Tennessee Ernie:

He's Two People

TENNESSEE ERNIE has proved that he can split his personality with the same facility that some people split infinitives.

In a little less than five years Ernest Ford stepped from relative obscurity into national prominence as a singer-performer. His recordings of "Mule Train" and "Shot Gun Boogie" won him widespread recognition as a singer of country music.

Goals

But the man from Bristol, Tennessee, had wider horizons in mind than being typed as a country singer. He wanted to develop into a performer as well as a singer of tunes. About three years ago he broke the ice at the Thunderbird in Las Vegas when he programmed a Gershwin ballad along with his twangy hillbilly numbers. After first registering surprise,

the audiences sat up and took notice of Tennessee Ernie's sweet, melodious rendition of "Summertime."

Encouraged by their favorable response, T. E. continued "testing" on his personal appearance tours. He soon learned that audiences, generally, contain a cross-section of the population and that he was reaching more people by including ballads and rhythm numbers instead of limiting his program to country tunes.

The gradual build-up reached a climax in several directions last spring. Tennessee Ernie got billing on his own CBS radio show as Tennessee Ernie Ford. (Ford is his legal name.) His delightful across-the-board musical strip is a happy combination of "rural" melodies and sophisticated tunes liberally sprinkled with glib humor. At last Mr. Ford was getting equal recognition with Tennessee Ernie. Or as he prefers to put it: "I really wasn't splitting my personality, I was just giving it a wider berth."

Another goal was attained when Tennessee Ernie made his first recording with a 22-piece orchestra instead of the usual six-piece combo backing. Whether his Capitol release of "River of No Return" (he sang the title song for the Marilyn Monroe picture) backed with "Give Me Your Word" will be as big a seller as his "Mule Train" is at this moment a moot point. But Ernie feels he at least made the plunge.

Acting

He also made the plunge as a comedian in two "I Love Lucy" sequences last May. Ernie's first attempt at acting was a howling success. The "Cousin Ernie" shows ranked among

the funniest stanzas of the season. Compliments were showered on Ernie for his toe-stubbing, country cousin characterization. The critics and public for once were in accord on a performance. Quite candidly, Ernie was as pleasantly surprised by his "acting appeal" as were his viewers.

Additional cognizance of split-personality Ernie took shape last spring when NBC contracted him to host the television of Kay Kyser's "College of Musical Knowledge" program. "College" bows on the videolanes sometime in July and Ernie will share quips with maestro Frank DeVol and emcee audience participation stints.

"College" is another career deviation for Ernie, who needn't have had any fears of becoming typecast because Tennessee Ernie Ford has taken a good many twists and turns and is now heading up a straight road.

I OFTEN get cold chills when I think what would have been my fate on live TV if I hadn't had some stage experience behind me. At least, from the shows I did on Broadway I learned how to sustain a characterization. Even sustaining it for only a half an hour is vastly different from what is required in motion pictures.

However, I wouldn't recommend live TV even to the most accomplished performer—at least, not as a steady diet. There are several things about it that throw me—but I think the most trying task is the line learning.

Line Learning

I have to learn about forty-five pages a week and learning lines is, at best, the ultimate in tedium. It is uncreative, time-consuming, and just plain dull. On the stage you have time to learn one part that you may continue to play for months. On TV you're doing a new show every week. And the schedule we have!

The first day is spent blocking out the action. I start learning lines that night. The second day I'm trying to remember the lines while we're blocking, working with props, and endeavoring to give some kind of an intelligent reading. The next day I try to give a performance but then comes the day devoted to camera rehearsal—and invariably all you've learned before is broken down and re-done.

Live TV is, of course, full of demands and challenges. In that respect it offers a stimulant to an actor.

The biggest challenge is not to let yourself walk through a part. Whenever I hear an actor say he breezes through a live show I can't help feeling that he's not doing too good a job. An apathetic, take-it-easy attitude can make a performer and his performance dead. This is exhausting, tedious, difficult work and an actor has to resist the temptation to slide

What I Think of Live TV Now

After one solid year of doing live TV for "My Favorite Husband" on CBS, Barry Nelson has drawn some very interesting conclusions. One thing he feels for sure—it's not exactly like being in a rest home.

through a part. He has to have very real pride in his work not to become a mere machine.

