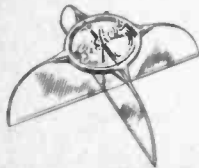

Radio maintains status quo for summer season, but TV presents a different picture: reruns and some replacements in lead

What's New... For Summer?

STOP! before you raise a skeptical eyebrow or scoff at the video fare during the annual hiatus season. The problem of maintaining a viewing audience during the hot, humid summer days has had top level executives in a daze.

By and large the standard radio programs will continue to be aired and the seasons, but the television re is somewhat different. Some programs are trying to hold their places during the hiatus with less expensive shows; consequently re-budget replacements and a

few pilots are on tap for warm weather viewing.

Re-runs

Many favorites are being re-run for your enjoyment . . . Roy Rogers, Loretta Young, "Medic," "It's A Great Life," "My Little Margie," "This Is Your Life," "Dragnet," "You Bet Your Life," "So This Is Hollywood," "Captain Gallant of the Foreign Legion," "Disneyland," "T-Men In Action," "Four Star Playhouse," "Life With Father," Burns and Allen, and "Private Secretary," which fills the 7:00 p.m. Sunday time slot throughout the summer with re-runs. "Millionaire,"

"Big Town," "Ford Theatre," "People Are Funny," Bob Cummings, and "Fireside Theater." If you missed any of the episodes on the foregoing, now's the chance to see what's happened to Davy Crockett or "Father Day."

Replacements

Then there are shows which are destined to be summer replacements unless they prove to be sleepers and by the grace of a sponsor find a permanent niche when the fall schedules are set. In this category we find "Those Whiting Girls," subbing for "I Love Lucy." "Make the Connec-

tion" is the tentative title for the panel show replacing "Justice." "Caesar Presents," a variety show starring Phil Foster, replaces the regular Sid Caesar show. Bill Cullen as emcee on "Place The Face" and "Arthur Murray's Party" are slated as Martha Raye-Milton Berle replacements. Jan Murray's "Dollar A Second" subs for "Circle Theater," and "Musical Chairs" fills the Imogene Coca spot.

"The Search" replaces "Person to Person," "Ethel and Albert" subs for "December Bride," Ray Milland replaces "Our Miss Brooks" with reruns and Loretta Young's show will be replaced with "Cameo Theater."

Julius LaRosa will be heard across the board as replacement for Jo Stafford, Perry Como and Jane Froman. Matt Dennis fills Dinah Shore's Tuesday and Thursday time period, while Vaughn Monroe subs for Tony Martin and Eddie Fisher.

George Gobel could never be replaced so NBC wisely planned a variety show entitled, "Here's the Show" on which they'll spot George every three or four weeks. Dave Willock and Cliff Arquette telecast a do-it-yourself program in the "Mr. Peepers" time slot. Sam Levenson does "Two For The Money," giving Herb Shriner a summer vacation. "Your Hit Parade" gives way to a fun show, "Your Play Time."

Regulars

Many of the regulars are not taking time off for play but will continue throughout the summer. "Philco Playhouse," "Goodyear TV Playhouse," "Climax," and "What's My Line?"

are some of the stancher programs on a fifty-two weeks cycle.

There are many scripts and pilots floating around that will undoubtedly find a niche, if not this summer quite possibly next fall. At this point the pilot path is strictly a rumor one, but Paul Gilbert, Senor Wences, the clever ventriloquist, Cy Howard and Zsa Zsa Gabor in "Just Plain Folks," (now there's a provocative title) "The Mighty O," "Gunsmoke," and "Miss Pepperdine" starring Marie Wilson are but a few of the hopefuls anticipating that gleam in the sponsor's eye.

Young Personalities

In addition to pilots, CBS, in particular, has launched a program of grooming young personalities with the hopes of catching the viewers' fancy. Their hottest contractee at the moment is Johnny Carson.

The local stations are playing it safe and generally will have little, if any, upsets during the summer season. But the fact that competition is better and healthier than ever in the industry is reflected by the careful consideration which has been given to the summer programming.

Maybe it won't be so hard after all to leave that delightfully cool patio for some "real cool" programming on your hot video tube.

Uncertain

As we go to press there are still some shows uncertain as to what will happen. "Willy," "Favorite Husband," and "Line Up" are scheduled to take a hiatus but replacements have not as yet been announced.

Lifelines

JACK WEBB IS NOW IN THE cutting room sharpening up his latest movie, "Pete Kelly's Blues." He sneak-previewed it in Long Beach the other night and is using audience reaction as a guide in editing his flicker. Incidentally, this film will get a terrific television splurge on the Colgate show, Sunday, July 24. The entire hour will be devoted to a "Pete Kelly's Blues" special, with Jack producing, directing and acting; Peggy Lee and Janet Leigh also appearing. Jack leaves then on July 27 for his cross-country air tour to exploit his latest brain-child.

I HOPE TO SEE SOME OR ALL of the picture before the television show. I hear there are fourteen old tunes in the movie, plus three new ones. Just like the stickler he is for authenticity, Jack has seen to it that all fourteen songs were popular before December 31, 1927. Naturally he's hoping there will be at least one hit out of the three new ones, which are the title song, "Pete Kelly's Blues," "He Needs Me," and "Sing A Rainbow."

I THINK THERE IS AN INTERESTING observation as follow-up to this Jack Webb special show and it is: Summer TV seems to be a little better than usual this year. In addition to giving us some better weekly programs, the networks are extending themselves with frequent special shows to give viewers a cut above the usual hot-weather fare. It is conceivable that abundant audiences will make better programming an integral part of future summers. This could be one of the happiest things ever to happen. It's also conceivable that the leering vision of Pay-TV has the networks jumping to prove how good "free" television can be. If this is so, let's hope the toll vs. free TV hassle goes on interminably!

