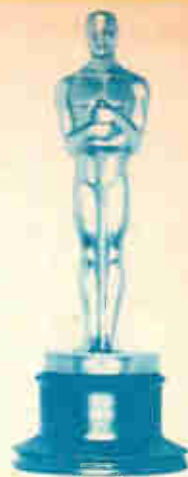
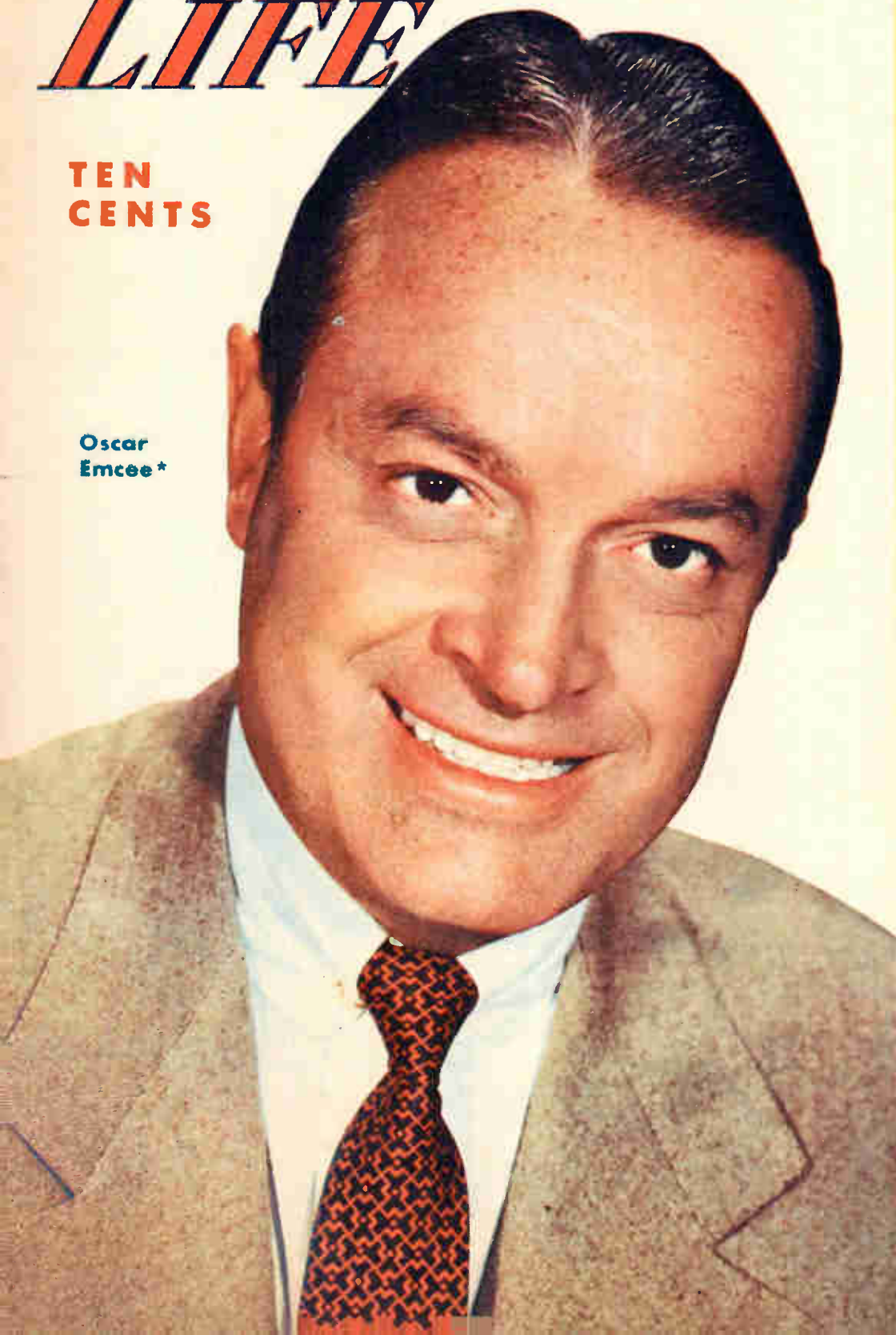

# Bandstand Revue

▲ THE NEW FORMAT OF KTLA'S "Bandstand Revue"—with over thirty complete and different production numbers each week—has caused a great deal of extra work for bandleader Leighton Noble and the entire KTLA staff. In contrast to the old one-stage show, four different stages are now used. A special theme was written for the show by the famed writing team of Livingston and Evans.