But the worst thing about live TV is the demands it makes on you physically. I do feel that it would be far better for actors to be given perhaps a week off every six weeks or two months in order to get some much needed rest from the nervous tension and strain. The show and the performances would definitely benefit. The mere fact that actors are usually on a thirty-nine week playing basis doesn't make the set-up right. The situation, it would seem to me, could be taken care of by an occasional use of film. I know I'd feel better if such a plan could be worked out. It is physically impossible for any performer to do his best, week after week, with no respite. As a result, many of his best performances are left in the rehearsal hall.

I did film TV in New York when I was doing "The Hunter," an action and suspense kind of thing. This was harrowing enough but only because of the circumstances at the time. I was doing "The Moon Is Blue" on the stage at the time and working on the TV show in the day. Altogether, I worked about nineteen hours a day. To make matters worse, I did the TV program in the middle of the worst heat wave ever to hit New York—and

in a small studio that was not air-conditioned. Besides, we had to wear winter clothes for the scenes. When I think back on those days, even live TV seems easy in comparison.

As a rule, though, film TV does give an actor more time to himself than does live TV. You can film two shows in about a week. I regard with sheer envy those actors who can wind up a filmed television series and go sailing to the Caribbean for a six weeks' vacation. And think how much easier it is for him to learn lines—right on the set. I spend at least ten hours a week knocking lines into my brain.

Film the Answer?

I've been asked if I thought live TV would be replaced entirely by film. I doubt this. Certain shows like Ed Sullivan's would lose a lot of spontaneity on film. However, the new tape process now developed could change the whole picture.

As for what I would actually prefer doing—live or film—if the chips are down, I think I'd better remain rather noncommittal. Who can tell where I'll wind up? I might find myself in the very TV spot I said I didn't like.

I'll continue for the time being to talk back to my nerves and try to escape an ulcer. As long as I'm wanted on live TV, I'll be live—even if I'm half dead.

What Live TV Has Done to Me

WHEN I WAS first approached on doing a whole season of live television shows, I was a little aghast. I'd heard so many harrowing tales about live TV I couldn't help wondering if this was for me. But it was also a challenge—so I accepted.

I have always been grateful that the first "My Favorite Husband" show for CBS was on film. This was the pilot from which the series was sold. The reaction was good so when we started doing the program live we all had more than a little confidence in what we were doing. Plus some faith in the future of the show.

After a year of live TV I have been firmly convinced that the only way to combat the tension and the fear that go along with this kind of work is to know your lines backwards and forwards. I used to put off learning my lines but I soon stopped any procrastination. I can't, however, do very well by studying at night. I'm just too tired, so I set the alarm for 5:45 a.m., get up, and learn my lines until nine.

Learning Lines

But no matter how carefully you may study there is always the chance that you'll "blow" a line here and there. However, there have only been about three times in the year we've been on TV that we've run into that situation where an actor completely forgets a line and can't ad lib his way out of it. We have taken care of such an emergency, though. The director just shuts off the audio and then throws the actor a cue. Once he's all right again, the audio is turned on.

You have to learn to relax doing live TV—especially when you're doing a comedy. You can't be light and gay

with a frozen smile, cold hands, and shaking knees. To help me eliminate my fear, Frank, my husband, comes to the studio every Saturday around six. From six to six-ten he walks up to the studio with me and helps to calm me down. Saturday is a rough day at best anyway. Our dress rehearsal begins in the morning, it's not over until five, then we go into make-up and wardrobe, report to the stage at six-ten and immediately go through as much of the show as possible until six-thirty. We're really on our feet from ten in the morning until seven at night.