HERE'S ONE READER'S ANSWER ABOUT PAY TV:

"That provocative idea tossed your way about Pay-TV is much bigger than a fight between the studios and theater owners. There are some million or more TV set owners that have a vital interest against Pay-TV. For those viewers not willing or unable to pay must give up TV stations now enjoyed.

"PAY-TV IS ASKING FOR A TRIAL period to try the public reaction. There are many channels above "13" where

the experiment could be tried out. But no, the Pay-TV want to horn-in on present TV channels and deprive viewers of channels long enjoyed.

"PAY-TV IS A SYSTEM ORGANIZED for profit and demanding that present viewers sacrifice some of their viewing to guarantee this profit. For unmitigated gall, these Pay-TV folks, take the cake."

THE WELK SHOW MUST HAVE garnered a terrific audience the other evening when Alice made her first TV appearance following her harrowing week-end. Everybody was curious to see how she looked.

IT WAS NICE TO WELCOME "ETHEL AND ALBERT" back to the TV screen. Their first show was zany but completely delightful—and Peg herself wrote the amusing script.

IT'S GOING TO BE A LOT OF FUN seeing commercial television get off the ground in England. This was my conclusion after meeting Clifford Davis of the London Mirror during his recent visit in Hollywood. Davis, the Mirror's TV and radio correspondent, was bulging with information about the programs from our neck of the woods which will be screened, come fall, for Britishers.

"**DRAGNET**" HAS ALREADY BEEN SOLD, according to Davis, so has "Four Star Playhouse," "Inner Sanctum," "Hopalong Cassidy," Liberace and Roy Rogers. Burns and Allen, "Amos 'n' Andy" and "Range Rider," have been running on BBC. In Davis's opinion, American TV fare is so superior to anything produced in England that Britishers are afraid the foreign product will squeeze theirs right off the video tubes. As a result, the unions have imposed a quota of twenty per cent, limiting American television presentations to this amount of the total commercial fare. Already, though, close to eight million dollars

in American TV programs have been bought.

ONE INTERESTING THING ABOUT ENGLISH commercial TV. Davis claims that sponsors will not buy a definite show when they put their money on the line. They will buy the right to make an announcement, or, in other words, the time. This will preclude the possibility of the star of a show making a pitch for the product, the way many of them do here.

HERE IS AN INTERESTING SIDE-LIGHT on the opening N.O.P.D. program on KTTV . . . the one in which three New Orleans' police officers were killed in cold blood. The men playing the parts of the three officers were the sons of the three men who were killed in line of duty. There were actually five officers killed in this case, but for purposes of filming the television show the producer felt that this was a little too much for the audience to take and the number was reduced.

NOT TO BE MENTIONED IN THE SAME breath with human life, but also interesting, is the fact that on the "wide, wide world" color special insert from Tijuana on Monday, Cantinflas did not kill the bull in front of the TV audience but was scheduled to after the TV cameras were taken off the scene. It seems that an audience of 10,000 Mexicans were assembled in the arena for the TV show, and according to the country's custom the bull had to be conquered before they would go home.

SMALL WORLD DEPARTMENT: Before taking off for Eldon, Iowa, her old home town, Young and Rubicam publicist Carol Davis worked overtime preparing material on the star of an upcoming agency show, Johnny Carson. Shortly after arriving in Eldon she met a woman who asked Carol if she'd ever run into a chap in Hollywood with whom she used to baby sit. She remembered that this boy had once clobbered his brother while she was "sitting" with the children. Boy's name, of course, Johnny Carson!

The Depression was in full swing and boy trios like ours were as plentiful as dairy maids at milkin' time. But persistence paid off and we finally talked our way onto a program at WMT, though I'm sure it was against the better judgment of the station manager.

But then, maybe he figured he wasn't losin' much at \$16 a week for the three of us. Lookin' back on it, I thank the good Lord that the Wilbur brothers had folks who were farmers. Because if it hadn't been for those shoe boxes crammed full of fried chicken they sent us, I don't know what we would have done to keep the skin on our bones through those first lean years.

And I remember, too, the way it was with Fran Allison who used to wear herself to a frazzle along with the rest of us at WMT. Fran was doing her now-famous "Aunt Fanny" character for Waterloo radio rans. When she'd sign off for the day, she'd tuck a briefcase under her arm and pound the streets selling commercial time for the station as part of its sales staff. Now, of course, she's the "Fran" of "Kukla, Fran and Ollie," in addition to appearing regularly on Don McNeill's "Breakfast Club."

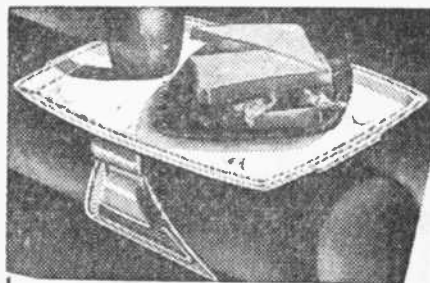

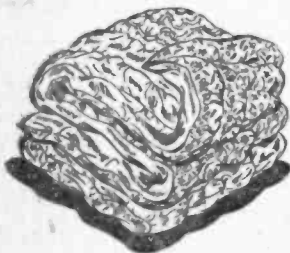

They have done other songs since, including "He Is Everywhere," "Mother," "Pray Today." These girls are more than grateful to Ellie Powell for the chances she has given them. They are a fan club in themselves. They are certainly moving now in their career.