WHEN THE gang on KTLA's "Bandstand Revue" rang out the old year and brought in the new one—they really meant it. As a matter of fact, no one connected with the hour-long Sunday night show had any idea how good 1955 was going to be to them.

The whole story really begins in the last week of 1954. Instead of doing the regular variety show on "Bandstand", producer-director Klaus Landsberg (in case you hadn't heard he's also Channel 5's station manager) came up with a new idea.

He decided to "revue" the top tunes of 1954. However, he didn't want to limit the program just to the top seven or ten or twelve songs. He wanted to go all out and do thirty of them—that's right thirty.

Although such a thing was unheard of for one program, it wasn't the first time that energetic Landsberg had attempted to do something new and startling. (Landsberg has more "firsts" to his credit than any engineer-producer in the television industry—bar none.)

#### Quote; Unquote

Actually, Landsberg had wanted to do an all-out production job on "Bandstand" for a long time.

It was back in June, 1953 (the TV-March 25, 1955

Radio Life issue of June 26, 1953 to be specific, and page nine to be more specific) that this reporter wrote the following words:

*"... we view with alarm the lack and similarity of production on KTLA's 'live' shows. Production-wise Channel 5 is getting in a rut. It seems that all of the variety shows with various acts follow the same pattern. They are all handled like night-club routines. . . . We realize that KTLA, unlike some network shows with tremendous budgets, has financial and special limitations. However, so do other local channels. They at least occasionally add a backdrop, put a little temporary, inexpensive scenery up, and use some initiative to break up the monotony.*

*"Watch a live variety show on Channel 5 some time; compare it with other local live variety shows, and see if you don't agree. If not, we'll apologize."*

We didn't apologize. We didn't have to.

Landsberg knew the well-intended criticism was a valid one. However, because of the "financial and special limitations" which we mentioned, he was powerless to do anything about it.

#### Public Response

But when the final week of 1954

rolled around—and more important, with his new KTLA studios on Sunset Boulevard ready for service—he decided to make his move.

The public response to the last show of 1954 was so gratifying that Landsberg decided to continue the idea through 1955.

Now, TV viewers watch "Bandstand" regulars Leighton Noble and his talented band, harmonica-playing Leo Diamond, songstress Anita Gordon, the dancing Mercer brothers, the singing MacDonald sisters, and at least four special guests go through thirty completely different songs and production numbers. All the songs, including some "predictions" and specialty numbers, are selected on the basis of a special poll which KTLA conducts through musical publications, disc jockeys, record stores, and various recording companies.

The new KTLA format has been so successful in just a few short months, that the sponsors decided to show it from coast-to-coast.

For many different reasons, we highly recommend watching the new "Bandstand Revue." We think our readers will enjoy it. If not—once again—we'll apologize.

(P.S.: And once again, we don't think we'll have to.)

# Al Jarvis Defends Teenagers

↓ **DICK AND JUDI GRIN** happily as they receive prizes from "Ballroom" maestro Al Jarvis. They now have crack at annual \$2,000 award in August.

**A** OWADAYS, in most people's minds the very word 'teen-ager' is synonymous with delinquency." So stated Al Jarvis when asked about his KABC-TV teen-age dancing competitions. (If you have watched Channel 7 any weekday afternoon between 4:30 and 5:30 you have seen thirty-five or forty junior and senior high school boys and girls stomping, swinging, romping and whirling to typical teen-age music . . . music with a beat. Daily, monthly, and annual finals hold attractive lures of loot for these boys and girls who come from schools over the Southern California area.)

"The teen-agers are very proud to come on this program," Al told TV-Radio Life. "This is *their* show. It gives them a sense of importance. They have an opportunity to interpret the music . . . they are given free rein in healthy competition. You seldom hear of a football player getting into trouble. The dance floor is football for the teen-agers who come to my 'Make Believe Ballroom.'

Sometimes I am surprised kids today aren't worse than they are. The youngsters feel so very insecure . . . my own Michael, who's thirteen, doesn't feel completely secure, and he has less reason than many others to feel this way. Many times the grownups are guilty of giving their youngsters a sense of insecurity."