Playing before an audience, as we do, can be of real help—and it can also be a hindrance. Some of the shows that received the best notices got the fewest laughs from the audience. There are people who are just afraid to laugh. When we do have an audience that is obviously enjoying the show it picks up the whole company. Sometimes people are slow in getting started, and we used to try to punch lines a little harder to get laughs. We learned quickly not to do this. I used to say my lines louder to get a reaction, but I found out this made them less funny. There is absolutely no way to know what lines people are going to laugh at. You can only know the whole scene so well that nothing will throw you—not even silence on a line you thought uproariously funny.

Live TV is, of course, not such an ideal state when it comes to meeting the inevitable boners that arise. And we've had our share of "predicaments."

Boners

On the first show, "Gilly" was hiding in a closet. The door accidentally opened. I had left the scene and the show would have been completely

over if Barry Nelson, playing my husband, had come in and seen "Gilly" in the closet. When I came back into the scene I noticed the door was opened and automatically, without even thinking of what I was doing, closed it.

Such failures are bad on TV—but you have to meet them. In one show four people in the cast had to hit a golf ball or the curtain might just as well come down. We didn't even have regular tees and the balls were anything but good. Luckily—and it was pure luck—each of us hit the ball.

Fast changes of costume are also trying for an actress doing live TV. I soon learned not to give a fashion show in a half an hour. Once I had to go from an evening dress to a skirt and sweater in thirty seconds. While I was changing, the zipper wouldn't unzip, so I simply ripped off the

Right-Way Corrigan Cashes In

If that old familiar chase in TV's western epics rings a bell pictorially as well as story-wise, there's every reason why it should.

Scenic back-grounds for "Kit Carson," "Annie Oakley," "Death Valley Days," Gene Autry and other telefilms shows, like the Western movies, have found the perfect location for their outdoor shots. Crash Corrigan's movie ranch



Crash Corriganville is the ideal place to lens thrilling chases over rough terrain, bloody saloon fights and hide-and-peek sequences behind sheltering boulders. Crash admits that his ranch rentals are split right down the middle between TV and motion picture companies.

Both use his famous sets—Fort Apache, the Corsican Village, Sherwood Forest, a Western Street complete with Wells Fargo office, bank, saloon, hotel and the Sheriff's office. These "fronts" are so authentically recreated that it gives visitors a rather strange feeling when they look behind the set and see nothing there but supporting 4 x 6's.

If a company wishes to alter a set, the ranch is equipped with a wood-working mill and machine shops to make any necessary changes. However after the shooting is finished the set is restored to its original status.

Pictures made for television are handled pretty much the same as movie features except for one important factor—the economic one. A telefilm budget for a western is pretty tight compared to even a B western in the movies. Consequently, half-hour telefilms are shot as quickly as possible to keep down expenses. The director concentrates on action and scarcely bothers with details, certainly not the minute ones.

If the actor delivers his lines smoothly and the action is right, it's a take. To maintain an average shooting schedule of two-and-a-half days per film, retakes are kept to a minimum. "Producers of western telefilms are the first ones to admit that their product is not a work of art. But fortunately the customers don't seem to care," explains Crash.

Seventeen years ago, Crash Corrigan's ranch was a vast wilderness. Crash spotted the beautiful acreage in the Santa Suzanna Mountains while on a nearby location making a western. He fell in love with its shaded knolls and bubbling brook and decided

AT THE AWARD PARTY GIVEN BY WESTLAKE COLLEGE OF MUSIC FOR KFI discer, Andy Mansfield, I singled out handsome Jeff Chandler to ask him what his radio plans were (he's been absent from the ether ever since winding up his "Our Miss Brooks" contract last year).

"WE'RE AUDITIONING A NEW SHOW," Jeff told me. "Working title is 'San Francisco Final' and we may use this permanently." As the show name suggests, the theme of the series is newspapering. Emulating "Dragnet," the scripts will be based on actual records and stories from the San Francisco Chronicle. Associated with Chandler are Mike Meshekoff (formerly with Jack Webb), Walter Schumann (who wrote the "Dragnet" theme), and writers Dave Friedkin and Morton Fine. "San Francisco Final" is being slanted toward eventual TV. "But my motion picture contract won't let me do television for two years," Jeff informed.

