Seri-ous-minded. in spite of his dizzy proiessional humor. and a gemuine plugger, he works as hard over his days as a bookkeeper over his figures. Jessel, on the other hand. is flightier. His marriage had gone on the racks, and he was a little cynical. He lits a remarkable, extemporaneuts wit and was kurwa in New York as "the greatest after-dimer spenker in the world." IVe was an intimate friend oi gay ex-mayor Jimmy Walker, and was his favorite toastmaster.

So while Cantor kept pretty much to himself, Jessel urok in the gay suots. Voldie couldn't stand the sight of Georgie throwing his money to the winds. He began (1) rebuke lim alsout this. (Jice they were hoth invited to a party that wats leing given in one of the citiss they toured.

I great little fixer he was. and a great pal. As a matter of faet, Fohlie evell stayed a week longer in New York so that he conld appear on lessel's first program. and "break him ints radio." After that (ieorgie carried on alone.

I don't know what it was that caused jessel to flop on that hour. Perhajs it was thecause it was almost intpossible for anyone to buck the tremendous popularity of Cantor. Perhaps it was because he wasult quite on to radio technique at that time. But whatever the reason. Jessel heard the fans clamoring. "We want Cantor! Wie want Cantor!" It was a pretty heartbroken Jeasel whem left the air.

1 must bring in Norna Talnadge at this point hecause she figures so prominertly in Jessel's life. Georgie first met her in 1925. He was playing in "The Jazz Singer" in Calitornia at that time, and he noticed the beantiful Sirma seated in the first row of the theatre three nights in a row! PHIL NAPOLEON, ace trumpeter at NBC and the organizer of the original "Memphis Five." holds a coveted place in the history of the National l3roadeasting Company. Few prople outside of New York know I'hil, but there's history in that that boy.
On the evening of November 15 . 1926. NBC went on the air far the first time from its new studios at 711 Fifth Avenue in New York City. It was a gala uccasion. It meaint the beginning of an experiment which was destined to make radio history. Celebrities were there. Big business turned nut. All eyes were on this now venture.

When the switch was thrown, and the amonncer opened the first network program, Phil Napoleon was one of the featured instrumentalists of the first musical number on that first program. For the first time. a network program was on the air. and thousands of people heard the wailing notes of Phil's trumpet.

Many things can happen in seven years. Today. NBC has outgrown those studios at 711 Fifll Avenue Radio City now stands as the realization of that first experiment. On the evening of November 11. 1933. when 711 was all deserted save one studio, Phil was in that stutio ready to give the last program from the old buikding. The control engineer gave his last opering signal. An announcer stepped to a microphone and announced his last progran from the building that has lrought kings and queens to your loudspeakers. Then music. And there was Pliil. featured in at trumpet solto.

At the conclasion of the prograns. the giant switch that was to forever

Litule Anthony Frome had seen her here when he had arrived for the usual evening of song. He had known it was Mrs. Blitz heeanse he had heard his mother and the neighbors say theyd taken her to Ferren's. In the crowied little blitz house there was no rom fur death. But never liefore in all the years they had lived side by side had Anthony seen Mers. Blit? still like that. her hands itlle and folded.

Herlert Ferren somited a mote on his pitch pipe.
"La," he sang in his booming haritone.
"La," samg Ambony in his boy soprano.
It never oceurred to Ambony that it might he diserespectinl to the clead for him and Mr. Ferren to yo on with their lessom that particmar evening. It never occurred to Anthony that there conld be anything disrespect ful ahout singing under any circumstances. On the contraty

Anthony was born with a song in his heart. He sang when he was happy. He sang when he was sad. He sang as he poled his rait along the Ohio Niver. He sang as he went his evening rounds. llinging twisted copies of the local newspapers onto Fiellaire's respectable front porches.
Besides, how could it possilly be disrespectful to sing hymons. And it was always with hymus that Herbert Ferren. a fervent Bapist, elected to teach the young Anthony what he knew about singing. What if those hymus were oppmsed to Anthonys Faith and he and his perple worshipped orty the God of Israel?

The main thing was that Anthony had a voice. That Inthony had a voice and if he didn't help fim cultivate it, no one clse would. Pamilies who lived along the river banks certainly hati no money for anything like singing lessons.

