonderfully happy marriage and still is.

Dana doesn't particularly "burn" with ambition where her career is concerned, although she's sung with the nation's top bands and entertained in its swankiest clubs. She loves to sing and she thinks it is very nice when someone wants to listen. In New York one day she decided to audition for Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scout program. She didn't bother to tell Al about it—in fact, she forgot about it herself. Six weeks later she was informed she would be on the show the next day. An hour before show time she called Al and calmly said, "If you've nothing better to do today you might listen to the Arthur Godfrey show. I'm on it." She won. Al just beams, "Isn't she wonderful?"

Both Al and Dana are mad about children, although fate has denied them any of their own; but if fate doesn't reverse its decision within the next few months, the Gannaways

plan to adopt a family. They spend a large portion of their time visiting and entertaining children in orphanages and hospitals. Usually they bring some of the children home and they have the kind of week end that make them feel happy and wanted. What the children do not realize is that they have in a small way appeased a hunger in the hearts of Al and Dana. Furthermore (and we hope this doesn't start a rush from harried mothers), the Gannaways are also the number one baby sitters for the whole neighborhood.

Besides Al's "Half Pint Panel," which is on KTLA Sundays at 5:30, he emcees "Hollywood Opportunity" for the same station. He is president of Bill Broidy Productions, which packages radio and TV shows, (incidentally five of them are being produced at the present time), owns the Mark Warnow Publishing company, and has half interest in the Pied Pipers Organization. He has written songs with Johnny Mercer and writes special material for entertainers such as Bob Hope, Frankie Laine, King Cole, Dorothy Shay and Hoagy Carmichael. During his two sojourns in the Army (one for four years—a second for thirteen months) he gained invaluable experience producing "Okay U.S.A.," "Golden Boy," "Hasty Heart" and "The Big Picture" series.

This is a small part of the interesting background belonging to Al Gannaway. In New York his children's show piled up the astronomical Hooper rating of 32.1. His Half Pint clubs in New York have 75,000 active members and it's no wonder they are snowballing here. These are not just more "Uncle Kratzwinkle Clubs for good little Kratzwinklers." They are clubs with a purpose. Besides the free movies and other advantages of holding a membership card, the members will work to help less fortunate children. We'll get a flock of less selfish, more tolerant and understanding citizens from these clubs. This is not just a publicity man's dream, for to use a much overworked and maligned word, Al Gannaway is sincere in his love for children and his desire to be of service to them.

Al and Dana are as potent a "package" as you'll find. We predict a long and uninterrupted run with no sponsor trouble—every one who knows them backs them one hundred percent.

11. Is it true that it's a customary practice with most d.j.'s to get "bonuses" for playing certain records? What is your opinion of this practice?

There is a rumor that some disc-jockeys accept money for playing records, but I do not know this to be a fact. To date, no one has offered me money to play his record. In my opinion, it is not a healthy practice—if it is so. It would not only be degrading to themselves, but to the station they represent. Our duty is to play music that our listeners want to hear, and if the recordings are good we are obligated to play them. No one needs to pay. If, in some instances this is true, then perhaps if the stations would pay a living wage, those persons would not be forced to stoop to this wax blackmail.

12. Have you any regrets about the way your show has been handled?

Yes, I have several regrets. I believe that through the right cooperation from many sources, with proper exploitation, full publicity and some production, "Juke Box Jury" could have a much higher rating than it now enjoys. In spite of many obstacles, "JBJ" has moved into fifteenth place with a 24.3 rating—at this writing.

13. Do you think you're too impulsive? Do you get angry too easily?

Yes, I am a very impulsive person—mostly because I do not have time to be otherwise. I do things today and think about them tomorrow. I don't get angry easily, though. I do get annoyed but never at anyone other than myself. Stupidity is so exasperating—at least, I know my shortcomings.

14. What was the biggest miss scored by Juke Box Jury and what was the biggest hit the panel made?

The biggest "miss" scored was on a Patti Page record called "Tennessee Waltz." It was voted six straight "misses" and has sold over three million records to date. As far as "hits" are concerned, we've picked the majority of popular musical "hits." Our average is eighty percent correct. The weakness lies in judging Western and hillbilly records. Most of our panels just don't savvy this phase of the business.