ABOUT THE AWARD FOR ANDY MANSFIELD, he was honored for "the best radio program of recorded popular music" (his Saturday night 10:00 to 11:00 o'clocker) and all we can say is, it couldn't have happened to a more deserving chap.

ANYONE SEARCHING FOR HUMILITY should talk to unostentatious Max Liebman, one of the greatest men in television and one of the most self-effacing. A reporter comes away from an interview with him and feels quietly honored that this great, unassuming genius takes the courteous time to answer a flock of questions, some of which surely must have been asked of him a score of times.

AS YOU ARE AWARE, LIEBMAN'S "Show of Shows" finaled in a blaze of reminiscence and burst of tears. Next season, Caesar has his own show, Coca has hers and Liebman has his. And what a show this will be!

TWENTY NINETY-MINUTE COLOR "SPECIALS," the first one kicking off with bouncing Betty Hutton on September 12; followed by Renee Jeanmarie on No. 2 and Judy Holliday on the third program. That's Liebman's

Crash invested all his movie earnings to make his dream come true. Three years later and with several broken bones to boot he finished clearing the wilderness and was ready for the ranch rental business. Liebman, who still owns "Show of Shows," expects to use the title again someday. There's an unspoken understanding between Caesar, Coca and Max that the two stars will be reunited at some date on a Liebman show, but when, Max doesn't know. He admits shedding a few tears at the closing "Show of Shows" telecast, especially at rehearsal when the orchestra came up with an arrangement of Liebman's "theme song," but he philosophically observes "there's no permanent marriage in the entertainment world." Instead of looking backward, this master showman is filled with tremendous anticipation for the onrushing season. He is hoping to add some or all of the following to his guestar list: Ginger Rogers, Joan Crawford (in a musical) Cary Grant and Betty Grable and Harry James. In Liebman's opinion, there'll be 60,000 color TV sets in operation by fall and a quarter of a million by Christmas.

DAVID O'MALLEY, GEORGE GOBEL'S manager, saw Lifeline's recent remark, "What's become of George Gobel?" and hastened to tell me, "George will be here a long time, health permitting, and TV will be here longer than anybody. Only question is when the marriage will take place." Reports saying Armour had signed George for a Fall variety-musical show were tabbed premature by O'Malley, who told me, "The deal's very hot, but not signed yet. I'll let you know as soon as."

HEAR TELL JACK CARSON will be presented in an altogether new light on his CBS nightly radio show starting July 6. He's getting away from the smart-alecky, wise-cracking guy and is to be real quiet and casual.