- ! was there just a few weeks aso." he saikt. "To see my mother. She isn't well. It is hearing me sing over the air. so she says. that keets her alise." He sniled. "Actually. of course it is her amazing fighting spirit.
" Is a hoy," he went on, "I never reatized how hard my nuther worked. 'The Italan mother in the honse next doon worked hard, too. And always my mother seemed to have time to spare. She would run down the roat to clean house and cook dinner for some wife who was ill."

On Saturdays Anthony went with his mother and father and ninc brothers and sisters to the poor little

synagogue. (In Sindays he went with his friend, a little [rish loy, to the Catholic Church which stood in Gothic grandeur on the hill.
"lt wasn"t in fact," be told the "until I was thirteen that I knew I had any fault to, find with life, that I realized I was poor and. at the same time. became aware of the rich people who lived up on the hill. the mill and factory owners, those who controlled the coal mines where most of the men I knew crawled about under the earth like worms.
"Sand it was at about the same time that I also beyan to hear the neighors" grombling how they could keep their families for a year on less money than the hill ment lost over a catrl table during a single evening."

Ambony, going on iourteen now, wanted to ask those grumbling men and women. "But why do yon stay on here? Why. in all the vears, haven't yot tone something towards getting awiy?" What he sabi insted was:
"l.m going to work. I'm going to save morrey towards college. I'm going to get away from liellaire. One day l'm going to be rich."

[Becanse man has reared a glittery pile of steel and stone into onar mid-Manlattan skyline that sweeps one's imagination and hurls it across the miverse on marehing kilocycles.

Tonight, it is this incredible air caste that we visit for a peek loehind the broadensting scenes. We shall see-if our eves are alen-many a gilded favorite and his girl friend. and many a modern miracle of science that would have sent our great-great-grandmothers galloping to our great-great-graudfathers crying "Witcheraft!"

Just the other night, for instance. from this crossroads of the air were hurled messages picked up withon thenefit of wire from London. Rio de laneiro, Rome, Moscow. Buenos Aires. Montevider, and lierlin. Just the othin
evening an inventive jachanapes arranged for Owen D Young and David Sarnoti. though separated by the swelling Atlanic ocean. to speak to each other as easily as thousth the were in andjacent homels.

Before we start our tramp. however. fortify yourself with these juice morsels. This pile, rhis staming fontstool of the fords that houses NBC's modern sturlios, reaches seventy-two staries into the sky. The studio section that we shall visit is ten floors high. It it. 1.250 miles of wire are used 10 connect various pieces of equipment. Jatit night. an expert told the this wire lad to be cut ino ten million pieces beiore the joh was finished. And ten million pieces means taunty million ends to be attached to this. that. and them. Trucnpy million comections bu be made before you in Little l'uddle. Arizuma, or Smithersville. Arkansas, can hear Graham MeNamee giggle at an Fid Wynn silly-sally that was a whiskered pun long Iefore this edifice rose tos confound the world and all of the radio ians whe live thereim. Ire vith swint?

Step through the looking glass, Alice, inta Radio City! Tread the corridors of this Palace of Sound and-yes-peek inside closed doors, too. And dare say that miracles have ceased!

The cotrance! Morlern and crisp, with a spotight hanging a vellow curais of light about is. Men in toppers and ladies in ermine spin through the golden revolving doors. Within.... lowk! It is all black and silver: Walls and foors gleam like obsidian, throwing a thonsand reflections along the endless corriblars.

Fiut here is a guarded gate through which all visitors must pass. And lueyonl we see the sweep of a stairway lifting into invisible heights. The phuter-pigeon in immaculate uniform seeks our tickets and aduits us. He is as Nold page buy. Furty-six others like hint help you and the and Innt Suphie wherever we wish to go.

These stairs rise to a mezanhine that is striking. circuJar. Lacewoul columas bath an either flank of the stair.

Walls are black and white under titan photographic enlargements. Scenes that depict broadcasting. On this sile are impressionistic componstions. Hands holding a violin, a lirench horm. the kevs oi a piano depressed under ten hlunt fingers. On the other wall are engineerimg pictures . . giant tules as large as a man. and cahles that writhe and twist like smakes.