NBC has a new comedy star called Harry Mimmo. He's now at the Coconut Grove and is one of the most unusual comics I've ever seen. He has a really different routine and he's a very funny man. Mimmo could be a big click on TV if he's handled carefully. He was supposed to have been on "Remember—1938" but his act was cut when the show ran too long. Perhaps he might have helped things. Also at the Grove with Mimmo are TV's "The Modernaires," and they do a zippy, fast-paced act. The Liberace take-off, though, should be dropped quickly since it is now old hat to satirize Liberace and this spot isn't too good. They don't need to indulge in such material—not with all the talent they have in the group.

In last week's issue a young man was touted as a big bet for TV. His name was erroneously listed as Mark Dawson. This is to inform all and sundry his name is MARK DAMON.

Odds and Ends: Joan Shawlee leaves in August for London to film more of the "Aggie" series. The property was sold and Joan apparently has her own series now. . . . Jan Merlin appears with Vanessa Brown and Ethel Waters in this week's "Climax," and it's his 750th live telecast. . . . Alan Baxter (currently appearing at the Biltmore in "Tea and Sympathy," with Deborah Kerr, and isn't anyone ever going to send me passes to anything?) is a photographer who inadvertently snaps a picture of a fugitive Nazi during an innocent camera binge, and gets into a peck of trouble. Nazi Richard Kollmar is bent on obtaining the picture, of course, and baits his trap with pretty Virginia Gillmore, but Alan is pretty sharp himself, and charms Miss Gillmore into switching to his side, thus bringing all the bad guys to a good end... they become deceased. I have always thought Mr. Baxter to be a pretty fair actor, and if you don't believe me, go to the Biltmore. Now, isn't anybody ever going to send me, etc., etc.

"Macbeth." (9) July 2, 9:30. Here's an Orson Welles item (and sit well away from the screen or he's liable to spit in your eye, the way he did in a London critic's a week or so ago) that is based on a work by William Shakespeare, and I'm sure Channel 9 didn't pay \$500,000 for it. As a matter of fact, I hope they didn't pay over \$1.98. Naw, I'm only kidding (I can see my award as I write this). It's an interesting picture, but I can't seem to remember the plot. Anyway, Roddy McDowall and Dan O'Herlihy are also in the cast and it all takes place in Scotland.

"So Ends Our Night." (9) July 5, 8:00. I haven't mentioned this one in a long time, and I'm only doing so now because I want to say once again that Fredric March is one of the two or three best actors in the U.S. when he really works at it. Here, he gives one of his most impressive performances as a man hounded from country to country by the Gestapo, during the late thirties. He befriends a pair of young refugees, Glenn Ford and Margaret Sullivan, and the major portion of the film concerns itself with their efforts to find a place for themselves in a chaotic world. This is a good picture, as adapted from the Remarque novel, and I think I'll enjoy seeing it again.

"We Want Writers" Story Starts Literary Rhubarb

Two typical letters printed to show how some of our readers reacted. Suggestion made to solve problem.

A "literary rhubarb" would be the best way to describe the reactions to the recent TV-RADIO LIFE article entitled,

"When Will They Stop Screaming: 'We Want Writers!'—And Start Doing Something About It?"

The following letters, pro and con, are typical examples of the comments received. In order to "follow up" on our story and to present both sides of the argument, we are publishing these letters.

Al Klein, North Hollywood

Your June 10 issue did our "amateur writers" hearts a lot of good when you and Mr. Young took a crack at NBC's earthshaking announcement about their talent search.

Talent search, my foot!

There are enough writers in Southern California to keep NBC readers busy twenty-four hours a day. We could send them in faster than they could read them. But, as you so aptly put it, it wouldn't make very good publicity.

Not only is this fiasco of theirs a slap in the face to the hopeful writers of this state and the state of New York, it is also a boot in the collective pants to the writers that are now employed by NBC.

I'm inclined to believe that this alleged "talent search" is just a smelly dream that 'publicity' thought up.

Why, the newest writer could think up a better plot than that. And they say that WE don't have any talent!

Let me make one exception to your article. We are not discouraged by rejection slips, nor do we say "I don't have any ability" when we get ope. Our stories are never lousy, at least not to us.

So we will keep trying to sell our stories until we are remuneratively employed by some studio...

Martha O'Connor, Hollywood

Mr. Marvin Young's recent article on the trials and tribulations of the novice TV writer was undoubtedly greeted with cries of joy in certain quarters, but let's take a look for another, and slightly more realistic, angle. There's no doubt that the pundits of television row are neglecting the talent lurking in their own backyard, but how much of this is deliberate and how much of it is common sense?

I've worked as a reader for several of the top publishing firms of the country and for the past years as an editor of the West Coast Branch of

a national publisher. As part of my job, I read an average of twenty to thirty manuscripts a week, chiefly the work of unpublished, non-professional writers. When I first went into my duties, I had hopes of discovering at least one potential Hemingway per week. I'm still looking for him. That isn't to say that I haven't found good stories, and successful stories, but the ratio of acceptances to rejects is in the low percentages. For the most part, I wade through a collection of hand-written, badly constructed, totally impossible trivia, and if the situation is this bad for the book publishing industry, I shudder to think of the burden falling on such highly technical, specialized mediums as television. At least, when a property is submitted by an agent, I have the consolation of knowing that it's legible!