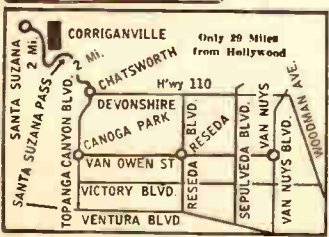

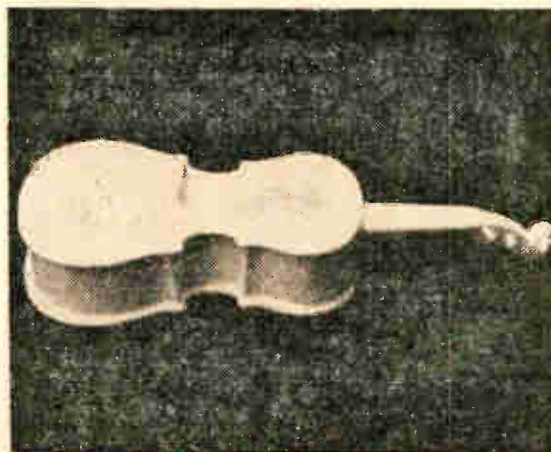

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

As we go to press, Paul Coates had planned to deliver on his last Sunday night "Confidential File" show a blockbuster against these "win a diamond" rackets. You know, those deals on radio and in the papers where you answer some ridiculously easy question or guess the identity of some world-famous personality who is so recognizable a child in grammar school would know who it is. So you win a diamond—the size of a pin point and then all you have to do is to buy an expensive setting in which to rest the microscopic gem. This has been a tired gimmick employed by disreputable concerns and it is good to see someone expose it. This column heartily advises one and all to stay away from all such "contests" and to avoid like the plague any pitch commercials on TV that offer you products at prices so low they can't be anything worthwhile. As long as the public is willing to be taken for a sucker, there will be fly-by-night concerns who will be willing to take advantage of them. So stop, look, listen, before you try to get something for nothing and then run like crazy in the opposite direction. The only way to stop pitchmen on TV and on radio is to refuse to fall for their smelly come-on deals. The stations obviously are going to do little to correct the situation, so it's up to you.

Once again we're being treated to the disheartening experience of seeing summer replacement shows settle for mediocrity. Instead of using the summer season to develop new stars for TV we have the set-up where it's a case of getting by with as little imagination and inventiveness as possible. When will the stations realize that bad summer shows will only cause them to lose audiences for good programs? When will there be a concerted campaign to bring forth new talent? Paul Gilbert, who has appeared on a couple of NBC shows and is soon to start his own series, "The Duke," is about the one case of a new personality being developed for TV.

Perhaps stations don't think anyone watches summer shows—or cares—but at a speech recently given by this column at a meeting for members of the Shriners the audience asked several pointed questions, and one dealt with summer shows and how come they weren't good. Other questions significantly asked were: "Why was 'Voice of Firestone' taken off NBC?" "Will there be as many murder and crime shows in the fall that are scheduled when children are up?"; "What can be done about bad commercials?"; and "Why are there so many unintel-

ligible English movies on TV?" NBC's commendable statement of "Voice of Firestone" was explained: no encouragement could be given anyone about there being less crime shows hitting TV since more are being scheduled; the bad commercials can only be taken care of by better ethical standards among stations and a consistent pressure from the public to have them removed; and the English movies are here to stay because the stations can get newer releases from Britain and at a smaller rate of pay than they can from American studios. The people at this meeting, incidentally, were representative of the average TV public and this public is certainly not dense, stupid or indifferent to what they get on television.

Barbara Fuller, who has been doing fine work on radio for some time and has been a notable member of "One Man's Family" in the past, should certainly be a good bet for TV shows and especially for TV films. With all the hue and cry being raised for experienced talent, why is there a tendency to overlook capable performers like Miss Fuller? Besides—she has looks to go along with the fact that she can act!

Tip to radio and TV newcasters and news commentators who want a cause to champion: you've got a honey in the action being taken by hundreds of irate Laurel Canyon residents who are rightfully resenting the fact that a Wonderland Ave. Air Force installation can be moved into a single resident zone and turn a quiet country district into a bedlam of noise, confusion, and one that creates a real danger to children. At the present, the installation is being added on to for the umpteenth time, property values are zooming downward as a result, and the place looks like a factory district instead of a place for homes. So maybe this is too isolated an instance for attention, but if it can happen in one place it can happen in other sections. This asinine, jerky deal foisted on people in this canyon deserves some hefty investigation—and who can do a better job of focusing attention on it than news commentators who like a fight and who want to protect the rights of people?

ALBUM OF THE WEEK: "The Pajama Game" (Columbia) apparently is not only the smartest musical comedy on the New York Stage this season, but that atmosphere is evident on this new original cast album of its songs.



John Raitt, Janis Paige, Eddie Foy, Jr. and the others were apparently as much at ease in a recording studio as they are before a theatre audience, for when it comes to songs like "Hey There," "Steam Heat," and "Hernando's Hideaway", there's just that professional aura of show business that no recording artist seems to inject. It's a top album with all the pace, vitality and brilliance that only the theatre can provide.