Here and there are show cases holding a musemm of early brnadeasting equipment. Old. snoke-blacked tubes. wire contraptions. In one sput is a mike that was made up fur Mary l'ichford the first time she visited a sthtio. it is a globe of silk luilt to hide the metal mike. so the thattery cinema star might not be nervous.

Sccond flowr! This is a spacious spread of thickly carpeted Hooring, walls in hrilliant buttermut. In its heart is a long slesk at which three hostesses atwait our loucolic yucestoming. A blond, a branette, a red-hearl. They're all beanimul. Isn't that wonderful. Guham?

Remenber, now, for the first time this company is able

to plan for comfort. At $71!$ Fifth Avenue. the old New York, home, things were much too crowded. Here on the left is a client's waiting rom. A sponsor. meeting guests for a broadcast. is not thrown with the mob hut has his own chambers in which he can relax. Desks are there. too. if he feels industrious.

Opposite. down past the reception desk, we find the answer to an entertainer's prayer. This is his room, his lounge and penthouse and sum-parlor all combined. He rests here between hroadcants.

Throngh rhat door you can reach the guarters oi the staff of workers in this city of sound. The announcers have a room not far away. Peek in ... and see that ping-pong taide on which ther amuse themselves. Kanging the walfs are lockers in which they keep their starcherl shirts and Tuxedos. NBC announcers must never he caught in their business pants after sundown. you know.

Another door leads into the musicians' room: They've lockers. too. And space in which to park their instruments. Yes eren a spot for the hull fiddler whose Herculean sound-hox was a constant problem over at old 711.

THIRD floor! Another staircase leads to it. This is the main studio floor. Here are benches and chairs where people may wait. The roon is really a vast alleyway that stretches between two loig ruws of stuklios. Those double thors on either side leat imo NBC's charming chambers.
let's peek into one. 'That's the door. U-u-u-ugh. what a weight. Jt's heavy, and why not? 1 in it , rumning from floor to ceiling, are three shects of heavy lead. The rest is wood and wool and perhaps even bird feathers, for all

I know. The thing's as sound-prool as can be. Their list price, in case you want to get rid of your nother-ith-law's voice, is just \$600 each. NBC's got quite a few around $2 \%$, to be exact. Figure it out yolirself.
But let's leap to a studio as is a studio. The elevatior will sake us there. "Eighth floor. Jehu!" You'll bear a lot ahout this studio 8 H be fore NBC yoes off the air. It's the higgest in the work. In length 132 feet, in width 78 feet. Twelve hombed people can sit in it at one time, provided NBC porters haven't forgotten to put out the chairs. There's a balcomy for three hundred more. And the stage-get a loat of that. Agnes-will hold a 100 piece orclestra. I thought von'd like to know,

The next largest roon is called the Ginild studio. It is expecied ic replace the old Times Square Theatre which has given you such glitering presentations as Rudy Vallee's Varieties. Jack Pearl. Eddie Cantor, and others. Here are seats in green leather. and a glass curtain that can cur off the sound of an audience pounding its pahms. atul a real stage with lights and mikes that make it as complete a little theatre as you could ever want.

And the kiddies, Gord lhess 'enn. They ve got a special stulio all their own up here. You don't have to le arounsl a radio station long to learn just how muth of a nuisance child actors can be. They play in the halls and step on your feet and get in your hair. Nice chitdren. sure, hut a bit crummy if you get what I mean. NIBC setted all that by builiding a playroom for these yomgsters with many leter Kahbits chasing Mickey Mouses all over the walls. Even the studio itself looks like a nursery and Madge Tucker (she's the Lady (Contimed on hage on)

# When Broadway's most famous columnist suddenly collapsed, Ruth Cambridge stepped into his shoes and the Jergen program, and came out with flying colors 

COLSTLESS listeners were stariled a few Sumays ago when. from their sets tuned to the jergen program, there snapped. not the harsh staccato of Walter Winchell's words, but the smoother, higherpitched voice of a wollan. HERE is a glimpse into the craziest business in the world. It rivals Hollywood and beats raising crickets for exhibition battles. It's all dizzy but delightful. When you finish reading this article, you will cone to understand why song writing is all that I have just said.

To wander for a moment from the ridiculons to the sublime. ask anyone associated with the radia business, "How important is music to radio"" The answer might well be, "Radio today depends entirely uph music. Without it. it is doubtiul whether radio could exist in this commercial era."