15. What is your candid opinion of most panel shows — disc jockey shows or otherwise?

One of my favorite TV shows is a panel show called "What's My Line?" Another, "Place the Face." I don't care what it is as long as it's spontaneous. Of course, everyone has his favorites—and I enjoy most record shows. In the evening, I like music that doesn't intrude on my thoughts, and certainly a disc jockey's knowledge of music is reflected in the quality of music he plays. Only through experience can you put your finger on the public's pulse and catch it's "beat." This is the tempo for a record show.

16. Are you a sentimentalist at heart?

Yes, very definitely. I've always been for the underdog—perhaps that is the reason I never win bets. It makes me very happy to see an unknown knock over a champion—then I'm sorry for the champ because I know how hard he worked to get to the top. This same feeling prevails with music. It thrills me to see a newcomer get a break and I've always tried to help him. Yet when someone tells me that Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, Count

Basie, Benny Goodman and other great bands are corny, I get fighting mad because they have given me and countless millions of others so many hours of pleasure.

17. What is Beryl's impression of you as a husband?

This question is something every husband would like to know. Sometimes Beryl treats me just like she does our four year old son, Bill. When he gets a cookie, she gives me one too. When it's time for Bill's orange juice, she sits me down for a glass (Cal-Fame, of course). This would lead any guy to wonder.

18. To whom do you owe the most for your success?

What success I have attained I owe to many wonderful people who believed in me and my idea. The thousand personalities who have lent their name to the show; my two right arms, Mary Markham and Marilyn Goodwin who work so hard to put the show together and keep it going week after week; the outstanding sponsors who make the show possible; those kind viewers who tell their friends about the show and buy the products I represent. Then there are the stage hands, the electricians, prop boys, and my director, and more — all who work as though they owned part of "JBJ."

19. Do you listen to records at home for relaxation?

Quite often. I find it very relaxing to listen to the collection I have at home — these are some of the "gems" of all time. To quote Cliff Arquette, "They don't make 'em like that any more."

20. What is the one characteristic you have you'd like to change?

That of being an ol' softie. I can't say no to anyone—and often it gets me into a lot of trouble.

What Makes A Marriage Fail

MARRIAGE IS a three-ring circus," states Dr. Paul Popenoe of the American Institute of Family Relations. Dr. Popenoe needs no introduction to Angelenos for his wise counsel has been dispersed for many years through his syndicated newspaper column and radio and TV appearances.

"The connotation of a circus is fun and that's exactly what a marriage should be," the eminent doctor explained. "The parallel of the three rings is simply this: One ring denotes the husband's activities, interests and diversions. The second ring is allocated to the wife for her varied interests and activities. The main or center ring, which should be twice as large as the flanking rings, represents the mutual efforts and results of both partners in the marriage. The common interests and activities which tie up their marriage must always outweigh the scope of their individual rings for a happy, successful marriage.

"A happy marriage is self evident. But why so many marriages end up in divorce courts always seems to be a problem. Primarily the cause for divorce is one of immaturity. Marriage has an adult status and individuals who act like children are not equipped to handle adult situations.

Immaturity

"Men who are over-dependent and expect their wives to solve problems hardly make the ideal marriage partner. Or men who are mama's boys and put their mother before their wife invariably irritate their spouse. The man who's afraid or suspicious of women never outgrew his 'cub scout' tendencies. The man who blames everyone else for his faults is despicable. Of course, these shortcomings don't necessarily belong to the male. The distaff side of the partnership is equally vulnerable to these immature traits.

"The lack of preparation for marriage is another factor which causes many divorces. Marriage based on romantic infantilism cannot last. The ecstasy of love and marriage as envisioned by radio, movies, television, songs and advertising slogans creates a false impression on the very young and oftentimes in the not-so-young. Companionship is the real basis for marriage. It will wear well. The romantic thrill wears off. If a couple can have both, so much the better.

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▲ **THE MOST FREQUENT QUESTION ASKED DR. POPENOE** by members of the studio audience on Art Linkletter's CBS "House Party" stanza is: "How can I get my husband to take me out?" Here Linkletter and the doctor get a chuckle from a woman who not only phrased the perennial question but also supplied her own amusing solution.

But a status of "all this and heaven too" is the exception to the rule.