SINGLES OF THE WEEK: Louis Armstrong (Decca) heads the list of

singles with the very able backing of Gordon Jenkins' Orchestra and Chorus for "The Boppin' Song", in which Satchmo describes the cool cats to the melody of yesterday's "Whiffenpoof Song". Flip is a stirring version of the old spiritual, "Bye And Bye", with Armstrong paying tribute to those jazzmen who are no longer with us.

The Modernaires and Tex Beneke (Coral) join talents for "I Know Why" and "That's You, That's Me, That's Love". There's a load of talent on this platter and results are great. . . . Tony Martin (RCA-Victor) comes back on record with "Boulevard Of Nightingales" and "Angels In The Sky", either one of which could be the top side as Tony sings them.

Les Paul and Mary Ford head Capitol's list with "I'm A Fool To Care" and "Auctioneer", both done to perfection with plenty of omph on the Ford side. . . . Jeri Southern (Decca) covers the currently popular "Joey" in good taste, but look out for "The Man That Got Away"—a decidedly different type of tune in rhythm and lyrics that can't help being the big side for this popular platter gal.

dress. All I could think of was that I was due back on that stage in thirty seconds.

I frankly like live TV. The only thing I don't like is that you only get one performance to do your best. I'd like more time to polish up. But live TV is a challenge.

Live TV has taught me that you can't blame others for your own shortcomings. That camera shows what you really are as a person—and there's no way to escape it. Live TV doesn't give you time to get mad or upset either. You have to learn to let nothing interfere with what's going on that stage. You have to be a selfless person.

I wouldn't take anything for the lessons I've learned as an actress and as a person by doing live TV. Nothing in my profession could ever scare me now.

Their Most Memorable

ART BAKER, KABC-TV: "Why don't you take the car, son?" My father said those words casually, but he knew the thrill they gave me. I had just mentioned to him that I would be taking my girl to the 4th of July picnic at Diamond Lake, 37 miles from Mishawaka, Indiana, where we lived.

It was July 3, 1914, and I was 16. The following morning found me behind the wheel of our big, old-fashioned touring car as I proudly chauffeured my sweetie and another young couple through the streets of Mishawaka. We motored slowly around town for more than an hour before finally heading toward Diamond Lake. It was my first "solo" in the car without dad at my side, and I wanted to make certain that everybody in Mishawaka would see me.

Several times during the trip to the lake I stopped the car and, with much ceremony, raised or lowered the cumbersome convertible top.

"Sure looks like rain," I would explain to my passengers. Then, later, "Nope, guess I was wrong."

Throughout the picnic I generously and persistently volunteered the services of myself and my car to search for lost children and to take all who wished for scenic drives.

Months after that wonderful 4th of July, I was still telling anyone who would listen the fantastic story of how I had driven the 74-mile round trip to Diamond without stopping even once to change a punctured tire.



MILTON BERLE

MILTON BERLE, NBC-TV: I remember the 4th best of all as an object lesson. My birthday falls on July 12 and up to the time I was eight years old the 4th had to take a back seat to my birthday as the year's big occasion. But during my eighth year I learned that the 4th meant something besides waiting an extra week for my birthday. Actually the birthday of our Independence was involved—a fact I had overlooked. From that moment on my

birthday took a back seat. In fact I was proud to say that I was a "July" baby.



OZZIE NELSON

OZZIE NELSON, KABC-TV: "I come from a small town called Ridgefield Park in New Jersey. My earliest memories of the Fourth of July were principally about the fireworks displays that were held each Fourth of July night along the edge of the meadows bordering Overpeck Creek, a rather formidable stream adjacent to the town. The townsfolk or at least about half of the eight thousand inhabitants would gather on the hillside, swatting Jersey mosquitos and watching the fireworks go off. The final display was always something patriotic, such as the American flag, a picture of Washington, or a Continental soldier.