Parents aren't allowed in the studio when the teen-agers come to Jarvis' show to compete. They sit in another room. There is no racial restriction, just an age qualification . . . thirteen through nineteen. The girls wear their party clothes; the boys must wear jackets and ties. (The teen-agers obtain tickets to the television program by writing Al Jarvis and telling him what they'd like to be when they grow up.)

#### His Aim

Al has a knack for making the teen-agers feel comfortable. He builds a sense of importance in them by heaping prizes on the winners . . . gives the champions big buttons to flaunt in front of their schoolmates. A sort of "Advice-to-the-teen-age" columnist, he is constantly reading



the best books on teen-age psychology and continually attempting to fathom the complexity of the teen-age nature which he labels "Mature physically but not mentally."

In the Jarvis "book," "If you can just stand up and walk around you qualify as a competitive dancer on the ballroom floor. We don't bar them if they can't dance." Al stated.

In line with his objective to understand the teen-agers, Al takes great pains to keep abreast of their language. "You must know it but you mustn't use it, because you're a 'square' if you do," he explained.

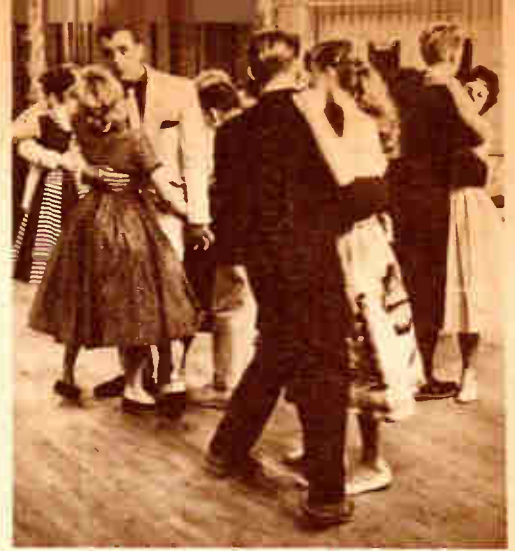
He believes that he knows what kind of music they enjoy most. Actually, Al has always considered himself as a disc jockey with special appeal to teen-agers and now admits that he was very unhappy during the six years when someone labored under the assumption that he was a young Tom Breneman type and had him cajoling housewives and bestowing orchids on his daily TV program.

Though Al was the first one to start the "Mother's March" for polio in this area, he has been happiest of all this year in duplicating this march for the teen-agers who had their first polio march on Sunday, January 30. The first 1000 teen-agers to show up in the lobby of KFWB were served hotcakes by Aunt Jem-

ina. Meanwhile, they left their contributions to the polio drive and enjoyed dancing to "Shtiggy Boom." This is Al's latest song, written in collaboration with Leo Diamond especially for the teen-agers.

#### Further Efforts

Tokens of Jarvis popularity with the sub-twenty groups are the 350 letters he receives daily. When he makes Saturday appearances at various markets in the Southern California area he draws enormous crowds of young couples (11,000 at Panorama City recently). These Saturday sessions are comprised of music, competitive dancing (in which two couples are chosen to go on the finals show), and a talk about the evil of narcotics, which Al gives in a friendly manner. Further proof that what he says and does carries great weight was the instance of a boy just released from reform school who didn't want to return to public school, but confided to his teacher that most of all he wanted to get on Al Jarvis' program. The boy, who was of the "Pachuco" type, was told that he would have to get a haircut in order to be seen on the "Ballroom" show. He was willing to do even this... went on the dance floor with his partner, won second place in the competitions and promptly went back to school. "This boy had gained

a sense of importance," Al pointed out. "He didn't have to steal a car to attract attention."

On another occasion a girl from the exclusive Marlborough School and her partner from Beverly Hills won first place in the contest. When Al called to congratulate the winner, her mother answered the telephone and excitedly told Al that winning the contest had not meant nearly as much to her daughter as a wonderful new experience. The girl had returned from the television studio to tell her family. "You don't know how much this afternoon meant to me! I sat next to a colored girl and, do you know what? She was charming!"

**AL, WHOSE SYMPATHIES** have always been with young people and who is in his element doing shows for them, gives a pretty contestant a whirl on the show.

**MONTHLY WINNERS SIT IN JUDGMENT** on vying dance teams. Phone calls and a well-known dance authority also help determine winners.