"In-laws, particularly mothers-in-law, have been the brunt of many gags. But, seriously, the in-law situation has broken up many marriages before the first twelve months of wedded bliss expired. The in-law threat diminishes after the first year. A mother-in-law doesn't maliciously set out to disturb an offspring's marriage. But her thoughtless interference, prompted usually by her loneliness, can be a very upsetting factor.

Alcoholism

"Marriage can survive many years and then suddenly be faced with an unsuspected problem that first shocks the husband and wife. It can easily lead to divorce. It is alcoholism. A man goes prodding along for twenty years and wakes up one day to the fact that he's a nobody

and has accomplished very little to be proud of. His incriminating self-appraisal makes him miserable and he reaches for the nearest bottle. He loses his self-respect and is filled with remorse and shame, which only leads to more drink. A bleak picture perhaps but it happens too frequently to be dismissed lightly.

"I have been counseling for almost a quarter of a century and am convinced that human nature can change with education and understanding. So if Dan Cupid is staring you in the eye, stare right back and evaluate your proposed marriage before making the plunge. If, on the other hand, you've already taken the plunge and are having some marital difficulties, don't get hot under the collar. Sit down and talk over your problems and try to see both sides of the situation. Grow up, act like an adult, and you'll be surprised how your marital difficulties vanish."

Why Local Sportcasters Hate Christopher Columbus!

SPORTS announcers on the Pacific Coast have every reason in the world to hate Christopher Columbus. Why? Simple. But he made a mistake. He discovered it from the wrong end. He landed on the east coast instead of the west coast. The boys out here who call the play-by-play and blow by-blow accounts of sporting events have suffered ever since.

To be more specific: Say there's a big fight coming at the Hollywood Legion, or the Olympic auditorium in Los Angeles. Or a big football game from the Rose Bowl or the Coliseum. A sponsor contracts with a TV or radio network to do a coast-to-coast show. Fine. All the local facilities and technicians and laboring men are utilized.

But when it comes time to pick an announcer, what happens? They invariably pick a man from the east coast—a Russ Hodges, Mel Allen, Bill Stern, etc. There's certainly nothing wrong with these men, or their reputations. However, there are sportcasters out here who could handle the job just as well, and in some cases, much better than these "big name" boys.

Example: Hank Weaver Let's be more specific. Take Hank Weaver, who handles each and every fight every Saturday night from the Hollywood Legion over KECA-TV. If you compare the job he does with that of the network "darlings," you discover that Hank rates a draw, and even a TKO in some cases, over his TV opponents.

One thing in particular should be remembered when comparing the job of a sportscaster to that of a network sportscaster. The network sportscaster doesn't have to travel. He stays in his home town. The local sportscaster, on the other hand, has to travel. He has to go back east and cash in? The answer is simple. They'd rather work and live in California for more dough than to go back east for less dough. No one can blame them, however, for beefing about the beating they are taking from the big shots back east.

Also, if upon occasion they should take the revered name of Christopher Columbus in vain, don't be too harsh on the local lungmen. He's the guy who started the whole mess back in 1492.

Hank does at the Hollywood Legion with the coast-to-coast callers. Doing a big fight, with big names, on TV is a great and self-evident that it's almost impossible to do a bad job. Then think of Weaver, doing four to six preliminaries a night on kids that have hardly any records to speak of. It's not the fighter's fault (he has to start somewhere) but it does put Hank on the spot. How can he describe a boxer's "style" if he has only had a few fights? If he wants to be fair and accurate, he cannot make a mountain mauler out of a molehill newcomer.

What's the Reason? Weaver is not necessarily the exception to the rule. Some Southern California fans may think that most of the local announcers "just plain stink." That's their privilege. The fact remains, however, that like Harmon, Kelley, Scott, Balter, Bond, etc., as a whole, can compete favorably with any group of sportcasters from any other city in the nation.

Why don't they get the top assignments then? (Some of them do, occasionally, but it is the exception rather than the rule.) One answer is that they don't have "the big name." But how can they get a "big name" if they never get any consistent coast-to-coast assignments?

Another version of the story is that some of the local stations are pretty tight with the buck. For example, one announcer will squawk at the money along, "cut his throat," and take it instead of also holding out for more folding stuff. Pretty soon, even the "holdout" will have to come to terms for much less than he originally wanted.

This is borne out by the fact that as a general rule announcers, sports and otherwise, make better money on equivalent stations back east. "Why," you might ask, "if the west coast announcers are so hot,