Assume for a wild moment that every producer could take the time and trouble to read every amateur script that came his way. He wouldn't have time to do anything else, but just for the sake of argument, we'll give him a stack of material and forget about him. Now let's take up the author himself. The professional writer is usually a realistic person. He has to be, or he wouldn't be a professional. He has written for a small station, perhaps, or he has some experience in the industry. Before he sets his sights on his target, he knows how to load his gun. He knows something about dramatic construction and the limitations of the camera. The signing of a release isn't a dark mystery to him, because he knows a bit about the business end of the industry. He can make revisions, or do some re-writing to suit the needs of the characters and of the program.

Not so the average amateur. I have found, through experiences both sad and funny, that the worse the manuscript, the more rigid the author's conviction that every single word he has written is revelation. The kindest criticism, or the most noncommittal rejection is proof to him that a conspiracy exists to keep his immortal words from reaching the public. If there is a talent, I know that it will only be a matter of time and experience before it bears fruit. But, if a manuscript is entirely hopeless, or the work of a crank or fanatic, I hold my breath until it is out of my hands and safely returned to the author. From this lunatic fringe comes the insulting letter, the series of wild phone calls, or that horror of the entertainment industry... the plagiarism suit. An author of this type may have an old manuscript in his desk, one that didn't get past the first reader, but if he sees a movie or show that contains a vague resemblance to his "original"

he will fly to a lawyer. To protect themselves against this, the producers have set up barriers that may seem like blind stupidity to the writer who hasn't climbed over them. But to the producer, they are a slight safeguard against wasted time, trouble and possible injury.

Let's face it. It's pretty hard to hide real talent under a bushel. A highly competitive business is no place for the easily discouraged, and if these are winnowed out, the result is... better scripts and better writers. A producer can't play nurse-maid or literary critic, and a writer can't expect to be handed a commercial show to experiment with, while he learns his craft by trial and error. Anyone knows that in order to find gold you have to turn over rocks, but they also know what they can expect to find under the rocks. It's no wonder that the harried producer prefers to tap the existing veins, or confine his search to areas where a strike has been made.

Still, the fact remains that there is a dearth of new material in the TV and motion picture industry. No one will dispute Mr. Young on that point, but the answer isn't to lay out the welcome mat and duck.

There's a crying need for a Super Clearance Bureau, supported by the TV companies, with the active cooperation of their producers and directors. It would need people who know good writing when they see it. The usual agent, especially the one who has enough time on his hands to represent untried writers, doesn't know a script from a stripper. He sells personalities, not ideas. The usual reader, on the other hand, may know good writing, but his experience may be so academic as to be useless to a dramatic, visual medium. Somewhere the producers will have to find people who are literate without being arty, readers who can understand the type, mood, slant and audience of each particular program concerned, and shoot the right script into the right hands. For the producer, this means an increasing source of fresh material. For the writer, it would provide a staff of interested, qualified helpers to work with him toward a professional approach. The producer with the best will in the world ordinarily can't sit down and discuss the script that "doesn't quite come off" with the author, but someone can, and should.

A plan along these lines has its drawbacks, but in the long run, it would do more toward solving the problem than anything else. It would put a stop to the exploitation of untalented hopefuls by so-called agents, schools and literary "revisionists" and it would save the promising writer from the bewildering process of submitting a story to program after program, with no idea of actual requirements. As for the companies, the success of the project would depend entirely on the interest and help they are willing to give, via story conferences, up-to-date bulletins, and a careful screening of all material that passes into their hands. The Hollywoodites would be only too glad to look in their own back yards, Mr. Young, but let's do a little weeding first.

"Winning Team" Makes KTTV Click

Richard Moore, Channel 11's new president, explains what it takes for a local TV station to stay "alive" in the face of stiff high-budgeted, network competition.

Can you remember four years ago when Los Angeles was still in the kinescope "forest" and relied mainly on local live shows, including wrestling, for its television entertainment? That's when Richard Moore was given the assignment of managing KTTV, then owned fifty-one per cent by The Times and forty-nine per cent by CBS.

Last week when Moore was elevated to the KTTV presidency, TV-Radio Life was interested, and thought its readers would be, too, in the story of how Moore and his "winning team" at KTTV steered the station out of uncertain waters into full steam ahead on the high seas of local independent TV.

Channel 11's affiliation with CBS ended in 1951 and with it KTTV lost twenty hours of prime programming. It was thrown back on its own creative resources, but even with live shows, which were very expensive, wasn't able to command much of the audience. "A four rating was high," Moore recalls with a grin. Then the microwave was completed and KTTV found it impossible to equal the live productions of the networks. The Big Move which started the station on its sensational climb was taken in the summer of '52 when KTTV bought a half-hour filmed program starring Abbott and Costello, who were then rid-



ing high as alternating stars on the "Comedy Hour."

"We bought this film at the highest price paid by us for a film before or since," Moore stated. "At that time Berle was the Tuesday night king . . . everyone was afraid of him. Old movies were the only things on locally against 'Uncle Miltie.' We saw an opportunity in Abbott and Costello to provide something new, so we built the Big Night around this new purchase. We got 'Ramar of the Jungle,' which we ran before Abbott and Costello. We programmed Tito Guizar after Abbott and Costello. Then we bought the 'Heart of the City,' (the re-run of 'Big Town'). This was the first time a network re-run had been made available. Then we scheduled a movie, so in one evening we gave our viewers adventure, comedy, music, mystery and a picture. Incidentally, Abbott and Costello DID get a higher rating than Berle, and soon KTTV became first on Tuesday night in the seven to eleven o'clock time. All of a sudden we had sponsors coming to US."