# Unmasking the Lone Ranger

Who is the mysterious stranger playing the role of the legendary hero?

THE "Lone Ranger" has been a legend for twenty-two years, enjoying far-flung popularity. But little has been learned about the man behind the mask — until now when television's "Lone Ranger" unmasked.

Clayton Moore portrays the "Lone Ranger" but he is so deeply immersed in his role that he answers to the name "Lone Ranger" more readily than he does to his own. Since his childhood, in Chicago, he has always longed to portray a Western hero. As a former trapeze artist and western serial actor, he was considered a likely candidate, and justly so, to enact the role of the "Lone Ranger" on television when the series was launched in 1949. Incidentally, the "Lone Ranger" series is the first western made exclusively for television.

Moore's early circus training stands him in good stead for some of the rugged "Lone Ranger" scenes, and he rarely uses a double. The six foot two actor is broad shouldered, has an athletic stride, blue-grey eyes and a winning smile.

He and his wife live in Tarzana where they have lots of room to train their two horses. Clayton is a walking encyclopedia when it comes to his equine friends. Ask him a simple question about his "pals" and he has an answer a paragraph long.

Collecting antiques of the Victorian era is another hobby of the Moores. They have about fifty antique clocks at home and Clayton boasts that they all run. Whenever Clayton is on the set he checks the props to make sure that there are no discrepancies. (He can peg an antique and the period to which it belongs the moment he sees it.) So far he hasn't found any but admits he has his fun looking anyway. The rugged actor explains that his liking for antiques is an outgrowth of his work in westerns.

Although the Moores are childless, Clayton feels that all children are his children because the "Lone Ranger" is idolized by the small fry the world over. Clayton sincerely loves children and eagerly welcomes every opportunity to entertain them whether it be at hospitals or at a youth rally.

## Standards

He firmly believes that the high standards of the "Lone Ranger" se-

ries contributes immeasurably to its success. The program is geared for children (but it has more than its share of adult audiences) and its goal is subtly to teach them patriotism, tolerance, fairness and a sympathetic understanding of fellow men and their rights and privileges. The sanctity of the home is protected . . . love interests are kept wholesome . . . brutality and gore are eliminated wherever possible, and held to a minimum when the plot calls for it.

The "Lone Ranger" is never seen without his mask or a disguise. He uses perfect grammar at all times. The "Lone Ranger" never shoots to kill and he never wins against hopeless odds; he is never seen escaping from a hail of bullets merely by riding into the horizon. All adversaries are American to avoid criticism from minority groups and the "Lone Ranger" does not drink or smoke.

Clayton Moore has patterned his life after the "Lone Ranger" until the two have become almost synonymous. The "Lone Ranger" is not a legendary figure but a real person to Clayton Moore.

## Big Deal

The biggest contract of its kind in the history of television, a long term agreement involving a package of one hundred and twenty three feature films originally produced at a cost in excess of \$25,000,000, was consummated this week by Herbert J. Yates, President of Republic Pictures Corporation and Taft B. Schreiber, Vice President of MCA TV, Ltd.

MCA TV, Ltd. Film Syndication Division has obtained exclusive worldwide television distribution rights to the largest block of films ever released to television by a major studio from their backlog of pictures. The package includes fifty-six feature films starring Gene Autry and sixty-seven feature films starring Roy Rogers.

# Lifelines

**THE URANIUM FEVER HAS INVADED** the precincts of radio and TV. Tony Ellis, CBS producer-director of "Suspense," sometimes writer of this hardy radio thriller, and two-time scripter of TV's "Climax," has "the bug." Introduced to this exciting activity by business conferee Kenny McManus (assistant director), Tony has two weekend "hunts" notched into his pick 'n' shovel. He and McManus scooted over to the vicinity of Hoover Dam, joggled over a dirt road which was "slightly less than a cow-path," and breezed past a warning sign "Keep Out," which, according to Tony, means "go" to a uranium hunter.

**WHEN THEY SUDDENLY FOUND THEMSELVES** in the wilds, they immediately had visions of mountain lions charging from the underbrush, snakes slithering into view and even began to worry about how close they were to a possible A-blast. Then they found the small hunk of rock which set their Geiger counter going like a "super-charged slot machine."