The one occasion that stands out most vividly in my mind occurred when I was about eight or nine years of age. Just before the grand finale the local announcer bellowed out in a thundering voice. "Will the band kindly play the 'Star Spangled Banner'?" Everyone heard him except the bandmaster, and finally the whole town took up the chant. Before the band could strike a note, however, the patriotic scene (which as I recall was Washington crossing the Delaware) flared up in all its glory. Something went wrong because soon sky rockets were flying in all directions and the workmen and musicians beat a hasty retreat. Fortunately no one was hurt but the whole affair ended up in the darnedest scramble I have ever seen. To the best of my knowledge, the band never did get to play 'The Star Spangled Banner' that night.

BEN BLUE, starring in NBC-TV's "Saturday Night Revue": The 4th of July that I remember most is one that took place in Africa during the war. World War II. I had been making the run between Africa, China, India and Burma entertaining the boys and happened to be in Africa on the 4th. It was a long way from home and I doubt if anybody but our boys knew that July had any sort of a special day. Well, I sort of had the date in the back of my mind but these boys never forgot it

for a minute. Gun powder, dynamite, and explosives of all kinds were their tools of trade but for the 4th they fixed up their own "firecrackers," "sparklers," and "sky-rockets," for a special salute to our Independence Day. Way out there gave a special significance to the 4th that it never had for me at home. I can tell you I was really thrilled at the sight. It meant a great deal to the soldiers, and other servicemen because it meant a big part of America was right there on the spot. Independence and America meant the same thing. It was my most memorable 4th of July.

FRED (Fearless) FORGETTE, KHJ: My most memorable 4th of July happened in the southern Japanese city of Kokura . . . where on the 4th of July 1951, a group of American soldiers invited over 200 Japanese teenagers to a party in their service club.

The day was spent playing games . . . dancing . . . eating American goodies and watching motion pictures on "Life in America."

Life in America, being in complete contrast to "Life in Japan" . . . left the children with many questions about our country which were answered through the interpreter.

As a bystander, I couldn't help but notice the accepted approval in the eyes of these youngsters. The germs of the idea of a democratic country and a democratic world brought looks of amazement, with 'possibility and probability' glances being passed

from youth to youth. I knew, at that moment, that our way of life could be possible . . . even in the Orient . . . and I thought how wonderful it would be if all the peoples of the world could think along the same lines. What harmony and lasting peace the world would know.

As the kids filed out of the service club that afternoon, my final thought rested on the fact that in this country, where they make most of the fire crackers with which we celebrate the 4th of July in America, maybe we planted a few "Lady Fingers" of our own . . . Lady Fingers extended by the hand of our Statue of Liberty . . . Freedom . . . and Equality.

BARBARA BRITTON, NBC-TV: "A few years ago I was in Barnesville, Pa., doing summer stock. I didn't think about it when I left Hollywood, but I'd be gone during the Fourth of July holiday. Suddenly—thousands of miles away from my husband and my son, Teddy—I realized I couldn't celebrate the Fourth with Teddy as we always did. We wouldn't be going to the Coliseum for the fireworks display. That night Teddy called me from home, a very unhappy little boy, who had been looking forward to the event for months.

I tried to explain why I wasn't with him, but I vowed then that Fourth of July was a family time, that I'd never be away from my loved ones on this wonderful day. And that, to me, because I learned just how valuable family relationships are is my most memorable July 4.

PINKY LEE, NBC-TV: July 4, 1948. My family and I were driving to Hollywood from Elko, Nevada. Suddenly, on a steep mountain curve, the car skidded and went out of control. We headed to the side of the road and

plunged down the embankment. But God was kind to us that day. The front of the car struck two tree stumps. The bottom of the car was ripped out but our momentum was slowed and we came to a stop. Miraculously, no one was hurt, neither my wife, Bebe, my children, Patty and Morgan, nor myself. Believe me, we celebrated that Fourth of July like we'd never celebrated it before in our lives.

ROBERTA LINN, KTLA: "The July 4th I spent in Cheyenne, Wyoming, during the Last Frontier Days celebrations, was definitely my most

memorable one. This was the first time that I witnessed and experienced what I had always imagined a July 4th should be like. Everyone was having fun, dressed in costumes and enjoying every fireworks explosion that took place. This was also one of the most exciting days in my life!"