Tackled Saturday

Using this same scheme, KTTV proceeded to build a strong Saturday night with "Life of Riley," "Badge 714," and "Captured," which is the re-run of "Gangbusters." It suddenly found itself first on Saturday night. "These are the two best promotion maneuvers we've made," Moore claims.

Meanwhile, George Putnam on KTTV began to catch on fire. The station was the first to go into the late night programming with Jackson Wheeler. Other personalities like "Sheriff John," Eleanor Hempel, Paul Coates . . . all Academy Award Winners . . . strengthened the personality roster of KTTV, along with Bill Leyden, Dude Martin, Ed Reimers, Norma Gilchrist and Bill Welsh. Present ratio of film-to-live programming at KTTV is seventy-five per cent film if one considers the actual time on the air. "No local station can produce enough top quality programming live," Moore claims.

As a result of this thinking that film is The Thing for a local independent outlet, KTTV now claims nine out of the top ten syndicated shows in Los Angeles and is the biggest purchaser of filmed shows in the country. Other independent stations throughout the United States have watched KTTV with interest, and now when they talk of converting to a predominately filmed program schedule they say they are going to "do a KTTV." Currently there are 216 national and local spot accounts on Channel 11 . . . more than on any other Los Angeles station, according to Moore.

Families

Moore's television "family" comprises John Vrba, vice-president in

charge of sales; Bob Breckner, vice-president in charge of programming; Jack O'Mara, promotion head; Reavis Winkler, publicity, and several others who are apt to be called for impromptu meetings, as well as the usual Friday staff conference. These include chief engineer Ed Benham; Les Norins, local sales; Dick Woollen, film director; George Ruby, comptroller; Bruce Baumeister, legal counsel, and Ernest Lee, director of services. Some or all of these gentlemen are not surprised at a 3:00 a.m. call from the boss. Moore's home family, wife Jane, three sons and small daughter, know that dad is a telephone-user who needs two instruments to accomplish all his business. He also watches his television set constantly. "I look at the competition to see what's going on," he says.

A Yale law graduate, Moore is not sorry he deserted his tomes for television. "I didn't like sitting and solving others' problems. It is much more fun creating your own," he claims.

- 1 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. wine vinegar
- 1 Clove garlic—chopped
- 1 Cup sauterne wine
- 2 Tbsp. raisins
- 2 Tbsp. pine nut seeds
- 1/4 Tsp. red pepper crushed
- 1/2 Cup warm water
- Salt and pinch of Rosemary

Clean chicken and cut into small pieces. Place olive oil and pounded salt pork in a thick pot with parsley, garlic and crushed pepper. Add chicken and brown well for 20 minutes. Add salt, rosemary, sugar and vinegar; stir well. Pour 1/2 cup sauterne wine over it. Cover. Simmer for 10 minutes. Add tomatoes blended with 1/4 cup warm water. Lower the flame. Add pine nut seeds and raisins. Cover tightly. Simmer 20 minutes or until chicken is tender. Add rest of the sauterne. Let boil for 1 minute. Serve piping hot.

Women Can Be "Hams," Too

YL's, women amateur radio operators from ten to eighty, have invaded a hobby predominated by males. They've just concluded their first international convention at Santa Monica.

"The "ham" had a field day last weekend when members of the Young Ladies' Radio League held their first international convention in Santa Monica. The YLRL, an organization of women amateur radio operators, was founded in 1939 with a membership of only thirteen. Today they have close to 600 world-wide members in their ranks.

Eavesdropping on a couple of "hams" is rather confusing. Their conversation sounds like a lot of double talk. But once you become accustomed to hearing them refer to one another by call letters rather than names you begin to get the gist of what's going on. The safest way to get any information from these double-talking hobbyists is to pin them down with direct questions.

Charter member Lenore Kingston Conn, W6NAZ, and Gladys Eastman, W6DXI, treasurer of the YL Club of Los Angeles, willingly submitted to our interrogation.

Why do most women become ham operators?

Most women who pursue the hobby are married to ham operators, or O.M.s—a male amateur radio operator, and to avoid becoming a radio widow they become "hams." Sometimes the only way they could see their husbands during leisure hours was to get a license of their own and share the transmitter and radio shack. (No matter how simple or elaborate a set-up might be it is referred to as a "shack.")

In some cases, girls actually have met their future husbands on the radio waves. Martha Edwards, W6QYL, met her husband on the 75 meter phone band when she was introduced to him by another YL ham. The wedding guests were practically all "hams." And those who could not attend were given a follow-up description via radio. It's interesting to note that Martha credits ham radio with being a life saver during a recent long period of convalescence.

What about those call letters?

They are proud of them just as if they were their middle names. California is the Sixth call area, so that 6 places us here. The W or K before the 6 indicates the USA, and the last three letters are their very own. Governor Knight signed a bill recently authorizing them to use their call letters on their auto license plates. They hardly ever know a "ham's" last name but his or her call letters are tremendously important. Other countries have their own prefixes so they know as soon as they hear them where they are.

How do they use the YL network?

Some of the members are active in Civilian Defense drills. "Hams" stand

ready to provide auxiliary communications in case of emergency and power failure. Gladys W6DXI, and her O.M. husband, Lee Eastman, keep regular net schedules with Civilian Defense. As a matter of fact, Gladys' children are also ham operators.

Many of the members perform another kind of service. They use their stations to let wives and loved ones of GIs overseas talk to the boys stationed in places such as Guam, Okinawa, Japan and Germany.

The girls in Los Angeles, sixty-five strong, have set up an ironing board net on Tuesdays when they all tune in on the same frequency and gossip back and forth as they iron. This net extends up to Northern California.