**ALL THE WAY BACK TO THE COUNTY** assessor's office in Las Vegas the fellows pondered their strike. They wondered how much they were going to be worth. Mulled whether they'd sell out for a million.

**FOUR DAYS AFTER TURNING THEIR SAMPLE** over to a Los Angeles assayer they received a report. It would have been quite exciting, said Tony, if it had revealed 1.4 to 1.5 uranium in the specimen. Kenny's and Tony's indicated .11—of strontium, and .0 of uranium! Seems strontium, along with about ninety-eight other radioactive elements, makes the counter behave just like uranium.

**THE PROSPECTORS, THOUGH TEMPORARILY DASHED,** are more determined than ever to strike it rich. They've talked about uranium so much that "now we're practically forced to find it," they admit.

**WHEN MILTON BERLE BOWED OUT OF NBC's** inaugural colorcast last week, it was decided not to replace him. Show is already loaded with talent, so much so that Berle conceivably might have felt that his spot wasn't important enough. Hal Peary is hitting his stride in TV as "Willy's" boss, as "Chuckling" Charley Henley on Bob Cummings' show and in other roles. "That's why," he wrote me, "as of April first I am turning over my early show on KABC to Fred Beck, if they ever get him up that early." (They used to, on "another network.") . . . A daytime sponsor is breathing so heavily down CBS-TV's neck for Johnny Carson that the comic may end doing both a daily and nighttime stint. CBS is also very high on a new comedian, Mort Sahl, and on its new "Mighty O" and "Hart of Honolulu" series. Latter to be shot in the Islands. "The Aldrich Family" starts filming this week, also the pilot for Marie Wilson's new TVer, "Miss Pepperdine."

**CBS PHOTO LAB GOT A HURRY-UP CALL** last week from Desilu Productions, where "December Bride" is filmed. New pictures of Spring Byington were needed for the outside showcase. Seems some little rascal with a BB gun had been using her as a target and was a pretty crack shot.

## Point With Pride

. . . to Elizabeth York for her wonderful performance as a not completely cured mentally ill person in "A Matter of Dignity" ("Robert Montgomery Presents," NBC). Her desire for vengeance against a former employer who robbed her of her dignity forces her to use drastic and maddening steps to humble him. Her portrayal of the disturbed young woman stole the spotlight from John Newland, star of the teleplay.

. . . to Eddie Albert and the entire cast of "Connecticut Yankee" for a fast moving television of the famous Rodgers and Hart musical. This was one of the best "Spectaculars" to date and it proved a wonderful showcase for Albert's many talents.

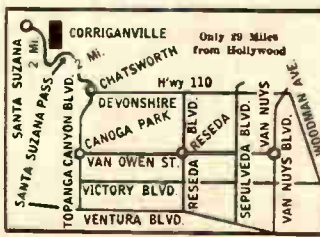

# Radio in Review

## John McShane's Nighttime Audience

Most people have nothing but pity and sympathy for the all-night disc jockey — that is, the people who live a normal life, working daytime and sleeping at night. But John McShane, the all-night disc jockey at Station KMPC, advises such people to save their pity and sympathy for others more deserving of it.

"Bored? Lonesome? Why, there's never a dull moment for the all-night disc jockey," says DJ McShane. "I go to at least a half dozen parties every night between midnight and 6:00 a.m. And to you folks who go to bed around eleven let me say the parties I go to are just getting warmed-up at midnight. I drop in on four or five industrial plants, postoffice sorting stations, airlines. Of course this is all by telephone but the thrill is there even though it is vicarious.

"Many of the daytime inhibitions seem to disappear at night. Telephone calls become more personal. Lonely folks who can't sleep seem to feel it is their prerogative to talk on the telephone to the disc jockey who has been talking to them on the radio. My telephone is buzzing constantly and I get a charge out of every ring because I never know whether at the other end of the line there will be a roisterous party with a half dozen happy people trying to talk at once or a lonely, depressed and disillusioned individual.



"Night-time listeners take their radio seriously, too. One group of night workers who listen to KMPC all night as they toil really took to heart my request for a ballot on the types of music preferred. There were forty-four workers in this particular group and one of them made up a chart listing more than 200 male and female singers, orchestras, singing groups and instrumentalists and had each of the workers indicate his preference.