SPADE COOLEY, KTLA: "My most memorable July 4th was back in 1919, when I was eight years old.

It was on that day that I played my first professional band date. Another member of that band was my father! It was a great thrill."

LAWRENCE WELK, KTLA: "The 4th of July that stands out in my mind was in 1925. This was before I had any permanent status in show-business. On this day I hired five musicians and managed to get a booking in a dime-a-dance palace in Scatterwood, South Dakota, on a fifty-fifty percentage basis. A baseball game was then scheduled for that evening and it looked as though

my percentage would be exactly zero. To my luck, the ball game was rained out, consequently the dance palace was packed and this marked the first day that I had earned the phenomenal amount of \$235 in one day."

ANITA GORDON, KTLA: "I'll never forget the 4th of July four years ago. That was the day I brought my baby, Linda, home from the hospital. My family was there and I sat up in bed, next to the window, and held my baby and watched the fireworks outside."

DOYE O'DELL, KTLA: "I suppose that the things that you would call memorable are the things that affect your life most. Back in 1945, when I was struggling to make a name for myself in show-business, I landed a job emceeing a rodeo show in Victorville, California. Bill Elliott happened to be there, heard me and arranged for me to take a screen test at Republic studios. The contract I landed as a result of this encounter got me started. I've been working ever since. Yes! I have good reason to thank the good Lord for that July 4th.

David Brian Has Reformed!

One of the screen's most famous tough guys has mellowed into a man fighting on the side of the law. He's David Brian who does a real switch in character as "Mr. District Attorney" on TV

THE most practical way to bring a new television series to the public is to offer one with a waiting audience of some hundred million. Of course, not everyone can achieve this coup—which has been done with the new KNXT "Mr. District Attorney" show produced by Ziv Television Programs, Inc., and starring David Brian.

"Mr. District Attorney" garnered this huge audience, of course, by virtue of being on the air for 12 years as a radio show. The only major change in the format for the TV series is that star David Brian will not have an Inspector Harrington as his aide. The reason is that the district attorney normally works with all facets of the police department, and hence has different assistants in each episode. So, you'll never have a chance

to get tired of supporting players, since they will change with each show.

"Mr. District Attorney" will give even natives of Los Angeles insight into our city which we would never get if we took conducted bus tours for three consecutive weeks. More than half of each show is shot on location. If a book store, a gas station, a travel agency—anything of this sort—figures in the script, the Ziv company goes out and shoots in these authentic locales. The only standing sets which they have for "Mr. District Attorney" are those of his secretary and the District Attorney himself. Everything else is done outside the studio walls.

And what of David Brian, who is "Mr. District Attorney"? Why did he hold out against doing TV for so

long? For a good and valid reason which will make every mother in the land rejoice.

Says David: "I didn't want to go into the nation's living rooms until I had a format that would entertain but not frighten. TV has too great an influence on youngsters and adults. This show is not a 'whodunit.' We never show a murder for the sake of gore. We prefer to imply that a crime has been committed, rather than show the crime itself. Quite frequently there is no crime. And it is the duty of the District Attorney to prove this. We show the great efficiency of every branch of all law enforcement agencies, that the law is everyone's friend—unless you're on the wrong side of it, of course..."

And Brian laughs as he recalls all the crime movies he has done. For a change now he gets a chance to smile on the screen and this pleases him no end. He tells the story of his mother informing all the neighbors at church in Jackson Heights, Long Island, that her son was starring in a new movie. And each time he'd be toting a gun, slapping actresses around the screen, and generally being a pretty unsavory character. And after all the neighbors had trotted faithfully off to see David in his new epic—his mother among them—she'd make a return visit to all of them and explain that really her son wasn't like that, that he didn't slug helpless ladies and actually he was a good, God-fearing boy.

"Mother needn't apologize to the neighbors any more," David sighs with relief. "In fact, now she's consented to let me buy her a TV set and she's asked all the neighbors in to see the show every week!"