What are some of the unusual things YL members have accomplished?

Betty Gillies, W6QOO, is more than a ham operator and homemaker. She's a pilot and a participant in powder puff derbies. World traveler Evelyn Scott, W6NZP, is in charge of all auxiliary communications for the Powder Puff Derby emanating from Long Beach. W6NZP has put her ham radio to other uses. Before taking a trip to South Africa last year she communicated with other "hams," establishing contact and making arrangements for her visit. And when she and her O.M. husband arrived in South Africa, instead of checking in at a hotel they were the house guests of various, other hams.

The general chairman for the first YLRL International Convention, Maxine Willis, W6UHA, made all arrangements for the conclave via radio. Members from Hawaii, the Canal Zone, from almost every city in the States, and other points on the globe most of them meeting for the first time were contacted by Maxine, who holds the record for distance communication.

Coincidentally, Governor Knight issued an executive statement recognizing June 19-26 as Amateur Radio Week.

The fem "hams" had a great time but bet there were a lot of husbands who were glad when the convention was over. It was probably the longest stretch of baby sitting most of them have done since they became papas.

Notes to You

This week, a pair of unique vocal albums appeared on Columbia; one twelve-inch long-play record featured a dozen songs originally recorded by Ruth Etting in the '20s—the other spotlighted twelve more from the soundtrack of MGM's "Love Me or Leave Me," in which Doris Day portrays Miss Etting's life. Although vastly different stylists, you can



readily see why both were (or are) tops in their individual eras, although separated by nearly a quarter century. Word from the East Coast is that the Etting collection is out-selling Doris Day's, although when we compared them on

"Turn Back the Clock" (KFI, 8:45-9:30 a.m. daily) the reaction was about evenly divided. Since old and new versions of "Mean to Me," "Shaking the Blues Away," "At Sundown," "Love Me or Leave Me," "Sam, the Old Accordion Man," "It All Depends on You," and "Ten Cents a Dance" are sung by both vocalists, the comparisons are doubly interesting—you pays your money an' takes your choice.

"In the Wee Small Hours" (Capitol LP) is a collection of sixteen great standards by Frank Sinatra, recorded—as the title implies—long after hours. Sung in the intimate Sinatra style, this is the sort of thing that's right down Frank's alley, and just about the best thing he's done in a month of Sundays or any other day of the week. It's mood singing at its best, with Frank wringing every bit of loneliness he can from the songs.

"The Mel Powell Bandstand" (Vanguard) is a fine jazz showcase of a top jazz piano man who needs no introduction. On the seven selections of this LP, Powell has the very able assistance of a seven-man combo and vocalist Joan Wile—and while emphasis is mostly on arrangement and ensemble, Mel's solos are an adventure in piano technique and advanced harmonic concepts.

There are many slides to the jazz picture and, in this view, improvising has given way to form and discipline in arrangements—a welcome relief from the every-man-for-himself style—and jazz fans must admit that Mel Powell's pianistic talents remain as fresh and undimmed as ever... It's still creative jazz that provides its appeal. A.M.

Pauline Frederick, Talking

NBC's Pauline Frederick, the first female commentator to win the coveted Peabody Award for "The Best Radio Contribution to International Understanding" during 1954, was in familiar territory when she covered the Tenth Anniversary of the United Nations last week. Miss Frederick, the only woman network news commentator, covered the forming of the United Nations in 1945.

Despite her extremely busy schedule, we contacted Miss Frederick in San Francisco for an exclusive telephone interview. Comparing her reactions to the United Nations ten years ago with her thoughts of the U.N. today, she said: "It seems to me that there is a more realistic approach in the United Nations today than there was ten years ago. There was greater emotion at the launching of the U.N. than there is now."

The reporter further thought that many people were disappointed in the U.N. because it was not used as originally intended. At this session there seems to be a closer return to the concept of the U.N. Delegates are more realistic now than they were ten years ago. The U.N. can only succeed as long as there is co-operation, a split in the powers is detrimental. But the spirit of the U.N. seems to be returning, according to Miss Frederick's observations.

On June 19 Miss Frederick snagged an impromptu interview with Molotov when his car was departing from the San Francisco railroad station. She shouted to him from outside the car. "How does the United States look?" When he saw the NBC mike in her hand he answered through his interpreter: "Thank you for the welcome by you given to all of the Soviet Union Delegates on arrival here. Allow me to convey through you cordial greetings to the people of San Francisco, the city where the United Nations organization was born."

The astute commentator summed up her feelings at the end of an exciting week by saying: "I feel a little like the U.N. delegate who said this week was more exciting and tiring than the Battle of Dunkirk."

Andy, Virginia Expand

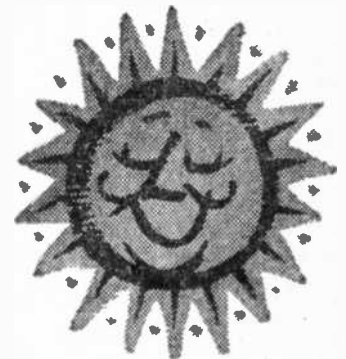

For example, it requires two and a half hours to carry on less than 15 minutes of actual action on the field!

And a third of a year to prepare for 12 contests when a baseball player readies himself for 154 games in a month and a half.

This, admittedly, is not one of the leading mysteries of our era.

But it must be an incentive to moments of meditation for the men in moleskins, especially when they discover that their annual earnings are, on the average, only a third—or, perhaps, in some of the more fortunate instances, perhaps one half—of that gleaned by the boys in the spiked shoes.