"Top three in each classification were: Male Singers: Tony Martin, Dick Haymes, Perry Como; Female Singers: Kay Starr, Kay Brown, Rosemary Clooney; Orchestras: Glen Miller, Les Brown, Benny Goodman; Group Singers: Ames Brothers, Andrews Sisters, Ink Spots (The Lancers were a close fourth); Instrumentalists: Frankie Carle, Johnny Maddox, Randy Brooks. It would be interesting to compare this balloting with a daytime study to see whether people's taste changes after midnight."

John McShane obviously likes his all-night shift and the loyal audience that goes with it. He even feels that

daytime listeners, lacking the nocturnal informality, are missing lots of fun.

# Carney's A CHARACTER

*An actor first, then a comedian—  
Content to play "secondary comic"  
Quiet, family-loving, introverted.*

EVER SINCE he clicked with his bagful of roles on the Jackie Gleason Show, Art Carney has had to become accustomed to being gazed at, discussed and hollered after in public.

"Hey, Norton, how are things in the sewer?" is one form of familiar greeting. Many times, fans are slow in recognizing "the secondary comedy lead" in CBS-TV's whopping Saturday evening show.

Carney will be walking down the street. A group will spy him. "It's Art Carney!" one will exclaim.

"Naw! it isn't," someone else will disclaim.

"He looks thinner on TV."

"He looks taller on TV."

"He's better looking than he is on TV."

"He looks too smart to be the guy on the Gleason show."

When they say he looks too smart to be one of the characters on Jackie's program, Art knows that he has played his role convincingly. The character he has created has been believable. This makes him glad because he thinks his greatest asset is his "ability to create and do different characters with Gleason. And Jackie's biggest talent is his ability to observe and capture the humor of any situation," Art told TV-Radio Life.

Of the three characters most often enacted — "Reggie Van Gleason's" father, the timid little guy who is foil for "Loudmouth," and "Ed Norton" of "The Honeymooners" sketch, Art likes the latter best. "It's free and easy," he explained. He recalled the recent catastrophe on the program when a door through which he was supposed to enter became jammed. Art wound up making his entrance through a window, ad libbing; "More than one way to skin a cat!" The whole cast was practically hysterical over Art's predicament and his solution. Their mirth was heightened because they knew that a Western Union boy was supposed to come through the door next—with what technique?

#### Wide Experience

Art really enjoys working with Gleason and he is certainly qualified to an opinion because his experience has cast him with such comedians as Fred Allen, Edgar Bergen, Milton Berle, Bert Lahr, Henry Morgan,

Morey Amsterdam, Garry Moore, Herb Shriner, Goodman Ace, Jack Haley, Victor Borge, Bea Lillie and Lew Parker. Carney's current three-year deal, a personal contract with Gleason, ends this coming June but is already being prepared for renewal. Art's arrangements with Gleason allow him to do three outside shows in every thirteen-week period. "I always enjoy a change of pace," Carney observed.

One of Art's most popular sketches is the baseball act with Bert Lahr which he has done once on the Buick program and three times on "Toast of the Town." Art works well with Lahr, whom he tags as "of the old school—broad, baggy-pants comedian—there aren't too many around these days."

Carney is very frank about his aptitude for playing second fiddle to top comedians. He makes it a point to study every star with whom he works. "I observe his nature and his temperament and let them observe what I have to offer. If they like it, they buy it.

"I figure myself as an actor," he continued. "I'm an actor who has majored in comedy."

Art has always been interested in doing impersonations. His take-offs were features of his high school dances in Mt. Vernon, New York, the place where he was born thirty-six years ago and where his parents still live.

When he joined Horace Heidt's organization, Art continued his imper-

sonations, plus novelty songs and announcing. He went into radio in 1942 and did a variety of assignments until 1944 when he entered the service. During an encounter in France he was wounded (on August 15, 1944, date of his wedding anniversary) and hospitalized for nine months.

#### Into TV

Art's real break came when he went with Morey Amsterdam's radio show in 1948 and with the radio program was swept into TV. He remained with Morey for a year and a half, still says of him "He's very quick—quicker with the ad lib than any guy I've worked with." The character Art created on the Amsterdam show was "Charlie, the Doorman," "not too unlike 'Ed Norton'," according to Art.