True enough. And to go further. perliaps $90 \%$ of the daily program, front the moment a station comes on in the morning until it signs off, is devoted to music. Kadio and music go hand in hand like the traditional ham and egys.

How marvelous is radio! Trily the eighth wonder of the world! Yet what is behind these scenes? How many restless nights, feverish faces aml poor digestions are worked into each composition which gives but a fleeting joy. Consider the poor song writer! He has a case.

The average program begins and encls with masic.

How many times have you deftly twirled a dial, listened to several hars of a melody, and before the anouncer comes on the air, said to yourself: "Ah, that's the Soandso Soap Company:" So many theme songs introduce programs that the majority of entertainments can now be recognized by the salutation alone.

Let's note several of the more important artists whon are identified by the strains that open their proyrams. Kate Smith is introduced by "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain." Bing Crosby is synomymous with "When the Ilue of the Xight." "Oid Kockin" Chair" is Miklred Bailey's signature. The voice of Rucly. Vallee follows "My "Pime is lour l'ime." "Here Comes the Showbat" serves as The Naxwell Coffce Hour's harmonious amouncer and Ben Bermie's "In a Lonesome Old Town" is as familiar as his "Yow sum!"

gotten them as far as a Commumist in the Slock Exchange. For the $u$ th time they had just left the office of a prominent publisher with refusal resounding in their ears. They stood on the curb, downcast, all hope abankoned. Slowly, Klemner said, "Gosh. N. this husiness is nothing but heartaches."

HOFFMAN stared at him for a moment, mumbling the words, and suddenly a smile lit his face. He clapped hlemer on the back enthusiastically. "John, Ihat's an inspiration. A swell title lor a song. 'Heartaches.'"

Whereupon the hoys !umried home and set to work. Came the dawn and the song was contpleted. Guy Lombardo liked it, and within a short time, "Heartaches" hecante a popular number, and lo and hehold, a hit!

Writing Hoffman's name reminds me that I collaborated with him on "You're a Pain in the Heart to Mc." That was a few years back, our maiden effort as co-workers. That's where the United States mail comes in: it you have some pet make-up prohlem of your own that's bothering you. write and ask me about it. Meantime-let's get down (0) worl.

First, the broad. general rules.

1. Make-up should always be applied to a spotessly clean face. (You knew that right along, fid you? Weli, see that you jractice what you know.)
2. 16 idn use a fomblation (and me. I don't hold with them ior general use - they're apt to clog pores I use it sparingly. The best way is to wring a pad ni cotton out in cold water and apply the foundation with the damp pad. Fonndations come in tints to match your skin nowadays. just as powiler does. So don't go using white if yon're a bruncte, or thesh-color if you're a gypsy-tan.
3. If vou use crean rouge or lignid rouge, this goes on next. (ream renge is the salest for zour skim, though it's a little harder th apply than dry rotige. $\mathrm{N}^{0}$OW that we're talking alowt gadgets, let's hop up to oner air conditioning piant. It's the biggest in the world and it sends a conslamt stream of air through every studio and hallway in XBC's ten flomers.
Maybe you don't know much ahous the neceswity of air comblitooning in a studio. Think of this, then. A studio mast be quiet and silent; so no windows can be puncled in its walk that would let in street noises. Even noises in halls nust be eliminated. so air-tight floors are providerl. That means that every studio is hernetically sealed. Suppose, now. Strdio 8H, with a mob of 1.500 people in it. were suddenly cus off from the outside air. In ten minutes you'd have folks choking to reath. shlothering, suffocating.

See those sixty-four clock-face dials on that wall. We're on the tenth and (11) flow, remember. They're gadgets invented to tell just how hot and just how fresh is the air in every studion and hall. They're sensitive to heat, plenty. If a fellow lights a cigarette even, they say. it shows on a dial. Wonder what will happen if anybody ever hrings arounkl Lupe Velez?
Those whirring sounds you hear come from the fans. They're churning fresh air into a humlred yawning itn-
nels that slamt through these ten tall floors. If any fan hould stop, a red light shows on the giant control hoard hefore us. An engineer is on duty there at all times. I-isen. mister. Including us, there are over four thouvand vivitors in the buikling tonight. Keep thowe fans turning. pull-eeze!