However, that is neither here nor there.

And since it isn't, the men obliged to pay the professional footballers undoubtedly would just as soon leave it there . . . and as far over there as possible.

This somewhat obscure thought seems to lead logically into an evaluation of the possibilities of the local pros.

Such an evaluation is not difficult.

They have all the possibilities in the world, just as they have had for the past two years in which they've wound up somewhat out of it (with "it" in this case to be defined as the higher sections of the standings, and not necessarily the world . . . although this, too, is a distinct possibility).

Actually, the Rams have come fairly close to winning the world championship every year since they hit town during the exhibition season.

Because of this, a great number of fans have purchased regular season tickets to see these potential world champions win.

Then has come the great disillusionment.

Those games won in August and September haven't counted in the standings.

Still players used too long in too many games that didn't count have been unable to play even though they were tired or injured in games that had no bearing on the outcome of the race for the title.

So it would appear that the best one could hope for the Rams would be that Sid Gillman can convince his superiors that the training season is for training; and that Bert Rose can convince the fans that you can't—and, more important, don't even have to—win 'em all, especially the ones that don't count, to be a potential champion.

When Day Is Done

This is when Lawrence Welk sheds the baton and the one-a-two-a-three character picks up a book and goes to bed. It's never just ANY book. His reading choices range from books on business and world affairs to philosophy and religion. He is quite a student of the most famous philosophers and he combines their thinking with his own exact religious beliefs as a basis for the conduct of his business life and of his family life. Lawrence is not the kind of person who talks a religion—he lives by what he believes. He governs his life by the beliefs he holds, and he has gained strength from the faith that is singularly his.

Lawrence is a deep thinker—and he is also a little analytical. He reasons everything out and listens to others' opinions but once he has made up his mind about something he sticks to it. He's stubborn in that respect.

Likes Food

Each day in the Welk household is interrupted intermittently with business calls, and yet Lawrence takes on the attitude of Mr. Man-About-The House. A phone call might catch him putting in a request for his favorite

dish for dinner, but actually just plain food is Lawrence's choice. Meat is the dish for him. He doesn't like anything too dressed up or spicy. Plainly cooked roast beef, broiled steaks or baked chicken head his list. Although he is not an Englishman tea rates high with Lawrence—with just a little lemon and sugar added. Cookies and cold drinks are a favorite pick-me-up snack, although, as a rule, he doesn't care for sweets.

Lawrence isn't altogether at a loss in the kitchen. Scrambled eggs are his specialty. "I kinda brag about my scrambled eggs," he says. "Now those aren't just ordinary scrambled eggs, but they're made with cream and either mushrooms, onions, or cheese—depends on whom I'm cooking for. The secret of successful scrambled eggs is cooking with the proper heat and just the right amount of butter." Lawrence's kitchen escapades don't happen often as Fern (Mrs. Welk) keeps things moving pretty fast in that area without any help from Mr. Music.

His Music

Since music is so much a part of Lawrence's life it's also a hobby. He likes to work with the sound system he has wired throughout the house. He literally has music wherever he goes. This comes in handy when his daughter, Donna Lee, dances with her Dad—which she does almost every

day. For a long time, though, Donna would dance mostly "bop." She had learned this from her school friends, but recently she has willingly taken to the sweet notes a la her father's style. Lawrence, Jr. dances the sweet stuff too, although he's not backward about "bop."

Lawrence is currently working with other top orchestra leaders to get dance bands to play more real dance music. He enjoys dancing so much himself he feels that people aren't getting the kind of music now that really gives them a chance to cut a rug or two.

Lawrence is also somewhat sport-minded, with golf getting the nod. His pet prank is to talk his opponents out of shots. He really works to win at the game. Next to golf he likes gardening.

"I find yard work very plesasant," Lawrence admits. "I wish I had more time to spend in the garden. I like flowers—especially the ones that smell. Gardenias are my favorites."

For other Welk-isms, he dresses modestly loud... his favorite color is light blue... he wears some coats with a metallic thread in the material... he is not moody or temperamental... he is sentimental... and he is one of the busiest men in these parts as he continues to delight fans with his KTLA and ABC-TV shows

Hang On and Hope

Jim Davis of "Stories of the Century" has had more ups and downs in his career than almost any star in town. Now he knows just where he's going.

 JIM DAVIS AND KRISTINE MILLER have appeared in several episodes of "Stories of the Century." Jim's success as an actor is one of the most interesting of all Hollywood stories.

BY ALL rights Jim Davis, "Matt Clark" of KTTV's "Stories of the Century," should have given up the ghost long ago.

He got a big send-off in a picture with Bette Davis called "Winter Meeting." It laid a sizable egg. And Jim didn't work for nine months after that one. But there was just enough of the Missourian in him—he's not from Texas or Oklahoma as you'd imagine—to refuse to be counted out. So today he's doing nicely in his own TV series, "Stories of the Century," which walked off with an "Emmy" award this year.

It's a long climb from being out to being on top, and Jim knows what it takes to keep on plugging when you can't see any reason for trying any more.

Keep Plugging

"Any young person starting out in this business," drawled the likable Jim, "has to realize first of all that he's going to have a lot of knocks and slaps in the face, and he's going to have to gear himself to the blows that are sure to come. You can't be a huge success over night. Most of the over-night sensations I've heard of had spent years trying to hit the top rung of that ladder. Being an actor takes a lot of patience, and I made up my mind a long time ago to go right on plugging. I may eventually go down, but I won't go down not trying.