Though well-meaning friends are always telling Carney he should have a show of his own, Art is perfectly content to keep right on with what he is doing on the Jackie Gleason program. This chap Carney has pretty definite ideas about himself and what he wants out of life. He thinks his wife, Jane, who was his high school sweetheart, is the greatest and he is crazy about their three children, Eileen, twelve; Brian, nine; and Paul, two and a half. To Art Carney, nothing is to interfere with this group. He is also loyal to the half dozen couples with whom he and Jane grew up. They still get together for regular gabfest evenings

at which Art prefers not to mention his showbusiness activities. "Sometimes it gets almost embarrassing," he lamented. He freely admits he is quite introverted, "more so than my wife," and feels uncomfortable when given the red carpet treatment.

The money which success has brought him has changed Art's mode of living only slightly. The family still lives in the typically suburban four-bedroom house in Yonkers into which they moved nine years ago. "Soon have it paid for," Art announced.

#### Saves

Asked what else he was doing with all his money, Carney replied, "I sack it away in the bank . . . buy a bond every so often . . . carry a good insurance policy for Jane in case anything should happen to me . . . give my folks a little more than I used to."

Carney's one extravagance upon signing with Gleason was to buy a second car. The family now owns a Ford ranch wagon and a Pontiac.

Art is adverse to hauling his family in on any of his showbusiness publicity. His youngsters take his career as matter of course, only now and then schoolmates press them for autographed pictures of their famous dad. Art has found that his TV career has enabled him to stay at home much more often than his previous showbusiness activities. His favorite form of relaxation is "sitting around the house." He also goes bowling

once in awhile, has dinner with friends, enjoys playing piano by ear, takes color pictures and spins his prize records, most of them piano and most of them Andre Previn's.

His favorite topics of conversation are his children, family doings, and recalling old ball days with his former high school gang. He thinks his greatest fault is his impatience—"at least that's what my wife would say," he admitted. But then, Jane is pretty frank with and about Art. It's often that she reminds him, "You just don't look the same to me on TV as you do at home."

# A Western That's Not a Western

*"Death Valley Days" is one show that believes that even a Western-type offering can be distinctive. It's so different, in fact, that you can't find a barrel-chested hero, or a cattle rustler, about.*

**I**F YOU ever hear the line, "They went thataway" on KNXT's "Death Valley Days," you'll be hearing things. This is the Western that goes in for realism, for historical fact. It centers more on the true stories of the Old West instead of on such cliches as rip-roarin' fights between heroes and villains who balance precariously on the edge of a cliff. And, furthermore, the cavalry never rides in, bugles blowing, at the crucial moment to save the nice people from the meanies.

Stuart McGowan, who, with his brother Dorrell McGowan, heads McGowan Productions, has directed every "Death Valley Days" film since the beginning—about forty-six in all. And he can vouch for the authenticity of the tales related.

### Authentic

"We go to any lengths to get realism," McGowan remarked. "For example, the first picture we did told

how Death Valley got its name. We filmed the show in May. The inn and the Ranch at the Valley had closed for the season, but the Ranch was reopened for us. We shot in temperatures that reached 148 some days. We had to put ice packs on the leading lady so she could keep working. One cameraman was overcome and had to lay off. The ground was so hot it would burn you if you touched it, and yet in one scene some of the actors had to lie down on the ground, with their shirts torn. Believe me, that was one time we had no problem getting realism—those men *were* suffering.

"All pictures calling for Death Valley as the locale are shot there. Yet we have done several in Lone Pine and a few at Sonora.

"Ruth Woodman has been writing the Death Valley scripts since she started them on radio fourteen years ago. She is now a recognized authority on the Valley. She has made repeated trips to Death Valley to talk to the people there, to research, to gather material for stories. She has so much in reserve she could write for years.

"We try to avoid all the typical Western cliches in our show, since we are concerned with realism. One phrase I hate is 'Come on, let's go' or 'There comes the posse, we'd better get out of here.' Most of our stories avoid this type of thing because they're based more on character. We have done pictures too where no one ever draws a gun and, in fact, very few of our films ever have gun fights.

"I believe any story becomes more gripping when you can say in the beginning, 'This is a true story, based on fact.' Realism pays off because it is more like life. And there is also more suspense in a story that is factual—you never know how it will end. In most Westerns you know exactly how everything will end."

There is naturally great attention to detail in all of the "Death Valley" shows. In one script, a story was supposed to be written on rocks in

Indian signs, but no such rocks were available in Death Valley, so a contest was held among local residents in order to create the most authentic backdrops possible. The winner was an eighty year old Indian.