"When I first went into the business I wasn't too serious about the idea of being an actor. I had a college degree, I had a good job with an oil company, and I knew I could make a living. But when I was transferred here things began to change. A friend

and I were driving past Republic Studios one day and I asked him what the place was. 'That's Republic Studios,' my friend replied. 'Guess those movie stars make a lot of money,' I observed. We then went into the studios to try to sell them some oil. We didn't—but I decided to try acting—as a lark.

"And that's how it all happened. I got the bug to act and it stayed with me."

After Jim's unfortunate experience in the Bette Davis picture things looked pretty black. He had to find a way to pay his rent and so one day he went into an office in Beverly Hills and asked for a job.

"What can you do?" he was asked.

When Jim said he was an actor there was the expected reaction. After all, the office where Jim was applying dealt in construction jobs.

"But I can pour concrete as well as the next guy," Jim said, and so he began work on a construction gang.

Still he wouldn't give up the acting. He began to get a few parts here and there. He played leads, heavies, anything. Then one day he was at Republic making "Jubilee Trail" when Herbert Yates, owner of the studio, asked to see him in his office at five. At the meeting Yates told Jim about the projected TV series, "Stories of the Century." Since Jim had always wanted to do a western type of show for television, it was right up his alley. Some time later the show got under way.

"The TV program has done a lot for me, career-wise," Jim stated. "It's brought me to the attention of a good many people. The biggest surprise to

me is discovering what a large juvenile audience we have. I had thought that going on as late as we do we would get more of an adult audience. I've been happy to learn that many parents approve of the show so much that they don't mind if their children stay up a little late to watch it.

"The program has given me more self-assurance. It's nice to know you're the pivotal factor in a series. It's been good for my morale and it's kept me so busy I haven't had time to think of anything else."

Jim's family is also happy about the state of things. His wife believes that the show has made him a better husband too.

"I don't think I'm too much of a problem to live with," Jim grinned. "At least my wife and my baby daughter, Tara, don't seem to be complaining too much. I'm pretty much of a home guy anyway. Marriage sure changed me in that respect. Now I don't like going out—except for a game of golf. At home I do the usual chores. I call myself a yard man in that I fuss around in the garden. Not because I like it but because I can't afford a gardener.

"My ambition is to have a working ranch one day—not the gentleman farmer kind of thing, but a real ranch.

"For the present at least, though, I'm going right on acting. I'd only get out of this business for one reason—if I found I couldn't make enough to take care of my wife and baby. I'm not too worried about that now, however. We're doing okay."

This from a man who, according to the "wise ones" in Hollywood, would never get another job as an actor.

Just what real effect does a religious program like this have on people who are earnestly seeking their answers by prayer? How does it help them acquire faith?

GOD HAS a strong worker in the "Family Theatre" program which goes out over KHJ.

For eight years this inspiring dramatic series has been providing entertainment but, even more important, it has tried to instill in people the desire to incorporate daily prayer in their lives. Certainly there is a "message" on this show. You'll find it at the beginning and at the end. It is what those in charge of "Family Theatre" refer to as their "commercials." And yet there is always one primary emphasis in all this program does—to point up by dramatic incidents the value of prayer.

This is a Catholic-sponsored show but its approach is non-sectarian and the stars, over 300 of them, who have appeared are not all Catholics. Prayer, after all, knows no denominations.

But—has "Family Theatre" brought people closer to prayer as a guide in their lives? Judging from some of the mail received the answer would have to be a resounding Yes.

Mail

There was one woman who had been crippled most of her life. She had fallen into a pit of self pity and resentment. Then one day she happened to overhear a "Family Theatre" show. Its message seemed to be directed right at her. Suddenly, she began to look outside of herself and her problems. She began to notice others who were far less fortunate than she. She began to see the need for prayer

in her life. And her life was changed from that moment on.

Another woman wrote that she had been downhearted for a long time. One day she was riding along in her car when she tuned in "Family Theatre." She listened intently and gradually she began to realize how seldom, if ever, she went to church. Somehow she found an answer to all that had bothered her. Church and prayer came back into her life—and brought her happiness.

Another case was brought to the attention of the "Family Theatre" group. A young couple was driving to Las Vegas with one thought in mind—to end their marriage. On their car radio was a "Family Theatre" show, and, as it happened, it dealt with divorce. By the time it was over, the young couple had begun to ask themselves many questions. They finally realized they had both been selfish, they had both made mistakes, so they decided to try again to hold on to their marriage.

This program has even gone into countries behind the Iron Curtain. In a prison camp in China one GI had a radio which he buried until the guards were out of sight and then he'd dig it up and listen to what broadcasts he could get. One of them happened to be the "Family Theatre's" Christmas show, "Joyful Hour."

Stars

The stars—and other important figures in business—have all clamored to be on the show. Personalities who do appear are selected carefully, but

even with such careful screening there are cases where someone in some part of the country will write in, "What did you have so-and-so on for?" Seems this person had heard a rumor about some improper conduct, hadn't checked the fact, and had assumed that the star had a questionable reputation. You can be sure that any star who does appear is beyond reproach. Ann Blyth, Loretta Young and Jeff Chandler are about in a tie for the most appearances, each having appeared around thirty-five times. Jeff wants to beat Loretta's record right now. He called the producer recently and said, "Don't you love me any more? You haven't had me on for some time." The Jimmy Cagneys appear each year—and will let nothing interfere with their appearances on the show.

As Father Lawyer and Father Corr, two of the men behind "Family Theatre" said, "We only try to entertain in a clean way and yet bring God into the lives of everyone. We think it's a worthwhile job." That is probably the understatement of the year,