Stuart McGowan's expert guidance of the series is the result of many years in the picture business. He used to work with Mack Sennett, and then he did comedy gag writing. Finally, in 1934 he and his brother began writing stories at Republic. They introduced almost every new series there, among them Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, and others. After this they went into their own production.

"In all things we do for our own company and in the stories for 'Death Valley Days,'" McGowan went on. "I like to include some kind of a moral value. I think each story should have a lesson. That's why our show is as well suited for children as for adults. For example, in the story of 'Sequoia' we had a scene with an insert of the Lord's Prayer written in Cherokee language. We did a vocal two-line translation in the scene. I had a minister ask for the complete translation. And often people write us for information about details or places mentioned in the stories."

"Death Valley Days" is one show that won't be put on film and then thrown away. The negative print of every picture made is stored in a borax mine far below ground in the Valley. Because the temperature doesn't vary a degree, there's no danger of the film's spoiling.

It's worth saving these prints. We can think of some films that were so bad they should have been buried before they ever left the camera.

# The Show That Will Never Die

Not many TV productions of today can be as timely twenty years from now as they are in this year of 1955. But "Where Were You?" is one which will have value far into the future.

I have only one regret—I wish I had started 'Where Were You?' years ago."

Ken Murray was very sincere when he said this. If ever a man loved his show, Ken is that man. And with good reason, for his KTTV offering is one of the few on television that informs, educates, and entertains. Because it was a show of dignity and of importance it was given a TV-Radio Life Award.

"If I had started 'Where Were You?' before, think of all the great personalities we could have on film now," Ken said. "How I would have loved to have done Al Smith, Mayor Walker, Babe Ruth, people like that. The shows we have done so far will, for the most part, be valuable records for future generations. Men like Alben Barkley, Dr. Ralph Bunche, Dr. Lee DeForrest, to mention a few, have been featured on 'Where Were You?' and there are many more who are to be done. Our show on America's jet ace, Captain McConnell, is already going into the Library of Congress. And before we did Sgt. York, America's World War I hero, there wasn't a single recognizable shot of this famous man on record. Not even the Army Signal Corps had anything on him.

## Important Show

"I frankly think 'Where Were You?' is an important show. I think we're doing something different. I personally want to do good with it. I did the show because I believed it had value—and because it was a hobby to begin with.

"I'd been making a film for my children called 'You Should Live So Long.' It covered every important theatrical, sports, and political event from the year of my birth, 1903. The record was done silent until 1929, the advent of the talkies, and then all succeeding films were with sound. I had always kept an extensive record on film of important events so it was not too difficult a matter to make this picture. However, when 'Where Were You?' was begun, I dropped the project. My children will have 'Where Were You?' as their record of the past."

## New Ken

There are still those who think that this show is another comedy offering—such as Ken has done in the past.

They think he is still the cigar-smoking funny man. But this is a new Ken Murray—no cigar, only a few jokes, and a man with real distinction. This is a production that is as far removed from the types of shows Ken has done in the past as Vampira is unlike Ed Murrow.

A prominent man in the motion picture industry saw "Where Were You?" and made a very significant remark. He told Ken, "You've taken what has been available to anyone and put a stamp of dignity and importance on it." On the surface, this seems to be true because anyone could conceivably get news reels. But no one had been saving films as Ken had. Many of the shots seen in his shows come from his personal collection.

"Our subjects will never be dated," Ken went on. "The personalities covered will be as important years from now. And yet some people still can't

see the value of this kind of production. They even make such remarks as 'Well, it won't take the place of an "I Love Lucy".' This dumbfounds me. I can only remind them that it isn't supposed to take the place of or be like any other show—"Lucy" included. No other production can be called a pictorial record of various eras for the future.

"I've also been asked—'What happens when color TV comes? Where will you be then?' My only comment is—no one can get people like FDR, or any of the other important personalities we have done, in color—and, besides, they will be just as great in black and white.

"I hope I have achieved something good in 'Where Were You?' I hope I have proved that to be entertaining one must be interesting. I know I have found the greatest thrill of my event-filled life in these shows. Nothing I have done has made me as proud as 'Where Were You?'"

Ken Murray has helped to give TV the "forward look."
